The forty-second session of the South Carolina Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America met in the Glenwood Wesleyan Methodist Church of Easley, South Carolina, November 6th, 1934, at 2:30 P. M.

Devotionals were in charge of Rev. G. E. Crenshaw. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed.

The President, Rev. R. C. Kendrick, called the Conference to order with a few very appropriate remarks.

Rev. E. F. McCarty, Foreign Missionary Secretary of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection and Mrs. McCarty, Editor of the Wesleyan Missionary, were presented to the Conference.

The W. H. & F. M. Society held their public meeting. Miss Jossie Garrett, Vice-President and Organizer, presided. The speakers were Miss Gertrude Farmer, T. P. Baker, Rev. and Mrs. E. F. McCarty. Pledges for over \$1500.00 were taken.

MORNING MEETING-Saturday, November 10, 1934

Devotionals were conducted by Rev. J. R. Green.

The President called the Conference to order.

The roll was called.

The minutes were read and corrected.

Paul Allred resigned as Lay Delegate to the General Conference.

E. W. Cartee was elected Lay Delegate to General Conference.

Talmage Evatt was elected alternate Lay Delegate to General Conference.

A motion was made to adopt the following recommendation:

Resolution.—In view of the fact that a more careful administration of funds raised for the care of superannuated or needy ministers, their widows, or dependent children is needed and a more consistent and determined effort be made to provide a fund large enough to meet the needs:

Be it resolved, That this Conference elect a Board of two Elders and one Layman, to be known as the Superannuate Board, which shall have complete charge of all Superannuate funds, and they shall administer said funds under the direction of the Conference. They shall be elected for terms of 3, 2, and 1 years, the first year, and one new member for a term of three years each year thereafter.

The senior member of the said Board shall be its Chairman, and a Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected from among their number, who shall receive from the Conference Treasurer all monies paid in for the above mentioned purpose, and he shall make a full report of same and of investments and loans, etc. to the Annual Conference.

It shall further be the duty of the Board to keep the matter of caring for our needy ministers before our people, and to solicit gifts, bequests, annuities and endowment notes, to augment this fund, said notes to bear one percent interest during the lifetime of the donor, and shall become due and payable at their death. This shall be prosecuted vigorously until an endowment fund be built up of sufficient size to care for these aged and needy warriors of the Cross.

No monies of this fund shall ever be used for any other purpose whatsoever save that hereinbefore mentioned.

The Board shall have power to invest any surplus monies in securities approved by the Annual Conference, and also to make loans from such surplus when said loans are secured by bankable notes, or by collateral of value at least ten percent greater than the amount of the loan.

The Board shall take charge of all monies, notes or securities now on hand in the Conference Treasury which may belong to said fund for Superannuated Ministers.

All loans now outstanding shall be investigated, collected if possible, since funds are so seriously needed at present. If collection is not possible, notes or collateral as hereinbefore provided for must be obtained to secure such loans to protect the fund against loss.

REPORTS

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To my co-laborers in the holy ministry and the faithful members of the South Carolina Conference: "Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. I think God always on your behalf."

As I come to you with another annual report, I have a very deep sense of gratitude to God and man. This has been a year of battles but God has given some victories.

As we see the prophetic signs being fulfilled and the end of this age drawing near, we need to put on the whole armor of God that we might be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. Let me urge upon you that we stand together and keep the unity of the Spirit in our local churches and in our conferences, for the forces of evil are organizing against the Church.

This is a day when one hears a great deal about a "New Deal" and the reconstruction of financial conditions. But in the face of this we have witnessed curtailment, strikes, and real need in the rural as well as in the textile districts. These conditions have made it hard for some of our pastors to raise their conference claims. But this is no time to recant; let us renew our courage and face the battle like men.

Acts of Official Business

In harmony with my Advisory Board I wish to submit the following items:

On Nov. 18, 1933, I organized a church at Arial Mill with 23 members. This class was added to the Alice Mill Charge and Rev. O. B. Stewart appointed pastor. They secured a nice hall for a place of worship, and have a good Sunday School with an average attendance of 123.

On November 26, 1933, we had a dedicatory service at Mt. Olivet Church. The balance of indebtedness was raised and the church was dedicated.

On Feb. 13, 1934, Rev. Arthur L. Vess organized a church at Liberty, S. C. and presented it to the Conference. This class was added to the Glenwood charge and Rev. E. W. Cartee appointed as junior pastor. This class is prospering nicely; they have bought a very desirable lot and have the stone and sand on the ground ready to build a house of worship. All of their bills are paid up to date.

On Feb. 8, 1934, we gave Rev. S. I. Keeler \$10.00 from the Superannuate Ministers' Fund.

On March 4, 1934, Rev. W. E. McEntire resigned the Carlisle Church. This church was added to the Graham Chapel charge and Rev. J. B. Hilson appointed pastor.

On March 18, 1934, Sunday 3: 00 P. M., we dedicated the new church at Smith's Chapel and raised funds to buy new pews.

On March 27, 1934, Rev. J. T. Russum resigned his work at Union Church. This class was added to the Gaffney Charge. Rev. E. C. Hord was appointed pastor.

On May 6, 1934, we had an all day rally at Martins Grove, raising nine hundred dollars (\$900.00) in cash and pledges.

On August 10, 1934, Rev. Paul E. Allred resigned his work as junior pastor of Mt. Calvary Church. This class was left under the direction of the Senior pastor until Conference.

On Sept. 9, 1934, Rev. L. F. Lance resigned as pastor of the Greer Church. The Church called Rev. E. J. Mills, who accepted the work on Sept. 23. On Sept. 11, Rev. L. F. Lance was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY BOARD

We recommend:

- 1. That the Conference Treasurer pay the deficit in the salary, and the traveling expenses of the Conference President. This money to be taken from the fund for Conference Work.
- 2. That the Superannuate money be disbursed as follows: Rev. J. T. Carey, \$25.00; Rev. S. I. Keeler, \$15.00; Dr. L. G. Clayton, \$10.00.
- 3. That the salary of the Conference President be \$100.00 per month and expenses.
- 4. That 10 cents be added to the third item of the Conference Budget. This item to be known as Church Extension and Conference Evangelism. The monies of this fund to be used exclusively for the work of extending the work of our Church within the bounds of the Conference. - 7. That the President have the oversight of the work according to our book of Discipline, and that he hold the first and fourth quarterly meetings. He is to work in needy churches or open work in new helds in the bounds of the Conference. If at any time he should hold meetings outside of the Conference, he is to release it from all financial obligation for the period spent elsewhere unless circumstances warrant such action.

We request that ten dollars (\$10.00) from the Conference Incidental Fund be used for the purchase of a nucleus of books for this library and solicitations be made for the donation of other books.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions Adopted in 1898

Resolved, 1st. That as a body in Conference assembled, we will not allow our pulpits or churches to be used by those who do not give evidence of being sound in the doctrines of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and true to our polity.

2nd. That as ministers and laymen we will use our best endeavors to prevent the promulgation of doctrines or usages not in accord with the Wesleyan Methodist faith.

Resolutions Adopted in 1905

Resolved, 1st. That the law with regard to complaints or violations of orders and resolutions found on page 37 of our Discipline, and beginning with the words, "When the President," shall apply to all cases of the violators of our Discipline, and no charges shall be entertained by the Judiciary Committee without said previous investigation and labor.

2nd. That no member of the Conference shall have his character passed who fails to carry out all the rules and orders of this Conference, unless providentially hindered, except upon a three-fourths vote of the body.

Resolutions Adopted in 1907

Resolved, 1st. That we affirm our faith in the soundness of the position taken by the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America in denying any of its members membership in any secret society.

2nd. That we believe that the preaching of Holiness that does not include a clear and distinct opposition to all secret societies is seriously lacking in the essential elements and must be more or less displeasing to God.

3rd. That we believe that the right type of Holiness preaching and teaching is the most effective means by which to induce men to separate themselves from all lodge entanglements; therefore, we will do our best to double our diligence in this line of effort.

4th. That we affectionately admonish our people to avoid all compromise with secrecy. Hence we as a Conference require that our pastors and churches shall not elect, or suffer to be elected, superintendents or teachers of any Sunday Schools that are held in our churches if they hold membership in secret societies; furthermore, those belonging to secret orders shall not be allowed to hold services in our churches.

5th. That we seriously urge upon all our brethren and sisters that they may be careful to maintain a consistent, but radical, attitude of opposition to all organizations, secret or open, which are opposed to Jesus Christ and His doctrine and principles of righteousness.

Resolutions Adopted in 1914

Resolved, 1st. That all of our Licentiates not receiving any appointments to pastoral or evangelistic work be required to preach at least once a month, or twelve times during the Conference year.

2nd. That in addition to the above resolution, we earnestly request all preachers not receiving a regular appointment by the Conference, except those attending school preparatory to the ministry, to hold, if possible, a two weeks' revival during the year.

3rd. That all preachers unemployed by the Conference during the coming year be urged to select a fellow-laborer with whom they can work harmoniously, and go out and try to build up new works as they may

have opportunity, and revive the desert places.

4th. That in order that the foregoing resolutions may have the greatest effect possible, and that each preacher may have a higher estimation of the dignity of his calling, and that the burden for souls may be increased, and that they may feel the sympathy of the Church to which they belong, we urge each charge to pass like resolutions.

5th. That it is not only the duty, but binding on each Circuit preacher of our Conference, to receive whomsoever the Conference may designate as Quarterly Meeting Evangelist, and give him their hearty support

and coöperation.

Resolution Adopted in 1919

Be it Resolved, That the Committee on Public Worship consist of the President of the Conference, the pastor of the charge where the Conference is held, and the pastor's delegate.

Resolution, Regarding Tithing, Adopted in 1922

Resolved, That no person be licensed to preach who does not tithe his income; that all our licentiates be required to faithfully tithe their income; and that the license of no preacher be renewed, who fails to tithe.

Resolutions Adopted in 1923

Resolved, 1st. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be opened to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.

2nd. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided, this shall not interfere with previous arrangements between pastor and charge.

Resolution Adopted in 1926

Resolved, That the pastors be required to raise their Minute Money and send to the Conference Treasurer within sixty days after they receive their Minutes.

Resolutions Adopted in 1931

Resolved, 1st. That this Conference elect a Tithing Secretary, as provided for in our Discipline, whose duty it shall be to visit each charge at least once a year, if possible. Each church visited shall raise at least the traveling expenses of the Secretary at the time of his visitation.

2nd. That each local church or charge elect a Tithing Secretary, whose duty it shall be to thoroughly canvass the membership of the church or charge each quarter and labor most earnestly to induce each member to strictly tithe his income and to place the same in the church treasury for the purpose of meeting all the claims of the church, both locally and generally. This Secretary shall report at each Quarterly Conference the percentage of the membership who are tithing in keeping with this plan, the percentage who are giving in other ways, and the percentage who are not giving at all.

3rd. That each pastor and church cooperate with these Secretaries in every possible way in order to make the entire membership of this Conference strict tithers.

Resolution Adopted in 1932

Whereas in America there seems to be a constantly increasing disregard for law and law observance, and whereas there has been a desire on the part of some to annul or repeal the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Be it Resolved, That we unequivocally place ourselves in opposition to any plan whereby either this Amendment or the Volstead Act should be changed.

Be it further Resolved, That we will labor diligently in public and private to create that public sentiment for these laws that will not only keep them on our Statute books, but cause them to be more rigorously enforced.
