

Journal of Daily Proceedings

The forty-eighth annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection assembled in the Auditorium at Miltonvale, Kansas, Tuesday morning, at 10 o'clock, August 27, 1918, President P. A. Miller presiding.

Conference opened by singing "The Cleansing Wave I See, I See." Prayer by S. W. Bond. Brother Miller read and exhorted at length from Philippians 2nd chapter, emphasizing the importance of having the mind of Jesus and doing all things to God's glory. After fervent prayer by Brother Miller, the conference joined in singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

The Conference Roll Call was answered by 20 Elders and 11 Licentiates.

The President read his annual report.

Motion made and approved that the financial part of the report be referred to the Auditing Committee and that the balance of the report be adopted. See Report.

On motion report adopted and delegates seated.

Motion made and approved that the Conference convene at 8:30 A. M. and 1:30 P. M., and adjourn on motion.

By vote of the Conference, William Millard was elected as an assistant for Brother William Smith as Treasurer until the election of permanent officers.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother F. C. Hill.

Tuesday Afternoon Session.

Devotions were led by Sister Lizzie Feltar, who offered prayer and read and commented from Ephesians 6th chapter.

On approved motion Brother I. Woodruff was added to the Committee on Moral Reform.

Committee on Credentials reported as delegates Brother J. H. Hinchsliff, Brother Jerome and Sister E. Huscher, Miltonvale.

The Committee also read a credential recommending John A. Anderson, of the Topeka charge, to travel under the direction of the Annual Conference.

The Committee also read a credential from the Eskridge charge recommending that Brother Raymond E. Young be ordained to Elder's orders.

Motion made and approved to adopt the report with reference to the delegates and refer the other two credentials relating to Brothers Anderson and Young to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

On approved motion visiting brothers and sisters were invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

On motion adjourned to the call of the chair.

Wednesday Morning Session.

The morning session of the Conference was opened by singing "Rock of Ages, Cleft for Me," followed by prayer by Brother Huscher. Rev. T. J. Pomeroy read as a Scripture lesson the first chapter of Titus and offered prayer.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

Chairman states that since the W. H. & F. Missionary Society meet at 1 o'clock P. M., the Society preferred that the Conference convene a little later than 1:30 in order that they might be permitted to attend.

Motion made and approved that we reconsider the time of meeting.

By vote of the Conference it was agreed to meet at 2 P. M. instead of 1:30.

Committee on Credentials report as delegates Sister Sniffin, of Miltonvale, Kan., and B. W. Gilger, of LeRoy, Kan.

On motion the report was adopted and the delegates seated.

Committee on Credentials further report, recommending Walter Hughes, of Miltonvale, and John Hinchsliff, of Jerome, to travel under the direction of the Conference. On approved motion the above credentials were referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

President rules that money contributed for the Ladies' Dormitory should be specified in the Statistical Report as given for this particular purpose.

Informal discussion with regard to Red Cross and other funds

appearing in the Statistical Report.

Committee on Orders of the Day report as follows: Thursday 2 P. M., election of permanent officers; Thursday 3 P. M., Educational; Friday 10 A. M., Sunday School work; Friday 3 P. M., Brother Teter to present the Connectional interests; Friday evening given to the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society; Saturday 3 P. M., given to the Memorial services.

On motion report adopted.

President makes statement with regard to Brother A. C. Thorp, of Springfield, Mo., and reads a letter received from Brother Thorp, with regard to taking work in the Conference. On motion the matter was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Secretary read a letter of greeting to the Conference from Brother Walter E. Carrington, of Oregon.

By vote of the Conference the Secretary was requested to write Brother and Sister Carrington a kind letter of greeting and sympathy.

Further mention was made of Brother Carrington with reference to his work and Christian character. Brother S. W. Bond stated that after twenty years of intimate acquaintance with Brother Carrington, he never knew a time in his life when he did not have the victory; that he possessed an exceptionally beautiful character, and while called upon to pass through great trials he wore a smile of submission and victory. Other brethren of the Conference also spoke very highly of Brother Carrington.

It was suggested that we take up an offering for Brother and Sister Carrington and also offer prayer in their behalf. An offering of \$19.52 was received and Brother Bond led in fervent prayer.

The name of V. C. Bowman was called. Brother Bowman being absent, the President made a statement with regard to his long illness which made it necessary for him to give up his work as pastor at Jerome. The work was supplied by Brother Hinchsliff. Brother Miller also spoke very highly of Brother Bowman as a consecrated man of God.

By vote of the Conference the Secretary was requested to write Brother Bowman a fraternal letter of greeting.

Rev. I. L. DeWitt's name was called for examination of character. Brother William Smith stated that he recently had read a letter written by Brother DeWitt, who was at that time in the State of Georgia. Brother DeWitt stated that he believed that he was in divine order and that he was doing not only regular army work, but was also doing Ghristian work. He had been keeping up a regular prayer meeting each week with the boys and was teacher of the largest Sunday School class in the Camp.

On approved motion the Secretary was requested to write

Brother DeWitt a letter of Christian greeting.

Secretary called the name of Rev. W. C. Elliott. Brother Wilson as pastor of the Gaylord work made a statement with reference to Brother Elliott, that he had recently attended their camp meeting, and although he had been called upon to pass through a most unusual and severe trial, Brother Elliott stated that he still enjoyed victory and expected to be true to the will of God.

On approved motion the Secretary was requested to write a

letter of comfort and sympathy to Brother and Sister Elliott.

The character of all of the above brethren was passed.

The examination of character was resumed and the following ministers were called: Fannie Dunbar, Lizzie Feltar, F. C. Hill, A. B. Hotchkiss, Ed. Huscher, Alfred Drake, G. A. Jackson, Raymond E. Young, I. C. Dunbar and E. H. Cook.

The characters of the above were all passed. Each related their Christian experience and told of the battles and victories of the

past year and gave a report of their work.

Following the examination of Brother Young's character, President H. W. McDowell spoke very highly of Brother Young during his year's work in the school and unhesitatingly recommended him to the pastors of the Conference for evangelistic work.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother S. F. Wilson.

Wednesday Afternoon Session.

Devotions were led by Rev. G. A. Jackson, who read a portion of Scripture and offered prayer.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

Examination of character resumed.

Rev. Wm. Millard called. Character passed. Brother Millard read his statistical report and made a statement with regard to his present Christian experience

Motion made and approved that the pastors in making out their

statistical report place under the head of "Conference President's Salary" all money paid to the President as Conference Evangelist.

Orders of the Day called for. Preaching by Rev. L. S. Currie. Brother Currie brought us a good message from the text, "Jesus Christ is made unto us wisdom, righteousness, sanctification and redemption."

Examination of character resumed. The following brethren of the Conference were called: F. E. Shivers, W. E. Odell, Ernest A. Coates, W. L. Carkuff, P. A. Miller, H. W. McDowell, T. J. Pomeroy, C. P. Sage, T. F. Child, E. H. Dunbar, George Gurtler.

The character of all of the above was passed and each of the ministers spoke of their present Christian experience and spoke of their work during the past year.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Dodd.

Thursday Morning Session.

Devotions were led by Brother Wm. A. Smith, who read and commented upon the first Psalm and offered prayer.

Roll call. Reading and approval of the minutes.

On approved motion Rev. T. J. Pomeroy was elected Conference Reporter.

Examination of character was resumed. The following ministers were called: F. E. Fitch, J. W. Lake, L. S. Currie, Wm. A. Smith, E. R. Dodd, S. F. Wilson. They referred to their present enjoyment of the grace of God and reported their work during the past Conference year. Their characters were all passed.

Committee on Credentials reported as delegates, Eura D. Howard, Kansas City, and C. P. Hovey, Miltonvale. On motion report was adopted and delegates were seated.

The Secretary read statistical reports from the Easton, Coffey-ville and New Hope charges.

Rev. Funk, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Milton-vale, Kan., was introduced to the Conference.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Rev. Funk.

Thursday Afternoon Session.

Devotions were led by Rev. F. C. Hill, who read a part of 2 Tim. 4 and Eph. 4 and offered prayer.

Roll call and reading and approval of minutes. Orders of the Day. Election of permanent officers. Ballot for President. Brother P. A. Miller having received a majority of all the votes cast in the first ballot was declared elected.

Ballot for Vice-President. Brother F. C. Hill was elected as Vice-President on the first ballot, he having received a majority of all the votes cast.

Ballot for Secretary. Brother E. H. Cook was elected on the first ballot.

Motion was made and approved that the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for Rev. F. E. Shivers as Assistant Secretary. This having been done, Brother Shivers was declared elected.

On approved motion the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for W. A. Smith as Treasurer of the Conference.

Motion made and approved that the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for Oliver G. Wilson as Assistant Treasurer.

By vote of the Conference the President was made one of the Quarterly Meeting Conference Evangelists.

The ballot for the other Conference Evangelist was as follows: A. B. Hotchkiss, 25; C. E. Huscher, 15; R. E. Young, 3; Will L. Carkuff, 2. Brother Hotchkiss having received a majority of all the votes cast he was declared elected.

Ballot for one ministerial and one lay member on the Conference Board of Trustees. The first ballot was for the ministerial member for a term of three years. Rev. C. Edward Huscher having received a majority of all the votes cast in the first ballot was declared elected.

Ballot for lay member to be elected for a term of two years: Henry B. Parsons was elected on the first ballot.

The further election of officers was postponed in order to give the hour to Educational interests.

The financial and spiritual interests of the school work was earnestly presented by President McDowell and Brother Hill.

While the year has been one of drouth in nearly every part of the State, yet the Educational Budget was more than raised. Praise the Lord!

Election of officers resumed. On approved motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for Brother Fred Drake for a term of four years on the Committee on Itineracy and Orders to succeed himself.

The Conference Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for the present Judicial Committee, which consists of S. F. Wilson, S. W. Bond, A. B. Hotchkiss, and I. C. Dunbar. This having been done, the Committee was declared elected.

By vote of the Conference Rev. C. P. Sage was elected as the first member of the Committee on Vacancy of the President. I. C. Dunbar, Will Macy and Alex. Ballard were added.

Motion was made and supported that Brother P. A. Miller serve as the first member of the Camp Ground and Camp Meeting Committee.

On approved motion Brother C. E. Huscher was elected as the second member. A. B. Hotchkiss, Alex. Ballard, Frank Dietrich and E. E. Jones were added.

The present Superannuate Board, which consists of the following members: President (Chairman ex-officio), F. C. Hill, T. J. Pomeroy, E. E. Jones, and L. P. Rawlins, by vote of the Conference was re-elected.

The President appoints as members of the Advisory Board, A. B. Hotchkiss and Alex. Ballard.

By vote of the Conference the Advisory Board nominated by the President was elected.

By vote of the Conference the present Missionary Board was re-elected.

On approved motion the present Sunday School Board was re-elected.

Motion was made and supported that Rev. T. J. Pomeroy serve as Conference Sunday School Secretary.

The election of delegates to the next General Conference was postponed until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Brother F. Whitney read Evangelist H. H. William's report of meetings held during the past year and the amount of money received for each meeting. See report.

Motion made and supported that the Conference hold a Preachers' Meeting.

By vote of the Conference the hour from 1 to 2 P. M. Friday and Saturday was given to the preachers.

Committee on Boundaries report. On motion the report was adopted. See report.

The Committee on Vote of Thanks reported. On motion the report was adopted. See report.

Reports were made of the Holiness Conventions held during the year by the District Superintendents.

Brother T. J. Pomeroy reported for District No. 1. He reported three successful Conventions held during the year.

On motion Brother Pomeroy was elected as Chairman of District No. 1.

Brother Dodd reported for District No. 2. Two Conventions were held during the year—one at Oakland and the other at Miltonyale.

On motion Brother E. R. Dodd was made Chairman of District No. 2.

Rev. L. S. Currie reported for District No. 3. He reported one successful Convention held at Wesley Center.

By vote of the Conference Brother Currie was re-elected as Chairman of District No. 3.

Brother F. E. Shivers reported for District No. 4. He reported three good Conventions held during the year.

On motion Brother Shivers was re-elected as Chairman of District No. 4.

On approved motion Brother C. P. Sage was elected as Chairman of the New District known as District No. 5.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Huscher.

Friday Morning Session.

Devotions were led by Rev. George Gurtler, who read a portion of the fourth chapter of Philippians and offered fervent prayer.

Roll call and reading of the minutes.

Rev. T. P. Baker, President of the Indiana Conference, was introduced to the Conference.

Rev. E. Teter, Connectional Missionary Secretary, was introduced to the Conference.

Orders of the Day called for. Election of delegates to the General Conference.

Ballot for ministerial delegate. Rev. P. A. Miller having received a majority of all the votes cast in the first ballot was declared elected.

Ballot for second ministerial delegate to the General Conference. Rev. H. W. McDowell was elected as the second ministerial delegate on the first ballot.

Vote for the lay delegates to the General Conference.

No election on the first, second or third ballot. On the fourth ballot Mr. S. B. Burgan having received a majority of all the votes cast was declared elected as the first lay delegate.

Ballot for the second lay delegate. Brother W. F. Whitney was elected as second lay delegate on the first ballot.

Ballot for alternate ministerial delegate for Brother Miller.

Brother E. R. Dodd was elected alternate ministerial delegate on the first ballot.

Ballot for alternate delegate for Brother McDowell.

No election on the first and second ballots. Brother F. C. Hill having received a majority of the votes cast in the third ballot was declared elected.

Ballot for alternate delegate for S. B. Burgan.

Brother A. Ballard elected alternate delegate on the first ballot. Ballot for alternate delegate for Brother W. F. Whitney. Brother Will Macy elected on the first ballot.

Rev. Eddy, returned missionary from Africa, and Prof. Hester were introduced to the Conference.

Orders of the Day. The hour was given to the discussion of the Sunday School work. A regular program was arranged for by the Conference Sunday School Secretary and every department of the Sunday School work was thoroughly discussed. All of our schools are in a prosprous condition, and although the cost of labor and paper has greatly increased, the Wesleyan Methodist is still published at \$1.50 per year.

Sister Hattie Crosby, returned Missionary from Africa, was introduced to the Conference.

Motion made and supported that we have the Missionary service tonight (Friday). Carried.

The Conference Sunday School Secretary read his annual report. Report adopted. See report.

Committee on Periodicals reported. Report adopted. See report.

Motion was made and sustained that the Ministerial Institute be made permanent.

Motion made and approved to refer the above matter to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

On motion Conference adjourned for Committee work.

Saturday Morning Session.

Devotions were led by Brother John A. Anderson, who read for a Scripture lesson the 91st Psalm and offered prayer.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

Report of the Committee on Apportionment. After correction the report was adopted.

Second reading of Pastoral Relations report.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders rendered a partial report recommending that the Ministerial Institute be made an annual event and that we hold a Ministerial Association in connection with the Institute. On motion the report was adopted.

Motion made and supported that we set aside \$25.00 to defray the expenses of the Institute.

By vote of the Conference, the Conference Treasurer was instructed to pay Wm. A. Smith 50 cents to cover his expenses and E. H. Cook 90 cents for postage and stationery, and P. A. Miller \$192.45 balance due him on his salary and \$8.00 to Brother Miller for postage.

Conference Evangelist read the schedule for the quarterly meetings.

Motion made and approved that the name of Rev. V. C. Bowman be placed on the superannuated list.

Motion made and sustained that the Conference dispense with the Sunday School on the Sabbath and meet at 10 o'clock for the love feast. Children's meeting to be held in the basement at 10 o'clock.

On motion adjourned for Committee work.

Saturday Afternoon Session.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes, after correction.

Motion made that we adopt the plan of Church Extensionrecommended by the President of the Indiana Conference, Brother Baker, and that we take up an offering for Church Extension tomorrow morning, also an offering for Conference Missions. Carried.

Motion made and supported that we relieve the Langley Charge of the interest due on money borrowed from the Church Extension, and that hereafter the Conference charge no interest for money loaned from this fund to poor churches.

Report of Missionary Board. Report adopted. See report.

Committee on Moral Reform report. Motion made to adopt the report. Motion amended that we strike out the clause referring to the mailing of letters on Saturday so that they would travel on Sunday. Motion carried as amended.

Orders of the Day. Memorial services.

Opened by singing. Prayer by Brother Hotchkiss. Brother P. A. Miller read as a Scripture lesson the 90th Psalm. Rev. F. C. Hill preached from the text, "So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom." He referred to the uncertainty of life and of the importance of our living in a prepared condition to meet God. Reference was tenderly made by several of the brethren with regard to our departed brethren, B. F. Hester, G. B. Howard and W. H. Burroughs. Reference was also made to Sister Mary Buell's sweet Christian character and triumphant death. While we miss the presence and the pleasure of their fellowship, yet we rejoice in the hope that we possess of meeting on the eternal shores, where partings will be no more. At the close of the service an offering was taken for Sister Burroughs amounting to \$50.63.

For the Year Ending August 31, 1918.

The first meeting of the Board was held at the home of Rev. A. B. Hotchkiss August 28, 1917. After prayer, W. F. Whitney was elected Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year. On motion it was decided to let Brother Hotchkiss have the Conference tent for a meeting at Elm Row. Adjourned.

The second meeting was held at the home of Rev. P. A. Miller,

and after prayer the question of holding a meeting at Agenda, Kan., was raised. After discussion it was decided that Rev. P. A. Miller and Rev. H. H. Williams should go to Agenda, look over the field and then act upon their judgment. On motion it was voted to pay Brother Miller \$5.00 for expenses of a previous trip to Marshall County. The Conference tent was tendered to Brother Whitney at Coffeyville. Adjourned.

The third meeting of the Board was held at the home of Brother Hotchkiss, and after prayer Brother Miller reported that prospects for a meeting at Agenda were unfavorable. The Board voted to pay Brother Miller \$3.00 for expenses of the trip. Brother Miller and Brother Williams having been to Raymond, Kan., the Board decided to engage Brother Williams to hold two meetings in that vicinity and to pay Brother Williams \$75.00 per month for time there and also to pay him \$5.00 for expenses of previous trip. It was also decided that Brother Miller should secure a singer for the meeting.

On January 25th the Board met at Brother Hotchkiss' home and made settlement for the meeting at Raymond. The work at Jerome, Kan., was declared a mission field by the President and \$25.00 was sent to Brother Bowman.

The next meeting was held at the Auditorium. At this meeting it was decided that Brother Hotchkiss hold a meeting at Abilene, Kan., and Mrs. Leona Hogg was engaged to lead the singing. Adjourned.

On July 13, 1918, the Board met at Brother Hotchkiss' home, and after prayer the work at Coffeyville was discussed, and it was decided to write Brother Huscher to go to Coffeyville for a meeting and to pay his expenses to Coffeyville. The Board advanced \$39.60 to Brother Hotchkiss to pay for books and bills and for expenses to begin a meeting at Abilene. Adjourned.

The last meeting was held in the Auditorium August 30, 1918. Brother Miller reported that he failed to secure Brother Huscher to go to Coffeyville, and in his stead he secured Brother Sage. The sum of \$15.00 was paid Brother Sage for expenses. Brother Hotchkiss reported that at the Abilene meeting the collections amounted to \$160.96. Expenses of meeting, including money paid to the singer, amounted to \$60.89. The Board decided that Brother Hotchkiss should keep the remainder, \$100.07, he having returned to the Treasurer the \$39.60 advanced to him to start the meeting. Adjourned.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The Sabbath School has been said to be "The Church in action, studying the Word and seeking to lead the unsaved to Christ.' This being true, the value of the Sabbath School cannot be overestimated, and certainly it demands much careful and prayerful consideration.

Officers, teachers, departments and committees are absolutely necessary for the carrying on of the Sabbath School work. But while machinery is essential, it is not the most important thing. We may have a school amply equipped with all needed machinery, and yet be unable to do much because of lack of power. That which is the most essential is that the officers and teachers be men and women who know God and are led by the Holy Ghost.

Wisdom, tact, training and patience are traits of character which materially add to the efficiency of a teacher,, and should be highly developed. While the Holy Ghost is unquestionably of the FIRST importance, "Training for Service" is imperatively secondary. All secular vocations—school teachers, doctors, merchants, lawyers, and farmers—are required to spend some time in special training for their respective line of work. Since the salvation of souls is by

far the most important work ever entrusted to mortal man, then most emphatically must training for this work be emphasized. As a means to this end we recommend the establishment, as far as possible, on each circuit in the Kansas Conference of Teacher's Training Classes, that those who are teaching, and those who might be used in this capacity, may receive systematic training along this line. We recommend that State and County Conventions be attended, but above all that our own people gather together in Sunday School Rallies and Institutes. Reputed speakers should be secured to discuss means and methods of carrying on Sunday School work.

We suggest that special attention be given to scholars of the Primary, Intermediate and 'Teen age. Since they differ in ability to comprehend, in their activities, like and dislikes, and many other ways, it is very apparent that the methods of interesting and instructing them must also differ. It is doing them great injustice when scholars of widely varying ages are grouped in the same classes. Teachers properly qualified, and who are willing to make a study of the needs of their scholars, are the ones who should be placed over them.

We call attention to the "Home" and "Cradle Roll" Departments as being of great aid in reaching a class of people who could not otherwise be reached. There are people in every community who have not been attending services for some time. Some are unable to go; others are neglectful. Be that as it may, oftentimes they can be induced to study the lesson at home, and frequently it leads to a deeper interest in church work. Then God is sending little ones into the homes of the community. By calling at these homes and requesting it, the names of the babies can be secured for the Cradle Roll. Properly managed, this is often instrumental in reaching the hearts of the parents, and winning them, and the children as they grow older, for Christ and the Church. Let us be alert and improve these opportunities for the advancement of the work of the Master.
