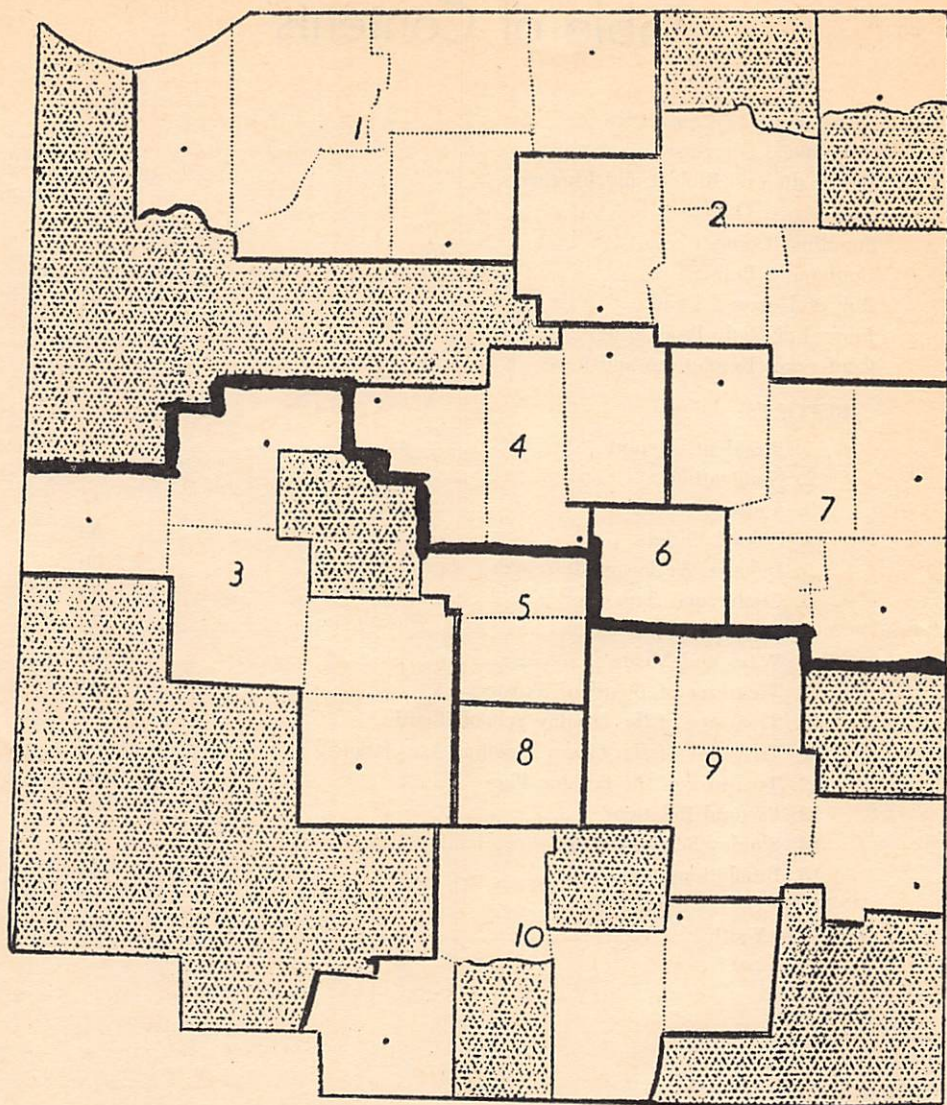

All churches whose regular Sunday school offerings and regular church tithes and offerings average the following per week for the month, shall remit as indicated:

Less than \$50.00 per week shall remit 7%
\$50.00 to \$99.99 per week shall remit 8%
\$100.00 to \$149.99 per week shall remit 9%
\$150.00 to \$199.99 per week shall remit 10%
\$200.00 and above remit 11%

These receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

64% for the Conference Operating Fund
18% for Conference Extension
8% for Camp Meeting
4½% for Camp Wiring Project
3½% for Conference Youth Work
2% for Conference Sunday School Work

Journal of Daily Proceedings

The one hundred fifteenth session of the Indiana Annual Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened on the Fairmount Campground, Fairmount, Indiana, 7:30 p.m., August 5th, 1963.

Opening—The President of the Conference, Rev. Kenneth Dunn, presided in the opening service. Rev. Richard Abraham, pastor of the Lancaster Church, led the congregation in singing two of our favorite hymns, "We're Marching to Zion" and "Saved to the Uttermost."

Invocation—Rev. Dallas D. McIntosh.

Congregational Song—"I Will Praise Him," a very appropriate hymn, was sung by the congregation.

Urgency of Prayer—The President of the Conference placed emphasis upon the necessity of prayer for this conference and camp meeting.

Special Song—Mr. and Mrs. David L. Thompson, from Asbury Seminary, Wilmore, Ky., brought a special message in song.

Opening Sermon—By the action of the last session of the Annual Conference Rev. H. N. Robinson, pastor of the Nelson St. Church, was elected to preach the opening sermon. The Scripture text of the message was taken from Rev. 1:9-20 and I Timothy 3:15. The subject "The Church" was presented in four points: 1. The Church—Its Meaning, 2. The Church—Its Origin and Builder, 3. The Function of the Church, 4. The Power and Destiny of The Church.

Closing Hymn—A closing hymn, "Redeemed," was sung by the congregation.

Benediction—Rev. B. O. Crowe.

Tuesday, August 6, 8:30 a.m.

Opening—Brother Maxwell Enyeart led the singing using "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," and "On Christ the Solid Rock I Stand."

Devotional—Rev. Lee Haines, Office Editor of Adult Sunday school material conducted the morning devotions. He used Scripture from I Samuel 7:7-12 as a basis for his message. He presented three points from the text which were: 1. Gravity of the Situation; 2. Greatness of God's Deliverance; 3. Gratitude of God's People. Brother Haines then offered prayer.

Call to Order—The President of the Conference, Rev. Kenneth Dunn, called the Conference to order.

Roll Call—93 elders, 10 conference preachers, 112 delegates answered roll call.

Conference Bar—A motion was made and carried by vote that the Conference Bar be fixed as the first ten tiers of seats in front and including the rostrum.

Time of Conference—A motion was made and carried that the time of Conference to convene be fixed at 8:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., to recess at 11:30 a.m. and to adjourn upon motion in the afternoon.

President's Message—The President read his Annual Message which upon vote was accepted.

President's Report—The President read the report of his Official Acts; Appointment of Chairmen; Special Orders and Calendar of Business which upon motions were adopted by vote. See Report No. 1.

Nominating Committee—The Committee on Nominations reported the nominations of committees, which upon motion was adopted.

Hospitalization—The Committee on Ways and Means read the following recommendation on the group hospitalization plan which was presented for consideration by this conference.

Introduction—Mr. Earl Nutter, representing the Blue Cross and Blue Shield, was introduced to hear discussion and to answer any questions.

"By adopting the report of last year's Ways and Means Committee, the 1962 annual session of the Indiana Conference ordered this year's committee to study a program of life, health, and accident insurance for the ministers of the Conference. It also instructed the committee to study immediately the hospitalization program which is now in effect for conference officials and superannuates, and if a more favorable program were found, that they recommend the same to the trustees of the Conference.

"In obedience to your instructions, this committee proceeded to study several different plans and made a recommendation to the Conference Board of Trustees. Because of the importance of the decision, the Trustees felt that it would be best for us to present our report directly to this session of the Conference.

"In view of the comparatively higher costs of other plans, the satisfactory service Blue Cross has thus far provided, the excellent recognition it meets at all hospitals, and the very fair margin of operating costs it maintains, your committee recommends to the Indiana Conference the plan proposed for us by Blue Cross-Blue Shield. The Blue Cross is to include in-hospital diagnostic care, and the Blue Shield will pay the standard surgical rate.

"Those eligible to participate in the Conference group will include those appointed by the Conference as pastors, conference officials, general evangelists, general officials and those employed by the general Board of Administration, and all superannuates who are eligible in accordance with Article III, Section C, Item 6 of the Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference, except those who are covered with another hospitalization plan due to other employment."

RESOLUTION ON THE RECOGNITION OF GOD IN OUR
PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS

WHEREAS the historic attitude of the United States Government toward the worship of God has been one of friendliness, as may be substantiated by any number of evidences, and

WHEREAS the American citizenry today, of whatever creed, is overwhelmingly characterized by faith in God and a recognition of our national and personal dependence upon Him, and

WHEREAS the intent of our founding fathers in forbidding the establishment of religion in the First and Fourteenth Amendments of our Constitution was manifestly not to remove all vestiges of our theistic faith from government-sponsored premises and activities, and

WHEREAS in recent years there has been a determined effort by an atheistic minority, having every personal privilege of disbelief, to secure judicial decisions purported based upon the Constitution to shield themselves from reminder of their minority status by the banishment of all theistic traces from publicly sponsored activities and premises, notably from our public school which, because of compulsory attendance requirements, affect the lives of the vast majority of our children, thus undermining the historic foundation of our moral and ethical value system, and

WHEREAS successive actions of the Supreme Court, occasioned by the persistent appeals of atheists and agnostics, seem to indicate a growing inclination to ban from public life all worship of God, in however broad terms, and all recognition of Him,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, assembled in its 31st quadrennial General Conference in Fairmount, Indiana, respectfully petitions our legislative leaders to discover for us and for the great God-fearing majority of our people some adequate lawful redress from the above-described disability. We presume that such may require a Constitutional Amendment recognizing the sovereignty of almighty God for our nation (while granting freedom of conviction and propagation to those who choose not to recognize Him), reaffirming the doctrine that units of the Government are to avoid acts and policies involving the support or establishment of organized religion, but declaring the principle that it is not deemed a contravention of this doctrine that the name of God be honored in state and civic life and that men be encouraged to read the Bible in its various versions and to worship God in accordance with the dictates of their own conscience, not excluding the incidental occurrence of such activities even from premises built or financed in whole or in part by public moneys, that this nation may indeed be a nation under God.

BE IT RESOLVED FURTHER that we urge all our people to circulate petitions after this tenor, these to be sent to the national legislators from our various areas of residence, endeavoring thus to show the concern of God-fearing peoples in America that the public recognition of God, the Creator of all men, who is revealed fully in His Son, Jesus Christ, be not destroyed from among us.

Motion was made and supported that this resolution be approved and that the annual conferences be requested to take action upon it, with such modifications as shall seem suitable, recommending it to the churches as an appropriate basis for petitions to be circulated among

God-fearing people and also as an idea and source for personal letters to congressmen and senators.

Resolutions and Laws

I. CHURCHES

A. Houses of Worship:

Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or ministers of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

B. Pastoral support:

1. All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and, also, payment of utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning, and sewage, also the pastor's medical, surgical and hospitalization insurance premium "and at least one-half Social Security." The parsonage telephone, except for personal long-distance calls, shall be considered as church incidental expense and paid for by the church.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.

3. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks' vacation with pay.

C. Pulpit Supply:

1. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which appointments may be made.

2. It is recommended that churches giving a vote for recall of their pastor, vote on or between the third and fourth Sundays of May.

D. Annual Business:

The Annual business meeting of the local church, which is referred to in Par. 165 (4) of the Discipline, shall be held during the month of June.

E. Church Council:

1. It is recommended that each church have a church council which shall serve as the co-ordinating committee for the entire church program. This council may be composed of the pastor, the S. S. Supt., the church treasurer, the president of the WMS, the president of the

WY, the first member of the advisory committee, the chairman of the Board of Stewards, the chairman of the pulpit supply committee and other leaders or committee members as the church may deem advisable.

2. The pastor may call the council together monthly or as many times during the Conference year as deemed advisable. The council may initiate business, make referrals, listen to reports, and serve in an advisory capacity for the entire church program. The Boards of the church shall continue to function as specified by the Discipline and in no way should this council displace any other committee or board nor assume any authority vested in any other committee.

3. When such a council exists, it should be the duty of the council to meet with the conference officials at least one time during the Conference year when the official visits the church to discuss problems and ideas which have to do with the better operation of the local church.

F. Newly Organized Churches:

Conference Budget shall not be assigned a newly organized church until one year from the end of the fiscal year in which they are organized.

II. PASTORAL DUTIES

A. Insurance:

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire, lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

B. Statistics:

1. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee, without fail, by July 10. In reporting statistics, all figures given shall be in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i.e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. This applies to all except budget and benevolence items. All unaccounted for members appearing in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported as received.

2. When a pastor or evangelist shall not have submitted satisfactory reports, including statistics, and, in the case of a pastor, when his church's Superannuated Pension budget is not paid in full, he shall be referred to the Character Committee before his official character be passed.

3. Delegates' credentials secured from the secretary shall be mailed to the assistant secretary by the pastor, not later than July 10.

C. Quarterly Meetings:

1. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board and shall be held near the close of each fiscal

quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meetings.

D. Calling List:

1. Each pastor should prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday School; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city, street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

E. Church Extension & Evangelism:

1. Each pastor whose total receipts from his charge exceeds \$4000 per year should seek to start a new work or make his services available for a revival meeting in a new or weaker church to help establish it. A weaker church shall be considered as one whose pastor's receipts are \$2500 or less. The charge which he pastors should grant him such privilege without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The church to which he goes should defray his traveling expenses and should receive regular offerings during the meetings for the establishing of their own work. The Vice Presidents shall serve as coordinators of this plan by recommending and helping to arrange such meetings.

2. All pastors should seek the council of the church advisory committee when a revival meeting away from the church is anticipated. No pastor should hold more than two revival meetings away from his charge unless by the consent of the Conference President.

III. CONFERENCE

A. Conference Officials:

1. There shall be a President and two Vice Presidents elected, one of these shall be designated as the First Vice President and the other as the Second Vice President. One Vice President's work shall be primarily in the northern area of the Conference and the other in the southern. These areas shall be designated north and south by a line running east from the Illinois State line following the northern boundary of district three and continuing along the southern boundary of districts four, six and seven to the Ohio State line. The three officials shall determine which Vice President shall work in which area. The Vice Presidents shall assist the President in presiding at the annual conference.

2. They shall be given a two weeks' vacation with pay and shall have the privilege of holding one revival meeting yearly, in or out of the Conference, at a time of their own choosing and for which they are to receive the remuneration personally.

B. Officials' Duties:

1. Each church shall be visited at least once during the year by a Conference official, but some churches, at the discretion of the officials, may be visited more often. During such visitation the official may bring a message, listen to a pastoral message, sit in a church business meeting, meet with any board or committee of the church he may choose, counsel with the pastor and work for a closer coordination and understanding be-

tween pastor, church, and Conference. At least once during the year at the time of a visitation the Conference official shall meet with the church council as described in Section I, E, sub-paragraph 3, to discuss finances, pastor's salary, problems, and ideas, or anything which has to do with the better operation of the local church.

2. President—The Conference President shall supervise the entire program of the Conference, being responsible for all matters of a general nature and devoting as much of his time as possible to visitation of the local churches.

3. The Vice Presidents, besides the visitations listed above shall work with the weaker churches in counseling, securing pastors to hold revivals (See Section II, sub-paragraph E) and make every effort to strengthen the weaker churches. With the counsel of the President, they shall determine where and when to hold revival meetings in a new or weaker church. They shall also determine the length of such meetings and the number of such meetings each Vice President should hold during each quarter. The offerings received during such meetings, unless raised for a local project or for Conference Extension, shall be turned to the Conference Treasurer and placed in the Conference Operating Fund. The Vice Presidents should keep in close contact with those churches in their area receiving Conference support by visiting them at least once a quarter with the aim of making them self-supporting as quickly as possible. They should promote church extension in their visitation and should see that funds are raised for that purpose. And they should work with the Board on Conference Extension and Evangelism in the planning of new works and have as a goal the organizing of at least one new church in each area during the Conference year.

4. In view of the great need of our local churches for close guidance in the work of Sunday schools and Wesleyan Youth, we recommend that our Conference Officials do what they can in visiting the churches to promote better organization, greater activity, and more consistent growth in these important fields. To this end we recommend that the three Officials designate one of the Vice Presidents to work especially in the area of Sunday schools and the other to work in the area of Wesleyan Youth. It shall be the duty of the first to meet with the Conference Sunday School Board and of the second with the Wesleyan Youth executive committee, and to counsel and aid them in their work. The contribution of the Vice Presidents shall be made especially in the areas of promotion and visitation. In carrying out this part of their duties, they shall not be limited to the geographical areas to which they are assigned. As they shall deem wise, special periods of time may be blocked off for local Sunday School or youth clinics, district conventions, and rallies, etc. In the matter of conference-wide promotional mailings, it shall be the responsibility of the organization involved to pay the cost of secretarial help and postage. The labors of the two Vice Presidents shall in no way relieve the Conference Sunday School Board or the Wesleyan Youth executive committee of their responsibility for the direction and promotion of their respective spheres of interest.

5. The President shall call a meeting of the ministers and their wives in the different parts of the conference during the conference year. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference.

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

The president shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals and in general seek to promote a greater interest in the Conference program. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

6. The President and Vice Presidents shall constitute the executive committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER. They shall be responsible for editing and circulating it. The departments which use the columns of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

C. Annual Conference:

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Ind., beginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.

2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gatherings belongs to the new conference year. This applies to pastoral appointment.

3. The fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.

6. Effective at the rise of the 1961 Conference the Conference shall pay the hospitalization premiums of the Superannuated ministers and their dependents unless they are properly covered with hospitalization otherwise, and, provided they are eligible to receive Superannuated pension benefits, and, provided they shall have received a Conference appointment at the hands of this Conference for ten years previous to their retirement. (Conference appointments shall be understood to consist of pastors, conference evangelists, only, in full-time work, conference officials, general conference officials, or those employed by the General Board of Administration.) Those Superannuates receiving hospitalization benefits at the present time shall continue to do so.

7. The President and Vice Presidents shall be consulted before any love offerings are taken during the annual encampment.

8. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the Minutes as if ordered by this conference.

9. The Emergency Benefit Fund shall be used for the relief of ministers of the Conference or their widows who shall make application to the Conference President for financial assistance in time of emergency. This fund is to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.

10. In the election of President and Vice Presidents, the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. The two names receiving the highest number of votes shall be the nominees.

11. A citation in the form of a certificate, shall be presented to all those who have been appointed by the Conference, and have given twenty-five years of service to the Wesleyan Methodist church.

D. Secretaries:

1. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.

2. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion daily papers, and the church periodicals.

3. In accordance with the Discipline, paragraph 377, exact budget assessments will be made for each church and mailed to the respective pastors by the conference secretary within two weeks of the rise of each conference session.

4. The Conference Secretary is authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the events of the death of minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested, the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Operating Fund.

E. Treasurers:

1. The Treasurers shall submit their reports by July 25th, to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

F. Boards:

1. Board of Conference Extension and Evangelism:

a. The Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism shall be composed of the Conference President, the two Conference Vice Presidents, the Conference WMS President, and two elders and two laymen nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference. The term of the elected members shall be for one year and they shall not serve for more than four consecutive years. It is recommended that no one, other than Conference President and the two Vice Presidents be at the same time a member of the Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism and the Conference Board of Trustees.

2. Board of Trustees:

a. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

G. Salaries:

1. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice Presidents \$50.00, Secretary \$100.00, Assistant Secretary \$50.00, Treasurer \$300.00, Assistant Treasurer \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00, Pension Plan Treasurer \$100.00, and expenses; the expense of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders; the same to be paid from the Conference Operating Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

H. Minutes:

1. The Conference Minutes are to be distributed with a minimum of one copy for every four members of the church or fraction thereof and that the same be paid for out of the Conference operating fund. Additional copies may be purchased at 75¢ per copy.

IV. COMMITTEES:

A. Itineracy and Elders' Orders:

1. The Committee on Elders' Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

B. Camp Meeting:

1. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference with his alternate.

2. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

3. The Conference President shall be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

C. Building:

1. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

D. Nominating:

1. A nominating committee shall be elected during the session of Conference, consisting of two ministers and two laymen, the President as chairman. This committee shall meet prior to the next Annual Conference and fill committees with nominees to be approved or disapproved by the conference. This committee shall be nominated and elected from the open floor of conference and shall serve for one year only, except the chairman who retains this position by virtue of his office.

V. OTHER RESOLUTIONS

A. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VI. BURIAL ASSOCIATION

A. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.

B. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

Item I. Budget

A. General Budget:

B. Conference Budget:

The Conference Budget shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer as undivided Budget at the end of each month, and shall be figured on the following percentages:

All churches whose regular Sunday school offerings and regular church tithes and offerings average the following per week for the month, shall remit as indicated:

Less than \$50.00 per week shall remit 7%
\$50.00 to \$99.99 per week shall remit 8%
\$100.00 to \$149.99 per week shall remit 9%
\$150.00 to \$199.99 per week shall remit 10%
\$200.00 and above remit 11%

These receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

64% for the Conference Operating Fund
18% for Conference Extension
8% for Camp Meeting
4½% for Camp Wiring Project
3½% for Conference Youth Work
2% for Conference Sunday School Work

C. Budget to Conference Treasurer:

All church budget excepting that raised by the W.M.S., the Y.M.W.B., and the Wesleyan Youth shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

D. Adjustment of Funds:

All adjusting of funds and renaming of funds shall be under the direction of the Board of Trustees, and if in the Conference year there shall occur a deficit, the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to raise the Conference Budget 1% for the balance of the year.

Item II. Remuneration of officials:

The salary of the president shall be \$450.00 per month plus hospitalization insurance, one-half Social Security, and utilities (including fuel, electricity, water conditioning, and sewage), and that of the vice presidents shall be \$400.00 per month plus hospitalization insurance, one-half Social Security, and utilities; the same is to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work. Travel expense shall be paid at the rate of seven cents per mile. The three shall employ secretarial help as needed. These items shall be paid from the Conference Operating Fund.

Item III. Changes and Additions to Resolutions and Laws:

We recommend the following amendments to the Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference:

A. A new paragraph between paragraphs three and four, page 39 under "Official Duties":

In view of the great need of our local churches for close guidance in the work of Sunday schools and Wesleyan Youth, we recommend that

our Conference Officials do what they can in visiting the churches to promote better organization, greater activity and more consistent growth in these important fields. To this end we recommend that the three Officials designate one of the Vice Presidents to work especially in the area of Sunday schools and the other to work in the area of Wesleyan Youth. It shall be the duty of the first to meet with the Conference Sunday School Board and of the second with the Wesleyan Youth executive committee, and to counsel and aid them in their work. The contribution of the Vice Presidents shall be made especially in the areas of promotion and visitation. In carrying out this part of their duties, they shall not be limited to the geographical areas to which they are assigned. As they shall deem wise, special periods of time may be blocked off for local Sunday School or youth clinics, district conventions, and rallies, etc. In the matter of conference-wide promotional mailings, it shall be the responsibility of the organization involved to pay the cost of secretarial help and postage. The labors of the two vice presidents shall in no way relieve the Conference Sunday School Board or the Wesleyan Youth executive committee of their responsibility for the direction and promotion of their respective spheres of interest.

B. A new paragraph pg. 40 under Secretaries between paragraphs two and three:

In accordance with the Discipline, paragraph 377, exact budget assessments will be made for each church and mailed to the respective pastors by the conference secretary within two weeks of the rise of each conference session.

C. At the top of page 40, first line insert parenthetically after the word, "retirement," Conference appointments shall be understood to consist of pastors, evangelists, Conference officials, General officials, or those employed by the General Board of Administration.

D. Page 36, Item I, under Pastoral Support, paragraph one, line six, after word "premium," insert "and at least one-half Social Security."

E. Delete Item VII, page 42.

Item IV. Miscellaneous

A. The Indiana Conference is entering upon a period when the demand for more churches is rising due to the population explosion, but when the supply of qualified pastors is decreasing. Some men are dropping out of the active ministry of necessity, others by choice. Some are settling into a long-term pattern of part-time ministry—again partly of necessity and partly of choice. Competition for the graduates of our colleges and seminary is keen, both from other denominations and from our sister conferences. It is our conviction that we as a conference must create the kind of spiritual and aggressive climate necessary to make our field of labor attractive to the best men available. We must encourage a full-time ministry, but we must also encourage a full-time support of that full-time ministry.

Therefore, we recommend that a committee of five be nominated by the Committee on Nominations and be elected by this body to study our needs in this area and to report to the 1964 session. It shall be their duty:

(1) To make a survey of all the men who have dropped out of the ac-

tive ministry in our Conference in the past 10 years, and of all pastors or ministerial graduates who have left our ranks to serve in other conferences or denominations; the survey shall seek to discover the reasons for these losses and possible means of stopping them.

- (2) To make a study of the methods used by other conferences or denominations to guarantee a living wage to their ministers.
- (3) To study the churches of our conference with the possibility in mind of reintroducing and updating the circuit system as a means of increasing pastors' salaries and decreasing the number of pastors needed; such circuits could not be organized before the 1965 session.

B. Inasmuch as the camps mean much to the spiritual life of our young people, and inasmuch as the burden of operating the camps continues to fall on a few, we recommend that all full-time pastors and pastors' wives offer their services and be granted time by their churches to help in the Youth and Junior Bible camps.

It is expected that this would not deduct from vacation, revival time, or salary.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Your Sunday School Board wishes to praise God for His blessings upon the Sunday School program of the past year.

The convention of last Fall, September 22, was a time of inspiration and learning as Dr. Edward Simpson and his wife, Dr. Frances Simpson, led the program with messages, workshops, and a skit. Dr. Paul Kindschi and the denominational Sunday School Department added much to the success of the day by leading workshops and presenting exhibits of Sunday School materials.

About 400 laymen and sixty ministers attended the convention.

The Conference Sunday School contest last March, April, and May gave impetus to local programs of attendance promotion, visitation, and leadership training. The Conference received first place awards in the large conference division of a denominational contest based on participation in the WESLEYAN EVANGELICAL TEACHER TRAINING program.

The Junior Bible Camp was a wonderful occasion when four hundred fifty-four children ages nine through twelve came to the campground intent upon having a good time. This they seemed to do. Scores of them were saved in the evening services. It is recognized that this is a fertile field for evangelism and Christian training. We believe that our ministers can make a great contribution to evangelism in the Conference by combining their efforts to make the Junior encampment a spiritual success. Soul-winning at this age level is of basic importance.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend that a one day conference-wide Sunday School Convention be held this fall, Saturday, September 21 at Marion, Hillside Church.

We recommend that our Indiana churches observe Rally Day, October 6.

We recommend that the Rally Day offerings be raised and used for local projects.

We recommend that the Conference Sunday School Contest be conducted from the first Sunday of March through Mothers' Day, and that the contest be based on: (1) Gains in Sunday school attendance. (2) Percent of Sunday school attenders staying for Worship. (3) Sunday school visitation.

We recommend that this conference year each church sponsor at least two units of study in the WESLEYAN EVANGELICAL TEACHER TRAINING series.

We recommend that inasmuch as it would be unwise to try to accommodate a larger Junior Bible Camp with present facilities there be two Junior Bible Camps in the summer of 1964. The dates for the camps would be July 6 through 10 and July 13 through 17. The districts with odd numbers should attend the first camp and the districts with even numbers should attend the second camp.

Since the Sunday School is the life of the Church, let us continually strive to do a more effective job for the Church through promotion of attendance, evangelism and Christian education in the Sunday school.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

I. REAFFIRMATION OF HISTORIC BELIEFS

WHEREAS, we believe that the Wesleyan Methodist Church has been called into existence to spread Scriptural holiness throughout the world, be it RESOLVED, that we reaffirm the historic position of our church as stated in the Articles of Religion in the Discipline on matters of Christian doctrine and practice.

II. MORALS

RESOLVED, that we voice our protest against open and shameless sin as exhibited by modern society, as evidenced by the desecration of the Lord's Day, immodest dress, degrading literature, drunkenness, adulterous practices, and other forms of worldliness.

III. YOUTH

WHEREAS, the greatest response to the call of God comes before the age of 17, and

WHEREAS, the demand for dedicated Christian workers is urgent, be it RESOLVED, that we emphasize the winning of youth to Christ, and that we present them with the challenge of soul-seeking for Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit.

IV. SPORTS

WHEREAS, there is a tendency in some of our churches for groups to engage in organized sports and in commercialized amusements in the name of the church, and

WHEREAS, it is our belief that the primary purpose of the church is spiritual and not secular, be it

RESOLVED, that we express our disapproval of the use of the name "Wesleyan Methodist" to denote any group whose primary purpose is participation in organized sports or in commercial amusements of any kind.

V. COLLEGE

WHEREAS, it is imperative that Marion College becomes regionally ac-

credited, be it

RESOLVED, that we give our full support in the realms of prayer, finances, and the encouragement of our youth to attend.

VI. CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

RESOLVED, that we intensify our efforts to conserve our converts for church membership.

VII. ECUMENICAL MOVEMENT

RESOLVED, that we reject any organizational union of churches that compromises the doctrines of the Holy Scriptures.

VIII. RACIAL

RESOLVED, that we be of Christian compassion and love for each branch of the human race, seeking to bring them to Jesus Christ.

IX. COMMUNISM

WHEREAS, communism remains a grave threat to the church and to our democratic way of life; and

WHEREAS, the aim of communism is to deceive people everywhere and to lull into a false sense of security so that the communist program may triumph throughout the world, be it

RESOLVED, that Wesleyan Methodists be urged to inform themselves with care as to the purpose and program of communism, and that as citizens of the United States, we support the leaders of our nation in every effort to combat this atheistic movement and to preserve the liberties of America.

X. RECOGNITION OF GOD

WHEREAS, this conference has adopted the General Conference resolution on the recognition of God in our public institutions, be it

RESOLVED, that we, as God-fearing, freedom loving Wesleyan Methodist people, do arise to preserve our rights to worship and honor Almighty God in the same freedom as our forefathers enjoyed, by the circulation of petitions and the writing of personal letters on both the conference and local level under the direction of the Conference President, Vice Presidents, and Pastors, these petitions and letters to be mailed to all our Senators and Representatives, urging whatever legislation or Constitutional Amendment is necessary in order to restore full right-of-worship to that vast majority of United States citizens that do believe in God.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Conference President send copies of these resolutions to Indiana officials of sister denominations, in order to urge them to act with us.

Minutes—The minutes were read and approved.

Adjournment—By motion the conference was adjourned sine die at 2:45 p.m.

Benediction—Mrs. Kathryn Beaver voiced the closing prayer.

SPECIAL ORDER

Public Missionary Service, Friday, 7:30 p.m.

The service, in charge of Mrs. Elizabeth Leach, retiring WMS president, was held in Bethel tabernacle, with missionaries, officers and the WMS delegation seated on the platform.

Congregational singing of "Truehearted, Wholehearted" and "I Will Make the Darkness Light" was conducted by Mrs. Alberta Metz, with Mrs. Kathleen Morris and Rev. Maurice Pierce at the instruments.

A ladies' sextette sang the WMS quadrennial theme song, "Heralds of Christ."

Rev. Robert Lytle, Deputational Secretary of the Department of World Missions, led in prayer.

New WMS officers, Mrs. Kathryn Beaver, president—Mrs. Lucile Ireland, treasurer—and Mrs. Ivetta Cockrell, YMWB superintendent, were introduced by the chairman.

Rev. and Mrs. Victor Chamberlin, missionaries-elect to Haiti, were presented and gave their testimonies.

Rev. Harold Johnson, missionary to Japan, sang a solo and brought the message of the evening, which was based on I Corinthians 16:9 "For a great door and effectual is opened unto me, and there are many adversaries." He said in part, "The door in Japan is open today . . . the goal for 1965 is 16 new churches . . . the revival spirit permeates the Japanese church." He closed with a plea for young couples to dedicate their lives as occupational missionaries as the need is so great for Christian school teachers.

An offering in cash and pledges amounting to \$510.63 was received for land purchase in Japan on which to build new churches.

Rev. Victor Chamberlin led in the closing prayer.

6. The President shall receive \$150, the Vice President \$100, the Secretary \$100, the Treasurer \$125, the YMWBS Superintendent \$100, and

each member of the Statistical Committee \$20. The same to be paid from the Conference Working Fund.

7. We recommend that the term of office of the Conference Officials begin at the rise of the annual conference.

8. We recommend that the time of the business meetings be as follows: Tuesday—8:30 to 11:00 a.m., 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.; Wednesday—8:30 to 11:00 a.m.; Thursday—8:30 to 11:00 a.m., 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.; Friday—8:30 to 10:a.m., 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Tuesday, July 23, 1963

The thirty-fourth session of the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Annual Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened in the Bethel Tabernacle on the Fairmount Campground at 8:30 a.m., July 23, 1963.

Motion—It was moved and seconded that we adopt the report of the Nominating Committee.

3. Devotional Committee: Harold North, chairman; Robert Tippey.

4. Ways and Means Committee: Jarrette Young, chairman; Roger Budde, Jesse Jackson, Rebecca Bennett, Rebecca Harvey.

President's Message—The president read his annual message which upon vote was accepted.

Motion—It was moved and seconded that the president be given permission to appoint tellers.

Report—The Resolutions Committee gave their reading and it was voted by the conference that Section D, Item 2 be amended to read, "That organized locals play a greater role in the leadership of the local youth work, and co-operate in all the conference programs." (See Report No. 4.)

Motion—A motion was made that the Resolutions Committee make possible for the body printed copies to all before voting upon the report.

Report—The Ways and Means Committee gave the 2nd reading of their report.

Motion—A motion was made that we, before adjournment, cast ballots for the office of Vice President.

Report—Rev. Richard Abraham read his annual Wesleyan Youth Treasurer's Report and it was adopted. (See Report No. 5.)

Recommendation—Recommendation number one (1) concerning teen talent, was referred and is to be passed upon by the W.Y. Executive Committee, and the Annual Conference President and his advisory board.

Recommendation—Recommendation number two (2) concerning a project for the 1963-64 calendar year was also referred and must follow the same procedure as recommendation number one of July 25, 1963, minutes.

Special Orders—The election of an officer to fill an expired term on the Youth Camp Committee for 3 years.

Rev. Eugene Cockrell was elected to serve 3 years on the Youth Camp Committee.

Report—The report of the Standing Rules Committee was read and adopted.

Reports—The secretary read the reports of the District Chairmen. They were adopted.

Special Orders—The special orders were the election of District Chairmen.

Standing Rules

I. AREA

- A. The Area President is to receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.

II. CONFERENCE

- A. The first session of the Wesleyan Youth Conference shall convene on the Tuesday nearest August the 8th and the sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.
- B. The PRESIDENT shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the Executive Council shall nominate the rest of the committee; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of the annual conference.
- C. There shall be elected an ASSISTANT SECRETARY whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.
- D. The TREASURER shall report at the annual conference the locals that have raised the budget in full.
- E. The WESLEYAN YOUTH TREASURER shall pay from Conference Expense Fund each year the sum of fifty dollars toward the expense of printing the minutes. The Wesleyan Youth Secretary shall co-operate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.
- F. The WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE for the coming year shall be nominated by the executive council prior to the rise of the annual conference; and shall meet at least 30 days prior to the next annual conference.
- G. Copies of the REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE shall be mailed within three weeks after the close of the main conference, one copy to each district chairman, pastor and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon after conference as possible.
- H. There shall be a WESLEYAN YOUTH CAMP COMMITTEE of seven members. The Executive Council shall be members ex officio; the president of Wesleyan Youth shall be chairman of said committee; the other three members to be elected for a term of three years. One shall be elected annually or until his successor is elected so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.
- I. The WESLEYAN YOUTH CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE shall be seated as members of the conference.
- J. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee.
- K. The Youth Camp recreational equipment is to be accessible during the conference and camp meeting, and the Youth Camp Committee is to be responsible for such.
- L. The Executive Council of the Wesleyan Youth shall have complete charge of helping new works.

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

- M. Members of the EXECUTIVE COUNCIL shall not hold the office of District Chairman, but shall work in cooperation with and under direction of the president.

III. DISTRICT

- A. That the Executive Council call a meeting of all DISTRICT CHAIRMEN semi-annually.
- B. Each district shall elect an ADULT COUNSELOR to counsel and assist in the plans of the district. This advisor may be beyond age of membership in Wesleyan Youth.

IV. LOCAL

- A. All organized locals keep permanent records of MEMBERSHIP AND FINANCES. This list of members shall be revised at the close of each conference year.
- B. All churches shall send their DELEGATES' CREDENTIALS and STATISTICAL REPORTS to the secretary by July 10.
- C. The LOCAL PRESIDENT shall consult with pastor when making out his annual WESLEYAN YOUTH REPORT, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- D. The EXECUTIVE COUNCIL of each local Wesleyan Youth should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.
- E. The General Wesleyan Youth EFFICIENCY STANDARD is to be adopted and promoted and each society rating is to be reported in the annual statistical reports.
- F. That all monies raised for budget and special projects be sent to the Conference Youth Treasurer by July 5.

Report No. 3

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

I. RALLIES

- A. We recommend that the district chairman be a member of The Wesleyan Methodist Church.
- B. That the district chairman be responsible for the rallies and that written notice of said rallies be sent to the local church pastor, and youth president, and to the conference youth president at least two Sundays in advance in order to promote closer cooperation between the district chairman and the president and the pastors. Rallies should be held quarterly and if possible, monthly.
- C. Whereas we serve this age in expectancy of the fulfillment of the Scriptural assurance of the second coming of Christ, we urge a strong evangelistic emphasis in each district with the aim of winning more souls in our rallies.
- D. That the district chairman call a meeting of the local presidents, pastors, district officers, and the district adult counselor within a month after the rise of the conference for the purpose of planning district youth rallies for the year. A notice of this should be sent to the Conference Youth President.
- E. That a special youth rally be held in each district during the months of May or June for the purpose of promoting the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Camp and Conference.
- F. That the following point system for district banner be adopted: Local president or vice president at rally, 5 points; Pastor present, 10 points; for each new member (received within the conference year) present, 1 point; for each 1% of active members present (to be based on the current number of members except for those in college or the armed forces), 1 point; for each non-member present,

1 point; for each mile traveled by one car from the local to the rally site, 1 point.

- G. That a loving cup be passed to the society, and the award be based on the percentage of subscribers to The Wesleyan Youth as to the number of active members plus the number of subscriptions to The Wesleyan Youth.
- H. That the conference print and distribute to the locals, suitable blanks to implement the point system.
- I. That a state-wide youth rally be held on the Fairmount Campground on Friday night of youth camp week, with the conference banner and loving cup being awarded on the same basis as that of the district rallies. That the executive council and the youth camp committee share the responsibility of this rally.

II. LOCALS

- A. The local president shall be responsible to see that each purposed member fully understands the membership pledge and that each active and associate member sign a membership card annually. No one shall be reported as a member until the pledge card is signed.
- B. That the local president, adult youth counselor, and youth solicitor shall be responsible for promotions of subscriptions to The Wesleyan Youth.
- C. That the local president shall be responsible for promoting projects suggested in Section III, Projects, paragraph B.

III. PROJECTS

- A. For conference project we recommend the following:
 - 1. That the executive council take up the advisement of a leaders' conference for local presidents or representatives, district chairmen, and the Executive Council.
 - 2. That there be close cooperation between the Wesleyan Youth and the annual conference church extension program.
 - 3. That the Executive Council be responsible to promote the Bible Quiz program and to provide the information to the local presidents of such.
- B. For locals we recommend the following:
 - 1. That the local plan and promote the interests of the Bible Quiz in organizing and preparing the local team.
 - 2. That it plan visitation programs and special meetings with members of the local, such as jail services, shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, and radio programs.

IV. FOR FINANCE WE RECOMMEND THE FOLLOWING:

- A. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:
 - 1. President—\$150.00
 - 2. Vice President—\$100.00
 - 3. Secretary—\$100.00
 - 4. Ass't Secretary—\$15.00
 - 5. Treasurer—\$100.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments on December 5 and June 1.
- B. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer be paid from the Youth Conference Budget;

and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp treasury, and that said expenses be paid quarterly. That traveling expenses be figured on the basis of 7¢ per mile.

- C. That the budget for the following year be as follows:
 1. General Dues, \$2.00 per active member of the local.
 2. One-fifth of the conference budget to be designated for the Youth Camp and the rest used at the discretion of the Executive Council.
 3. That there be a Youth Conference working fund assessment of 50¢ per active member.
 4. On the basis of the above apportionment, exact assessments for each item shall be made for each local and mailed to the pastors and local presidents by the conference secretary within three weeks of the rise of the main conference session.
 5. The above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the conference.
- E. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the conference budget for general promotion of the Youth work.
- F. That all monies raised by the local for missions be forwarded to the Wesleyan Youth Treasurer for departmental credit, and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings and be sent in quarterly with the Wesleyan Youth budget.

REPORT ON RESOLUTIONS
