Standing Resolutions

- 1. The Conference President shall in his quarterly meeting see that adequate insurance is carried by each church on its property.
- 2. The Pastor's Statistical Report must be passed by the Conference Treasurer and the Committee on Character, and must be presented to the Statistical Committee before being read to the conference body.
- 3. The Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the conference year which shall be a standing committee of five members with the Conference President as member ex-officio. This committee shall nominate the chairman and members of committees and the third member of the Publications Committee. Each committee on this report shall be presented to the conference body separately and time allowed for nominations from the floor.
- 4. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close at midnight, June 30, and that the Conference Treasurer close his books effective midnight, July 7th, and that all statistical reports are to be sent in by that date to the Conference Treasurer, and that he in turn send them to the statistical chairman. All money received after that date is to be applied to a budget item on the following year. The Conference Treasurers of the Missionary Society, Wesleyan Youth and Y. M. W. B. send a report immediately after their books close to the Conference Treasurer, listing amount paid on each budget item from each church.
- 5. The Conference shall convene the first Monday night of August each year.
- 6. The Conference Trustees shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location and Building.
- 7. All ministers and delegates attending the entire annual conference and camp are to be given rooms in preference to those not active in conference business.
- 8. No divorced person who has been remarried shall be ordained u in the Kentucky Conference.
- 9. All Conference officials shall assume office in the next meeting following the election.
- 10. No charge shall call a pastor or a supply from other conferences or denominations as long as there are available ministers in our conference qualified for the work. The Conference President, after having exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other conferences or denominations, shall immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, which shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report their findings to the President, after which appointments may be made.

- 11. The vote on the pastor shall be taken by ballot the first week in June unless special permission is granted by the Conference President and his Advisory Board for another date; said ballots are to be prepared by the clerk and the results of the vote shall be reported at once to the Conference President.
- 12. Let all ministers have their membership transferred to their new appointment, and the Ways and Means Committee shall figure Budget Apportionment after the final reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee.
- 13. Since television in its present state is so radically demoralizing in its range, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference register its disapproval of anyone within the Conference endorsing or owning a television set. Furthermore, be it resolved that Kentucky Conference will not license preachers or workers, ordain elders or station ministers who own or have a television set in their possession.
- 14. The Conference President and the Conference Secretary shall be members of the Publications Committee ex-officio.
- 15. A standing Committee on Ways and Means shall be elected at the regular conference election, of which the Conference President shall be a member ex-officio.
- 16. Pastors shall read to their congregations the General and Special Rules and instructions of the Discipline, the Standing Resolutions of the Conference, and the report of the Committee on Moral Reform.
- 17. Every preacher borrowing a book from the Conference Library may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty-five cents for the month and five cents for every day over the month.
- 18. In this age when immodesty and worldliness are subtily creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister of ours earnestly contend for, and faithfully preach the entire Word of God without fear or favor of man. Let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the church of her glory and preachers of the divine anointing.
- 19. IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED AND ORDERED by the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in session assembled this 8th day of August, 1957: That the Trustees of said Conference are hereby fully empowered to buy, sell, convey, mortgage or lease property for, or on behalf of said conference, and to sign notes and execute mortgages for said purposes on behalf of said Conference, provided however, that between the sessions of the Kentucky Conference, a majority of the Mission Board, as the designated Board of Managers of the said Kentucky Conference, shall signify their agreement therewith by a special resolution and order authorizing each and every transaction.

Report No. 3

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Kentucky Conference and friends:

With a deep sense of gratitude we gather for another annual conference to give God glory, to report and make plans for another year.

We insist that there must be earnest, individual, conscientious dependence upon the Spirit of God for His fiery baptism of love, renewed interest in Bible reading and standing on the immutable promises, a keener interest in salvaging the lost by a deeper and more determined effort, deeper loyalty to Christ and His Church, a venture into pioneer fields, a personal sacrifice to promote salvation work at home and abroad, renewed intercession for a supernatural revival for the conference and the world, and a greater confidence in one another.

State of the Conference

Over the Conference much material progress has been made. Buildings under construction last year have been completed and indebtedness reduced this year. Lexington has added a greatly needed new stone front addition for comfort as well as beauty. Holton has repaired the church foundation, redecorated and installed a furnace. Brooksburg has purchased a commodious parsonage in Madison and paid off about one third of the cost. Owensboro has purchased a parsonage beside the church which greatly adds to the church's standing in the community and provides for the pastor's comfort. In various places repairs and improvements have been made.

The pioneer field this year has been blessed of God with good advances. As is well known now, the Glasgow pioneer field developed in the spring and excellent progress is being made there. At Concord near Jamestown a new pioneer building is being finished. At Pekin, Indiana, an excellent frame addition has been built to the rear of the church for parsonage quarters at a very moderate cost. Notes payable for pioneer work have been reduced, but others made. Some spiritual progress has been made, revivals held and fires kindled; but there is room for a greater deepening yet. The Spirit of God is our greatest need.

President's Activities

This year the President has held 43 quarterly meetings, preached 142 times, taught six Sunday school classes, attended 33 conference committees, six pastors' pioneer rallies, four Marion College Board meetings, various revival meetings, the Ministerial Institute, edited the Messenger and cared for his own desk work and typing.

President's Acts

August 14, 1956, received J. E. Sanford as conference preacher from the Nazarene Church, and under the Mission Board appointed him to Temple.

August 20, appointed Samuel T. Long to Sylvania whose credentials were received later from the Indiana Conference, Sept. 22.

November 21, accepted Lester Sanders as a conference preacher coming from the Methodist Church and appointed him to evangelism.

Set Calendar Sunday for September 23 for exchange of pulpits and taking of pledges.

August 31, 1956—Board members C. L. Blanchard, E. G. Pommerehn, and Robert W. Pelton met jointly with Conference Trustees D. W. Fossit, K. K. Rothrock and Audie Basham and voted jointly to deed property at 912 South Grant Street, Brazil, Indiana, formerly deeded to Conference Trustees, back to Clara G. Albrecht to avoid any involvement. IV. Calendar System

- 1. A pioneer calendar shall be provided by the Mission Board for a Sunday in September chosen as Pioneer Sunday.
- On pioneer Sunday pledges shall be taken in each church to be paid in 10 monthly payments.
- 3. A pioneer secretary appointed by each local church shall announce, or have announced, on the second Sunday of each month the pledge collection on the third Sunday, and shall collect, and tabulate opposite each pledge the monthly contribution, then have church treasurer remit total collected each month to Conference Treasurer.
- 4. Pioneer works may be granted permission by the Mission Board to use their money locally as may be needed.
- 5. Previous to Pioneer Sunday there shall be a rally of the pastors in each district presided over by the Conference President or another designated by the Mission Board, when goals for each church may be suggested.
- V. The first-Sunday-of-the-month Sunday School offering in full shall be remitted monthly by each Sunday School treasurer for much needed conference pioneer work.

VI. Field and Goals

- 1. Money shall be saved for centers of population, to be invested in property or to employ men of pioneer ability.
- 2. We urge a goal of \$6000 this year for paying off Glasgow and toward starting another pioneer work.

VII. Revolving Fund

This fund shall be increased by gifts, and at the discretion of the Mission Board from regular pioneer funds not to exceed \$500 per year.

VIII. Mother Church

We urge the larger churches to cooperate with the Mission Board

in starting a prayer meeting or a Sunday School in a new section, as well as in tithing their church tithes and offerings for mothering a new work under the Mission Board.

IX. United Effort

We suggest and urge cooperation of the Conference W. M. S., and the Youth Executive Committee with the Mission Council and Mission Board to aid our pioneer works as may be needed.

Report No. 12

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

Item I. Budget

- 1. We recommend that this conference pay General Budget Assessment, General Wesleyan Youth Budget of \$1.50 per member and that in accordance with the action of the Board of Administration all newly organized churches and organized missions be exempt from the General Budget the first two years: furthermore, that they be exempt from the Conference Budget the first year and take free will offerings for Conference Budget the second year.
- 2. We recommend that our churches pay Conference Budget as follows: Conference Work Fund—\$1.00; Conference Entertainment—\$1.00 per member; Camp Meeting Fund—\$1.00; Conference Parsonage Fund—\$1.00 per member; Conference President's Salary—\$1.00 per member and an amount equal to 10% of the pastor's cash salary; and that the Sunday School offering for the first Sunday of each month be sent to the Conference Treasurer for Pioneer Evangelism. All budget money shall be sent in monthly.

Item II. Pastor

- 1. Each pastor shall encourage the Storehouse Plan of Tithing.
- 2. All pastors shall endorse and encourage membership in the Church Extension Card Call Plan.
- 3. The pastoral year shall end immediately following the last Sunday of Camp and the church that he is serving shall pay his salary until that time.
- 4. All churches shall provide for their pastors suitable living quarters, all utilities, fill their obligation by monthly donations and allow him two weeks vacation with pay.
- 5. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church.

Item III. Conference President

- 1. The Conference President shall be paid \$75.00 per week, house rent, utilities, desk expenses, traveling expenses at 7 cents per mile in connection with conference work and shall be allowed two weeks vacation with pay.
- 2. The Conference President shall meet the Board of Stewards of all churches paying less than \$1,000 salary and adjust the finances accordingly.
- 3. Each church shall hold four quarterly meetings annually; one to be held by the Conference President at his convenience and three to be arranged by the pastor. These Quarterly meetings are to be held the third weeks of October, January, April and July.
- 4. The Conference President shall give one Sunday preaching service to each church annually and shall give as much time as possible to supervising the pioneer works and the smaller churches.

Item IV. Miscellaneous

- 1. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary shall each be paid \$75.00 a year.
 - 2. All superannuated ministers of our conference shall be en-

tertained entirely free all during camp.

3. \$500 of the surplus in the Conference President's Fund shall be transferred to the Pioneer Evangelism Fund.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

We thank God that our schools are carrying on. The attendance records show some growth is spots but there is not the conference wide growth that we ought to see. So let us in this new conference year set our goals higher and press on more faithfully to attain them. Rally Day was generally observed in the schools and with a few exceptions, every school contributed to the Thanksgiving Offering. The International Headquarters Building will still be the object of our coming Thanksgiving Offering, so let us do our very best in it.

The reports show that 120 Sunday School scholars were converted during the year, of whom 35 joined our churches. Six schools held Daily Vacation Schools with an attendance of 305. We would like to see a large increase in such schools next year.

Our average attendances show an attendance of about 70 per cent. That means that in a class of ten three scholars are absent every Sunday. Perhaps we can tighten up our follow up of absentees this year.

Our total receipts are higher than previous years \$11,000 plus. Eleven hundred and twelve dollars were designated for the Head-quarters Building and another two thousand was given to other benevolences, of which much probably went to this same cause.

Only three schools list contributions to Foreign Missions amounting to \$111 and four schools list gifts of \$158 to Home Missions, which seems to indicate that we are not placing enough emphasis on Missionary education and giving in our schools. This we must not fail to do if we would take the lands of the heathen for our inheritance. Our expenditures for supplies totaled \$6218 and I would suggest that we use rigid economy in avoiding waste of helps or papers or in any way diverting funds that might be added to missions.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means, wish to make the following recommendations:

I. Conference

- a. The W. Y. President shall attend one rally in each district during the year and each district shall bear the traveling expenses at the rate of five (5) cents per mile.
- b. We recommend that the pioneer project for this year be left in the hands of the W. Y. Executive Council, in co-operation with the Conference Mission Board.
- c. We recommend that each district have at least three rallies during the year and that we use our Young People in variety of programs for these rallies rather than always securing an outside speaker.
- d. We recommend that the W. Y. Executive Committee make plans to raise funds for the new Youth-Missionary Building.
- e. We recommend that the Executive Committee make plans for a quarterly Youth Bulletin, to be sent to the young people of the conference.
- f. We recommend that our Youth Conference be held the Saturday following the conference and that Saturday be known as Youth Day with the closing of a Youth Rally on Saturday night.
- g. We recommend that a Ways and Means Committee be elected as a standing committee for a year.

II. Local

a. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close at mid-night Wednesday following the second Sunday of July.

III. Finances

- a. We recommend that each society raise the amount of one dollar and a half (\$1.50) per active member for the General W. Y. Program and that those churches not having an organized society take an offering for the General Youth Program.
- b. We recommend that each society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for the Conference Expense Fund.
- c. We recommend that each society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for Pioneer Evangelism to be used for our

Pioneer Projects.

- d. We recommend that each society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for the Youth Camp Fund.
- e. We recommend that each society raise the amount of ten (10) cents per active member to subsidize the expenses of the Youth Bulletin.
- f. We recommend that \$10.00 be raised in each Louisville District Rally and \$5.00 in each of the other District Rallies, the same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.
- g. We recommend that \$150.00 of the fund be disbursed for the support of the Ellis child in Africa.
- h. We recommend that the Area Assessment and all desk funds be paid out of the Conference Expense Fund.
- i. We recommend that the \$15.00 voted by the Conference as the Young People's assessment to help subsidize the Conference Messenger be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
- j. We recommend that the amount of \$75.00 be given the W. Y. President in appreciation of his work in behalf of the Kentucky Conference Youth.
- k. We recommend that the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Fund for the general promotion of Youth Work.
- 1. We recommend that all money be forwarded quarterly to the conference W. Y. Treasurer, Miss Shirley Kendall. The conference W. Y. Treasurer's books close mid-night Wednesday following the third Sunday in July.
