THE CONFERENCE SERMON was delivered by Rev. Robert Pelton, who spoke from II Chron. 6.41, the theme being, "Three Indespensibles for Kentucky Conference"—namely, 1. The Strengthening Presence of the Lord in the Midst of His People, 2. A Salvation-Clothed Ministry, and 3. A Membership of Rejoicing Saints.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. The Conference President shall in his quarterly meeting see that adequate insurance is carried by each church on its property.
- 2. The pastor's Statistical Report must be passed by the Conference Treasurer and the Committee on Character, and must be presented to the Statistical Committee before being read to the Conference body.
- 3. The Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the Conference year which shall be a standing committee of five members with the Conference President as member ex-officio. This Committee shall nominate the chairmen and members of committees and the third member of the Publications Committee. Each committee on this report shall be presented to the conference body separately and time allowed for nominations from the floor.
- 4. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close at midnight, June 30, and that the Conference Treasurer close his books effective midnight, July 15, and that all statistical reports are to be sent in by that date to the Conference Treasurer, and he shall in turn send them to the statistical chairman. All money received after that date is to be applied to a budget item on the following year. The Conference Treasurer of the Missionary Society, Wesleyan Youth and Y. M. W. B. shall send a report immediately after their books close to the Conference Treasurer, listing amount paid on each budget item from each church.
- 5. The Conference shall convene the first Monday night of August each year.
- 6. The Conference Trustees shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location and Building.
- 7. All Ministers and Delegates attending the entire annual conference and camp are to be given rooms in preference to those not active in conference business.
- 8. No divorced person who has been remarried shall be ordained in the Kentucky Conference.
- 9. All Conference officials shall assume office in the next meeting following the election.
- 10. No charge shall call a pastor or a supply from other conferences or denominations as long as there are available ministers in our conference qualified for the work. The Conference President, after having exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other conferences or denominations, shall immediately

refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, which shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report their findings to the President, after which appointments may be made.

- 11. The vote on the pastor shall be taken by ballot the first week in June unless special permission is granted by the Conference President and his advisory board for another date; said ballots are to be prepared by the clerk and the results of the vote shall be reported at once to the Conference President.
- 12. Let all ministers have their membership transferred to their new appointment, and the Ways and Means Committee shall figure Budget Apportionment after the final reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee.
- 13. Since television in its present state is so radically demoralizing in its range, be it resolved that Kentucky Conference register its disapproval of anyone within the conference endorsing or owning a television set. Furthermore, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference will not license preachers or workers, ordain elders or station ministers who own or have a television set in their possession.
- 14. The Conference President and the Conference Secretary members of the Publications Committee ex-officio.
- 15. A standing Committee On Ways and Means shall be elected at the regular conference election, of which the Conference President shall be a member ex-officio.
- 16. Pastors shall read to their congregations the General and Special rules and instructions of the Discipline, the Standing Resolutions of the Conference, the report of the Committee on Moral Reform, and shall urge same to familiarize themselves with the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.
- 17. Every preacher borrowing a book from the Conference library may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty-five cents for the month and five cents for every day over the month.
- 18. In this age when immodesty and worldliness are subtly creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister of ours earnestly contend for, and faithfully preach the entire Word of God without fear or favor of man. Let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the church of her glory and preachers of the divine annointing.
- 19. All ministers not attending both conference and camp without a written excuse from the Conference President and his advisory board shall be placed under discipline and they be required to appear before the Character Committee of the next annual Conference for clearing. Further, no pastor shall be permitted to accept revival meetings or camp meetings if they conflict with the conference or camp meeting.
- 20. Our own Evangelists shall not conduct revivals or camp meetings in Wesleyan Churches within the bounds of our conference at the

time of our Youth Camp, Annual Conference, Camp Meeting or Ministerial Institute.

21. The Standing Resolutions of the Conference shall be printed in the September issue of the MESSENGER.

22. It is hereby resolved and ordered by the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in session assembled this 7th day of August, 1959: That the Trustees of said conference are hereby fully empowered to buy, sell, convey, mortgage or lease property for, or on behalf of said Conference, and to sign notes and execute mortgages for said purpose on behalf of said Conference, provided however, that between the sessions of the Kentucky Conference, a majority of the Mission Board, as the designated Board of Managers of the said Kentucky Conference, shall signify their agreement therewith by a special resolution and order authorizing each and every transaction.

Report No. 1

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In the midst of international, racial, political, ecclesiastical, social, economic and personal confusion and chaos, the Kentucky Conference is permitted to gather for the thirty-seventh annual session. But we gather in the name of Him who is to have all power, glory, majesty and dominion forever and ever.

The Conference is to do business for time and eternity. Seriousness should characterize such a gathering. Responsibility rests heavily upon each minister, delegate and church. All action is to please Him. His will is to be sought for guidance. Every decision, all legislation and planning must be done in the light of the great plan of redemption, the coming judgment and eternity. Souls must be rescued. The church exists as the agent of redemption. The only reason for Wesleyan Methodism's existence is to spread Scriptural holiness to every clime.

The battle rages between the seed of the woman and the seed of the serpent. But the immutable promises hold: "Upon this Rock will I build my Church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it", and "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee", "And it shall come to pass in the last days, saith God, I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh".

Courage, then, little one. Omnipotence girds thee. Forward little Conference. This is our day. Pray as never before. Search the Scriptures. Fish for souls. Promote peace. Declare war on sin and the devil. Unite in spirit and effort to launch pioneer churches. Loose the purse strings. Stand in the gap. Separate from the world. Fear to displease God. Love the brethren. Respect those with you whom you disagree. Challenge those under your care to holy living, dynamic witnessing, constant refreshing, personal soul winning, and unity in love.

Conference Progress

Various churches have made improvements and repairs over the last year. The Highland Park Church has built a needed addition to the parsonage. Camp Taylor has put on a new roof and improved kitchen and bathroom. The Clear Fork Church has purchased excellent used pews and refinished the floor. The Columbus Church has installed new pews and refinished the floor. The Holton Church has installed a larger furnace. At Hope, Indiana, a four-foot stone base was laid around the church and aluminum siding over the walls above that, and other repairs were made. Mt. Zion has built a cistern and added a room to the parsonage, New Shiloh has built attractive Sunday School rooms in the basement. Rock

Springs and West Terre Haute have made improvements.

At Walker Chapel a new parsonage has been built. Franklin Avenue has made good improvements too. At Owensboro two lots for a pioneer work were purchased. Across the street from the Glasgow church, the Conference Boards are purchasing a parsonage to aid the local church with Sunday School rooms and to give adequate parsonage space.

Ninth Street has sold the apartment house beside the church. Atwood Church has paid off all indebtedness this year, and to honor God are giving extra to missions and the pioneer work in addition to what they have been doing at Franklin Avenue.

The Denomination has placed the mountain missions under the Conference and Wheelrim Mission has been sold.

Indebtedness has been consistently reduced on pioneer properties at Brazil, Pekin, Franklin Avenue and Glasgow. This is done through the Sunday School pioneer and the Calendar funds. Loyalty to conference effort in these fields is urged for further progress.

Some spiritual progress has been made in the regular revival meetings and services. A great Youth Camp was held in June in which scores of youth sought the Lord.

The hope of the conference is for a dynamic awakening under the Holy Ghost, fervent unceasing prayer, Biblical and expository preaching, unified cooperation and confidence in each other, self denial, living family altars, and unfaltering faith in the omnipotent God.

President's Activities

The President has driven his car over 17,000 miles in Conference work this year; has held 37 quarterly meetings, preached 132 times, attended over 20 Conference Board meetings, three Marion College Board Meetings and some committee meetings of the Board, made pioneer trips to Grayson, Hokinsville, Owensboro and Glasgow, Kentucky, and Terre Haute, Indiana, attended eight pastors' pioneer rallies, attended the Area Ministerial Convention at Marion, Indiana, in October, spoke at the South Carolina Ministerial Institute in December, attended the Kentucky Conference Ministerial Institute in April, spoke twice at God's Bible School chapel by invitation, taught Sunday School class 10 times, and has written hundreds of letters, held many interviews, and edited The Messenger.

Discussed the property at Glasgow, Ky. Motion prevailed that the name be changed, by request of Mrs. Elizabeth Salmon, from Salmon Memorial Wesleyan Methodist Church to Glasgow Wesleyan Methodist Church. Motion carried that we insure the Glasgow, Ky. parsonage for a total amount of \$8,000.00

MISSIONARY BOARD RESOLUTIONS

- November 14, 1958—signed resolution jointly with Conference Trustees authorizing Walker Chapel to build a parsonage and for the local trustees to sign mortgage and note for the same; the cost to be \$5,000.
- November 14, 1958—signed resolution authorizing K. L. McGuyer to purchase two lots in Owensboro, Kentucky, for church purposes, and authorizing the Conference Trustees to sign any notes or documents pursuant thereto.
- December 4, 1958—signed resolution authorizing the Hope, Indiana Church to remodel the church and to proceed with signature of notes and documents pursuant thereto.
- December 21, 1958—signed resolution jointly with the Conference Trustees accepting the Terre Haute property on North Third Street, and authorizing services to be held in same by two local men of another denomination according to agreement signed jointly by them and the Missionary Board.

- II. Each District shall have a chairman nominated by the Mission Board, approved by the Conference, provided the district or conference may nominate others from the floor. District chairmen shall constitute a Mission Council for the Mission Board.
- III. Calendar System
 - 1. A pioneer calendar shall be provided by the Mission Board for a Sunday in September chosen as Pioneer Sunday at which time pledges shall be taken in each church to be paid in 10 monthly payments.
 - 2. A pioneer secretary appointed by each local church shall announce, or have announced, on the second Sunday of each month the pledge collection on the third Sunday, and shall collect and tabulate opposite each pledge the monthly contribution, then have church treasurer remit total collected each month to Conference Treasurer.
 - 3. Pioneer works may be granted permission by the Mission Board to use their money locally as may be needed.
 - 4. Previous to Pioneer Sunday there shall be a rally of the pastors in each district presided over by the Conference President or another designated by the Mission Board, when goals for each church may be suggested.
 - 5. Field and Goals.
 - a. Money shall be saved for centers of population, to be invested in property or employ men of pioneer ability.
 - b. We urge a goal of \$6,000 this year for paying off Glasgow and toward starting another pioneer work.
- IV. Sunday School.

The first Sunday of the month Sunday School offering in full shall be remitted monthly by each Sunday School treasurer for

much needed conference pioneer work.

V. Revolving Fund.

This fund shall be increased by gifts, and at the discretion of the Mission Board from regular pioneer funds not to exceed \$500 per year.

VI. Mother Church

We urge the larger churches to cooperate with the Mission Board in starting a prayer meeting or a Sunday School in a new section, as well as in tithing their church tithes and offerings for mothering a new work under the Mission Board.

VII. United Effort.

We suggest and urge cooperation of the Conference W. M. S., and the Youth Executive Council with the Mission Board to aid our pioneer works as may be needed.

Committee on Moral Reform

We urge the re-emphasizing of our Bible teachings of regeneration, sanctification and separation. The imminent return of our Lord is the greatest Biblical argument for a pure, unselfish, devoted, un-worldly, active life of service.

Let it therefore be resolved that we vigorously protest against liquor and similar vices by every means possible, including a refusal to patronize merchants who handle the same.

We shall likewise register our opposition to nudity and the wholesale prostitution existing in the Armed Forces and National life by exalting a virtuous life and instructing our young people and parents.

Be it resolved that all Christian parents seek to establish and maintain the family altar, and to create a spiritual home atmosphere, in an effort to guard our household against insidious invasions of evil influences, and to save them for God and our church.

Be it further resolved that we urge the strict observance of the Sabbath by refraining from buying and selling and all other forms of merchandising, the performance of unnecessary labors, and participation in those activities which rob the church and individual of their influence. Since dancing has become so prevalent in our public school systems, and since our youth are faced with a problem in not participating, and since our conference disapproves participation in such, we recommend that each pastor take a firm stand against dancing, and instruct the parents and young people of his church accordingly.

Be it resolved that we strongly oppose the evils of our day such as television, worldly conformity in dress, make-up, nudity, mixed bathing, crime comics and lewd literature, questionable practices in our public schools, the use of tobacco, dope such as marijuana and heroin, etc.

That, being aware of the increasing number of divorces in our land, we urge that the sanctity of the marriage be upheld by the instruction of our youth and by plain scriptural preaching on this matter.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

Item I. Budget.

- 1. We recommend that this conference pay General Budget Assessment as follows: General Wesleyan Youth Budget \$1.50 per member; World Missions \$2.00 per full member; Australia \$.25; Brainerd Indian School \$.25; Church Extension and Evangelism \$1.50; Superannuate Pension Plan \$2.00; Church Administrative Fund \$1.00; General Conference Expense and Entertainment \$.50; Board Meeting Expense \$.25; Hephzibah \$.35; Sunday School \$.20 per member (based on the total number of members in the Sunday School). Educational Budget \$3.00.
- 2. We recommend that our churches pay Conference Budget as follows: Conference Work Fund \$.75; Conference Entertainment \$1.00; Camp Meeting Fund \$1.00; Conference Parsonage Fund \$.50; Conference Sunday School \$.05 per member (No. in main School); Conference President's Salary \$1.00; and an amount equal to 10% of pastor's cash salary; Ministers' Group Insurance Fund \$.50 per member; and that the Sunday School offering for the first Sunday of each month be sent to the Conference Treasurer for Pioneer Evangelism. All budget money shall be sent in monthly.

Item II. Pastor.

- 1. Each pastor shall encourage the Storehouse plan of Tithing.
- 2. All pastors shall endorse and encourage membership in the Church Extension Card Call Plan.
- 3. The pastoral year shall end immediately following the last Sunday of Camp and the church that he is serving shall pay his salary until that time.
- 4. All churches shall provide for their pastor's suitable living quarters, all their utilities, fill their obligation by monthly donations and allow him two weeks vacation with pay, and definitely arrange with the pastor the number of revivals he is allowed to conduct.
- 5. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church. Item III. Conference President.
- 1. The Conference President shall be paid \$77.50 per week, house rent, utilities, desk expense, traveling expenses at 8 cents per mile in connection with conference work and shall be allowed two weeks vacation with pay.

- 2. The Conference President shall meet the Board of Stewards of all churches paying less than \$1,000 salary and adjust the finances accordingly.
- 3. Each church shall hold four quarterly meetings annually; one to be held by the Conference President at his convenience and three to be arranged by the pastor. These quarterly meetings are to be held the first weeks of October, January, April and July.
- 4. The Conference President shall give one Sunday preaching service to each church annually when possible, and shall give as much time as possible to supervising the pioneer works and the smaller churches. Item IV. Miscellaneous.
- 1. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary shall each be paid \$75.00 a year.
- 2. All superannuated ministers of our conference shall be entertained entirely free all during camp.
- 3. Each active church member shall be encouraged to become an honorary member of Wesleyan Youth with annual dues of \$1.00.
- 4. We recommend that an adding machine be purchased for the conference with money from the work fund.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

The Suday School reports this year show some very commendable increases, for which we humbly thank God. First and foremost is one in the total enrollment which now stands at 3275, which is an increase of 400 over last year. That is a good healthy step forward that is reflected in increases down the line. A splendid increase of 200% was had in the V.B.S. enrollment with likewise a good average attendance, However we are not satisfied that we do not have more of these V.B.S. We need them and they are profitable. We are happy also to note that the number of conversions increased, although not so well pleased that not so many of them joined our churches. We are still lagging in our Home Department work. Only 17 reported in this department. Though the ministry of this department is directly to the aged and shut-in it can be an open door to make contact with families that may as yet have no interest in your church. Seek out these needy old folks, and cheer them up with a visit frequently. Likewise we had a fine rise in the cradle roll enrollment of almost a hundred. We hope that indicates that many new families have been enlisted in supplying this fine crop of babies. Let us ever seek to lengthen our cords and strengthen our stakes, as we bring in new families.

The financial receipts are climbing too but the benevolent giving remained nearly the same, the sum of \$3,000 which represents one fourth of the total receipts. Let us keep before our schools the pressing need of giving for those who have never once heard the Gospel.

We recommend your active participation in every seasonal emphasis

such as Rally Day, Thanksgiving Offering and such other crusades for adults or other specific work that the general Sunday School Department plans for advancement. We really do not hear from many of you as to your Rally Day attendances. Will you do better on that this year? With bright prospects for a great year ahead of us let us launch forth with deep determination to do our level best to realize every hope.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means, wish to make the following recommendations:

1. CONFERENCE

- a. The W. Y. President shall attend one rally in each district during the year and each district shall bear the traveling expenses at the rate of five (5) cents per mile.
- b. We recommend that the pioneer project for this year be the Brazil Pioneer Work in cooperation with the Conference Mission Board.
- c. We recommend that the W. Y. Executive Committee make plans to raise funds for the Youth-Missionary Building.
- d. We recommend that the W. Y. Executive Committee continue a quarterly Youth Bulletin, to be sent to the young people of the Conference.
- e. We recommend that a conference-wide Youth Rally be held Friday night following the Annual Conference and Saturday be known as Youth Day at which time the Youth Conference will convene.
- f. We recommend that the following committees be elected as standing committees: (1) Ways and Means Committee, (2) Resolutions Committee, (3) Statistical Committee, and (4) Auditing Committee.
- g. We recommend the conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the conference year which is to be a standing committee of five members with the Youth Conference President and secretary as members ex-officio. This committee shall nominate the chairman and members of the standing committees.
- h. We recommend that a conference-wide "Youth Leaders Workshop" be held Saturday, September 12 for the purpose of promoting the conference youth work. We urge the pastors, district chairmen, and all Local Youth Officers to attend.

II. DISTRICT

- a. We recommend that the districts be set up the same as the Mission Board.
- b. We recommend that each district have at least three rallies during the year and that we use our Young People in a variety of programs for these rallies rather than always securing an outside speaker.

III. LOCAL

a. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close June 30th.

IV. FINANCES

- a. We recommend that each local raise the amount of one dollar and a half (\$1.50) per active member for the General W. Y. Program and that those churches not having an organized local take an offering for the General Youth Program.
- b. We recommend that each local raise the amount of one dollar (\$1.00) per active member for the Conference Expense Fund.
- c. We recommend that each local raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for the Youth Camp Fund.
 - d. We recommend that each local raise the amount of ten (10) cents

per active member to subsidize the expense of the YOUTH BULLETIN.

- e. We recommend that members and friends of each local Church be encouraged to become honorary members of the Wesleyan Youth, with dues of one (1) dollar per member.
- f. We recommend that the Executive Committee shall have the power to appropriate the Youth money for the promotion of the General and Conference work.
- g. We recommend that each district in their District Rallies raise the following amount for the support of David Ellis in Africa and our Pioneer Project at Brazil, Indiana:

- 4. That the W. Y. meetings be so interesting and inspirational that young people will catch the vision to meet the challenge of the world today, and an effort be made to seek and secure the guidance of the

Holy Spirit before leading each W. Y. meeting.

- 5. That special attention be given to the planning of special programs for Youth Week, and that the Local young people participate in these programs.
 - 6. That each Local sponsor a youth revival annually.
- 7. That each president inform his Local concerning plans adopted and that he strive to put them into force during the year.
