Daily Proceedings

Minutes of the Seventy-Ninth Annual Session of the Dakota Conference, of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, held at Rapid City, South Dakota, June 21-25, A. D. 1960.

First Meeting-8:00 a.m., Tuesday, June 21, 1960

Opening of Conference: The Seventy-Ninth Session of the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened in the new Tabernacle, on the Wesleyan Methodist Camp Ground (Red Dale Drive), Rapid City, South Dakota, on June 21, A.D. 1960 at 8:00 a.m.

Opening Meeting of Conference: Rev. John J. Hunter, President, of the Dakota Conference announced the opening meeting of the Conference Session. Rev. O. D. Watson Jr. led the congregation in singing "Glory to His Name."

Opening Devotions: Rev. J. F. Simpson conducted devotions from Luke 21: 25-33 and offered prayer.

Co-Chairman: By motion and vote, Rev. B. H. Phaup was made Co-Chairman with the President of the 79th session of the Dakota Conference. Rev. Phaup brought Christian greetings from the Denomination and from General Superintendent Rev. H. K. Sheets.

Roll Call: The Conference Roll was called and answered by 67 ministers and 46 delegates.

Conference Program Committee Report: The Conference Program Committee made their report after programs were distributed to Conference members. After additions and revisions were made by proper parliamentary action, the Report, by vote, was adopted.

Organization of Conference: A partial report of the Nominating Committee was read. This Report was acted upon item by item and the following Committees were elected:

Passage of Character: John J. Hunter, Lester R. Fletcher, Paul Drown.

Railroad Expense Committee: Lee Goodell, chairman; Rolland Fletcher.

Committee on Appreciation: Mrs. Viola Leyh, chairman; Mrs. Louise Goodsell.

Committee on Resolutions: Rev. B. I. Griffin, chairman; Rev. Ellis Sollie. Conference Reporters: W. D. Shelor, chairman; Glen Wessel, Darrell Wagner.

Committee on Courtesies: Rev. Robert Vermilyea, chairman; Rev. Eugene Stanislaus.

Pages: Rev. Bennie D. Veeder, Rev. Ben Joachim.

Bar of Conference: By motion and vote, the Bar of Conference was made the first eight rows of seats in the center section, and the first five rows of seats on both sides of the Tabernacle.

Seated in the Conference: Rev. John Dillon, Rev. Burl Baty, Rev. Clifford Watt, were by Conference action seated in the Conference. On separate motion, Rev. Marion Vreugdenhil was also seated in the Conference. Seventy-Ninth Annual Dakota Conference Camp Meeting: Thursday evening, June 16, preceding the Annual Conference, marked the beginning of the 79th Annual Dakota Conference Camp Meeting, with Rev. B. H. Phaup of Marion, Indiana, General Superintendent of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and Rev. Robert Wallace, General Evangelist from Pennsylvania, as evangelists, and with members of the Conference leaders in song being, Rev. Paul Faulkenberry, Rev. Fred Francis, and Rev. Rolland Fletcher. The Camp Meeting ran concurrently with the Conference Session, ending on Sunday evening, June 26. The Holy Spirit honored the ministry of these God-called efficient workmen as they preached the Word, and many found help.

Conference Sunday School Rally: 7:30 p.m., Friday, June 17, 1960. The program for Sunday School Night was prepared by Rev. Glen Wessel, Conference Sunday School Secretary, who was also chairman.

Opening: Rev. Fred B. Francis, led the congregation in singing.

Special Songs were presented by a Children's Choir. Also other special numbers were presented during the evening.

Prayer was offered by Wesley L. Knapp, President of M. W. C.

Announcements and Reports of Bible Crusader Camps were given.

Public Recognition was given to those churches having the largest Sunday School attendance and also to those churches having the greatest percentage gain in their Sunday Schools.

Awards were presented to the highest in each class.

Speaker: Rev. Robert Wallace of Franklin, Pa., Camp Meeting Evangelist, read from Acts 6: 1-4, and spoke of the necessity of the Administrative officers and teachers to be filled with the Holy Ghost, and to teach according to the Word and to be possessed with the grace and perseverance needed. He stated also that we must have a conscious concern for the community.

Closing: This Rally was closed with an altar service with a number seeking help of the Lord.

Special Youth Day: Saturday, June 18, 1960. Special Youth Day was observed in uniting in an Educational Service at night; Rev. Darrell Wagner, presiding.

Educational Service: Saturday, June 18, 1960, 7:45 p.m. An Educational Service was held with Rev. Gordon Cary, Conference Educational Secretary, presiding. Rev. Rolland Fletcher led in singing some congregational A. L. Cretsinger offered prayer. Special numbers in song were songs. presented in a Girls' duet, Ladies' trio, and a Men's quartet. The members of the Conference Educational Committee were presented and students and alumni were recognized. Rev. L. Wesley Knapp, President of Miltonvale Wesleyan College, was the speaker for this service. President Knapp spoke of the definite new forward steps and recognition which has come to the college. Turning to the parents and youth, the speaker asked what factors they were considering in selecting a college: Were they looking for a wholesome Christian atmosphere where the students could find God's place for their life and could have spiritual leadership, or were there other considerations outside of entering a Christ-centered college? When a young person gets his mind set on attending a Christian college it is amazing what difficulties can be overcome.

President Knapp pointed out the greater cost to the individual and to the church, if there is a failure in patronizing and supporting a Christ-centered college, with her students, her means, and her prayers. May hers, under God, be an ever expanding program. This service was closed by prayer.

Rev. B. H. Phaup, General Supt., presented congratulations in behalf of the Denomination for the Conference in providing such a fine Tabernacle. He anticipated rewards in a continued dedication, with souls finding God.

Auditing Committee Report: Partial Report of the Auditing Committee was presented. A motion prevailed to accept this report.

President's Financial Report: The Conference President read his financial report which was accepted by motion and vote. See Report.

Book Stand Announcement: Rev. O. D. Watson, manager of the Conference Book Stand, made an announcement concerning books, Bibles, and Wesleyan Methodist and other publications on the Book Stand.

Adjournment: Conference was adjourned by motion and vote.

Adjournment: A motion prevailed to adjourn.

Closing Prayer: Rev. Gordon Goodsell offered the closing prayer.

Miscellaneous Business was taken up and Rev. Ellis Sollie was made the second member of the Resolutions Committee.

Courtesy: The Committee on Courtesy presented to the Conference Rev. Robert Lytle, representative of World Missions, and our Missionary Speaker; also Mr. LeRoy Rattling Leaf and Rev. Burl Baty. These made fitting remarks and brought words of greeting.

Report of the Secretary of Prayer: Rev. A. L. Cretsinger, Secretary of Prayer, made his annual report. On motion and vote the report was adopted. See Report.

The Vice President, Rev. Gordon Goodsell, took the Chair.

After discussion, a motion to adjourn was made and passed. Conference

was adjourned subject to the Orders of the Day.

At the call of the Chair, Conference was convened at 11:00 a.m. to hear the Denominational Address and Service.

Denominational Service: Rev. Fred B. Francis led the congregation in singing songs, "Holiness Unto the Lord," and "Love Divine All Love Excelling."

Prayer was offered by Rev. Lester R. Fletcher.

Rev. John J. Hunter, Conference President, introduced the Speaker, Rev. B. H. Phaup, General Superintendent and Denominational Representative of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America. The speaker read and commented from Matt. 16: 15-20 and brought to us words of information and Christian Denominational greetings.

The speaker ably described the new reorganization plan of the Church by the election of three General Superintendents and their respective departments and programs. He gave us an oral picture of the new Headquarters Building and of the Executive Offices, and spoke of the work of the Official Bodies. He presented very well every official branch and department of the Church of God within Wesleyan Methodism and spoke of the bright prospects which are ahead for Her in Christ for the tomorrows.

1. Rates go in July, for family plan, to \$9.80 a month but if trend continues it may go down again next year. Single rate is \$4.10 per month.

2. Benefits: \$25.00 deductible and pays all expense above that for a semi-private room up to 70 days for each admission. Also it is \$5.00 deductible for any accident treatment in a hospital if one does not stay all night.

3. It was voted to retain present benefits for a raise of \$1.30 per month rather than accept \$10.00 per day benefits for a .05 cent per month raise.

Motion was made that Special item or paragraph taken from June 16, 1960 Missionary Board Meeting minutes relating to changing the $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ item to 10% be considered first in June 23 meeting beginning at 8:00 a.m.

Report of Wesleyan Youth: Rev. Darrell Wagner, Wesleyan Youth President presented the Report of the Wesleyan Youth of the Dakota Conference to the Annual Conference for their consideration. By motion and vote this report was accepted. See Report.

Committee on Courtesy: The Committee on Courtesy presented Miss Ruth Bixler, returned Missionary to Africa, now on furlough. Also Jerry Yellowhawk, our Indian minister was introduced. They gave their testimonies and words of greeting.

Adjournment: A motion prevailed to adjourn. Rev. B. H. Phaup offered the closing prayer.

Missionary Rally: 7:45 p.m., Wednesday, June 22, 1960. The Y.M.W.B. submitted a program directed by Lois Jean Cretsinger, Esther Harris, and Dorothy Vreugdenhil. Mrs. Dorothy Cretsinger presided in the main Missionary Sevice. Leader in song was Rev. Rolland Fletcher. Prayer was offered by Rev. B. H. Phaup, General Superintendent. Introduced were Miss Ruth Bixler, Miss Ruth Hayworth, Rev. J. F. Simpson, and Rev. Marion Vreugdenhil A special song was also presented by Rev. Robert Wallace, entitled, "Jesus Is Calling." An informational talk by Rev. Robert Lytle was presented after which the offering was taken. Then Rev. Speaker: Rev. Neil Phipps, who presented the challenge of evangelizing among the American Indians. His subject was, "What hast thou done for the American Indian?" The speaker pointed out the need of a Holy Ghost Revival to meet the needs and challenges of this day. He also said, "There is a field among us, the American Indian, that God is going to hold us responsible for." Rev. Glen Case gave an oral picture of the Indian work in Rapid City, S. D. Rev. Phipps unburdened his heart with concern for the needs of the Brainerd Indian Training School of Hot Springs, S. D. Rev. Phaup closed this service with prayer.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT - June 21, 1960

As we enter into this 79th Annual Session of the Dakota Conference it is with praise and gratitude in our hearts to God for many gracious victories from His hand during this past conference year.

Going from our last Conference session directly to the services of our General Conference in Houghton, New York brought to us some of the greatest encouragements and some of the greatest challenges that have come to us in years. We were made more keenly aware than ever before that we were a part of a great arm of God's work which He had been pleased to bless in a wonderful way. Unmistakable evidences of His blessing were brought before us again and again. Though some areas of our problems and needs were viewed with marked differences of opinion yet it was most encouraging to witness the unanimous decision that was made by that large assembly of the General Conference delegates in adopting in its entirety the proposed changes in our Church government. These changes included the election of three General Superintendents and a financial plan to put into operation in the enlarged program of the denomination.

Through this year in the Dakota Conference we have been keenly aware of the urgent spiritual needs in the Conference as well as urgent financial needs. The near tragic accident of a load of delegates as they returned from the General Conference seemed typical of the assaults that Satan was making. A train traveling in reverse at a dangerous crossing with no signals and no flagman might well represent for us the subtle attacks Satan would make. The severe drouth across a large part of the Conference was but a small part of the problems and needs that have confronted us this conference year. But out of God's Word has come very definite encouragement-permit me to quote Isaiah 59: 19, 20, 21 and 60: 1 and 2. "When the enemy shall come in like a flood, the spirit of the Lord shall lift up a standard against him." As we note God's fulfillment of this promise in His Word one thing has impressed me above all others. In lifting up a standard against the enemy, again and again God did so by finding human channels through which He could work. In lifting up a standard against the cruel opposition of Israel by Egypt, God found a man to be a channel for His work. In lifting up a standard against the oppression of the Midianites God found a man He could use; in this case it was Gideon. In lifting up a standard against the enemy in the Babylonian captivity God sought and found men who would do His will. He found Daniel and his three companions and He found Nehemiah, Ezra and others. God's quest for human avenues through which He can work comes to the 79th Annual Session of the Dakota Conference. My heart is encouraged to believe that He has found many such channels in the Conference this year. A number of our churches have witnessed gracious revival during the year. Several could be enumerated. God grant that cvery minister of the Conference and every church in the Conference may be a yielded and open channel through which He may work.

Our labors in the conference this year have included: 157 Church services or business meetings, _____ Board meetings and several conventions and prayer conferences. Two new churches were dedicated and assistance has been given in the construction of several new churches.

The co-operation and spirit of prayer that I have encountered across the Conference has been an encouragement to me.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF PRAYER

Isaiah, the major prophet, sensing the need of prayer for the spiritual restoration of Israel, wrote: "For Zion's sake I will not hold my peace, and for Jerusalem's sake I will not rest, until the righteousness thereof go forth as brightness, and the salvation thereof, as a lamp that burneth. I have set watchmen upon thy walls, O Jerusalem, which shall never hold their peace day nor night: ye that make mention of the Lord, keep not silence, And give him no rest, till he establish, and till he make Jerusalem a praise in the earth" Isaiah 62: 1, 6, 7. The prophet's message is fitting for this day. God is the answer to the needs and problems of the Church, and of the human family. The Church following Pentecost gave themselves to prayer and to the ministry of the Word, making progress, and triumphing over persecution and opposition in the midst of a heathen world. The Church of today must follow this precedent, if advance is to be made. We are laborers together with God. A prayerless life is a godless life, and a prayerless Church is a barren Church. God place upon us the spirit of prayer and intercession. We shall go forward just in the measure and proportion as we give ourselves to hard work, faith, sacrifice and prayer. The world has yet to see what God can do through an obedient, Spirit-filled, praying, believing Church. May all wait upon GOD, until they have prayed through for themselves, then for others and for the whole world.

How quickly another conference year has come to a close. We pause in retrospect to thank Almighty God for answers to the many petitions made. We have deeply appreciated the Christian co-operation of the Brethren, and of the Churches in response to the Conference Prayer Program, and submit the following record:

I. YEAR ROUND CONFERENCE CHAIN OF PRAYER

1. To have a chain of prayer, or hourly intercession, by the personnel of each Local Church in the Conference; that is, someone praying each hour night and day, (as nearly as is possible) from the beginning of the conference year, and throughout, until the close, is the prayer objective.

II. THE PERSONNEL INCLUDES ALL

- 1. To enlist young and old in the Conference Prayer Program: the children assigned 5, 10, or 15 minutes or more; the young people assigned a longer period; and adults generally spend one hour or more, alone with God in prayer.
- 2. Those who remain on the old fields (where their Church structure is gone), who desire to unite in the Prayer Chain, for the work of the Lord and the Conference.
- 3. Also to enlist all other outside the Church, who will unite in this United Prayer Program, for the building of Christ's Kingdom upon earth.

III. THE PURPOSE

- 1. That sinners might be born into Christ's Kingdom.
- 2. That every believer (justified soul) might be entirely sanctified.
- 3. For the mobilizing of prayer for those churches starting revivals; for conventions, and for special occasions and needs.
- 4. For the evangelizing of our great Northwestern Territory, and the planting of Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools and Churches therein.

5. To build, and to advance the work of God on every field.

- 6. That laborers shall be called into the whitened harvest fields.
- 7. That the material and spiritual needs of the Church shall be supplied.
- 8. That in every home there shall be a Family Altar.
- 9. That secret prayer be renewed in every life_

IV. MAILING AND EXPENSE

- 1. About five hundred (500) prayer requests have been sent out.
- 2. Prayer Calendars and Prayer Lists have been mailed from our office to the Churches.
- 3. The expense for this work has been about \$17.60.
- 4. May this effort bring honor and glory to the Lord, forevermore.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF CHILD EVANGELISM

To the 79th Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church 1 submit the following report.

I am indeed grateful for the privilege I have had during the past year of laboring for the Lord in the field of Child Evangelism. I am also grateful for the privilege which was mine of attending the General Conference last June where I assisted as Children's worker, and where I also received much help in my own work by meeting other Child Evangelism Superintendents and sharing ideas and plans for the work.

During the past year there have been within our Conference four Bible Crusader Clubs, nine religious instruction classes, (or released time classes) four children's churches all with meetings quite regular throughout the year. The total attendance for the year as reported to me was 1,477. Of course doubtless many other children's services were held which were not reported. Of those reporting, 1,812 Scripture verses were also memorized. We trust these will be a stabilizing influence in many lives in the years to come.

We sent out approximately 175 letters during the past year.

Two Bible Crusader camps were held during the past year. One was held at Mitchell and the other at Rapid City. These were singularly blessed of the Lord and many children came into a saving grace experience. I sincerely thank each one who helped make these two camps the blessing that they were. I regret that I was unable to be present at the two camps, but as you know, this was physically impossible. Plans are underway for two camps again this summer. They also are to be held at Mitchell and Rapid City.

MISSIONARY BOARD MEETING CALLED October 23, 1959 at the Aberdeen Church

The meeting was called to order by the Conference President, Rev. John Hunter. A short Scripture was read from Isaiah 26. Rev. S. J. McIntyre and Mrs. A. L. Cretsinger led the group in prayer. A sense of God's presence was felt at the very beginning of our meeting. The Conference President had previously sent out an agenda to all members and so we began with the first item.

1. A report was given by our Conference Treasurer, Rev. S. J. McIntyre.

2. A motion was made and seconded Rev. John Hunter be given authority to make authorization for any repairs necessary on the Sturgis property to keep it in good repair. Motion carried.

3. A complete study and discussion was made in connection with our newly formed Revolving Fund and a report was given us on all monies that have come in and all monies that have been expended. A motion was made and seconded we accept the report as given. Motion carried.

4. A motion was made and seconded we authorize the sale of the 300' frontage of conference property on the west side of 38th Street which lies directly north of the property owned by Rapid City First Church and this to be for the use of residential property. Motion carried.

5. A motion was made and seconded that the three acres be plotted of the conference property referred to above and the expense of plotting of same be taken from the sale of remaining three lots. Motion carried.

6. A motion was made and seconded that a committee consisting of Rev. Gordon Goodsell, Rev. Darrell Wagner and Rev. John Hunter be authorized to take care of the details involved in the selling of the lots. Motion carried.

7. A motion was made and seconded that 1/3 of the proceeds of the lots be turned to the camp treasurer and this item be referred to as fulfilling the obligation made in item 38 at the last annual conference and listed in the minutes. Motion carried.

8. Motion was made that Revolving Loan Committee meet and draw up a set of by-laws and/or governing rules and be brought before our next board meeting for consideration and approval. Motion carried.

9. A motion was made that the rent from house number one in Sturgis be applied on payment commitment of conference President's property on 38th Street in Rapid City, South Dakota. Motion carried.

10. Motion was made and seconded we authorize Rev. John Hunter to borrow \$2,000.00 from Sturgis bank on Sturgis property for Revolving Fund or to receive loans from individuals and that the amount used to pay the back taxes on Bushnell property be replaced by this transaction. This action taken because of the time needed to complete the sale of the Bushnell property. Motion carried.

11. Motion was made and seconded the committee appointed previously on the Bushnell property sale, move forward with original plan of action. Motion carried.

12. Motion was made and seconded the 2/3 of the sale proceeds of the lots of conference property be placed in the conference treasury. Motion carried.

Motion was made and seconded we approve action for a loan of \$10,000.00 on Miles City, Montana parsonage project. This to be secured from Miles City bank for a 10 year period and on a monthly payment basis
 of \$80.00 per month and in addition an annual payment of \$300 be understood to be paid and the rental of the old property be applied to the payments on the new property. Motion carried.

14. Motion was made and seconded that we authorize the securing of a loan of \$6500.00 on Terry, Montana project and to make satisfactory arrangements for the repayment of interest and principal. Motion carried.

15. Motion was made and seconded we reaffirm the approval of the board's previous action for the approval and securing of a loan for \$15,000.00

from Farmers and Merchants Bank in Aberdeen, South Dakota for the Aberdeen Wesleyan Methodist Church Project. This motion carried with 9 affirmative votes.

16. Motion was made and seconded that we authorize the sale of Rocky Point Church subject to satisfactory arrangements with the local group. Motion carried.

17. Motion was made and seconded that we grant Mission, South Dakota the privilege of continuing their plans for future building, subject to the approval of the Conference Building Committee of the Conference Plans and that final authorization to come from the Missionary Board. Motion carried.

18. Motion was made and seconded that we continue study relative to future plans for a new work in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. Motion carried.

19. Motion was made and seconded that we go on record as favoring the charges at Huron and Pierre start at once a Building Fund to get underway with future expansion. Motion carried.

20. Motion was made and seconded the meeting be adjourned. Motion carried.

MISSIONARY BOARD MEETING June 16, 1960

The Missionary Board Meeting was held at headquarters building, and camp grounds June 15, 1960. President Rev. John Hunter called the meeting to order and Rev. H. W. Cretsinger led in prayer.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Rev. S. J. McIntyre gave his Conference Treasurer's report. A motion was made and seconded we accept his report. Motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded we accept the report of the Revolving Fund. Motion carried.

A period of general discussion followed. Meeting adjourned for noon lunch.

Meeting reconvened at 1:00 p.m. Rev. Darrell Wagner led in prayer.

Motion was made and seconded we authorize Rev. R. M. Kelly to make inquiry of lot 17 of the Sturgis property and he check on the possibility of purchasing the adjoining property. Also to contact Attorney Morrell for assistance and what the price would be.

A letter was read that Rev. J. F. Simpson had forwarded to the board for their consideration regarding three different items. A motion was made and seconded that we table action on these items until the fall meeting of the Board of Directors of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America of the Dakota Conference. An amendment was offered that we recommend favorable action on items two (2) and three (3) and special consideration be given on item one (1).

A motion was made and seconded that Rev. H. W. Cretsinger and David Robertson be given authority to negotiate for the sale of the Flandreau property. The price for the property, it was felt, should be in the price bracket of \$12,500.00 and not lower than \$10,000. Motion on above action carried unanimously.

Motion was made and seconded we make a loan available for the revolving fund for \$500.00 when and if needed for the Mission Church project and Mission Church assume the repayment of principal and interest and in view of the present condition of conference funds we refer the Statement for arches back to Mission Church for immediate payment to Prairie States Wood Arts. Motion carried.

Motion made and seconded that because of the depletion of conference funds we refer the items of parsonage payments for Pierre and Robbinsdale Churches back to the Beckman Foundation of Church Extension. These two items had been previously taken care of from this fund. Motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded that we the Board of Directors do seriously recommend action at this conference session to raise our 7½% plan of assessment to 10% and this take care of the increasing costs involved in conference operation and that 2% of this 10% total assessment to be earmarked for operation of Conference Headquarters and camp. Motion carried.

Motion was made that the \$1000.00 loaned to the Missionary Treasurer from the Revolving Fund be increased to \$1500.00 and that arrangements be worked out for its repayment. Motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded we make a loan for the Revolving Fund for the camp of \$2000.00 to \$2500.00 from the Sturgis Bank. These funds to be used for existing emergencies.

MISSIONARY BOARD REPORT - JUNE 25, 1960

We, your Missionary Board, submit the following report:

The Missionary Board met on Saturday morning June 25, 1960 on the Camp Grounds, and the following recommendations were made:

1. That we raise the $7\frac{1}{2}$ % to 8% and we earmark 2% of this for Conference Headquarters, and that standing rule No. 1 be revised to coincide with this action.

2. That we cover moving expenses of pastor to Sand Point, Idaho.

3. That we allow \$50 per month salary assistance to Bismarck through September 1960.

4. That we pay back parsonage rent due at Joliet, Montana.

5. That we continue payment of \$30 per week through August, 1960 salary assistance to Hamilton, Montana.

6. That we allow \$30 per week through October, 1960, for support of Rev. Richard Franklin at Sand Point, Idaho and that this item be reconsidered at the Fall meeting.

7. That we authorize \$800 loan from the Revolving Fund to Hamilton and review this work again at our Fall meeting.

8. That we allow \$100 to Terry for needed improvements for parsonage and increase loan authorization from \$6500 to \$7000 at Terry Bank.

9. That we allow \$100 to moving the pastor to Williston, North Dakota.

10. That we use the Mother Church Plan on Williston, North Dakota, and what money is received from other churches and the local group be supplemented by Conference assistance to make up \$55 per week as pastoral support.

11. That we give authorization to the Conference President and Rev. B. H. Veeder to proceed with investigation and possibilities of developing some plan to start the work at Williston and report again to the Missionary Board and to the Conference Building Board for further action.

12. The item suggested by the Conference President regarding a Conference Church Extension Secretary to spend part time to assist the President on Pioneer fields and other churches involved in building programs, be considered at the Fall meeting.

13. That a committee of 3 from the Missionary Board process all applications for loans from the Conference Revolving Fund. Actual loans are to be made by the Missionary Board. That this committee be the Conference President as chairman, Wayne Cretsinger, 2nd member and Erwin Bailey, 3rd member.

14. That we rent house No. 2 of Sturgis property to Rev. R. M. Kelly for 40 per month.

15. That Rev. R. M. Kelly act as a special agent to handle the rental involved in the Revolving Fund and forward all information to the Conference Treasurer.

16. That we continue the committee on the Bushnell project. The following are the members of the committee:

17. That we grant the Harlowton church a loan from the Revolving Fund when available in the amount of \$2000 when needed.

18. That we authorize the Conference President to purchase a dictaphone for his office.

19. That we approve payment for completion of hood over the stove in the conference parsonage.

20. That we authorize the Conference President to hire a part time secretary and that salary for same be set at the discretion of the Conference President.

21. That we pay the Conference President \$80 per week salary and give him \$10 per week for utilities.

22. That we amend standing rule No. 2 so that the second sentence will read, "The monies thus raised constitute the Pioneer Pastor's fund which will be distributed by the Missionary Board."

23. That we allow \$50 per month on salary for 2 months at Ridge.

24. That we continue payment of \$10 per month on the Flandreau note, subject to the sale of the property.

25. That we continue to advance one-half of the President's salary at the first of each month and that at the end of the month he submit a statement of the monies received and balance to be paid.

26. That we continue to advance to the President \$50 per month for expense ,and that he send a statement of deficit at the end of each month for said expenses.

27. That at the time of his visitation the churches raise a liberal offering for the Conference President's salary.

28. That the pastor of the Sioux Community Chapel be paid \$80 per

month. Parsonage payment to be covered from same.

29. That the parsonage payment of \$65.65 at Bismarck be continued.

30. That we request the unorganized churches to receive an offering to apply on the Pioneer Pastor's Fund.

31. That we pay \$43 per month house payment at Sundance, Wyoming.

32. That we continue payment of \$496.98 per month payment on the Hamilton project.

33. That we pay \$30 per month payment on Belle Fourche parsonage.

34. That Standing Rule No. 29 be observed regarding Pioneer Pastors.

35. 'That we continue support of Romeo Baronia and pay \$50 per month.

36. That we continue the authorization given our Conference President and agent Rev. R. M. Kelly for Sturgis property, to increase loan needed for the Revolving Fund.

37. That we accept personal loans from various individuals at 5% interest rate.

38. That churches delinquent on last year's Pension Fund are urgently requested to make up their deficit and send to Mr. Edwards at Houghton, South Dakota before August 1, 1960.

39. That Mr. Edwards be reimbursed for \$16 office expense.

40. That we authorize a loan on the Beckman estate property in Perkins County deeded to the Dakota Conference to repay loan from the Beckman Board to the Conference from the sale of the Rawlins, Wyoming property plus \$3000 on the Robbinsdale church obligation to the denomination.

41. That we assume payments of the Robbinsdale and Pierre parsonages subject to commitments from the Special Church Extension Committee.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING AND LOCATION

The board met at Rapid City, South Dakota on September 2, 1959. Members present were Rev. John Hunter, Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. Gordon Goodsell, and Rev. H. W. Cretsinger. The board approved the plans of the Buffalo, Wyoming church to construct a connecting wing between the Parish Hall and the church. These plans included new log siding on the exterior of the present church.

By correspondence, the board approved the Miles City remodeling plans of December 30, 1959. The plans included a nursery, an additional rest room, a new basement stairway, and an addition which includes the new platform, a classroom and pastor's study.

By communication the board approved tentative plans for the Mission, South Dakota church. These plans called for a building 26×54 to be built on the present basement structure. This action was taken on March 20, 1960.

The board met on June 24, 1960 on the camp grounds at Rapid City, South Dakota with all members present. The board approved final plans for the Mission Church as submitted by Rev. H. W. Cretsinger with a recommended change regarding the pulpit exit.

Due to an oversight in the Report of the Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location last year the action on the Strathaven Church as recorded in the Missionary Board report mentioned in item 41, page 45 of the 1959 minutes is hereby added to the minutes of this board.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

We, your Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report: Be it resolved:

That every pastor give due consideration to the Conference plan of work, including raising the budget, getting our reports in on time and especially raising our Superannuate assessment. We should recognize that we pastors are the key men in this situation, who will be held responsible under God in rendering a faithful account of our stewardship to the Church and Conference.

Knowing that we are living in perilous times, when there is a great falling away of the Church in general, we strongly urge the important necessity of giving priority and proper emphasis to the prayer program as set forth in the report of our Conference prayer secretary. Let us observe times of fasting and prayer throughout our entire Conference area and promote district prayer Conferences wherever possible. That we also have the family altar and secret prayer in our Wesleyan homes, until we are known as a praying people, who have power with God and man.

1960, being national election year, we recommend that much prayer be made for our nation in this hour of crisis, and that all of our people take part and cast their vote on election day. Regardless of our personal political preference, we should deplore the possibility of electing a Catholic President because this endangers our present form of government through outside pressure and influence upon our leadership and its decisions. Be it known however, that we as a church stand for the separation of Church and State. Therefore be it resolved, that we pray much and then let the Holy Spirit direct us in our voting.

Be it also resolved, that we make "Holiness Unto the Lord," the keynote and standard of our lives and ministry. Let us shun all forms of worldliness, including immodest apparel, remembering what is written in James 1: 27, "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and to keep himself unspotted from the world." Jesus said of His disciples, "They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world." Can He say this today of us Wesleyan preachers of the Dakota Conference and of all our people?

In the light of all this, may we heed the injunction by the Apostle Peter, "Be ye holy, in all manner of conversation, because it is written, Be ye holy, for I am holy." We need not only be preachers of Bible Holiness but also consistent examples. Shall we then lift high the bloodstained banner of the cross and the standard of Bible Holiness?

Last of all, let us do all in our power to win souls for Christ and promote Holy Ghost revivals on our charges.

Be it resolved that we go down before God and pay the price to keep the Holy unction and anointing on our souls so that our lives and ministry may be deeply spiritual and fruitful. There is no substitute for spirituality or the Holy Ghost.

This is the Word of the Lord (unto you my brethren) "Not by might nor by power, but my Spirit saith the Lord of hosts."

Action on the recommendations of Donald John and Larry Johnson to travel under Conference direction was deferred, pending opportunity to interview them.

We request that those who are attending school inform us from year to year as to the course they are taking, their classification as to year, and the hours of credit they have earned to date. In particular, we need to know whether they have passed a course in Wesleyan Methodist Discipline or in theology.

We request that those pursuing the Conference Course of Study by correspondence keep a record of their progress in the "Reading Course" and inform the secretary from year to year. Such reports and the reports of grades on examinations may be sent this year to Gordon Cary.

We call attention to the fact that paragraph 92 of the Discipline stipulates that all Conference Preachers must have an effective Quarterly Conference license. The first question for Conference Preachers on their "Report of a Minister to the Annual Conference" asks whether their Quarterly Conference license has been renewed. The answer to this question has bearing on the renewing of Annual Conference licenses; so Confrence Preachers and those holding Quarterly Conference business meetings should take care that such licenses are granted.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE PHILIPPINE MISSIONS

This has been a history making year in the work of Philippine Missions. Several ministers from other denominations have come to us asking that they might have an opportunity to join the evangelistic program which our Church has launched. There are several more on the waiting list. They assure us that they are coming as soon as possible.

There is a moving of the Holy Spirit among this people. It appears that the harvest is ripe.

According to word from Rev. Baronia, 20 of the 25 churches in the twoyear goal that was set have been built. He writes that there are six-more churches to be erected just as soon as the money is forthcoming for this project. During this two year "goal," our carpenters took about six months off to finish the erection of the necessary buildings on the Bible School Compound.

Rev. Romeo Baronia has been elected as field man with a charge that he give full time to the supervision of the field work. God has given him some gracious revivals recently in these new Churches. Our plan is to erect a Church in a new community and then send an evangelistic team to this church for a revival. We do not know how long the field will be wide open for us but at the present time, your representative has never witnessed such a challenge and opportunity to minister to hungry hearts.

We are operating on a cash basis. If the funds do not come in we wait for the Lord's orders. We marvel at the Lord's help thus far and believe that greater things are in store for His people.

The value of our churches and Bible School properties stands at \$100,-000.00 and there is no indebtedness.

Rev. and Mrs. Marion Vreugdenhil and daughter have been selected as workers in the High School and Bible School. We trust that we can get clearance of their visas so they can be on their way in ten days. We solicit your prayers for them and for all of our workers there.

REPORT OF THE WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT

On behalf of Dakota Wesleyan Youth, 400 strong, we bring greetings to the Dakota Annual Conference. We express our sincere thanks to every Pastor, every parent, and every layman, who has stood behind the work of Wesleyan Youth as we have sought under God to launch out into the rich harvest of the whitened fields of youthful souls. Above all we express our thanks to God, and give Him glory for every soul saved, for every believer sanctified, for every victory won in His name, for we recognize that without Him we can do nothing. To God be the glory, great things He hath done.

We are happy to report that during the year, 3 new youth societies have been organized with a total membership of 64. Since the end of the conference year another Society has been organized which will be reported in next year's report. Total increase in membership for the year is also 64. Wesleyan Youth subscriptions increased by 59. One of our Youth, Mrs. Bobby Lee Abarr of Billings, Montana, was the winner of the Photo Contest in the Annual Youth Week Campaign. For these gains we give thanks and honor to God. The Youth Project for the coming year has for its goal the raising of \$550.00. Of this amount \$300 to be used for the assistance on salary for Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Yellow Hawk as they labor on the American Indian Mission Field. The remaining \$250.00 will go toward completion of our Youth Chapel.

We are grateful for the support of the members of the Conference in helping us raise nearly \$1200.00 thus far for our Chapel, and will with the receipt of the funds mentioned above have the project completed and debt free. We are believing God to aid us in the fulfillment of this goal.

But with cause of rejoicing and thanks, there are also areas of deep concern. One such area is in the area of reporting the youth statistics. For instance last year while you reported on your Youth Statistical blanks that you had 355 members, you reported only 327 on your Pastor's Statistical Reports. While reporting on your Pastoral Reports 311 W. Y. subscriptions you reported only 273 on your W. Y. Statistical Report. It would seem that greater care should be exercised in securing correct information for these reports.

Of even greater concern was the report of the President of our Area College that in answer to inquiry made, over 50% of our churches have no youth of Senior High School age. This is serious. It will become tragic, if we as Pastors and laymen do not heed the warning and rally to the challenge of the hour.

We believe Wesleyan Youth of today are as wonderful as Wesleyan Youth of any age. They have proven themselves as we have worked with them. But we need to remember that Satan is also as great. The failure is not with the Youth primarily, but with us, in praying and living, until youth be brought under Holy Ghost conviction, established in the faith, and sent forth as witnesses for Him.

The time has come for aggressive, forceful leadership. We believe such leadership has been installed. We urge you to work with him, and through him to the glory of God.

Our thanks for your co-operation as we have served these past two years. We join the ranks to put our shoulders to the wheel with you to win the battle for Christ. For all things are possible through Him.

THE DAKOTA CONFERENCE

STANDING RULES

1. Annual Conference 8% Fund: Financial plan for Conference Work: Money for Conference work shall be obtained by each local church paying an amount equal to 8% of all monies raised for all purposes, this to include local treasury, Sunday School, W. M. S., W. Y. S., and Y. M. W. B., with the exceptions of finance for building and repairs and dues, and that 2% of the 8% be earmarked for Conference Headquarters and Camp Meeting. This amount is to be sent to the Conference Treasurer once a month. "A the

2. Railroad Expense: The amount of the Railroad Expense assessment this year is \$15.40. It is recommended that this amount be sent to the Conference Treasurer as soon as possible. The Committee shall reimburse the pastors for railroad expense on the basis of five cents a mile, one way, for distance traveled.

The Committee in securing the amount of assessment for each Church shall take the cost of car fare of the pastors present, and eligible for such expense, added to any deficit from the previous year; the result divided by the total number of churches, shall determine the assessment each year for this item. Only those pastors whose Churches have paid the assessment for the previous year shall be eligible to receive car fare.

3. Camp Meeting Board: The Conference W. M. S. President and the Conference W. Y. President, shall be members of the Camp Meeting Board by virtue of their office.

4. The Local Church File is to be left with the Church by the outgoing Pastor, so that the incoming Pastor will have immediate access to the data contained therein upon his arrival on the field. This file is to be open for inspection to members of the local church.

5. **Budgets:** All churches are to be instructed at the beginning, and again at the close of the conference year regarding their obligations to the Conference, relative to Budget askings, and the amount due on the Budget.

6. Officers' Terms: All officers shall hold office until the close of the Conference session in which they are retired.

7. Honorarium Treasurer: The Conference Treasurer shall be paid an honorarium of \$150.00 each year.

8. Honorarium Secretary: The Conference Secretary shall be paid an honorarium of \$150.00 each year.

9. Regarding Ordination: No person shall receive ordination in the future in the Dakota Conference who does not intend to engage in definite Christian work.

10. The Auditing Committee shall be one of the Standing Committees.

11. Instruction to Treasurers: The treasurers of the various Conference funds shall hold such funds in some bank that is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in the name of the Dakota Conference and checks drawn on such account shall be signed by the treasurer, as treasurer of said fund.

(a) Each treasurer shall have in hand, bank statements at the beginning and at the close of the conference year involved, and said bank statement shall be submitted with the Treasurer's account book to the Auditing Committee of the Conference at the Annual Conference session, on the first day of the session.

(b) Duplicate receipts, or records, other than the treasurer's account

book, with source, date, and donor of all receipts shall be submitted to the Auditing Committee with said treasurer's books.

(c) All disbursements from said funds shall be paid by check, and all cancelled checks shall be submitted with the treasurer's books to the Auditing Committee.

12 Pioneer Pastor's Funds: An assessment of three dollars (\$3.00) per year shall be raised from each member of each charge, and sent to the Conference Treasurer. The monies thus raised constitute the Pioneer Pastor's Fund which will be distributed by the Missionary Board.

13. Closing Date of Conference Fiscal Year: Closing date shall be April 30.

14. Dakota Annual Conference Minutes, or Journal: Each church or charge, shall be apportioned, one Journal for every three members, unless otherwise designated by the Pastor or Delegate. The Conference Secretary shall send a statement to each charge, stating the amount necessary to pay for the Minutes.

15. Each Pastor Shall Receive His Salary from the Church he has served the past year, for the two Sundays of Conference and Camp Meeting.

16. Change of Pastors-Moving Expense: We recommend that when a church makes a change of Pastors, that said church enter into an agreement with the incoming Pastor, establishing an equitable way of financing the Pastor's moving expenses.

17. Vacation for President: We recommend, that the Conference President be granted a two-weeks vacation with pay, inclusive of two Sundays.

18. Vacation for Pastor: We recommend, that the Pastor be granted a two-weeks vacation with pay, inclusive of two Sundays.

19. Ministerial Benefit Fund Purpose: To provide financial assistance for Conference Elders and Preachers, in times of serious illness, or death in their families.

All members and Licentiates shall become members upon payment of first assessment, but no one shall be eligible to receive benefits until four consecutive assessments have been paid.

The Secretary-Treasurer Shall Make Four Assessments per Year, or more if emergencies arise, in the following manner: Each minister on the Conference Roll shall be assessed \$1.50 on due notice from the Secretary, except when both husbands and wives are preachers. In such cases only one is assessed. Each pastor shall collect \$1.50 from his church or charge each time an assessment is made, except ministers not serving in the Conference as Pastors. These are to pay \$2.00 for each assessment.

Disbursements: The Secretary shall upon the receipt of the worthiness of the case, pay out of the treasury 50% of the amount of the actual expense provided that no payment shall exceed seventy-five dollars to any one family during one conference year, possible exceptions being made in extreme cases with the approval of the Conference President and his advisory board, and the Secretary-Treasurer of the Ministerial Benefit Fund. (Normal maternity cases excepted.)

Members Delinquent in the last two payments prior to claim for help, shall be ineligible. In case one is delinquent in two, or more payments, no benefits will be paid in emergencies by paying of delinquent payments. If assessment is paid by check, include a service charge to the amount of the check. In Case of Death a maximum of \$100.00 will be paid the beneficiaries. The assessment in such case shall be one dollar for pastor, and one dollar for the church and \$1.50 for all others.

In case the Secretary-Treasurer is in doubt as to the worthiness of a case, he shall advise with the Conference President.

Postage and necessary expense shall be deducted from the fund.

20. Opening Date of Conference: Shall be the FIRST Tuesday after the third Monday of June of each ycar. (Camp Meeting shall begin on the Thursday preceding Conference.)

21 Conference Work: All monies sent in under the 8% fund shall be counted as Conference Work on the Statistical blanks, and monies sent in for the Pioneer Pastor's Fund shall be counted as Conference Missions on the blanks.

22. Standing Committee Records: Each Conference Standing Committee shall have a book of records, and shall be prepared to report to Conference all work done by their Committee.

23. Member of Missionary Board: The Conference Treasurer shall be a member of the Missionary Board by virtue of office.

24. Committee Members Travel Expense: All members of all Committees doing Conference work shall have their travel expenses paid from the Conference Treasury.

25. Closing Date for Treasurers: All treasurers of the various funds of the Conference are instructed to close their books on the 15th day of May each year.

26. A. Committee Chairman and Personnel: The Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, the Chairman of the Committee on Railroad Expense, and the entire Statistical Committee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference a year in advance and their names to appear with the list of Standing Committees.

B. Standing Committee Member: The second ministerial member of the Committee on Passage of Character become a standing member of committee, elected the previous year to receive and review the reports on preparation for the consideration of the committee when it is completed.

27. Church Responsibility: Each Church shall be responsible to the pastor, and each Pastor shall be responsible to the Church to which he was appointed at the last Conference session, and which Church he has served for the preceding Conference year; this responsibility to be inclusive of the first Sunday after the close of the Conference and Camp Meeting.

28. Superannuate Pension Fund: Monies sent in by the Churches on the budget item of Superannuate Pension Fund (\$1.50 per member), is to be sent to the Superannuate Pension Fund Treasurer of the Conference.

29. Aid to Churches: All Pastors receiving aid from the Conference, whether the funds come from the Conference Treasurer, Advisory Board, Beckman Board, or Pioneer Pastor's Fund, shall send a monthly statement of monies received; 1st, from the Charge, 2nd, from secular work, and 3rd, from any other Conference source. This report to be sent to the treasurer of the fund from which he is receiving aid, and to the Conference Treasurers, and that subsequent payments not to be made until last month's statement be received, also this information to be included in the regular quarterly report to the Conference President.

ITEMS OF VITAL IMPORTANCE

Information Regarding the Beckman Board: A Board was created in June, 1949, to be known as the Beckman Board, this Board to manage and operate the Beckman properties. This Board is composed of the following persons: J. F. Simpson, L. D. Harris, Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Arthur Reisdorph, John Kearns, R. J. Sausoman, O. Theo Beckman, Kenneth Shelley. This Board is self-perpetuating and shall appoint any vacancies that shall occur through death or other causes. This Board shall have complete control over the properties received through transfers of Willie E. Beckman or O. Theo Beckman as Executor of the last will and testament of Willie E. Beckman, This Board shall retain such portion of income as necessary to deceased. meet its expenses in operating and keeping the property in good repair, including a separate reserve to insure sufficient operating funds. That the funds shall be disbursed in accordance with the agreement heretofore entered into between Willie E. Beckman and the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. That in accordance with the wishes of Willie E. Beckman that O. Theo Beckman continue as supervisor of the Beckman properties.

30. Agreement Between Conference and Willie Beckman Estate: The following land is deeded to the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church on the agreement mentioned below: S. W. ¼ North of 28, all of section 21, and S. W. ¼ of 9, all in township 18, range 11, in Perkins County, South Dakota.

(1.) That O. Theo Beckman be appointed supervisor to rent and subrent such land.

(2.) That the land not be sold without the approval of O. Theo Beckman.

(3.) That Rev. J. F. Simpson and his Advisory Board be a Committee to receive and disburse 50% of the receipts of the crop for Church Extension.

(4.) That when J. F. Simpson ceases to be President of the Conference that the Committee to receive and disburse the amount for Church Extension as mentioned in paragraph 3, be Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. R. J. Sausoman, and O. Theo Beckman.

(5.) When the land is sold, it is requested that Miltonvale Wesleyan College, the Indian work and the Philippine work sponsored by the Conference, be given proper consideration.

(6.) It is requested that the following persons be a committee to disburse the money from the sale of the land: Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. L. D. Harris, Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Rev. Arthur Reisdorph, Rev. John Kearns, Rev. R. J. Sausoman, Mr. O. Theo. Beckman.

(7.) That the Committee mentioned in paragraph 6 be empowered to fill vacancies made by the death or other causes, of any of the Committee.

(8.) It is requested that this agreement become a part of the Standing Rules of the Conference and printed accordingly in the Conference Minutes.

(9.) In case O. Theo. Beckman, the land Supervisor, is deceased before the land is sold, that the Committee mentioned in paragraphs 6 and 7 be empowered to transact all business relative to the land mentioned in this agreement.

31. The Signers for the legal documents for said Dakota Conference, shall be the President and Secretary of said Corporation, or its Trustees.

32. Pastor to Receive Salary When Attending Youth Camp: Each Pas-

tor shall receive his salary for one week, including Sunday, each year, during his attendance at Youth Camp.

33. Ministers Reporting: Ministers who do not report to the Annual Conference, and those who do not present a satisfactory report—the character of these can be passed only by Conference Action.

34. A Recommendation: That when a missionary conducts services in any of our churches who is other than a Wesleyan Methodist missionary, that ½ of the offering be retained for our own missionary work and that missionaries from other bodies be notified of this standing rule.

35. Conference Reports Due May 15 of Each Year: The blanks designated (Report of a Minister to the Annual Conference," "Pastor's Statistical Reports"; Evangelists and Special Workers financial Reports are to be in the hands of the Statistical Committee Chairman by May 15th of each conference year.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

On June 7, 1952, the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, voted to amend their articles of Incorporation, as follows:

1. That the Dakota Conference Missionary Board be the Board of Managers for said Dakota Conference; it has the power of attorney to transact all legal business for said Conference, in keeping with the Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in the interim of the Annual Conference.

2. The signers for the legal documents for said Conference, shall be the President and Secretary of said corporation, or its trustees.

3. That the Beckman Board of the Dakota Conference, be known as the directors of the Beckman estate, with power to transact all legal business in the estate, in keeping with the provision of the Will of Willie E. Beckman.

4. When said Board of Directors shall sell a part, or all of the land in the Beckman Estate, or when the leasing of the land for oil, or the sale of mineral or gas right, or royalties be made, that the President and the Secretary of said Conference, or its Trustees, are empowered to sign any legal papers, leases, deeds, and contracts of all kinds.

> 1.) The said Beckman Board of Directors has power to sell any, or all of the land, hereinafter described and that the President and Secretary shall have power to execute such conveyances. Said land being described as follows, to-wit: S. W. ¼ North half of 28, all of Section 21, and the S. W. ¼ of 9, all in Township 18, Ranges 11, in Perkins County, South Dakota.

> 2.) That said Beckman Board of Directors is self-perpetuating and the remaining members shall fill any vacancies which shall occur through death or other causes.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY APOLOGY:

The report of the Educational Secretary must consist almost entirely of a description of what others have done in the cause of Christian education during the past year. Therefore it must begin with a contrite apology from the secretary for failure which cannot be excused even by the demands of a new charge and other increased responsibilities. I appreciate the privilege of a "second chance" and hope by God's help to make a better effort the coming year.

The special activities of the secretary have been limited to attendance at the January meeting of the Local Board of Trustees of Miltonvale Wesleyan College, participation in the conference educational service Saturday evening, June 18th and the preparation of this report—which, I trust, will receive the careful consideration due the facts it contains.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

Students: A wholesome increase in the number of Dakota Conference students enrolled at MWC has taken place in recent years—an increase from 15 (10.7% of the student body) in 1957-58 to 28 (18.7% of the student body) in 1959-60.

Giving: 1959-60 statistics show \$4380 raised on educational budget and \$1933 on educational benevolences (the latter including harvest home offerings, living endowemnt pledges, honorary enrollment fees and gifts to the Miltonvale Wesleyan Campaign for expansion of about \$1600). In all, 21 churches overpaid their budget assessment by a total of \$475; 3 churches paid exactly; and 27 fell short of their educational budget assessment by a total of \$1123-for a net deficit of \$648.

A few comparisons may best indicate the recent trend in our giving to MWC:

The trend over a 5 or 10-year period is more encouraging than the last 12-month picture. In the years 1954-59 (the most favorable comparison), while MWC's expenses increased by 1/3, Dakota Conference's total educational gifts **doubled**. We trust that this year's 22.2% **decrease** is only a temporary relapse, attributed to the drought which has reduced the total contributed for all purposes for the year.

RESPONSIBILITIES:

The achievements of the conference during 1959-60 are to be appreciated under the circumstances; however, we fell far short of meeting the need and discharging our share of the responsibility. With 25% of the churches of the Miltonvale area (there are 8 conferences), 17.5% of the membership, nearly 19% of the students at MWC-and claiming 5 of the 15 faculty members as representatives of the Dakota Conference, we rank second only to Kansas in such areas as number of students in attendance, representatives on the faculty, budget giving, number attending hospitality day, etc.-all to be expected, since Dakota is the second largest conference in the area. In the light of the figures just cited, it would seem fair to say that Dakota Conference holds a one-fifth interest in Miltonvale College. By the same token, we must assume a major share of responsibility for failures along the lines of the 7.4% decline in enrollment and the bogging down of the Miltonvale Wesleyan Campaign for expansion. In a year when special effort was put forth by the school, sending Bob Girard and the MWC Varsity Quartet to travel the conference in quest of students and in the interests of the financial campaign, the decrease in above-budget gifts (however understandable) is cause for both embarrassment and alarm. If the drought alone was to blame, surely an improvement in the weather will produce a corresponding increase in gifts to MWC-sufficient to wipe out the deficits of '59-60 and to erase any question as to whether the churches of the Dakota Conference are enthusiastically "behind" our area school in her drive to provide adequate educational opportunities for our Youth in a vigorously Christian atmosphere.

NEEDS:

Students: With 66 in the junior college department, MWC ranks 19th in size of Kansas' 20 junior colleges (though she ranks second as to faculty qualifications). Only two others have fewer than 138 students. Enrollment in other departments raises Miltonvale's total to 150, of course. However, Kansas state authorities advise that continued accreditation of the junior college department will depend on an increase to at least 100 junior college students within the next few years-an increase of 66%-which would mean as our share an increase of 19 from the Dakota Conference to make a total of 47 of our young people. We have the youngsters, for 50 of them attended hospitality day this spring. The facilities are there and offer exceptional opportunities for distinctively Wesleyan Christian education. The trend is in that direction. We seek God's will for our Youth-and He uses human instruments in working out His plan for them. Is not this the time to do our utmost to see that every young person He wants at MWC actually learns His will and finds his way to the school? Both the welfare of our Youth and the future of our school are at stake.

Building: Dr. Wesley L. Knapp, MWC president, has said "As we view the educational scene today and project our planning into tomorrow it is very obvious that if Miltonvale College is to "stay in the running" we must be prepared to expend larger sums than ever for plant expansion. . . While our immediate concern is a new science and math building this must only be the beginning. Any program of long range planning on this campus must, it seems to me, envision new facilities for the library, possibly an administration-library building; new construction of student housing as soon as enrollments warrant; better quarters for our fine arts program; and enlargement of the present student union facilities. This may sound visionary, but I am thoroughly convinced that only as we move in this direction is there a future for M.W.C." To this may I add: We will have to pay to provide educational facilities for our Youth somewhere. Where better than at Miltonvale, where there is already a good start, a \$300,000 campus, an established reputation, a well-qualified and consecrated faculty, an organized, interested, united constituency-a "going concern" that needs only our united support to go forward to meet the challenge and demands of service to our Wesleyan youth in the "last days" or the "atomic age," whichever you choose to call it. A tremendous job is to be done. The temporal and eternal welfare of our

own children is directly involved. Wesleyans of the Miltonvale Area and the Dakota Conference can carry the task to successful completion as they take it to heart and work hand in hand.

Miltonvale Wesleyan Campaign: This 4-year campaign to raise \$125,000 (for a new science building, liquidation of the gymnasium debt, remodeling of other buildings and establishment of a reserve fund) has progressed slowly throughout the area, less than \$20,000 dollars having come in during the first year-less than half of the first year's quota. (During the same period the Central Area raised \$137,000 for a similar project.) At last report 70 of the 237 churches of this area had organized for the campaign and 40 had actually completed the canvass and reported.

With a 1/5th interest in MWC, the Dakota Conference in a recent year contributed 20.6% of the budget funds sent to Miltonvale, which sounds like a reasonable discharge of that responsibility. However, in the above-budget gifts to MWC (which are also essential to the operation and particularly to the growth of the college) Dakota Conference gifts accounted for only 9.5% of the total. (One-third of the cost of the school's operation is met from "General Income"-received in addition to what students themselves pay for tuition, fees, board and room. More than half of this "General Income" comes from above-budget gifts--that is, about 1/6th of the operating expenses. Budget supplies the other 1/6th. And-all funds for building and expansion must come from above-budget contributions-hence, their importance.)

This 9.5% of above-budget contributions seems to set the pattern (so far) of our giving to Miltonvale's special appeals—roughly 1/10th, for at last report Dakota Conference had contributed 11.2% of the cash received on the Miltonvale Wesleyan Campaign. Evidently we need to give special attention to adequate presentation of these special appeals, for certainly we would want to discharge our 1/5th responsibility—and real concern for the school might prompt us to go much farther whenever we are able.

Holding a 1/5th interest in MWC, the Dakota Conference might be expected to raise \$25,000 on the \$125,000 Miltonvale Wesleyan Campaignthat is, \$6250 per year for four years. In the first year we raised barely ¼th of \$6250-\$1578.78 at the first of the year. In other words, while the area as a whole fell 50% short of the year's goal, the Dakota Conference lagged 50% behind the area average-75% short of our goal.

It is difficult to picture the Dakota Conference without an area school. Conference President John Hunter states that 20 of our 51 pastors attended MWC-besides uncounted pastors' wives and faithful lay workers. Other Christian schools might give our Youth similar educational opportunities, but without the advantages of proximity to our area or the distinctive stamp of Wesleyan Methodism. I believe we would lose the benefit to much more than half of our young people were it not for Miltonvale. We need a school which will ground Dakota Youth in Wesleyan ways and return them to the Dakota Conference.

To survive, MWC must grow numerically.

To survive MWC must build.

To serve our youth as we would wish and as they deserve, MWC must improve her facilities.

If MWC is to serve and to survive, she must have funds above budgetand we must get behind the Miltonvale Wesleyan Campaign.

If \$25,000 is our conference's fair share, we may estimate our local

church responsibility either per-capita or %-wise. \$20 per member (\$5 per member per year for four years) would do it. (Our present combined budget and benevolent gifts to education amount to \$5 per member; so we must double our present effort.)

%-wise and a la $7\frac{1}{2}$ %— $2\frac{1}{2}$ % of total disbursements (not counting building, repairs and dues) would provide MWC with about \$6250 per year, or \$25,000 in four years. Each church could set its own goal, but we should aim high to compensate for possible failure on the part of other churches and more-distant conferences.

Such figures as \$125,000, \$25,000, \$6,250-or even \$5 per membersound like big money. However, look at it this way: each Wesleyan, by giving as much more for Christian education as he spends to keep up on current events, could put the Miltonvale Wesleyan Campaign over the top!!! (If there are three Wesleyans per family and they spend only 30¢ per week for a daily newspaper which they share in the home, they are paying more for the "news" than MWC is asking for her survival needs!) 10¢ per member per week for four years in the Miltonvale Area would raise \$148,054.40without the gain of a member since 1958!)

It can be done! Let's push this thing!

REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. When the educational secretary's oral report was given before conference, a second, spontaneous "educational service" took place, high-lighted by an earnest appeal by Reverend Lester Bennett, who had recently visited Miltonvale. His plea, and that of your secretary, is that we of the Dakota Conference should "back" MWC first of all by our most importunate prayers for God's leadership, His working upon the campus, His supply of school needs and His sending of revival.

2. The conference is to be commended for the fact that despite a drought year only a small decrease in budget giving was reported. Let us continue to give first attention and due emphasis to raising the educational budget.

3. Let us concern ourselves with the future plans of the young people of our homes and our congregations, enquiring where God may be pleased to have them continue their education and doing our best to send those He calls to MWC.

4. Let us enquire of the Lord and examine our hearts and give Him an opportunity to speak to us concerning the Miltonvale Wesleyan Campaign --then let us be faithful in all that He would have us to do in response to it. Would He have us do less than the \$20 per member that represents our fair share???

5. Will each local church please elect a Church Educational Secretary and send his name and address to Gordon Cary, 1509 University Ave., Hot Springs, S. D. The names will be sent to President Knapp, who plans to assist them in their work.

6. Let each church activate the local Church Educational Committee, inform them of their duties and alert them of their responsibilities for July 17th, October 16th, January 15th and April 16th. (See paragraph 254 of the Discipline.)

 $\overline{7}$. And let us pray for one another and for each arm of God's great work in our conference, area and denomination.

PLAN OF WORK

We, the Plan of Work Committee, wish to submit the following as outlined by the General and Annual Conference for the year which begins May 1, 1960 and ends April 30, 1961:

- 1. Arrange with pastor for our missionary prayer service each month.
- 2. A minimum of 10 meetings to be held during the year, at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted, and at least one public meeting.
- 3. Recognizing the power of prayer let us diligently observe the following:
 - a. The formation of Women's World Fellowship circles in each society with W.W.F. Secretary who shall send a report to the Conference W.W.F. Secretary within 60 days after adjournment of the Annual Conference.
 - b. Observing on Tuesday the W.W.F.. Also the observance of the monthly Prayer and Fast Day and the World Day of Prayer services.
- 4. a. The President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the equivalent of 75% of the active membership be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary.
 - b. That a solicitor be elected for the Wesleyan Missionary, who will faithfully endeavor to obtain all renewals, gaining not less than two subscriptions a year, and that she use the conferencechurch key combination on all subscriptions, reporting the same to the Conference Magazine Solicitor.
- 5. a. Each society to be represented in Annual Conference by the new President and Delegate and provision be made by her society for such representation.
 - b. Delegate to be instructed by the local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference Session, same to be divided equally as decided at the Conference Session.
 - c. Statistical Report Blanks to be filled out on time and one copy sent to Mrs. Eunice Vreugdenhil, Brentford, South Dakota by May 15.
 - 6. All monies, including dues, and vouchers MUST be sent to Conference W.M.S. Treasurer ONLY at the close of the quarters ending July 31, Oct. 31, Jan. 31, and April 30, unless otherwise specified, with the final quarterly remittance not later than May 1,

using blanks sent out by Conference Treasurer.

- 7. Every woman in the church a member of the Society or a 10% gain in total membership.
- 8. a. An amount equal to 8% of all monies raised, except funds for building, repairs and dues, be paid for Conference work.
 - b. \$5.00 or more per society be paid for Church Extension. This may apply on budget.
 - c. \$5.00 or more per society be paid Hephzibah Orphanage. This may apply on budget.
 - d. 40¢ per member be paid for Conference WMS Expense and Administrative Fund. Not to apply on budget.
 - e. \$3.00 or more per society be paid to the Medical Fund. Not to apply on budget.
- 9. a. \$1.25 per member be paid toward the support of our Conference missionary. This may apply on budget.
 - b. Participation in the Card Call Plan. Not to apply on budget
 - c. Co-operation as far as possible in using Thank Offering Jars, Pre-Easter Self Denial Folders, or Thirty Pieces of Silver Plan, said money to be used as directed at the time.
 - d. That we promote the use of the Study Book, The Guide, Wesley Film Service and other helps, and also the Missionary Reading Course, sending the final report for same to Mrs. Mabel Wadsworth, Mina, South Dakota, by February 1.
- This efficiency standard to be read in the society at least twice a year. 10% credit for each of the 10 items or according fraction thereof. Total 100%. Honor Roll 80%.

We recommend the following:

- 1. That the Resolutions and Goals Reports be read before the society upon receipt of the new minutes.
- 2. That we urge the use of "In Memorium" folder funds for missions.
- 3. That local societies inquire into the needs of Mission stations and orphanage before sending used clothing and that no monetary value be placed on same, that such boxes be reported merely as the number sent; that boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value and that the sending society evaluate and fill out receipt for same. This receipt to be sent to missionaries for their signature, after which it should be forwarded to the W.M.S. Treasurer for proper receipting.
- 4. That gift subscriptions to the Magazine be encouraged.
- 5. That our Prayer Partners be remembered by letters and gifts, and surgical needs.
- 6. That our local societies make bandages, and unless otherwise directed through the Magazine, forward them to the Dept. of World Missions, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana, to await outgoing missionaries, the number of pounds to be reported.
- 7. Each Society to sponsor a Work Project throughout the year, bringing the same to the conference session to be displayed.
- 8. That each Society send jelly and canned goods to camp.
- 9. That our pastors be given at least two grocery or miscellaneous showers a year.
- 10. That we remember often in prayer:

- a. The Sioux Indian Chapel in Rapid City and Brainerd Indian School.
- b. Our work in the Philippines.
- c. Missionaries who have gone from our Conference.
- d. Dakota Conference youth preparing for Christian work.
- e. The need of consecrated laity answering God's call to assist in new fields,
- f. Our younger societies.
- 11. Concerning Finance:
 - a. That a missionary offering be taken at the monthly prayer service.
 - b. That an offering be taken for our work in the Philippines.
 - c. That an offering be sent by each society to be used for Dining Hall supplies.
 - d. That we include Honorary members in our assessments, unless otherwise specified.
 - e. That our local societies co-operate in the promotion of the Honorary Enrollment Plan for our colleges, and that monies for this project be channeled through the local and conference W.M.S. treasurers.
- 12. That there be continued reference to the Plan of Work as a guide to the year's work.
