# JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

Fairmount, Ind., August 18, 1925.

The seventy-seventh session of the Indiana Annual Conference convened on the Camp Ground at 7:30 P. M., August 17.

The opening sermon was delivered by Rev. E. L. Glover, pastor of the Blue River charge. The message was practical, inspiring and full of timely admonition.

#### Tuesday, 8:30 A. M.

The first business meeting convened at 8:30 A. M. Tuesday.

Devotions were conducted by H. T. Hawkins, J. Hester and G. W. Zike.

The roll was called and 47 elders and 15 licentiates responded to their names.

# RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF INDIANA CONFERENCE.

- 1. It is contrary to the spirit of the Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist in any service with oath-bound societies.
- 2. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or to travel under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 3. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.
- 4. Any waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 5. Whereas, The Discipline requires that the Stewards must meet the Pastors and agree with them as to the amount necessary for their support, be it resolved: That the circuits may at the same time enter into an agreement in writing with the Pastor as to the service he is to render to the church. In case the pastor shall fail to render said services unless providentially hindered or released by the circuit, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make an adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as any other financial obligation entered into by contracting parties.
- 6. Each pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter these reports shall not be read in open Conference.

- 7. The membership, so far as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional interests to the pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference Treasurer by the membership, he shall send a duplicate receipt to the pastor of the charge where such persons are members.
- 8. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.
- 9. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between pastors and charges.
- 10. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they have charge of the same and make all entries therein.
- 11. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby empowered to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Assistant Secretary, \$15.00, and each member of the Statistical Committee, \$15.00, the same to be apportioned pro rata among the various funds of the Conference.
- 13. The official character of no Pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 14. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.
- 15. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials and Evangelists shall be called first.

- 16. In the membership report all members who are found on the circuits in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 17. No letter of standing shall be granted in the interim of Conference or during the session of Conference, until satisfactory evidence is given by the minister making the request that no outstanding debts are unprovided for and that he has honorably withdrawn from the contract for service made with a charge or Conference.
- 18. Be it resolved, That where the Conference demands the services of anyone, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.
- 19. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be elected as follows: One for three years, one for two years and one for one year, and that the person elected for three years be chairman of the Committee, and that thereafter each member be elected for a term of three years.
- 20. Be it resolved that, It shall be the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offence. If the Church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference, who shall then have the property insured. In such case, all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.
- 21. It is the duty of the Conference Evangelists to inquire, first, whether donation stewards have been elected at each church on the charge, second, whether donations are given regularly and systematically. He shall call for a report of the work of the donation stewards and urge that the charges are expected by the Conference to give freely to the pastors.
- 22. Whereas, We have a scholastic standard for our preachers, and whereas those saved, sanctified and called among our own number are compelled to meet these requirements before ordination: Be it resolved that the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Con-

ference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.

23. Whereas our Conference has never recognized the gifts and callings of a singing evangelist, and we have within our bounds people of such calling who have no recognition, may it be the sense of this Conference that such persons may be so recognized by a vote of this Conference and that their names placed on the list of Singing Evangelists.

# CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION SOCIETY.

#### CONSTITUTION.

#### Article I.

The name of the Society shall be: The Church Extension Society of the Indiana Yearly Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

#### Article II.

Purpose: The purpose of this Society is to extend the kingdom of God within the bounds of said Indiana Yearly Conference by encouraging new and weak churches to build good and substantial houses of worship and comfortable parsonages by loans of money at a low rate of interest.

#### Article III.

The officers of this Society shall be President, Recording Secretary, Field Secretary and Sub-treasurer and Treasurer.

1. The President of the Conference shall be the President of

this Society.

2. The Secretary of the Conference Board shall be the Recording Secretary of this Society.

3. The Church Extension Secretary of the Conference shall be the Field Secretary and Sub-treasurer.

4. The Treasurer of the Conference shall be the Treasurer of this Society.

- 5. The Board of Trustees of the Conference shall constitute the Board of Extension.
- 6. The Executive Board elected by the Conference Board of Trustees shall constitute the Executive Board of Extension.
- 7. The term of office of the officers and members of the Board of Extension shall be coetaneous with the corresponding terms of the Conference officers and Board of Trustees.

#### Article IV.

#### Duties of Officers.

- 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and Full Board and Executive Board Meetings and shall have general oversight of the work.
- 2. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Annual Meetings and the meetings of the Full Board and the Executive Board Meetings.
- 3. The Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all the monies of the Society reported to him, and shall hold in trust all the funds of the Society, paying out the same on order of the Board, the President signing all orders.
- 4. The duty of the Field Secretary shall be to travel the Conference and secure members, money, endowments and bequests for the Society. He shall have honorary membership on the Board of Extension to act in an advisory relation to the said Board.

#### Article V.

- 1. The management and general administration of the officers of this Society shall be vested in the Board of Extensions.
- 2. The Executive Board shall have full power to make recommendations for loans, etc., in the interim of the Full Board meetings. Three members, including the President, shall constitute a quorum.
- 3. This Society shall work in harmony with the Indiana Yearly Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America: Points of difference shall be decided by the said Indiana Conference in session.

#### Article VI.

Any person of good moral character and in harmony with the doctrines of the Wesleyan Methodiet Church, may become a member of the Church Extension Society, by meeting the following requirements:

- 1. By paying one dollar annually into the treasury of the Society.
- 2. By promising to pay into the treasury the sum of one dollar for each built or purchased by a new Church organized during the year, not to exceed four; the same to be forwarded to the Secretary upon being notified.
- 3. Any person making a gift of \$100 or more to this Society, shall be granted a certificate of life membership.
- 4. Upon failure to pay said dues as indicated in (1 and 2) membership shall be considered forfeited.

#### Article VII.

A meeting shall be held during the session of the Annual Conference at which appropriate exercises shall be given, including a report of the work accomplished during the year, and a discussion of plans and methods for the advancing of the work. The time of the meeting to be a special order by the President of the Conference.

#### Article VIII.

The Constitution may be amended at any session of the yearly Conference.

#### Article IX.

The Society may adopt such Rules and By-laws as are necessary for the prosecution of the work.

#### BY-LAWS.

No. 1. Adopted by the Board of Extension in full meeting August 22, 1924.

All loans shall be for a period of not more than five years:

First year without interest.

Second year with 2% interest.

Third year with 3% interest.

Fourth year with 4% interest. Fifth year with 5% interest.

If the loan cannot then be paid in full, satisfactory notes shall be given with bankable interest, the Board of Extension to be the judge.

No. 2. Adopted August 22, 1924, by Full Board meeting.

Loans from this Society shall not exceed 25% of the appraised valuation of the property concerned.

## Report No. 2.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEES ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIA-TIONS.

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriations, submit the following report:

Inasmuch as the gospel ministry is a high and holy calling and should receive the loyal support of all the membership of the church, we recommend and insist, that proper support be given the pastors of the several charges and also those ministers engaged in other lines of gospel work. We urge that our people consider the responsi-

bility that is upon them and rally to the support of the work as the needs appear. We recommend the sum of \$1,000 as a reasonable minimum salary for pastoral support, whereas those charges which have adopted the weekly pay system, or the envelope system, for supporting the pastor and meeting other expenses of their work have found it workable and successful, we urge its general use as a step toward the adoption of the storehouse plan as given in Mal. 3:10.

Recognizing the sacredness of the contract between a church and pastor and that it is binding until it is fulfilled by both parties, we insist that the provisions of such contracts be faithfully performed.

## Evangelists.

We recommend that the Conference President's salary be \$1,400 with an additional \$100 as a compensation for his official duties as President, and that his expenses incident to his official duties as President be paid by the Conference, the same to be paid out of the arm of the work he represents.

We recommend that the two Conference Evangelists receive \$1,-400 each, and wherein the quarterly meeting apportionments fail to meet this amount the deficit shall be paid out of the arm of the work they represent.

#### College.

Inasmuch as Marion College has enrolled the largest membership of any previous year and that the spiritual atmosphere of the school has been the best by far of any year; we recommend that the Conference pledge its hearty co-operation and loyal support to the school.

We, therefore, recommend that our pastors raise the educational budget assigned them and send the same in quarterly payments to the Treasurer of the College.

Believing that Marion College is a gift of God and that the duty is devolved upon us to give it our loyal support, we recommend that each pastor raise thirty-one cents per member, as per present enrollment, for the purpose of meeting their portion of the College deficit as handed down to us by the educational society and apportioned by this Conference, the same to be paid during the first quarter.

We recommend that each pastor raise fifteen cents per member, as per present enrollment, to take care of the interest on the College building fund for the current year.

#### Home Missions.

Whereas the results of using the Sunday School offerings on the first Sunday of each month for Home Missions have been so gratifying, we urge our pastors and people to the universal adoption of the plan. We recommend further that these offerings be promptly forwarded to the Conference Treasurer so that the thirty per cent which is apportioned to the Home Missionary Secretary may reach him without unnecessary delay. We recommend further that all monies raised for Home Missions go through the Conference Treasurer, except gifts for special work.

All money raised for Home Missions shall apply on the budget of \$1.50 per member.

We also recommend all Foreign Missionary money raised shall apply on the budget of \$2.50 per member.

We recommend that the Minute fund be raised on the basis of thirty cents per copy and the quoto be kept up to the present level.

#### Report No. 4.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, beg leave to submit the following report:

Realizing the aggressiveness of evil in the present age, and noting how easy it is for even vital Christians to fall into the snares of these present evils, we wish to emphasize the following items:

- 1. We wish to reaffirm the Wesleyan position on Secret Orders.
- 2. We insist that the rules of the Discipline relative to dress be followed, that it be such as "becometh holiness," and believe that those who do not comply with these rules should not be seated as Conference delegates.
- 3. Since the use of cigarettes is rapidly increasing in our country, and many young women who may become in part the mothers of the next generation are becoming addicted to this evil habit, we urge that all our people do all within their power to check this great sin.
- 4. The Eighteenth Amendment has proven to be a great blessing to our country. The ensuing year promises to be one of great advancement if sufficient co-operation is given. We have noticed the laxity of law enforcement in many places. This is not as it should be. We urge all our people to co-operate with the Law Enforcement League of Indiana, and that they do not fail to exercise their right of franchise, to place in office men who will uphold the Constitution.
- 5. We regret the spirit of Sabbath desecration that prevails, and urge all Wesleyans to refrain from baseball, picnics, reunions and visiting on the Lord's day, and that they be faithful attendants to the means of grace.
- 6. The crime wave that has been sweeping our country, putting America in the lead in numbers of crimes and criminals, may well claim the attention of thinking men of the Church and State, and in our judgment is the result of teaching in the schools and colleges, and from the supposed Christian pulpits of the country of the Darwinian theory of evolution or brute ancestry of man, which materially makes wrong conduct the result of the remains of the brute nature, not yet evolved from and largely releases the criminal from a large part of the responsibility for his crime, sets aside the authority of God's Word denies the need of a vicarious atonement and largely destroys any thought of man's responsibility to God and His right to judge man for his conduct. We protest against the teaching of such a sin-encouraging, faith-destroying theory to the youth of our country and urge our people everywhere to exert their influence to keep such out of our public schools.
- 7. We believe that undue leniency of the courts in giving light sentences and on the part of the State and National executives in granting pardons to criminals has a tendency to encourage crime, and is largely responsible for the boldness of criminals. We urge

our preachers and people in every way possible to seek to throttle this growing evil.

8. Our hearts have been recently stirred by the passing of the most outstanding Christian layman of his generation, Hon. W. J. Bryan. We wish to express our regret at the loss of such a stalwart defender of the Faith of our fathers, who manifested such ability and manly beaming, fine Christian spirit and faith in God and His Book, as Mr. Bryan manifested in the Scopes trial at Dayton, Tenn.

Though the pen has fallen from his nervous fingers and his voice is stilled and he has passed through the "starlit way" to the reunion of tomorrow, we trust his mantle of leadership may fall on some worthy man and that every Wesleyan shall do his or her best to help win in this greatest issue of the day.

## Report No. 5.

#### REPORT OF CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

We, the Sunday School Board, beg leave to submit the following report:

The Sunday School Secretary has traveled throughout the year attending Sunday School every Sunday of the year and addressing every Sunday School in the Conference where opportunity was given. He has sought to give constant encouragement and supervision to the work and reports splendid co-operation in almost every School. Wonderful work is being accomplished by our consecrated workers. Gratifying devotion and spirituality is found in almost every school. In the month of May the entire Board, accompanied by Rev. I. F. McLeister, held a series of Conventions, visiting every district. It proves an inspiration to the Board to thus come in contact with the local workers. Splendid response was given to the appeal for work in the program. Several have graduated from Teachers' Training and fitting exercises were held at one Convention where a class had just completed its work.

The Sunday School is a distinct element in the evangelistic work of the Church. It ought, therefore, to be carefully safeguarded and organized and supervised that it may be effective and its work conserved.

We, therefore, recommend that the classes and departments be carefully enrolled and those thus enrolled become a serious concern to the ones in their charge.

No literature in print excels our own in spirituality combined with efficiency. The primary grades are well provided for both with quarterlies and papers and we feel like insisting that all our schools use our literature and thus avoid the light and trashy element so prevalent in the popular print of the day.

## Districting.

We recommend that the Conference work be divided and Superintendents be supplied as follows:

> Northern—Amos Jackson. North Central—F. O. Spitler. Eastern—Eugene Hunter. Western—C. L. Enyeart. South Central—J. H. Brown. Southern—E. L. Glover.

#### Reorganization, Statistics and Information.

- 1. We recommend that all schools reorganize between July first and fifteenth.
- Each Sunday School Superintendent shall report the work of the Sunday School to each quarterly meeting.
- 3. The pastor shall report each School under his care to the Conference Sunday School Secretary by August first on the blank furnished him for that purpose.
- 4. It is the duty of the Departmental Superintendent in each School to have general oversight of their respective departments in the School and seek to increase interest in the same.
- 5. Each District Departmental Superintendent shall have general oversight of the general interest of his department in the district and shall seek to assist and encourage the local workers.

The District Conventions have proven a unifying and inspiring element in the work and should be continued.

- We recommend that Conventions he held in the spring and that we seek to make them powerful spiritual forces.
- These Conventions shall be held by the District Superintendents under the direction of the Conference Sunday School Secretary.
- 3. We recommend that the Conference apportionment be ten cents per member, total enrollment, including Cradle Roll and Home Department. One half shall be used in the Conference work and one half sent to the Connectional Secretary to be used in advancing the general efficiency of the work.
- 4. We urge that this amount be sent to the Conference Treasurer not later than August 1st.
- 5. We would urge all our schools to comply with the Discipline in giving the Sundays offering of each month for Home Missions. God especially has blessed this plan of work.

## Report No. 7.

#### CONFERENCE EVANGELISM REPORT.

The Committee on Conference Evangelism heartily commends the plan of tent meeting work as being an effectual one to the end that we may extend our borders as well as strengthen weak points, and recommend that it be continued with renewed vigor.

Inasmuch as we have had a full year in which to try out the plan of Conference Evangelism, we feel that in the light of said trial, the best plan to use in preparing for the work is to put on an intensive itinerating tour, visiting every point in the district with evangelistic effort as our main aim, with offerings to be taken to replenish the district treasury—expense of same to be deducted from the offerings.

We recommend that the election of the district treasurer in each district be approved by the Conference President.

We also recommend that all funds raised by the various districts remain in and be disbursed by the district treasurer upon recommendation of the district committee.

We further recommend that the tent remain in the district to which it belongs and used under the direction of the district committee.

We recommend that the district superintendent have general supervision of the tent. Pastors upon whose charge or circuit said tent is being used shall be held responsible for their care and all repairs made which shall become necessary while in their hands.

Transportation of tents and supplies shall be borne by those de-

siring the use of same except when returning to the regular place of storage, which shall be met out of the district fund.

So far as possible, we urge that all meetings shall be made selfsupporting and that if necessary the district superintendent shall be granted the privilege of assisting in the securing of said funds.

In justice to the district superintendent, or other persons engaged in district work, we feel that they should receive their traveling expenses when engaged in district meetings or itinerating work on the basis of five cents per mile.

Our General President, Mrs. Clara McLeister, en route from the Kansas and Iowa Conferences, was introduced and gave an encouraging and appreciative talk.

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

Dear Sisters of the Indiana Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society:—It gives me great pleasure once again, this August, 1925, to have the privilege of standing before you and greeting you in Jesus' name!

Another year with its joys, its sorrows, its labors and rewards, its victories and failures has gone into enternity, and insignificant as that history may seem in the eyes of the world, it is recorded in heaven.

Many times throughout the year your faces have been before me, and in my mind's eye I have seen you busy with your tasks in the home and the church trying to fill your mission in the world, and have breathed a prayer that God would keep you faithful to the tasks he has given you to do!

In contemplation and prayer as to what I should say to you in this little message today, the Spirit brought to my mind this text, "What shall I render unto the Lord for all his benefits toward me?"

It is a sad fact that too often instead of the human family dwelling upon its blessings, it thinks of the unpleasant things of life, so I wish to speak of some of the blessings we have for which we should gladly render willing service to Him, who hath brought such joy and comfort into our lives.

First, we have been born in a Christian land with the best government on which the sun shines! We may worship God according to the dictates of our own conscience, where none dare molest or make afraid. We have churches, schools, hospitals, railroads, good roads, telephone and telegraph, autos and flying machines, houses, lands, food, clothing, friends, loved ones, and the respect of men, as their wives, mothers, sisters and daughters, and though at times we pass through sore trials, and grow weary in body and mind, have we not many benefits, for which we should render much to the Lord?

Let us contrast with the above, a description of the living of some of our unfortunate sisters as described in the "Wesleyan Missionary," written by a missionary who stopped at one of the Cape

Verde islands, and recorded the event in her diary: "The natives are Portuguese West Africans, and they all speak the Portuguese language. They resemble in every way the native African, but what a pitiful sight! The women and girls were on the docks, doing all the work. The only way of getting their imported goods from the dock miles up into the city, seemed to be on the heads of these women and girls. Bags of grain, boxes, stoves, beds, trunks, many so heavy that it took four men to place them on the women's heads, as they bent down like camels being loaded. Some were so heavy that two women walked, one in front of the other, and carried heavy boxes on their heads. The big coal carts were pulled by them. They were all dirty and their short skirts in rags and a few with pieces of waists on, composed their costume. The stones on the roads hurt my feet through my shoes, and I did not see a single woman in shoes or stockings. As I stood and watched them I counted a procession (and they moved rapidly after being loaded) of eighty-two women, young and old. There were twenty-six babies from three to twelve months, swinging from the backs of their mothers by a piece of cloth, while their little heads rocked from one side to the other with the toss of the mother's body. Their feet and legs were so dirty that the dirt and grease seemed to lay on in cakes, and the sores and infections were so bad that I chilled through in that hot sun.

"The men and boys, what were they doing? Sitting and standing around, drinking and laughing and hailing the women for money. How I wanted to take one of the iron rods near me and give every one what was due him. They lived in dirty little huts. The people are all very poor. It never rains and they have to pay forty cents a pail for every pail of drinking water. All of the water and fruits are imported from a near-by island, and other goods come from the United States, Great Britain and Germany. . . . The large public market was conducted by the women. There were so many people in the market that we had to push our way through dirty people, clotheless people, children, with running sores, babies covered with sores and flies, lame, blind, dumb, and many other sad sights were all at the market. As I drop my head one of the missionaries, who has spent four years in Grand Bassa where I am going, said, 'This is not half. Africa, where you are going, is worse.'

"Not a single missionary on this island; not a single person to care for the dying babies and the miserable germed bodies of these beautiful women and girls; no one to tell them about Jesus."

Sisters, do you not think with me, in answer to the text, "What

shall I render unto the Lord for all his benefits toward me?" that one debt we owe to Him is to do our best to help spread this glorious gospel to the uttermost parts of the world? Nothing but the grace of God in the lives of these men and women will lift them out of their degraded condition, and put them on a plane of decent living—with love and respect for their Creator, and for each other.

As your President I have been pleased with your hearty cooperation with the program of the year as outlined at our last Conference gathering; the district conventions, the harvest day, the educational day, the State convention and your response to supplying the needs of the new dormitories, all this along with your regular missionary activities, has no doubt taken much time and thought, but, thank God, time well spent!

We are thankful for the new societies organized, and may this continue to be our purpose, to organize new and strengthen the weak societies, until every member of the Wesleyan Methodist church shall be a member of the W. H. & F. M. S. or Y. M. W. B., or both, so taht unitedly and continuously—till God says, "It is enough, come up higher,"—we shall do our best to bring about the salvation of a lost world at home and across the sea; and as we take up the duties of this Conference gathering, let us do it heartily as unto the Lord, giving untiringly of our time, strength and ability that the work may be done in a creditable manner, and that as we outline the work for the coming year we may have the mind of the Lord in the same. May we adopt this as our prayer!

"Lord, help me to live from day to day In such a self-forgetful way, That ever when I kneel to pray, My prayer shall be for—Others!"
