DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Fourteenth Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Churches of Ohio convened at Cambridge, Ohio, August 24, 1921, in charge of Rev. A. W. Smith, President.

Conference opened at 9 A. M. by singing appropriate hymns, "Saviour Like a Shepherd," "Stand Up For Jesus," "My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less." Scripture Lesson, 1 Cor. 12:4-31, 13:1, by A. W. Smith. Prayer by J. W. Boggs.

Committee on Credentials was elected as follows: H. R. Smith, W. H. Mayle, G. E. Dudgeon. A partial report was given.

Conference bar was fixed as follows: First three seats on left of hall, and first six on right.

Ordered that a Nominating Committee of five be elected to nominate the committees that would take care of the business of the Conference. Committee is as follows: Elders, H. R. Smith, E. W. Cole, S. M. VanBlaricom; Lay Members, E. D. Packer, Earl Good.

Recess for thirty minutes.

The Nominating Committee gave the following partial report: Itineracy and Orders, L. H. McMillen, Edwin Greer.

Rev. W. H. Mayle spoke of the desire that Bertha Rickerson expressed to speak at one of the Conference sessions. The matter was referred to the Committee on Religious Services.

Time for Conference services was fixed as follows: 9 A. M., adjourn on motion. 2:30 P. M., preaching. Following the 2:30 P. M. service the business of the Conference is to be taken up.

Ordered that Saturday afternoon be the time for Conference election. Motion was amended to Friday afternoon.

Committee on Religious Services—Rev. Chas. Hill, Rev. Samuel Vorhies, Rev. A. W. Smith.

Conference President gave his yearly report. See report No. 1.

In order to further the work of the Ohio and the South Ohio Conference, it was ordered that a Committee be appointed to confer with the South Ohio Conference on making the boundary line of the two conferences elastic in order that the South Ohio may work among the colored people in Ohio territory, and Ohio Conference may work among white people in South Ohio territory, and with their concurrence memorialize the General Conference to make

this arrangement permanent. The following Committee was elected: Rev. Chas. Hill, L. H. McMillan, C. E. Knight.

The Conference Treasurer presented the following resolutions:

No. 1. Inasmuch as the fund known as the "Pastor's Moving
Fund" has not been used during the past two years, I recommend
that this Conference take action to safeguard this fund by ordering
that is shall be used to help pay moving expenses of Pastors moving

from one charge to another in the Conference.

And, further, that not more than twenty-five dol!ars be allowed any Pastor any one year. (Amended.) Placed in the hands of the President and Advisory Board.

No. 2. I also recommend that this Conference order that no money be paid out of the Conference Missionary Fund except by the written order of the Conference Missionary Board. (Carried).

The standing order of Conference, that the Conference election be held at 10 A. M., Saturday, was rescinded.

Second ruling of Conference that no one could leave the Conference only for sickness or death was rescinded and ordered that any member leaving Conference must present his excuse to the Conference.

Ordered that the President and his Advisory Board have application blanks on which such questions shall be asked as will make it convenient for the President and his Board to ascertain the amount the applicant is to receive for his moving expenses.

Committee on Courtesy introduced the following persons: Mrs. Edith Lee, Rev. J. S. Willett, Mr. J. S. Luckey, Rev. Smith,

Rev. Hoagland, Mr. Smalley and Samuel Vorhies.

Ordered that all those introduced to the Conference and in sympathy with our doctrines become honorary members of this body.

Ordered that Friday, 10:30 A. M., be given to Rev. J. S. Willett. Ordered that the election of Conference officers be held Friday at 3:30 P. M.

The matter regarding the Conference tent was taken from the table, and the following committee was elected: R. A. Hoffman, R. E. Ross, Chas. Hill, L. H. McMillan and Earl Good.

Rev. A. W. Smith presented the following resolutions: The first was amended, the others were adopted as read. tions and Corrections.

Auditing Committee reported. See report No. 8. As long as the Conference Treasurer is a layman, it was ruled that he made an honorary member of the Conference.

Ordered that the Conference Treasurer be given \$10.00, in a small way to reward him for his year's work, this money to be taken from the Conference Fund.

Nominating Committee reported as follows:

The following Committee on Itineracy and Orders was elected: Rev. A. W. Smith, Rev. L. A. Smothers, Rev. S. M. Van Blaricom, Rev. E. W. Cole, Mr. L. H. McMillan.

Committee on Credentials presented the name of Robert Cousins,

Delegate from Zanesville. His name was added to the roll.

The Committee that was to take care of the matter regarding the purchase of a Conference tent gave a report. See report No. 6.

Matter of raising money to buy the Conference tent was left

in the hands of the pastors.

Rev. George Dudgeon, Chairman of the Dunkirk Camp Meeting Association, brought to the Conference the greeting of the Association, and also extended a greeting to all who wished to attend the Camp.

A vote of thanks was sent to the Dunkirk Camp for using our own men, and being so liberal in their gift to our mission work.

The matter concerning the boundary line between the Ohio and South Ohio Conferences was left in the hands of the Conference President.

Ordered that the Conference officials keep a record of their expenses during the coming year, and the same be paid out of the Conference Fund.

The matter regarding the Conference President giving all of his time in the field was held back until after the election of Conference officers.

Miss Monna Rogers brought the greeting of the Miltonvale school, and also spoke highly of the work done there.

Mrs. Edith Lee referred to the advantages of Houghton School. Rev. Willett in speaking along this line, mentioned the vast amount of work the School had accomplished.

Surely we will not lose the inspiration received from the above speakers.

Rev. A. T. Vestal and Rev. Swain, of the United Brethren Church, were introduced to the Conference.

Committee on Statistics made a report. Report referred back to Committee.

Committee on Budget made their report. See report No. 3. Rev. J. M. Williams asked to be excused. 'Excuse granted. The following officers were elected:

Rev. Hill reported concerning the Oak Grove church, and C. E. Knight was made a Committee to look up title.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders made a partial report. Adjourned.

Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its report. See Report No. 5.

Ordered that the Secretary notify H. Livingston that in order to be continued an Elder in the Ohio Conference he must be a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Voted that the Conference President voice the thanks of the Conference to the Cambridge people for their kindness.

Ordered that Conference be on or near August 23, 1922.

Ordered that April be the date for the Institute, or near that time. The matter was left in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders gave its report. See report No. 4.

Rev. J. S. Willett preached a splendid sermon on Saturday evening and also on Sunday morning, followed by the Conference President on Sunday evening, which was the closing service of a very profitable Conference session.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Report No. 1.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1921.

Brethren and Sisters of the Conference:—The year just closed has been a blessed year of victory. Many of our charges have had good revivals and the omens of success were never so bright as now. Through financial depression and in some cases at great sacrifice, the work has been supported. The loyalty of our people to the Church and its doctrines is unquestioned.

Your President has been royally received by the charges visited and accorded not only the privilege of preaching the truth, but has received the moral and financial support of our people in his work. Souls have been saved and sanctified in the quarterly meetings held and in meetings held in connection with them. There is a growing unity among our people and a bond of union and brotherly interest in each other's welfare between the various charges. We need some encouragement as a people to know each other better. This is being brought about by our District Sunday School Associations and Holiness Conventions. They should become more and more the means of more intimate association among our people and likewise the means of a larger and richer spiritual life in the various churches.

For my services this year as your President I have received \$241.84.

My official actions are as follows:

September 1-20, 1920. Completed the deal for the Cambridge Mission property and received the deed for the same.

September 3, 1920. Met the Coolville Camp Meeting Association with the Conference Camp Meeting Committee and secured an option on the Camp Grounds at Coolville, Ohio. No camp was held there on account of a conflict with the proposition of the people of that place to hold a meeting near the time we had chosen.

September 10, 1920. Received Rev. R. E. Ross as a Licentiate from the International Holiness Association on his letter of standing.

September 10, 1920. Made a trip to Paulding, O., to supply that charge with a pastor as ordered by the last Conference. Made what seemed to be satisfactory arrangements, but it later failed to materialize and the organization has ceased to exist as an organized Wesleyan Methodist Church.

September 23, 1920. Made a trip to Findlay to assist in getting the transfer of church deeds made.

February 1, 1921. Recognized the Ridge Avenue Wesleyan Church as a new church according to the Disciplinary provision for separate organization on lines of nationality, this church having formerly in large measure been included in the membership of the Park Street Church.

March 14, 1921. Organized and recognized the Ross Chapel Church as a charge in the Conference.

Synopsis of an Address Given at a Meeting of the Ohio Conference
Preachers by the President and Requested to be Printed
in the Minutes.

Brethren of the Conference:—Since I have been your President there has frequently come to me a thing of which I desire to speak at this time. From whence I cannot say, but a rumor persistently prevails that some of our preachers are not clear on the doctrine and experience of sanctification as a second and distinct work of grace. Almost every man among us has some where and some time been accused of this thing. It affords me unlimited pleasure to say that as I have visited the various charges it has been said of the pastor, that he preaches the whole gospel.

Then, too, it has been said that there are charges where a preacher may not declare the whole counsel of God. This, too, is a false idea of the true conditions. While there are those that have been considered opposers of the doctrine, yet it appears that there is more opposition to some forms of presenting holiness than there is to the doctrine itself. We who are familiar with the history of the past realize that the wisest methods have not always been used in meeting and overcoming this prejudice. I cannot but believe that had these souls been antagonized less and led more that now they would be rejoicing in the possession of hearts in which God sets seal that "the blood of Jesus Christ, His Son cleanses from all unrighteousness." There have been some presentations of the experience that have not exemplified the love of First Corinthians Thirteen. This should not have been and retards our work to a certain extent. Some of these are souls that are honest seekers for the truth, but have been misled into believing that the Church holds a certain line of manifestation to be the mark of the experience. This is not the doctrine of Tongues, but other manifestations right and proper in themselves. We may not measure every man by the rule of physical manifestation. One man is boisterous and noisy. He overflows with joy, shouts, laughs, and in a marked fashion shows the emotion of his heart. Another sits quietly and with the peace of heaven on his face demonstrates the abiding of the Holy Comforter. Another weeps; and every man according to the operation of grace on his heart shows the depth of his emotion. Yet the quiet man may not say to the one of greater manifestation that the same grace and experience does not operate on both and to one as surely as to the other. And the brother of much emotion may not discount the experience of his quiet brother. There is room here for charity of judgment, lest we condemn him whom God approves. There is also food for thought in this: a man may preach much about holiness and very little holiness. Let us be careful that we preach the doctrine and experience so no one has a false conception of its nature and operation on the heart.

To understand why the conditions set forth previously exist, it is necessary to go back into the past history of the Conference and note its original membership, both in ministry and laity. We were a Conference of reformers gathered from various churches. Other conferences and churches were almost altogether Methodist in their faith originally, while many at least of our laity came of Calvinistic stock. This left its imprint on the early churches and in places lingers yet. These men and women were strong characters and left the imprint of their beliefs on their communities. Men pointed to them as exemplary in the last degree. Men of noble purpose and exalted character, who resisted evil in every form, and to whom every reform was dear. However they were not pleased with the introduction of the article on sanctification into our Book of Discipline. I can not but believe that these men and women might have many of them been won to the position of the Church had more conciliatory methods been used by the advocates of holiness. Many of the early ministers of the Conference shared the views just set forth. They were strong, clean living men, of unusual talent. That their teachings should linger was but natural. To overcome these things has taken time and will yet take some more time. It is to be feared that some times there has not been as much love shown in teaching the experience of perfect love as should have been shown. If holiness ever commends itself to men it will be when the abounding love which it begets in human hearts is always the uppermost grace. However these things are past and a new race

of men are in our midst. Among the staunch professors of holiness and among some of our most consistent examples of what the grace does for human hearts are descendants of those who in the past were not one with this Methodistic and Scriptural doctrine and experience. With whatever residue of opposition that yet may linger we must exercise patience and use love in all our dealings lest we fail to lead all in the blessed paths of holy living.

Characteristic of the youth of our Conference it may truthfully be said that they are walking in the light and are testifying to full salvation. Nearly every church in our borders has a company of most excellent young people, loyal and true Wesleyans, who are our hope and will soon be the bulwarks of our Conference.

I feel that we need to be careful in the presentation of the gracious experience lest we give false standards. Some have minimized regeneration to magnify sanctification. Probably this will always exist where there is not clearness of teaching and definite experience in the teacher. Holiness of life begins in regeneration and the initial desire for holiness of life is begotten in the soul when pungent Holy Ghost convicton for sin is experienced. Regeneration is an experience of victory over actual transgression. Sanctification is an experience of cleansing from the nature and inbred pollution of sin. Each will stand for itself. A man does not need to be sanctified to be a gentleman. The regenerated soul in all outward conduct is as holy as the sanctified. Neither does this view minify full salvation. Men repent and forsake sin, hating it and fleeing it as a pestilence in conviction. They are forgiven its transgressions in justification and find the cleansing of their hearts in sanctification, so that they are able to love and serve God out of a pure heart fervently. These experiences are attested by the direct witness of the Holy Spirit, who abides as the Comforter of all who have thus received Him. His abiding is continuous, unless grieved by sin and neglect from the soul.

"And now abideth faith, hope, love, these three, and the greatest of these is love."

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE WESLEYAN METHODIST DISCIPLINE.

In order to make the choice of a pastor the judgment of the mature members of the church, Be it resolved, That the Fargo and Oxford charge requests the Ohio Annual Conference to petition the next General Conference to amend the Discipline as follows: Page 52, Paragraph 78, add at bottom of page and end of paragraph, "No person who has not attained the age of sixteen years shall be eligible to vote on retaining the present pastor."

Page 56, Paragraph 83, Section 1: Strike out the words, "It shall also have power to recommend suitable persons for Elders' ()rders."

Page 69, Paragraph 102, Strike out the words, "making such recommendations as it may deem advisable," and insert in their stead: "recommend suitable candidates to be received to study or to travel, and it shall also recommend for ordination such persons as have satisfactorily completed the course of study as required by the discipline."

Page 56, Paragraph 83: Strike out the words, "Quarterly Conference" in the clause, "all persons so recommended shall pass an examination satisfactory to the Quarterly Conference on the preliminary course of study," and insert, "the Committee on Itineracy and Orders."

Page 96, Paragraph 303. Strike out paragraph 303 and insert, "We, therefore, require that no Annual Conference receive any licentiate to travel under its direction until he has passed the preliminary course of study before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, except as proper school credits covering the course are presented to the Committee and approved by them."


