OPENING SERMON OF THE 102nd ANNUAL SESSION

"FACING UP TO OUR TASK AS A MINISTRY AND AS A LAITY IN ALLEGHENY CONFERENCE."

Text: 1 Tim. 4:16. "Take heed to thyself and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee."

2 Tim. 3:14. "... but hold you to what you have been taught, hold to your convictions, remember who your teachers were ..." (Moffat).

Introduction: Nations are tottering. Civilization seems to be crumbling. The family has never before witnessed such conditions as it is now facing. Our own Country is passing thru its greatest crisis. Postwar planning is now occupying the attention of world leaders. It is also a pertinent question to be considered by the Church. The tendency is toward a State Church which is to bring in a man-made millennium.

Church leaders, Church workers, religious directors, and church laymen, many of them we believe, are getting sidetracked in this postwar pianning program. But thank God we have a Chart, a Compass, and an Anchor in the present perilous storm—only the person of the Gospel of the Lord Iesus Christ remains secure.

Our Fundamental Responsibility remains unchanged: "And this Gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come," (Matt. 24:14). God's purpose for this age was clearly declared at the Jerusalem Council, "God did visit the Gentiles, to take out of them a people for His name." Our business as a Church is still to get people saved, sanctified, and to live a holy life for a witness.

Paul tells Timothy here what it means to face up to his task for his day and also for ours in these last days. (Read these two books of Timothy and you will see what it means).

I. TAKE HEED TO THYSELF—hold to what you have been taught, hold to your convictions.

To be called of God to preach the Gospel, to be separated from the common walks and businesses of life and sent out as a messenger of God to carry the good news of His love to lost humanity, seems to me to be the very highest and most exalted position that can be occupied by any man. When Andrew Jackson was President of the United States, a man called upon him and asked to be appointed to an important office. The President asked him what his occupation was, to which the applicant replied that he was a minister of the Gospel. The President looked at him keenly in the face and said, "Well, Sir, you will have to come down from that exalted position in order to accept the highest office I could give you in this government."

President Jackson was correct. We can conceive of no office among men higher than that of the Gospel ministry. Such an office carries with it high honor, great responsibility, and almost unlimited opportunity.

Paul assures Timothy that much depends, both for himself and to those to whom he ministers, on his own character and the pure Gospel which he proclaims. It is suggested here that the preacher himself is to be saved, or lost, according to the faith that is in him and his steadfast loyalty to the Word of God. If the minister would win souls, he must take heed to himself first and then to the doctrines he proclaims.

If you will take the time to go thru these two books of Timothy you will find how the Apostles warns Timothy to take hed to himself:

- A. Shun the aspiration to be rich (good when every one else is getting such high salaries)—aim at integrity, godliness, faith, love, steadfastness, modesty; fight the good fight of faith, secure that eternal life to which you were called, (1 Tim. 6: 10-12).
- B. Flinch from no suffering—discharge all your duties as a minister, (2 Tim. 4: 6).
- C. Shut your mind against profane, driveling myths—train for the religious life, (1 Tim. 4:7). Keep the securities of you faith intact—avoid the profane jargon and contradictions of what is falsely called knowledge, (1 Tim. 6: 20, 21). This is to be done by the Holy Sp.rit within you. Keep clear of the foolish, popular controversy of the present day.
- D. Be unprejudiced in carrying out these orders—be absolutely impartial, (1 1 im. 5: 21). Need to be sure that we have the evidence in from all sides before we form a conclusion. This is no easy matter for we are so easily swayed by personality and friendships, likes and distikes.

"The Lord's servant must not be a man of strife: he must be kind to everybody, a skilled teacher, a man who wal not resent injuries; he must be gentle in his admonitions to the opposition—perhaps God may let them change their mind and admit the Truth; they may come to their senses again and escape the snare of the devil, as they are brought back to life by God to do his will," (II Tim. 2: 24-26). (Moffat).

- E. Keep the Divine Gift kindled—keep the fire going. (II Tim. 1:6).
- F. Paul's Charge:

"Attend to your Scripture-reading, your preaching, your teaching; attend to these duties; let THEM ABSORB YOU; watch yourself, watch your teaching; stick to your work; if you do that you will save your hearers as well as yourself," (I Tim. 4:15, 16—Moffat).

"I charge you to keep your commission free from stain, free from reproach, till the appearance of our Lord Jesus Christ," (I Tim. 6:14—Moffat).

If you are going to face up to your task as a minister and keep your church spiritual in the sense of being deep, godly, unwordly, Spirit-filled and Spirit-anointed, you will have to keep spiritual yourself. YOU CAN'T BE light, frivolous, unburdened, indifferent and keep a spiritual church. YOU MUST KEEP the fires of Pentecost burning brightly upon the altar of your own heart. YOU MUST FREQUENTLY have your heart melted. YOU MUST BE A MAN who attends to Scripture-reading, to preaching, to teaching, to your prayer-life and to stick to your work. YOU MUST ENCOURAGE spiritual freedom among your people. If you fight Holy Ghost demonstration you will SOON BE LEFT WITH-

OUT ANY SEMBLANCE OF FREEDOM to fight. YOU MUST NOT COMPROMISE in your preaching. With all firmness, yet with all tenderness speak the word of truth. YOU MUST INSPIRE GOOD PELLOWSHIP among your people. This genders a wholesome atmosphere. It tends to make the church attractive.

II.—TAKE HEED TO THY DOCTRINE.

In I Tim. 2-4:5, Paul lays stress upon what to lay before the brother-hood. "Lay all this before the brother-hood, and you will be an excellent minister of Christ Jesus, brought up on the truths of the faith and on the lessons of the good doctrine you have already followed." (Read this and see what to preach).

Then the Apostle warns against:

- A. Speculation, I Tim. 1:4—Our theme as ministers is, "Christ Jesus came to save sinners". "Keep away from empty arguments," says Paul.
 - B. What to look for in the last days:
- 1. I Tim. 4:1—certain people will rebel against the faith; they will listen to spirits of error and to doctrines that demons teach thru plausible sophists who are seared in conscience. What about this rebelling in the holiness church against the standards set by the church? What about this attitude, "I will do as I please; I can interpret the Bible for myself?" Isn't it because of an inner rebellion which has never been conquered by Christ? Why all this argument and defense of forbidden things?
- 2. II Tim. 4:3—will not endure sound doctrine—want to be tickled. Well, what about this attitude in our holiness churches that wants one to say nothing that touches sin, carnality, or standards of the church? One preacher said to me, "If I just preach on prayer, or something that does not touch sin, or carnality, that blesses them a little, but not too much, it is all right." We aren't called to preach what people want. We are to preach what they need. The natural, unregenerated human heart never did want the truth.
- 3. II Tim. 3:1-6—having a form, but living in defiance of the Gospel power to transform the life. Take a look at this—see how this class live and yet profess to have salvation and see what it means to have a form of religion and live without its transforming power.

We need the Holy Ghost as never before to keep us from having just a form today. Without Him our singing will be for self and the show of talent rather than for Jesus and the salvation of souls; our praying will be from memory and habit rather than in the power of the Holy Spirit; our testimonies will be as sounding brass rather than for edification, exhortation and consolation of men; our preaching will be pointless, harmless, inspid and vain rather than in the power and demonstration of the Spirit. For without Him our vision is too dim; without Him our life is too feeble, our holiness too defective, our love too selfish, and limited; without Him the power of the Church is inadequate; without Him there is no conviction, no conversion, no sanctification, etc. We shall simply beat the air.

Never since our founding has there been a greater need for a church like ours with its emphasis on righteousness than there is today. We are living in a time of:

1. Changing moral standards—a day of moral indifference and looseness; a day of growing unconcern for the ideals of Christian morality. The prevailing moral trend is in the opposite direction to the high ideals

we advocate and to the Gospel Standards we proclaim. Practices which our church condemns are being generally accepted or winked at by our religious leaders of the day.

Dr. Corlett says, "The war conditions are greatly aggravating the already growing trend among the people towards immoral practices and juvenile delinquency; the use of liquor and tobacco is increasing rapidly, and the use of profanity, obscenity and vulgarity in literature, entertainment, and conversation has become more prevalent. In fact, we are working with a generation of people which have little conscience on any of these and related matters, which to us are matters of principle."

Surely, these conditions make our task as a ministry and as a laity all the more difficult, but also their very existence is all the more reason for our existence as a Wesleyan Methodist Church, and for the message our church preaches and the standards we advocate. The more difficult our task becomes the more we are challenged to faith, to prayer and to intense activity to maintain our standards and win people for Christ.

- 2. Rising tide of Anti-Christ spirit.
- 3. A materialistic trend.
- 4. An appalling world-pull until it is affecting the church folk.
- 5. A disregard and a disrespect toward the Holy Spirit's leadership—we are being destroyed by the termite of partial obedience.

Beloved, we must guard ourselves against these evil influences and practices and be diligent to keep a keen conscience on these matters, and ever maintain in our thinking a clear understanding of God's standards for righteousness. "Because everybody's doing it", we are facing constantly the temptation to think these practices are not as evil or wrong as we have formerly thought, and that perhaps we are somewhat extreme in our emphasis. We must face up to our task in an intelligent manner, yet boldly and fearlessly for our own protection. The more others about us ignore and break the laws of God, His laws of righteousness, and think lightly of and slight the high ideals of Christian living, the more needful it is that we declare clearly and convincingly the standards and the doctrines of our church as it has been revealed to our founders thru God's Word. The more important it is that we instruct our people on the reasons why we advocate and demand the high ideals to which we are committed as a Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Indeed, our living, our teaching, our preaching, our witnessing, and our influence must be in constant and living protest to any and all unrighteousness. We must be possessed of that spirit of Jesus which characterized Him as a lover of righteousness and a hater of iniquity. The more we love righteousness, the more we will hate iniquity, and the more we will devote ourselves to living righteously, to promoting it among others, and to the furthering of it everywhere at whatever cost in personal sacrifice and suffering it may bring to us. The more we hate iniquity the more we will give ourselves to condemning and overcoming evil of all kinds wherever found. It was the love for righteousness and hatred for iniquity that stirred up the contemporaries of Jesus until they crucified Him. In Nazareth they did not like the teaching of Jesus; it did not suit their way of living. They would not change their living up to the level of Jesus' teaching. They were a bit set in their ways about that. He would not change His teaching down to the moral level where they insisted on living. So there was trouble, and the trouble thickened; and one day things came to a break, and they forced Him to leave the little

home village. Finally, He was crucified because He would not change. Think not that we shall escape without suffering and opposition and persecution if we face up to our task. However, we must not invite needless opposition and persecution by unwise and foolish actions and statements. Our protest must be intelligent and our appeal must be positive to have any wholesome effect. Even then, there will be plenty of opposition to an intelligent protest.

Lastly, we must face up to our task on evangelism. We must evangelize—not merely hold evangelistic services, but we must reach people with our message. We must get folk definitely saved, and sanctified. The more definitely and intelligently we face up to this task, the more successful viil we be in safeguarding ourselves against the encroachments of the in-

sid.ous moral and anti-Christ influences of the day.

Let me repeat—never was there a greater need for a church such as ours with its clear-cut pronouncements in righteousness and its high standards of moral and of holy living. We must face up to our task on these matters. We must be always examples of Christian believers on all matters of conduct; lovers of righteousness and haters of iniquity; such lovers of God and of people as to seek by all means and in all places to bring them to Christ and to lead them into the experience of holiness. We must become so militant in our love of righteousness and hatred of iniquity until our protest against existing evils in conflict with God's righteous standards become a crusade for Christ and righteousness. Only where we follow this course are we truly facing up to our task as a ministry and a laity in Allegheny Conference.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all financial reports, save missionary, and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.
- 2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference, excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing shall be received at first as associate members only.
- 3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an elder is elected to the Conference Presidency expenses incurred in moving to a suitable location shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the outgoing pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the Charge he is leaving.
- 5. At the opening of the Conference Session the President shall appoint a nominating Committee of not less than three members, Two Elders and one layman, to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates'

Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before convening of Conference.

- 6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Annual Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with the recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board, when they deem it best.
- 7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his usual salary be paid him while he is absent.
- 8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and state of the work under his care.
- 9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.
- 10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.
- 11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to church or candidate, and since the practice of having a trial sermon is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shail accept any such invitation, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.
- 12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.
- 13. We recommend that all Districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.
- 14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders' Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH. And that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination in faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work or blames the ministry.
- 15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.

- 16. We recommend that in election of local Church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this Committee.
- 17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Auditing and Finance Committee shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing a publication, and let contracts for same.
- 18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74. The "Ideal Church Record", published by the Bethel Publishing Co., Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.
- 19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1 to April 30. All funds received after that date shall be counted in the tollowing year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 10.
- 20. It shall be the duty of lay delegates to the Annual Conference to carefully take notes of all principal items of business, make a record of new business passed upon, elections, etc., for the benefit of the lay membership of the churches which they represent. Not later than the second Sunday after the Annual Conference, at the service most largely attended by the members of the church represented, the delegate shall be granted adequate time to make a complete report of the Annual Conference. When more than one delegate is elected by a church or charge, the first delegate elected from each church shall report the business affairs of the Conference. The other delegate, or delegates may be instructed at the time of their election to give supplemental reports, or report the religious services.

The first elected delegate from each charge shall ascertain from the pastor before conference whether or not the charge has made provision for the support of the pastor according to paragraph 103 of the Discipline, and whether the charge has fulfilled its obligation. When the provisions of paragraph 103 of the Discipline have not been carried out, the delegate shall ascertain what provisions were made and be prepared to report same to the Conference.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

To the members of the 102nd Annual Session of The Allegheny Conference, greetings in the name of Him whose work engages our attention! Today we call the Conference to join in gratitude and praise to God for the many blessings which have marked our way throughout the past months since we last met in Annual Session. Through the manifold blessings and the mercy of Almighty God we have been permitted once again, in spite of war time restrictions, to assemble in this 102nd Annual Session.

This year has not been without its problems. In fact in many ways

they have been peculiarly difficult and unusually numerous. War conditions affecting especially the questions of travel and employment have created new and special problems which we are having to meet throughout the Conference. This, combined with the "War Spirit," the rush of duties, and an attitude of pre-occupation and anxiety makes spiritual work more difficult. Many times we have been driven to our knees in earnest supplication. But God has been good to us, has over-ruled the difficulties, has given increase to the work and has given blessing to the workers.

In spite of the conditions which outwardly appear so unfavorable, we see signs of Divine favor here and there, which make us look more and more for a real Holy Spirit revival among us. We believe the prospects for the future look bright. Opportunities for further advancement are on every hand if we will but take them. It is our conviction that this is our day if we will maintain the attitude of utter dependence upon God, and look to the leadership of the Holy Spirit; if we maintain the emphasis upon the distinctive tenet of Wesleyanism, Scriptural Second-Blessing Holiness: if we refuse to compromise our principles and standards and main ain our margin of safety from all that would undermine spiritual life; if we keep enamored with rock-ribbed convictions and fearlesly proclaim them; if we keep our hearts red-hot with the love of God and keep filled with a deep compassion for lost souls, we shall build for eternity, not for time. We should allow no activities, however worthy and commanding, to turn us aside as a ministry or as a laity from the work of winning souls to Christ. The church is not an entertainment center but a soul-saving center. It would be well for us to consider what a group of soldier boys in one of our training camps, said to a group of ministers who had run out of ideas with which to entertain them. These pastors, a bit perplexed about the next move, met with the men and said, "Men, we have done our best to entertain you, and frankly, we have run out of ideas. Now we want to know what you would like best of all for the next entertainment." The men replied without hesitation, "You are preachers; Give us the Gospel. We are entertained to death."

We thank God we can report a good healthy condition in the Conference, and that there are evidences of definite progress. We believe the greatest gain has been a deepening along spiritual lines and a more determined stand to hold to what the Conference has held to for the past 102 years. We have been greatly pleased with the progress made by so many churches in the elimination of their debts wholly or in part.

We have continued throughout the year in the work assigned to us by the last Annual Conference. Following is a report of our actions:

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following recommendations:

- 1. Approval of item 12 of the Conference President's report We recommend that he receive a salary of \$50.00 per week and house rent as provided for by the Conference Trustees. Also the sum of \$500.00 per year for traveling expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of his office. He shall provide adequate liability insurance for his car. We further recommend that when the Conference President is called for special meetings or occasions outside his regular Quarterly Meeting schedule, all offerings shall be for expense incurred and no receipt for budget shall be given.
- 2. Adoption of the Conference Treasurer's Report, as we find his books neatly and correctly kept according to our judgment. He snall be authorized to draw from the treasury the sum of \$100.00 in appreciation of his labors, plus a sum equal to all expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of his office.
- 3. That each Sub-treasurer be paid by the Conference Treasurer the sum of \$50.00 (except the West Virginia Sub-treasurer, who shall be paid \$25.00) in appreciation of their labors, plus a sum equal to all expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of their office.
- 4. That the Sunday Schools be urged to continue giving the first Sunday of the month offering to Conference Missions for the use of churches not yet self-sustaining, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.
- 5 Continuation of sending Birthday Offering from the Sunday School to the Conference Missions Fund.
- 6. That the New Aid Plan be published in the Conference Minutes each year and that all pastors urge their churches to the prompt payment of the \$1.00 per member assessment as set forth in th Aid Plan.
- 7. Approval of the financial report of the Group Insurance Treasurer. That the Conference portion of said Insurance be paid by EACH church on the membership basis. Each church shall remit to the District Sub-Treasurer an amount equal to 20 cents per member, annually. This amount to be paid within the first three months of the Conference year.
- 8. That the Conference Budget be raised undivided, said budget to be equal to 10 per cent of the sum obtained by adding the following three items: Pastor's cash salary, Parsonage rent and Church Incidental expenses. Budget to be remitted to Sub-treasurers monthly. Distribution of Budget to be made by the Conference Treasurer as follows: Conference expense, 75 per cent; Conference Missions, 10 per cent; Superannuated Ministers' Fund, 10 per cent. Incidental Fund, 5 per cent . Distribution apportionment subject to revision by the Auditing and Finance Committee to maintain an equalized distribution.
- 9. That the Pioneer Self-Denial envelopes for monthly remittances of 25 cents (Above the tithe) be given our continued support.
- 10. Recognition and hearty support of the following Connectional Budget askings: Foreign Missions, \$2.00 per member; Home Missions, \$1.00 per member; (Please distinguish from Conference Missions) Education, \$1.50 per member; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.25 per member.

11. That the fee for Conference Entertainment remain at \$.25 per

member. This fund shall be remitted by the local church treasurer to the District Sub-treasurer not later than May 10th. The Sub-Treasurer shall receipt this fund as Conference Entertainment Fund and it shall be written in as such on the annual statistical blanks.

- 12. Approval of the Financial item of the Pioneer Secretary's report.
- 13. Approval of the Financial item of the Conference Trustee's report.
 - 14. Approval of the Financial item of the New Aid Treasurer's report.
- 15. That the Conference President be authorized to draw from the Incidental Fund for such miscellaneous items as flowers, telegrams, phone calls, etc., without contacting his Advisory Board.
- 16. That the Conference Treasurer be authorized to pay all members of Conference Boards or Standing Committees an amount equal to all expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of their respective offices, upon presentation of such expense accounts.
- 17. That all church treasurers adopt the use of the new unified system of bookkeeping being used by the District Sub-treasurers. We further recommend that the reports of the church treasurers to Quarterly Conference close at the end of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference; and that all church treasurer's records for the annual Conference year close April 30th. The Conference fiscal year is thus from May 1st to April 30th for the local church treasurers. We further recommend that all Sub-treasurers' books close as of May 10th and the Conference Treasurer's books close as of May 20th.
- 18. Approval of the Financial item of the report of the Superintendent of Victory Gospel Center submitted by J. B. Sheffer.
- 19. We recommend the adoption of the petition of the Camp Board that the Conference assume a proportionate part of the salary of the Superintendent of Rooms and Superintendent of Grounds for opening the Camp for the use of the Conference. We further recommend that the Camp Meeting Fire Marshal shall function for the Conference as well as for Camp Meeting, and that he receive the sum of \$10.00 for this service, to be paid from the Conference Entertainment Fund.
- 20. That the sum of \$25.00 monthly be paid from the Superannuated Ministers' Fund to each of the following: F. P. Kerst, Gracia L. Fero.
- 21. Adoption of the report of the Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes. We recommend that the sale price for the ensuing year be \$.35 per copy. By motion the Cliftons were granted the sum of \$4.00 per week for the purpose of making light lunch for soldiers who were at Tabernacle after Broadcast. This to come out of the Sunday afternoon offering.

Voted to pay the \$50.00 pledge made by J. R. Swauger, for the Mis-

sion Board, to West Virginia Camp.

Motion carried to continue the salary of the Cliftons at \$25.00 per week for labors at Gospel Center and also to give them one-half of the Sunday afternoon offering.

At a meeting June 10, 1944 the following action was taken:

THE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the members of the Allegheny family, greetings in the name of our precious Lord, who continues to bestow His favor upon you. P.oneer Department.

The return of our armed forces to civilian life and the reconstruction program presents a new and urgent problem. It also opens a wide door of evangelism to the church in the home land as well as abroad.

Dr. Mier, addressing the graduating class at Houghton College, said, "The greatest equipment for the youth of this day is the fullness of the Spirit of God and His Holy Word" He continued, "I plan to fly to Europe in the next few days, to direct in the erection of centralized radio stations throughout the continent to assist in the great task of evangelizing the multitudes of the unchurched peoples of Europe."

An Army Chaplain, addressing a Sunday School class recently, said, "This war has helped us to fe-discover that thousands of our American men and women in the armed forces are in total ignorance of the Word of God and Spiritual life." He suggests the imperative need of a great missionary movement at home.

Eminent thinkers tell us that the key to the reconstruction program and future world peace is to be found in the evangelization of our children and youth. We praise God that our beloved Church is awakening to her privilege of spreading Scriptural Holiness over these lands among both youth and adults. The result of a religious census published in the Pathfinder, reveals that the Wesleyan Methodist Church is the only denomination that has shown no decrease, but a steady increase in Sunday School attendance over a period of the past ten years. This startling fact not only reveals the chaotic condition of the religious world but points a warning prophetic finger to the alarming world events. This must urge us on to frantic efforts in pioneer evangelism.

- 1. At the last annual session of Conference your pioneer Secretary was assigned to the pastorate of the Pittsburgh work. Our first and great task was to find a suitable place of worship. For months we waged a fruitless search, until in March we moved into comfortable temporary quarters at the corner of Coal Avenue and South Street, Wilkinsburg. April 10-15 marked the formal opening with the Cliftons as evangelists. The pastor's report will show the progress of our efforts in this great area of almost 1,000,000 souls.
- 2. The last of June, the Conference President authorized the appointment of Paul Wilkerson to the pastorate at Laurel Hill, Ohio. During the

year the debt against the property has been cancelled and the property deeded to the Allegheny Annual Conference. The interior of the building has been re-decorated and other repairs are under consideration. Two successful revivals were conducted and a substantial work is in the making, with a Sunday School average of 40 and above

3. Under the advisement of the Pioneer Department, R. L. Kuhn conducted a meeting in Grove City which resulted in the opening of a regular appointment. On April 2, we formed a pioneer class.

The Conference President approved the appointment of Rex Brickell to the Soldier-Kramer work on December 8. Both of these projects have taken on new life under his ministry. A third point has been added to this work. Brother Brickell has been preaching each Sunday evening in a Union church at Helvatia. Souls have been finding help and we believe there is prospect in this field.

5. By authorization of the Conference President we dedicated a church at Olive Hill, West Virginia, on Sunday, April 20. The church was dedicated free of debt and deeded to the Conference. Rev. Fred De-Cost was appointed pastor. We anticipate an organization during the

coming year.

- 6. Arrangements are in progress to deed the Blue Eye church building and the adjoining school property (which will be remodeled into a parsonage) to the Conference
- 7. Tent meetings were conducted at Weston, West Virginia, Hubbard, Ohio and Salem, Ohio. None of these resulted in a permanent penetration.
- Twenty-seven visits were made to the eleven pioneer churches. One Quarterly Meeting was held in one of our organized churches.
- 9. Three Daily Vacation Bible Schools were conducted during the summer.
- 10. We also answered calls to four Camp Meetings and three revival meetings.
- 11. Inasmuch as our pioneer projects represent both hard work and expense, we recommend that this body adopt an Article of Agreement which will safeguard the interest of both the Conference and the Pioneer groups. We submit the following for your consideration:

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Your Conference Board of Trustees begs leave to report the following business transacted during the year:

- 1. June 10, 1944, Stoneboro Camp, granted renewal of loans from Ministers' Aid Fund to Harry T. Reid for \$35.00 and to Frank B. Miller for \$75.00.
- 2. July 26, 1944, at the home of Harold Garvin, Niles, Ohio, authorized the trustees of the Niles church to place a bid not to exceed \$250.00 on a building to be used as a church. The trustees were instructed to move the building from the present location to the church lot and a loan to the Niles church of \$1,000.00 to cover purchase, moving and relocation of said building on church lot at Howland Corners.
- 3. At the home of C. A. Hoien, Wolf Summit, West Virginia, authorized the trustees of the Wolf Summit church to purchase the two lots and house west of the church for a parsonage, for the sum not to exceed \$2,000.00, provided said property could be freed of the existing encumbrance.

Approved a loan of \$1500.00 from Conference funds to apply on purchase of aforesaid property. They to provide the remaining \$500.00 from other sources.

- 4. September 20, 1944, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Tyson, Swissvale, Pennsylvania, took action authorizing Oneida Gleason and the Pittsburgh church to investigate the matter of purchasing the property located at 1314 West Swissvale Avenue for a parsonage and place of worship.
- 5. September 26, 1944, at the C. E. Tyson home, Swissvale, Pennsylvania, approved a loan of \$275.00 from the Church Aid Fund to the Middlefield church for purchase of a much needed furnace.
- 6. December 9, 1944, at the home of H. C. Van Wormer, Titusville, Penna., action was taken authorizing the trustees of Pittsburgh church to purchase property located at 432 Franklin Avenue, Wilkinsburg, to be used for a church and parsonage, for a sum not to exceed \$7,500.00.

The trustees were instructed to investigate the matter of taxation relative to renting out the extra rooms, and to secure a clear deed for the property.

Approved a loan to the Pittsburgh church of \$500.00 from the Pioneer Fund and \$400.00 from the Conference Missions Fund. This amount to be applied on making the down payment of \$3,000.00.

Authorized the Pittsburgh church to secure a loan from other sources in a sum not to exceed \$4,500.00 and give mortgage on the property as security.

Because of the prolonged illness and death of the late Conference Preacher, Rev. Gerald Rodgers, the Board voted to recommend the cancellation of his note for \$75.00 borrowed from the Minister's Aid Fund.

7. By correspondence, January 18, 1945, approved a loan of \$1,075.00 to Meadville church to pay off the mortgage on their parsonage.

Appproved a loan to T. A. Robertson.

8. March 15, 1945, at Titusville, approved the purchase by the Titus-

ville church of the property located at 416 East Main Street for the sum of \$5,900.00. Said property to be used for a parsonage.

Approved a tentative loan of \$1,000.00 from the Conference Treasury to the Titusville Church.

- 9. March 29, 1945 at Punxsutawney, it was voted to loan the Punxsutawney church \$1,000.00 (\$500.00 from the Conference Budget and \$500.00 from the Pioneer Fund) for the purpose of purchasing and remodelling a property for a place of worship.
- 10. By correspondence, Appril 9, 1945, approved a loan of \$150.00 from the Ministers' Aid Fund to Verner J. Kerr.
- 11. May 2, 1945, at Punxsutawney, approved the purchase by the Punxsutawney church of the North Point School house for the sum of \$150.00. Said building to be moved and converted into a place of worship

Authorized the Punxsutawney church to purchase the Staley lot located on Route 436 for the sum of \$400.00.

12. May 2, 1945, at Smithport, authorized the Hortons Wesleyan Methodist church to purchase the Bennett property at Smithport for the sum of \$800.00, said property to be used for a parsonage.

Granted a loan of \$200.00 from the Church Aid Fund to apply on the purchase of above described property.

COMMITTEE ON STATISTICAL REPORTING

Your Committee to bring recommendations on new form of report and recordingn Statistics presents the following:

In order to relieve the congestion of compiling Statistics on the Conference floor and permit our younger members who usually comprise the Statistical Committee to enjoy more of the conference deliberations, we recommend the following changes in compiling Statistics:

- 1. That the Conference Statistical Chairman, in concurrence with the Conference President, appoint from each Holiness District, an assistant, whose duty it shall be to compile Statistics from his district, making the compilation as complete as possible, to be presented to the Statistical Committee at the beginning of the Conference.
- 2. The Conference Statistical Chairman shall supervise such work, supplying similar blanks for each district assistant and rendering other assistance as may be required to facilitate the work.
- 3. The District Assistant may call to his aid any adequate local volunteer help he may need and be able to secure.
- 4. In order that Statistics may be available to the District Assistant, pastors shall fill the regular statistical blank furnished by the Conference Secreary, to and including Item VII, and further if practical, and mail it to the District Assistant as soon as possible after the close of the fiscal year, i. e. April 30, and preferably not later than May 15th.
- 5. District Assistant shall list the churches of his district alphabetically and the Conference Statistical Committee shall complete the forms

from Item VIII to XI and present the report as a whole by districts, rather than in the present alphabetical order for the whole conference, giving

grand totals rather than district totals.

6. We suggest further that this is altogether an experiment, and all benefits from the same will be lost unless every pastor will co-operate to get his report to the District Assistant as early as possible.

THE NEW AID PLAN (Reprint)

- I. An Aid Fund shall be established in Allegheny Conference for the purpose of giving material aid to churches and ministers who may have a pressing need.
 - II. The Aid Fund shall be established and maintained by:
 - 1. Such gifts as interested persons shall see fit to give.
 - 2. An annual assessment on every church of the Conference of a sum equal to one dollar per member, payable, if possible, before the end of the first quarter of each Conference year.
 - III. The Aid Fund shall be divided into two divisions, namely:
 - 1. For churches 60 per cent.
 - 93 2. For pastors 40 per cent.
- IV. Disbursements from the Aid Fund shall be under the direction of the Conference Board of Trustees, who shall be governed by the following rules:
 - zi . 1. Aid to Churches:
- A. Loans may be made to any church of the Conference to assist in buying a property, building a church, paying a pressing debt, buying or building a parsonage, meeting an emergency obligation, or paying a needy pastor in time of emergency.
- B. All loans shall become due and payable at the end of each Conference year, provided that the privilege of renewals for one year may be granted, at the discretion of the Board of Trustees, to churches making a written application for such a renewal. Any church not paying their indebtedness when due, and failing to make application for lawful renewal for the loan shall immediately forfeit a sum equal to 5 per cent of its indebtedness to the Conference, which amount shall be remitted to the Conference Treasurer within 30 days. This payment shall not be deducted from the original amount loaned.
- C. In considering a request from any church for a loan, the Board of Trustees shall note the record of that church as to its loyalty to the Conference by the payment of its Conference obligations and its cooperation with Conference efforts.
- D. No gift outright shall be made to any church. Only the vote of the Annual Conference can cancel any loan made from the Aid Fund. Such

a vote can be taken only upon the recommendation of the Board of Trustees.

2. Aid to Pastors:

- A. Loans may be made to any pastor of the Conference serving under Conference appointment and holding Authorization papers, or to any evangelist who is an Elder of the Conference, for the purpose of helping him in times of emergency or extreme need, to meet pressing obligations or procure necessities, deprivation of which would expose him or his household to unwarranted hardship and suffering or handicap him in his service as a pastor.
- B. All loans shall become due and payable at the end of each Conference year, provided that the privilege of an annual renewal may be granted at the discretion of the Board of Trustees to pastors making a written application for such a renewal. A pastor failing to make proper application for renewals shall be penalized by the forfeiture of a sum equivalent to 5 per cent of his loan which 5 per cent shall be paid within thirty days of the adjournment of the Annual Conference. This sum shall not be deducted from the original amount loaned.

C. In considering the application of a pastor for a loan, the Board of Trustees shall take note of the pastor's record as it relates to his promptness and carefulness in meeting his financial obligation, his habits of thrift, his cooperation in seeing that his church meets its Conference obligation, his loyalty to the Conference and its standards, and his period of service

in the Conference

D. No gifts out-right shall be made to any pastor. Only the vote at the Annual Conference shall cancel any loan made from the Aid Fund to any individual. Such a vote can be taken only upon the recommendation of the Board of Trustees.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved:

- 1. That, since the main theme of our Annual Conference body is on the Holy Spirit, we, the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, shall in like manner incorporate this theme of the Holy Spirit in our Conference session and in our local meetings throughout the coming year.
- 2. That we shall not be diverted by any indifferent or selfish motives from our sacred task of arousing and directing missionary spirit. By the help of the Holy Spirit we will endeavor to habitually attend all Missionary activities and devise lawful means to interest our women in Missionary work at home and abroad.
- 3. That we give ourselves to prayer in our monthly day meetings in a much greater way than in the past; realizing that out of an awakening within the society will come a deeper interest in the church. Proverbs 29:18, "Where there is no vision the people perish..."
- 4. That we, individually, give ourselves to a more persistent and faithful STUDY of the Wesleyan Missionary, thus keeping ourselves informed of our Missionary activities and needs; and that we use the Wesleyan Missionary in the monthly programs.
- 5. That, with minds informed of the progress and needs of each branch of our Missionary work and with hearts united in passion for the lost of earth, we cease not to pray daily for our Missionary enterprise in the Home and Foreign Fields.
- 6. That we adhere to Scriptural methods of raising funds for missions, and out of sacrificial hearts and lives, give heartily as unto the Lord and His Holy cause, for the Lord loveth a cheerful giver.
- 7. That we, young and old, uphold by precept and example, modesty of dress, by which we mean wearing long hose on children, avoiding short sleeves, low necked dresses, short skirts, and nude shades of hose and the wearing of jewelry. all of which tend to foster pride and draw attention to our bodies, thus tending to destroy purity and deep spirituality; also that we adhere to Deuteronomy 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man; . . . for all that do so are abomination unto the Lord thy God." Read also I Timothy 2: 9, 10.
- 8. That we persistently adhere to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in order to create an atmosphere in the home and church conducive to spirituality in these perilous times of departing from the faith of our

fathers, so that the world may know we belong to the King of Kings and look for His return for His Holy Bride.

- 9. That, as far as possible, we refuse to patronize grocery stores, restaurants, or other places selling liquor, since we keenly abhor drinking and smoking.
- 10. That we, as members of the Society, join with the women who are sacrificing their loved ones for our country, in prayer for their salvation and protection.
- 11. That these resolutions be read in each Society frequently enough that all members be informed of their proposed attainments and requirements.

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

- 1. That at the first meeting after Conference each local society hold an installation service which includes the outline of the work and consecration to their office Suggested helps. Section 13 and 30 of the Discipline.
- 2. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the Minutes are received. This includes the Standard of Efficiency as drawn up by General Conference for local Societies, to be secured from Mrs. Mabel Perrine, Rives Junction, Michigan.

We also urge that the President of each society refer to these as a reminder during the year.

- 3. That each society endeavor to hold a public meeting monthly, praying especially for the requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary. We suggest that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local communities by the members of societies, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.
- 4. That each society elect one or more corresponding secretaries to keep in touch with our Home and Foreign mission field, thereby bringing first hand knowledge to our women.
- 5. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary. Where it is difficult to get subscriptions we urge the use of the club plan.
- 6. That the President of each society remind those attending Stone-boro Camp Meeting of the daily Missionary Prayer Meeting from 4:15 to 5:00 o'clock, urging them to be faithful in this work of intercession.
- 7. (a) That each society put forth a special effort to send their President and a delegate to the annual Conference, assuming their expense for transportation.
- (b) That delegate's credentials and statistical report be sent to Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, 2459—31st Street N.E., Canton, Ohio, at least two weeks before Conference.

- (c) That each society send at least one dozen quarts of fruit or vegetables to Conference. Fruit to be credited at thirty cents per quart and vegetables at fifteen cents per quart.
- That fifteen cents per member be raised for Delegate's entertainment and sent to the Sub-Treasurer before books close April 30.
- That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the public meeting Unless otherwise specified, these pledges are divided one-tourth for Home and three-fourths for Foreign Missions.
- 8. That we urge the use of the Study Book and the excellent programs in the Wesleyan Missionary. We believe the use of the book review method is most successful.
- That each local society raise a General Conference budget of not less than six dollars for Mountain Missions, and five dollars for Hephzibah Orphanage. Let all dues and budget obligations be sent through the local church treasurer to the representative district Sub-Treasurer
- That we send programs and supplies to our Mountain Missions, Hephzibah Orphanage, and the Indian Mission, also bandages, when required. (Note: Bandages should be cut from 2 to 4 inches wide and tightly rolled. These may be valued at fifty cents per pound. The amount to be credited on the statistical report, but not applied on budget.)
- 11. That we endeavor to raise one-fourth of the Church Educational Budget, including L. S. U. pledges.
- That we stress the needs of Home Mission, raising as much as possible for this. Two hundred dollars of the total Conference receipts to be used for Zion's Hill Mission and One hundred dollars for Blue Ridge . Mountains.
- That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed when possible. That Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions.
- (a) We suggest that where suitable, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers or greeting cards to shut-ins.
- That our Holiness Conventions, where possible, observe a Missionary service.
- That each society have a live Program Committee, varying once a month, thereby each member being made to feel a greater interest in Missionary work. We sugggest the President act as Chairman of said Committee.

(d) We urge that dollar dues be paid by all members.

15. That since the retiring President is Acting President during the Conference session, we suggest that the society send her to the Conference, and elect the new president as delegate, where possible.

16. We further suggest that where possible, a Missionary be secured

to hold special services some time during the year.

17. That each society carry such a burden of prayer and concern for our boys in the armed forces that they will recognize a spiritual atmosphere as they return to our services. Also, may each society formulate a plan to make the boys feel our welcome and support, having as its ultimate goal their personal salvation,
