# DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

The thirtieth session of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection, or Church, of America met in the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Easley, S. C., November 21st, at 7:30 P. M.

The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. W. D. Correll, who used as a text Acts 20:28.

#### Morning Meeting, Wednesday, November 22nd.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. R. George, who read the 133rd and 134th Psalms.

After a few appropriate remarks, the Conference was called to order by the President. The Secretary called the roll, and thirteen elders and five licentiates answered to their names.

A. E. Belk was elected Committee on Credentials.

D. O. Powers and I. B. Brannon were elected Committee on Ministerial Character,

T. J. Boozer, Lieutenant of the Salvation Army, from Greenville, and Rev. T. P. Baker, Missionary Secretary, of Fairmount, Ind., were introduced to the Conference, made fitting remarks, and were later made honorary members, with the privilege of speaking on all questions.

#### Night Meeting, Wednesday, November 22nd.

A service was held in the interest of our Orphanage at Macon, Ga. Rev. W. D. Correll preached the text Psalm 85:6. Following the message a collection was taken in cash and pledges, amounting to \$150.00.

# Morning Meeting, Thursday, November 23rd.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. D. O. Powers, after which the President called the Conference to order.

The following resolution was presented: "Resolved, That no person be licensed to preach who does not tithe his income; that all our licentiates be required to faithfully tithe their income; and that the license of no preacher be renewed, who fails to tithe." On motion, this resolution was adopted.

an interesting and forceful manner.

To the Members of the South Carolina Conference: Dear Brethren, we wish to make the following report:

During the year we have traveled over the Southern Conferences. We have presented the Budget where we have had opportunity and raised several hundred dollars.

We held a meeting in Concord, N. C., where they had a little class. As a result of the meeting eighteen came into the Church. At present they have a new church as result of the revival. We have pushed the Educational part of the work. Conducted two meetings in the School this year in which numbers of the students got real help.

Something like one hundred members have come into the Wesleyan Churches where we have conducted meetings.

We have received on salary \$1,719.00.

A real prayed-down revival will solve all these problems, such as finance, raising the budget, and increasing our membership.

Another great need of the Church is better paid pastors. We will never build a strong Church until our pastors can give their whole time to the work. How can this be done? By getting our

people to tithing. It will solve the finance.

Another need of the work is more pastoral visiting. A visiting pastor makes a Church-going people. Nothing will bring the people out to hear us like getting into their homes.

Think of the suffering, to say nothing of the sin and darkness, because the Church has failed to obey. At the rate we are going, how long will it take us to give the gospel to millions of heathens? Every year millions slip into eternity without the Gospel.

What he Church needs is a Pentecostal awakening. What was Pentecost anyway except a great missionary revival? Anything short of a missionary spirit, even if it is called Pentecostal, is

spurious Holiness.

Another need is to educate our people on home work. If we neglect the home work the foreign will die. We must feed the home if we expect to keep our foreign going. "Now if any man have not the spirit of Christ He is none of his." The Spirit of Jesus was a missionary, self-sacrificing spirit.

#### REPORT OF ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE.

On January 16 and 17, 1922, your Committee met in the Hephzibah Home at Macon, Ga., in a joint session with four others, Presidents of the four other Southern Conferences of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, for the purpose of taking over the

Hephzibah Orphanage property.

The full Board met with Rev. T. W. Galloway in the chair. They voted all property and relinquished all claims to the five representative men of the Southern Conferences of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, namely, Rev. Edw. M. Graham, of the North Carolina Conference; Rev. W. D. Correll, of the South Carolina Conference; Rev. J. H. Lawrence, of the North Georgia Conference; Rev. J. A. Wood, of the Georgia Conference and Rev. W. R. French, of the Alabama Conference, by us assuming the indebtedness og \$10,000.00, which was at that time due. Three thousand was paid on the purchase price on receipt of said transfer.

By vote of the Wesleyan Committee the five Presidents are made the five Trustees of said property. They are Trustees by

virtue of their election to said presidency.

Out of the Committee, Rev. W. D. Correll, of Central, S. C., was made President of the Orphanage; Rev. Edw. M. Graham, of Gastonia, N. C., Secretary and Treasurer; Rev. J. A. Wood, Sparks, Ga., Vice-President. Miss Bettie Tyler was made sub-Treasurer. Miss Isabell Whallon was secured as Acting Manager until a man is secured to take the general oversight as Manager.

We recommend that an Agent or Agents be put in the field (or State of South Carolina), and that Rev. J. R. George and Rev. W. L.

Miller be these Agents.

We recommend that a budget of \$1.00 per member be raised for the expense or upkeep of the Home.

#### SECRECY.

James 5:12 forbids absolutely the taking of an oath required in joining a secret order, as do the Old Testament Scriptures.

Secrecy smacks of temporal things, hence the insurance. It is interested also in benevolence, hence the orphanages. Masonry is a

system, or rather an attempt at a system, of salvation without Jesus Christ. The secret orders adopt some of the principles of Christianity, attributing them to God essentially, without suffering the "reproach of the cross of Christ." It seems to be an effort to divide the Trinity of the Godhead—a substituting of a religion by works. We have heard from good authority that the Name of Jesus is not used in the ritual of the various orders, and we do not believe that the Holy Spirit is honored as He should be in the prayers of the secret orders. Men of profane lips often are expected to pray, and do pray, in the lodge, through custom, of course, and not because of sincere piety.

If the statement be true that a person cannot be a true lodgeman without being a Christian, that is, a truly converted Christian, then the system is a farce, secondary to Christianity and unnecessary. We cannot recall ever having seen many, if any, of the members of a certain secret order at a penitent's altar sincerely and earnestly seeking the Lord Jesus.

We consider our stand against secrecy entirely justifiable and honoring to our Lord, giving Him the preference.

# Resolutions.

#### Resolutions Adopted in 1898.

Resolved, 1st. That as a body in Conference assembled, we will not allow our pulpits or churches to be used by those who do not give evidence of being sound in the doctrines of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and true to our polity.

2nd. That as ministers and laymen we will use our best endeavors to prevent the promulgation of doctrines or usages not in accord with the Wesleyan Methodist faith.

#### Resolutions Adopted in 1905.

Resolved, 1st. That the law with regard to complaints or violations of orders and resolutions found on page 37 of our Discipline, and beginning with the words, "When the President," shall apply to all cases of the violators of our Discipline, and no charges

shall be entertained by the Judiciary Committee without said previ-

ous investigation and labor.

2nd. That no member of the Conference shall have his character passed who fails to carry out all the rules and orders of this Conference, unless providentially hindered, except upon a three-fourths vote of the body.

#### Resolutions Adopted in 1907.

Resolved, 1st. That we affirm our faith in the soundness of the position taken by the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America in denying any of its members membership in any secret society.

2nd. That we believe that the preaching of Holiness that does not include a clear and distinct opposition to all secret societies is seriously lacking in the essential elements and must be more or less

displeasing to God.

3rd. That we believe that the right type of Holiness preaching and teaching is the most effective means by which to induce men to separate themselves from all lodge entanglements; therefore, we will

do our best to double our diligence in this line of effort.

4th. That we affectionately admonish our people to avoid all compromise with secrecy. Hence we as a Conference require that our pastors and churches shall not elect, or suffer to be elected, superintendents or teachers of any Sunday Schools that are held in our churches if they hold membership in secret societies; furthermore, those belonging to secret orders shall not be allowed to hold services in our churches.

5th. That we seriously urge upon all our brethren and sisters that they may be careful to maintain a consistent, but radical, attitude of opposition to all organizations, secret or open, which are opposed o Jesus Christ and His doctrine and principles of righteousness.

#### Resolutions Adopted in 1914.

Resolved, 1st. That all of our Licentiates not receiving any appointments to pastoral or evangelistic work be required to preach at least once a month, or twelve times during the Conference year.

2nd. That in addition to the above resolution, we earnestly request all preachers not receiving a regular appointment by the Conference, except those attending school preparatory to the ministry, to hold, if possible, a two weeks' revival during the year.

3rd. That all preachers unemployed by the Conference during

the coming year be urged to select a fellow-laborer with whom they can work harmoniously, and go out and try to build up new works as they may have opportunity, and revive the desert places.

4th. That in order that the foregoing resolutions may have the greatest effect possible, and that each preacher may have a higher estimation of the dignity of his calling, and that the burden for souls may be increased, and that they may feel the sympathy of the Church to which they belong, we urge each charge to pass like resolutions.

5th. That it is not only the duty, but binding on each Circuit preacher of our Conference, to receive whomsoever the Conference may designate as Quarterly Meeting Evangelist, and give him their hearty support and co-operation.

#### Resolution Adopted in 1919.

Be it Resolved, That the Committee on Public Worship consist of the President of the Conference, the pastor of the charge where the Conference is held, and the pastor's delegate.

#### Resolutions Adopted in 1921.

#### Regarding the Orphanage.

Resolved, 1st. That we as a Conference continue W. D. Correll as Committeeman until next Annual Conference; also to act as Manager of the institution from this Conference.

2nd. That we meet the balance of \$7,000,00 on the purchase price of the property. We suggest that \$1.00 per member be asked for throughout the Conference, for 1923.

3rd. That a Committee of two be elected to associate with W. D. Correll as Committeeman.

4th. That this Committee appoint such financial agents or agent as necessary to carry on this work throughout the Conference, and that said agents be secured on such terms as can be agreed thereon by Committee and agents.

5th. That a special effort be made between now and the first of January by the pastors and Financial Agents to collect the amount subscribed during this Conference, and to add to it if possible, thereby saving interest and deferred payments.

6th. That the Conference Treasurer handle all cash and re-
