DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

Tuesday Evening Meeting.

The Champlain Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America convened for its eighty-fourth session at Long Lake, N. Y., April 21, 1925, at 7:30 P. M.

Rev. A. J. Allen, the President, called the Conference to order, and made some announcements and brief but stirring remarks.

Songs "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart", and "Saved by the Blood" were sung. A Scripture lesson was read from the first chapter of Joshua, the first nine verses. L. M. Hayes and E. D. Carpenter offered prayer. Duet by Miss Florence Baxter and Mrs. L. M. Hayes, "God Is Still on the Throne." Brother Allen brought the message of the hour from Malachi 3:10, "Prove me now here-with, saith the Lord of hosts." The blessing of the Lord was upon the message.

Report No. 2.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

Your Committee on Resolutions hereby submits the following report:

I. Law Enforcement.

The tendency to disregard the laws of our country is alarming. Not only is this true of one law, but of many laws. It is especially true as it regards the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead Act which provides for the enforcement of the Amendment.

It is also a matter of regret that the State of New York has no adequate law (similar to the Mullen-Gage law that was repealed) by which they would co-operate with the Federal Government in making the Eighteenth Amendment more effective.

Believing it to be important that such an act be passed; and that the Volstead Act be enforced; therefore be it

Resolved, 1st, That it is the sense of this Conference that no voter of the State of New York should support by voice or vote any person as a member of the State Legislature who is not committed to the passage of such an act.

2nd, That no voter should support for member of the House of Representatives or of the Senate of the United States any person who is opposed to the Eighteenth Amendment, or the enforcement of the same by the Volstead Act, or one equally effective.

II. Multiplication of Secret Orders.

We notice that secret orders continue to increase. One that has occupied much space on the front page of the daily papers for the last two years now is the Klu Klux Klan, which poses as an opposer of evil and a law enforcer. But we do not believe that even if the claims were true that they fight evil, that it is a good thing to fight one evil with another, and that a secret evil. Therefore be it

Resolved, That in harmony with the action of our last General Conference, we will not affiliate with them in membership, neither open any of our churches for their meetings.

III. Young People.

The lack of interest and attendance upon the means of grace on the part of young people is alarming. Perhaps this lack is no greater in proportion to the counter attractions that exist than in the past. We are sure that one reason for this is the lack of interest on the part of parents and their own spasmodic attendance or

THE CHAMPLAIN CONFERENCE

entire non-attendance. Another reason is that too many people of mature age fail to get into the life of the child, or young people. Seemingly they do not let their memories go back to their own child life, and think of the things that appealed to them as children and young people, and so they fail to influence the life of the child in the formative years of childhood, or the young people as they should. Another weakness in our problems with children and young people is, that at an early age the child enters on the school life in the day school and they are crammed with their secular school work six hours per day for five days per week, while only from thirty to sixty minutes per week (if they are in Sunday School) is given for Bible instruction, which is too little time for the spiritual development, and oftentimes not made very bright and attractive. Therefore be it

Resolved, That we will endeavor to make our Sunday School services as spiritual, interesting and attractive as any service of the church.

IV. Miracles and Evolution.

The effort in many places and by people of different denominations, or of no denomination, to do away with the miraculous in the Word of God, and to build up and foster the evolutionary theory of the existence of man through the so-termed modernistic teaching today we believe is not in harmony with the Word of God. Therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the Champlain Annual Conference, put ourselves on record as being fundamentalists, in that we accept the Bible in its entirety as God's Word, and as fundamental to a strong, affirmative Christian life.

V. Automobiles.

With all of the blessings that the automobile has brought to the world in expediting commerce and travel, and bringing pleasure and recreation we also recognize that in many instances, in both city and country, it has proved detrimental to large church attendance, and also detrimental to strong spiritual life. We therefore sound the note of warning and urge our people everywhere, if they possess an automobile, to see that it carries the family to all of the regular church services, and also use it to bring their more fortunate friends who do not own one.

VI. Enlarging Our Membership and Borders.

It is not a pleasant thought for contemplation to think of the loss in membership in our Conference for several years past (even

though much of it can be accounted for by natural reasons), and it seems as if the time must speedily come when this shall be counteracted, and the tide of increase begin and continue to flow. Therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the ministers and laity of our Conference, will put forth strenuous and legitimate effort: First, to increase the membership of each of our charges as at present constituted; and, second, if possible, to open up some new field or fields during the year 1925-1926.

VII. Entertainment.

We, the members of the Champlain Annual Conference and visiting friends in Annual Conference session at Long Lake, N. Y., from April 21st to 26th, 1925, hereby express our thanks to Rev. and Mrs. C. A. Heath and the members and friends of the Wesleyan Methodist church of Long Lake for their hospitality in entertaining this annual session of the Conference.

Report No. 3.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ORDERS.

Brother Stanley Lawrence, having passed the Course of Study in Houghton Theological Seminary, and having met the other requirements, is recommended for Elder's Orders.

CHAMPLAIN CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL STANDARD.

1. A total of at least 60 per cent on Denominational Standard.
2. At least one organized class, recognized by the Conference.
3. Connectional and Conference Sunday School Budget paid in full on or before April 15.
4. Annual Statistical Sunday School report in hands of Conference Sunday School Secretary on or before April 15.
5. Quarterly reports to be made on or before July 10, October 10 and January 10.
6. Wesleyan Methodist Literature used exclusively, quarterlies and papers.
7. A definite spirit of evangelism by Pastor, Officers and Teachers. (September and April suggested.)

Note.—This Standard has been adopted by the majority vote of the Conference Sunday School Board.

A certificate will be given to every Sunday School in the Conference which attains to at least 70 per cent on Standard, provided their average attendance is 75 per cent of enrollment at beginning of year. To schools that have already earned a certificate, a seal will be added each year that it is earned.

Special mention will be made in Conference Sunday School Secretary's annual report of all worthy schools.

Much prayer must accompany much success.

STANDING RULES.

At the session of Conference the following Standing Rules of Conference were adopted:

I. The Standing Rules of Conference shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.

II. All visiting members of our own or other churches in harmony with our principles shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

III. The Conference President shall receive \$20.00 per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.

IV. The Conference Secretary shall receive \$15.00 per year for his labor and incidental expenses.

THE CHAMPLAIN CONFERENCE

V. The Conference Treasurer shall receive \$10.00 per year for his services in caring for the funds.

VI. In making his report the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books April 15th of each year. The Treasurer of the Ministers' Relief Association shall also close his books April 15th.

VII. In our Camp Meeting work, after the expense of the camp meeting has been paid by the Camp Meeting Committee or by the person whom they may designate, any unexpended balance shall be turned over to the Conference Treasurer.

VIII. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice-President. It is understood, of course, that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.

IX. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference or by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

X. Each elder shall make his engagement as pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released in his pastoral engagement.

XI. Moved that the Standing Rule No. 11 be changed to read, "The first Sunday in each month shall be known as Home Mission Sunday and the Sunday School offerings shall be given to Home Missions and should be sent to the Conference Treasurer."

XII. That in securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting work that those of the Wesleyan Methodist Church be secured if this can be done.

XIII. That the Camp Meeting Committee be composed of the Conference President as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot after the Conference of 1923, the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.

XIV. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget, and so far as possible are requested to report all budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals except as provided above.

PLAN OF WORK FOR LOCAL SOCIETIES.

1. As a means of spiritual development of our women, more time should be given for devotion and real supplication, and not so much in work. And as prayer is a real vital factor in the success of missionary interests, special prayer should be offered at each meeting for the different fields and workers.

2. As we are a Home and Foreign Missionary Society, and not an aid society, let us see to it that the greater part of our money be used for missionary work, instead of using it all or nearly all for local church work.

3. There are some things still needed on the camp ground at West Chazy, and we suggest that each society make at least one mattress, and such other articles of bedding as they can for this purpose, sending the same in care of the pastor's wife at that place.

4. In view of the need of the work at Stony Creek, the Conference Society voted to pay \$100 to help to care for that work, and each local society is requested to contribute all they can over and above that amount, the same to be sent to Conference Society Treasurer.

5. Our contributions to the Hephzibah Orphanage having been so well appreciated in the past, we urge a continuance of this good work. Also the sending of useful articles of clothing to the South Carolina mountain work.

6. Watch the Missionary Magazine for suggestions from our General President or Foreign Secretary of any special need, and comply with the same so far as possible. Also that each society elect a committee to look after renewals to the Magazine and secure new subscriptions.

7. That each society pay at least \$6.00 annually through the Conference Society Treasury to the General Treasurer for the Home work.

8. The treasury of the Conference Society being often depleted, we request that each local society send some money annually to the Conference Society to be used as they may direct.

9. We wish further to emphasize that ALL money or receipts MUST be sent to the Conference Treasurer if credit is expected to be given for the same.
