

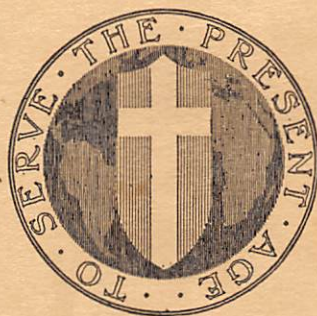

The forty-fourth session of the South Carolina Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America met in the auditorium of the Wesleyan Methodist College at Central, South Carolina, November 10, 1936, at 3:00 p. m.

Devotionals were conducted by Rev. R. C. Kendrick.

After some discussion regarding the changing of the date of Conference from November to some time in the summer, it was moved and carried that the President appoint a committee of five to decide on a suitable date for Conference and make recommendations to the Conference. Rev. and Mrs. Godsey, pastor of West Asheville Wesleyan Church of the North Carolina Conference, were presented to the Conference.

By vote the secretary was instructed to have 1,000 copies of the minutes printed and the same number each year hereafter until the Conference thinks it necessary to change the number.

By vote the secretary was instructed to send resolutions of sympathy to Rev. E. F. McCarty.

On motion Conference adjourned.

Thursday, 1:30 p. m.

Devotions were in the form of a Memorial Service for Mrs. E. F. McCarty and Mrs. Nancy Barts Willis. The Conference W. H. & F. M. S. had charge of the service.

The President called the Conference to order.

The roll was called.

C. M. Elrod and L. Rigdon read their statistical reports.

Rev. J. T. Carey gave a verbal report.

The committee appointed to decide on a suitable date for Conference reported. The report was adopted and is as follows:

"We recommend changing the time of the South Carolina Annual Conference so that it convene in the summer months.

"We further recommend that this action carry a request to the Book Committee that the time of convening be set for the first Tuesday after July 15." Signed by the committee.

An offering of \$14.61 was taken for Rev. D. T. Cain.

The secretary was instructed to write a message of sympathy to Rev. and Mrs. H. Robb French.

Rev. R. C. Mullinax gave his report as High School Principal at Central College, Titling Secretary, and Sunday School Secretary. The report was adopted.

Fred Elrod gave a report in behalf of Rev. I. O. Gray.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its first reading.

On motion it was voted that Rev. W. L. Thompson be invited to speak to the Conference on the subject, "The Pastor and His Study" at the devotional hour Friday morning.

On motion it was voted that Rev. R. C. Mullinax speak to the Conference on the subject of titling at the devotional hour Friday afternoon.

On motion Conference adjourned for committee work.

Thursday, 7:30 p. m.

An Educational service was in charge of Professor J. F. Childs, President of Central College.

Friday, 8:30 a. m.

Devotions were conducted by Rev. W. L. Thompson who spoke very ably on the subject, "The Work and Study of the Ministry."

Conference was called to order by the President.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

On nomination by the President and vote of the Conference, G. E. Crenshaw and J. B. Childs became the President's Advisory Board.

By vote the Conference (on request of the Pickens View Church) authorized the Conference Trustees to secure a loan of \$265.00 through a mortgage on the Pickens View Church property.

Statistical reports were read by D. G. Matheny, A. J. Tant (read by J. D. Elrod).

Rev. W. C. Lovin, a Pastor in the North Carolina Conference, was introduced to the Conference.

The Vice-President was called to the Chair.

Committee on Thanks reported. The report was adopted and requested read at the Friday evening service.

Committee on Moral Reform reported. The report was adopted and requested sent to the "Wesleyan" for publication.

Committee on Memorials reported. The report was adopted. See Reports.

On motion Conference adjourned to the call of the Chair.

Friday, 1:30 p. m.

Devotions were in the form of a tithing service conducted by Rev. R. C. Mullinax. He was assisted by Rev. W. C. Lovin of the North Carolina Conference who spoke on the subject, "The Pastor, the Church, and the Storehouse Plan."

The roll was called.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders reported. Report adopted. See Reports.

On motion it was made the Special Orders of the Day that at 3:00 D. L. Jones, Superintendent of the Hephzibah Home, be given the privilege to address the Conference regarding our work at Macon, Georgia.

On recommendation of the Superannuate Board, the Conference made a budget assessment of twenty cents per member for the Superannuate Fund.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its second reading.

On motion Conference adjourned until 3:00 o'clock.

At 3:00 o'clock Mr. D. L. Jones addressed the Conference regarding our work at Macon, Georgia.

Rev. W. L. Thompson presented and explained his plan of Home Mission building. It was moved and carried that the Conference endorse the plan.

On motion Conference adjourned.

Friday, 7:30 p. m.

The W. H. & F. M. S. held their public meeting. Miss Ina Gaines, the President, presided. Miss Mary Greene, missionary to India, gave a very stirring missionary address. Other speakers were Miss Gertrude Farmer and Rev. John Youngblood. Cash and pledges to the amount of \$809.00 were received.

The President called the Conference to order.

The roll was called.

The Missionary Board reported. Report adopted. See Reports.

Rev. D. G. Matheny read a report from Rev. W. D. Correll. Report adopted and his character was passed.

Rev. S. I. Keeler gave a verbal report.

Committee on Heresy reported. Report adopted and requested sent to the "Wesleyan" for publication.

Auditing Committee reported. Report adopted. See Reports.

Conference Treasurer reported. Report adopted. See Reports.

Committee on Statistics reported. Report adopted. See Reports.

R. C. Mullinax resigned as Sunday School Secretary and a member of the Sunday School Board. On motion his resignation was accepted.

On motion J. C. Nunnally was elected Sunday School Secretary and a member of the Sunday School Board.

On motion the Committee on Apportionment were instructed to report to the President and his Advisory Board.

Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its final reading. Report adopted. See Reports.

On motion Conference accepted the invitation of the Arial Mill Church to convene there for its 1937 session.

The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

On motion Conference adjourned.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions Adopted in 1898

Resolved, 1st. That as a body in Conference assembled, we will not allow our pulpits or churches to be used by those who do not give evidence of being sound in the doctrines of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and true to our polity.

2nd. That as ministers and laymen we will use our best endeavors to prevent the promulgation of doctrines or usages not in accord with the Wesleyan Methodist faith.

Resolutions Adopted in 1905

Resolved, 1st. That the law with regard to complaints or violations of orders and resolutions found on page 37 of our Discipline, and beginning with the words, "When the President," shall apply to all cases of the violators of our Discipline, and no charges shall be entertained by the Judiciary Committee without said previous investigation and labor.

2nd. That no member of the Conference shall have his character passed who fails to carry out all the rules and orders of this Conference, unless providentially hindered, except upon a three-fourths vote of the body.

Resolutions Adopted in 1907

Resolved, 1st. That we affirm our faith in the soundness of the position taken by the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America in denying any of its members membership in any secret society.

2nd. That we believe that the preaching of Holiness that does not include a clear and distinct opposition to all secret societies is seriously lacking in the essential elements and must be more or less displeasing to God.

3rd. That we believe that the right type of Holiness preaching and teaching is the most effective means by which to induce men to separate themselves from all lodge entanglements; therefore, we will do our best to double our diligence in this line of effort.

4th. That we affectionately admonish our people to avoid all compromise with secrecy. Hence we as a Conference require that our pastors and churches shall not elect, or suffer to be elected, superintendents or teachers of any Sunday Schools that are held in our churches if they hold membership in secret societies; furthermore, those belonging to secret orders shall not be allowed to hold services in our churches.

5th. That we seriously urge upon all our brethren and sisters that they may be careful to maintain a consistent, but radical, attitude of opposition to all organizations, secret or open, which are opposed to Jesus Christ and His doctrine and principles of righteousness.

Resolutions Adopted in 1914

Resolved, 1st. That all of our Licentiates not receiving any appointments to pastoral or evangelistic work be required to preach at least once a month, or twelve times during the Conference year.

2nd. That in addition to the above resolution, we earnestly request all preachers not receiving a regular appointment by the Conference, except those attending school preparatory to the ministry, to hold, if possible, a two weeks revival during the year.

3rd. That all preachers unemployed by the Conference during the coming year be urged to select a fellow-laborer with whom they can work harmoniously, and go out and try to build up new works as they may have opportunity, and revive the desert places.

4th. That in order that the foregoing resolutions may have the greatest effect possible, and that each preacher may have a higher estimation of the dignity of his calling, and that the burden for souls may be increased, and that they may feel the sympathy of the Church to which they belong, we urge each charge to pass like resolutions.

5th. That it is not only the duty, but binding on each Circuit preacher of our Conference, to receive whomsoever the Conference may designate as Quarterly Meeting Evangelist, and give him their hearty support and coöperation.

Resolution Adopted in 1919

Be it Resolved, That the Committee on Public Worship consist of the President of the Conference, the pastor of the charge where the Conference is held, and the pastor's delegate.

Resolution, Regarding Tithing, Adopted in 1922

Resolved, That no person be licensed to preach who does not tithe his income; that all our licentiates be required to faithfully tithe their income; and that the license of no preacher be renewed, who fails to tithe.

Resolutions Adopted in 1923

Resolved, 1st. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be opened to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.

2nd. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided, this shall not interfere with previous arrangements between pastor and church.

Resolution Adopted in 1926

Resolved, That the pastors be required to raise their Minute Money and send to the Conference Treasurer within sixty days after they receive their Minutes.

Resolutions Adopted in 1931

Resolved, 1st. That this Conference elect a Tithing Secretary, as provided for in our Discipline, whose duty it shall be to visit each charge at least once a year, if possible. Each church visited shall raise at least the traveling expenses of the Secretary at the time of his visitation.

2nd. That each local church or charge elect a Tithing Secretary, whose duty it shall be to thoroughly canvass the membership of the church or charge each quarter and labor most earnestly to induce each member to strictly tithe his income and to place the same in the church treasury for the purpose of meeting all the claims of the church, both locally and generally. This Secretary shall report at each Quarterly Conference the percentage of the membership who are tithing in keeping with this plan, the percentage who are giving in other ways, and the percentage who are not giving at all.

3rd. That each pastor and church coöperate with these Secretaries in every possible way in order to make the entire membership of this Conference strict tithers.

Resolution Adopted in 1932

Whereas in America there seems to be a constantly increasing disregard for law and law observance, and whereas there has been a desire on the part of some to annul or repeal the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Be it Resolved, That we unequivocally place ourselves in opposition to any plan whereby either this Amendment or the Volstead Act should be changed.

Be it further Resolved, That we will labor diligently in public and private to create that public sentiment for these laws that will not only keep them on our Statute books, but cause them to be more rigorously enforced.

REPORTS

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Through the good providence of God, we have been permitted to come together for another Annual Conference. We are not here, we trust, just to report the work of the past year, but to worship the Lord together, to renew Christian fellowship, and to devise plans that will mean better days in the future.

I can say with the apostle, I have longed after you and prayed that your love would abound, and that you would be filled with the fruits of righteousness. (Philippians 1:8-11.) We are under renewed obligations to God for His extended mercy. The Death Angel has not visited our ranks and claimed any of the ministers of the South Carolina Conference since our last Annual Gathering. Some have been called to pass through serious illness, but the hand of death has been stayed, for which we thank God. The events of the twelve months, which have so rapidly passed by, have had their sweets as well as their bitternesses. The Christian association should enrich our lives; the glorious victories should increase our faith. It is a privilege to be a co-laborer with God in the Great Cause. So let us endure hardships as good soldiers of the cross.

The Conference has taken on some new life and added to our ranks some new material. There is a noticeable growth in a number of the churches—both in number and in spirituality. Graham Chapel has enjoyed a spiritual awakening and souls are being saved and sanctified at their regular preaching services.

The old Picken's View Church has been pulled down and a new building erected on the same site.

Oakway has added six Sunday School rooms, which is a great asset to the work there.

Rock Hill Church has been remodeled some and has been given a coat of white paint.

The work at Pelzer has been given a boost. The Mill Company has arranged a nice, permanent parsonage in a good community for our pastor. This parsonage has lights and water free.

The Arial Mill Church has been completed and the main auditorium equipped with pews.

The Old Easley Mill Church has been underpinned with brick and a new heating system installed.

The Carlisle Church has also installed new pews, which has added much to the appearance, as well as to the value of the property.

The Conference Camp Ground at Greer has been improved by remodeling and reconstruction of some old buildings and the adding of a new twenty-room dormitory.

Rev. Clyde Bryant was appointed Pastor of the Conestee Charge.

On the rise of the last Annual Conference, Rev. E. J. Mills resigned his place on the Missionary Board.

Rev. J. D. Elrod was elected a member of the Missionary Board in Rev. E. J. Mill's place.

December 12, 1935, the Pelham Church was added to the Greenville Charge and Rev. E. C. Moon was appointed Junior Pastor.

March 6, 1936, the Rock Hill Church was reorganized, and added to the Westminster Charge. Rev. C. W. Nalley was appointed the Junior Pastor.

May 15, 1936, Rev. E. J. Mills was transferred to the Indiana Conference.

July 1, 1936, Dr. E. E. Barrett was transferred.

August 30, 1936, I received the transfer of Rev. Dan S. Hardin, Elder from the North Carolina Conference.

August 30, 1936, Rev. R. C. Mullinax was elected Conference Sunday School Secretary to fill the vacancy made by the transfer of Dr. E. E. Barrett. This was made by the Committee on Vacancies.

On October 18, 1936, Rev. Paul E. Allred was transferred to the Alabama Conference.
