

Standing Rules

I. CONFERENCE OFFICERS-Resolved: that the officers be installed during Conference, at a public service announced in advance; office to take effect at the rise of Conference.

II. CONFERENCE PRESIDENT—Resolved: (1) That the Conference President be appointed, authorized and required to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance.

(2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education,

and Superannuated Ministers where there are no pastors.

(3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same, to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property and see that the rent is turned into the treasury and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use.

That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disband classes.

(5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of the Conference asking them in case they cannot attend to write the Conference a letter of greeting, stating the condition of their religious experience.

(6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference.

(7) That he may engage help from time to time, as may be advisable and who he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Church Extension Fund.

Quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Church Extension Fund.

(8) That he shall be paid from the Conference President's Salary Budget the sum of eighty dollars (\$80) per week for his services, the same to begin the first Sunday following the rise of Conference, and to continue through the second Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, the same to be paid monthly in advance; he shall also be paid official expenses, including secretarial help up to ten dollars (\$10) per week and he shall be paid five dollars (\$5) per week for utilities, and his premium on the Conference approved minister's health insurance policy shall also be paid. He shall also be paid five cents (5c) per mile car travel expense and ninety dollars (\$90) per month house rent or be provided a Conference Parsonage. Conference Parsonage,

That he shall act, or appoint to act, as Fraternal Delegate to all de-

nominational or inter-denominational bodies as he deems advisable.

CONFERENCE TRUSTEES-Resolved: (1) That the Board of Trustees shall consist of nine members, three to be elected each for a term of three years and each to reside within the bounds of the Conference.

(2) That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference are the state of the Annual Conference are the stat nual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by mual Conference.

(3) That the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign on behalf of the Board of Trustees, such signatures to be valid and binding as if all members of the Board of Trustees had signed said papers

IV. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION AND EVANCELISM—Resolved.
(1) That the Conference Board of Trustees and the President of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society constitute the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism of the Conference.

(2) That the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism is hereby author-

ized to pay out all monies from the Con erence Church Extens on Fund.

That the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism be the (3) Board of Managers for the Conference in the interim of the Conference sessions.

V. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING ALTER-ATION AND REMODELING-Resolved: That the Conference Board of Trustees shall constitute the Committee on Church and Parsonage Building, Location, Alteration and Remodeling.

VI. CAMP MEETING BOARD—Resolved: (1) That the Camp Meeting Board be constituted of a total of nine members, consisting of the Conference President, Conference Wesleyan Youth President, Charles City pastor, three Elders and three laymen. One Elder and one layman shall be elected by ballot each year for a term of three years.

(2) That the camp ground property shall be under the care of the Camp

Meeting Board.

(3) That this Board shall have the power to engage workers beyond the present year.

(4) That this Board, together with the Conference Secretary, constitute

the Orders of the Day Committee.

(5) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated.

(6) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference, while in ses-

sion, be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

VII. COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS AND CREDENTIALS—Resolved: (1) That a standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of the Statistical Secretary and three other ministerial members. That three lay members be elected at the opening of Conference.

(2) That there be a standing Committee on Credentials whose duty it shall be to send each pastor, Sunday School Report blanks, Character blanks and Delegates blanks. The Delegate Credentials shall be returned to him one week prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. The Statistical Secretary shall be

the Committee on Credentials.

- VIII. FINANCIAL SECRETARY—Resolved: That the Conference shall elect a Financial Secretary for the Conference year, whose duty it shall be to study finances and bring recommendations to the Committee on Finance at the next Annual Conference, of which Committee he shall be first member. He shall also require the various treasurers of the Conference to secure a competent auditor and submit a certificate of audit to him. He shall give a report of the auditors to the Conference.

He mentioned also the concept of a Divine overflow. The overflow is from within. If we are to make an impact in our day it must be from within. The within. If we are to make an impact in our day it must be from within. The river, impressive as it is, is made up from springs with which it is fed. A spring is spontaneous. You can prime a pump, but unless there is a spring, it cannot be generated. If the Spirit abides it will spring forth. If He does not abide He cannot spring forth. Springs are not usually marked by signs; it can be found without. Spirit filled Christians need no signs to identify them. You can't stop a spring. They break forth from the rocks. They refuse to be contaminated by mud, etc. The work of the river cannot be experienced without first experiencing the spring. Water in the first place slakes thirst. We are surrounded by a thirsty world. There is no substitute for the living water. Water in the second place demonstrates power. Some of the frustrations, inadequacies and diseases about us result from our failure to demonstrate the power of the Spirit. The water in the third place is, in the life, a life of beauty. The beauty of caverns caused by the power of the water, and the deposit of minerals from the water. We don't have to champion our beauty and integrity. In the fourth place, water has power nave to champion our beauty and integrity. In the fourth place, water has power to ease fever. In the midnight hour of need people turn to Christians with their need. These are two aspects of Christian experience to which the body was challenged, the preaching of an experience of inflow, and living and preaching the overflow experience. Rev. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 110th session of the Iowa Conference.

Our election to the presidency last year necessitated many changes and adjustments in our family plans. Soon after conference we were able, by God's leading and by your prayers, to locate a home in Charles City, which we are presently purchasing. The burden of our transition was greatly lessened by the wonderful welcome extended to us by the Charles City Church

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to you dear people of the conference for your receptiveness to me as I have traveled in your midst. The pastors and people have been most kind and helpful during this past year of orien-

tation in the conference work.

Several areas of progress can be noted to the Glory of God. One of the highlights of the year was the organizing of a new church at Anoka, Minnesota with 17 full members.

A new record attendance was reported in one of our Youth Camps with all

of the camps reporting numerous conversions to Christ.

During the past year, church buildings at Waseca, Des Moines, and St. Paul Minnehaha were dedicated to God.

Hutchinson Church has purchased a large house and remodeled it into a

beautiful chapel and parsonage.

DIRECTOR OF C. Y. C. REPORT

Previous to this quadrennium, the children's work was carried out under the Child Evangelism Crusade. The information gathered was for Bible Crusader Clubs, children's churches. released time classes. etc.

WASECA-A grant of \$75.00 per month was authorized for parsonage rent at Waseca, Minnesota on a temporary basis; granted approval of a second mortgage to cover outstanding obligations.
