COMMITTEE REPORT ON THE CONFERENCE VISITOR

The Visitor Committee would like to share with you our concern regarding the heavy financial expense in making the paper available to our constituency. The cost of printing and distributing the Visitor was approximately \$817.49. Of this amount \$250.00 was a loan from the Conference Treasurer, that we shall be unable to repay. In addition there is an added expense of \$70.00 to be paid as a gratuity to the editor and distribution manager, from the conference budget. This means that 11 monthly issues containing 12,000 single copies were distributed to the churches at an approximate cost of \$75.00 per 1000.

Our concern is further deepened by the mediocre response of the churches to avail themselves of this expensive news service. This year we received in the Editor's office:

RETIREMENT HOME REPORT

Significant steps were taken by the Conference Missionary Board in carrying out the will of the Conference as it relates to the Retirement Home.

The special study committee appointed by the Missionary Committee was continued during the past year. They have endeavored, through the distribution of a brochure-questionnaire, which has been placed in your hand, to secure an indication of interest and need for the various levels of residence in a retirement home.

The Missionary Board, after further study of the recommendation of the 1964 Annual Conference voted to establish a retirement home.

The Committee authorized purchase of a 2½ acre building site located across the street, south of the Conference grounds, on which to build such facilities. Contract for the same is being negotiated at the present time.

The Missionary Board makes the following recommendations:

Retirement Home By-Laws

NAME: Wesley Villa.

PURPOSE: To provide retirement facilities for those wishing to retire, and to make available care for the sick, the aged, and the infirm.

ORGANIZATION: (a) The combined Conference Missionary Board of Trustees (hereinafter known as the Parent Board) shall be the Board of Review of Wesley Villa, with power to review, initiate.

or revoke any action of the Board of Managers. They shall receive quarterly reports from the Board of Managers, and approve all construction plans and methods of financing.

(b) There shall be a Board of Managers, consisting of five members, nominated by the Parent Board and elected by the conference, whose terms of office shall be for three (3) years; except that in the initial election, the first member shall be elected for a term of one year, the second and third members for two years, and the fourth and fifth members for three years.

(c) The Board of Managers shall have power to hire an Executive Manager, who shall be amenable to the Board of Managers; they shall agree with him as to salary, and shall define his duties.

(d) The Board of Managers shall have power to hire necessary staff members, agree with them as to salary, and define their duties. This includes occasional help as needed for the most efficient operation of Wesley Villa.

(e) In the process of erecting buildings, the Board of Managers shall be empowered to secure an architect and let contracts for buildings, subject to approval of the Parent Board.

(f) The Board of Managers shall have power to receive monies for Wesley Villa, and to arrange financing for its construction and operation, subject to approval of the Parent Board.

(g) The Board of Managers shall make a quarterly report to the Parent Board as to progress of construction and operation, and the Parent Board may counsel with the Board of Managers at any time, regarding any phase of the work of Wesley Villa.

(h) The Board of Managers shall have power to set rental rates, and shall determine policies and conditions of residence.

(i) The Board of Managers shall perform the duties that would normally fall to such a board, for the most efficient operation of Wesley Villa, for the good of mankind and for the glory of God.

STANDING RULES

CONFERENCE

1. **CONFERENCE AND CAMP DATE:** The Conference shall begin annually at 1:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday in August for the organization of Conference business and committee work, and continue through Saturday or until completed, and Camp shall begin the first Sunday following the beginning of Conference and continue through the second Sunday.

2. **ORDER OF BUSINESS:** Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the following order of business be followed:

(A) The front ten rows of the middle sections and the platform of the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

(B) All recommendations to travel or study be turned directly to the assistant secretary, who shall turn them to the committee on Itineracy and Orders.

(C) Business shall continue from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:30 p.m. to the hour for the orders of the day.

3. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE:** There shall be a Nominating Committee of five stationed elders, including the President as chairman ex officio and five delegates elect. There shall be an alphabetical rotation of the churches from year to year, as well as an alphabetical rotation of elders serving on the committee excluding elders' wives.

The 1966 committee shall be: C. W. Dunbar, Eunice Hunsinger, Wilford Kaufmann, Wesley Knapp and James LaRue; the delegates elect from Topeka Gage Park, Topeka North, Topeka Oakland, Wesley Center and Wesley Chapel. The duties of this committee shall be:

(A) To examine the credentials that are in their hands at the time of its first meeting.

(B) To examine all delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in to the committee after the first seating of delegates, and to report such to the Secretary, who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

(C) To nominate all Conference Officials, except the offices of President and First and Second Vice-President which shall be elected by separate ballots; all Trustees to Miltonvale Wesleyan College including their alternates as their terms expire; all Conference Trustees as their terms expire; all Standing Committees; all Personnel of all Conference Boards, except those by appointment; all Sessional Charimen and the full Statistical Committee for the following Conference; the Ministerial Association Committee; all Sessional Committees for the current Conference; all District Chairmen; and any other offices expedient to Conference business as designated by the Conference or the Conference President including the General Conference Delegates and their alternates as required.

(D) To make all written reports in the form of proposed elective ballots (copies to be supplied to each voting member of our Conference) showing the names of those nominated by said committee with space provided for other names to be added by motion from the Conference floor or written in by the individual.

4. **PRESIDENT TO APPOINT TELLERS:** Following the convening of Conference and previous to the Orders of the Day for election of Conference Officers, the President shall appoint tellers for the occasion.

5. **PRESIDENT'S DUTIES:** The Conference President's duties shall be to:

(A) Travel the Conference, visiting each church once during the year as scheduled by the President. At the request of a church or a pastor and/or at the discretion of the President, other visits may be arranged.

(B) Receive quarterly reports of the pastors, using the findings of the same for the purpose of promoting the spiritual and material welfare of the churches and the conference.

(C) Urge the proper repair and insurance of church property.

(D) Meet annually with the Board of Stewards and the Board of Trustees (or other church boards at the direction of the local pastor) for the purpose of reviewing the church's progress and emphasizing the church's financial obligations.

(E) Cooperate with the Layman's Church Extension League in raising funds for church extension.

(F) Seek out new fields for church extension and present the challenge of these fields to such groups as opportunity might afford.

6. **AUDITING OF FINANCIAL REPORTS:** All financial reports together with the books that are to be audited by the Conference Auditing Committee shall be submitted to and approved by said Committee before being read on the Conference floor.

7. **INTRODUCTION OF NEW BUSINESS:** All new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.

8. **ORDERS OF THE DAY:** The Campground-Camp Meeting Committee is permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day. Their duties shall include the preparation and publication of the Conference Schedule, the same to be printed in the "Wesleyan Visitor".

The following services are regular Orders of the Day:

Tuesday evening, Conference Sermon at 7:30 by the Conference President.

Wednesday morning, Report of the president and the treasurer followed by the election of officers.

Wednesday afternoon, Y.M.W.B. Service at 3:30.

Wednesday evening, Educational Service at 7:30.

Thursday morning, Denominational Address at 10:00.

Thursday evening, Conference Missionary Service at 7:30.

Friday morning, Memorial Service at 10:30.

Friday evening, Sunday School Service at 7:30.

Saturday evening, Youth Rally at 7:30.

Sunday morning, Ordination Service at 9:30.

9. **CAMPGROUND-CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE:** The Conference President and the President of the Wesleyan Youth shall be members ex officio of the Campground-Camp Meeting Committee.

The Campground-Camp Meeting Committee is authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.

10. ADDITIONAL DELEGATES:

(A) The delegate for an elder residing outside the bounds of the conference whose membership is with a church within the conference shall be elected by the church of which he is a member.

(B) The delegate for an elder residing outside the bounds of the conference whose church membership is with a church outside the bounds of the conference shall be elected as follows: The president shall designate the church from which the delegate shall be elected.

(C) When more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.

11. TENURE OF OFFICE: All newly elected Conference Officers shall take office at the rise of the Annual Conference session.

12. VACATIONS: The Conference President shall be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and he shall be given two weeks pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for vacation.

13. CONVEYING CHURCH PROPERTY: All instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use shall carry the official name of the church, viz., "The Kansas Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."

14. TRUSTEES AUTHORIZED: All action taken heretofore by the Trustees of the Annual Conference concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

The duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seems proper and expedient and to the interest of the Annual Conference and the local church concerning the purchase, sale mortgaging, and conveying of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference; and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

15. BOARD OF BUILDING AND LOCATION:

(A) The Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall consist of the Missionary Board and the Conference Trustees.

(B) The Missionary Board shall be composed of five elders, including the President as chairman, ex officio, and four laymen, with not more than three of the members being changed in a given year.

16. EXPENSE ALLOWANCE: The expenses of the Conference Officers and Committees incident to performing duties designated by the Conference shall be paid from their respective funds at the rate of 5¢ per mile.

17. CONFERENCE LOANS: The Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Trustees.

18. SUBSCRIPTION LISTS: All subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes shall be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W.M.S., or the Camp Meet-

ing Committee; and said Treasurers shall furnish the Conference President with a copy of each subscription list, and each pastor with a list of subscriptions from his charge.

19. CANDIDATES TO ELDERS' ORDERS: All candidates to Elders' Orders shall present the Committee on Itineracy and Orders a transcript of credits which may be accepted in lieu of the Conference course and a list of books and reading other than textbooks.

20. PRAYER CONVENTION: Each district shall hold a District Prayer Convention and the District Chairman shall be responsible for planning such conventions and announcing same in the "Wesleyan Visitor".

21. COMMITTEE ON WORLD MISSIONS: There shall be a Conference Committee on World Missions composed of the following officers: Secretary of World Missions, chairman ex officio; President of the Conference; President of the Woman's Missionary Society; Superintendent of the YMWB; President of Wesleyan Youth; Secretary of Wesleyan Men; Sunday School Secretary; and the Director of CYC.

The duties of this committee shall be to:

(A) Plan and conduct the Annual Missionary Service.

(B) Recommend to the Annual Conference ways and means of increasing the missions outreach of the conference.

(C) Recommend to the local churches ways and means of involving the entire congregation in the program of Missions as outlined by the denomination and the conference.

The method of handling the money raised in the Annual Missionary Service shall be determined by recommendation of this committee as approved by the conference and the Woman's Missionary Society.

LOCAL CHURCH

The following rules which pertain to the local churches shall be read to the membership by the pastor or a church official as appointed by the pastor at the first Quarterly Business Meeting following receipt of the Conference Minutes and at the final Quarterly Conference.

22. PASTORS PAID THROUGH CONFERENCE: The Church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he is leaving the field or not, shall be extended through the Conference and Camp Meeting period.

23. PASTOR'S MOVING EXPENSES: The church hiring a minister shall assume all responsibility of moving expense.

24. PASTOR'S EXPENSE AT ANNUAL CONFERENCE: Inasmuch as the pastor is actually a representative of the local church at the Annual Conference and camp, the local churches shall pay the expenses of the pastor and his wife, including room, board and transportation, the same to be paid in advance.

25. SUNDAY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE:

(A) The two lowest Sundays of the fiscal year shall not be counted in the Sunday School average attendance reports made to Conference.

(B) Our Sunday Schools shall determine their attendance by counting only those who arrive in time to attend a portion of the class period.

26. QUARTERLY MEETING DATES: The first quarterly meeting of the conference year is to be held three months from the closing date of the previous conference fiscal year and they are to continue throughout the year at regular three month intervals. Pastors are urgently requested to make proper provision for the observance of the Lord's Supper at these intervals.

27. PASTORS RELEASED FOR ONE MEETING: At the request of the Missionary Board a church so approached shall release its pastor for one meeting, the same to be held on a new field or one of the weaker charges under the direction of said Board, and the local church shall pay its pastor's salary during the engagement. The pastor so engaged shall receive money for the special meeting expenses incurred during such employment, the same to be paid by the church or charge being served, or by the Missionary Board.

28. PASTOR NOMINATES STEWARD: The pastor shall be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

29. REPORTING OF ALL CONTRIBUTIONS: The Conference President and each pastor shall urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of the more equitable distribution of funds.

30. VACATIONS: Each church shall grant its pastor a two Sunday leave of absence from his work, that at least two full weeks might be spent for vacation and the church shall give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by the pastor and church for vacation.

31. MONEY TO TREASURER: The local treasurers are urged to send all budget remittances monthly to the Conference Treasurer. Such remittances should be made in whole dollars when possible.

32. MINISTER'S RETIREMENT:

(A) Each church is urged to pay its superannuated pension plan budget assessment in full, in order that superannuated pension plan members may continue to receive their pension benefits.

(B) Since the pension plan has been discontinued, it is urged that the church pay at least one-half of the social security payment for participating pastors. Such payment shall be based on the pastor's net church income.

33. CHURCH DELEGATE EXPENSE: The local church shall pay the room, board, and transportation expenses of all authorized delegates to the Annual Conference, the same to be paid in advance.

34. LAYMAN'S CHURCH EXTENSION: To implement the Layman's Church Extension League, every pastor shall appoint a layman to serve as local secretary for the league and inform the conference League Chairman of that appointment.

35. CHURCH EXTENSION LOAN FUND: One Sunday per month shall be designated by each church for receiving a special Sunday School offering, the same to be given to the Missionary Board for church extension and to help weaker churches not yet self-supporting, and the pastor and superintendent shall help stimulate the giving in these offerings. These monies are to be loaned without interest under the supervision of the Missionary Board.

36. UNLEAVENED BREAD: All our churches shall use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We sug-

gest the following recipe: One-half cup of flour, one rounded tablespoon of butter, moisten with water enough to roll. Mark in $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch squares and bake as pie dough. This recipe will serve 65 to 70 people.

37. ROOM RESERVATIONS: Any person reserving rooms in Conference or School dormitories shall pay room rent for one year in advance. In the event the room is not to be used at Conference, the party shall inform the one in charge by the opening day of Conference, in which case monies received shall be refunded provided the one in charge is notified on or before the first day of Conference.

38. SOLICITATION OF FUNDS:

(A) Requests by and plans of all organizations and individuals desiring to visit the churches of the Conference for the purpose of soliciting funds, shall be referred to and cleared by a committee composed of the President of the Conference, the President of the W.M.S., and the Treasurer of the Missionary Board, before the completion of such plans with the local churches.

(B) We urgently recommend that 50% of all monies solicited from the churches of the Conference for projects not sponsored by the Conference or the Wesleyan Methodist Denomination shall be retained by the local church involved, and contributed to Denominational Missions or to Conference Church Extension.

39. VOTE ON THE PASTOR:

(A) The Churches shall conduct their pastoral vote between the fourth Sunday in May and the second Sunday in June. If for any reason a church or pastor deems it necessary to hold the pastoral vote at an earlier date, approval must be secured from the Conference President and his Advisory Board.

(B) To avoid uncertainty and to allow equality among all churches and pastors, it is strongly urged that the pastor who is not returning the following year refrain from giving such information to his church until first advising the Conference President.

(C) Each pastor shall answer any return call to a church within a period of one week after receiving said call (unless the Committee agrees to an extension which shall not exceed one extra week).

(D) Each pastor shall answer any church extending a new call within a period of ten days and in each instance the pastor shall immediately inform the Conference President of his decision in writing.

40. PARSONAGE RENT: It shall be the responsibility of the local trustees and the pastor to determine the allowance for parsonage rent. This allowance shall reflect the current local rental scale for comparable facilities.

41. HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE:

(A) Since the group hospitalization plan adopted by the Conference could well effect the economy of the local church, it is urged that each church pay at least half of their pastor's group insurance premium.

(B) In the event of a change of pastors, the church's responsibility shall include the August premium.

42. NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF EVANGELICALS: We urge each church, if at all possible, to make a contribution annually to the N.A.E.

PASTOR

43. **CALLING LIST:** The Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all homes connected with the church and Sunday school, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number; the same to be kept for his work while on the pastorate and to give to his successor on the field.

44. **PASTORS VACATING PARSONAGE:** Each pastor when moving from his charge shall vacate the parsonage during the first week following the close of Camp Week or at such time as designated by the Annual Conference or the President and his Advisory Board.

45. **REPORTING STEWARD'S NAMES:** Each pastor shall be required to furnish to the Conference President the name and address of the Chairman of the Board of Stewards of the local church before the end of the first quarter of the conference year.

GENERAL**46. FISCAL YEAR:**

(A) The closing date of the fiscal year shall be June 30, and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by July 18. We further request that he forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman not later than July 25.

(B) Delegate credentials, a copy of the statistical report and the report of the Minister to the Annual Conference (sometimes referred to as the Character Report) should be sent to the Conference President not later than July 20.

47. WESLEYAN VISITOR:

(A) The Conference shall publish the periodical known as the "Wesleyan Visitor," the single subscription price to be \$1.00 per year.

(B) The Publication Board shall consist of the Conference President and Treasurer and the Editor.

(C) Each Church of the Conference shall receive one subscription for every two full members and shall remit at the rate of 75c per copy to the Editor.

(D) The "Visitor" shall be sent to the General Superintendents, Editor of the Wesleyan Methodist and to such other Miltonvale Area Conference Officials as the Editor and the Conference President deem advisable.

48. MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION:

(A) The Annual Convention of the Ministerial Association shall begin on the second Tuesday of March and continue through Thursday of the same week.

(B) An offering equivalent to 25¢ per member shall be received in each local church to be sent to a member of the Ministerial Association for Convention expenses.

(C) The Ministerial Association Committee with the President of the Conference shall be authorized to engage Convention speakers as for in advance as it may seem advisable.

49. **MORAL REFORM:** In recognition of a growing indifference to the social and political sins of our time, and a concern for the preservation of the foundations upon which has been built our Church

and Country, we as Wesleyan Methodists strongly urge the following positions:

A. DRUNKENNESS: For us to remain a nation worthy to be called both civilized and Christian it is necessary that we oppose with all available means the use of intoxicating beverages. Total abstinence, be it assuredly known, is the position of Wesleyan Methodist people everywhere.

B. IMMORALITY: During the decline and to the end of historic civilizations there has always been an accompanying break-down of morals. Obscene literature, vulgar language, maudlin jokes, lewdness and perversion quite common today should be a warning to us. We deplore any tendency to minimize such things or to shrug off their seriousness.

C. COMMUNISM: No thoughtful person is unaware of the fact that Communism is making steady gains in all the world. We call for an end to indifference and would urge upon all a greater fear and a better understanding of this great evil. We urge a more vigorous opposition to it.

D. ROMANISM: Let it not be forgotten that self-styled and admittedly unchangeable Romanism is as convinced today as ever in the past that Protestants are "heretic" and undesirable. In countries where her power makes it possible she proceeds today, as always to persecute and would, if possible exterminate the so-called heretic. Respect for our neighbor should not blind us to what he could and may yet be induced to do to us, should political power enough to accomplish it ever fall into his hand.

E. MATERIALISM: The word "Materialism," like the word "Worldliness" is a bit ambiguous. For the most part they mean the same thing. Reduced to their simple meaning, either word has to do with a common trend to be possessed by possessions, snared by the sensual, and fascinated by foolishness. Mere THINGS, like the husks on which the prodigal fed, do not satisfy. We should remain careful lest they become too important to us.

F. ONE-WORLDISM: Since UNESCO propaganda has largely made patriotism obsolete and loyalty to the American Flag only secondary to that of the United Nations, be it known that patriotically Wesleyans are Americans and proud to remain so. We remain believers in the "free-enterprise" system as opposed to all forms of State Socialism. We believe in traditional so-called "state's rights" and that the Federal Government, if becoming too dominant, may cease to be "by, of and for the people." Instead of remaining the servant of the people of sovereign States, an overmuch centralized Government may well become the master of the people.

G. SABBATH DESECRATION: We decry the widespread practices that make the sacred become secular. Let us hold fast our belief that the Sabbath is sacred and holy unto God and refrain from buying and selling or seeking worldly pleasures on God's day.

We urge that the moral reform items be read before the congregation of each local church or be printed in the local church bulletin at least once each year.

STANDING RULES

1. The W.M.S. Treasurer's books and the Y.M.W.B. Treasurer's books shall be audited prior to the convening of the Annual Conference.
2. The incoming presidents for the new year shall be seated as voting members of the W.M.S. Annual Conference.
3. The Pastor's wives and lady ministers of the Conference and the Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall be seated within the Conference Bar and have speaking privileges. The Presidents Emeritus shall be seated as voting members.
4. There shall be three delegates to Area Conventions.
5. Should a delegate be incapacitated, the first alternate elected shall fill the vacancy, proceeding through the list of delegates until the list of delegates is filled.
6. Any person reserving rooms in Conference or school dormitories shall observe the following:
 - a. That room rent be paid one year in advance.
 - b. That if the room is not to be used at Conference, the party shall inform the one in charge by the opening day of the Conference.
 - c. That there shall be no sub-renting of rooms.
 - d. That the monies received shall be refunded if the one in charge is notified on or before the first day of Conference.
7. The Nominating Committee shall be made up of the Executive Committee and two delegates from the societies beginning with Abilene and Ancell (now Scott City) in 1958 and rotating in alphabetical order (Hall and Heber for 1966) to:

Y. M. W. B. WORKSHOPS

On Tuesday, August 3, 1965, the first of a series of Y.M.W.B. Workshops was conducted by the Conference Superintendent, Mrs. Oletha Hoerner, in the Missionary Hall, from 4 to 5 p.m.

The workshop opened with Mrs. Hoerner introducing three visualized songs and Mrs. Buena Delehoy accompanied on the piano. Miss Vivian Haun led in prayer. Program outlines for the workshops, and notebooks compiled by our Superintendent were passed to each one present. Roll call was taken and addresses checked. Mrs. Hoerner reported on the seven rallies during the year with eight districts taking part. A total of 577 children and 127 adults attended the rallies. Approximately 120 children and one adult knelt at the altar for prayer. An informal discussion and analysis of report forms completed the period.

On Wednesday Eve., Mrs. Opal Roseti of Abilene, presented the New Memory verses, and an informal discussion on ways and means of presenting the Y.M.W.B. memory work, including the great missionaries and song were discussed. A new song "Wonderful World" to the tune of Blessed Assurance was introduced, also a prayer chorus, to the tune of America. New ideas and ways of backing flannelgraph figures were discussed, including, flocking guns, Redi-sued and the use of plastic bags between the picture and flannel. The Public Y.M.W.B. service opened with the singing of a congregational song, "Send the Light", led by Mrs. Georgia Hall, with Miss Janet Garlow at the piano. Rev. Robert Lytle led in prayer, after which "Uncle Lynn" led 96 children in the singing of several choruses, closing with "His Name is Wonderful". Approximately 110 children were present in the service. A boys quartet composed of Don Garlow, Bill and Bob Garlow, and Daniel Seitz, of the Morgan Chapel Band, sang several numbers.

The names of 16, 100% Bands were read with the conference award going to the Miltonvale Band. The Eskridge Band received 2 reading course books as an award for second place winner.

The highlight of the service was the final play off between the winners from the various rallies, over the memory verses for 1963-

64 and 1964-65.

Those taking part in the contest and representing the winning bands from their district were: Judy Heck, Salina, representing the Abilene district; Gary Delehoy, Wichita Westside, Wichita district; Don Garlow, Morgan Chapel, Concordia district; Betty Attwood, Williams Chapel, Topeka district; David Anderson, Gas City, Ottawa and Chanute districts; Patty Rose Vanderfoot, Kansas City, First, Kansas City district; and Linda Beals, Clay Center the Miltonvale district. Judy Heck from Salina, was the winner and received a Bible. Each child taking part received a copy of the Illustrated New Testament.

An offering was taken at the close of the service for Child Support, which amounted to \$79.00. The service was dismissed with prayer.

Y. M. W. B. PLAN OF WORK

We, the Y.M.W.B. Executive committee, submit the following plan of work: We recommend:

1. That by careful study of the Plan of Work, and Efficiency Standard, each Superintendent strive to make a goal of 100%.

2. For memory work — The names and stations of our missionaries; the songs, Scriptures and great missionaries as listed in the July issues of the Young Missionary.

3. The solicitation of the entire Sunday School and church as members of the Y.M.W.B. Those through 13 as active members and all over 13 as honorary members.

4. That the bands have at least one meeting each month, and a public meeting once every three months when possible.

5. That the money be sent quarterly to the Superintendent, Mrs. Oletha Hoerner, 216 N. E. 4th, Abilene, Kansas 67410. Quarters ending September 30, December 31, March 31; and the Superintendents books be closed immediately following the June meeting. The fourth quarters remittance and yearly report, sent not later than June 30.

6. That each band make a 5% gain in membership and raise \$5 more in band credit funds.

7. That the Y.M.W.B. Plan of Work be read publicly at least once a year.

8. That at Conference an award be given to the band that has met the largest of the following requirements:

- (1) For having reached a goal of 100% on the Efficiency Standard.

- (2) For having the greatest percent increase in membership (must be at least 5% increase).

- (3) For raising the largest amount of money per member.

- (4) For bringing a poster or membership chart to conference.

- (5) For bringing a scrapbook, made by a Y.M.W.B. active member.

- (6) For at least 50% of the active membership memorizing the assigned scripture.

- (7) For fulfilling obligations mentioned in items 7, 10, 11 and 12, of this plan of work.

STANDING RULES

The Standing Rules shall be read to the local within 30 days after conference and within 30 days of the closing of the fiscal year.
Conference

1. **PRESIDENT'S DUTIES:** The Wesleyan Youth President's duties shall be:

A. At the discretion of the Wesleyan Youth Conference Executive Council, the Conference Youth President shall visit each district once during the year. The itinerary of visitation shall be worked out with the District Chairmen so that mileage expenses may be kept at a minimum.

B. We recommend that the President attend the Youth sessions of such National Conventions as he and the Council would deem advisable, in order to keep posted on current youth trends. His expenses shall be paid from the conference Promotional Fund.

C. We recommend that the President have his financial report audited by the annual conference Auditing Committee.

2. **OFFICERS' EXPENSES:** The expenses of the President and the Executive Council incurred in the interest of the Conference Wesleyan Youth shall be paid from the Conference Promotional Fund. (See Financial Report.)

3. **CONFERENCE YOUTH RALLY:** The Conference Youth Rally shall be held Saturday evening of the week of conference, such meeting to be planned by the Executive Council. An attendance award shall be presented to the district earning the highest number of points. (The point schedule shall be determined by the Executive Council.)

4. **BIBLE QUIZ CONTEST:** A portion of the Annual Conference Youth Rally shall be given to a General Conference Bible Quiz and/or a Conference Bible Quiz Contest in lieu of a scheduled General Conference Contest.

A. The Conference Wesleyan Youth Vice President shall act in the capacity of Conference Bible Quiz Director to work with the Executive Committee in selection of the book to be used and to make necessary preparation.

B. District Bible Contest teams' travel expenses to all Conference playoffs shall be paid from the Conference Fund at the rate of five cents per mile one way. It is suggested that board and room expense shall be paid by the respective districts.

5. **EFFICIENCY STANDARD AWARD:** An award shall be given to the "A" Local which earns the highest points on efficiency standard. This award will be determined by percent of gain in case of a tie for first place.

6. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE:** There shall be a nominating committee composed of the Conference W. Y. President as chairman ex-officio, the annual conference president as a member ex-officio, and the first delegates-elect from Paola, Phillipsburg. and Salina and pastors, Raymond Anderson, John Betters, and George Beals. (Locals and pastors rotate alphabetically.) The duties of the committee shall be:

A. To examine all credentials and certificates.

B. To nominate all sessional committees for the current year, and committee chairmen for the ensuing year.

C. To nominate all Conference W. Y. officers (excepting W. Y. President) and all W. Y. delegates to the quadrennial convention, the same to be placed on a printed ballot.

D. To nominate all District Chairmen.

E. To nominate members of the standing committees.

7. **ANNUAL WESLEYAN YOUTH CONFERENCE:**

A. The Wesleyan Youth Conference shall begin annually at 8:45 a.m. on Saturday of the annual Conference and continue at 1:30 p.m. Saturday, 8:45 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Monday, and 8:45 a.m. Tuesday. All unfinished business shall be at the call of the chair.

B. The first ten rows of the tabernacle and the recording table shall constitute the conference bar.

8. **ORDERS OF THE DAY:** Orders of the day for the Annual Conference shall be:

A. Saturday 8:45 a.m.

1. Report of the Nominating Committee.

2. Report of the President.

3. Report of the District Chairmen and Officers.

4. Report of the Youth Camp Directors.

B. Monday 8:45—Election of Officers

C. Wednesday morning—Youth Hike

9. **PUBLIC RELATIONS DIRECTOR:** The Public Relations Director shall be a member of the Executive Council. His duties shall be:

A. To promote the interest of youth throughout the conference.

B. To serve as Wesleyan Youth Devotional Chairman for the Annual Conference as well as for the Youth Conference and Camp.

10. **STANDING RULES MAILED:** A copy of the changes in Standing Rules that pertain to local and district business shall be mimeographed and mailed to the local presidents immediately following the closing of Wesleyan Youth Conference, by the Kansas Conference Wesleyan Youth Secretary.

District

11. **YOUTH CAMPS:**

A. All Youth Camp Committees, programs, officers and work-

ers shall be approved by the Conference Executive Council.

B. Youth Camp committees shall be composed of not less than five members.

C. Members of the Executive Council whose churches are included in the Kansas Youth Camp shall serve on the Kansas Youth Camp Committee.

D. Pastors and District Chairmen shall serve as the Youth Camp Committee for District Camps (Missouri and Colorado) and the District Youth Camp Director shall be elected by the District Youth Camp Committee.

Local

12. **YOUTH WEEK:** Each local is urged to sponsor a Youth Week program. The Executive Council shall be responsible for all activities. Where Evangelistic help is secured the evangelist, advertising, and financing are to be approved by the Advisory Committee of the church.

13. **LEADERS:** We urge that leaders for Wesleyan Youth services be carefully chosen and their names with lesson topics be posted quarterly. It is recommended that the President lead at least once each quarter.

14. **MISSIONARY MEETING:** Emphasis should be given to the Missionary Meeting of the Wesleyan Youth, noting that the offering received applies on Church Budget and is divided 25 percent to World Missions, 25 percent to Church Extension and Evangelism, and 50 percent to Education.

15. **EDUCATIONAL SUNDAY:** Emphasis should be placed on the disciplinary provision for an offering on Wesleyan Youth Educational Sunday, the third Sunday in July. All educational budget money received during the summer quarter may be credited to the Wesleyan Youth.

16. **WESLEYAN YOUTH SUBSCRIPTION MONTH:** Special emphasis shall be given to the circulation of the Wesleyan Youth (both new and renewal subscriptions) during the month of November. It is recommended that all members of the Local Executive Council have a subscription of the Wesleyan Youth.

17. **MONEY TO TREASURER:** All locals sending money to the Conference Treasurer shall remit the same quarterly by check or money order rather than small change. Remittance slips should be used and filled out properly. This remittance shall be mailed within five days following the close of the quarter.

18. **CONFERENCE REPRESENTATION:** Attention shall be given to local representation at the Annual Wesleyan Youth Conference.

A. The newly elected President or Vice President.

B. Two delegates. (One additional delegate for locals whose membership exceeds twenty-five.)

C. The Pastor.

D. In case there is no Wesleyan Youth Local, the pastor may appoint a representative (age 13-40).

19. **FISCAL YEAR:** The Fiscal Year shall close the thirtieth of June and all monies sent to the Conference Youth Treasurer must be postmarked by the fifth of July; the conference treasurer's books

and financial statement shall be sent to the Conference auditor the first week of the Annual Conference. All reports are to be sent to the Conference Youth Secretary by the twentieth of July. These include:

- A. Annual Report.
- B. Delegate Credentials.
- C. Efficiency Standard Report.

20. **TABERNACLE FUND:** One service each conference year shall be designated for the promotion of the Conference Wesleyan Youth Tabernacle Fund. (See finance report)
