"Let it be a Standing Rule of this Conference that the Camp Meeting Committee nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the Opening Sermon of the next Conference year with his alternate."

Upon Vote the resolution carried.

The following resolution was presented by W. J. Seekins:

"Whereas, since it has pleased the Lord to call and make us a part of His visible body on earth, and we are nearing the century mark of our denominational history; and, whereas, the historical records of many of our churches are very meager and in many instances are lacking of vital historical data; and, whereas, if proper historical facts are secured the same must be secured very soon while some of our older members still live. Therefore be it Resolved.

"1. That we hereby instruct all our pastors to urge all the churches under their care to secure proper church records and coöperate with them in securing a history of the organization of the church, its membership, how and by whom received. A motion was made and carried that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at the call of the Chair.

The final reading of the Report of the Committee on Pastoral Relations was given. Upon motion the report was adopted. See Report No. 7.

It was moved and carried that when churches which have been placed in the hands of the President, if they can and do decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to the press, the same shall be entered in the minutes the same as if ordered by this Conference.

In conforming with the requirements of the Discipline, Section 8, Paragraph 137, it was moved and carried that the President, his Advisory Board, and three other members selected by this Conference constitute a Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location.

The minutes were read and corrected and approved as corrected.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

- 1. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. And waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 2. Be it resolved, That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.
- 3. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conserence, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and resused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 4. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 5. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the Pastor may live.
- 6. Be it resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.

- 7. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the Pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said Pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between Pastors and charges. That where the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.
- 8. Each Pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the fifth day of August with the exception of Pastor's salary and Membership. These items to be reported the first day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter the full reports shall not be read in open Conference. The official character of any Pastor shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 9. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein.
- 10. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Treasurer \$100.00, the Assistant Secretary \$25.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$25.00, Assistant to the Treasurer \$10.00, the same to be apportioned pro-rata among the various funds of the Conference. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$50.00 and each of the other memmers of the Conference Sunday School Board shall receive \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.
- 11. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.
- 12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 13. The Conference shall elect three members of the Camp Meeting Committee, one to be elected each year for a term of three years.
- 14. The Pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President quarterly on blanks furnished by the Conference.
- 15. Whereas, our people are being deceived by the erroneous teaching that Divine healing of the body through faith in the atonement is the same as for sin, therefore:

Be it Resolved, That we record our belief that the healing of the body is among the gifts of the Spirit according to 1 Corinthians 12:7-11, hence not for all Christians at all times as it is not always the will of God to heal the body.

- 16. Let it be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked, that no charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work; Further, we urgently request our President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations, to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.
- 17. Resolved, That the Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.
- 18. Inasmuch as the Pastor's statistics reveal the true condition of the work as much as anything that might be said, therefore be it resolved, That the Pastors report in open Conference the amount of Pastor's salary received, the amount of budget raised and the loss or gain in membership, also the number of Wesleyan Methodist papers and Wesleyan Missionary magazines taken.
- 19. It shall be the standing rule of this Conference until revoked, that the term of office of the President of our Conference shall not exceed six consecutive years.
- 20. It shall be a standing rule of the Conference until revoked that the Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.
- 21. Let it be the standing rule of this Conference that each Pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$1000.00 a year shall seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to one of the weaker churches—whose total pastor's receipts are \$500.00 or less—to help establish it. And that the church which he pastors grant him such privileges without censure and with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting.
- 22. Let it be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked that the Storehouse Tithing Plan shall be the Conference plan for financing the Church work and the following percentage basis be the rule for distributing the same: Local Church Work, 70%; Budget, 30%. Further, that a Tithing Secretary be elected and that one evening service in the Conference Session be given for a Tithing Service and all Tithing Bands

or Churches of the Conference be called to give their yearly report, and that some minister be chosen to preach on the Storehouse Tithing Plan. The expenses of Tithing Literature and Postage to be paid from the Conference Claims Fund and that churches desiring literature may secure the same from the Tithing Secretary. Further, that this service be a Special Order of the Conference.

- 23. Let it be a standing rule of this body until revoked that the Assistant-Secretary act as reporter of the Conference and Camp Meeting to the Marion daily papers.
- 24. We recommend that fifteen percent of the "Conference Missions" Budget be applied on the arms liabilities as the nature of the liabilities demand, and, that the Conference Treasurer disburse the unrestricted receipts in the "College Building Fund" as the nature of the liabilities demand, with the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 25. By decision of the Conference President, the first Sunday of the Annual gathering shall belong to the old year, and the second Sunday of the Annual gathering shall belong to the new year.
- 26. Let it be a standing rule of this Conference that the Camp Meeting Committee nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.

Report No. 6 REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriations, desire to make the following recommendations:

Item 1. That the President shall have oversight of the work of the Conference, and shall hold at least one quarterly meeting on each charge during the year, and also shall render whatever assistance he may deem necessary to the weaker charges of the Conference, as time will permit. He shall coöperate with the pastors in raising their budgets and render needed assistance in organizing the financial system of the charges to con-

form as nearly as possible with that adopted by the Conference. The pasors shall report to the President quarterly the condition of their budget apportionments, and their failure so to do shall necessitate a vote of Conference to pass their characters. The President's salary shall be \$1,600.00 per year and traveling expenses.

Item 2. Conference Missions:

First—That the Conference be divided into districts corresponding to the Sunday School Districts as of 1937-8.

Second—That a Superintendent and Advisory Committee of two members be nominated for each district by the Committee on Pastoral Relations and elected by the Conference.

Third—That the Missionary Board shall have general supervision of all the work carried on in these districts.

Fourth—That the District Superintendent and his Advisory Committee shall have authority to call to their aid evangelisic help as they shall deem advisable.

Fifth—That the traveling expenses of the Superintendent shall not exceed two cents per mile.

Sixth—That the evangelistic help and the Superintendent's expenses which are not provided in the district shall be drawn from the Conference Missions Fund as it is available.

- Item 3. That the Conference Claims Budget be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly, except that the Quarterly Meeting Apportionment shall be paid to the President when he holds the Quarterly Meeting on the respective charges; and that the Conference Treasurer shall pay the Conference President's salary and other expenses incident to the Conference work monthly from this fund.
- Item 4. That newly organized churches are asked only for free will offerings for the first two years.
- Item 5. That the Sunday-school offerings on the first Sunday of each month be divided by the local Treasurer equally between Home Missions and Conference Missions and shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer at least guarterly.
- Item 6. That any deficit in the Minute Fund be apportioned to the various Conference Funds.
- Item 7. That each church elect a Board of Stewards of at least three members whose duty shall be to cooperate with the pastor in raising the Budget and that the pastor shall forward the same to the proper Treasurer a least quarterly.
- Item 8. Since the Storehouse Tithing Plan has been adopted by this Conference as the financial plan of the Conference, we urge our churches to conform to this plan as quickly as possible.
- Item 9. We recommend that the Budget Apportionment per member be paid on a pro-rata basis and be as follows: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Or-

phanage, \$.25; Connectional Education, \$1.50; Conference Claims, \$.75; Conference Missions, \$.75; Home Missions, \$.50; College Building Fund, \$.50; Superannuated Ministers' Fund, \$.10; all to be paid at least quarterly; General Conference Delegates' Fund, \$.25, to be paid the Conference Treasurer not later than June 1st, 1939.

Item 10. That for the assistance of disabled pastors the President shall levy assessments upon the various churches on the basis of membership and at a rate, and for a time which the need shall demand. Said assessments to be paid monthly to the Conference Treasurer and disbursed under the direction of the President and his Advisory Committee.

Item 11. That all churches or ministers purchasing property or beginning a building program comply with the Book of Discipline, page 65, paragraph 110.

Item 12. That the Board of Trustees shall issue an order to the Conference Treasurer for the payment of all liabilities of the various arms of the work as the funds are available.

Item 13. That Rule 24, now unnumbered in the Conference Minutes of 1937, be amended as follows: Change the semi-colon to a comma after the word "demand" in line three of the rule so that it will be clearly understood that the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees shall apply to the "fifteen per cent of the Conference Missions Budget" as well as to the "unrestricted receipts in the College Building Fund."

Report No. 9

REPORT OF CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

We, your servants, are glad that in the good providence of God, we are able to report some gains in the Sunday-school department of the Church.

The enrollment shows a gain in all departments with a total enrollment of nine thousand one hundred eighty-seven, which is more than double the membership of the churches. The average attendance shows an increase of three hundred twenty-one for the year. For this we thank God.

The benevolences are about the same as last year in spite of the "re-

cession," with a total of two thousand eight hundred sixty-three dollars and ninety-seven cents.

Seven hundred Sunday-school scholars were converted and two hundred forty-six joined the church during the year. We would like to show an increase in these items for the ensuing year.

There are more than twice as many in Teachers' Training Classes than last year, and some have been given Diplomas for this work during the year. We would urge our pastors that wherever possible study classes be organized.

We recommend that the ten cent per member assessment be continued and that it be sent to the Board Treasurer by August first.

The Sunday school is our best friend for temperance work. We fear it is being neglected and urge our pastors and workers to give attention to this important work, as the liquor forces are doing their best to rob us of our youth, and we must fight these forces by education and prayers.

By vote of the various conventions, it was ascertained that our people want the conventions in the fall. We recommend therefore that the conventions be held in the various convention zones the first two weeks of October.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Resolved, That the following articles be adopted as the sentiment of this Conference:

Whereas, there is prevalent a lack of Holy reverence for God, in the home, church, social gathering, we call upon all who have oversight of all our young people, either as parents, teachers, or ministers to stimulate a more respectful deportment.

We urge upon our pastors and evangelists to preach a definite, practical holiness and to discourage all carnal disturbance, that robs the church of peace, power and glory.

Whereas there is unrest in some churches, we urge the out-going pastor to refrain from those visitations and correspondences that contribute to this condition.

Since modernism which destroys faith in the inspired Word of God, leads to all modern fashion in dress, we call upon our people to refrain from mixed bathing, the use of sun suits and shorts, and all manner of dress which will tend to unwholesome thought. We also call your attention to the increase of drink among young people, and use of tobacco and to watch for that deadly foe marijuana which is making its roads in our state.

Since true resolutions begin in the heart, therefore let us pledge ourselves to pray for a Connection-wide revival sponsored by Brother Clement. We urge upon our people the necessity of personal evangelism as well as mass evangelism.

Recognizing the growing tendencies to Communism, Fascism, Nazism, let us pledge ourselves in united opposition to those forces which take away our religious and national freedom, and evidence the same by dropping party lines and casting our ballots for those who uphold constitutional rights.

Inasmuch as alcohol is a racial poison and habit-forming drug, it is a menace to the home and to society, and undermines our religious and

moral teaching. It is a co-partner with crime, an enemy of health and the greatest hindrance to safety. With these facts in mind we pledge our coöperation with all anti-alcoholic forces in their program in endeavoring to secure legislative protection for the people from the forces of the liquor traffic.

The Auditing Committee Report was read and adopted. See Report No. 2.

Motion prevailed to accept the partial report of the Plans Committee. See Report No. 3.

The Broadcasting Committee Report was adopted, which included the printing of pledge cards and the taking of pledges to support the regular broadcast.

The Statistical Committee Report was adopted. See Report No. 4. The Treasurer's Report was read and adopted. See Report No. 5.

Report No. 1 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Young People of our Indiana Conference: Once more we are permitted to greet you in our annual gathering; we have come from all four corners of the Conference to do work for the King of kings. A great task is ours, to spread the glad tidings of His gospel everywhere, and to do our best to gather in the unsaved youth of our land. Paul wrote to the Corinthian church, "We are laborers together with God." How wonderful to have such a leader as Jesus Christ. We have not been disappointed, for the finance has come in, with the exception of the last few weeks. We are in arrears about twenty-four dollars at the present time. We are trusting there will be some plan instituted at this convention for carrying on this work.

The task we face is no easy one, for the enemy contests every step we take, but to retreat because it is difficult would not prove the spirit of Christ. Let us not grow weary in well doing, for in due season we will reap, if we faint not.

Report No. 2 AUDITING COMMITTEE REPORT

We have audited the books of the Secretary-Treasurer of the Wesleyan Young People's state organization and of the Secretary-Treasurer of the Radio broadcasts of WHBU. We find them to be correct.

Report No. 3 REPORT OF PLANS COMMITTEE

We, the Plans Committee, beg leave to submit the following report:

- 1. The Committee recommends that a Gospel Team visit each district, the team to consist of the State President, Vice-President, and six others, two of whom shall be students of Marion College, the six being chosen by the State President, these visitations being Saturday all-day rallies, and the team's travelling expenses being paid from the district offerings on the basis of three cents per mile.
- 2. We recommend that each district cooperate with the following state program as to rallies:
- (a) A district rally at the time of the visit of the Gospel Team in each district.
 - (b) The State Rally on May 30 at these campgrounds.
 - (c) At least three other rallies.
- 3. We recommend that the Divisional Superintendents be given at least two weeks notification by the District Secretary as to the time and place of each District Rally, and that he attend at least one of them, his expenses being paid by that district.

- 4. For the encouragement of the young people, we recommend that the churches in each district be visited by the District President together with two or three other young people, holding a service, these helpers being chosen by the President of that district where possible, the expenses being paid by the churches visited.
- 5. We recommend that each society pay to the State Treasurer an amount equivalent to ten cents per member of its church, the Connectional dues then being paid from the State Treasury.
- 6. We recommend that the President receive from the State Treasury the amount of thirty-five dollars for state work and that the Secretary's desk expense be paid from the State Treasury.
- 7. We recommend that each district sign and be responsible for the payment of a pledge to Home Missions, using one of the Church Extension cards provided for this purpose, the pledge not to be less than live dollars.
- 8. We recommend that each local society use the W. Y. P. S. Loyalty Fund Chart to raise its quarter of the Educational Budget, where there is not a workable plan in operation.
- 9. We recommend that at least one service early in the year include a careful study of the Connectional constitution and that all societies work earnestly toward complete organization according to the constitution.
- 10. We recommend faithful use of helps in the Journal and the Wesleyan Methodist, stressing the Bible Quizzes.
- 11. We recommend that each society give special attention to the efficiency standard published in the W. Y. P. Journal and that the signing of Fast and Prayer League covenants be emphasized.
- 12. (a) We recommend that each district sponsor a revival at least two weeks in length in either one of the weaker churches or a new field in that district, using a tent where advisable.
- (b) We further recommend that there be an Appointing Committee composed of the State President, the respective Divisional Superintendent, and respective District President to appoint an Evangelistic Committee in each district of which the District President be Chairman to arrange for a revival in that district—that Evangelistic Committee to labor under the approval of their District Executive Committee, and that all the above given workers labor under the supervision of the Annual Conference.
- 13. We recommend that the minutes of our State W. Y. P. S. Conference be referred to frequently and complied with through the year by all our young people.
