# JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The sixty-eighth annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection assembled in the Conference tabernacle in Miltonvale, Kansas at 2 p. m., Tuesday, August 2, 1938, with the President in the Chair.

Devotions—The opening song service was led by Sister Lorin Miller. God's presence was preciously real. Brother Britton read the 13th chapter of First Corinthians and led in prayer.

Roll Call—The roll was called, and answered by 29 Elders and 7 Conference Preachers.

Credentials Committee—Gerald Carry and Wendell Campbell were elected the Committee on Credentials. They reported the names of 28 Delegates-elect. On motion the Delegates were seated. For names see the Conference Roll.

New Churches Presented—Brother H. K. Sheets, Conference Evangelist, presented the new class at Greenleaf which was organized in December. They have 15 full members and one accociate. On motion the Class was received into the Conference.

Rev. V. C. Martin presented the new Class at Quinton Heights, Topeka, which was organized in January. They have 11 full members and 6 associates. On motion the Class was received into the Conference.

Rev. W. S. Hotchkiss presented the new Class at Manhattan which was organized July 31 with 10 members and more to follow. On motion the Class was received into the Conference.

Conference Bar—On motion the first ten rows of seats of the two center sections were made the Conference Bar.

# CONFERENCE EVANGELIST'S REPORT

Once again we have come to the annual Conference and are assembled to reflect prayerfully and humbly upon the labors of the year as well as to seek a clear vision and a renewal of strength for the future labors. We have sought to the best of our ability to carry forward the work assigned us as Conference Evangelist a year ago. Our activities have been centered upon five fields, including a tent revival at Phillipsburg, which just closed Sunday night.

We began the year's work at Greenleaf where we conducted a five weeks' meeting in a rented hall. As a result of the interest and response in this meeting and the pastoral leadership on the field following the meeting, a Wesleyan class of fourteen members was organized and Brother Wendell Campbell was stationed as temporary pastor. Eight subscriptions for the Wesleyan Methodist were received.

Upon leaving Greenleaf we turned our attention to the Manhattan field. Our revival there was preceded by a period of house to house visiting along with regular Sunday services and prayer meetings in a rented hall. The College Male Quartet joined us in the revival. We sensed some distinct gains in the meeting against the tide of opposition which seems peculiar to that field. Some were saved and many were helped. The quartet made friends throughout the city, singing to shut-ins, in street services, in the Junior and Senior high school assemblies, as well as the regular evangelistic services each evening. At the close of this revival we set about to organize a Wesleyan class. However, the response was not what we expected it would be. After prayerful consideration we con-

cluded it would be unwise to attempt an organization at the time. Following the revival we continued pastoral work in Manhattan through a period in which the interest did not seem sufficient to justify our giving full time, and upon advising with the Board we left the group to the challenge of local initiative, assisting them in securing student preachers from Miltonvale for their regular services. Since that time a Wesleyan Sunday school has been organized with an attendance average of 30 or 35. Regular services are being continued in the same location, the local group carrying responsibility for same. By common consent, Brother Ray Horner has assumed the pastoral leadership of the work during the vacation period. Nine Wesleyan Methodist subscriptions were received in Manhattan.

We turned our attention to the Quinton Heights field in Topeka and were graciously welcomed into the home of the acting pastor and wife, Brother and Sister L. W. Melton. Brother V. C. Martin conducted a fruitful revival on this field and organized the class. He, together with Brother and Sister Melton, deserves much credit for the early developments on this field. We continued here a month, nearly all of which time was spent in special services. During our ministry we saw some saved and sanctified, and the saints greatly encouraged. Three substantial members were received into the fellowship of the church. We negotiated for the purchase of the church property and assisted in raising \$125 cash to apply on the purchase price, also recommending that the church consider securing the services of a full time pastor. After consulting with Brother and Sister Melton and receiving their endorsement, Brother and Sister Leo Cox were given a unanimous call to pastor the work. With the approval of the Conference President, Brother Hill, he moved to the field at once. Brother and Sister Melton are continuing their interest in the work.

Our next labors were in the town of Belle Plaine, located south of Wichita. Belle Plaine has a population of perhaps 900. Brother S. M. Yonally, our pastor in Wichita, who has been conducting prayer meetings on this field for nearly two years, had preparations made for a tent meeting. By proper consent we pitched the tent on ground belonging to the Baptist people and adjoining their church. Being visited with wet weather and a scourge of mosquitoes, we were glad to accept an invitation to move into the Baptist Church as the only possible way of continuing the services. Quite a little interest developed in this meeting, and more than a dozen sought the Lord. We made every reasonable attempt to conserve the work. However, some among the Baptist remnant drew back the closing week of the meeting and we were unable to see the forces represented in the revival move forward under holiness leadership at its close. The field is needy and open, and with some regular follow-up work, as may be possible, will ripen in time, I believe, for a class there.

Upon our return to Miltonvale, we assisted Brother Campbell at Greenleaf in services over two Sundays and the intervening evenings, were with the Manhattan group one Sunday and with Brother Conrad at Mankato over one Sunday just prior to the Phillipsburg revival.

We have sought throughout the year to have the supervision of the Missionary Board together with their approval upon each new undertaking. We deeply appreciate the prayers and backing of the Conference through the year, especially so in view of the newness, at least, if not the experimental aspect of the venture. Though there is no royal road to the entrance upon new fields, the need and challenge is tremendous. We cannot appeal too strongly for a continued sense of burden and vision to rest upon the Conference in behalf f pushing into needy fields. ### SUNDAY SCHOOL

For the moral and religious instruction of our people, and for the promotion of Bible Holiness, and the propagation of other doctrines essential to the development of Christian character, we consider the Sunday school a necessary and indispensable institution of the Church."

The Sunday school is important because it is an evangelizing agency. The Word of God is responsible for faith. "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God." The Word of God is the means the Holy Spirit is pleased to use to awaken the young, tender life and lead it to repentance and faith. Seventy per cent of all who are saved have been converted under the age of twenty. The great Bible characters, Joseph, Moses, Samuel, David, Timothy, and others, were converted in the young and tender years of life. Woodrow Wilson says: "It is very difficult indeed for a man or boy who knows the Scriptures to ever get away from it. It haunts him like an old song. It follows him like the memory of mother. It forms a part of the warp and woof of his life."

The Sunday school is important because it nourishes and feeds the divine life. We grow in grace by a knowledge of the truth. "The Holy Spirit is our instructor, and the Word is the medium through which He instructs us. The vigor of our spiritual life will be in exact proportion to the time we devote to the study of the Word." "While Shakespeare is the greatest of all writers outside of the Bible, the Bible is so superior to

Shakespeare from merely a literary point of view; so superior to Shakespeare in beauty and splendor of poetry, richness of prose, in knowledge of human nature, that there is no comparison at all. This is generally believed today by all shades of people, whether they are hostile to religion or not."

Our Sunday schools should be kept spiritual. We should keep out formality and worldliness. Our Sunday schools should be well organized in every department. Again, we should avoid falling into a rut. Plan for special numbers and vary opening and closing services. Forward with the Sunday school work.

#### MORAL REFORM

"Thus saith the Lord, stand ye in the ways and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls." Jer. 6:16.

Inasmuch as we are confronted with constantly shifting and slipping standards in moral and spiritual realms, it is of tremendous importance that we inquire for the old paths and "Earnestly contend for the faith once delivered to the saints," remembering the Lord hath said, "I will set a plumbline in the midst of my people," and His plumline changeth not.

While the popular church of today has lost its head and turned its back on God and things spiritual, let us, as Kipling suggested, not "Lose our head while all about us are losing theirs," but rather, looking unto Jesus, our Mighty Captain, go forth warring against sin till He come again.

Inasmuch as worldliness of all kinds is settling down upon the Church like a pall, we again uncompromisingly reaffirm our stand against it. God's people are a separate people. We cannot afford to allow the dividing line that separates between the Church and the world ever to grow dim. God has blessed our Conference in recent years as she has held high the standard. We must not lower it. If we should, we will lose our power and go down in disgrace and defeat.

The present trend of women wearing men's clothes, (such as slacks, etc.), semi-nudity of both sexes of all ages, such as shirtless men and boys, dresses without backs, short sleeves, shortened or split skirts, or otherwise of such material as does not properly cover the body, is dianetrically opposed to vital godliness, and cannot be indulged in without injury to the soul.

We wish to stress anew our disciplinary stand of dressing as becometh holiness wherever we are, including when in our own homes, knowing that if we let down the standards here it dulls the keen edge of our convictions. Much of the modern hair dress, including permanent waves, are not conducive to spirituality, nor in harmany with the Christian principle of self-denial. Faddy colored or sheer, flesh colored hose bespeak of worldliness rather than modest apparel as becometh holiness.

The tobacco and liquor interests, together with other devilish influences, are greedily and lustfully after our children and youth. Let us build high about them a wall of prayer and faith, refraining from dressing them in such attire as anklets, sun suits, or other abbreviated fashions. Lustful eyes are upon, and greedy hands are grasping after them.

The ancient Jew, along with godly parents of all ages, have taken time to instruct their children in the ways of God. To neglect this scriptural plan will be at the peril of our own as well as their souls. Perhaps we would have more men of the John and Charles Wesley type if we had more mothers of the Susannah Wesley type.

Since many periodicals have sold out to the tobacco and liquor interests by way of advertising, we urge that with caution we permit newspapers and magazines to come into our homes. If articles of value are contained in such periodicals, the pages containing debasing and false advertising should be torn out. Certain radio programs should never be allowed to be heard in the home. Since we desire better programs we should freely express our appreciation of such programs as are spiritually uplifting.

The present trend of the New Deal in spending such vast amounts of money purportedly to help us out of the recession may have a tendency to cause us to place too much dependence on the arm of flesh rather than on the arm of God. Certain forms of lending to the farmers is causing many to become involved in debt from which they cannot free themselves. It is unwise and unChristian to mortgage the future for present privilege.

Sabbath desecration is an ever increasing sin of this age. No Christian can participate in or countenance anything that mars the sacredness of the holy Sabbath.

Reformation without vital godliness can never safeguard society in this present life or prepare one to meet God in peace. Therefore a genuine revival of New Testament Salvation must be our goal and the subject of our united prayers.

# SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS AID SOCIETY OF THE KAN-SAS CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH CONSTITUTION

### Article I. Members

All Elders, Conference Preachers who are voting members of the Conference, and duly elected Delegates to the Kansas Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection, (or Church) of America, shall be members of this society.

### Article II. Officers

The Society shall elect by ballot a board of five members, three Elders and two Laymen, who shall act for the Society in the supervision and dispersing of funds in the interim of the regular meetings of the Society. The Board shall have a President, Secretary, and Treasurer, who shall make annual report to the Society.

### Article III. Funds

All interest on endowment, and all Superannuate monies raised shall become a part of the Benefit Fund and be subject to use for benefit of those qualifying for such benefit, unless specially specified for endowment.

No monies shall be dispersed except by order of the President and Secretary of the Annual Conference, as per paragraph 146 of the Discipline.

## Article IV. Eligible Beneficiaries

- 1. Superannuated Elders who have served under appointment of the Conference for fifteen years.
  - 2. Widows of such men.
- 3. Widows of all other Elders who served fifteen years, provided the Elders were members of the Conference at the time of their death, and provided the widow served the church as his wife during those fifteen years. Benefit stops upon remarriage of the widow.
- 4. Other worthy Ministers or their widows may be included by vote of the Society.

### THE KANSAS CONFERENCE

### Article V. Benefits

As the need may require and the funds permit, the basis shall be:

- 1. When a house is not owned by the beneficiary, the rent will be paid, not to exceed \$10.00 per month.
- 2. When a house is owned, the taxes will be paid, not to exceed \$50.00 per year.
  - 3. Each married man will receive \$15.00 per month.

- 4. Each single individual, whether man or woman, will receive \$10.00
- 5. Added benefit may be given by a vote of the Society for each dependent child.
- 6. On the judgment of the Board \$50.00 towards funeral expenses may be paid to eligible beneficiaries.

Note: The vote of the Society shall be final concerning its obligations to its beneficiaries.

### STATISTICAL GLEANINGS

The Committee on Statistics presents the following items of interest: The Conference has a gain in membership of 43 and the average Sunday school attendance shows a gain of 140.

The average contribution per member is \$36.80. The total amount raised for all purposes is about \$4,400.00 less than the same item last year. The pastors' receipts total about the same as last year.

The property valuation, including both churches and parsonages, shows an increase of more than \$26,000.00, while the amount of indebtedness increased but \$8,200.00.

The following charges raised every item of the Budget: Antioch,

Belleville, Concordia, Eskridge, Hall, Hopewell, Kansas City, Kansas; Miltonvale, Ottawa, Topeka, First Church; Trudell, Wichita. The following charges raised the Budget assignment but did not fill each item: Abilene, Chapman Creek, Cedar, Gage Park, Lawrence.

Reports indicate a loss of one subscription to the Wesleyan Methodist. Hardy and Wichita Mission have both been active during the year. Reports from these works have not yet reached the hands of the Committee, therefore, the names do not appear on the statistical records. Nevertheless, their labors and contributions have been appreciated.

### RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be authorized, if they see fit to do so, to engage Evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting two years in advance.
- 2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, That the election of Conference Officers be held on the second day of Conference at 9:00 a. m.
- 3. Subscription Lists. Resolved, That all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Conference Treasurer or the Treasurer of the W. H. & F. M. Society, and that all subscription lists be kept by these Treasurers, and that notice of indebtedness be given all subscribers by means of a list sent to their pastors early in the year.
- 4. Sanctity of God's House. Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.
- 5. Pastor's Moving Expenses. Resolved, That the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.
- 6. Reporting All Offerings to Pastors. Resolved, That all monies be reported to the Pastors for entry on their Statistical Report in order to give due credit both to the Charge and to the Conference.
- 7. Subscription Lists Record. Resolved, That the Secretary supply the Conference President with a list of all supscriptions taken at Conference. That he also provide each pastor with a list of those from his charge.
- 8. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: ½ cup flour, 1 teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in ½ inch squares and make as pie dough. The above will serve 50 persons.
- 9. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member to the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

- 10. To Hold Quarterly Meetings. Resolved, That the Conference President shall travel the Conference and care for one-half of the Quarterly Meetings.
- 11. Inspection of Church Property. Resolved, That it is the sense of the Annual Conference that the Conference President should inquire at each Quarterly Conference whether the local church property is properly repaired and insured.
- 12. Nominating Committee. Resolved, That all Conference Sessional Committees be filled through a Nominating Committee, and that the Conference President be Chairman ex-officio.
- 13. Night Services Evangelistic. Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that all its night services be conducted along strictly evangelistic lines.
- 14. Theological Institute. Resolved, 1st, That the Theological Institute begin on Monday of the last full week of April and continue until noon Thursday.
- 2nd, That the Ministerial Association begin Thursday at 2 p. m. of that week and continue over Friday.
- 3rd, That the traveling expenses of Instructors to and from the Theological Institute be paid from the Conference Fund, and also such books as may be needed for Institute work.
- 15. Superannuate Service. Resolved, That one public service in each Annual Conference Session be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund, and that it be the duty of the Second Vice-President to arrange for such service.
- 16. Superannuate Constitution. Resolved, That the Constitution of the Kansas Superannuate Association be printed in the Conference Minutes once in five years, and that a note be carried regularly in the Resolutions stating the year of last publication.
- 17. 1 Per Cent Assessment. Resolved, That we require all active ministers to pay 1 per cent of their cash salary to the Superannuate Fund, this not to be applied on the Budget.
- 18. Conference Loans. Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 19. Additional Delegates. Resolved, That when more than one Delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the Elder that entitles the church to the additional Delegate.

# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Sisters of the Kansas W. H. & F. M. S.:

Greetings! I wish to bring you a brief message from a few words found in the story of Esther, namely, "For such a time as this."

The destiny of God's people, you remember, depended not only on

the humors of this Persian king, but also upon the manner in which this stately queen met the crisis of her life. We have the view of Esther standing before the king, not as a wife, but as a petitioner before a sovereign. There was an opportuneness in duty and Mordecai said to her that she "had come to the kingdom for such a time as this." She had risen to such a height to be the deliverer of her own race. She nobly met the challenge, was equal to the time and its demand.

Any one with intelligence enlightened by experience recognizes that we are living in days of distress and confusion. True, there is much that God's people cannot change but must endure. But let us not be among the number that say "nothing can be done about it." Dark days have always preceded revivals. There is a striking similarity between our days and the days in which the Wesleys were born. One biographer writes, "The whole country as a whole was in sad need of reform, both in morals and religion." According to the historian Green there were not a thousand righteous people in England. But God was preparing his men and out of this chaotic condition came the Wesleys, with their hearts burdened, with their eyes opened to the terrible needs of their nation and with a real passion for the salvation of souls.

"For such a time as this." Women have always exerted a decisive influence upon the destinies of nations. J. ## PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend the following:

#### Division I. Local Work

- 1. That this Plan of Work be reviewed quarterly in each Local Society.
  - 2. That we observe the "Red Letter Days":
    - A. Harvest Home Day for Educational Work.
- B. Easter-Programs and offerings for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- C. The World Day of Prayer—We recommend that the District Organizers make definite plans for the observance either by District or Local Societies.
- D. May Day—to be known as gift day, gifts of clothing, money, or other articles such as can be sent out with outgoing missionaries or used on the home fields.

Before sending donations please secure information concerning proper addresses. (See Magazine Directory.)

- E. Wesleyan Missionary Day—public presentation of the Missionary Magazine in effort to secure subscriptions. The duty of the Local Solicitor for the Magazine shall be to secure renewals and fill the quota for her society. The same to be a permanent officer.
- 3. That October 14 be observed as Harvest Home Day. We urge each society to send cash or make donations to the Dormitory and report Same to Harvest Home Committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.
- 4. That all local dues be sent to our Conference Treasurer. One half of the same to be used for missionary work and be applied on church budget. Please designate specifically where this credit is desired.
- 5. We recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the collection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.
- 6. That each Society contribute 10 cents per active member to pay General Conference Delegates expenses.
- 7. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- 8. We urge each Society to contribute at least \$5.00 to the Hepzibah ()rphanage. Such contributions to be applied on Budget.
- 9. That each Local President appoint a committee quarterly whose duty shall be to visit the sick and to work in harmony with the pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the kingdom of God.

- 10. That the President of each Local Society be made responsible to arrange with the pastor for one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for Mission work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services as follows:
  - A. September, December, March and June, Grace Davis's Salary.
  - B. October and November for Education.
  - C. January-Hepzibah Orphanage.
  - D. February-Kansas Conference Missions.
  - E. April-Home Missions.
  - F. May-Bethshan Home.
  - G. July—Medical Missions.
- 11. In harmony with the recommendation of the General Society we urge that our ladies observe Friday of each week as a day of fasting and prayer for a Connection-wide revival, until it comes.
- 12. We urge the use of the Programs printed in the Wesleyan Missionary.
- 13. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on Budget be sent from the Local W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.

This money should be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least one week before Conference.

- 14. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Local Society, one copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, Mrs. N. Mae Clark, Perry, Kansas, two weeks before Conference, the duplicate copy to be brought to Conference by the Delegate. The names of the newly elected President and Secretary should appear on the back of the Report Blank.
- 15. That each Society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard, which is to be read at the last business meeting. A grade of 10 per cent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies making a grade of 90 per cent will receive honorable mention and those making a grade of 100 per cent will be placed on the Honor Roll.
- 16. We urge the reading of the report on Moral Reform at four public meetings during the year.
- 17. That each Society have a Committee of two to see to the gathering of food stuffs for the Conference dining hall. The minimum for each Society shall be: 10 quarts of fruit spread, 10 quarts of pickles, relish or catsup, 10 pounds of noodles, one-half dozen tea towels, also one large apron.
- 18. That the Local Society coöperation with the Temperance Super-intendent of the Sunday school in observance of Temperance Sunday.

19. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 500 members, 330 magazines, and \$3,000.00 Budget. We urge that each Society make a gain in each of the above mentioned.

20. That honorary membership be undivided and applied on Mis-

sionary Budget.

### Division II. Conference Work

21. That the W. H. & F. M. S. Conference begins Wednesday at

8:00 a. m. of Camp Meeting week.

22. That the President and District Organizer arrange the time and recommend the worker for the Convention, also that they prepare the schedule for the visitation of our worker.

23. That each District be supervised by the District Organizer under

the direction of the Conference President.

The Organizer shall be Prayer Secretary and Magazine Committee of her District and shall report the conditions of her District to the President quarterly.

We suggest that each organizer meet with each Local Society once

during the year.

24. The Districts are as follows:
