Honor Roll awards were presented to 14 Bands of the Conference who achieved 100% efficiency on the Standard. The Mankato Band was given a set of reading books in recognition of their highest percentage of gain of any Band in the Conference.

Rev. R. S. Nicholson, Jr., Missionary to Japan on furlough, was introduced, who in turn presented three Japanese pastors, who have been students at Houghton College. John Tsutada, Benjamin Saoshiro, and Samuel Arai each spoke in turn and testified of the grace of God in their lives. In stirring words and evident conviction they told of their conversion, entire sanctification and call to preach the Gospel. These three experiences are considered essential to any definite Japanese testimony. The Japanese trio sang "Jesus Loves Me" and "Jesus Lover of My Soul" in Japanese.

Rev. Nicholson then gave a very vivid picture of the needs and problems of Japan as a mission field. He reported that 55% of the ninety million population of Japan are under 25 years of age and that four great forces are now at work to capture the minds and hearts of this youthful nation. These forces are the old way of religion, Roman Catholicism, Communism, and Christianity. All are of about equal strength at the present time. Rev. Nicholson told that the key problem in the establishment of churches in Japan is to find and have young men who are saved and sanctified and called of God to pastor a flock. He presented the pressing need of a new Bible School and said that there are now 250 young people waiting to enter such a school when provided. An offering in cash and pledges was received for the new Bible School.

Another year is passed into history and under the merciful providences of God we have met in this eighty-fifth session of our Annual Conference to give our reports and plan for the future. During these eighty-five years God has never forsaken His people. He has always been sufficient for every need. With these many years of labor put into the building of our Conference we are keenly aware that the compiling of our reports should reveal much greater success for He has called us to bring forth fruit.

Throughout the year we have endeavored to carry out the task assigned by the Conference. The loyal support and co-operation of pastors and people is very commendable and deeply appreciated. Your thoughtfulness and the generosity of the churches in taking offerings to assist with the extra medical expenses this year were a real blessing and lifted quite a load. The offerings were so liberal that the expenses were cared for and about twenty percent left over to invest in God's cause. Your prayers were most appreciated and we thank God for the way He has answered.

A new church was organized with twelve full members at Independence, Kansas. A church building was purchased last fall and a parsonage bought this Spring. The church is showing good signs of progress. They are making the payments on the parsonage and have voted to assume full support of the pastor by September.

A brick veneer church was built at Augusta, Kansas. Though this group has not yet organized very good interest is manifested in all the services. This good people have carried a heavy financial responsibility from the very beginning.

The first unit of a fine new church was constructed at Englewood, Colorado. On the first Sunday the new church was used a near capacity crowd was present.

The Miltonvale Church has been under construction and excellent progress have been made for the amount of finances involved. They are to be commended for the large amount raised.

The Greeley church is in the process of building an enlarged church. A new parsonage was purchased at Kansas City Mo. Several others are in the process of securing building plans. We are thankful that more has been paid on indebtednesses this year. I believe the two churches in St. Louis have raised the largest amounts for this purpose. We hope there will be some mortgage burning services next year.

As we face our day with all its needs and opportunities let us earnestly seek the leadership of the Spirit in all our plans.

Resolutions

The following resolutions which pertain to the local churches shall be read by the pastors to their people within six weeks after the receipt of the Conference Minutes and at least four weeks before the Annual Conference.

1. **Fiscal Year.** Resolved, that the closing date of the fiscal year be June 30 and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by July 15. We further suggest that he forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman not later than July 25.

2. **Conference and Camp date.** Resolved, that the Conference begin annually at 1:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday in August for the organizing of Conference business and committee work, and continue through Saturday night or until completed, and that Camp begin the first Sunday morning following the beginning of Conference and continue through the second Sunday.

3. **Order of Business.** Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the following procedure of business be followed:

First, the first ten rows of the middle sections and the platform of the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

Second, all recommendation to travel or study be turned directly to the assistant secretary, who shall turn them to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Third, Ministers reports shall be given immediately after Officer's reports are given and continue whenever other business will permit.

Fourth, the following order of business shall be followed in each session:

- a. Roll call
- b. Minutes
- c. Communications
- d. Special Committees
- e. Standing Committees
- f. Sessional Committees
- g. Unfinished business
- h. New business
- i. Minister's reports

Fifth, business shall continue from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:30 p.m. to the hour for the Orders of the Day.

4. **Nominating Committee.** Resolved, that we elect a committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and five delegates elect, from five churches designated by the Conference to:

First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting.

Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of the Conference.

Third, examine all delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in to the committee after the first seating of delegates, and to report such to the Secretary who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

Fourth, nominate the personnel of all the Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference.

Fifth, nominate the Committee Chairmen for next year, including the chairman of the Ministerial Association.

Sixth, nominate the District chairmen.

5. **President to appoint tellers.** Resolved, that following the convening of Conference and previous to the Orders of the Day for election of Conference Officers, the President shall appoint tellers for the occasion.

6. **Election of Conference Officers.** Resolved, that the election of Conference officers be held the second day of Conference immediately following the morning devotional period.

7. **President's Duties.** Resolved, that the Conference President shall first travel the conference, visiting each church at least twice during the year; the first series of visits to be two services per church, and the last series, one service per church. The time of the president's visits shall be established by a committee on "President's Schedule", who shall plan approximately one month of visitation to be followed by approximately two weeks at home for office work, administrative duties, etc. This plan of rotating field and office work is to be followed throughout the year; with cognizance taken of conventions, holidays, etc; **second**, be it further resolved that the president shall secure quarterly reports of the pastors, using the findings of the same for the purpose of promoting the spiritual and material welfare of the churches; **third**, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property; **fourth**, the president may upon his own initiative or upon the request of the Board of Stewards of the Pastor of a local church call a meeting to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church; **fifth**, raise funds for the Church Extension Program.

8. **Auditing of Financial Reports.** Resolved, that all financial reports together with the books that are to be audited by the Conference Auditing Committee be submitted to said Committee before being read on the Conference floor.

9. **Introduction of New Business.** Resolved that all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.

10. **Orders of the Day.** Resolved that the Camp Meeting and Camp-ground Committees be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the

"Visitor."

Be it further resolved that the following services be fixed as permanent Orders of the Day:

Tuesday Evening, Conference sermon at 7: 30 by the Conference President.

Wednesday evening, Education Service 7: 30.

Thursday evening, Public service of the W.M.S. at 7: 30.

Friday evening, Sunday School service at 7: 30.

Sunday morning, 9: 30, Ordination service.

11. **Camp Meeting Committee.** Resolved, that the President of the W.Y.P.S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

12. **Evangelistic Help.** Resolved, that the Campground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.

13. **Additional Delegate.** Resolved, that when more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegates.

14. **Superannuate Service.** Resolved, that one public service in each Annual Camp Meeting or Conference period be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Superannuate Board to arrange for such service.

15. **1% assessment to be paid.** Resolved, that effective at the beginning of Conference year 1955, every active minister of the Kansas Conference receiving an appointment by the Conference shall be required to pay 1% assessment on the total receipts for the current conference year as determined by the rules and regulations of the Superannuate Pension Plan of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America; membership in the plan being optional with the minister.

16. **Tenure of Office.** Resolved, that all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of Conference.

17. **Pastors Paid Through Conference.** Resolved, that the Church's financial obligation to the pastor whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through the Conference and Camp Meeting Period.

18. **Pastor's Moving Expense.** Resolved, that the church hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.

19. **Pastor's Expense at Annual Conference.** Resolved, that inasmuch as the pastor is actually a representative of the local Church at the Annual Camp and Conference, that the local churches pay the expense of the Pastor and his Wife, including room, board and transportation, the same to be paid in advance.

20. **Sunday School Attendance.** Resolved, that the two Sundays of Conference and Camp not be counted School average attendance reports,

made to Conference.

21. **Quarterly Meeting Dates.** Resolved, that the first quarterly meeting of the conference year be held three months from the closing date of the previous conference year and that they continue throughout the year at regular three month intervals.

22. **Pastors Released for Meeting.** (A.) Resolved, that at the request of the Missionary Board a church so approached shall release its pastor for one meeting, the same to be held on a new field or one of the weaker charges under the direction of said Board, and that the local church pay its pastor's salary during such engagement. (B.) That the pastor so engaged shall receive money for the special meeting expenses incurred during such employment, the same to be paid by the church or charge being served, or by the Missionary Board.

23. **Pastor Nominates Steward.** Resolved, that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

24. **Reporting of all Contributions.** Resolved, that the Conference President and each pastor urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of more equitable distribution of funds.

25. **Vacations.** Resolved, that the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for his vacation.

Resolved, that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be spent for vacation and that the church give him one weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by pastor and church for vacation.

26. **Money to Treasurer.** Resolved, that the treasurers be urged to send all remittances to the Conference Treasurer in whole dollars when possible. That the local treasurers send budget money each quarter to the Conference Treasurer.

27. **Calling List.** Whereas, most of the friends and members of our local churches are won through personal contact by the pastors; and whereas, many of these friends and prospective members are lost in the changing from one pastor to another because the incoming pastor does not know of these people nor their interests in the church;

Be it resolved that the Conference shall ask each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday school listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number; the same to be kept for his work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

28. **Church Delegate Expense.** Resolved, that the local church pay

the Annual Conference church Delegate's room, board and transportation expenses, the same to be paid in advance.

29. **Church Extension.** Resolved, that one Sunday per month be designated by each church for the receiving of a special Sunday School offering, the same to be given to the Missionary Board for church extension and to help weaker churches not yet self-supporting, and that the pastor and superintendent help stimulate the giving in these offerings. That these monies are to be loaned without interest under the supervision of the Missionary Board.

30. **Conference Visitor.** (A.) Resolved, that the Conference shall publish the publication known as the Conference Visitor. (B.) That each Sunday school of the Conference pay a minimum of \$2.00 to supplement the subscription income of the Visitor, the same to be sent to the editor. That each church so responding shall receive one subscription per 50 cents sent in. (C.) That each church elect a subscription solicitor to the Conference Visitor.

31. **Conveying Property.** Resolved, that all instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use, carry the official name of the church viz., "The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."

32. **Trustees Authorized.** Resolved, that all action taken heretofore by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meeting of such Annual Conferences concerning the purchase of conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such action had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, that the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seem proper and expedient and to the interest of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveying of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

33. **Board of Building and Location.** Resolved, that the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location consist of the Missionary Board and the Conference Trustees.

34. **Conference Loans.** Resolved, that the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Trustees.

35. **Subscription Lists.** Resolved, that all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the

Treasurers of the Conference, the W.M.S. or the Camp Meeting Committee and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with the copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor with a list of subscriptions from his charge.

36. **Unleavened Bread.** Resolved, that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-half cup of flour, one rounded tablespoon butter, moisten with water enough to roll. Mark in $\frac{1}{2}$ inch squares and bake as pie dough. This recipe will serve 65-70 people.

37. **New Resolutions.** Resolved, that all proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions, to be considered at the next Conference, be printed in the Conference Visitor at least sixty days before the next session of Conference.

All proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions not so printed shall require a two-thirds vote to pass.

38. **Ministerial Association.** Resolved, that the Annual Convention of the Ministerial Association be held on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in March of each conference year.

Provided also, that an offering equivalent to 25¢ per member be taken in each local church, to be sent to the Chairman of the Ministerial Association. Such monies shall be used to defray the traveling expense of the pastors whose salary is \$1850 or less, at the rate of 2¢ per mile, round trip; also that the pastor and his wife from said churches be given \$1.00 each per day for meals.

Be it further resolved, that pastors from the more distant churches that are over 200 miles from the Convention be paid 2¢ per mile in excess of 400 miles round trip, irrespective of salary.

39. **Prayer Convention.** Resolved, that each district hold a District Prayer Convention, and that the District Chairmen shall be responsible for planning such Conventions, the time and place to be announced in an issue of the Visitor.

40. **Candidates to Elders Orders.** Resolved, that all candidates to Elders Orders present the Committee on Itineracy and Orders a transcript of credits which may be accepted in lieu of the Conference Course and a list of books and reading other than textbooks.

41. **Pastors vacating parsonage.** Resolved, that each pastor when moving from his charge, shall vacate the parsonage during the first week following the close of camp week or at such other time as designated by the Annual Conference (or the president and his Advisory Board.)

42. **Statistical Committee.** Resolved, that at each Annual Conference session the ministerial members of the statistical committee for the following year shall be elected. The delegate lay members of the committee to be elected from churches designated by the Annual Conference, or by the Conference President and his Advisory Board.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to the Delegates and Representatives to the 31st Annual Session of the Kansas Conference Wesleyan Youth.

For the fourth and final year, we are called upon to give an account of our stewardship as Conference Wesleyan Youth President. We humbly submit this abbreviated report. A more detailed report was read and accepted on the Conference floor.

District Visitation

Nine of the ten Districts were contacted this year. In eight of the Districts the program pre-arranged with the District Leaders last Conference, was followed with modifications in some cases. Rev. Wayne Caldwell, ably assisted the President in this itinerary.

A Conference-wide project in co-operation with the Districts was the purchasing of photographic and projection equipment. A Revere "555" 35 mm. projector, Argus C-3 35 mm. camera, screen and light meter make up this project.

"God's Volunteers"

The committee recommended a survey in Independence, Kansas. This was carried out in co-operation with the Theological Department of Miltonvale College. Some 100 blocks were given a church census-survey, and the Church's Responsibility List was turned to the Pastor, Rev. J. F. Harrington.

The committee further recommended financial assistance in securing musical and evangelistic help at the other new work of Augusta, Kansas.

"Committees, Conventions and Camps"

1. Attended all the meetings of the Camp Meeting Committee, of which the President is ex-officio member.
2. Attended and assisted in the quadrennial convention at Fairmount, Indiana.
3. Attended the Youth Commission sessions of the National Association of Evangelicals Convention in Chicago, Ill.
4. Attended and assisted in the Miltonvale Area Advance. (Youth section)
5. Directed the 1955 Conference Youth Camp at Miltonvale, Kansas.

Mail and Miles

There were some 100 pieces of correspondence sent out to local, District, Conference, Area and General leaders.

We travelled some 4,250 miles in relation to Conference Youth work.

This Conference

As we now take up another duty, that of presiding over this annual session, we do so with a sense of responsibility before God. We are here, not just to mechanically grind out reports but to examine our statistics and records and outline our program under the guidance of the Holy Spirit who was promised to come upon Sons and Daughters in those last days. And as our banner suggests, may we Kansas Wesleyan Youth be United for Truth—studying to show ourselves approved unto God, workmen that needeth not be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth, until many, many Youth of these Central States shall become Wesleyan Youth.

SUGGESTIONS FOR WESLEYAN YOUTH

The local president shall read these suggestions to the society within 30 days after conference and 30 days before conference.

Local:

1. That each society sponsor a Youth Revival, the Executive Council being responsible for securing the evangelist, advertising and financing the meeting.

2. That the leaders for Wesleyan Youth services be carefully chosen and the leader's names with lesson topics posted quarterly. It is recommended that the President lead at least once a quarter.

3. That emphasis be given to the Missionary Meeting of the Wesleyan Youth noting that the offering received applies on Church Budget and is divided 50% to Foreign Missions, 25% to Home Missions, and 25% to Education.

4. That emphasis be placed on the offering of Wesleyan Youth Educational Sunday, which is the third Sunday in July. All educational budget money received during the summer quarter may be credited to the Wesleyan Youth.

5. That all societies sending money to the Conference Treasurer remit the same quarterly by check or money order rather than small change, and that remittance slips be used and filled out properly.

6. That attention be given to local representation at the Annual Wesleyan Youth Conference:

A. The newly elected President or Vice President.

B. Two delegates. (One additional delegate for societies whose membership exceeds 25.)

C. The Pastor.

D. In case there is no local Wesleyan Youth organization, the Pastor may appoint a representative (age 13-40).

7. That the fiscal year close the thirtieth of June and that all monies

sent to the Conference Youth Treasurer be postmarked by the third of July and all reports be sent to the Conference Youth Secretary by the tenth of July. These include:

- A. The Annual Report
- B. Delegate Credentials
- C. Efficiency Standard Report

8. That each society endeavor to bring a poster related to youth work to Conference. The poster to be judged by the Executive Council and suitable awards presented to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners.

9. That the local president and adult counselor receive the Conference Visitor, the subscription to be paid from the society treasury.

10. That the Moral Reform report of the Annual Conference be read within 30 days after receiving the Minutes.

11. That one service be designated for the promotion of Conference Church Extension Revolving fund and the raising of the Church Extension apportionment. (See Finance Report)

District:

12. That each district plan at least three Conventions a year, one of which shall be under the direction of the Conference President, and that the District Chairmen be responsible for making a report of these conventions to the Conference Visitor.

13. That the Conference Wesleyan Youth President work out the District visitation itinerary with the District Chairman to the end that mileage expense may be reduced.

Conference:

14. That a Youth Rally be held Saturday of Conference Week at 7:30 p.m., such meeting to be planned by the Executive Committee.

15. That there be a Nomination Committee composed of the Wesleyan Youth Conference Executive Committee and first delegates elect from Denver and Englewood, Colorado Societies and pastors from Paola and Phillipsburg (Societies rotating alphabetically). The duties of the Committee shall be:

- A. To examine all credentials and certificates
- B. To nominate all sessional committees
- C. To nominate District Chairman.
- D. To nominate members of the standing committees
- E. To select tellers to serve in the election of officers

16. That the Annual Wesleyan Youth Conference convene on Monday morning of the Annual Camp Meeting and that sessions be held from 8:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. each day until business is completed.

17. That the Orders of the Day for the Annual Conference be:

Monday, 8:30 a. m.

- A. Report of the Nominating Committee

B. Report of the President

C. Report of District Chairmen

Monday, 1:00 p.m. Election of Officers

Thursday, 6:00 a. m. Youth Hike

18. That the Wesleyan Youth President's traveling expense be paid while traveling in the interests of the Conference Wesleyan Youth; when traveling by car, he be allowed 5¢ per mile.

19. That there be a sixth member of the Executive Council whose duty shall be to act as Wesleyan Youth Conference Devotional Chairman, and to serve as Public Relations Director.

20. That the Executive Council be the Committee for Youth Camp and that two additional members be elected to make a full committee.

21. That information and promotional guidance may be secured, we recommend that the President attend the youth sections of such National Conventions as he and the Council would deem advisable.

Thursday, 8:15 a. m.

Nina Miller led the opening song service. Gwendolyn Campbell assisted at the piano. Devotional leader, Josephine King, called the body to prayer led by Eva Coates and Grace Burks. A solo, "I Love To Tell The Story", was sung by Harold Hotchkiss, accompanied by Gwendolyn Campbell.

Devotional period continued with review of the study book, "The Revival We Need." Our attention was centered on the thought of God's method of preparing man for revival. A summary brings out these important factors:

1. What—Soul travail is a most fundamental point. Jacob travailed until he prevailed.

2. When—We must **Make** time to pray.
3. Why—From olden Bible times down to the present, revival needs have been the same; God's method of producing revival has been the same.
4. How—Enduement of power. Extraordinary power from God not human abilities, produces fruit for revival.

John Tsutada quoted John 20:19 as a basis for his testimony. Benjamin Saoshiro spoke about John 9:4 and Samuel spoke of I Cor. 9:16 in their respective testimonies. The boys then sang, "We're Marching To Zion" in Japanese.

"Our Million for Lost Millions", the new four year plan of raising more missionary funds for an expansion program on each field was presented by R. S. Nicholson, Jr. "If we all give .43 more per member in the coming quadennium, we will have our million."

Adjourned by limitation of time. Dismissed by Mary Riley.

Thursday, 1:30 p. m.

The session was opened with the singing of "Bringing in the Sheaves", led by Vera Stephens.

Anniversary—As a small token of our love and best wishes, a Japanese painting was presented to our president, Beulah Gilger, in appreciation of her twentieth wedding anniversary.

Veda Garlow and Hazel Buckley sang the song, "Make Me a Channel of Blessing", accompanied by Gwendolyn Campbell. Prayer was led by Clara Rist.

Roll was called. The name of Grace Davis, Manhattan, was added to the roll.

The president introduced the presidents of two newly organized societies: Buena Delahoy, Arkansas City and Dorothy Goodin, Augusta.

Since it is our privilege to have one of our number as Area Chairman, our president, Beulah Gilger, presented Pearl Freeborn, recently elected. She spoke a few words of greeting. A special number in song, "We've a Story To Tell To The Nations", was rendered by a double male quartet.

Our special guests were R. S. Nicholson, Jr., returned missionary from Japan; Rev. David Tsutada, his son, John, Benjamin Saoshiro, and Samuel Arai, all of Japan. Dr. Tsutada is president of the Immanuel Bible College of Japan. The young men are recent graduates of Houghton College ready to return to their homes as ministers. The boys brought a trio number, "From Greenland's Icy Mountain" in the Japanese language with beautiful harmony.

In introducing Dr. David Tsutada, Rev. Nicholson likened him to the Apostle Paul, who one day came face to face with Christ on the Damascus Road. Japan, the strategic point of the entire Asiatic people needed a man. God called David Tsutada from a chosen ambition of the diplomatic field. He made him an Ambassador of Jesus Christ to his people. His life has been singularly used.

Dr. Tsutada used for a text, Phil. 4:19. He emphasized the words, "MY GOD". He said a child can memorize and quote but it takes the experiences of manhood to know the meaning of those words. In a suspense-packed message, he spoke of persecution, of prison sentence, of affliction, of life preserved and a militant faith honored. The Christian church of Japan is nothing short of miracles of faith. The God of Elijah is our God in the twentieth century. MORAL REFORM

We, your Committee on Moral Reform, submit the following report:

We are grateful to God for the leaders in our church who have held against the evils of this present day and have brought up a standard of morals for our people to follow. Today as always there is a constant drifting from "the old paths which our fathers have set" unless there are faithful men of God to lift a standard for the people. First of all let us exhort with the apostle Paul "Put on the whole armour of God that ye may be able to stand in the evil day" Eph. 6: 11, 13. If there is a shrinking on the part of those professing Christ, of doing His definite and perfect will, then surely there is a lack in our full consecration to his service.

Be it resolved that we as Wesleyan Methodists emphasize more definitely genuine holiness of heart from which will emanate the graces of the spirit in daily holy living.

Following are some rules of moral reform we feel should be stressed to our people.

(1) Honoring the Lord's Day by keeping it holy for His service and worship. We should refrain our conversation from material things and carefully guide our children in their play to feel that the Lord's Day is different.

(2) Carefully selected reading material should be placed before our children and adults. There is a tendency to feed on the trashy, easy to read material and have no time for that which would build strong moral character.

(3) Observing the evils of some programs we urge upon our people great care in selecting their radio and television programs.

(4) We should oppose by every possible means the liquor traffic and tobacco interests which lead to crime and delinquency.

(5) Knowing the harm many of our young people have experienced in attending our state colleges and universities we would urge our missionary women to use every means possible to direct and encourage our young people to attend Holiness schools where their training will best suit them for Christian Service.

(6) In II Peter, the third chapter we have God's word of admonition to wives concerning their duties of moral conduct, "while they (husbands) behold your chaste conversation coupled with fear. Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel: But let it be the hidden man of the heart in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price."

3. The President of each society is responsible for arranging for one evening each month to pray especially for Mission Work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. Prayer meeting offerings are to be applied as follows:
 - August—Child Evangelism. Non-budget
 - September—Education. Budget
 - October—Education. Budget
 - November—Jewish. Non-budget
 - December—Orphanage. Budget
 - January and February—Kansas Conference Missions. Budget
 - March and April—Home Missions. Budget
 - May—Edward Eddy. Non-budget
 - June and July—Foreign Missions. Budget
4. Dues.

10. The Annual Report is to be prepared by the president, secretary and treasurer which serves as an audit of the treasurer's report and send to the chairman on Statistics, Mrs. Mildred Macy, Oak Hill, Kansas, postmarked not later than July 10. Duplicate to be brought to conference by delegate.
11. Each society shall grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard.

Efficiency Standard

1. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society the first monthly meeting after conference (5% credit) and that arrangements be made with the pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month. (5% credit).
2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted (5% credit) and at least one public meeting (5% credit).
3. We recommend the formation of one or more Prayer Partner Circles in each society with a Prayer Partner Secretary, who shall report the names of same Conference Prayer Partner Secretary within sixty days after the sitting of Annual Conference.
4. That the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the equivalent of seventy-five per-cent of active membership be subscribers to the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY.
5. That a Solicitor be elected for the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY

- gaining not less than two subscriptions a year.
6. That a Delegate be elected to the Annual Conference Woman's Missionary Society and that she be instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference session (5% credit) and that the President attend the Annual Conference session. (5% credit).
 7. That the dues one dollar per member be sent directly to the Conference treasurer, fifty cents of which shall be divided by her as specified and applied on budget, (5% credit), and that all monies and vouchers be sent to the Conference treasurer at least quarterly. (5% credit).
 8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the Society, or achieve a ten per cent gain in total membership.
 9. That each local society pay annually an amount equal to twenty-five cents per active member to be used as a General Administrative fund, not to apply on budget.
 10. That the local Y.M.W.B. Superintendent be seated in the Annual session and be granted the privilege of speaking, and provision be made by her society for such representation. (Ten per cent credit shall be given for each of the above items, and all societies making a grade of eighty per cent shall be placed on the Honor Roll.)

Conference Work

12. Conference goal for coming year: 850 active members, 325 honorary members and 1000 magazines.
13. The President and District Chairman arrange the time and recommend the worker for Conference and Convention Visitation.
14. Each district supervised by the District Chairman under the direction of the Conference President.
