The fifty-fifth annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church assembled in the auditorium at Miltonvale, Kan., Tuesday, August 11th, 10 A. M., with President, P. A. Miller, in the chair.

Rev. F. C. Hill led the devotions, read portions from the epistles to the Thessalonians, and made several splendid remarks. Several prayers were offered and the presence of the Lord was manifest.

Roll Call.—Roll call was answered by twenty elders, three Conference preachers and one under the Missionary Board.

Committee on Credentials.—T. F. Child and E. H. Dunbar were elected a Committee on Credentials.

That the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society be given Thursday evening, 8 o'clock. Y. M. W. B. service Thursday at 2:30 P. M. Sunday School Rally, Thursday, 10 to 11 A. M. Ordination service, Sunday, 3 P. M. Connectional address, Friday, 3 P. M. Signed by the Committee.

Religious Services.—Committee on Religious Services renders partial report. Rev. T. Ford to preach Tuesday evening. Sister Grace Davis to lead the morning prayer meeting on Wednesday morning. Rev. William F. McConn to preach Wednesday evening.

Examination of Character.—Examination of Character resumed and E. J. Carry reported. Some discussion was had as to the report blanks for pastors. Moved and supported that we have a Committee to consider the blanks discussed before the Conference and to bring their report relative to same.

Committee on Pastor's Report Blanks.—Brother Carry was elected chairman. On motion Brother Huscher, Brother Miller, Brother DeWitt and Brother Ballard were added.

Children's Meetings .- Moved that the matter of Children's Meet-

ings be referred to the Committee on Religious Services.

President Miller made some remarks as to the character of the Children's Services desired.

Motion to adjourn carried and benediction was pronounced by Brother Hill.

### Wednesday Morning.

Conference was called to order with the President in the chair.

Brother Hardie led the devotions, quoting many passages from
Isaiah, and led in prayer. The Lord blessed and there was a shout

in the camp.

Roll Call.—After the roll call, the minutes of the last session were read and after some minor corrections were approved.

Brother Hardie Resigns From Committee.—Brother Hardie's resignation was accepted from the Committee on Moral Reform.

Brother Ford's Name Added .- On approved motion Rev. T.

Ford's name was added to the Committee on Moral Reform in the place of Brother Hardie.

Credentials.—The Committee on Credentials presented the name of Jesse Jones as delegate from Excelsior. On motion the report was adopted and the delegate seated.

Report of Prayer League.—The Secretary of the Prayer League gave his report and added some appropriate remarks. On motion the report was adopted. See Report.

Report of Ministerial Association.—Report of the Ministerial Association was then given by Brother Cook, the chairman, and after some very pleasant remarks of appreciation by both ministers and laymen the report was adopted. See Report.

Report of the Missionary Board.—The Secretary of the Missionary Board then read his report. On approved motion the report was adopted. See Report.

Credentials.—Committee on Credentials presented the name of Mrs. E. Hunter of the Bethel charge as a delegate to the Annual Conference and on approved motion the report was adopted and the delegate was seated.

Recess.—The President then declared a recess until 10:10 for Committee work.

The Conference was then called to order at 10:10 A. M.

Itineracy and Orders' Partial Report.—Committee on Itineracy and Orders then rendered a partial report, recommending that Miss Grace Davis be elected to Elders Orders, and that C. W. Dennison be admitted to travel under the direction of the Conference. On motion the report was adopted.

Credentials.—The Committee on Credentials presented the name of A. Balty as delegate from the Wesley Center charge, and on approved motion report was adopted and the delegate was seated, and the names of Arthur Rothfuss and Harry Rothfuss to travel under the direction of the Conference, and on motion these names were referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Examination of Character.—The examination of character was then resumed and Brother Currie was called. Brother Huscher reported. The Spirit of the Lord was manifest, the glory of God came down and there was a shout in the camp. Brother Cook, Brother DeWitt, Brother Miller, Brother Dennison and Brother Hill all reported.

Adjourned by limitation of time. Sung the doxology and was dismissed by Brother Ford.

#### Wednesday Afternoon.

Conference opened with the President in the chair.

Brother Coates read from the Book of First Peter and led in prayer.

Roll Call.—After the roll call, the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Credentials.—The Committee on Credentials reports the name of Eva Hall as delegate from New Hope. On motion the report was adopted and delegate seated.

Orders of the Day, Election of Officers.—Orders of the day were called for, the election of permanent officers.

On first ballot Rev. P. A. Miller was elected President.

On first ballot Rev. F. C. Hill was elected Vice-President.

On first ballot Rev. I. L. DeWitt was elected Secretary.

On motion the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for Rev. Charles Kaufman for Assistant Secretary.

On motion the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for Charles F. Pomeroy for Treasurer.

On separate motion for each the Secretary of the Conference was instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for Rev. W. A. Smith as Assistant Treasurer, Rev. E. H. Cook as Sunday School Secretary, Rev. E. H. Dunbar as Tithing Secretary and Rev. E. J. Carry as Secretary of the Prayer League.

On the first ballot Rev. F. E. Shivers was elected Conference Trustee to succeed himself.

On the first ballot C. H. Sheldon was elected Lay Member of the Board of Trustees to succeed himself.

Motion was then carried that we have a caretaker for the camp ground and that the Finance Committee bring in a recommendation as to his salary.

Motion was carried that the President be chairman of the Camp Ground and Camp Meeting Committee.

On motion the following members were added to the Committee: Rev. I. L. DeWitt, Rev. E. J. Carry, Rev. S. F. Wilson, T. B. Holloway, C. H. Sheldon, William S. Ivey.

On approved motion Brother Ivey was elected caretaker of the camp grounds.

On approved motion Rev. E. A. Coates was elected to succeed himself on the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

On approved motion the Assistant Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for Rev. I. L. DeWitt, Rev. E. A. Coates, Rev. C. E.

Huscher and Rev. T. J. Pomeroy as Committee on Judicial Proceedings.

On approved motion Rev. S. F. Wilson, Rev. F. E. Shivers, Alex Ballard, L. P. Rawlins were elected Committee on Vacancy of President.

On approved motion I. L. DeWitt, T. J. Pomeroy, E. E. Palmer, Frank Dietrich were elected members of the Superannuate Board.

On approved motion F. C. Hill, C. H. Sheldon were constituted President's Advisory Board.

Motion was then made and approved that I. L. DeWitt, E. J. Carry, W. F. McConn, Alex Ballard, C. H. Sheldon and Guy Harrington be the Missionary Board.

On approved motion E. H. Cook, chairman; E. A. Coates and E. C. Campbell were elected Sunday School Board.

Quarterly Meetings.—Motion was then made that the President have oversight of the four quarterly meetings of the Conference and that the President provide supplies for those meetings he cannot hold himself. Motion was lost.

Quarterly Meeting Evangelist.—Moved that the President hold half the quarterly meetings and that we elect a Quarterly Meeting Evangelist. Carried.

On second ballot I. L. DeWitt was elected.

Pastor's Salary.—Moved that the Annual Conference direct the Quarterly Meeting Evangelists at the First Quarterly Conference of each charge to help in making proper canvass for the raising of the pastor's salary before his work on the charge be considered finished. Carried.

Home Missions.—There was then much discussion as to Home Missions.

Resolutions.—Resolutions of the Conference were then read and discussed.

Committee on Resolutions.—On approved motion E. H. Dunbar was appointed to look up the resolutions of the Conference now in effect and report to the Conference.

Date of Camp Meeting.—The matter of the confliction of dates of our Conference and Camp Meeting with some neighboring camp meetings was discussed.

Moved that our Camp Meeting begin on Friday and run over the two Sundays following, with the Conference commencing Tuesday after the first Sunday and to run parallel until the following Sunday. Motion lost.

Moved that we have our Conference and Camp Meeting as at present. Carried.

Salaries of Quarterly Meeting Evangelists.—On approved motion the matter of salaries for Quarterly Meeting Evangelists was referred to the Finance Committee.

Adjourned on motion and Rev. Coates dismissed with prayer.

#### Thursday Morning.

Brother Shivers led the devotions, reading from the thirty-second chapter of Deuteronomy and led in prayer.

Roll Call.—After the roll call, the minutes of the previous session were read and approved after some minor corrections.

Credentials.—The Committee on Credentials presented the name of P. M. Martin as delegate from Gaylord and Vernon Willard of the Miltonvale class as a proper person to travel under the direction of the Conference.

On approved motion the delegate was seated and the recommendation to travel was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Connectional Editor Introduced.—Rev. F. A. Butterfield, Editor of the Wesleyan Methodist, was then introduced to the Conference and made some appropriate remarks.

Finance Committee.—Brother Currie having been compelled to return home on account of sickness, C. H Sheldon was added to the Finance Committee in his place.

Report of Committee on Blanks.—Special Committee on Blanks reports that the pastor's blank be used at the Quarterly Conference and that the same blanks be used at the Annual Conference by the evangelist and others not pastors.

Moved as an amendment to the motion that the report be brought to the Annual Conference to be submitted to the Committee on Examination of Character for their use in passing the character of the preachers. Amendment carried.

Motion then carried as amended.

Visiting Brethren.—Moved that all visiting brethren be invited to a seat within the Conference bar.

Examination of Character.—Examination of character was then resumed. T. F. Child, C. A. Kaufman and F. E. Shivers were called.

Sunday School Rally.—The hour having arrived for the Sunday School Rally, Rev. E. H. Cook, Sunday School Secretary, then took the chair. Many good things were said but we wish to mention specially the good talk given by Mrs. Clara McLeister, Assistant Editor of the Sunday School Literature of our Connection.

Credentials.—The Committee on Credentials presented the names of S. F. Stapp, of Belleville, and Elmer MacIntosh, of Excelsior, as suitable persons to travel under the direction of the Conference.

On approved motion the credentials were referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Finance.—The Committee on Finance reports. See Report.

Rev. U. G. Travis Introduced.—The Committee on Courtesy then introduced Rev. U. G. Travis of the United Brethren church, who made some pleasant remarks.

Camp Ground Treasurer Reports.—Treasurer of the Camp Ground and Camp Meeting reports. See Report.

On approved motion report was referred to the Auditing Committee.

The matter of changing the tabernacle was discussed.

Change of Tabernacle.—On approved motion the action of the last Conference as to changing the tabernacle was rescinded.

Typist for Secretary.—On approved motion the Conference agrees to hire a typist for the Conference Secretary.

Refund of Tabernacle Funds.—Motion was then carried to permit the Treasurer of the Camp Ground and Camp Meeting Committee to refund the money paid on subscription for cementing the floor of the tabernacle to those desiring same.

Loud Speaker.—On approved motion the President was instructed to appoint a Committee to investigate the advisability of putting in a loud speaker for the camp meetings.

Adjourned on motion.

Session opened with President Miller in the chair. Brother Carkuff led the devotions, reading a portion of Scripture and leading in prayer.

Roll Call.—After the roll call, the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Credentials.—The Committee on Credentials then presented a recommendation from the Gaylord class recommending that J. H. Hinchsliff be elected to Elder's Orders.

#### REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY BOARD.

To the Kansas Annual Conference, August 11-15, 1925.

Number of meetings, seven.

First meeting September 5, 1924. Voted to assist in financial way the meeting at Concordia and gave \$100.

Considered the possibility of openings at other places and in other fields, but nothing definite was done.

Second meeting October 24, 1924. At this meeting the Board listened to the favorable report of the successful meeting at Concordia and were glad a church organization was effected.

A motion prevailed that the Board stand behind a meeting in Gaylord for \$100 and that amount was sent to Rev. Hinchsliff.

Third meeting November 12, 1924. At this meeting the Board voted to pay six months' rent on building at Concordia for the new church there.

The Secretary was instructed to write the subscribers to the Concordia Mission to ascertain who had paid or were in arrears and to urge payment of pledges as the Mission was in urgent need at that time.

Fourth meeting January 6, 1925. Voted to advance money to pay back payments of the Mission at Concordia and insurance on the building.

Also to back meeting in Topeka near Gage Park in the early summer.

Fifth meeting, March 6, 1925. At this meeting a number of subjects were up for discussion, such as organization of a class at Belleville, and the securing of Brother Hotchkiss to carry out this plan, but nothing definite was accomplished except the assisting of the Concordia Mission.

Sixth meeting, May 18, 1925. President reported that he made trip to Belleville, but was unable to effect an organization at the present, although it looks favorable.

Voted to insure Evangelist V. C. Martin \$25 per week in meeting at Union Valley, providing collections were not sufficient to cover that amount. Also Brother Bowser, who assisted in meeting at that place, giving him \$20 per week under the same provisions.

Advanced \$20 to Norton class to pay pavement there.

Brother F. C. Hill was to go to Ottawa to look into the matter of buying church property and that Board pay his expenses on this trip.

Seventh meeting, July 28, 1925. President Miller reported that Evangelist V. C. Martin had a good meeting at Union Valley and Board voted to give Brother Martin \$20.03 to give him \$25 per week as previously arranged and Brother Bowser \$23.71 to insure him \$20 per week.

It was decided to drop the matter of organizing a class at Ottawa for the present. Brother Hill did not go to Ottawa because the matter was called off.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Since the success of the Sunday School rests in a great measure with the teachers, we believe, therefore, that great care should be exercised in the selection of the same. They should not only be spiritually minded men and women, but they should have the gift to teach. There are some excellent exhorters who are not teachers. And since as a Conference we insist upon a trained and educated ministry, we, no doubt, would meet with greater success in teaching our Sunday School lessons, if our teachers were encouraged to at least take up some form of systematic Bible study. We would recommend that each of our pastors introduce and encourage such a course of study.

We also believe that we, as a Conference, should work more cooperatively with our district and county associations and follow more closely the plans of our state workers. And while they are sometimes not spiritual, we should accept the challenge and instill spirituality into these associations.

We believe the literature of our denomination unexcelled and we recommend its use in all Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools.

Regularity and promptness should be encouraged in all.

We would also voice our opposition to the organized liquor forces of the nation who seek to break down the Constitution itself. We declare as our profound conviction, that any individual who will violate these laws for financial gain, will violate any other law that does not suit his convenience to obey; he is a menace to society and should be confined behind iron bars.

We reiterate our opposition to worldly conformity of every kind and especially condemn the commercialization of the Sabbath, the public dance hall, and all other forms of amusement which arouse the sensuous natures of men.

We believe that the Bible furnishes the best standard of morals ever devised, and declare it to be our belief, that America will be secure only if the teachings of this book are followed in the lives of our people.

- 8. Statistical Report. Resolved, That the Conference require each Pastor and Evangelist to submit their statistical report upon the first roll call at the opening of the Conference. If it is not possible for him to be present at the opening session of the Conference, he shall mail his report to the Conference Secretary so that it may be submitted at that time.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PLAN OF WORK.

We, the Committee on the Plan of Work, hereby recommend:

- 1. That we have a Harvest Home Day as near the middle of October as possible, and that each local Society take an offering for the College Library in connection with the Harvest Home donation.
- 2. That by recommendation of the General Conference Society all local dues be sent to our Conference Treasurer, and there to be divided equally between the General and Conference Treasurers.

  - 12. That the members of our Gleaners Society write at least
