JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

The Lockport Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America convened in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, Cattaraugus, N. Y., for its sixty-seventh annual session, April 4, 1928, at 9:00 A. M. The opening sermon was preached the previous evening by Rev. C. L. Horton, pastor of the Higgins charge.

The Conference was called to order by the President, Rev. James A. Bain, and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. John E. Bruce.

The roll was called and 18 ministers and 19 delegates were marked present.

Following the calling of the roll, a few hearty words of greeting and welcome were given by the President and the Conference was opened for business.

On motion the Bar of Conference was fixed for the first six rows of seats across the body of the church.

The Committee on Temporary Organization submitted its report, which was considered item by item, and after a few minor changes was adopted. See Report No. 1.

On motion the time for opening and closing the sessions of Conference was fixed as follows: Morning sessions opening at 8:30, closing at 11:30; the afternoon session opening at 1:30, and closing by vote of Conference.

All special orders, by Conference action, were referred to the Committee on Religious Services.

The election of Conference Officials was made the order of the day for Thursday morning at 9:30.

Mrs. Mary Lane Clarke, Superintendent of the Y. M. W. B., was introduced to Conference and made a few remarks.

An oral report was made by H. R. Barnett relative to the Bethesda Home of Bradford, Pa. The report was adopted.

The following names were called and characters passed: Francis B. Markell, Noah R. Shaffer, M. A. Bateman, Walter Readett, C. I. Armstrong, J. E. Bruce, J. H. Woodhouse and J. R. Pitt.

On motion the name of Walter Readett was substituted on the Committee on Statistical Reports to fill the vacancy caused by the absence of President J. S. Luckey until he arrives.

Letters from Revs. O. G. McKinley and B. S. Laughlin were read, their characters passed, and the request of Rev. B. S. Laughlin to be placed on the Superannuated List was referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

By a vote of 19 to 7 the action of the Conference of 1927 limiting the reading of the pastor's statistical reports to the Budget Item of his report was rescinded, and on motion it was made obligatory to read items 3, 9 and 10 of their reports.

Letters from Revs. W. W. Rolf and C. H. Dow were read and their characters passed.

A letter was read from Sister Sarah Wilcox, a former member and pastor in the Lockport Conference, and her request for Conference membership was referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

The following persons were introduced to Conference: R. C. Nelson and M. E. Cornelius, assistant city clerk of Bradford. Both these brethren are members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of that city.

A motion prevailed calling for religious services to be held each afternoon of Conference from 2:30 to 3:30. The Committee on Religious Services may use this hour for special orders if they so desire.

Adjourned by limitation of time, the benediction being given by Rev. Walter Readett.

Afternoon Session, April 4, 1928.

The Conference was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. George Clement.

The roll was called and the minutes read and approved, as corrected.

A motion was made and duly seconded to rescind the former action of this Conference limiting the Conference President's term of office to a period of four consecutive years. The motion prevailed by a vote of 33 to 2.

The Conference Treasurer submitted his report, which was adopted. See Report No. 2.

If there are sufficient funds left in the Home Missionary Budget the Treasurer of the Conference is hereby authorized to turn over 70% to the Conference Budget for Conference use.

On motion the orders of the day with regard to religious services were waived for this afternoon to continue present business.

The following names were called and characters passed: A. O. Northrup, Edward Elliott and G. E. Bathurst. The report of the Higgins charge was read by M. A. Bateman on account of the illness of the pastor, C. L. Horton, and said pastor's character was passed.

On motion the matter of nominating the Standing Committees was referred to the Committee on Temporary Organization.

A report of the Judiciary Committee relative to the case of Rev. H. H. Schoonover was read by Rev. Walter Readett and referred to a Committee of Review for further consideration and report to this

Conference. Said Committee to meet at the call of the Chairman. The following persons were made to constitute the Committee: J. A. Bain, J. R. Pitt, J. H. Woodhouse, A. O. Northrup, E. B. Houghton, N. R. Shaffer, C. F. Ball, Lewis Dietrich, Walter Readett, Harry Morley, Edward Elliott, G. H. Clarke.

Adjourned for Committee work, to meet at the call of the Chair.

The Conference was called to order at 4:45, and adjourned on motion.

Morning Session, April 5, 1928.

The Conference was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. G. E. Bathurst.

The roll was called and the minutes read and approved.

The Committee on Temporary Organization to whom was referred the matter of nominating the Standing Committees submitted its report, which was considered item by item. The item relative to the Committee on Evangelism was referred back to the Committee for further consideration and the balance of the report was adopted. See Report No. 4.

On motion a Committee was elected to divide the Conference into Districts for the purpose of drafting resolutions for aggressive evangelistic effort. A. O. Northrup, C. I. Armstrong, F. B. Markell, J. H. Woodhouse and Edward Elliott were elected as the Committee.

The Auditing Committee having O. K.'d the reports of the Conference Treasurer, the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees and the financial report of the Conference President submitted a partial report, which was adopted.

The Conference President submitted his report, which was considered item by item. Before the completion of its consideration the time for the orders of the day arrived and the orders were postponed pending a full consideration of the report. The report was adopted. See Report No. 5.

The Conference proceeded with the election of Conference officials, which resulted as follows:

The first ballot was declared to be an informal ballot by vote of Conference.

On the first ballot for President, Rev. James A. Bain received 35 of 41 votes cast and was declared elected.

On the ballot for Vice-President, Rev. Noah R. Shaffer received 27 of 41 votes cast and was declared elected.

On first ballot for Secretary, Rev. Francis B. Markell received 40 of 41 votes cast and was declared elected. The Secretary on motion

was authorized to nominate his assistant. Rev. C. I. Armstrong was nominated, and the action was sustained by vote of Conference.

On first ballot for Treasurer, Rev. George H. Clarke received 36 of 40 votes cast and was declared elected.

On first ballot for Sunday School Secretary, Rev. Chauncey I. Armstrong received 22 of 36 votes cast and was declared elected.

On motion Rev. M. A. Bateman was elected Tithing Secretary and Rev. John E. Bruce was elected Statistical Secretary.

The election of Trustees resulted as follows:

On first ballot for ministerial member of the Board of Trustees Rev. Joseph R. Pitt received 33 of 38 votes cast and was declared elected.

Rev. James A. Bain was elected as the second ministerial member of the Board of Trustees by a ballot of 35 of 39 votes cast.

For lay member of the Board of Trustees Orval H. Howard received 35 of 38 votes cast and was declared elected.

The Treasurer of the Board of Trustees submitted his report, which was adopted. See Report No. 6.

The following persons were introduced to Conference and made a few remarks: Rev. E. F. McCarty, Connectional Foreign Missionary Secretary; President J. S. Luckey, of Houghton College.

Adjourned by limitation of time, the benediction being given by Rev. J. H. Woodhouse.

Afternoon Session, April 5, 1928.

The Conference was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. W. A. Backus.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

On motion the Conference Board of Trustees was made to constitute the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location as required by the last Discipline, page 77, paragraph 137.

The following persons were introduced to Conference and made a few brief remarks: Rev. R. J. Smeltzer, Pastor of the Lynndon Park Wesleyan Methodist Church, and Professor C. A. Ries, of Houghton College.

The following names were called and characters were passed: A. A. Hickok, George Clement, Louise Gifford, W. A. Backus.

The report of the Machias and Wyoming charges was read by the pastor, Price Stark.

On motion the Conference Sunday School Secretary was authorized to bring in a list of the Sunday School Superintendents of the various charges in the Conference, the same to be printed in the Conference Minutes.

A matter relative to the apportioning to the various charges of the Conference the amount of 15 cents per member to help defray the expenses of Annual Conference entertainment was referred to a Committee for consideration and report to Conference. The following persons were elected as the Committee: Harry Morley, C. I. Armstrong and James S. Luckey.

The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived, Rev. E. F. McCarty brought to the Conference an inspirational message of truth from God's Word. Text, Romans 12:1.

The Conference was called to order at 3:35 and adjourned for Committee work.

Morning Session, April 6, 1928.

The session was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. R. Pitt.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved as corrected.

The Committee to which was referred the matter of apportioning to the charges the amount of their financial support for the Annual Conference entertainment submitted its report, which was adopted. See Report No. 7.

The Committee to whom was referred the matter of dividing the Conference into districts for the purpose of aggressive evangelistic effort and the holding of Holiness Conventions submitted its report. The report was adopted. See Report No. 8.

A partial report of the Committee on Budget was submitted by President J. S. Luckey and adopted.

On motion the Secretary was authorized to order printed 200 copies of the Conference Minutes, the same to be paid for from the Conference treasury. The money received from the sale of these minutes by the pastors is to apply on the Conference Budget.

It was moved and seconded that the Conference elect a Committee to consider a plan for the distribution of the Home Missionary Budget. The motion was carried and the following persons were elected on the Committee: Edward Elliott, J. S. Luckey and Bertha Grange.

Adjourned for fifteen minutes for Committee work.

The Conference was called to order by the President and the Connectional Interests were presented by Rev. E. F. McCarty.

The Conference was called to order by the President at 11:12 and the report of the Allegany charge was read by Mrs. M. E. Warburton.

The time was extended from 11:30 to 11:55 and the Conference adjourned for Committee work.

Afternoon Session, April 6, 1928.

The Conference was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. H. Woodhouse.

The roll was called and the minutes read and approved.

Letters from the following persons were read and their characters were passed: Rev. L. C. Mattoon, Rev. J. A. Mann, Mina Mann and Rev. C. M. Dudley.

Rev. Thomas Slocum, a superannuated minister in the Free Methodist Church, was introduced to Conference.

Moved, seconded and carried that the Statistical Committee be authorized to retain on the statistical report the following charges and their rating of membership: Cameron, with 8 members; Napoli, with 6; North Main, with 7; Isolated, 10. Jamestown Mission to be dropped from the list of charges.

On motion a matter relative to the Chestnut Ridge charge was referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

The following persons were elected on the Sunday School Board: Prof. LeVay Fancher and M. E. Cornelius.

The name of H. H. Schoonover was called and his case was referred to the Committee of Review.

The Orders of the Day relative to a Religious Service were suspended for this afternoon and the Conference adjourned for Committee work.

Morning Session, April 7, 1928.

The session was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Francis B. Markell.

The roll was called and the minutes read and approved.

The Committee on Temporary Organization, to whom was referred the renomination of the Committee on Evangelism, submitted its report, which was adopted.

The Budget Committee submitted its report, which was adopted. See Report No. 9.

The report of the Committee on Thanks was read by Miss Bertha Grange and adopted. See Report No. 10.

Having O. K.'d the books of the Conference President and found them correct, the Auditing Committee submitted a partial report, which was adopted.

The name of Rev. C. W. Smith was called, his character passed and his request to continue on his present field of labor was referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations. He was also excused from the Conference after this afternoon.

The Committee on Review, to which had been submitted the case of Rev. H. H. Schoonover, submitted its report, which was adopted. See Report No. 11.

Moved and duly seconded that the President investigate a matter relative to a Church at Kattanning, which is seeking admission into the Lockport Conference and act according to his own best judgment.

The Conference President nominated Rev. Edward Elliott and Mr. E. B. Houghton as the members of his Advisory Board and the action was endorsed by vote of Conference.

On motion the Committee on Statistics was instructed to read items 3, 9 and 10 only of the Statistical Report. The report was then submitted by the Committee and adopted. See Report No. 12.

The following persons were introduced to Conference and made a few remarks: Rev. E. J. Cook, pastor of the Cattaraugus Free Methodist Church, and Mrs. Clara Stoddart, a former pastor in the Lockport Conference. The case of Mrs. Stoddart, who desires membership in this Conference, was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The report of the Sunday School Board was submitted and adopted. See Report No. 13.

Rev. C. I. Armstrong, Conference Sunday School Secretary, submitted his annual report, which was adopted. See Report No. 14.

On account of the absence of Rev. J. R. Pitt, who was called home on account of sickness, Rev. H. J. Bullock was elected on the Committee of Pastoral Relations.

On motion the matter of ordering the Conference stationery was left in the hands of Rev. G. H. Clarke.

The following names were called and their characters passed: H. J. Bullock and Mae K. Shaffer. A report for Sisters Lulu Tanner and Florence Yorton was made by Mrs. Hubbard and their characters were passed.

The time for the presentation of the Educational Interests having arrived, this subject was presented by President J. S. Luckey, assisted by Miss Crystal Rork.

The Conference was called to order at 11:00 o'clock and the Committee to whom was referred the matter of outlining a plan for the distribution of the Home Missionary Budget, submitted its report, which was adopted. See Report No. 15.

The Report of Bethesda Home was submitted by the Acting Matron, Miss Anna Freeman, and was adopted. See Report No. 16.

On motion the Conference voted to extend to the members of the Community Chest of Bradford, Pa., a vote of thanks for their financial aid in supporting Bethesda Home.

On motion Edward Elliott, Bertha Grange and James S. Luckey were elected a Committee to confer with the members of the W. H. & F. M. Society relative to the securing of their co-operation in disbursing the Home Missionary money.

Rev. C. I. Armstrong, pastor of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Bradford, Pa., extended to the Conference an invitation to hold the next Annual Session of Conference in said Church. The invitation was accepted.

Adjourned by limitation of time, the benediction being given by Rev. C. I. Armstrong.

Afternoon Session, April 7, 1928.

The meeting was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. C. W. Smith.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved as corrected.

On motion A. O. Northrup and W. A. Backus were excused from Conference after 3:00 P. M.

C. I. Armstrong tendered his resignation from the Missionary Board and the vacancy was filled by the election of George Clement.

The time for the Religious Service having about arrived, and on account of a lack of business at this time, the Committee of Pastoral Relations withdrew for Committee work, and a religious service was held in the body of the church. A-message was preached from Galatians 5:22. God honored His people by a good refreshing shower of grace, especially during the testimony service which followed.

The Conference was called to order by the President at 4:20 and the Committee on Pastoral Relations submitted its report, which was considered item by item. In the case of the name of Rev. Sarah Wilcox being placed on the Superannuated List the matter was referred to the Conference Board of Trustees, and after a few minor corrections the report was adopted. See Report No. 18.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders submitted its report which was adopted. See Report No. 19.

On motion the request of C. I. Armstrong to be excused from Conference was granted.

Conference adjourned until 6:30.

The Conference was called to order and the Report of the Board of Trustees was submitted, and after some consideration was adopted. See Report No. 20.

The names of J. R. Babcock, W. J. Roth and C. E. Woodhead were called. No Report.

The report of the Committee on Post Office Addresses was read and adopted.

The minutes were read and approved.

Adjourned on motion subject to the call of the chair.

To the Members of the Lockport Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church: Greeting.

ON BUDGET.

- 1. The part of the Budget for Education is \$1,319, and all money paid for current expenses of Houghton College, all money on L. S. U. pledges for Houghton College, and all interest (but not principle) paid on Educational notes for Houghton College, and all money raised on Educational day by the Y. M. W. B. and on Harvest Day by the W. H. & F. M. Society may count toward this Budget.
- 2. The part of the Budget for Foreign Missions is \$2,193, and all money paid for current expenses for Foreign Missions, all money appropriated for this purpose by the W. H. & F. M. Society, and all money paid by the Y. M. W. B., may count toward this Budget.
- 3. We recommend that the part of the Budget for Home Missions be \$1,319, and all money paid for Home Missions, and all money appropriated for this purpose by the W. H. & F. M. Society, may count toward this Budget; also money paid for work authorized by the Conference Missionary Board may count toward this Budget, and this work may include tent work, building churches, organizing Sunday

Schools in unoccupied territory, and strengthening and building up of work already established, but not self-supporting. However, it is understood that thirty per cent of the total Conference apportionment for Home Missions must be paid in cash to the Connectional Home Missionary Treasury.

- 4. We recommend that the part of the Budget for Conference be \$2,193, and that nothing but cash may count toward this Budget. This Budget shall be distributed as follows:
 - 2% for Connectional Sunday School Work.
 - 6% for Conference Entertainment.
 - 12% for Marion No-Retreat Fund.
 - 20% for Superannuated Ministers' Fund.
 - 60% for Conference Work, including the cost of Conference Minutes.
- 5. We recommend that no Charge shall receive credit on its Budget except for cash or receipts sent to the Conference Treasury.
- 6. We recommend that the pastors shall include in their Statistical Reports these items: Total Budget Assigned, Total Budget Raised; that the second item shall not be filled in until the pastor has settled with the Conference Treasurer, and that the account placed in the second item be the amount reported to the pastor by the Conference Treasurer.
- 7. We recommend that the Conference authorize each pastor to hand to the Budget Committee at the next Annual Conference a list of the members on his charge under sixteen years of age, provided he declares that he knows personally each one on the list is under sixteen. This list shall then be deducted from the number determining Budget apportionment on that charge.
- 8. We recommend that Batavia, Cameron, Machias, Napoli, North Main and Wyoming be rated at one-half membership.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees of the Lockport Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America, met in the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Cattaraugus, N. Y., April 6, 1928, at 6:30 P. M.

The meeting was called to order by the President of the Conference, Rev. James A. Bain, who on motion was elected President of this Board of Trustees. On motion the following other officers were elected: Vice-President, Rev. Noah R. Shaffer; Secretary, Rev. J. R. Pitt; Treasurer, Rev. Walter Readett. The Executive Board was filled by the election of Rev. James A. Bain, Rev. Joseph R. Pitt, and Earnest B. Houghton.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees was authorized to use the Conference seal on all legal papers, this to be a standing rule of the Board of Trustees.

We recommend the following:

- 1. That Mrs. J. L. Benton receive the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) from the Superannuated Minister's Fund.
- 2. That Rev. C. H. Dow receive the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) from the Superannuated Minister's Fund.
- 3. That the Conference Secretary and Treasurer each receive the sum of thirty dollars (\$30.00) for their services, to be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 4. That the twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) deficit on the Conference President's salary be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 5. That the salary of the pastor of the Batavia Church be \$1200.00, and that the Conference shall be responsible for \$600.00 of this amount, the pastor also to have the use of the parsonage (exclusive of the three rented rooms) and the use of one stall in the garage.
- 6. That the rental from the rooms in the parsonage and the two stalls in the garage be deposited in the Genesee Bank of Batavia to the credit of the Board of Trustees of the Lockport Conference, and that a statement of each deposit be sent to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees.

- 7. That the three trustees who hold in trust the Bethesda property at Bradford, Pa., be instructed to re-insure said property to the amount of the present insurance before the 18th day of July, 1928, and that the bill from said insurance be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 8. That the record of the bonds, and all matter pertaining to the payment of interest, also the redemption of said bonds, be placed in the hands of the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees.
- 9. That the name of Sarah Wilcox be placed on the Licentiates List, and that an appropriation of fifty dollars (\$50.00) be made from the Superannuated Minister's Fund.
- 10. That the interest on the notes from the Olean Church up to June 1, 1928, be considered paid.
- 11. That an appropriation of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per quarter be made from the Home Missionary Fund toward the salary of the pastor of the Ransomville charge.

GENERAL CONFERENCE DELEGATE'S REPORT.

To the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the Lockport Conference:—Greetings in the name of Him who has promised to us "the heathen for an inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for our possession."

May I here express my appreciation to this body of women for the unmerited honor conferred upon me a year ago, when you elected me your delegate to the General Conference Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society. It was a wonderful privilege, which if once enjoyed will never be forgotten. The inspiration received from mingling with and listening to that body of consecrated women still lingers.

Tuesday evening, June 21st, an informal reception was held in the High School study hall of Houghton College, where a short program was enjoyed, after which a receiving line was formed in the transit to the library and each had opportunity to meet the General Conference Officers and returned missionaries. A sweet spirit of fellowship prevailed as old acquaintances were renewed and a general good time was enjoyed.

With the co-operation of the students and faculty the College Study Hall was converted into a delightful resting place, and here were displayed the curios from our foreign mission fields.

The business sessions were held in the High School Study Hall.

Each branch of the Missionary work was presented in such an interesting and forceful manner that we are sure the hearts of the listeners were stirred to their very depths, and will result in deeper devotion to God and His service.

To give the daily proceedings is unnecessary, as you have this in the Wesleyan Missionary; but may I say, that we as members of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society should count ourselves priviledged to have such efficient Spirit-filled women as are our General Officers, modest and unassuming, but with a vision and a spirit which counts no sacrifice too great that the missionary work shall be advanced. Rarely, if ever, would you find in any quadrennial session, of whatever denomination, a more devoted company of Christian women than met in Houghton in 1927.

It is beyond our ability to give a comprehensive report of that session, but oh, that you might get a glimpse of the devotion and self-sacrificing spirit exhibited by the fifteen or sixteen returned missionaries, who were presented and spoke with hearts too full for words.

Miss Florence Yorton was only a few months home from Africa and the burden she carries on her heart over there was still hers, even though back in her native land. As she recited incidents from the field the hearts and heads of her hearers were humbled, especially when she asked if we thought we put too much money into Africa, as she has sometimes heard it said.

The thought was brought to us, "that we are in great danger of letting unimportant things in life take so much of our time that we let opportunities go past for helping to save the lost." Much time spent in prayer will help us not to fail in our duty.

Dr. Ruby Paine stressed this same thought—the need of prayer to settle all problems that confront us in the homeland as well as on the foreign fields. May we not pray out some consecrated young men and women, prepared, or who will prepare for medical work on our Foreign fields? At the present time we are without a doctor at any of our mission stations. Brother Birch made a striking statement, well worth the thought of every Christian: "Some one must take the way of the cross if souls are saved."

Our hearts were assured as the other missionaries from Africa brought their messages, that their interests too are largely in the land

to which God once called them. We believe none of those lately returned carry the work of the African field today more deeply on their hearts than do our Brother and Sister Clarke, who have spent so many years over there and who now, in the homeland, are so efficiently superintending the work of the young people.

Sister Ina Gaines gave us this good thought: "Not to be so taken up with the means employed in carrying on our work, as to lose sight of the goal." She spoke very highly of the good work that Mrs. Nancy Barts Willis is doing in the South as Organizer.

The work in the Blue Ridge Mountains and the Alabama Mission School was brought to us by Miss Leila Hughes and Rev. Lon Gillam. Many and varied are their problems and the privilege of praying for them and their needy fields is ours.

Brother Will French presented the Oregon work and pressed the need of evangelists on the coast. Real pioneer workers are needed, who count no sacrifice too great that souls may be saved.

Rev. C. B. Harvey, Rev. and Mrs. Morris and Arthur Doty, son of our missionaries, brought inspiring messages from India. Brother Harvey spoke of the great responsibility that rests upon the people of the United States to carry the Gospel to those who sit in darkness, now that the law has shut out the browns and blacks from our shores.

Our Foreign Missionary Secretary, Rev. E. F. McCarty, spoke encouragingly of our work in Japan. The Japanese church has a membership of 140 and is rapidly becoming self-supporting. May we not pray that God shall so fully restore Sister Gibbs to health that this consecrated family may return to carry on the work, or that other workers shall feel the call to that land.

The interests of the Home Missionary work were well presented by Rev. T. P. Baker, our Home Missionary Secretary. He urged us to remember that it is the regular contributions of the people that make it possible to enter the open doors. Let us not fail in praying for the Home work and give as God has prospered us.

Sisters, the last Quadrennium is history today, but the fields at home and abroad are still white for the harvest, waiting for the laborers to go forth and the great commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel," still stands. What is your part and mine in the gathering in of the lost of earth? Can we in any degree become lax in our prayer life for every field? Can we withhold our tithes and offerings? Can we cease to say, "Here, Lord am I," or "Here are those whom Thou hast given me; use all to Thy glory and to the upbuilding of Thy cause," and be free from the blood of souls?

Shall we not take as our slogan for the coming years the words used by our President, Mrs. Clara McLeister, in her reply to the wel-

come given, "Advance, but advance on our knees," and let us make the following lines our daily prayer:

"Stir me, O stir me, Lord. I care not how,
But stir my heart in passion for the world;
Stir me to give, to go—BUT MOST TO PRAY.
Stir till the blood-red banner be unfurled
On lands that still in heathen darkness lie,
O'er deserts where no cross is lifted high,
O Lord, stir into flame."
