#### MORAL REFORM

We, your committee on Moral Reform, submit the following:

The flood tides of skepticism, communism, ungodliness, and immorality are sweeping through our fair land today. Crime and juvenile delinquency are on the increase. Worldliness is making its inroads in the Church of Jesus Christ. The only solution to the appalling condition that confront us is a Holy Ghost revival that will begin in the individual heart and sweep through home, church, and nation. God's recipe for such an awakening is found in II Chron. 7: 14: "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land." Confession, restitution and separation are a mighty trinity, when linked with prayer, to bring about the revival which is imperative.

In these days of spurious brands of holiness, let us contend for the old fashioned death route as given in Romans 6:6. This would be the answer to many of our church problems. Unsanctified talent is one of the perils

of the present day church. God forbid that we should allow deep spirituality to slip into a secondary place.

The spiritual tide of the church rises and lowers with that of the home. A most effective weapon against juvenile delinquency and the loss of youth to the church is the old-fashioned family altar where God's Word is honored and His presence is graciously manifest. A life of consistency with the standards of the Bible, faithfulness to the house of God and devotion to God's cause will be a powerful influence on the lives of our children. "Example is better than precept." Let us do all in our power to see their early conversion. We would mention the importance of providing wholesome literature for our families. Our own church periodicals should be in every Wesleyan home. Let us keep a watchful eye on that which our children read. We should also exercise careful discrimination in that which we allow to come into our homes by means of radio, doing so in the light of vital godliness and eternal values. Shall we not follow the example of faithful Abraham, who commanded his children and his household after him, to keep the way of the Lord.

Sabbath desecration is increasing. "If thou turn away thy foot from the Sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day; and call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable; and shalt honor Him, not doing thine own ways, not finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words; then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord." Isa. 58: 13-14a.

We believe in total abstinence from alcoholic beverages for the individual, and total prohibition for the state. Liquor, gambling, and immorality are kindred sins, and we urge that all our people steadfastly resist the further invasion of these vicious evils into our social life.

We would exhort our pastors and people to stand by the old paths of separation from the world which have brought victory and revival power in the yesterdays, and still bring the same results today. The theater, dance, card table, and mixed bathing groups are entirely out of the realm of Christian living, and we deplore their damning influence on society. We believe that the wearing of jewelry, including the wedding and engagement ring, short sleeves and low necklines, nudity in men's attire, curled hair, and use of make-up to be inconsistent with the standard of God's word and holy example. "That women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly array." I Tim. 2:9. "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel; but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price." I Peter 3: 3, 4. We are fast slipping to the place where there is no difference in the appearance of the world and of one professing holiness. We would at the same time beware of a legalistic spirit and attitude which bears a harsh spirit and is void of a holy radiance and fire. May the Lord help us to be true to God-given convictions and to keep the Spirit's anointing upon our hearts.

"Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty." Let us earnestly and prayerfully guard against a lax spirit that blinds us to the exceeding sinfulness of sin and the dire results of compromise. Judges 2 gives us a word picture of the degeneration of Israel. Verse 7: "And the people served the Lord all the days of Joshua, and all the days of the elders that outlived Joshua, who had seen all the great works of the Lord, that He did for Israel." Verse 10: "And there arose another generation after them, which knew not the Lord, nor yet the works which He had done for Israel." Verse 13: "And they forsook the Lord, and served Baal and Ashtaroth." Let us cry mightily to God for a visitation of His power that will preserve us as a church in this and the rising generation.

Eight years before his death, John Wesley penned these words: "I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist either in Europe or America; but I am afraid lest they should only exist as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power; and this undoubtedly will be the case unless they hold fast the doctrine, spirit and discipline with which they set out."

We have examined the following Treasurer's books and find them correct: Missionary Board Treasurer, Camp Meeting Treasurer, Board of Trustees, Conference Secretary, Wesleyan Visitor, Conference President's report, and Hope Mission.

We recommend that since the Treasurer of the Missionary Board handles such large sums of money that his books be audited by a Public Auditor.

#### STATISTICAL GLEANINGS

Another milestone has been reached as the 79th Annual Kansas Conference comes to a close. We offer thanks unto God for His divine leadership this past year. The reports present a mighty challenge to the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America to enlarge our borders and spread scriptural Holiness.

The Statistical Committee has prepared a full report for future reference and hereby submit some items of interest.

The Daily Vacation Bible School reports are encouraging, with an enrollment of 846, a gain of 198 over last year. There is a gain in Wesleyan Youths and Missionary Magazines taken. The Value of Church Property has made an increase of \$149,221.00. There is likewise an increase of \$3,838.43 in Total Budget raised this year. Our Pastors' cash salary shows a gain of \$9,314.29. while the total receipts for pastors increased \$11,383.55. The total raised for all purposes is \$287,685.93 a gain of \$36,408.12. We believe the gain in Tithers and Family Altars reported is a very encouraging feature.

### FINANCE REPORT

We, your Committee on Finance, recommend the following:

That the budget per member be: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Connectional Home Missions, \$1.00; Education, \$2.25; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.25; General Sunday School, \$.05 per member in main school; Conference Missions, \$2.00; Conference Fund, \$4.50; Superannuated Ministers' Fund, \$1.50; Trustee Fund, \$.25; Campground Maintenance Fund, \$.25; Executive Budget Fund, \$.25; General Conference Expense Fund, \$.20.

That the Conference President's (1) Salary be \$50.00 per week throughout the year and that receipts for all offerings received on the charges be applied on the Conference Fund. (2) Official expense be allowed. (3) Traveling expense be paid; when traveling by car, he be allowed five cents per mile.

That the Quarterly Conference Evangelist and Field Man be paid a salary of \$45.00 per week throughout the year. That his salary and expense be paid from the Conference Fund while working on the Quarterly Conference schedule or when engaged by the Missionary Board. That his

traveling expenses be paid; when traveling by car he be allowed five cents per mile.

That we pay for the following services rendered: Conference Secretary, \$50.00; Assistant Secretary, \$10.00; Conference Treasurer, \$50.00; Editor of the Wesleyan Visitor, \$50.00.

That the secretary's expense account in the amount of \$8.31 be paid.

That Raymond Balty be paid \$5.00 for expense incurred in behalf of the Conference.

That the Missionary Board Treasurer's salary and the Superannuate Treasurer's salary be paid from the expense accounts of their respective funds.

That an offering be taken at the public meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society the evening of June 14 to be applied on budget as follows: one-third Foreign; one-third Kansas Conference Missions; one-third Connectional Home Missions.

We recomend that the Conference approve the action of the local Board of Managers of the Wesleyan Methodist College:

That each conference endeavor to raise \$10.00 per member of said conference for the building of the new gym. That a special committee be elected in each conference to promote the best possible method of raising this sum throughout the year.

## RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, that the Campground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.
- 2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, that the election of Conference Officers be held the second day of Conference at 9:00 a.m.
- 3. Subscription Lists. Resolved, that all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W. M. S., or the Camp Meeting Committee, and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor a list of subscriptions from his charge.
- 4. Sanctity of God's House. Resolved, that such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the house erected for public worship.
- 5. Pastor's Moving Expense. Resolved, that the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.
- 6. Reporting of All Contributions. Resolved, that the Conference President and each pastor urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of more equitable distribution of funds.
- 7. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, that it shall be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-third cup flour, one teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in one-inch squares and bake as pie dough. The above will serve 50 people.
- 8. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, that it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.
- 9. President's Duties. Resolved, that the Conference President shall First, travel the Conference and hold one-half of the Quarterly Meetings. Second, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property. Third, call a meeting, upon request of the Board of Stewards or Pastor to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church. Fourth, raise funds for the Church Extension Program.

10. Vacations. Resolved, that the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two week's extra pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for his vacation.

Resolved, that we recommend that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be used for vacation and that the church give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by pastor and church for vacation.

- 11. Nominating Committee. Resolved, that we elect a committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and three delegates-elect, from three churches designated by the Conference to: First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting. Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of the Conference. Third, nominate the personnel of all Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference. Fourth, nominate the Committee Chairman for next year. Fifth, nominate the District Chairman. Sixth, nominate a minister of the Conference to preach the Conference sermon next year.
- 12. Bible School Evangelism. Resolved, that the Conference Sunday School Secretary be authorized to work with the churches in arranging for Teacher Training Institutes for the purpose of promoting an evangelistic program among the children, and that the project be known as "Bible School Evangelism."
- 13. Superannute Service. Resolved, that one public service in each Annual Camp Meeting or Conference Period be set aside in honor of the Superannuated Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Superannuate Board to arrange for such a service.
- 14. Conference Loans. Resolved, that the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Trustees.
- 15. Additional Delegate. Resolved, that when no more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.
- 16. Fiscal Year. Resolved, that the closing date of the fiscal year be two weeks before the opening date of the Annual Conference Camp Period, and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least one week before the Conference Camp Period. He

shall forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman who shall be able to report an early session of Conference. (The fiscal year for 1949-1950 shall close May 17, 1950.)

17. Pastors Paid Through Conference. Resolved, that the church's financial obligation to the pastor whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting Period.

Resolved, that the outgoing pastor of a charge be expected to fill the pulpit the Sunday following Conference, unless other arrangements are made with his successor, and that he receive the salary for that week.

- 18. Orders of the Day. Resolved, that the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor."
- 19. Camp Meeting Committee. Resolved, that the President of the W. Y. P. S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- 20. Trustees Authorized. Resolved, that all action heretofore taken by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meetings of such Annual Conferences concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such action had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, that the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seem proper and expedient and to the best interest of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

- 21. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, that all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.
- 22. Installation of Officers. Resolved, that all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of the Conference when there shall be an installation service held for the installation of the officers as are to appear in the Conference minutes; this service to be arranged by the Pastoral Relations Committee.

- 23. Pastors, Released for Meetings. Resolved, that we earnestly request each of our churches to release their pastor for one meeting of three weeks' length to be held on a new field or on one of the weaker charges under the direction of the Missionary Board, and that the church pay his salary during his absence.
- 24. Money to Treasurer. Resolved, that the pastors be urged to send all remittances to the treasurer in whole dollars when possible. That the budget money be remitted quarterly from the local churches.
- 25. Conveying Property. Resolved, that all instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use, carry the official name of the church, viz., "The Kansas Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."
- 26. Conference and Camp Date. Resolved, that Conference begin annually at 2:00 p.m. on the first Wednesday before the first Sunday in June and continue daily until completed, and that Camp begin on Friday night of the same week and continue through the two following Sundays.
- 27. Calling List. Whereas, most of the friends and members of our local churches are won through the personal contact of the pastors; and whereas many of these friends and prospective members are lost in the changing from one pastor to another because the incoming pastor does not know of these people nor their interest in the church;

Be it resolved, that this Conference ask each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday school, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number. The same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

- 28. Church Delegate Expense. Resolved, that each local church pay the Annual Conference Church Delegate room, board and transportation expenses, the same to be paid in advance.
- 29. Field Man and Quarterly Meeting Evangelist. Resolved, that we elect by ballot a General Field Man to labor under the Missionary Board, who not employed as a Field Man is to hold Quarterly Meeting services.
- 30. New Resolutions. Resolved, that all proposed new resolutions and changes in existing resolutions, to be considered at the next Conference, be printed in the Conference "Visitor" at least sixty days before the next Conference session.

All proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions not so printed shall require a two-thirds vote to pass. 31. Order of Business. Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the following procedure of business be followed:

First, All delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in after first seating of delegates, be turned in directly to the Nominating Committee who shall examine such credentials, and report such to the Secretary who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

Second, All recommendations to study or travel be turned directly to the Assistant Secretary who shall turn them to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Third, Ministers' reports shall be given immediately after Officers' reports are given, and continued whenever other business will permit.

Fourth, The following order of business shall be followed in each session:

- a. Roll call
- b. Minutes
- c. Communications
- d. Special Committees
- e. Standing Committees
- f. Sessional Committees
- g. Unfinished business
- h. Ministers' Reports

Fifth, business shall continue from 8:30 to 12 noon and from 1:30 to 4:30 each day with no adjournment for committee work, unless deemed very necessary. It is understood that important Committees may meet during sessions if necessary.

- 32. Conference Visitor. Resolved, that each Sunday school of the Conference pay \$1.00 to supplement the subscription income of the "Visitor," the same to be sent to the editor.
- 33. Pastor's Expense at Annual Sessions. Resolved, that inasmuch as the pastor is actually a representative of the local church at the Annual Camp and Conference and the Ministerial Association, that the local churches pay their pastor's expense, including room, board and transportation, the same to be payed in advance.
- 34. Hope Mission Support. Resolved, that the churches be urged to take offerings once a month for Wesleyan Hope Mission, and that the Superintendent be permitted to visit the charges of the Conference in the interest of the mission.

35. Attention to Resolutions. Resolved, that the above resolutions he presented by the pastors to their people wihin six weeks after the receipt of the Conference Minutes and at last four weeks before the Annual Conference.

#### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

#### PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend:

#### Division 1, Local Work

- 1. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 775 members, 325 honorary members, 800 magazines. We urge that each society make a gain in the above.
- 2. That a MEN and MISSIONS program be sponsored by the men to solicit their help and interest in the cause of Missions.
  - 3. That we observe at least four of these "Challenge Days":
- A. Harvest Home Day, October 14. We urge each society to send cash to Harvest Home Committee. Credit applies on Educational Budget.
- B. Wesleyan Missionary Day. Stress should be placed on getting new subscriptions circulated among the unsaved.
- C. World Day of Prayer. We recommend that each society observe this occasion, an offering being taken for Medical Missions. (Not to be applied on budget.)
- D. Easter. Programs and offerings for Home Missions denominationally supported.
- E. May Day, to be known as gift day. Gifts may include clothing, bandages, money or other articles to be sent with outgoing missionaries or used on home fields.

Supplies for foreign mission fields should be sent to 321 Bergen Ave., Jersey City, New Jersey. Follow mailing instructions in Magazine Directory in sending gifts to home fields. Receipts are now given.

4. That the President of each society be responsible to arrange for one evening each month to pray especially for Mission work, the same

to be preceded by a day of fasting. Take an offering for the arm of the Work listed monthly, giving emphasis to that work:

July for Wesleyan Hope Mission
August for Child Evangelism
September for Ozark Missions
October and November for Education
December for Orphanage
January and February for Kansas Conference missions
March and April for Home Missions
May and June for Foreign Missions

- 5. That each society elect a Magazine Solicitor to secure new subscriptions and all renewals to meet quadrennial goals.
- 6. We recommend an active, interceding, corresponding Prayer Partner group in each society with a Prayer Partner Secretary to report to the Conference Secretary, Mrs. Clara Rist, 117 North Clark St., Salina, Kansas.
- 7. In view of the fact that our missionaries are to be benefitted by the Pension Plan, we recommend that each society help support this worthy cause.
- 8. That the local Missionary Library be enlarged, interest stimulated, with elected librarian and records kept.
- 9. That the President review the Plan of Work quarterly before the Society.
- 10. That we avail ourselves of the excellent materials given in the Wesleyan Missionary and Wesleyan Methodist, also that the adopted study book be used in the regular meetings.
- 11. That each local president appoint a committee to contact the sick in person or by correspondence, and assist the pastor in every possible way in reaching souls and furthering the kingdom.
- 12. That the president of each society be responsible for the reading of the Moral Reform at some suitable service during the year.
- 13. That the president of each society appoint a committee to cooperate with the Temperance Superintendent of the Sunday School to further the cause of temperance.
- 14. That all local dues, including honorary, be sent to our Missionary Treasurer, Mrs. Bertha Wilson, 647 Watson Ave., Topeka, Kansas, one-half of the same to be applied on Missionary Budget. Please designate specifically where the credit is desired.
  - 15. That all membership dues be paid by May 1 to local treasurer.

- 16. That all money be disbursed quarterly through our local and conference Treasurers. That this money be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least two weeks before Conference.
- 17. In view of the great need in the Home Mission fields we urge an increase in the Card Call pledges.
- 18. That each society contribute at least \$5.00 for the Hephzibah Orphanage except in cases where the church budget is less than \$5.00.
- 19. That each society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions denominationally supported.
- 20. We urge each society to contribute \$5.00 for the W. M. S. Tabernacle Fund. This Fund has been transferred to apply on the School symnasium which will be used by the W. M. S. conference sessions. Funds are still needed to complete the pledge already made.
- 21. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the local society, which serves as an audit of the Treasurer's Report. One copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, Leah Macy, Longford, Kansas two weeks before conference, the duplicate to be brought to Conference by the delegate. Place the name of the new President for the coming year on the back of the report blank.
- 22. That the President of each society appoint a committee to gather supplies and cash for the conference dining hall.
- 23. That each society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard. A grade of 10 per cent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies with a score of 100 per cent will be placed on the Honor Roll.
- 24. That we issue an award to each looal society that makes a grade of 125 per cent or more in standard Efficiency, that secures magazine subscriptions equal to membership of the society, that has prayer partners, and sends newly-elected president to the annual conference.
- 25. We recommend that the forms in the Discipline on page 316, Article 438 be used for the delegate credentials for annual Conference.
