RECORD OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The 108th Annual Session of the Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church opened at 2:30 p. m., June 27th, at the West Chazy Campground. After congregational singing, the Vice President led in prayer. Bro. Ray Morgan sang a solo entitled "God is Still on the Throne."

The roll call was responded to by 22 Elders, 6 Conference Preachers, and 22 lay delegates.

The Conference President, Rev. Chas. Dayton, addressed the assembly, and presented some parallels in the Champlain Conference to the Scripture lesson at I Samuel 14.

Following the address, the President read his Annual Report, Official Acts, Orders of the Day and Financial report.

By vote all of these reports were adopted. See reports.

Those elected to the Committee on Passage of Character were Rev. Fred Shippee Mrs. L. Starks.

It was voted that the Bar of Conference be the first seven center rows of seats.

The hours of Conference were voted to be as follows:-

A. M. from 8:45 to 11:30; P. M. 1:30 and close by vote.

The Nominating Committee elected is as follows:

Harris Earl and Gerald Matson were elected to the Auditing Committee.

Lay members—Mrs. Bertha Jones, Mrs. Edith Ackerman, and Mr. Harold Smith.

The Report of the Committee on Church Extension was read by Rev. Aldis Lamos. The report was adopted. (See reports.)

It was voted that the Conference adjourn for the rest of the afternoon to complete work (on the grounds) which it is imperative to be done. Dismissal by Bro. Finch.

WEDNESDAY FORENOON

Devotional part: Sr. Shippee led in singing. Sr. H. Perry read Psalm 34, and offered prayer.

Business: The roll was called. The minutes of the Tuesday afternoon session were read and adopted.

Introduced to the assembly: Rev. Roy S. Nicholson, our General Conf. President, and Connectional Representative, this year.

He spoke a few words of greeting.

It was voted that the Roll be called daily before the devotional period.

The report of the Conference trustees was read by Bro. Chapman, the Treasurer. It was adopted. See reports.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Bro. and Sr. Keyser for their work and care of the President's home.

It was voted to amend Standing Rule IX to read "Each Elder shall make his engagement as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released from his pastoral engagement within the period of three months following his election."

It was voted that it be made a Standing Rule that—During the year each Sunday School shall take an offering for the maintenance of the Conference President's home. (Standing Rule XXIV)

A motion relative to Statistical blanks being sent to the Conference Treasurer to fill in Budget items was LOST.

During the forenoon the following names were called and characters passed: Albert Warner, Aldis Lamos, Howard Chapman, Florence Shippee, Fred Shippee, F. H. Wright, Ray Morgan, Stanley Klob, Gerald Matson, Edwin Seaman, Wilbur Matson.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Bro. Wright in appreciation of his work in Houghton College.

It was voted that the Conference Secretary send a leter of appreciation to Bro. Price and Sr. Helen Stark.

The Conference Tithing Secretary gave his report, and it was accepted.

It was voted to adjourn for Committee work.

Bro. Moon offered prayer, especially for the National situation.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The roll was called.

The devotional period was conducted by Bro. H. Johnson. He read and commented upon the Scripture at Ephesians 3:14-21.

Prayer by Bro. Lamos.

Business: The minutes of the Wednesday forenoon session were read and adopted. It was voted to set the Order of the Day back sufficiently to give the Missionary Society time to hear the Springfield report.

Bro. Chas. Dayton's name was called and character passed. He gave the Springfield report. A balance of \$120. on the Springfield debt was raised.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Memorial service, with Sr. Shippee in charge. Singing—"Amazing Grace." Prayer preceded the following: Rev. Reginald Hewitt spoke in memory of Sr. Allen.

Sr. Ruth Hill spoke for the Missionary Society, also in appreciation of Sr. Allen.

Sister Flora Ressler was remembered in remarks by Bro. Jock. Bro. Elton Seaman spoke appreciatively of Sr. Gladys Paine, of West Chazy; and Bro. Aldis Lamos spoke likewise of Loren Putney (Age 9).

The closing song, "In the City Where They Need No Sun," was dedicated to the memory of others who died during the past year.

Second ORDER OF THE DAY: Address of the Educational Representative, Rev. George Failing.

He spoke of various VITAL interests to Houghton College. His message was indeed an inspiring address.

Prayer by Dr. Wilbur Dayton.

The NOMINATING COMMITTEE made a partial report.

It was voted that Sr. Ruth Hill be a committee to gather the names of those Conference members who die during the following Conference year, and present them to the Committee on Memorial.

The motion was amended thus: That Sr. Hill be the first member of the Memorial Committee next year.

The third ORDER OF THE DAY was deferred, in the absence of Dr. Stevenson.

It was voted to adjourn for Committee work.

Since Harold Smith is on the Pastoral Relations Committee, Bro. Sprague was appointed a member of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, in place of Bro. Smith.

Dismissal by Bro. Keyser.

THURSDAY FORENOON

The roll was called.

Devotional period: Bro. Herbert Seaman, leader. Bro. Ed. Mein offered prayer. The 91st Psalm was read for the devotional lesson.

The minutes of the Wednesday afternoon business were read and one insertion was made. After discussion it was voted that the minutes be accepted as read.

It was voted to change each of the Standing Rules IV and V to read \$50, instead of \$25. See Standing Rules.

Bro. Mullen was introduced, and later Bro. Chapman was presented as President of the N. Y. State Holiness Association.

The Conference Treasurer read his report, and it was adopted.

Names called and characters passed: O. M. Finch, Reginald Hewitt, James Keyser, C. L. Hill, Robert Wolcott, Gerald Hewitt, Duane Chadwick.

Bro. Nicholson was asked to explain the relative importance of identification with the National Holiness Association and the National Association of Evangelicals. He complied with the request.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Address by Rev. R. Nicholson, Connectional Representative. He read the Scripture lesson from 1 Cor. 12: 12-27. In speaking, Bro. Nicholson mentioned some of the Perils which confront us; he spoke of the matter of the proposed Church merger, the financial problems, the mid-century goals; and he outlined an eight point program.

Following the address, Bro. Phelps dismissed with prayer.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The roll was called.

Devotional period: Bro. Floyd Tyler offered prayer, and Bro. Ralph Seaman read portions from two Psalms.

Bupinesss It was voted to accept the minutes of the forencon as read. A partial report of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was read.

The Committee on Nominations read its complete report.

It was voted that the Resolutions incorporated in the report of the Committee on Nominations be referred to their respective Committees.

The Committee on Resolutions reported, and the report was adopted. See Reports.

It was voted that the Champlain Conference apply for member-ship as an auxiliary of the National Holiness Association.

A "Memorial to the General Conference" was read by Bro. A. Lamos. It was moved that it be presented to the General Conference.

The motion was LOST.

It was voted that the Conference make a gift of ten dollars to the National Holiness Association, this year.

During the afternoon the following names were called and characters passed: Spencer Moon, Elton Seaman, Arthur Northrup, Floyd Phelps, Ralph Seaman, Kenneth Ross, L. C. It was voted that we have a Church Calendar another year. Bro. Edwin Seaman was elected to publish the Church Calendar. The Conference consented to let him choose someone to assist him, and he did choose Bro. Aldis Lamos.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations was excused for Committee work.

Bro. Nicholson occupied the Chair while business was continued in the passage of character.

It was voted to adjourn. Prayer by Bro. McCallum.

FRIDAY FORENOON

The roll was called.

Devotional period: Conducted by Bro. Brainard. "Draw Me Nearer" was sung. The Scripture at 1 Thess. 4:13-18 was read, and Sr. Moon prayed.

Sr. Charles Dayton was introduced to the Conference.

Business: It was voted to accept the reading of the previous meeting.

The Auditing Committee made a verbal report, and it was accepted. It was voted to adjourn, to meet at the call of the Chair. Closing prayer by Bro. Finch.

Evening and Sunday Services TUESDAY EVENING MEETING

Report No. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the members of the Champlain Conference, Greetings!

As we come together in this one hundred and eighth session of the Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, it requires but little thinking to cause God's children to humbly bow and gratefully acknowledge the tremendous debt of gratitude which we owe to our Heavenly Father that we are spared; and this gracious opportunity is in reality ours. The mercies of God through this year have been manifold. Prayer has often been answered, and the hand of the omnipotent God has marvelously intervened in many instances, oftentimes in ways which, while not exactly as asked, yet in ways which were far more profitable and effective in the work of the Kingdom.

There is almost no church in the Conference which has not prayed and labored for a revival. Almost without an exception, every church has had at least one to three special series of revival meetings. The reports from some of these services were most inspiring and encouraging. Definite results were seen with the salvation of souls and the sanctification of the saints with a deepening among the members. Several have reported awakenings which were apparently deeper than for years past. It is our prayer that the effect of these meetings will be apparent and manifest in the lives and conduct of the delegates to this Conference, both Elders and lay-delegates.

We can truly say that God has helped in the pioneer projects of the Conference. Malone has enjoyed a gracious revival. Canaan Hill has grown, expanded, and developed in an encouraging way. The work at Cobleskill has been enjoying a very unique growth with a number of new souls saved and increased attendance. Northside-Cohoes has had a good year with a full-time pastor. Rev. Stanley Klob has done a fine work by God's Grace at East Poestenskill. Rev. Reginald Hewitt has maintained a prayer meeting weekly at Cambridge, N. Y. most of the year. We have responded to the request of the Sandgate, Vt. Chapel to provide them a preacher.

Because Springfield, Mass., was elected to be the Pioneer Church of the year, we will definitely report on this work separately. The debt of ten thousand dollars, which confronted the little band, July 1, 1949, last year, will be paid in full by July 1, 1950. Praise God! Also, perhaps two thousand dollars of building has been done during the year to nearly complete the construction of the parsonage. The membership has not grown in net numbers, but we feel that the outlook

and prospect of a Wesleyan Methodist Church in Springfield, Mass., is better than it was one year ago. Much thanks is due to the churches, pastors, and laymen who have contributed time, prayers, mileage, cash, and interest, to, as a Conference, achieve this tremendous task of raising the money to pay our creditors.

We have several churches which have contributed very liberally to our own Conference Missions, and in addition have attempted to give money enough to Foreign Missions to care for the full salary of a missionary on the field. May God bless these efforts.

God has used our Woman's Missionary Society under the able leadership of Mrs. Marjorie Stevenson.

The youth program of the Conference has prospered and been of profit under the guidance of Rev. Elton Seaman.

This will be a banner year with our young people standing firmly with us in church extension.

Some other achievements along the line are noteworthy such as the Brant Lake Church, which has finished paying for their Sunday School rooms this year. A fine new garage at the President's Home at West Chazy, built by Rev. James Keysor. A new 153 foot water well, eleven new flush toilets, new equipment and repairs on buildings, are improvements on our West Chazy Camp Ground. The Corinth Church is to be commended on their building program, having started and completed a beautiful addition to their church this year.

The times in which we live demand much of our pastors. They have a tremendous task and must draw constantly upon the storehouse of Heaven for ability. May we not expect the laity to also present their bodies a "living sacrifice" that our church may, in this hour, make our contribution to God, which we should in view of Christ's imminent coming.

Sunday School work is great work.

The following achievements represent the result of cooperative effort in the work of the Lord in our Sunday Schools. Our 34 schools have an enrollment of 2774 compared to 2796 reported last year, making a loss in enrollment of 22; the average attendance for the year is 1654 compared with 1598 reported last year making a gain in average attendance of 56. 18 schools gained, 14 schools lost, 2 reported no change. Some reported large gains, others heavy losses.

The Conference 4 Star Program has been promoted, and the following classification of Sunday Schools is according to this:

- (1) A Vacation Bible School.
- (2) Monthly Worker's Meetings.
- (3) A Christian Worker's Course.
- (4) 10% increase in Average Attendance.

STANDING RULES

- 1. The Resolutions of this Conference shall be printed in the Minutes of this Conference each year.
- 2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conterence.
- 3. The Conference President shall receive twenty dollars (\$20) per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.
- 4. The Conference Secretary shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his labor and incidental expenses.
- 5. The Conference Treasurer shall receive fifty dollars (\$50), per year for his services in caring for the funds.
- 6. In making his report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books one week before Conference session. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference session.
- 7. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.
- 8. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.
- 9. Each Elder shall make his engagement as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released from his engagement as Pastor within the period of three months following his election.
- 10. The first Sunday of each month shall be known as Missions Sunday, the Sunday School offerings to go alternately to Home Missions and Conference Missions, in that order, and be sent to the Conference Treasurer. (The Committee on Finance defines "Conference Missions" as the establishing of new and (or) subsidizing of the needy fields of the Conference.)
- 11. In securing Evangelists for the Camp meeting, the Camp meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.
- 12. The Camp meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen,

all to be elected by ballot (after the Conference of 1923), the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.

- 13. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget; and as far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.
- 14. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with Post Office address of the same.
- 15. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conference. The Pastor's salary for this closing Sunday shall be paid by the Church of which he is Pastor; and for the Sunday of the new Conference year it shall be paid by the Charge to which he is going.
- 16. Newly elected Conference officers shall take office after the close of the Conference Sunday.
- 17. The Conference shall include in the Orders of the Day a special period to consider Camp meeting business.
- 18. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.
- 19. Each Church member over fourteen years of age shall be apportioned fifty-two cents per year for Church Extension.
- 20. The Delegate's Credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CONFERENCE, and the Conference Secretary shall send printed blanks with the Statistical, Character, etc.
- 21. The Conference recommends that each Charge grant its Pastor two weeks vacation, and also grant him permission to hold a two weeks meeting (over two Sundays) away from his local Charge,—"both vacation and meeting to be without loss of pay, and exclusive of attending the Annual Conference and Camp meeting.
 - 22. The first Sunday in May shall be PASTORAL VOTE SUNDAY.
- 23. CHURCH EXTENSION. (1) The Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. (This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall be the Church Extension Committee.

(2) There shall be at least one Church Extension service on each charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Church Extension activities within the Conference shall be presented.

This service shall be under the supervision of the Conference President, or one whom he may appoint. Any person traveling the Conference in the interests of Church Extension must be appointed and under the direction of the Conference President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interest of Church Extension shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.

- (3) All offerings taken for Church Extension shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, and credited to Church Extension. The Conference Treasurer, upon recommendation of the Conference President and the Committee on Church Extension, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conference President.
- (4) Whereas the W. Y. P. S. is an organization that is aggressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies for Pioneer work be passed through the local W. Y. P. S. Treasurer to the Treasurer of the Champlain Conference.

We further recommend that the local Church Extension program be sponsored by the local W. Y. P. S. as far as possible.

24. (New Standing Rule) During the year each Sunday School shall take an offering for the maintanance of the Conference President's home.

GENERAL RULES

Ever bear in mind that these grounds and buildings are church property, and respect them as such.

The religious services are for your benefit—take advantage of them

Only young people who come at the recommendation of their pastor will be permitted the benefits of the Young People's Financial Plan.

Each young person is required to attend the regular Young People's Meeting; also—the evening service, and one other service during the day.

I. Care of grounds

- 1. Place waste paper and garbage only in containers provided. Do not throw it on the grounds.

- 4. Do your part toward keeping the grounds around your cottage or dormitory neat and looking clean.

II. Personal Conduct

- 1. The use of tobacco, profanity, obscene literature, card playing and gambling are prohibited on the Camp Grounds.
- 2. Wearing apparel must be modest at all times. The wearing of slacks, shorts, gym clothes or bathing suits is prohibited on the grounds.

Men are requested to wear shirts, and ladies to wear hose.

III. Dormitory and Cottage Rules

- 1. Campers are requested to be in their rooms for the night at 10:30 unless engaged in the tabernacle.
- 2. The rights of your neighbors must be respected: therefore, quiet must prevail in all rooms and dormitories.
- 3. Remember that there are others who will occupy these rooms after you; therefore, keep them clean, and leave them in good condition.
- 4. Because of fire hazards, there must be no cooking of food in the Dormitories.

STANDING RULES

- 1. The standing rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference minutes each year.
- 2. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to close her books one week before the Conference session begins.
- 3. The local treasurer is to send the two statistical blanks to the statistician two weeks before Conference convenes. Send the delegates credentials to the Conference Missionary Secretary two weeks before conference. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being sent, also giving rating according to efficiency standard. Take one blank home after conference to read to the local society.
- 4. All money raised by the society shall be used for missionary work, and no money paid out without a vote of the society.
- 5. The Conference President shall receive annually five dollars, the treasurer, ten dollars, and the Secretary, three dollars, to defray expense of postage and writing material.
- The voting body shall be composed of Conference Officers, Y. M.
 B. Superintendent, Presidents of local societies, lady pastors, pastor's wives, and one delegate from each local society.
- 7. Each local society shall continue sending six dollars to Southern Mountain Work, and five dollars or more to Hepzibah. This must be sent thru the Conference Treasurer to apply on budget.
- 8. It is required that twenty-five cents per member of the local society dues be forwarded through the Conference Society Treasurer to the General Conference Treasurer for the general fund. Also that twenty-five cents be retained in the Conference treasury and the remaining fifty cents be used directly for missionary work and to be applied on the budget.

The local societies shall disburse all Conference and General Conference funds through the Conference Treasurer, who shall in turn remit all General funds to the General Conference Treasurer.

- 9. Each society is to make provision for a missionary to travel the conference as early in the year as possible, allowing ample time for each charge.
- 10. The Plan of Work should be read quarterly to our local societies to keep us enthused in our work.
- 11. We recommend that the Treasurer of the Conference Society be elected as a committee of remembrance with authority to send flowers or other suitable tribute to those of our number who shall be called to their eternal reward. We further recommend that this shall include all pastor's wives and officers of our Conference Missionary Society.

Report No. 4

Whereas—Our Heavenly Father through Jesus Christ, His Son, commissioned the Church to carry the Gospel to the uttermost parts of the world; and

Whereas—That commission has never been revoked, its responsibility still rests upon His Church; and

PLAN OF WORK

For each local W. M. S. we recommend:

- 1. The holding of regular monthly meetings, with prayer, business, and the study of books and other missionary material.
- 2. The observance of special days with appropriate programs, these days being Harvest Day, Easter, World Day of Prayer, May Day (gift day for missions), and Wesleyan Missionary Day.
- 3. The effort to secure every woman of the congregation as member, and to enlist the men as honorary members unless they have a missionary organization of their own.
- 4. The formation of an active Prayer Partner group with a Prayer Partner secretary reporting to the Conference Prayer Partner secretary by November 1st. It is also urged that a prayer and Fast Day be observed monthly.
- 5. The election of officers who are subscribers to and readers of the WESLEYAN METHODIST and the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY and that effort be made to place the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY in every home.

- 6. The continuation of sending good, usable clothing, notions, pictures and medical supplies to our Home missionaries, requesting that no valuation be made.
- 7. The preparations of exhibits for our Home and Foreign missionary stations. These exhibits shall be packed for mailing at the close of Conference, the postage being paid from the Conference treasury.
- 8. The sending of canned goods and other supplies for the Camp Ground and that the upkeep of assigned rooms be continued.
- 9. The sending of delegates credentials to the Conference Missionary secretary at least two weeks before Conference. (No. 438 in Discipline).
- 10. That the local treasurer send statistical blanks to the statistician two weeks before Conference convenes.
- 11. That at a meeting before Conference officers for the coming year be elected, including a magazine solicitor and a delegate, (other than church delegate, if possible), whose room and board shall be provided for Conference week, and that said delegate be instructed as to the amount of pledge for missions.
- 12. That each delegate give a complete report to the local society at the first meeting after Conference.
- 13. The sending of the equivalent of 10c per member per month to the Conference treasurer, quarterly, toward the pioneer project,—the new work at Cambridge, N. Y.
- 14. The election of a Mission Study secretary who will form a Mission Study class, keeping a record of all reading and study work done, and reporting the statistics to the Conference Mission Study secretary each quarter.
