# President's Report

To the members of the ninetieth session of the Kansas Annual Conference greetings. Through the mercies of God we rejoice to thus meet again to enjoy Christian fellowship and, we trust, gracious blessings from the Lord as we work and plan for the interests of the church.

This has no doubt been a year of many difficulties and battles on all fields. The forces of evil are most persistent in their determined efforts to hinder the advancement of the work of the Lord. Though on one hand there has been keen conflict with the enemy, we rejoice in serving a conquering Christ.

Personally, we have been especially conscious of God's help throughout the year. He has so definitely answered prayer in various instances. Many times, and especially in the taxing few weeks prior to conference time, we have been so aware of prayer in our behalf. The help of the Spirit has been most amazing. Above my type-writer table I have the motto from Isaiah, "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on Thee." I fall so very short in appropriating that which has been provided for us but the promises of God are the best tranquilizers I know about.

The beautiful and commodious new church building at Denver was dedicated this year. A very fine brick veneer parsonage was built at Junction City during the year. The splendid annex to the F. C. Hill Memorial church is completed with exception of light fixtures and minor little details. The new church at North Topeka has been in use this year with a little finishing to do in the basement. Belmont has completely remodeled their church basement putting in cement block partitions. A new location for the Park Ave. Church has been purchased. A location for a possible new church in Wichita has been contracted for. Additional property has been purchased by the West Side Church in Wichita. In Thornton, Colorado, an equity has been accepted in a three bedroom, brick house and payments assumed by the conference. The donor desires that this property be used to help start a pioneer work. Luke Turnbough has had charge of a pioneer effort in Sullivan, Mo. He has continued weekly services and plans to teach school and pioneer in Sullivan this next year. A new church is under construction at Kansas City Immanuel.

Mr. Lowell Brown of St. Louis has prepared a camp site and built buildings to be used by the Missouri district youth. This has cost him an investment of many thousands of dollars. When it is all paid for he plans to deed it to the Conference. This is a most generous gift and one which is deeply appreciated.

For the material blessings we are grateful. There remain two urgent, pressing needs: 1. That we operate nearer capacity in our outreach. 2. The

old debts need to be reduced more rapidly so that we can invest more in new fields.

Another of the Elders has gone to his reward this year. Rev. T. F. Child, who was so faithful for many years will be missed from our midst.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

It has been a privilege this year to serve as Sunday School Secretary of the Kansas Conference. We have contacted the pastors by letter three times during the year and have printed reports in the Visitor each Quarter.

It was our privilege again this year to attend the State Sunday School Convention which was held in Wichita in October and also the National

Sunday School Convention held in Columbus, Ohio.

The first day of the Columbus Convention consisted of a National Wesleyan Methodist Convention. Here we were introduced to the New Alders-

gate Series which we recommend very highly.

Our Sunday Schools this year had an average attendance of 72.9 per school. This is an increase over last year of 2.6 per school. This is the highest average per school we have yet reported. It has climbed from less than 50 per school in 1930 to 53.8 in 1940, dropping down to 53.4 in 1950. There has been a steady climb in the 50's excepting for the past two years which have showed a slight drop.

Of the 50 Sunday Schools in the conference, 24 showed a gain and 24 showed a loss with two holding their own. This is considerably better than

last year when only 19 showed a gain.

Our enrollment this year for the conference is 4795, which is down 54 from last year. The number of scholars converted this year was 285 compared to 380 last year. There were 85 in Teacher's Training courses compared to 93 last year.

The Sunday School Board in cooperation with the Woman's Missionary Society, published this year a Wesleyan Catechism Handbook which has been used already in D.V.B.S. to great advantage.

It is agreed that we are having a population explosion. Let's have a Sunday School Explosion during the coming Conference year.

#### STANDING RULES

#### Conference

1. CONFERENCE AND CAMP DATE: The Conference shall begin annually at 1:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday in August for the organization of Conference business and committee work, and continue through Saturday night or until completed, and Camp shall begin the first Sunday morning following the beginning of Conference and continue through the second Sunday.

2. ORDER OF BUSINESS: Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the

following order of business be followed:

FIRST, the front ten rows of the middle sections and the platform of

the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

SECOND, all recommendations to travel or study be turned directly to the assistant secretary, who shall turn them to the committee on Itineracy and Orders.

THIRD, Ministers reports shall be given immediately after the officers reports are given and continue whenever other business will permit.

FOURTH, business shall continue from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon and

from 1:30 p.m. to the hour for the orders of the day.

3. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: There shall be a Nominating Committee of five elders, including the president as chairman ex-officio, and five delegates elect; the four elders and five delegates to rotate alphabetically from year to year. (Care exercised to include Colorado and Missouri churches.)

The 1961 Committee shall be President, R. E. Britton, W. D. Buckley, W. E. Caldwell, D. W. Campbell; the delegates elect from Colorado Springs, Denver, Englewood, Colorado, Greeley and Hall. The purpose of this committee will be:

First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting.

Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of Conference.

Third, examine all delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in to the committee after the first seating of delegates, and to report such to the Secretary, who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

Fourth, nominate the personnel of all the Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference.

Fifth, nominate the committee Chairmen for the next year, including a full statistical committee to be elected to serve the next year, and the chairman of the Ministerial Association.

Sixth, nominate the District Chairmen.

Seventh, nominate the Editor and a Circulation Manager of the Wesleyan Visitor.

4. PRESIDENT TO APPOINT TELLERS: Following the convening of Conference, and previous to the Orders of the Day for election of Conference Officers, the President shall appoint tellers for the occasion.

5. ELECTION OF CONFERENCE OFFICERS: The election of Con-

ference Officers shall be held the second day of Conference immediately following the morning devotional period.

6. PRESIDENT'S DUTIES: The Conference President's duties shall be

- (A.) Travel the Conference, visiting each church at least twice during the year. The time of the visits and rotation of field and office work shall be left to the arrangement of the president;
- (B.) Secure quarterly reports of the pastors, using the findings of the same for the purpose of promoting the spiritual and material welfare of the churches and the Conference;

(C.) Urge the proper repair and insurance of church property;

(D.) The president may upon his own initiative or upon the request of the Board of Stewards or the pastor of a local church call a meeting to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church;

(E.) Raise funds for the church extension program.

- 7. AUDITING OF FINANCIAL REPORTS: All financial reports together with the books that are to be audited by the Conference Auditing Committee shall be submitted to said committee before being read on the Conference floor.
- 8. INTRODUCTION OF NEW BUSINESS: All new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.
- 9. ORDERS OF THE DAY: (A) The Camp Meeting and Campground Committee are permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Wesleyan Visitor," (B) The following services are fixed as permanent Orders of the Day:

Tuesday evening, Conference Sermon at 7:30 by the Conference

President.

Wednesday evening, Education service at 7:30.

Thursday evening, Public service of the W.M.S. at 7:30.

Friday evening, Sunday School service at 7:30.

Saturday evening, Youth Rally at 7:30.

Sunday morning, Ordination service at 9:30.

- 10. CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE: The President of Wesleyan Youth is a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- 11. EVANGELISTIC HELP: The Campground and Camp Meeting Committee is authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.
- 12. ADDITIONAL DELEGATES: When more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.
- 13. PENSION PLAN: Time will be given at each Annual Conference for the promotion of the Pension Plan and it is the duty of the Pension Plan Board to arrange for such service.
- 14. TENURE OF OFFICE: All Conference Officers shall continue in office until the close of the annual session of Conference.
- 15. VACATIONS: The Conference President shall be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and he shall be given two weeks pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for vacation.

16. CONVEYING PROPERTY: All instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use shall carry the official name of the church viz., "The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."

17. TRUSTEES AUTHORIZED: All action taken heretofore by the trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meeting of such Annual Conferences concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

The duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seems proper and expedient and to the interest of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging, and conveying of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

18. BOARD OF BUILDING AND LOCATION: (A.) The Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall consist of the Missionary Board and the Conference Trustees; (B.) The Missionary Board shall be composed of five elders, including the President as chairman, ex-officio, and four laymen, with not more than three of the members being changed in a given year; (C.) The travel expense of the Board of Building and Location shall be allowed at the rate of .03¢ per mile in excess of 100 miles round-trip, the same to be taken from the Missionary Board Treasury.

19. CONFERENCE LOANS: The Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Trustees.

20. SUBSCRIPTION LISTS: All subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes shall be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W.M.S., or the Camp Meeting Committee and said Treasurers shall furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor with a list of subscriptions from his charge.

21. CÂNDIDATES TO ELDERS' ORDERS: All candidates to Elders' Orders shall present the Committee on Itineracy and Orders a transcript of credits which may be accepted in lieu of the Conference course and a list of books and reading other than textbooks.

22. VISITOR EXCHANGE: The "Wesleyan Visitor" shall be sent to all Conference Presidents, Conference Sunday School Secretaries, Wesleyan Youth Presidents of this area, Presidents and Executive Secretary of Wesleyan Youth, the Editor of the Wesleyan Methodist and the General Superintendents of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. The expense of the same shall be paid from the Conference Fund.

#### District

23. PRAYER CONVENTION: Each district shall hold a District Prayer Convention, and the District Chairman shall be responsible for planning such Conventions, the time and place to be announced in an issue of the "Wesleyan Visitor."

#### Local Church

The following rules which pertain to the local churches shall be read by the pastors to their people within six weeks after the receipt of the Conference Minutes and at least four weeks before the Annual Conference.

24. PASTORS PAID THROUGH CONFERENCE: The Church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, shall be extended through the Conference and Camp Meeting period.

25. PASTOR'S MOVING EXPENSE: The Church hiring a minister shall

assume all responsibility of moving expense.

- 26. PASTOR'S EXPENSE AT ANNUAL CONFERENCE: Inasmuch as the pastor is actually a representative of the local church at the Annual Conference and Camp, the local churches shall pay the expenses of the Pastor and his wife, including room, board and transportation, the same to be paid in advance.
- 27. SUNDAY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE: (A) The two Sundays of Conference and Camp Meeting shall not be counted in the Sunday School average attendance reports made to Conference; (B) Our Sunday Schools shall determine their attendance by counting only those who arrive in time to attend a portion of the class period.
- 28. QUARTERLY MEETING DATES: The first quarterly meeting of the Conference year is to be held three months from the closing date of the previous conference year and they are to continue throughout the year at regular three month intervals. Pastors are urgently requested to make proper provision for the observance of the Lord's Supper at these intervals.
- 29. PASTORS RELEASED FOR MEETING: At the request of the Missionary Board a church so approached shall release its pastor for one meeting, the same to be held on a new field or one of the weaker charges under the direction of said Board, and the local church shall pay its pastor's salary during the engagement. The pastor so engaged shall receive money for the special meeting expenses incurred during such employment, the same to be paid by the church or charge being served, or by the Missionary Board.
- 30. PASTOR NOMINATES STEWARD: The pastor shall be granted the privileges of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.
- 31. REPORTING OF ALL CONTRIBUTIONS: The Conference President and each pastor shall urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of the more equitable distribution of funds.
- 32. VACATIONS: Each church shall grant its pastor a two Sunday leave of absence from his work, that at least two full weeks might be spent for vacation and the church shall give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by pastor and church for vacation.
- 33. MONEY TO TREASURER: The treasurers are urged to send all remittances to the Conference Treasurer in whole dollars when possible; and the local treasurers are to send budget money each quarter to the Conference Treasurer.
- 34. CHURCH DELEGATE EXPENSE: The local church shall pay the room, board and transportation expenses of all authorized delegates to the annual Conference, the same to be paid in advance.

35. CHURCH EXTENSION: One Sunday per month shall be designated by each church for receiving a special Sunday School offering, the same to be given to the Missionary Board for church extension and to help weaker churches not yet self-supporting, and the pastor and superintendent shall help stimulate the giving in these offerings. These monies are to be loaned without interest under the supervision of the Missionary Board.

36. UNLEAVENED BREAD: All our churches shall use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-half cup of flour, one rounded tablespoon of butter, moisten with water enough to roll. Mark in ½ inch squares and bake as pie dough. This recipe

will serve 65 to 70 people.

37. ROOM RESERVATIONS: Any person reserving rooms in Conference or School dormitories shall pay room rents one year in advance. In the event the room is not to be used at Conference the party shall inform the one in charge by the opening day of Conference, in which case monies received shall be refunded provided the one in charge is notified on or before the first day of Conference.

38. SOLICITATION OF FUNDS: (A) Requests by and plans of all organizations and individuals desiring to visit the churches of the Conference for the purpose of soliciting funds, shall be referred to and cleared by a committee composed of the President of the Conference, the President of the W.M.S., and the Treasurer of the Missionary Board, before the completion of such plans with the local churches; (B) We urgently recommend that 50% of all monies solicited from the churches of the Conference for projects not sponsored by the Conference or the Wesleyan Methodist Denomination shall be retained by the local church involved and contributed to Denominational Missions or to Conference Church Extension.

39. VOTE ON THE PASTOR: (A) The Churches shall conduct their pastoral vote between the fourth Sunday in May and the second Sunday in June; (in event these dates conflict with Baccalaureate services at Miltonvale College Church, it shall be the recognized prerogative of that church to set an earlier date.) (B) To avoid uncertainty and to allow equality among all churches and pastors, it is strongly urged that the pastor who is not returning the following year shall refrain from giving such information to his church until first advising the Conference President. (C) Each pastor shall answer any return call to a church within a period of one week after receiving said call; (D) Each pastor shall answer any church extending a new call within a period of ten days and in each instance the pastor shall inform the Conference President of his decision.

40. PARSONAGE RENT: It shall be the responsibility of the local trustees and the pastor to determine the allowance for parsonage rent. This allowance should reflect the current local rental scale for comparable facilities.

41. INSURANCE: (A) Since the group insurance plan adopted by the Conference could well effect the economy of the local church, it is urged that each church pay at least half of their pastor's group insurance premium. (B) In the event of a change of pastors, the church's responsibility shall include the August premium.

#### **Pastor**

42. 1½% ASSESSMENT TO BE PAID: Every active minister of the Kansas Conference receiving an appointment by the Conference shall be

required to pay 1½% assessment on the total receipts for the current Conference year as determined by the rules and regulations of the Pension Plan of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America; membership in the plan being optional with the minister.

- 43. CALLING LIST: The Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday School, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number; the same to be kept for his work while on the pastorate and to give his successor on the field.
- 44. PASTORS VACATING PARSONAGE: Each pastor when moving from his charge shall vacate the parsonage during the first week following the close of Camp Week or at such time as designated by the Annual Conference or the President and his Advisory Board.

#### General

- 45. FISCAL YEAR: The closing date of the fiscal year shall be June 30, and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by July 15. We further request that he forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman not later than July 25.
- 46. WESLEYAN VISITOR: (A) The Conference shall publish the periodical known as the "Wesleyan Visitor," the subscription price to be .75¢ (B) Each Sunday School of the Conference shall pay a minimum of \$2.00 to supplement the subscription income of the "Visitor," the same to be sent to the Editor; (C) Each church shall elect a subscription solicitor to the "Wesleyan Visitor."
- 47. MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION: (A) The Annual Convention of the Ministerial Association shall be held on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in March of each Conference year. (B) An offering equivalent to 25¢ per member shall be taken in each local church, to be sent to the chairman of the Ministerial Association. Such monies shall be used to defray the traveling expenses of the pastors whose salary is \$1,850 or less, at the rate of .02¢ per mile, round trip; also the pastor and his wife from said churches shall be given \$1.00 each per day for meals. (C) Pastors from the more distant churches that are over 200 miles round trip from the Convention shall be paid .02¢ per mile in excess of 400 miles round trip; irrespective of salary. (D) The Ministerial Association Committee with the President of the Conference shall be authorized to engage Convention speakers as far in advance as it may seem advisable.
- 48. MORAL REFORM: In recognition of a growing indifference to the social and political sins of our time, and a concern for the preservation of the foundations upon which has been built our Church and Country, we as Wesleyan Methodists strongly urge the following positions:
- A. DRUNKENNESS: For us to remain a nation worthy to be called both civilized and Christian it is necessary that we oppose with all available means the use of intoxicating beverages. Total abstinence, be it assuredly known, is the position of Wesleyan Methodist people everywhere.
- B. IMMORALITY: During the decline and to the end of historic civilizations there has always been an accompanying break-down of morals. Obscene literature, vulgar language, maudlin jokes, lewdness and perversion

quite common today should be a warning to us. We deplore any tendency to minimize such things or to shrug off their seriousness.

- C. COMMUNISM: No thoughtful person is unaware of the fact that Communism is making steady gains in all the world. We call for an end to indifference and would urge upon all a greater fear and a better understanding of this great evil. We would urge a more vigorous opposition to it.
- D. ROMANISM: Let it not be forgotten that self-styled and admittedly unchanging and unchangeable Romanism is as convinced today as ever in the past that Protestants are "heretics" and undesirable. In countries where her power makes it possible she proceeds today, as always, to persecute and would, if possible, exterminate the so-called "heretic." Respect for our neighbor should not blind us to what he could and may yet be induced to do to us, should political power enough to accomplish it ever fall into his hands.
- E. MATERIALISM: The word "Materialism," like the word "World-liness," is a bit ambiguous. For the most part they mean the same thing. Reduced to their simple meaning, either word has to do with a common trend to be possessed by possessions, snared by the sensual, and fascinated by foolishness. Mere THINGS, like the husks on which the prodigal fed, do not satisfy. We should remain careful lest they become too important to us.
- F. ONE-WORLDISM: Since UNESCO propaganda has largely made Patriotism obsolete and loyalty to the American flag only secondary to that of the United Nations, be it known that patriotically Wesleyans are Americans and proud to remain so. We remain believers in the "free-enterprise" system as opposed to all forms of State Socialism. We believe in traditional so-called "state's rights" and that the Federal Government if becoming too dominant may cease to be "by, of, and for the people." Instead of remaining the servant of the people of sovereign States, an overmuch centralized Government may well become the master of the people.

- 8. That these resolutions be mimeographed and mailed to the local presidents immediately following the closing of Wesleyan Youth Conference.
- 9. That information and promotional guidance may be secured, we recommend that the President attend the Youth sessions of such National Conventions as he and the Council would deem advisable.

#### District

10. We recommend that each district plan four rallies a year, one of which shall be under the direction of the Conference President and that the

district Chairmen be responsible for making a report of these rallies to the Conference Visitor.

### **Conference District**

## 11. Youth Camps:

A. That all Youth Camp Committees, programs, officers, and workers be approved by the Conference Executive Council.

B. That Youth Camp committees be composed of not less than five

C. That members of the executive council whose churches are included in the Kansas Youth Camp, serve on the Kansas Youth Camp Committee.

D. That Pastors and District Chairmen, serve as the Youth Camp Committee for District Camps (Missouri and Colorado) and that the District Youth Camp Director be elected by the District Youth Camp Committee.

#### Conference Local

12. That the local president and adult counselor receive the Conference Visitor, that these subscriptions be paid by the conference W. Y. treasurer and that the post office committee compile the subscription list. (See finance report.)

13. That each local sponsor a Youth Revival, the Executive Council being responsible for securing the evangelist, advertising and financing the meetings. The Evangelistic help is to be approved by the Advisory Committee of the

church.

14. That the leaders for Wesleyan Youth Services be carefully chosen and the leaders names with lesson topics posted quarterly. It is recommended that the President lead at least once a quarter.

15. That emphasis be given to the Missionary Meeting of the Wesleyan Youth noting that the offering received applies on Church Budget and is divided 25 per cent to World Missions, 25 per cent to Church Extension and

Evangelism, and 50 per cent to Education.

16. That emphasis be placed on the disciplinary provision for an offering on Wesleyan Youth Educational Sunday, the third Sunday in July. All educational budget money received during the summer quarter may be credited to the Wesleyan Youth.

17. That all locals sending money to the Conference Treasurer remit the same quarterly by check or money order rather than small change and that remittance slips be used and filled out properly. This remittance to be mailed within 5 days following the close of the quarter.

18. That attention be given to local representation at the Annual Wesleyan Youth Convention.

A. The newly elected President or Vice-President.

- B. Two delegates. (One additional delegate for locals whose membership exceeds 25.)
- C. The Pastor.

D. In case there is no Wesleyan Youth local, the pastor may appoint

a representative. (age 13-40)

19. That the fiscal year close the thirtieth of June and that all monies given to the Conference Youth Treasurer be postmarked by the fifth of July and that the Conference Treasurer's books and financial statement be sent to the Conference auditor the first week of the Annual Conference. All

reports are to be sent to the Conference Youth Secretary by the twentieth of July. These include:

- B. Delegate Credentials.
- C. Efficiency Standard Report.
- 20. That one service be designated for the promotion of the New Science Building Laboratory Desk Fund of M. W. C. (See finance report)

key combination on all subscriptions. (5% credit)

That the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the equivalent of 75% of the active members be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary. (5% credit)

5. That a Mission Study Secretary be elected and she report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by January 15. (5% credit) That 10% of the active members read at least four of the recommended

books. (5% credit)

6. That a delegate be elected to the annual conference W.M.S and that she be instructed by the local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the annual conference session (5% credit) and that the Y.M.W.B. Superintendent be seated in the annual session and be granted the privilege of speaking, and provision be made by her society for such representation. (5% credit)

7. That the \$1.00 membership dues be sent to the Conference W.M.S. Treasure and be forwarded to the General W.M.S. Treasurer for the

general fund.

8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the society; or achieve a ten per cent gain in total membership.

9. That each local society pay annually into the Conference Working Fund the amount assessed by the Conference W.M.S.

10. That the newly elected local President or Vice-President, attend the conference session and provision be made by her society for such representation.

(Ten per cent shall be given for each of the above items, except those otherwise specified, and all socities making a grade of eighty per cent shall be placed on the Honor Roll.)

#### CONFERENCE WORK

1. Conference goal for coming year: 850 active members; 325 honorary members: 1.000 magazines.

2. The Conference will provide some form of leadership training for W.M.S. members-clinics, workshops or training classes and one work-

shop for the Y.M.W.B. and Children's Workers annually.

- 5. There shall be three delegates to Area Conventions.
- Should a delegate be incapacitated, the first alternate delegate elected shall fill the vacancy proceeding through the list of delegates until the vacancies are filled.
- Any person reserving rooms in Conference or School dormitories shall observe the following:
  - a. That room rent be paid one year in advance.
  - b. That if the room is not to be used at Conference, the party shall inform the one in charge by the opening day of the Conference.
