JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America assembled for the seventy-fifth annual session in the Conference Tabernacle at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 10:00 a.m., Thursday, August 2, 1945, with the President, the Rev. E. A. Coates, in the Chair.

The devotional period was led by Clair Dunbar. He read from the Psalms 123:1-4 and 125:1, 2, bringing to the Conference some very inspirational truths.

The roll was called with fifty Elders, six Conference Preachers, two honorary enrollees, and forty-four Delegates-elect answering present.

Credentials—Gerald Carry and Geoerge Sundstrom were elected the Committee on Credentials.

Presidents Report—The President made his report. The Official Acts were adopted. The financial part of the report was referred to the Financ Committee.

Diamond Jubilee Committee—On motion, it was voted to elect a committee, E. H. Dunbar being chairman, to present plans and goals for the Conference in observance of its Diamond Jubilee; that a short service be held to inaugurate these plans.

The completion of the committee was referred to the Committee on Nominations which presented the following nominations: E. H. Dunbar, Chairman; Lorin Miller, Dale Campbell, Lola Smith, and Grace Davis. These were elected.

Courtesy—The Rev. F. R. Birch, Connectional Foreign Missionary Secretary and Representative to the Conference, and the Rev. and Mrs. W. C. Roberts, camp evangelist, were presented to the Conference. Each spoke briefly.

Orders of the Day Report—The Committee on Orders of the Day made a complete report which was amended placing the Ordination Service at 1:00 p.m. on Thursday. The report was adopted.

Elimination of Floor Reports—The Conference voted to eliminate the floor reports of Pastors and Evangelists.

Special Resolution—Arkansas City—The church at Arkansas City by special resolution requested assistance from the Conference in promotion of a revival effort and the possible adjustment of the indebtedness. The resolution was referred to the Missionary Board.

Adjourned for committee work. Benediction by V. C. Martin.

Thursday Afternoon

The afternoon meeting was called by the President. Rev. L. S. Currie read the Twenty-third Psalm and commented thereon.

Credentials—The Committee on Credentials presented the name of one Delegate-elect. The Delegate was seated. See Conference Roll.

The Committee also presented four recommendations from the Miltonvale Church that Betty Nell Freeborn, Clara Cooper, Charles Boardman, and Rolland Fletcher be received to study, preparatory to travel under Conference direction.

That the Conference President's:

STATISTICAL GLEANINGS

Another milestone is past and we are happy to note God's blessing and guidance with some marked advancements this year. Your statistical committee has prepared a full report for your future reference. The following report is only notes of interest.

We have the same number of Wesleyans taken, a loss of thirty-six

Missionary Magazines and a gain of seven Wesleyan Youth.

There are forty-seven churches reporting with a total of 1,581 members, a loss of twenty-four members and two churches discontinued. A total of 1,111 tithers (gain of 46) and 456 family alters (gain of 15) were reported.

We are happy to note our conference, with a marked increase in average attendance, has a part in making our church one of the three denominations showing a gain in Sunday School attendance. We have a loss of 4 W. Y. P. S. societies and 34 members but an increase in average attendance in Daily Vacation Bible School.

There are 43 church buildings and 36 parsonages with a total valuation of \$221,550.00 with \$27,251.14 indebtedness, having \$21,066.34 cash or other values on hand. It is interesting to note each charge having indebtedness has made substantial payments.

The total pastors' salary was \$48,775.50, an increase of \$6,962.59 with an average of \$19.95 weekly (increase of \$3.87 per week).

For all purposes our churches raised \$150,779.36 an increase of \$15,-813.40.

All Connectiona lbudget items were over paid but Connectional Sunday School; all Conference budget items were under paid.

We thank God for the progress that we are making and trust that every item will show a gain in the future.

RESOLUTIONS

1. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.

- 2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, That the election of Conference Officers be held the second day of Conference at 9:00 a.m.
- 3. Subscription Lists. Resolved, That all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W. H. & F. M. S., or the Camp Meeting committee, and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor a list of subscriptions from his charge.
- 4. Sancity of God's House. Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be preformed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.
- 5. Pastor's Moving Expense. Resolved, That the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.
- 6. Reporting All Offerings to Pastors. Resolved, That all monies be reported to the Pastor's for entry on their Stastical Report in order to give due credit both to the Charge and to the Conference.
- 7. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, That is be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following receipe: One-third cup flour, one teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in one-half inch squares and bake as pie dough. The above will serve 50 persons.
- 8. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member to the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.
- 9. President's Duties. Resolved, That the Conference President shall, First, travel the Conference and hold one-half of the Quarterly Meetings. Second, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property, Third, call a meeting of the board of stewards and help arrange a workable financial plan for that church.
- 10. Vactions. Resolved, That the Conference President be granted a vaction over two Sundays that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for vaction.

Resolved, That we recommend that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absense from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be used for vacation and that the church give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he may choose for vacation.

11. Nominating Committee. Resolved, That we elect a Committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and three delegates-elect, from three churches designated by the Conference to: First, examine all credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting. Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the

first session of Conference. Third, nominate the personnel of all Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference. Fourth, nominate the Committee Chairman for next year. Fifth, nominate the District Chairman.

- 12 Theological Institute. Resolved, That the traveling expenses of instructors to and from the Institute be paid from the Conference Fund, and also such books as may be needed for Institute work.
- 13. Superannuate Service. Resolved, That one public service in each Annual Conferance Session be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund, and that it be the duty of the Second Vice-President to arrange for such a service.
- 14. Superannuate Constitution. Resolved, That the Constitution of the Kansas Superannuate Association be printed in the Conference Minutes once in five years, and that a note be carried regularly in the Resolutions stating the year of last publication. (Published in 1943 Minutes).
- 15. 1 Per Cent Assessment. Resolved, That we require all active Ministers to pay one per cent of their cash salary to the Superannuate Fund, this not to be applied on the budget.
- 16. Conference Loans. Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 17. Additional Delegates. Resolved, That when more than one Delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the Elder that entitles the church to the additional Delegate.
- 18. Fiscal Year. Resolved, That the fiscal year of the local church close ten days before Conference and that the statistical report be made on the basis of money received up to that time. That the pastors mail immediately to the Conference Treasurer the complete Statistical Report and budget receipts, who shall check them and give them to the Statistical Chairman, who shall then be prepared to report at an early session of Conference.
- 19. Pastors Paid Through Conference. Resolved, That the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting period.
- 20. Orders of the Day Committee. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Camp Ground Committee be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor".
- 21. Camp Meeting Committee. Resolved, That the President of the W. Y. P. S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- 22. Trustees Authorized. Resolved, That all actions heretofore taken by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meetings

of such Annual Conference concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such actions had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary actions as to them may seem proper and expedient and to the best interests of the Annual Conference and the local Churches concerning the purchase, sale, morgaging and conveyance of real estate during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as of full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

- 23. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, That all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must not be presented later than Thursday noon of Conference.
- 24. Installation of Officers. Resolved, That all Conference officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of the Conference when there shall be an installation service held, for the installation of the officers as are to appear in the Conference Minutes; this service to be arranged by the Pastoral Relations Committee.
- 25. Pastors Released for Meetings. Resolved, That we earnestly request each of our churches to release its pastor for one meeting of three weeks length to be held on a new field or on one of the weaker charges under the direction of the Missionary Board, and that the church pay his salary during his absence.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Then the Lord". The book of Job is unique in its subject and circumstances. The author is not known. The time of it is involved in equal darkness. How it was originally written and in what language, have also been questions on which great and learned men have been divided. But this we do know—God says that Job was a perfect man, a pious man and a praying man; yet he was a prey for the enemy. He was put on exhibition as it were, while God stood back amid the shadows, keeping watch over his own; but the trial was none the less severe.

Notice this man and his surroundings—children gone, property gone, wife back-slidden, afflicted in body, assulted by hell, and a few pillars in the church coming to search out the old patriarch and tell him he had sinned or he never, never would have been afflicted in this way. But Job stood the test, declaring his faith that the Redeemer would appear; but if he did not, said, "though he slay me yet I trust him." Just about that time, when there was not a ray of hope in sight "then the Lord" One has glibly said, when you get to the end of your rope, tie a knot in the end of and hang on. You have read the old proverb, "When the tale of bricks is doubled, Moses comes." But this was better, the Lord himself appeared. There are times when Moses will not do, when an angel will not do, and our souls cry out, "If thy presence go not with me"—and we can hear him say, "My presence shall go with thee."

The moral of the story of course, is that God always comes on time "Then the Lord'. Darkness for a while, the hour of Satan' power for a while, the body sore wrecked for a while, and then the Master speaks. PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend:

Division 1. Local Work

- 1. That this Plan of Work be reviewed quarterly in each local Society.
- 2. That we observe at least four of the "Red Letter Days":
- A. Harvest Home Day, October 12. We urge each Society to send cash or donations to the Harvest Home Committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.
- B. Easter—Programs and offerings for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- C. The World Day of Prayer—We recommend that the District Organizers make definite plans for the observance either by District or Local Societies.
- D. May Day to be known as gift day, gifts of clothing, bandages, money, or other articles such as can be sent out with outgoing missionaries or used on home fields.

Before sending donations please secure information concerning proper addresses. (See Magazine Directory)

- E. Wesleyan Missionary Day. (See Program Booklet, Page 6)
- 3. That each Society elect annually a Magazine Solicitor to secure new subscriptions and renewals.
- 4. That each Society establish a circulating Missionary Library and thereby stimulate the reading of Missionary books; and that a record of books read be kept by each reader on Activity Record in Program Booklets.

(NOTE—Library to be in hands of a librarian elected by the Society. Allow no books to become part of library which have not first been approved by Pastor of the Church and President of the W. H. & F. M. S.)

- 5. That we recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the collection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.
- 6. That all local dues be sent to our Missionary Treasurer, Mrs. Bertha Wilson, 647 Watson Ave., Topeka, Kansas. One-half of the same to be applied on Missionary Budget. Please designate specifically where this credit is desired. (See Treasurer's book, Item C. under Number 4). Honorary membership dues apply on Missionary Budget.
- 7. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on budget be sent from the local W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer to the Conference W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer quarterly.

That this money be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least two weeks before conference.

- 8. That each Society contribute 5 cents per active member to pay General Conference Delegates expenses.
- 9. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- 10. That an effort be made by each Society to secure subscriptions to the Card Call Plan either by individuals or by Societies.
- 11. That we urge each Society to contribute at least \$5.00 to the Hephzibah Orphanage, except in cases where the church budget is less than \$5.00.
- 12. That each Society be responsible for the eraising of \$1.00 or more for the new W. H. & F. M. S. and W. Y. P. S. Tabernacle.
- 13. That each local President appoint a committee whose duty shall be to contact the sick in person or by correspondence and to work in harmony with the pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the Kingdom of God.
- 14. That the President of each local Society be made responsible to arrange with the pastor for one evening of the third week each month to pray especially for mission work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services as follows:
 - A. September for Child Evangelism.
 - B. October and November for Education.

- C. December for Orphanage .
- D. January and February for Kansas Conference Missions.
- E. March and April for Home Missions.
- F. May and June for Foreign Missions.
- G. July for the Wesleyan Hope Mission, Kansas City, Mo.
- 15. That in harmony with the recommendation of the General Society we urge that our ladies observe Friday of each week as a day of fasting and prayer for a Connection-wide revival until it comes,
- 16. That we use material printed in the Wesleyan Missionary, also the new Study book, "Hudson Taylor's Spiritual Secret" in our regular meetings.
- 17. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the local Society, which serves as an audit of the Treasurer's report. One copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, Ruby Anderson, 410 Monroe Street, Topeka, Kansas, two weeks before Conference. The duplicate to be brought to Conference by the Delegate. Place the name of the President for the coming year on the back of the report blank.
- 18. That each Society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard, which is to be read Quarterly. A grade of 10 percent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies making 100 percent will be placed on the Honor Roll.
- 19. That the President of each Society be responsible for the reading of the Moral Reform report at one public church service during the year.
- 20. That the President of each Society appoint a Committee of two to see to the gathering of supplies for the Conference dining hall. The minimum for each Society shall be:

Two tea towles and one apron; ten quarts of fruit or fruit spread; five quarts of pickles, relish, or catsup; ten pounds of noodles; canned or fresh vegetables, or fill quota with cash. The surplus donations shall be given to the College Dormitory and will receive credit on the Educational Budget.

- 21. That the President of each local Society appoint a Committee to cooperate with the Temperance Supenintendent of the Sunday School in observance of Temperance Sunday and distribution of Temperance literature.
- 22. That November be Men and Missions Month. Program shall be sponsored by the men.
- 23. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 775 members, 325 honorary members, 500 magazines and \$12,000 apportionment. We urge that each Society make a gain in the above.

Division II. Conference Work

- 24. That the President and District Organizers arrange the time and recommend the worker for Conventions or Conference visitation.
- 24. That each District be supervised by the District Organizer under the direction of the Conference President.
 - 26. That the Districts are as follows:

Lawrence District—St. Louis, Mo.; Kansas City, Mo.; Kansas City, Kansas; Ottawa, Paola, Lawrence, and Leavenworth.

Topeka District—Topeka First, Gage Park, North Topeka, Oakland, Quinton Heights; Willis, Williams Chapel, and Eskridge.

Clay Center District—Manhattan, Clay Center, Wesley Chapel, Bethany Chapel, Abilene, Antioch, Miltonvale, Salina, and Idana.

Concordia District—Concordia, Hall, Belleville, New Hope, Morgan Chapel, Heber, and Hollis.

Wichita District—Wichita: First, West Side, Seneca St.; Grace Chapel, Hopewell, Chanute, Hutchinson, and Arkansas City.

Mankato District—Mankato, Wesley Center, Victor, Hardy, and Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Phillipsburg District—Cedar, Gaylord, Phillipsburg, Iowa Union, Inglewood; Naponee, Nebraska; and Englewood, Colorado.
