- Apalachicola At Chapman's School on U.S. 98, turn west and go one block, then left.
- Brooksville On Florida Wesleyan Methodist Campground southeast edge of Brooksville, just off U.S. 98.

- Fenholloway Six miles east of Perry on U.S. 27, then ½ mile east into Fenholloway -2nd church.

STANDING RULES

- 1. The conference treasurer shall be paid \$25.00 and the conference secretary \$15.00 per year for their services.
- 2. Nomination Committee -- There shall be four elected members and the conference president, who is to be chairman. Two elected members to be elders and two lay delegates, to be designated by the selection of local churches whose delegates are to serve. It is understood that members of this committee are not to be from the same church.
- 3. Each pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay, or if he desires to hold a two weeks meetin this will be considered in lieu of his vacation.
- 4. The conference president and his advisory board are designated a Deed Examining Committee. This committee shall inspect each deed for church or conference property before it is registered and see that it contains the necessary disciplinary provisions to secure the property to the conference. It shall be the duty of each person charged with the responsibility of negotiating for or handling any deed for the church or conference properties to submit such a deed to the Deed Examining Committee for inspection and approval before offering it for registration.
- 5. Any work or worker useing the name "Wesleyan Methodist" within the boundaries of this annual conference must have the approval of the annual conference or the president and his advisory board.
 - 6. No new work shall be organized until all in-

volved property is dully deeded to the annual conference and local trustees, or such steps are being taken, and has the approval of the conference trustees.

- 7. The date for beginning the annual conference and campmeeting shall be the fourth Tuesday in June.
- 8. Fiscal year the closing date of the fiscal year shall be May 31. The conference treasurer's books close June 7, and no money or receipts shall be honored after that date. The treasurer shall forward the statistical blanks to the statistical chairman.
- 9. The introduction of all new business of such a nature as to require an election, must be presented not later than noon of the third day of conference.
- 10. The Campmeeting and Campground Committee shall also be the permanent Orders of the Day Committee. They shall prepare the Conference and Campmeeting program in advance for publication.
- ll. Inasmuch as the pastor and delegates are actually representatives of the local church at the annual conference, we recommend the local church pay the expenses, in advance, of their pastor and delegates. This is to include transportation, meals, and lodging.
- 12. That each of our churches release their pastor, if on call and under the direction of the conference president and his advisory board, to hold one evangelistic meeting on a new field or in one of the weaker charges, and that the local church continue to pay his salary during his absence.

- 13. The election of conference officers shall be in the morning of the third day of conference.
- 14. Each pastor is to take an offering at each Quarterly Conference for the conference president's traveling expense. This is not to apply on budget credit but is to be receipted to Conference Work Fund.
- 15. The conference president shall be reimbursed for his traveling expense a \$.05 per mile. This is to be paid from the Conference Work Fund.
- 16. The conference president is to visit the local churches as he sees the need.
- 17. Quarterly Conference business meetings shall be held as follows:

First Quarter - Immediately after Aug. 31

Second Quarter - Immdenately after Nov. 30
Third Quarter - Immediately after Feb. 28

Fourth Quarter - Immediately after May 31

- 18. All pastors are to read these standing rules to their local churches at least one month before annual conference. Furthermore, each pastor should pay special attention to notes on the statistical blanks and to the first paragraph in particular.
- 19. The election of officers of the local church shall be held at least fifteen (15) days before the close of the fiscal year, in accordance with Paragraph 165. #4, of the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.
- 20. Pastors are to fill their pulpits through the conference session.

- 21. The conference president shall be chairman exofficio of the Campmeeting Committee
- 22. The Woman's Missionary Society President shall be a member ex officio of the Campmeeting Committee.
- 23. The conference Wesleyan Youth President shall be a member ex officio of the Campmeeting Committee.
- 24. The Missionary Board is to be a permanent committee and is to be composed of the Conference President, W.M.S. President, and the Board of Conference Trustees.
- 25. In reading the statistical blanks, read only the following items:

Rev. Warren Woolsey showed interesting and informative pictures of the work in Sierra Leone, West Africa.

SUNDAY SERVICES

Rev. V. A. Mitchell spoke in both the morning and evening services.

In the Sunday afternoon service pledges were received for the construction of a youth building to be built on the campground as soon as sufficient planning and funds are secured.

For his closing message Rev. Warren Woolsey brought to us again the responsibility of our giving the gospel to those (in Africa) who are hungry. Even as Christ said to His disciples at the fedding of the five thousand, "give ye them to eat," so He is saying to us today to give to those needing the Bread of

Life. Our lives must be yielded to Christ, broken and blessed by Him in order that we may be used for His glory.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Part I

To the members of the Ninth Annual Conference of Florida:

As we look back on the work of this past year, then we begin to realize just how much we have to thank our Heavenly Father for. Our church is being challenged from every side these days. First, it is challenged by many cults and isms that are false. Second, it is challenged by the Modernistic trend that seems to want to crowd in. Third, it is being challenged from the financial standpoint. If our church is to survive, it must do a few things. It must be careful not to have a selfish, independent attitude. It must keep humble and prayerful, yet bold against sin and wrong of every kind. It must stay true to all the teaching of the Bible and not be afraid to preach holiness.

As we grow as a church, the problems grow too. It is possible while we are busy growing, working, improving and enlarging that we neglect our main duty of keeping spiritual and winning souls. If we fail to put the spiritual part first, then we just better

stop everything.

We feel that this year marks some great progress for our Florida Conference. It became necessary to make some debts in order to get some new works going, but, on the other hand, some of our churches and parsonages have paid their way out of debt this past year. The campground in itself is a great accomplish -

ment, however, it took sacrifice on the part of some with hard work and the cooperation of everyone. At this point I want to thank all who worked, prayed, helped financially, and cooperated in seeing this project developed as it has this past year.

The advisory committee with myself spent quite some time helping the St. Petersburg Church to locate and buy a house for the pastor to live in. We also helped the Sarasota group in securing land for the new church site there. We went to Orlando and looked at several houses with Rev. Ahlbrand in aiding him in securing a house for him to live in as pastor of that church. I made a special trip to Marianna, Florida, to look over a prospective site for a church there. We have two new mission churches at this time. One is at Sarasota with Rev. Ernest Nichols acting as pastor; Mrs. Newton is heading a work at Fort Pierce, Florida. We are also in contact with a young man at Panama City who hopes to start a work for us there.

What time I was not working directly with the churches of the conference, I was working here at the campground helping to get it completed to its present stage. The Lord has been good to us in supplying our needs. We also appreciate the help our good friends from the North gave us in laboring with us on the buildings.

I trust the time will soon come that our pastors can devote full time to their churches. We are all aware of the fact that no work can be its best until it is our full time business. We trust each church will do its best to support its pastor in order that he can give full time to his church.

CONFERENCE CAMP COMMITTEE

Proceedings of the committee throughout the conference June 28, 1957

First meeting held at the Largo Church. N. Lee Shultz named as manager of the campground project. Separate financial report to be given to next annual conference. Manager to be paid \$1.25 per hour for physical labor performed on ground and buildings.

August 3, 1957

Entire committee met at campground. Caretaker ordered to secure someone with tractor and mower to mow grass on grounds. Also instructed to send letters to all lot owners requesting payment on lot if possible. Plan for and location of tabernacle discussed.

Instructed secretary to send newsletter.regarding campground to the Wesleyan Methodist.

N. Lee Shultz appointed as secretary of the committee.

Determined that a minimum of \$50 be accepted as down payment on resident lots.

Secretary instructed to draw up list of restrictions for purchasers of resident lots.

Determined that trailer space be rented for \$10 per month plus charge for electric power used.

October 22, 1957

Meeting held at campground, Rev. Foster Piatt presiding.

Giving of resident lot No. 6, Block 4, to Rev. Foster Piatt presented, and this proposition approved.

Proposed and approved that caretaker and conference president not be charged for utilities.

Determined that a dining hall-tabernacle build-ing, 30 x 60 with 24 x 30 unit on south side be planed for and construction begun as soon as possible on site directly south of caretaker's house.

Committee members assigned to oversee different items of labor on the Thanksgiving work day.

November 15, 1957

C. H. Martin's plans to build dormitory and to finance construction by lease or sale of rooms approved. Construction to begin at once.

February 3, 1958

Meeting at campground, all members present, Rev. Piatt presiding.

Permission granted to buy truck already in use

on grounds.

Secretary instructed to purchase insurance on existing buildings.

Rev. Groves instructed to investigate prices

of and where kitchen equipment could be obtained.

Decided that there be campmeeting service each of conference, Monday through Sunday innight clusive.

Decided that a winter camp be held and that the chairman of the committee attempt to get an evangelist, selected from a list furnished him by the committee. This campmeeting suggested to be held beginning the last Thursday of February and continue thru two Sundays.

March 8, 1958

Meeting held at Clearwater church, Rev. Foster Piatt presiding.

Order by committee that no more rooms be sold

in dormitory to be used as apartments.

Earl Rickey requested to work out set of rules relative to use of dormitory.

After discussion, the committee voted to construct truss type roof on dining hall building.

Changing of power lines discussed and instruct-

ed to arrange for some permanent power lines.

Voted to allow Charles Groves \$200 on lot for

his deep freeze cabinet.

Camp Manager instructed to rent any vacant room in dormitory and to charge \$1.00 per night.

Mrs. Claude Rickey given authority to purchase kitchen utensils and dishes.

Chairman announced that Rev. Virgil A. Mitchell would be the denominational representative and speaker in night services, for the coming conference.

Committee formed - Charles Groves, Earl Rickey, Mrs. Claude Rickey - to draw contract for buildings to be constructed for conference on campground, also, to draw up form for lease of lots.

No building to be erected or construction begun until blue print is approved by conference camp committee.

April 19, 1958

Meeting called by chairman, Foster Piatt.
Drawing for trusses for roof of dining hall made by
Dean Hughes presented, and the committee approved
them for use on this building.

Report on kitchen equipment given and certain items approved for purchase.

Campground Regulations

- 1. Bathing suits, shorts and slacks are not to be worn on the campgrounds.
- 2. The Conference Camp Committee will set curfew hours.
 - 3. Speed limit is 15 miles per hour.
- 4. Cabins started must be finished (externally) within 18 months. They must be maintained in
 a neat condition. The Conference Camp Committee has
 the right to charge for maintenance, mowing, and repairs which they deem necessary to perform on neglected property. Buildings which are abandoned for three
 (3) years, and after proper attempt has been made to
 notify owner, shall revert to the Florida Conference.
- 5. No cottage shall be build closer than five (5) feet to the three side lines nor closer than fifteen (15) feet to the front line.
- 6. A reasonable rate shall be charged for use of electricity, water, and garbage disposal. Garbage shall be placed in closed containers and shall not be burned.

- 7. All toilet facilities shall be connected to approved septic tanks or sewers.
- 8. No wash water shall be thrown on the ground but shall be emptied in proper drains.
- 9. All damage to property under the control of the Conference Camp Committee above the ordinary wear and tear shall be charged to the offender.
- 10. Cooking of meals to be prohibited in new dormitories.
- 11. The Conference Camp Committee or its manager shall have authority to stop any action of a nuisance nature.
- 12. In the future leasing of lots, trailers shall be parked only on those lots designated for trailer use.
- 13. Pets must be on leashes during camp activities.
- 14. Refuse can be burned only in designated areas.
- 15. The occupancy of all campground property shall have the approval of the Conference Camp Committee or its manager. Rooms shall not be vacated until properly cleaned.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

TUESDAY
