IN MEMORIAM



Elder Arthur G. Carlson passed to his eternal reward from the halls of Salem Bible College on their "Harvest Day", October 20, 1961, at the age of 73. He had given over twenty years of faithful and efficient service to the Conference. For sixteen years he held the office of Conference Treasurer with unusual accuracy and ability. He was a valued Trustee for eight years relinquishing this position only upon accepting the Warren pastorate which made him ineligible to serve longer because of removing from the state of Pennsylvania. He was associated with the Conference in ministerial capacity for seven years as a Conference Preacher, co-pastoring with Sister Carlson, and eight years as an Ordained Elder. Into whatever capacity he was ushered he undertook the task with diligent heart and soul. One has said of him, "He was a devout man, dedicated to his God and devoted to the work to which God had called him."

Brother Carlson's introduction to the Conference official circle came on July 8, 1941 when, as a layman, he was elected by the Conference

Vacancy Committee to the Treasurership to take up the work of retiring Treasurer, F. W. Dreyer. He sustained this relationship for sixteen years, retiring from office in 1957 because of illness. He advanced his Conference fellowship when on March 26, 1942 he became the husband of Elder Catharine D. Carr, then serving as pastor of the Grace Church. Four years later Brother Carlson took another step forward in Conference relationship by being recommended from the Grace Church to Study and Travel under the direction of the Conference. The recommendation was accepted and the Carlsons were appointed to the pastorate of the Carrollton Tabernacle. Ending four years of service at the Tabernacle, at the Conference of 1946 they were transferred to Pittsfield where they remained until 1955. During his pastorate here Brother Carlson advanced another step in Conference fellowship, being elected to Elders Orders at the Conference of 1953. The fact that Brother Carlson completed the Conference Course of Study in seven years gives good insight into the sterling character and the efficiency and diligence of his life and work.

Five years of strenuous labor marked the Carlsons' stay at Mentcle, where ill health required him to lighten his burden by relinquishing the office of Treasurer. At the Conference of 1960 they accepted appointment to his last pastorate, the Warren Church. Here after a year and one half of diligent labor, toiling faithfully to show gain in the local church, and with many plans for the future, he was suddenly called to "Come up Higher." A life of Christian fidelity was abruptly transferred to Eternal Life.

We have lost a beloved brother, a kindly father, a faithful companion, a diligent Minister, a devout Christian. But our loss is his gain. He has gained an entrance into the City of God, a rest from his labors, a heavenly home. "God buries His workmen, but carries on His work."

Standing Resolutions

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all the financial reports, except the W.M.S. and Y.M.W.B., and to be a Standing Committee to advise on Financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to a new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage, shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.

4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organizations. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference. The Secretary shall be Chairman of the Credentials Committee and shall compile the Roll of Delegates from the regularly filled Credentials received.

6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid to him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.

9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candi-

date and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitations, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

13. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the **WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH**, and that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in him, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.

15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.

16. We recommend that in election of ^{the} local church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this committee.

17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let all contracts for same.

18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74, The "Ideal Church Record" published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.

19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after this date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30, may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purpose.

20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued to Elders and annually to Conference Preachers who are eligible.

21. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of

our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

22. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the third Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the church to vote on a week night, it will be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and the Advisory Board.

23. Each church shall allow their pastor a reasonable vacation with pay to be taken at his convenience. Two weeks is suggested.

24. In the judgment of the Allegheny Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to the public clamor for entertainment is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism—being an epitome of the Christian religion—obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs for Jesus' sake.

Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Allegheny Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

25. The third Sunday of September shall be designated, each year, as Pioneer Sunday to present the work of the Pioneer department to our congregations and pastors be urged to exchange pulpits on this Sunday as much as possible.

26. Any Elder or Conference Preacher desiring a transfer from the Allegheny Conference to another Annual Conference, or to receive a letter of Standing, must have all notes paid to the Minister's Aid Fund, or have made satisfactory arrangements with the Chairman of the Auditing and Finance Committee for their repayment.

REPORT NO. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America here assembled for its One Hundred and Nineteenth Annual Session, we greet you with the exhortation with which the Early Church Fathers exhorted the Christians of their day and which is very appropriate for our day: "Watch for your life's sake. Let not your lamps be quenched, nor your loins unloosed; but be ye ready, for ye know not the hour in which our Lord cometh" (c Anti-Nicene Fathers, VII, 382).

The whole world is in a state of fearful expectation. "We are living in the most dangerous era of human history." We find ourselves in a debt-ridden, crime-plagued, strife-torn, drink-crazed, sex-perverted, money-mad and pleasure-seeking age and one that is being swept by materialistic concerns. Technology is the god of this age. The one word which most adequately characterizes our day is the word "crisis". Crisis conditions have gripped almost every nation on the globe and have spread into every realm of human endeavor. The people of today are feeling the burden of crisis as never before and in moments of wavering faith many find themselves wondering whether God is still on the throne.

Dr. Simon E. Forsberg said, "There can be no question that the world today is in the grip of a great crisis which poses an unprecedented threat to humanity and to human institutions. We are living in an age which is marked by mighty political convulsions, treacherous revolutions, economic and racial unrest, bitter enmity against established order and periodic wars. The threat to our freedoms and to our Christian way of life is by far the greatest that has ever been faced."

Recently, Dr. Graham made this statement: "There is no doubt that there are dangerous drifts in America at this moment. The country has reached the point of moral desperation. A leading newspaper publisher recently confided in me, 'The dam has broken—the flood is beyond control. In every area of American life we are in deep trouble. The thing that amazes me most is the apathy, indifference and complacency of the average citizen.'"

Recently the News Columnist, Eric Sevareid said, "We have misjudged the terrible restlessness in the world when belief in a heaven after death fades away, as it is doing across the great stretches of this globe, something must take its place." He further charges that "This illusion of a semi-fictional life of glamour has touched the uneasy spirits of men and beckoned them to enter the gates of a semi-fraudulent paradise on earth."

The advent of the atomic bomb and now the break through on the fantastic "Light Ray" with kindred devastating weapons has brought the world face to face with the possibility of the doom of

the present civilization. Great powers tremble in confusion and within the halls of the United Nations they grapple at each other's throats. Nobody knows the solution.

If there ever was a generation of Christians who had a right to look forward to the Coming of the Lord momentarily day by day, on the basis of what they see in the world, it is this present generation. Even unbelievers are warning that things cannot go on as they are much longer.

Everywhere today there are signs that the return of the Lord for His "own possession" is drawing near. We have:

1. The beginning of the consolidation of European nations into a United States of Europe in fulfillment of portions of the Book of Daniel which is a reviving of the Old Roman Empire—on the last Sunoco News Broadcast of 1961, one analyst said that the most important thing to watch in 1962 would be the reviving of the Old Roman Empire;
2. The Confederation of Northern Nations centered in Russia, in fulfillment of the thirty-eighth chapter of Ezekiel's prophecy—such a phenomenal rise of a nation, that is so godless and blasphemous, must certainly have some deep significance;
3. The awakening of the nations of the Far East, after long slumbers, in fulfillment of Revelation 16:12 which describes the marching of the kings of the East to the battle of Armageddon;
4. The return of Israel to the promised land for the first time since the days of Nebuchadnezzar—one secular writer said that this nation's rise from the dust of history is without parallel.
5. The coming of the atomic age in answer to suggestions in 2 Peter chapter three concerning the melting of the elements with fervent heat;
6. The beginnings of a world church, evident in the increasing trend toward ecumenicity and in the closer relationship of Protestantism with Romanism, in fulfillment of the prophecy concerning ecclesiastical Babylon in the Book of Revelation—Dr. J. Dwight Pentecost says, "Powerful Protestant leaders today are advocating the union of several major denominations into one church in the United States. These leaders are advocating what is known as the 'ecumenical movement', and those who apply this term to the religious realm have in mind the development of a great ecclesiastical body which will one day be world-wide in scope. Some outstanding Protestant leaders have already gone so far as to admit that their goal is the ultimate reunion of Protestantism and Romanism and the establishment of a universal Church. After the rapture of the church the apostate religious systems of the world will join hands. Rome will come into the ascendancy as the leader of this religious octopus, and the entire system will come under the judgment of God in the Tribulation." This will be known as the Harlot Church;

7. The sweeping flame of apostasy with its spirit of compromise and capitulation to error—a development that is taking place so rapidly as to almost bring dizziness to Bible-believing ministers and Christians in this country.

Skepticism is developing so rapidly that Bible believers are getting into a smaller and smaller minority. Dr. Charles Woodbridge says, "I thought it would be a frontal attack against our faith by obvious enemies of Christ. This is one reason I went to Germany as an exchange student years ago, to sit at the feet of liberal German professors, in order to understand their point of view and to be prepared to meet it. But now it appears that in addition to a stubborn frontal attack against the Word we have also an oblique attack, an attack from an angle, even on the part of some who used to be right with us in the defense of the faith. Men of good will are beginning to capitulate and to throw their weight on the side of apostasy—a very interesting phenomenon, a striking sign that we are in the latter days. The prophetic Word says that this apostasy is one of the basic signs of the latter days."

This is comparable to the day in history when Habakkuk raised the plaintive cry, "Why doesn't the Lord intervene in the affairs of Israel?" He further said, "I have cried violence and you do nothing about it." He was writing in a time of unparalleled prosperity in his own country and living in a day of moral laxity and spiritual apostasy. It was a day of corruption in the courts and of criminal violence and of social chaos. The real problem in the mind of the prophet arose from his observation of these abuses and reflecting on the lofty disclosures of God's righteousness in days gone by, he simply could not understand God's silence and forbearance. The Chaldeans, a terrible and powerful force, were moving down upon little Judah and Israel and it seemed that all their world was to be destroyed, the Ancient Prophet cried out, "Why, Lord?"

The answer from God was "I am doing a work in your day that if I told you you would not believe it." And so He did.

Today, God is still on the throne. Neither apostasy in the church, nor godless atheistic Communism, nor Khrushchev will write the last chapter of history. God is going to write it.

In God's own mysterious way He is doing a work in our day. His program is on the march. If we could see it from the divine point of view we would gasp at His Divine world strategy. Our Lord's Kingdom is going to prevail. If you will read Revelation 19:11-20:14 and Daniel 2:34,35, you will discover how God is going to smash His enemy and set up His Kingdom.

In Micah 4:1-3, we read about the time mentioned in Psalm 2:6, "Yet have I set My King upon My Holy Hill of Zion" - "But in the latter days it shall come to pass, that the mountain of the house of the Lord shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and it shall be exalted above the hills, and the peoples shall flow to it. And many nations shall come, and say, Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; that He may teach us His

ways and we may walk in His paths. For the law shall go forth out of Zion, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. And He shall judge between many peoples, and shall decide for strong nations afar off; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning-hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more" (A.O.T.). In Daniel 2:45, we read: "And in the days of these (final ten) kings shall the God of Heaven set up a kingdom which shall never be destroyed, nor shall its sovereignty be left to another people, but it shall break and crush and consume all these kingdoms, and it shall stand forever" (A.O.T.).

You may well ask, "What shall we do?" Jude tells us what to do in this dark hour. We are: (1) To build ourselves up in the most holy faith; (2) To pray in the Holy Ghost; and (3) To keep ourselves in the love of God. The greatest need of this hour is for God's people to have their fires of devotion to the Son of God rekindled at the altars of the Holy Spirit.

We are grateful for what progress has been made in the Conference in these trying days. Some churches have experienced some unusual movings of the Spirit while others have stood still. The thing that alarms us is the fact that in ten years if some of our churches do not begin to grow they will be closed when the older people die off. Did you ever stop to think that the church that evangelized the Roman Empire did not own an acre of ground, had no building, no publishing plant, no radio station, no airplane and no automobiles? This Church had nothing but zeal for the lost and it carried the Gospel to the ends of the Roman Empire. Could it be that we are depending too much upon buildings, programs, mechanical devices, etc., to do only what a mighty Holy Ghost passion can do? Let's think it over!

Throughout the year we have continued in the work assigned to us at the last Annual Conference. To the best of our limited knowledge and ability, through much tarrying before the Lord even in the night hours, we have sought the guidance of Him who knows everything from the beginning to the ending. Following is a report of our actions:

 3. That each pastor do all he can to interest his people in supporting and attending Stoneboro Campmeeting. (It is the Pastor's and Layman's Camp as well as the Conference Camp);
 4. That everyone join the Conference Brigade of Intercessory Commandos;
 5. And that each pastor do his best to maintain Holiness Evangelism by (1) Preaching Holiness; (2) Living a Holy Life and (3) Having a passion for souls.

ITEM XV. AN EARNEST APPEAL—In this day of utter disregard for God's Word, holy principles, holy standards of conduct, modesty, proper Christian attitudes and vital holy living, we appeal:

1. To the ministers of the Allegheny Conference—that every preacher will endeavor to do his best:
 - a. to possess a Christlike compassion for the lost;
 - b. to express his faith through tactful witnessing;
 - c. to defend the interests of the kingdom and the church even when their reputations are jeopardized and to "set forward, as much as lieth in you, quietness, peace and love among all Christian people", especially among those committed to your charge;
 - d. to set forth by precept and example the tenets of his faith by uncompromisingly righteous living;
 - e. to maintain a deep regard for God's Word and daily study the same.
 - f. to do his utmost to keep his church and young people's society on a spiritual level rather than yield to the popular social trend;
 - g. to be faithful not to violate your vow taken to "be diligent to frame and fashion yourselves and your families according to the doctrine of Christ and to make yourselves and them, as much as in you lieth, wholesome examples and patterns to the flock of Christ";
2. To the ministers' wives of the Allegheny Conference—that every minister's wife will do her best by influence and example to set before their people patterns of modesty and of holy living and not allow herself to be swayed in this day either by worldly fashion, custom or maxim, but to carry out what the Apostle Paul says in Romans 12:2, "Be not conforming day by day to this world but be day by day transforming by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God." The Bible exhorts to abstain from the very appearance of evil. Therefore, in every instance give God the benefit of the doubt (I Tim. 2:9, 10; I Peter 3:3-5; Titus 2).

The first impression people receive of us is our appearance

and conduct. We, therefore have a responsibility to appear and conduct ourselves as Christians. This rule applies to both sexes and ought to be considered by Christians in this day when the propensity is so strong for complying with the fashions of a world which is defying God and when the tendency is to ignore and violate the just relations held by men and women in society, above all things ought Christian women professing godliness "to adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety" resisting firmly every fashion that may prove either a dishonor to themselves or a temptation to a man.

The laws of nature confirm the dictates of Christianity, and real Christianity accepts, authenticates and sanctifies the teaching of nature.

These past nineteen years we have endeavored to maintain and to set before this Conference a sensible, sane, scriptural standard. We are not a fanatic nor an extremist but we are convinced that God demands a separated way. We must have your help to maintain what this Conference has stood for down through the years. We cannot maintain on a Conference level what is not conscientiously maintained on a local level. There are some trends appearing here and there which will mean the downfall of this Conference spiritually if they are not corrected. We trust that every one will do his best to keep the Conference on a high spiritual level.

ITEM VIII. We recommend that credit for no book in the Course of Study be allowed for more than one quadrennium after that book has been officially dropped from the course.

ITEM IX. We will not recommend to the Pastoral Relations Committee any person who has not complied with Paragraph 170, Sub-paragraph 1 of the Discipline. We further insist that recommendations to Study and Travel with Transcripts of grade for which credit is desired will be in the hands of the Committee on the first day of the Annual Conference, also that with each transcript the Committee shall be furnished a copy of the School catalogue from which the transcript came.

ITEM X. We require that students who are ready to take an examination in any book shall designate an acceptable member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church outside their immediate family, to whom Authorized Examiner shall mail the selected list of questions, and in whose presence the examination shall be taken in accordance with the rules and general instructions, for examinations. Such person shall certify that the examination was taken in his presence in an honorable manner, and shall return the examination paper to the examiner with self-addressed stamped envelope to return to the student.

ITEM XI. We place in nomination the name of Rev. Frank B. Miller for election to the office of Custodian of Conference Books. We recommend that no books be mailed from the library unless sufficient postage accompanies application for the same and that this library be reserved for the use of those who are pursuing the Course of Study as Conference Preachers and Song Evangelists. We also insist that no study book or reading book be kept by one individual longer than forty-five days. In case of necessity, upon application to the Custodian an extension of thirty days may be granted.

ITEM XII. We urge that in writing examinations special attention be given to neatness, spelling, and composition. The Committee cannot give the same credit to papers that lack neatness and are poorly composed, as to those that have received proper attention in this respect. We require papers to be typewritten or written in ink.

ITEM XIII. In taking examinations, when a specified number of answers are asked for and more are answered, the grade will be based on the number asked for. As an example, if 10 answers were asked for and 12 were given, the grade will be based on the first 10. If less answers are given than the number requested, the grade will be based on the full number requested.

ITEM XIV. We wish to call to your attention that those wishing to take examinations on Wiley's Theology are to contact the member of the

Committee for that particular year, sending postage, in order to receive the select list of questions for study.

ITEM XV. When anyone has completed a course of study in school and is to appear before this Committee he shall bring a transcript from that school in which the work was taken.

ITEM XVI. We recommend that those coming from another denomination must have a letter of recommendation from their superior.

ITEM XVII. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraphs 91 and 92 of the Discipline require that the holder of an Annual Conference license must continue to hold an effective Quarterly Conference license and that license must be renewed each year and this requires the passing at least one book in the Course of Study.

ITEM XVIII. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraph 170, sub-item (2) of the Discipline states that continued authorization to marry and to administer the sacraments depends on passing at least two books of the Course of Study.

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and recommendations:

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

1. The following Denominational Budget items: World Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$3.50, (20 per cent to Houghton Academy); Pension, \$2.00; Brainerd \$.25; Church Extension and Evangelism, \$1.50; Hephzibah Home, \$.35; Administrative Budget, \$1.00; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.50; Australia, \$.25; Board Meeting Expense, \$.25; (these assessments are per church member per year.)
2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference work) shall be equal to ten percent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items:

The Allegheny Conference

Pastor's salary, parsonage rent, and church incidental expense (to be remitted monthly). Included in church incidental expenses are: Parsonage tax, all kinds of insurance on church and parsonage; janitor services and supplies, church utilities and fuel, parsonage utilities, and fuel when paid by the church, pastor's car expense when provided by the church, all other items which are similar to or comparable with the above. Not included are repairs, replacements, improvements, evangelistic help and special projects, church and parsonage furnishings, Sunday School and Church literature and similar items.

3. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.35 per member.
4. Conference Entertainment, \$.45 per member.
5. Pioneer Self-denial envelopes for monthly remittances (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.
6. The above financial items shall be sent to the District Sub-treasurers. Church Treasurers are to make remittances by the 5th of each month to the credit of Conference Budget, Conference Missions, and Pioneer Fund.
7. The pastor or persons responsible for the sale of the Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$1.00 per copy to the chairman of the Committee on the Sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31st. The Chairman of said committee shall mail statements to all those who have not paid for their Minutes by March 31st, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30th.
8. Church Treasurers' reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurers' records for the Conference year shall close April 30th. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

1. The first Sunday School offerings of the month to the Conference Missions Fund for the use of churches not self-supporting, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.
2. Sunday School birthday offerings to the Conference Mission Fund.
3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.20 per Sunday School member.
4. All three items above mentioned are to be paid to the local church treasurer for remittance to sub-treasurer.

ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

1. To the Conference President an annual salary of \$4,680.00.
2. To the Conference Vice-President an annual salary of \$4,420.00.
3. The two above named Conference officials shall also be paid or have paid for them the following items:
 - a. All utilities which include heat, light, gas, water and telephone.
 - b. The premium for Liability Insurance for their cars in the amount \$100,000.00 which coverage they shall be required to maintain.
 - c. The cost of their Annual Social Security Assessment.
 - d. The cost of Blue Cross Premiums.
 - e. \$100.00 vacation bonus.
 - f. \$1,100.00 Travel expense with the provision that all traveling costs in excess of this amount be paid them up to the amount of 5c

per mile for the mileage reported in their current reports to the Conference. This includes all traveling costs exclusive of car depreciation.

4. \$1.10 per hour for Secretarial Aid for Conference President's Secretary, plus the cost of her Hospitalization Insurance and \$50.00 vacation bonus.

5. All expense incurred by Conference officials, Board and Committee members in the pursuit of the duties of their respective offices upon the presentation of itemized expense accounts. Mileage will be paid at 5c per mile.

6. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for their services; Conference Secretary, \$125.00; Conference Treasurer, \$150.00; each sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$60.00; West Virginia sub-treasurer, \$30.00; Conference Pension Plan Financial Secretary, \$25.00; Superintendent of Rooms, \$25.00; Statistical Chairman, \$25.00; Aid Fund Financial Secretary, \$25.00.

7. \$25.00 to each Sub-treasurer for an expense account.

2. That the churches pay the annual Social Security Assessments for their pastors. We recommend that this be paid to the pastor when he pays his annual assessment. (Where a change of pastors is involved, payment in proper proportions is to be paid to both pastors)

3. That the churches pay the quarterly Blue Cross premium for their pastors when possible.

4. That the churches pay all utilities for their pastors.

5. That when a pastor requests a change in the quarterly meeting of the President or Vice-President which involves extra mileage or expense, the church or churches involved shall pay said expense.

6. We have interviewed each of our general evangelists who is attending Conference and we recommend that aid be given them as follows: H. E. Robertson, Sr.—\$50.00; C. R. McPherson—\$50.00; George Sundstrom—\$50.00.

7. That \$25.00 monthly be paid to W. R. Kopp from the Assistance Fund.

8. That our Conference President be given one month vacation and our Conference Vice-President be given three weeks vacation.

9. Inasmuch as the handling of Aid Fund payments on loans often involves the cancelling of notes and the issuing of receipts by the Conference Treasurer; and inasmuch as the handling of this particular fund can be expedited by being sent directly to the Conference Treasurer, We recommend that all Aid Fund Payments be made to the Conference Treasurer and that the office of Aid Fund Financial Secretary be discontinued.

10. We recommend that the "Earnest Appeal" submitted by the Camp Board to the Conference for the offerings taken at this Annual Session plus enough to make up a total of \$1,500.00 to help defray the cost of the new water well and gas lines be declined.

In lieu of granting this request, we recommend that the Conference demonstrate its good will toward and appreciation for the Camp by making a contribution of \$3,000.00 of which \$1,000.00 is to apply toward the support of the Caretaker.

11. For some years there has been a degree of uncertainty as to what attitude our Conference ought to take with regard to payment of our Educational Budget.

Some things have come to the attention of your Finance Committee which we regard as being conclusive and valid reasons for our refraining from further support of Houghton College and Academy. It has been known for a considerable period of time that practices of which we do not approve were permitted and condoned.

It has now come to our attention that the visible things of which we do not approve are not regarded by the Institutions as anything of which to be ashamed. The publicity afforded through the medium of the two year-books, the Boulder and the Pebble, brazenly displays pictures which reveal the calibre of social and sports life which prevails. Some of the pictures are nothing less than disgraceful, displaying large areas of the body by the wearing of shorts, low cut necks, and near sleeveless attire. Pedal pushers, short cut hair, and jewelry are in abundance.

In the "Pebble", the Houghton Academy year book for 1962, verification of the above statements may be found on pages 44-52 and 58-60.

In the college year book, "The Boulder" for 1962, verification may be found on pages 10-13, 19, 34, 47, 77-83, and 86-90.

It is evident that the management of these institutions does not share our views on modesty and decency. We feel that if the management had the proper attitude toward these matters, the very least they could do would be to see that they were not publicized through the year books.

We are grieved and ashamed that these year books have gone out to the world, bearing pictures which represent a College, which is represented to be a Christ-centered college.

To verify our stand as a Conference against the brazen affront of worldliness, we feel that it is impractical and inconsistent for us to continue our support as a Conference to these institutions unless there can be furnished to us satisfactory evidence that a definite effort is being made by the schools to correct these deplorable conditions.

Therefore, we recommend that copies of this recommendation be sent to President Paine of Houghton College and President Tysinger of Houghton Academy, as our protest to the clearly evident state of spiritual decline. We believe this protest reflects the spirit of and is in harmony with Paragraph 256—Sub-paragraph #2 in the Discipline.

If, after one year, we are not furnished with genuine evidence that a sincere effort is being made to correct the above-mentioned conditions, we shall, as a Conference, disclaim all responsibility for paying our Educational Budget.

ITEM VII. BUDGET APPOINTMENTS:

1. The Conference Undivided Budget apportionment shall be as follows: Conference Budget, 90 percent; Assistance Fund, 2 percent; Pension Plan, 8 percent.

ITEM VIII. EXAMINATION OF AID FUND ACCOUNTS:

The ruling enacted one year ago, requesting that all Aid Fund note renewals be made in writing and mailed to the Chairman of the Finance Committee has had a successful response.

All renewal requests have been granted.

Payments on notes in almost all cases have been satisfactory and we regard the Aid Fund as being in a healthy condition. We appreciate the cooperation of all who have loans.

Appointed Rev. C. R. McPherson to be an assistant to the Pioneer Supervisor, over the S.W.Va. District, and to be president of the S.W.Va. Camp Meeting. He is to travel the District two weeks twice during the year: once in the fall and just preceding the camp meeting. His salary to be \$300.00 plus travelling expense.

Discussed the work at Holiday Park with Bro. Ralph Manners, and voted the sum of \$200.00 from the Pioneer Fund to paint and repair the church building. Later this was raised to \$247.50.

Voted that the full salary of the pastor of the Duquesne Heights church be paid from the Pioneer Fund.

Voted that \$250.24, the moving expense of the Duquesne Heights pastor be transferred from Pioneer Fund to Conference Mission Fund.

Finance Committee extended Bro. Markell's assistance at \$75.00 per month until December 15.

Finance Committee met at Stoneboro August 23, 1961.

Voted to reimburse Rev. H. A. Markell the amount of money he spent on repairing the church at Jamestown, Pa.

Voted a grant sufficient to pay off a note owed to the U. S. National Bank, Nanty Glo office, for the pump and water conditioner at the Barkley parsonage.

Voted a grant sufficient to pay an account at the Arone Block and Supply Co., Homer City, for materials used in the parsonage basement at the Barkley church.

October 20, 1961:

By telephone and correspondence, the Pioneer committee recommended that the Conference purchase two lots in Aliquippa, Pa. for the sum of \$9,000.00 for the purpose of erecting a church building. The Mission board passed this recommendation on to the Conference Trustees.

Voted that the sum of \$101.50 in the Pioneer unspecified Fund be paid on the note of the Canton McKinley parsonage owed by the Youth Department.

Voted to pay from the Conference Mission Fund the amount of \$398.50 to apply on this same note.

Voted to transfer the sum of \$6.75 from special Pioneer Fund to the regular Pioneer Fund and the sum of \$20.00 to the Beckley Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Voted to place a Pioneer pastor at Aliquippa, Pa. immediately following conference.

May 17, 1962:

REPORT NO. 9

THE MERGER COMMITTEE

At the 1961 Annual Conference a resolution was presented and carried for the Conference President and his Advisory Board to appoint a committee to keep the possibility of future merger with another body under consideration. Such a committee was duly appointed: F. E. Mansell, C. A. Blair, T. O. McCracken, J. B. Markey, A. Mark Larson, C. R. McPherson, T. W. Comadoll, C. A. Hoiem, T. A. Robertson, Charles Ewing, and Mont Moore.

The first meeting of the committee was held June 16, 1961.

It was voted that a statement of reason for the vote on merger taken within the conference be drawn up and sent to the Board of Administration. Action at this time was taken and a committee elected to draw up the statement on Purpose. The statement prepared and forwarded to the Board of Administration is as follows.

STATEMENT

Since several Annual Conferences have registered their approval of the merger idea with the Board of Administration, and since we are opposed to the idea of merger, and since we feel that the merger of denominations is of the prevalent world spirit, and since we fear that merger

would lead to further centralization of government, the Annual Conference at their Annual Session took this vote which registers its opposition.

The Merger Study Committee

The Merger Committee met June 12, 1962 and made the following recommendations:

1. It is recommended this committee be continued intact for the ensuing year.

2. The motion was made and carried that the following resolution be presented to this Conference body.

A strong sense of reluctance has postponed action until this time. But after prolonged, prayerful, and solemn deliberation an even stronger sense of compulsion, arising from our deepest God-given convictions, demands that strong and definite action be taken now. Our desire is to remain intact as a Conference with present policy, form of administration, and fellowship.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church finds itself in disagreement with the General Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc.; and

WHEREAS, the Allegheny Annual Conference being a Pennsylvania corporation doing business in Pennsylvania, Ohio, West Virginia, and New York, desires to continue in its present course without alteration; and

WHEREAS, it has become apparent that the General Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc., being a New York corporation, inclines toward union with certain other Churches and changes in the form of the Wesleyan Methodist Church as now established; and

WHEREAS, the General Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America sanctions other practices not in harmony with the historic stand of the Allegheny Annual Conference and of Wesleyan Methodism in general, it is hereby **RESOLVED** that the Allegheny Annual Conference will remain in communion with the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc. for purposes of doctrine only, but does specifically reject any change in church organization and/or practice which is not submitted to the Allegheny Annual Conference for its consideration and passage prior to being effective within the Allegheny Annual Conference area, and it is further the position of the Allegheny Annual Conference that the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline in its most recent (1959) edition can not and does not place the Allegheny Annual Conference under the episcopal power of the General Conference.

REPORT NO. 10 SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Greetings in the Precious Name of Jesus, the One Who said, "Suffer the little children to come unto me and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of Heaven."

Sunday School is "soul business" and unless we have prepared souls as well as prepared lessons for the task at hand, we will fail the souls of those we are held responsible for. I am fully convinced that we need to catch sight of the fact that each one on the register in our Sunday Schools of the Conference is a never dying, immortal soul. We may well write over the class room doors of our teen-agers "Perishable" because it is a known fact that we are losing nearly 70% of our youth from the church these days.

I am encouraged to note that we have had a small gain in average attendance throughout the conference. Do not underestimate the value of the Sunday School. Remember my brothers and sisters in the Lord, Sunday School is soul business. Jesus said, "One soul was worth more than all the world." If you look at it this way it is not hard to see the wealth that is ours in our Sunday Schools.

REPORT NO. 11

SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

Scriptural evangelism receives its authority from heaven, and its doctrine from Christ as prophet, Who was attested to by the Father at His baptism and on the Mount of Transfiguration, when a Voice from the excellent glory proclaimed, "This is my beloved Son, hear ye Him." It offers the authentic Lamb of God as atonement for man's sin.

True evangelism receives its enabling from heaven. When Jesus ascended on high, taking captivity captive, He received from the Father honors and obtained gifts for men: 1. The infinite resource of the Spirit's ministration, 2. The anointed Word, and 3. The anointed ministry of His servants—apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers. All are heaven's effectual and only means of carrying on in earth the true work of evangelism.

The modern evangelism which deals deceitfully with the Word of the Lord, and gives little value to an anointed ministry, thus rudely grieving

the Holy Ghost, has no seal or authority from God.

Anyone acquainted with the desolation that modernism has brought to the Mother Church, which at one time was a mighty force for righteousness in thousands of American communities, need not be in the dark as to the destruction it will bring to our beloved Zion once it obtains strategic places of honor and acceptance.

The new evangelism that is finding wide acceptance in many areas of the holiness church today is a child of modernism. It is spoiled by vain philosophy after the traditions of men and the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ.

When modernism infiltrates the holiness colleges, it robs the young ministers and missionaries of their faith in the scriptural gospel. It works its way into the church periodicals, and Sunday School literature. Little by little, it picks at the Bible standards, and removes objectionable points of doctrine and practice that are an offense to the world. In its strategy of aggressive advance, it first coexists with truth, injecting supposedly harmless unscriptural substitutes. For instance, it promotes unscriptural youth programs for the adolescent, patterned after the Boy and Girl Scout Movements. Only a backslidden church with unregenerate church members could champion such a far-cry substitute for the New Birth.

In modernism's inroads into the holiness church, it first infiltrated the children and youth literature. It is with this group that it concentrates its efforts. Like all sinister forces in world movements, it bids high for the future of the holiness church by capturing her youth. It also seeks to capture places of leadership and key pulpits, from which it may effectively boycott Bible evangelism.

When I was pastoring a seven-point circuit in a conservative area of the Mother Church, a large percentage of the pastors were self-educated lay preachers. Almost without exception they believed the Bible with its demands for repentance and the New Birth. They proclaimed the Word of God, cried out against sin, sought revivals in their churches and had some fruit in turning souls to righteousness. However, coexisting with this was a new evangelism introduced by Seminary educators and promoted by the Bishops, their District Elders and by aspiring late graduates of the church schools of religion.

This unscriptural child of modernism authorized by the god of education bypassed man's depravity and the sin issue, ignored the Bible demands of the new birth and holiness as a second definite work of grace. It did not openly war with Bible evangelism, but soon found such wide acceptance that place was no longer given to scriptural revivals. Preference for the late graduates of the schools of new Theology soon replaced the key pastorates and strategic places of position and leadership. It was more pleasing to an ease-loving people and the easy-success-seeking pastor to sell the truth for a yearly promotional membership drive. At this point the old-time evangelism found no more place within such churches.

Signs of the same spirit are evidenced today by manifest antagonism against an all-out Bible ministry. Its authority and heaven-clear demands are being subtly side-stepped. The Word is a reproach in many so-called holiness churches. The authority of the statutes of Omri and Ahab are

held in preference to the Word out of Mount Zion.

The Spirit-anointed prophet, pastor and evangelist, God's blood-bought gift, is His best gift to any church or community, His gift to open the eyes of the blind, to bring them out of darkness into the light, and from the power of Satan unto God. Where Modernism has made its inroads, many pastors and congregations feel they have accomplished something really great when they have excluded from their midst God's messenger and prophet. If they could only see the nature of this ingratitude, they would see that they knew not the things that pertain to their peace and now they will soon be hidden from them and their children forever. Poor Amaziah, Jeroboam and Israel were destroyed by a famine of hearing the Word. We are in this day—the day of a famine of hearing the Word from the pulpit and a famine of hearing the Word in the pew.

Of course, this antagonism centers toward the person of the Holy Ghost. Surely, in many areas, He is not finding the room in so many pulpits and pews that He needs to find if sin is destroyed, the church saved from worldliness, and if genuine cases of regeneration and sanctification are wrought in those dead in sin and trespasses.

A close adherence to God's Word and giving room to a Spirit-filled ministry as well as to the gracious operation of the Holy Ghost will enable us to labor certainly. In so doing we shall both save ourselves and those that hear us.

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." I Cor. 15:58

REPORT NO. 12

SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

In I Corinthians 16:9 we read, "A great door and effectual is opened unto me, and there are many adversaries." One cannot consider conditions of our times without recognizing that many doors are open to the church today, but with more careful consideration, I am sure we all agree that there is no open door today which is of greater importance or which offers greater possibilities than the door of Christian Education.

Christian Education, in the broader sense, is not limited to any one field or age group. It must begin with the earlier years of elementary schooling and extend throughout the years of college training. In past years, a student could finish high school in the public school and enter Bible College with great possibilities, but no longer is this generally true. The influence of the government supported schools today has such an influence upon our youth that very few of these graduates have any desire to enter fields of Christian education, and the few who do, find that the change is so drastic that adjustments are very difficult and many times impossible.

In this report I do not desire to magnify the many advantages of education. I feel that many times we have laid down our armor and turned in retreat because of the many opposing forces which we must face. We all realize that a well organized army is marshalled against any effort which is made for Christian education. The Bible presents, however, a Christ Who is greater than all world-forces and Whose very heart is in this phase of the work of His Kingdom. This is God's work and it is He Who gives the victories.

Let us consider several encouraging facts relative to this subject. First, we observe today that the church is receiving an enlarged vision which has been desperately needed for years. The Bible teaches that "where there is no vision the people perish." For many years our vision has been retarded. We have neglected, or in some cases, refused to see the destruction which comes to our youth because of certain influences. In the elementary and high school the influence of non-spiritual and even godless leaders, the association with other children from non-spiritual homes, the teaching of material from textbooks which contradict the principles of true Christianity, and the social and worldly demands which many times outweigh the teaching received in the home and church. In years of college training our young people are faced with atheistic, communistic and evolutionary teaching which continually attacks their faith. The highly organized social program of our colleges which is encouraged by presenting a bathing beauty in the school annual, a queen who rides on the float at the head of the parade, and a sports program which emphasizes the worldly and secular at the expense of the spiritual, all gender pride and sensuality in the lives of our young people and turn them entirely away from the New Testament teaching of separation, self-denial and personal sacrifice. Many young people have perished and more are perishing because of this serious lack of vision.

We do praise God, however, that eyes are being opened. This is evidenced in many ways. The beginning of new schools is an encouraging evidence of new vision which is now possessing the people. We are happy to report good possibilities for the newly organized school in the Indiana District, but this is only the beginning. We must have new schools in every district, and several in the widely scattered areas. These schools must be so located that every parent will have access to a place of Christian education, where the children of every home may be sent upon entering the first grade and thus be protected from many destructive influences. We cannot send small children away from home as boarding students. We must provide such schools in every locality.

In the second place, this new vision is seen in the fact that many parents are moving into new localities where Christian schools are available. Even though the parents have good jobs and comfortable living, many fathers and mothers are leaving these advantages and comforts of life and are moving to communities which provide for their children the advantage of a Christian education. Many such parents are moving at what the world would call unreasonable sacrifice; but is this sacrifice? What will money, homes and comfort mean to any parent if their children are

lost? The advantages of Christian education are worth far more than all we would give up to attain them.

Finally, this extended vision is seen in the increased interest in financial giving. Churches, parents and other individuals now are beginning to realize that if we are to save our children, our homes and our churches, we must act at once in this field of education. The beginning of a new school should not reduce the financial support of other schools but rather should increase it, as more people are awakened, and more interest is stirred, the giving will increase until those schools now organized will receive more support, and newly organized schools will receive the interest and financial backing necessary to carry on the operation in this phase of God's work.

In closing, let me quote from C. C. Morrison, former editor of *Christian Century*, who said, "Public education without religion, creates a secular mentality faster than the church can Christianize it." In view of this proven fact, let us pray, sacrifice and give for the cause of education.

CHILD EVANGELISM SECRETARY

II Timothy 3:1 and 2 says: "This know also that in the last days perilous times shall come.

For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy."

Every true Christian knows that we are living in the Last Days, that the perilous times have arrived, and the generation of youth we're facing is the one described above—disobedient, unthankful, unholy. It's one of the main characteristics of the times. It's not mere personal opinion or prejudice or even black pessimism, but facts are facts, and sad to say, many are cold-blooded facts. Police records, riots, crimes, immorality, dope, and drunkenness—these are some of the things with which this generation of youth is charged.

I wish I had a better report to bring, and am certainly not trying to underestimate or undermine the great number of children and young people who are trying to live fine, upright lives—God's richest blessings upon them, but in trying to search for some up-to-date, firsthand information on the general trend of the youth of today, the picture looks very dark; not only dark, but alarming. Quoting from an article in the April, 1962 issue of the *McCall's Magazine*, "When Youth Runs Wild". A disturbing report on the growing teen-age riots by Samuel Grafton:

"At this Easter Season, not all Young People are gathering in church. Crowds of them are converging on the popular resorts in every region of the country, for try-anything frolics that often end in the vulgarity and viciousness of Youth Riots. A phenomenon of our times. Surprisingly, they will be boys and girls you know. Isn't it time we stopped saying 'Kids will be Kids'.

"There's something mean about those kids,' is the wondering phrase often used by spectators, which almost caused them to doubt what they were seeing." Their actions were so terrible.

Another article, "Kick" Drugs—Growing Teen-age Menace written by Thomas J. Dodd, United States Senator from Connecticut, tells of the teen-agers caught in the dope habit.

These are authentic facts gleaned not from religious writers and magazines, but from writers for the secular papers and magazines. If the worldly people are alarmed, how much more should the church be?

Police authorities put most of the blame, not on the youth, but on the lack of parental discipline.

Quoting again from the article in McCall's:

"This is the generation of parents that has been raising its children in agonized fear, under the (totally false) idea that to discipline a child will mess him up psychologically and turn him into a Jack the Ripper or at least a tensed-up neurotic.

"If you let a child grow up without discipline—often they hate the parents who let them get away with anything."

This generation of youth is a challenge to the church. In view of all these discouraging facts the evangelism of the children and young people is their only hope. Christ is the answer!

The men of the world who apparently are alarmed at the rapid rise of juvenile delinquency may have some good suggestions to help improve certain conditions, but they cannot reach the root of the trouble which is the Sin principle in their young hearts. They may be able to reform to a certain degree, but only the Blood of Christ can transform and make new creatures out of them.

What we need in these closing days of time are real intercessors who will, weep between the porch and the altar or we will be charged with a lost generation of children and young people when we stand at the Judgment.

Not all the churches reported to me on their Children's Work, but most of them that did, indicated that they were interested in the children, and were conducting various services in their behalf.

BURIAL ASSOCIATION SECRETARY

In 1929, in response to the widespread need for a plan by which the church could give financial aid to Wesleyan Methodist homes stricken by the death of a loved one, the Wesleyan Burial Association was organized. Its worth was quickly recognized and applications for membership were received from all parts of the denomination. The Association's membership is approximately 2,000 persons, representing every Conference. It operates as a recognized and approved part of the general program of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

Its membership is open to all members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, their husbands, wives and minor children. The entrance fees:

are as follows: Six months to 20 years, \$1.00; 20 to 30 years, \$2.00; 30 to 40 years, \$5.00; 40 to 45 years, \$10.00; 45 to 50 years \$25.00; 50 to 55 years, \$50.00; 55 to 60 years, \$75.00. Upon the death of a member of this Association an assessment of .20 shall be levied upon each member. A notice is sent out each time five deaths have occurred. Benefits now being paid are \$300.00.

With sixty-one churches reporting we show a Conference membership of 131. For other information write the Conference Burial Association Secretary.

REPORT NO. 15

TITHING SECRETARY'S REPORT

The "Tithe" is one-tenth of all that with which God has prospered us. It is the least that a Christian can give and still have God's blessing upon his life. Often we stress financial obligation to the church as the main reason for tithing, but it is relatively unimportant when compared to our debt of love. God gave the best He had to save our lost soul. Heaven was robbed of its most precious jewel when Jesus came to earth. How can we claim to love God if we are stingy. We can never repay our Saviour for what He has done in our behalf. When we love Him as we should, giving will not be limited by a tenth, but using this as a starting point, it will extend to the capacity of our resources.

The words of the Master remind us that "a good man out of the good treasure of his heart bringeth forth that which is good; and an evil man out of the evil treasure of his heart bringeth forth that which is evil: . . ." (Luke 6:45) Therefore, we may conclude that actions are a fair indication of what is in the heart. If the Love of God fills us, giving will be a delight. If the lust of the world abides, giving will be a grievous chore. Here is your thermometer. Take your temperature. What is it that fills your heart?

Giving not only reveals love, but it puts faithfulness on display. We don't give to be seen; however, the faithful tither is soon identified by the unsaved. They know that salvation is considered valuable by anyone who continually gives of his substance to support God's work. Sinners are watching. How can we convince them salvation is the most valuable thing in the world when we fail to give all we can to spread the message to others? When others see God's children being faithful in this matter, they begin to believe we mean what we say.

Sometimes our testimony is as that of the auctioneer who describes the value and beauty of an object and then accepts a trifling amount for it. No one believes he meant it in the first place. Could this be the reason some folks' loved ones are not interested in hearing more about Jesus Christ?

Much more could be said concerning the effects of our faithful giving on others, but since the primary thought in this report is our relationship to God,—remember—in spite of all we say and do, the amount we put

in the offering plate tells what we really think of God. Allow us to close with the words of Lyle Prescott:

God gave His Son, an Offering
To men who were lost in sin;
God poured out His riches
To men who were far from Him.
Christ, the wealth of heaven,
By men was vilely slain;
But never did the Father
Report His Gift was in vain.
And only have we and our nation
The gospel that calmed our strife
Because unselfish missionaries
Gave both their money and life!

Lord, take more than my money;
Take my heart, my life, my all.
And, Lord, if I may serve Thee,
Here am I, awaiting Thy call!

Our Brother and Sister gave us faithful service during the years that they served and saved the Association many a dollar. We cannot blame them for leaving this place of responsibility, as our Brother and Sister felt the need of having more time for the work that the Lord has called them to do, and also that they might have more time to be in the services and business meetings of the Conference, and that they might have part in all of the services of the Youth Convention and Camp Meeting as well.

Our new Superintendent is a layman, and member of our Wesleyan Church in Sagamore, Pa. His name is James Feracioly. He believes that God wants him in this kind of service, therefore he has made considerable sacrifice in arranging the work that he follows to make a living for his family, so that he can be free to serve us in the dining hall when he is needed.

REPORT NO. 25

RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTIONS: Your Committee on Resolutions submits the following report: **BE IT RESOLVED:**

1. That since the tendency of our times is towards indistinct lines as pertains to doctrine and compromise as pertains to practice, we as a Conference, by adopting this report, re-affirm our position to adhere to the general and special rules of our Discipline as interpreted by Allegheny Conference.

2. That we re-affirm our love and our loyalty to our beloved denomination by praying for its leaders; and that we resolve to express our appreciation for the officials of our Conference and the standards which they maintain by faithfully praying for them and earnestly following their example.

3. That since our conference sustains tremendous losses among our youth from our Sunday Schools and Churches, we therefore urge our pastors to encourage the Youth of our Churches to attend the Annual Youth Conference, District Youth Rallies and Stoneboro Camp Meeting, and that every effort be put forth to lead them into a definite experience of salvation and when deemed advisable to unite with the Church. Be it further resolved that we refrain from any compromise of our standards or introduction of social programs into our churches, which only lead to superficial loyalties, spiritual decline, and discouragement of the spiritual laity.

4. That since divorce is one of the great curses of our land, a corruption of the morals of our youth, a destroyer of our homes, and a violation of God's law, we therefore urge our pastors to prayerfully and tenderly warn our people, young and old, of this popular evil and its consequences.

5. That we go on record as being unalterably opposed to any affiliation whatsoever with the National Council of Churches or any of its departments. That we maintain our guard against the modernistic bias reflected in the Revised Standard Version of the Bible and the "Interpreter's Bible" which have been produced under the auspices of the National Council of Churches.

6. That since we recognize the religious motion picture to be an evil and not to be consistent with the divine plan for the presentation and

propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and since we recognize the use of plays and other entertaining diversions as substitutes for Holy Spirit anointed presentation of truth, we therefore urge our pastors and churches to refrain from using such in the Churches of the Conference.

7. That we urge our ministers and laymen to maintain the family altar as a spiritual institution in our homes, to practice the grace of systematic fasting and give themselves to intercessory prayer.

8. Since our Conference boundaries include areas of shifting population, we recommend that our pastors keep each other informed of those, who move from area to area who attend our Sunday Schools and Churches.

9. That since we recognize Communism to be a subtle, godless influence, and that the present trends to a welfare state are opening wedges to supplant our democratic way of life—be it resolved:

a. That our ministers and church leaders warn our people through the preached Word and the printed page of the subtle approach, satanic origin, and destructive results of this political philosophy.

b. That we recognize our solemn obligation to pray for the President of our Nation and the committees of Congress who are engaged in exposing and opposing Communistic infiltration into our American system, and further, that God will grant them wisdom and courage to fight this evil.

c. That the Conference Secretary convey in writing this resolution to the House Un-American Activities Committee, Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, the Senators and Representatives of the States within our bounds; and further that he express our appreciation for their labors in exposing and opposing the Communistic infiltration into our American system.

10. Whereas we recognize the continued advancement of the Roman Catholic system in numerical strength and political power in our nation, school systems and local governments and that since we recognize this constitutes a menace to free government, freedom of worship, and conscience if it should gain a majority position, be it therefore resolved:

a. That we instruct our Conference Secretary to write to the Senators and Representatives of the States and congressional districts within the bounds of our conference concerning the above mentioned sentiments in regard to this danger.

b. That the ministry of the Conference instruct the people in our Sunday Schools and churches concerning the prevalent practices and teachings of the Roman Church, relative to civil government.

c. That we instruct our people in the teachings and practices as advanced by the Roman Church concerning marriage.

11. That we recognize crime comic books and pulp magazines, which depict violence, sadism, brutality, and blood lust unparelled in the history of children's literature of any time or nation, to be a contributing factor to the present delinquency problem. We therefore urge our people to war against this evil wherever practicable by withholding patronage from those engaged in the distribution of these tools of Satan and by reproving and rebuking them with Christian love.

12. That we declare ourselves as supporting the reading of the Holy Scriptures in the public schools and that we urge our ministers and

parents to seek by all ethical means to improve the moral character of our youth through the boards of education, offices of superintendent, principal, faculty, and Parent-Teacher Associations. And be it further resolved: that we endeavor to arouse our constituency to support, by prayer and other methods, Christian day schools which adhere to Bible principles.

13. That we continue to register our opposition to Federal Aid to education both in the parochial and public areas and that we urge all of our people to make this opposition known to our Senators and Representatives and other officials who may have to do with the determination of this issue.

14. That we register our protest as opposing the proposed King-Anderson Bill pertaining to medical care for the aged under Social Security, believing that its passage would be another step toward a social-welfare state. We therefore recommend that this body instruct the secretary of the conference to register our protest in writing to the Senators and Representatives of the States and congressional districts within the bounds of our Conference and further that our people register their individual protests likewise.

15. That these resolutions together with the standing resolutions be read on each charge at the first quarterly meeting following the distribution of the Conference Minutes.

REPORT NO. 28

BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CONFERENCE

The Board of Education for Parochial Schools within the boundaries of the Conference submits the following report:

Schools have bid fair to replace the weather as everybody's daily subject of conversation, and to press further Mark Twain's quip, nobody is doing anything about either of them. To be sure, the quip, like all such remarks, overstates the case in both instances. People are doing all sorts of things to protect their children and themselves from the gigantic government school systems now gripping the United States.

Since parents, Christian parents, are confronted with grave problems relating to the education of their children, Christian Schools are being organized throughout the nation. It is God's intention that the parent, and not the state, is to have the full responsibility of the child's education. Under the present state-operated program, that authority and responsibility has been delegated to the state. The parent is losing control of the education of his child, and as the jointure program continues to develop larger educational units, more control will be wrested from the parent and invested in the state. There was a time when the parents within a community controlled the choice of teachers and texts for their children's instruction, but under the present system of public education, this has largely passed from local control to state control. As a consequence the child is subjected to anti-Christian indoctrination.

Within the public school structure, the child is thrust into an environment and atmosphere, intellectually as well as morally, utterly hostile to the environment and atmosphere of the Christian home and church. The teaching he receives is often contradictory and biased—socialistically inclined, and presented by unbelievers. For 180 days, six hours a day, the child is subject to a philosophy, to a teaching, and to an example, for the most part, from non-Christians. In no other area

of development, do we place a child in such jeopardy as we do in the field of education. By all means at our disposal, we guard carefully his physical well being by proper diet, sufficient attire to clothe his body, and proper health habits. We do not mix poison with his food to acquaint him with poison. We have better sense. We guard zealously his morals by influencing his choice of companions, choices of recreation, both as to places he seeks it and the kind he seeks. We do not turn him over to the theater operator or the tavern keeper to teach him to utilize his spare time properly, but we surround him with a wholesome atmosphere and proper companionship. Yet, when it comes to the mental development of our children, we permit anyone to teach them. It must be remembered that it is impossible to teach without respect to religion. Somehow some reference must be made relative to God, to Jesus Christ, and to the church. After all, education is the conveyance of Truth and how can one properly teach truth without reference to the TRUTH. If we were to subject the bodies and morals of our children to the same influences in degree as unwholesome as we do the child for his mental training, what kind of a parent would we be judged by society? It must be remembered that the mind is the battle ground of the soul.

Thus it behooves us to make proper preparations for the education of our children. The question has always been asked, "What can we do about the situation?" The answer is simply, begin Christian Schools within the boundaries of the Conference. We should lay the foundation by beginning in the elementary field and extending into the secondary as rapidly as possible. The cost appears small when we realize that the future of the church and the souls of our children are at stake. Size of a school is no problem. Any church anywhere or any group of churches can have its own school. There is no magic in numbers. The feasibility of church-operated schools has been demonstrated by the rapid increase in these schools during the fifteen-year period, 1945 to 1960. Protestant enrollment in Christian Schools has increased 600%. Approximately 16% of the elementary children attending school are now in private schools and approximately 12% of the children on the secondary level attend private schools.

The key to the whole matter is a conviction that teaching cannot be separated from religion. The fact is, there is serious doubt that education can be education in the proper sense, unless such education leads a man to God. After all, to teach, something must be taught about God and Jesus Christ. The parent ought to have in his vicinity, institutions of learning to which he can feel free to send his child with the assurance that his teaching will be consistent with the teachings of the Christian home and the church. It is a Christian tenet that parents have the sole responsibility for the training of their children and not the state. May the time come, and that quickly, too, when Christian schools shall have been established over the whole Conference.

The Board submits the following recommendations:

1—That the Nominating Committee bring nominations for this board before the Conference. Terms of office to be set up on a staggered basis. The Board to consist of four elders elected for four-year terms, and three laymen elected for three-year terms.

2. That the Conference adopt the following resolution—"Be it resolved that the Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc. authorize the establishment of the Indiana Wesleyan School, to be located in facilities in Dixonville, Pennsylvania, and such school to operate under the authority and supervision of the Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc.; a corporation in the state of Pennsylvania with headquarters at Titusville, Pennsylvania."

REPORT NO. 2

WMS PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1961-1962

Ezekiel 22:30—"And I sought for a man among them, that should

That was many centuries ago when God was forced to pour out judgment and wrath upon a wicked, rebellious, God-rejecting people. Read this account in His Holy Word, scan records in history of all kinds, study conditions in present-day life and you will discover that every time, everywhere and in every age God will punish the wicked unless someone prays, someone makes up the hedge and stands in the gap with open eyes, a burdened soul and a God-given, consuming love for lost humanity and a righteous Holy God, pleading with Him to turn His wrath to mercy and the sinners' hardened hearts to broken, repentant seekers of God's grace.

Today, more than ever, God needs hedge makers to stand in the gap and hold back Hell fire and judgment from a rebellious, though very religious and civilized America, as well as to stand in the gap to bring benighted heathen souls to the light of the glorious gospel of true holiness that America is rapidly spurning and defying.

Who knows, Sisters, but that this man may be or can be you or me if we will pay the price to intercede and get hold of the horns of the altar. At any rate we can all do our part at our little hedge or corner and God will surely hear and answer honest, earnest prayer. Let us today, at this Conference, determine anew that we will make up the hedge and stand in the gap for God and souls as never before.

ACTIVITIES

Though the activities of the past year were more numerous and required more time than usual, yet there is not so much to report as there should be, for the Master Whom we are serving is deserving of so much more than we can ever do for Him and the need of lost souls is greater and heavier every year that we live. God grant that we shall not fail in vision, prayer and labors of love to rescue precious lost souls for the King of kings.

CONVENTION—The Eastern Area Convention of which we are a part convened August 1 to 3, 1961, at Wesley Grove Camp Ground, Yardville, New Jersey. Rev. and Mrs. C. A. Blair and Rev. and Mrs. T. W. Comadoll attended as our representatives. It was a wonderful help to have these men go with their wives as they received help and inspiration as well as insight into the work in perhaps even a greater degree than did the ladies for men are more alert to business, etc., than we women usually are and it was new to them. We are sorry that it is really too late to have them report to this session as the news is nearly a year old. Brother and Sister Blair gave good reports at Camp but so many missionaries arrived and the schedule was so full that Brother and Sister Comadoll never got to give their reports, to our regret, as Brother Comadoll especially was surely anxious to give his.

STONEBORO CAMP—Our Stoneboro Camp services were good and well attended especially as the missionaries began to come in. Rev. Leroy

Rattling Leaf from Brainerd spoke to us; also Rev. and Mrs. Ward French from All Tribes Indian School. Prof. David Budensiek gave us an excellent, awakening talk on Communism Saturday afternoon. Pastor Sedu Mans from Africa brought a good message and Rev. and Mrs. Henry Ortlip arrived in time to speak at the last service about Haiti. Rev. Jehart Hanson from India was our public service speaker and Mrs. Hanson gave an excellent talk in one of the afternoon services.

MISSIONARY TOURS—Rev. Levi Troyer from La Gonave, Haiti, made the fall missionary tour beginning September 17 to December 10 and December 16 with November 21-25 off for Thanksgiving. Sister Troyer and the family accompanied him a few times when close by, which was nice for all. Good reports were given of Rev. Troyer's visit to our churches both spiritually and financially.

Mrs. Irene Hanley gave the month of May to our Conference telling of her visit to Israel and her work among the Jewish people there. This message was a blessing to all who heard. Mrs. Hanley requested that we report the offerings given her during her tour to our Conference. They amounted to \$940.23, which she will use for her Jewish Evangelism work. For this help she was very grateful.

BRAINERD WORKERS—Miss Ellen Christy, our worker at Brainerd, secretary to Rev. William Gale, changed her name to Mrs. Harold Pinkerton. She plans to continue at Brainerd another year as Secretary to the new Superintendent, Rev. Robert Pelton.

Mr. and Mrs. Merle Rough are also returning to Brainerd after two years of faithful work there. Mr. Rough is now Assistant Superintendent of the School.

Another of our former Conference girls, with her husband, has been at Brainerd the past year, Mrs. Russell Dunn, the former Judy McCleary from Sarver.

Miss Ruth Stearns' health did not permit her to return to Brainerd last year, though her heart is still in the work there. Please remember her in special prayer for God is still able to raise her up according to His will.

MISSIONARIES RETURNING TO FIELDS OF LABOR—Rev. and Mrs. Henry Ortlip and family are returning to Haiti in August after a year's furlough and some language study in summer school next month.

Rev. and Mrs. W. N. Saunders are again to return to their beloved Africa the first part of July. They are leaving their grown daughters here in the States, which will not be an easy separation for them.

Rev. Levi Troyer is probably entering the field of Evangelism. If so, we hope also that he will be available for missionary conventions and special meetings. Perhaps Mrs. Troyer can be secured occasionally. Keep them busy. They will do you good.

DEATH—There has been one Home-going among our recently former WMS Presidents. Mrs. Catherine Nellis, formerly president of the Stewart Run WMS for several years, passed to her reward April 17, 1962, at an early age of 45 years.

SUPPORT OF MISSIONARIES—Several of our societies are supporting missionaries fully or partially:

Massillon supported Rev. Arthur Calhoon and Rev. Levi Troyer

(Haiti); Canal supported Mrs. Lydia Troyer (Haiti); Oak Grove partially supported Mrs. Arthur Calhoon (Haiti); Akron First supported Mrs. Lucille Day (Puerto Rico). Canal also supports the Merle Roughs; Falconer, Mrs. Gerow and Titusville, Ruth Stearns, all Brainerd workers. The Conference WMS paid the Field Support of Rev. and Mrs. Ferdinand Witthuhn the past year.

Next year Titusville will support Rev. K. M. Ridgway in New Guinea and Canal will pay Mrs. Jean Ridgway's Field Support in New Guinea.

We hope some societies will assume the Saunders' support as they return to Africa and the Orlips in Haiti if the Conference Wesleyan Youth do not continue their support.

Five societies are taking the support of a native worker in New Guinea for the coming year: Keepville, West Middlesex, Barberton, Franklin and Canal two of them.

The Conference YMWB is now assuming the support of the three Ridgway children instead of the Troyer children. The Ridgway children are Robert, Johnnie and Lael Marie. You will hear more about this later from our YMWB Superintendent.

PROJECTS—Other projects of the societies have been the raising of funds or the giving of material for the equipment necessary for the return of the Saunders to Africa and the Orlips to Haiti. The Saunders received \$1,159.82 and the Orlips received \$825.00. Both couples express sincere thanks to our societies for this help in getting their needs supplied for another term of service on their chosen fields.

FALL ITINERACY—Though we had Rev. and Mrs. Ferdinand Witthuhn engaged for our fall tour, we were notified just before Conference that they are staying three months longer because of the emergency furlough of Rev. McCandless. Consequently, we are left with no plans to report.

OFFICE WORK—As far as office work is concerned this has been the busiest year we have ever had. We put out 7 circular letters and 1 circular card to all the presidents, and 1 circular letter to 61 societies with other mail totaling 988 pieces.

In addition to the above reported regular correspondence and at the Conference's request, we printed 2,000 copies of the President's message in our office and distributed them at Stoneboro Camp. Because of the many requests we had an additional 1,000 copies published at Salem College and sold them by mail this spring, which made a lot of extra work at a busy time. However, we hope and pray that some good was done and that God's name was glorified by the truth presented. At least, we received some very sympathetic, encouraging letters with the orders.

STANDARD OF EFFICIENCY—Our Standard of Efficiency rating for the year 1961-62 is 81%; for the Quadrennium 86%.

CLOSE OF QUADRENNIUM—Since this closes our Quadrennium it brings upon us a sense of great responsibility and necessitates an inventory of our motives and desires as well as a report of our material accomplishments. We must admit that though we have done our best as far as we know we have fallen far short of achieving our goals and of doing what we would like to have done for our Master.

Our gains in finances is somewhat satisfactory but our loss in subscriptions and membership during the quadrennium is very disappointing. For some reason we are failing and scattering abroad instead of gathering in as we should. Surely, we can do better if we really pray and put our hearts into the Lord's work. These are discouraging days we know when the enemy presses in to the breaking point but the Saviour is still able to conquer every foe. So let us endeavor to do better by God's grace and help as we enter a new untried future.

We regret very deeply that we have no new society to report this year though we did contact several pioneer churches in hopes that they would organize. Again we will have to try a little harder and pray more fervently.

Above all, WMS Co-workers, let us covenant with the Lord that we will keep spiritual at any cost by obedience to His Word, by prayer and consistent living. Then we can keep clear before Him regardless of our external gains or losses. We are sure that an old-fashioned revival can solve all our problems and create a true missionary interest that no program, workshop, promotional effort or any other human effort can ever do.

GOALS FOR NEW YEAR—Let us make these purposes our goals for the coming year:

- 1—Fervent, frequent prayer for all our missionaries, especially for our own Conference missionaries;
- 2—Faithfulness to all our obligations, Conference and Denominational, as unto the Lord and not unto men;
- 3—Promotion of all spiritual means toward missionary interests; such as, the Reading Course, the Study Book, Prayer Partners, Woman's World Fellowship, the reading of and subscribing to the Wesleyan Missionary, etc., as much as we are able;
- 4—The maintenance of our own private devotional life in order that we may live consistent Christian lives, be victors over self and sin, carry a burden for the lost and dying at home and abroad and keep ready for the soon return of our Heavenly Bridegroom.

REPORT NO. 3**COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK**

We Recommend:

1. That the first meeting after Conference each local society hold an installation service at which time the duties of each officer are read. (Note: New officers to assume duties first meeting after Conference. Re-

fer to Wesleyan Methodist Discipline, Paragraph 301, 302).

2. That the Program and Plan of Work, as revised at Conference, be read and discussed at an early meeting, and frequently referred to thereafter.

3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly meeting, praying for those requests found in the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY and that stress be placed upon personal evangelism. That each member feel a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

b. That each district during the year observe one missionary service.

4. a. That we urge our societies to promote the Women's World Fellowship by meeting in two's and three's as convenient each Tuesday morning to pray for women around the world.

b. That a service early in the conference year be given to the local WWF Secretary for enlisting prayer partners and encouraging prayer. Reports to be sent by September 30 to Conference WWF Secretary, Mrs. Mary Huntsman, 1220 Second Street, Brownsville, Pa.

c. Since we are requested by the General WWF Secretary to have a monthly prayer and fast service, we urge that all societies refrain from having meals at any missionary service since it does not become the interest of missions to be feasting when we should be praying.

5. a. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, whose duty it shall be to report all subscriptions to the district solicitor, send a quarterly report to the conference solicitor, Mrs. Erla Hoobler, R. D. 1, Hadley, Pa., and strive to place the magazine in each home of the church and Sunday School. If possible, each society send at least one gift subscription to some interested family.

b. When sending in subscriptions always be sure to identify your church by its number and conference letter, AL, as published in the Conference Minutes.

6. a. That all society officers and delegates to Annual Conference be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We also recommend that Conference Society Members be members of the Wesleyan Church and their local Wesleyan Missionary Society.

b. That each local society have a nominating committee if possible.

c. That each society send the retiring president to conference and elect the incoming president or an officer as delegate, assuming the expense for transportation.

d. That each society instruct the delegate the amount to pledge at the public missionary service.

7. a. That each society use the designated study book, the WMS Handbook, and other helps, and encourage members to follow the Mission Study Course as recommended by General Conference. All literature to be obtained from the Wesley Press, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana.

b. That each society have a program committee of which the president is chairman.

8. That each society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the Extension Program of the Church. NOTE: All money for Card Call, send to Church Extension and Evangelism Department, Rev. V. A. Mitchell, Secretary, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana. NOTE: Send

all stubs with statistical report to Mrs. Elma Patterson, 17 6th Avenue, Greenville, Pa.

9. That inasmuch as the American Bible Society prints our Bible Transcripts without charge, we support it with prayer and finance. This can be sent through regular treasurers.

10. a. That, where possible, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers or greeting cards to shut-ins.

b. That we encourage the giving of special memorial gifts as recommended by General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.

11. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or bring about a 10 per cent gain in membership.

12. That we follow the Denominational Monthly Emphasis:—June—Installation of officers; September—Membership; October—Education; November—American Bible Society; December—White Christmas; January—Subscription; February—Women's World Fellowship; March—Personal Evangelism; April—Self-Denial.

REPORTS

13. That the delegate's credentials be sent at least two weeks before conference to the Conference Wesleyan Missionary Secretary, Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, R. D. 1, Utica, Pa.

14. That Statistical Blanks be sent to Mrs. Elma Patterson, 17 6th Avenue, Greenville, Pa., at least by May 15th. Send an itemized list with vouchers for "Local Church Work", also, send an itemized list with vouchers for "Other Objects".

15. a. That the Local Missionary Treasurer send money for both individual and society pledges made at Conference and Camp through the church treasurer and sub-treasurer. Designate on pink report blank who paid and for what project.

b. That local missionary treasurers keep a record of all money paid in pledges and report the amount on each pledge, at least two weeks before Conference to the Conference WMS Treasurer, Mrs. Edith Christy, 225 Brook Street, Titusville, Pa.

16. That the report of the Mission Study Secretary be sent by January 15th to Mrs. Muriel Terpe, R. D. 4, Mercer, Pa., Conference Secretary of the Mission Study Course.

FINANCIAL

17. That \$1.00 dues be paid by all members, active and honorary. That said dues be sent undivided through the local church treasurer to the sub-treasurer. All monies to be sent in at least quarterly.

18. That we endeavor to raise one-quarter of the church education budget. This is to include the L. S. U. Pledges.

19. That each society contribute \$5.00 or more annually for the sup-

port of Hephzibah Home, the same to be applied on budget.

20. That each society contribute \$3.00 or more annually to the Medical Fund. This not to apply on budget.

21. That each society contribute at least \$5.00 for General Church Extension and Evangelism. This is a budget item.

22. That \$40 for each active member for Conference entertainment be sent to the Sub-treasurer before the books close, April 30th. An extra donation of canned fruits and vegetables or cash will be much appreciated and needed.

23. That each society send \$.50 per active member for Conference WMS Working Fund, which includes \$.10 per active member for the Conference Missionary Cottage upkeep. This is not a budget item. (Southern W. Va. District exempted from the missionary cottage upkeep.)

24. That each society give the delegate an appropriate amount of money for the purchasing of literature for the society and for small offerings taken during conference.

3. a. That we be faithful in attending our missionary services, and not by indifference hinder our missionary work at home and abroad.

b. That we strive to obtain all of our men as honorary members.

4. That we give ourselves to prayerful study of the "Wesleyan Missionary" and other helpful material, and that we do our best to interest our people in getting the "Wesleyan Missionary" into other homes and institutions.

5. That we adhere strictly to Scriptural methods:

a. In raising funds for missions, by sacrificial giving. "Freely ye have received, freely give." Matt. 10:8

b. In our programs by abstaining from the use of movies, slides, skits and plays.

6. a. That we diligently strive to maintain firm, loving discipline in our homes; because we believe with Catherine Booth that "the secret of lawlessness both toward God and man is that children were never taught to submit to the authority of their parents" Prov. 22:6; Eph. 6:4.

b. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes.

c. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part. That we, as parents, faithfully instruct our children concerning the plan of salvation, urging them to obtain a definite personal experience, knowing that this will create in them the desire to follow Bible standards. Deut. 6:5-9

d. That we encourage our children to use their own Bible, and have a regular system of reading and of memorizing Scripture in the home. Psalm 119:11

e. That we pray faithfully for our children in school, that they may reject all erroneous teachings presented, and be careful in choosing their friends and associates. That we urge parents to take a firm stand against the immodest dress and other evil practices of the modern athletic and music program.

7. a. That we abstain from all worldly amusements, including the theater, both private and public, the dance, cards, unwholesome radio programs, etc. That we abstain from reading or allowing our children to read comic books and other unwholesome magazines and books, and that we provide wholesome literature for our children.

b. That since modern mixed bathing is conducive to loose morals, we urge parents to refrain from social visiting or permitting their children to visit such places of sinful amusement.

c. That we abstain from all Sabbath desecration such as buying Sunday newspapers, pleasure riding, visiting, reunions, buying, etc. Isaiah 58:13, 14. Also that we refrain from patronizing establishments open on the Sabbath Day.

d. That we urge our people to refrain, where it is in their power, from having television sets in the home; realizing that television has a degrading influence, a tendency to make the soul lean, and the potential danger of sending souls to hell, both young and old.

8. a. That we who are mothers tell our children the true story of life as soon as they begin to ask questions. Also be sure to instruct them in the care of their bodies before they start to school in order that they may hold these truths sacred, and be prepared to withstand the low moral standards of this day.

b. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholesome recreation frequently, and as far as possible know where they are and what they are doing at all times. Also, that mothers carefully select their "baby-sitters" since there is so much immorality prevalent today.

9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses half-way between the knee and ankle, both standing and sitting, with long sleeves and modest neckline, which things accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Tim. 2:-9, 10. Also, that we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "The woman shall not wear

that which pertaineth unto a man—for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God.”

b. That we refrain from wearing all jewelry, which includes brooches, showy watch bands, and all other ornaments such as sparkling buttons and sequins. Isa. 3; I Pet. 3:3, 4. Also, that we do not wear very sheer or nude shades of hose, shoes with open toes and heels or spike heels, or hats which display flowers, veiling, and other superfluous adornments. Furthermore, we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly in the home, that we may be examples of modesty to those who approach our doors.

c. That we also refrain from the worldly style of the “Long bob,” and cutting, trimming, and curling the hair. I Cor. 11:15. We believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Tim. 2:9, that “Broidered hair” means curled hair.

d. That we also dress our boys and girls modestly, thus teaching them early the necessity of modesty in dress. Not permitting our boys to go without shirts, to wear shorts or sheer shirts, and that our girls wear long hose and not be allowed to wear sheer clothing, shorts or slacks.

10. That we urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and the neglecting of long standing bills. “Owe no man anything.” Rom. 13:8

11. a. That as far as possible, we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also that we oppose the use of tobacco in all its forms since we greatly detest the use and effect of both. II Cor. 7:1

b. We urge that our children be given scientific instruction on the evils of tobacco, alcohol, and all narcotic drugs.

c. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing national holidays, thereby honoring God Who gives us freedom and liberty.

12. That resolutions be read in each society semi-annually.

CONVENTION MINUTES

First Day — July 13, 1962

The 31st annual Youth Convention of the Allegheny Conference con-

vened on Stoneboro Camp Ground with the first service on July 12, 1962. At this service the appointments for temporary organization were read. The first business meeting was held on July 13, 1962, and was called to order by Rev. P. D. Stonebraker. Rev. Donald Boyd led in singing "Take My Life". Prayer was led by Rev. James Hogg and Rev. Sheridan Rainey. Roll was called with 77 delegates present, 23 pastors and 24 youth presidents.

The Bar of Conference was set as the first 12 rows of the center and right hand tier of seats, and the platform. Our General WY Secretary, Robert W. McIntire, was accorded an honorary seat within the bar of Conference. The President's report was given and accepted as read. The Treasurer's report was read and referred to the Committee of Auditing and Finance. The Auditor's report was read and adopted. Report of Prayer League Secretary read and accepted. The minutes were read. The meeting was adjourned by vote.

Second Day — July 14, 1962

The second business meeting was called to order by President Stonebraker. Rev. Donald Boyd led in singing "Send the Fire", prayer was led by Rev. Charles Baker. Roll was called with 88 delegates, 30 pastors, 31 youth presidents present.

Balloting ensued. Tellers were, 1st team, Tom Shuttlesworth, John Hoiem, Edwin Manners, Howard Mahood; 2nd team, Dean McIntire, Harold Blair, Larry Uber, Bud Hannold. Partial report of the nominating committee read. Name of Rev. P. D. Stonebraker submitted for president. Balloting for President ensued. Efficiency Standard Committee report was read and accepted with its three recommendations. Recommendation No. 1 was amended to read: Have you contributed to the welfare of the local W. Y.? The ballot for president resulted in the election of P. D. Stonebraker with 149 votes out of 152. Partial report of nominating committee read. Names of Prewitt Duncan, Wm. Cornell submitted for Vice President. Balloting for Vice President ensued. Report of Committee on Resolutions was read and adopted. Report of Statistical Committee read and adopted. The ballot for Vice President resulted in the election of Prewitt Duncan with 105 votes out of 157. Partial report of Nominating committee read. Names of Sheridan Rainey, David Phelps submitted for Secretary. Balloting for secretary ensued. Report of the Committee on Goals and Methods read and adopted. The ballot for secretary resulted in the election of David Phelps with 122 votes out of 149. Partial report of nominating committee for treasurer read. Names of Wm. Rosengreen and Wm. Cornell submitted. Balloting for treasurer ensued. Recessed for dedication of Girls' Dorm and presentation of Bro. and Sis. Van Wormer's cottage.

Resumed business meeting at 2:40. No election for treasurer. Balloting for treasurer ensued again. Nominations for Zone Chairman read and adopted. Youth activity of Bible memorization was presented and discussed. The ballot for treasurer resulted in the election of Wm. Rosengreen with 78 out of 135 votes cast. Balloting for delegates to General Conference ensued. Request from chair for permission to appoint a three-person president's Advisory committee to work with the President and

Executive Council at such times as necessitates their help and advice. This was voted on in the affirmative. The three persons selected are: H. E. Robertson, Jr., Elwood Hannold, Mark Larson. Rev. C. L. Boston was nominated and elected as Prayer League Secretary. Rev. James Beers was nominated and elected as Chairman of Efficiency Standard. The ballot for delegates to General Conference resulted in the election of Prewitt Duncan, David Phelps and Wm. Rosengreen. Balloting for alternate delegates to General Conference ensued. Zone chairmen gave informal reports on activities in their zones this past year. The ballot for alternate delegates to General Conference resulted in the elections of: 1st alternate, Wm. Cornell 124, 2nd alternate, Donald Boyd 112, 3rd alternate, C. L. Boston 110. Minutes were read and accepted. A motion was made and carried that all unfinished business be left in the hands of the Executive Committee. Motion made and carried to adjourn.

THE WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Thirty-first Annual Youth Convention now convening at

Stoneboro, Pennsylvania, July 12-15, 1962:

To every pastor, youth president and delegate in this representative assembly, we greet you in the Wonderful Name of Jesus.

Once again, in God's permissive will, it is our privilege to meet on this sacred "hill top" where many Allegheny Conference youth have settled important spiritual matters and marked the paths of their eternal destinies.

On this "hill top" many young people have been saved from a life of sin, others reclaimed and still others sanctified. On this "hill top" some have had a clarified call to the ministry while others, having heard the call of the heathen, have responded to the missionary challenge. These naturally have memorialized this place because of their obedience to God's will while others will regret forever the deliberate wrong decisions they made on this "hill top." May God therefore, grant a convicting, reviving spirit of heart-obedience among all our fine young people here assembled. May you desire and settle for nothing less than a definiteness in regeneration and sanctification. May you seek earnestly until your life is transformed and your steps are turned toward Heaven.

We are meeting on this "hill top" at a time and in a manner diverse from most other youth gatherings of this day. Our gathering, I trust, is with a holy purpose, many of their's are unholy. For the most part those young people will return from such camps more conditioned for the world and for sin because of their attendance. Surely

How thankful, then, we can be for this Youth Convention and the spirit and the purpose of our gathering. Our purposes are clear! Our business is eternal and "woe" will be upon us if we fail. Yea, guilt and the blood of others will be upon our hands if we fail in directing our youth aright.

2. December 27-29, 1961—Together with the Conference Youth Vice President, Rev. Herb Robertson, I attended the National Youth Convention at Louisville, Kentucky.

III. Executive Council Meetings:

1. August 22, 1961—Met at the Stoneboro Wesleyan Youth office.
2. January 24, 1962—Met at the Conference President's office, Titusville, Pa. to summarize plans for this Youth Convention.
3. April 5, 1962—Met at the Ministerial Institute, Sandy Lake, Pa.
4. June 15, 1962—Met at the Stoneboro Wesleyan Youth office.

IV. Personal Labors:

1. Mailed 165 pieces of mail plus 396 pieces sent out by Virginia Caryl.
2. Traveled approximately 3,712 miles in the interest of the Conference youth work.
3. Wrote seven "Youth Columns" for the Conference Messenger.
4. Prepared and tried to promote the "Theme Writing Project."

V. Accomplishments:

1. Several above the average Youth Week Revivals were reported across the Conference.
2. The Prayer League has been greatly revived this year to a new peak of personal participation on the local level.
3. Under the revised Efficiency Standard, a new interest has been generated and many more churches are participating.
4. The new girls' dorm is now completed, partially furnished and occupied, but not fully paid for.
5. The extra building project is now nearly completed and will be ready for presentation tomorrow.

VI. Recommendations:

I recommend the following:

1. That a new emphasis be placed on the importance of prayer and that each local become an active, organized Prayer League Society. I further urge that each praying young person becomes a member of the "Conference Brigade of Intercessory Commandos."
2. That each local group, together with their pastor, prayerfully strive for a Spirit-sent Youth Week Revival.
3. That you observe the N. A. E. motto, adopted and promoted by Wesleyan Youth, to "Read Your Bible Through in 62."
4. That you read the books of the "Wesleyan Youth Reading Course" which will be selected and commended by your Allegheny Conference Youth Executive Council.
5. That we strive for a 5% gain in youth membership this year and a goal of three newly-organized "locals."
6. That all, including pastors and youth presidents, strive to put

new life into the new "Youth Activity" when it is formally announced.

Item III: Evaluations:

Every church was contacted the first two quarters. Out of this initial

thrust there was a 30 percent participation (or better than 3 times last year) and a 48 percent co-operation (or almost 2 times last year).

The average yearly percentage is 75.6 percent. The greatest percentage of rise, over the quarterly record, was a 34 percent, and the greatest percentage of decline, over the same, was a 34 percent.

After checking the 9 check-areas one could not help but observe that the lowest percentages were consistently on (8) "co-operating with the W. Y. Prayer League", and (9) "memorization of one Bible verse per week". There is also another rather significant observation in that the percentage in (3) "daily devotions of Bible reading and prayer"; and in (4) "reading . . . spiritual books and literature"; and even in (7) "bringing in of tithes and offerings"; were upon many reports higher than the spiritual state of grace reported by the society's members. Possibly this demands some attention.

Item IV: Recommendations:

After surveying the Efficiency Standard for another year, as well as some other corresponding areas, I recommend the following changes:

- 1) to strike out check number 2 and broaden the scope by inserting in its place—

Have you contributed to the welfare of the local W. Y.?

- 2) to add to the present list of 9 checks the following check as number 10—

Have you personally witnessed by life and word to the outside world?

- 3) to evaluate all checks as 10 percent, EXCEPT
check number 3 worth 20 percent
check numbers 8 and 9 worth 5 percent.

PRAYER LEAGUE SECRETARY'S REPORT

A very significant statement was made by a young man who was speaking of his father. "When father is in trouble, he almost always prays." There is a feeling, that when in trouble that is too great to bear or solve, THEN one should pray. Jesus teaches that we should always pray and not to faint. Then again, one's prayers are very self-centered, concerning only "my" and "mine." But not once in the pattern prayer are the words my or mine or I spoken. Jesus gives us the pattern of prayer in His sermon on the mount when He stated, "After this manner, pray ye." He gave us an outline for prayer with six petitions; first recognizing God, then making our requests known. Note the petitions: 1. Hallowed be Thy name. 2. Thy kingdom come. 3. Thy will be done. Then man's needs: 4. Give us our daily bread. 5. Forgive us our debts. 6. Lead us not into temptation. May we each one learn the secret or the plan of God for more powerful praying in our lives.

This has been a splendid year for the Prayer League. Over 50 pieces of mail have reached my desk giving almost 200 new names to the society. There seems to be an awakening for more earnest prayer among the youth of our conference. Young people, let each one humble himself

before the Lord and ask, "Lord, teach me to pray."

Recommendations for the coming year:

1. Each society have a regular meeting for prayer alone at least once a month—perhaps a cottage prayer meeting.
2. Each society, at least once a quarter, have a public meeting stressing the importance of prayer.
3. Each society send the name of their Prayer League secretary to the conference Prayer League secretary.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GOALS AND METHODS

The Committee on Goals and Methods submits the following report:

1. That every church organize a Wesleyan Youth Society.
 2. That each society send the name and address of the local W. Y. President and Secretary to the Conference W. Y. President not later than one week after election.
 3. a. That each society pay annually:
 - (1) \$1.50 per full member for General Conference Dues
 - (2) .50 per full member for Conference Dues
 - (3) .50 per full member Annual Convention Entertainment
 - b. That each unorganized society pay:
 - (1) \$.50 per each attender for Conference Dues
- All moneys to be sent through church treasurer not later than April 30.
4. a. That our pastors and local W. Y. Presidents carefully read and do their best to carry out the program of our Efficiency Standard.
 - b. That a committee composed of the Pastor, W. Y. President, and Secretary or the Efficiency Standard Chairman, shall grade the local society quarterly, according to the Efficiency Standard. This rating shall be submitted to the Conference Efficiency Standard Chairman quarterly and the annual report two weeks before the Annual Young People's Conference.
 - c. That the secretary keep such records as are necessary for this committee to make this rating.
 5. That each W. Y. support the Pioneer Program of the conference.
 6. That each W. Y. heartily support our missionary endeavor according to the requirements of the Discipline with one service a month for missions and we suggest that the offering of said meeting be given for missions.
 7. That each local society strive to engage in as many of the following as possible:
 - a. Street and institutional meetings.
 - b. Cottage prayer meetings.
 - c. Tract distribution.
 - d. Door-knob evangelism.
 - e. Visitation of sick and shut-ins.
 - f. Cooperation with child evangelism, Daily Vacation Bible School, and Religious Education in public schools.

g. Become a member of Conference Brigade of Intercessory Commandos.

8. That each local W. Y. cooperate 100 percent to make Wesleyan Youth Week all God wants it to be, and strive to interest other young people outside the church in these services.

9. a. That a Local Prayer League Secretary to cooperate with the Conference Prayer League Secretary be elected to recruit volunteers for the W. Y. League.

b. That the name and address of this Secretary be sent at once to the Conference Prayer League Secretary.

10. That the W.Y. augment the church and Sunday School library, or where there is none, sponsor one with good church literature approved by the pastor and adult counselor.

11. That each society send the President, two delegates, chaperon, and pastor, with expenses paid, to the Annual W. Y. Convention.

12. a. That the Conference W. Y. President arrange to hold at least one service in each zone of each district during the year.

b. That his traveling expenses be paid by each zone visited.

13. That the District and Zones evaluate their activities according to the following point system and an appropriate award be given to one achieving the highest percentage.

10 points for having at least 6 Rallies a year.

10 points for the organization of each new society.

10 points for a Paid Conference Budget for every organized society.
(50 cents per member)

10 points for District or Zone Youth revival.

10 points for meeting Zone pledge.

5 extra points for over subscribing the zone pledge 10%.

5 points for Conference dues for every unorganized society.

5 Points for Chairman attending Annual Conference Convention.

5 points for Chairman reporting the year's activities to the Annual Conference Convention.

5 points for report of Zone Rallies sent into the Conference Messenger.

5 points for report of one Zone Rally sent into the Wesleyan Youth magazine.

Goals for 1962-63

1. That we seek to have a spiritual program that is God-honoring, Christ-centered, and Spirit-directed.

2. That all Youth Societies report to the Annual Youth Convention.

3. That at least 3 new W. Y. Societies be organized.

4. That we heartily support the Conference W. Y. program and projects.

5. That these goals and methods be read in each local society within the first month after receiving the conference minutes. Also that they be read at the first youth rally.

6. That each W. Y. send by mail all statistical reports to the Conference Youth Secretary not later than July 1.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We, the Committee on Resolutions of the Wesleyan Youth of the Allegheny Conference submit the following:

1. That we, as Wesleyan Youth, govern our lives by adhering to the Standards of the Bible and the principles set forth in the Discipline, as interpreted by the Allegheny Conference.

2. a. That we, as Christian youth, have a definite plan of Bible reading, Bible memorization, and prayer, and accept privileges of carrying a soul burden.

b. That we strive to have each active member of the Wesleyan Youth become a member of the Wesleyan Youth Prayer League.

c. That we prayerfully strive for a Youth Week Revival.

3. a. That we refrain from reading unwholesome literature such as comics, Detective and True Story or other literature detrimental to our spiritual life.

b. That we build Christian Character through careful and extensive reading of edifying literature.

c. That we read the books of the "Wesleyan Youth Reading Course" which will be selected and commended by your Allegheny Conference Youth Executive Council.

4. That because of the physical, moral, and spiritual degeneration resulting from the use of tobacco, narcotics, and alcoholic beverages, especially among our youth, we take a vigorous stand against these evils.

5. That we take a positive stand against worldliness in that we refrain from the following:

a. Card playing, games of chance, theater attendance, public beaches, mixed bathing, dance halls(including participation in Senior Proms), skating rinks, bowling, circuses, carnivals, fairs, and viewing television.

b. Wearing of jewelry.

c. Wearing of the immodest style of dress. (Both boys and girls)

d. Worldly amusements and worldly organized sports.

6. That due to the problems of modern education, in as far as possible and advisable, we will support our own church schools with our prayers and finances.

7. That our societies be evangelistic in our plan of work supporting the Sunday School and other church services, by distributing tracts, street meetings, personal work, and pioneer work.

8. That our regular meetings be restricted to a time of spiritual uplift instead of a time of eating, drinking, and frivolity.

9. That each society shall appoint a proper chaperon for their group attending the annual convention, who shall be responsible for their conduct and attendance at all services of the convention; and we request the presence of the pastors.

10. That each society have two adult counselors, one of which shall be the pastor.

11. That these resolutions be read in each local society semi-annually.
