Standing Rules

No. 1 Date of Conference: The Annual session of the Lockport Annual Conference, Inc., shall convene the Tuesday evening following the first Sunday of June on Houghton Campgrounds.

No. 2 Board of Trustees Report for Final Action: Resolved, That all matters involving the expenditure of money to be appropriated from the Conference Treasuries, be referred to the Board of Trustees for their consideration and to be reported back by them to the Conference for final action.

No. 3 General Conference Delegate: Resolved, That it is the sense of the Lockport Conference that no person should accept the position as delegate to the General Conference unless he expects to be present during the entire session. The President is required to communicate this resolution to the delegates three weeks before the General Conference begins.

No. 4 Pastor's Moving Expenses: The church calling a pastor to serve them shall pay his moving expenses to the charge. The same not to apply on his salary.

No. 5 Closing Treasurer's Books: The Conference Treasurer is hereby authorized to close his books two weeks before the Annual Conference convenes, therefore all receipts and monies should be in his hands by that time if credit on Statistical Report is desired.

No. 6 Temperance, Sabbath Observance, and Public Morals: Resolved, 1. That we are definitely committed to the prohibition of the liquor traffic rather than its regulation. 2. That we hereby affirm our belief and conviction that the Christian Sabbath was appointed as a day of rest and worship and should be so observed with resolute consistency. 3. That we believe that the highest and noblest conception of public morals is to be achieved through the regeneration of individuals rather than through the collective reformation of society. 4. That for the successful maintenance of the positions above indicated we are fully committed to the support of every valid effort for the preservation of our democratic rights of free speech, a free press, and free religion against all encroachments of dictatorial regimentation of thought and action whether in State or Church.

No. 7 Pastor's Vacation: Each charge shall grant to its pastor each year a two weeks' vacation with pay at a time he shall elect.

No. 8 Reading of Reports: Resolved, That in the reading of the Pastor's Statistical Report it is obligatory to read only items 3, 8 and 10.

No. 9 Adjustment of Pastor's Salary: Resolved, That churches which enter into a financial agreement with the pastor shall when needful, make adjustment of this obligation at each quarterly meeting. A full settlement of the pastor's salary shall be made before the time of the Annual Conference. Any financial agreement on salary entered into by a church and pastor shall not be of force after the end of the Conference year for which

it is made, unless it is renewed by the contracting parties. The financial obligation of each church to its pastor shall be in force throughout the conference and camp meeting period. He shall receive his salary the same as if he were on the charge conducting services. The Sunday following conference shall be the first Sunday of the new year.

No. 10 Delegates' Credentials: It shall be the duty of the pastors to forward to the Conference Secretary not later than one week before the Annual Conference convenes the church (not missionary) delegates' credentials from his charge.

No. 11 Budget Apportionment: The Budget Committee shall base their appointment of the budget for Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Education and Hephzibah Orphanage on the rate per member recommended by the Board of Administration. The Sunday School budget shall be determined by the number of persons in the Main School, at the rate of five cents a person for Denominational and one cent a person for Conference Sunday-school work, the same to be listed as separate budget items. Conference Budget shall be the sum recommended by the Board of Trustees and approved by the Conference. The Conference Entertainment Budget shall be the amount recommended by the oard of Trustees, the same to be disbursed upon their recommendation and approval of Conference. The W. Y. P. S. budget shall be determined on the rate per active member of the W. Y. P. S. Society according to the Discipline. Each charge may have the number of members under sixteen years of age, and any Elder or Elder's widow who cannot contribute to the budget, deducted from its membership list provided the pastor gives to the Budget Committee the number of such members before the close of the second day of Conference.

No. 12 Budget Credit: Nothing but cash shall count on the Sunday School, Conference, or Conference Entetainment budgets. Money paid on L. S. U. pledges, or interest paid on Educational Notes and all money paid for current expenses of Houghton College shall count on the Educational budget. Cash and receipts acceptable to the Missionary Boards shall count on Orphanage, Home and Foreign Missionary budgets.

No. 13 Date for Taking Pastoral Vote: The pastoral vote shall be taken throughout the Conference the first Sunday following March 15.

No. 14 Communion Service: The Conference Annual Communion Service will be observed on Tuesday evening following the preaching service, the communion table to be prepared by the stewards of the Houghton Church.

No. 15 Conference Board of Church Extension: 1. That the Conference elect by ballot an Extension Secretary. This is to be a non-salaried office, receiving remunerations only for travel expense and time spent away from regular duties in the interest of the Church extension work.

2. That the Annual Conference elect a Conference Board of Church

Extension to include: President of the Conference, Conference Extension Secretary, President of the W. Y. P. S., all these three ex-officio, plus two lay members elected by the Annual Conference. Whenever the offices of Conference President and Extension Secretary are filled by the same person the fifth member shall be elected from the Conference floor.

- 3. That the duties of the Extension Secretary be:
 - A. To act as Chairman of the Conference Board of Church Extension.
 - B. To have supervision of the Conference Board of Church Extension, of the Conference extension work.
- 4. That the duties of the Conference Board of Church Extension be:
 - A. To survey the Lockport Conference territory to determine the most suitable locations for extension projects.
 - To allocate such funds as are received for the proposed designated projects.
 - C. To publicize throughout the local churches the work of the department.
 - D. To render to the Annual Conference a detailed report of the work of the past year.
- 5. That the treasurer of the Conference Board of Church Extension be elected by the board from their number and be authorized to receive funds for this extension program.
- 6. That the Pioneer Calendar plan be used as a means of raising funds for this program. That all offerings and contributions received in extension service go into this fund.
- 7. That all funds go directly to the treasurer of the Conference Board of Church Extension.

Report No. 3

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

Brethren and Sisters of the Lockport Annual Conference, we bring you greeting in the Master's name! We have reached another milestone in our history, the eighty-ninth annual session of our existence as a body, through the tender mercies of our God. Let us give praise for all His goodness, and implore His grace and guidance in the deliberations and actions of this present assembly.

That the days in which we live and labor are momentous, politicians, statesmen and world leaders, as well as earnest Christian leaders everywhere are agreed. But we have a mighty God, and He has made available to us as His servants and soldiers a panoply which is fully adequate to make us more than conquerors, not alone in a defensive warfare against the arch enemy of our souls, but to successfully wage a great advance against his strongholds and to win new territory for the King of kings! I am saying this not merely to fill in, but from a deep and growing conviction that too long we have been prone to count too much on human sagacity and human wisdom and skill, and though we have not fully realized it, we have not appreciated as we should that it is "not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts."

If I may be permitted to express some personal feelings and to make an humble confession it is this: that for recent months especially I have felt an increasing hunger for more of God; for the "power from on high," for the fullness of the Spirit, as we are commanded in Ephesians 5:18. In Acts 1:8, Jesus said, "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you," etc. So we have His authority to say that God has

power which will make His church invincible today! Is not the honest acknowledgement of the need of this divine enduement, and the humble and wholehearted seeking it at the hand of God, the secret of the gracious Holy Ghost revivals which have been given in Los Angeles and in various subsequent places in this country in recent months?

We have been busy through the year at the work assigned us, and while there is nothing spectacular to report for the conference we believe progress has been made. Two new churches have been dedicated.

On August 14th at 211 West State Street, Wellsville, N. Y., we dedicated a very attractive and splendidly located place of worship. This property was purchased by the class there, and the ground floor remodelled to make a very inviting and commodious sanctuary. It has Sunday School rooms, rest rooms and all equipment for a church plant. The parsonage is in the upper flat and is very pleasant and comfortable. Brother Girts and the group of faithful men and women there worked hard and gave liberally to make this possible. Through united and prayerful effort under the blessing of God, we believe they can carry their financial load and enjoy a steady growth.

On September 18th we dedicated a beautiful new church at East Leon on a new site at the four corners in that community. Such was the enthusiasm and loyalty with which this church and community rallied when the project of remodeling their old edifice fell through, this beautiful new house of worship was dedicated with but a few hundred dollars of indebtedness remaining. Dr. Rufus Reisdorph preached the dedicatory sermon, which was much enjoyed and appreciated by all who were present.

At Big Tree what has amounted to a building program has been carried through successfully under the leadership of Warren Hartway. They have had their trials there but God brought them out on top. When they had raised their building last Fall and put a basement under it, the big wind storm struck, and blew the building off the foundation, wrecking the wall and doing considerable damage to the structure. But wind insurance repaired the damage and gave them a nice concrete floor in their basement, the furnace installed and chimney built, all to the good. When finished they will have comfortable living quarters for the pastor in the same building. Brother and Sister Hartway have been doing a good work among the children and youth in the community and have seen some seeking the Lord, and some adults as well.

At Cuba, N. Y. on 11 North Park Street, a very fine parsonage has been practically completed. If you haven't seen it you ought to make a call on the Rev. and Mrs. George Osgood and look it over. It is well built and splendidly laid out, very pleasant and roomy, modern in every particular. The splendid part of it all, and the part that makes us won-

der how they did it is that it is free from debt!!! I expect Brother Osgood could very easily explain that to all of you, for he was the main architect, contractor and builder. Of course the good people of the church helped in every way possible, and to pastor and people of the Cuba church is due much credit. I have not heard of plans for dedication of this fine parish house as yet, but we doubtless shall in due time. Then come and see for yourself.

At Fillmore church a splendid job of interior decorating and remodelling has been done this year which greatly improves this house of worship, both in appearance and for convenience, adding some new rooms for Sunday School work and for the comfort of all.

Several others have made improvements on the church properties which also are commendable and will be rewarded of the Lord. Progress has been made on the parsonage at McRae Brook, and will doubtless be completed ere long. Mention ought to be made of the valiant work of the Rev. and Mrs. C. J. White at Machias. They have seen during this year what has encouraged their hearts and has encouraged ours. Their labors are being rewarded. We visited a revival meeting they held last winter with Brother Emerson Cornelius, as evangelist, and there was a good congregation and an excellent service.

The conference paper has been published four times during the year and has been well supported by the churches.

Travel

We have held fifty-eight quarterly meetings during the year, and several other quarterly conferences and business meetings of the churches as occasion has required. Beside this there has been considerable travel in caring for different conference matters which have demanded our attention. On March 28-30, it was a great privilege to attend the Leaders' Conference at Central, South Carolina. This was the third such gathering held since last General Conference, and though all have been excellent it seemed to be generally conceded that this was the greatest thus far. It was indeed a time of fellowship, of prayer and going down before God, of humbling and melting and blessing from the presence of the Lord. conferences are arranged and the programs prepared by our General Conference President, Dr. Roy S. Nicholson, and a hearty vote of appreciation was accorded him by those present for the feast of good things provided and for the capable and gracious way in which he presided throughout the three days of the gathering. It was decided that since next year June will be the occasion of the General Conference Quadrennial Session, there will not be a Leaders' Conference held. Plans were considered concerning the printing in book form of the addresses given at the conference so that those who were not privileged to be there and hear them might nevertheless have their content.

Official Acts and Appointments

June 25, 1949 appointed the Rev. Clarence Barnett as pastor of Rich Valley church.

July 18, 1949 granted a letter of transfer to the Michigan Conference to the Rev. Charles Foster.

July 30, 1949 granted a letter of transfer to the California Conference to the Rev. Roma Lapham Acuna.

August 21, 1949 upon recommendation from the Levant church, we received Miss Pearl Crapo to study and travel and granted her authorization papers since she had been appointed by the Missionary Board as a missionary to South America. This had the approval of my Advisory Board.

July 30, 1949 released John A. S. Woodhouse from his appointment as pastor of the Batavia church at his request, after consulting my Advisory Board. Later, Brother Woodhouse decided to remain as pastor at Batavia for the remainder of the year. We therefore re-appointed him accordingly. October 1949 placed R. Burnett Thompson in charge of the prospective new work in Silver Creek, N. Y. Gave him a Conference Preacher's License; also authorization papers, with approval of the Advisory Board.

September 5, 1949 received the Rev. Marion H. Vincent's credentials, and later, in December advertised him as no longer a minister in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, my Advisory Board approving.

January 15, 1950 placed the Rev. Joseph R. Pitt on the Superannuated List at his own request, and with the Advisory Board's approval.

March 22, 1950 after consulting the Board, we granted the request of the Rev. H. J. Bullock, that he be placed on the Superannuated List, the Advisory Board approving.

April 18, 1950 received the Rev. George E. Failing by Letter of Standing from the South Carolina Conference.

May 8, 1950 appointed the Rev. C. H. Barnett, the Rev. Erwin Enty, and the Rev. Eldyn Simons as Committee on Temporary Organization.

May 26, 1950 signed for the Conference Board of Trustees a new mortgage and bond to renew a loan of \$2425.00 from the Foreign Missionary Society to the Buffalo church.

May 31, 1950 signed for the Board of Conference Trustees a Sale Contract for purchase of lots in Silver Creek, N. Y., for a church building site.

June 1, 1950 granted a Letter of Standing to the Rev. Earle H. Thompson.

June 3, 1950 appointed Dr. Frieda Gillette and Charles Flint as lay members of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders.

June 6, 1950 received the Revs. Price P. Stark and Helen D. Stark by letters of transfer from the Champlain Conference.

The Conference President called a meeting of the Judiciary Committee for Saturday, August 27, 1949, at the College. This meeting came to order at 1:00 p. m. The following members were present: Arthur J. Taylor, Chauncy I. Armstrong, Aaron A. Hickok, Archie R. Crapo and Stephen W. Paine.

The committee took cognizance of the fact reported by the President and his Advisory Board, that the Rev. M. H. Vincent had, following the rise of Annual Conference, been pursuing unauthorized labors within the confines of the Rich Valley charge, and that after having been requested in writing by the President to desist and having been labored with by the President he had persisted in these labors considered detrimental to the welfare of the Rich Valley charge.

The committee, after prayerful deliberation, voted that these acts constituted a violation of the orders and resolutions of the Lockport Conference. They voted to entreat and admonish Brother Vincent to desist from this insubordination, and, provided that if he should not so desist by Monday, September 12, the Conference President should request the surrender of his ministerial parchments.

The Rev. Vincent replied immediately by surrendering his parchments.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

The Lockport Conference Board of Church Extension has had four meetings this Conference year. We started the year out by dividing the charges of the Conference among the men of the Board and visiting each charge in the interest of the Pioneer Calendar Fund. This required hundreds of miles of travel. The Lord blessed us in our contact with the churches.

Our pioneer points and organized work assisted has been under very

able leadership. Cuba has become self-supporting. Big Tree suffered reverses in the wind storm but God did work it out to His glory. The need continues to be great at Big Tree.

At the close of our last session of Conference, Dr. Stephen W. Paine recommended Burnett Thompson to the Board for extension work. The Board asked him to make a survey of the Dunkirk-Silver Creek area. After a six weeks canvass he reported that Silver Creek was wide open to a new work. He was sent out to Silver Creek and has in the remainder of the year gathered a fine group of people and seen a number of the young people saved. Also, a fine building site has been purchased and dedicated to the Lockport Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We praise God for His leadership in Silver Creek.

As Extension Secretary we have traveled something over 1000 miles. We did not keep the mileage the last part of the year as we did not make a charge to the Board.

For all that has been done we give God the glory, Praise His Name! I know the blood covers and the Holy Spirit cleanses for service. I trust God to make up wherein I am not capable and to forgive wherein I have failed.

MEMORIALS TO GENERAL CONFERENCE MEETING IN 1951

The following are memorials adopted Item by Item containing suggested amendments to the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline for presentation at the Quadrennium General Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church meeting in 1951 at Fairmount, Indiana:

ITEM I: Regarding the Authority of the Scriptures. Par. 12 of the Discipline. Change the title to read: "The Sufficiency and Full Authority of the Holy Scriptures."

After the words, "we do understand the . . ." make the article read as follows: "books of the Old and New Testament. These scriptures we do hold to be the inspired and infallibly written Word of God, fully inerrant in their original manuscripts and superior to all human authority."

Then follows the list of the canonical books and the references as at present.

ITEM II: Par. 127 After the conclusion of the present paragraph add the following: "No candidate shall be recommended for elders' orders until he has first been carefully and specifically questioned by the Committee on Itineracy and Orders and shall have fully satisfied the Committee as to his Christian testimony and as to his full personal commitment, with-

out reservations, to the Articles of Religion of the Wesleyan Methodist Church."

ITEM III: Par. 369. Amend the present paragraph to read as follows: "Each candidate must also, prior to his recommendation for elders' orders, be examined orally by the conference Committee on Itineracy and Orders regarding his personal adherence to each and every one of our Articles of Religion."

ITEM IV: Par. 419 (p. 278) After the words "are you persuaded that the Holy Scriptures . . ." insert the following added words: "are the fully inspired and inerrant Word of God and that they . . ." The remainder of the paragraph to read as at present.

ITEM V: Regarding Officers of Campus W. Y. P. Societies. Par. 398 (p. 246) In Article IV (Officers) at the close of Section (1) add the following: "Except that in the case of a campus W. Y. P. Society any of the members who are of unquestioned Christian experience and devotement to God and commitment to the doctrines of the Bible as taught by the Wesleyan Methodist Church shall be eligible for election to these offices."

Message—Rev. Rufus Reisdorph brought a stirring message on Launching out in the work of the Lord. Our hearts were challenged to do exploits for the Lord.

Adjournment—The Convention was closed with singing a prayer. All went home refreshed from having met together because God had met our hearts.

Standing Rules

- 1. That the Committee on Temporary Organization consist of the President of the Woman's Missionary Society, the Vice-President and the Secretary.
- 2. That this Committee shall include in its report a Committee on standing rules.
- 3. That the election of the Society officials be held on Friday afternoon.
- 4. That all local societies see that all missionary money be remitted to this Conference Treasurer through the local treasurers.
- 5. That the local Y. M. W. B. Superintendent instruct their local treasurers to send money through the Conference Y. M. W. B. Superintendent, money orders and checks made payable to the General Superintendent, Mrs. Aileen Shea, Houghton, N. Y.
- 6. That each local Y. M. W. B. remit to the Conference Superintendent 1 cent (.01) per member as a desk fund.
- 7. That the White Gift Christmas to Home Missionaries be continued in the local societies.
- 8. That it shall be the duty of the incoming local presidents to attend Conference if possible. Her name also should appear on reports.
- 9. That each Woman's Missionary Society and each Y. M. W. B. have the last meeting of the Conference year as near the tenth of May as possible so all monies can be remitted to the conference treasurers in sufficient time to return all receipts to the pastor so they can have credit on their reports.
- 10. That we observe the Friday before Conference as a day of prayer and fasting.
- 11. That all money raised by the societies shall be used for missionary work.
- 12. That no money shall be payed out without the vote of the local society.
- 13. That the membership of the Conference W. M. Society voting body shall consist of: lady pastors, pastor's wives, Y. M. W. B. Superintendents and missionaries as well as Conference officer and president and delegates from each local society.
- 14. That one of the two statistical blanks, sent to the local societies, shall be given the Conference Statistical Committee on the first day of the Annual Conference Session. The other blank kept by the delegates to be read to the Conference Society and to be read at the first meeting of the

local society following the rise of the Annual Conference.

- 15. That receipts and disbursements in all reports shall be made to balance before being handed to the Conference Statistical Committee.
- 16. That all delegates' credentials be sent to the Secretary one week prior to Conference.
- 17. That one-half of the membership dues, both active and honorary, be used as Home or Foreign Missions as voted by the society, and the remaining half to be sent as Membership dues to the Conference Treasurer.
- 18. That all benevolence receipts be sent to the Conference Treasurer to receive credit. (Benevolence includes all receipts for clothing, offerings for individuals and projects for whom appeals have been made through the society. Also all receipts for radio work, floral funds and bandages for foreign work, white gift receipts, etc.) That all monies and receipts be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer two weeks before the date of the Annual Conference.
- 19. That the auditing committee should audit local reports before submitting them to the Statistical committee.
