CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

Section I. Conference Officers

- 1. (a) We shall have a traveling Conference President, who shall receive \$2600.00 annually and house rent. This salary shall be apportioned to the churches and paid by them to the Conference Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month beginning with August 1, each Conference year, forward a check for one twelfth of the amount to him. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finance, and other affairs that affect the spiritual and temporal welfare of the work. After consulting with the pastors, he may confer with the stewards if necessary with the purpose in mind to increase the pastor's salary. He shall hold one quarterly meeting which shall consist of a Friday, Saturday and two Sunday services annually. This slate to be published in the first issue of the Messenger and in The Wesleyan Methodist.
- (b) His traveling expense shall be guaranteed him from the Conference Incidental fund, at the rate of .05 a mile for automobile travel, and actual train and bus fare; also his desk expense and all long distance telephone bills pertaining to his conference work shall be paid from the same fund.
- 2. (a) The Conference Missionary Board shall be composed of the Conference President as Chairman; the Vice-President as the Executive Secretary; the W. M. S. President and five additional ministers, one from each of the five districts of the Conference. These five members are to be nominated by the ex-officio members of the Board and the President's Advisory Board, and shall be elected by ballot.
- (b) It shall require a written order of the Board for funds to be paid from The Conference Mission Fund.
- (c) The Missionary Board may employ such pastors of the Conference as may be needed for pioneer meetings. Churches are urged to co-operate by granting their pastors a 2-week leave of absence with pay, if his services are requested by the Board.
- (d) The Vice-President shall act as the Executive Secretary of the Board, and with the five men elected from the districts, shall survey the field and carry out the plans of the Missionary Board for Pioneer Evangelism. Their traveling expenses shall be paid for at the rate of .05 per mile for automobile travel and actual train and bus fare fully cared for; the Executive Secretary's desk expense and all long distance telephone bills pertaining to this pioneer work shall be paid from the Conference Missions funds: remuneration for the Vice-President shall be arranged by the President and his

advisory board. The Vice-President acting as Executive Secretary of the Missionary Board shall make a written report to the annual conference and shall include the guarantees of salaries paid by him; also all financial statistics.

- (e) The five elected men, with the Secretary, shall organize the pastors on the various districts for pioneer work and shall set aside a Sunday as Pioneer Day, and the pastors shall interchange on that day, bringing a pioneer message and raising offerings and pledges for this work.
- (f) The Conference shall be divided into five districts by a line from Sandusky to Portsmouth, and from Union City to Martin's Ferry, with the exception of a central district composed of Licking, Franklin, Morrow, Knox, Delaware and Union Counties.
- (g) The Missionary Board and the Conference Board of Trustees shall jointly administer the Church Extension Fund.
- 3. The Conference shall elect a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of nine members, five ministerial and four lay, to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds, and it's improvements and the making of complete arrangements for camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. They shall serve for terms of three years. One ministerial member of the Committee shall be designated as Chairman by ballot, annually at it's regular session. This Committee shall designate one of it's members as Treasurer, and another as secretary. Each shall report to the Annual Conference and the report shall be incorporated in the conference minutes. The Treasurer's report shall be audited. This committee shall advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to the location, erection, and improvements of conference buildings on the Campground.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the trustees of the Ohio Conference to receive, hold, and dispose of property within the bounds of the Conference as provided in the book of Discipline, paragraph 120, and 384-389. In addition to this they shall also be empowered to act in certain instances as follows:
- A. Resolved; the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds, and papers of a like character, when necessary to secure loans to the Ohio Annual Conference, or to any church within the conference needing funds to liquidate conference, church or parsonage indebtedness provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set forth the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested, and that both the President and Trustees of said Conference are satisfied that the object for which the loan or loans is sought is both necessary and desirable.
- B. Resolved; the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be and they hereby are empowered to execute all necessary papers,

mortgage deeds, and papers of a like character, when necessary to secure loans for the purpose of purchasing or erecting church or parsonage buildings in the pioneer work of the Conference, provided that the proposed project and the financing of it by means of the proposed loan shall receive the approval of the Conference President, a majority of the total membership of the Missionary Board, and a majority of the total membership of the Board of Trustees.

- C. Resolved; the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be and they hereby are empowered to sign any or all deeds and papers for the transfer of real property that is now or hereafter may be held in trust by said trustees, provided the sale of such conference, church, or parsonage, or other real estate has been authorized and approved by the President of the Conference with the concurrence of at least one member of his advisory board.
- 5. We recommend a standard traveling expense of .05 a mile to the Conference Board of Trustees from the Conference Mission Fund and the Conference Incidental Fund, to the Missionary Board from the Conference Missions Treasury, and to the Camp Meeting Committee from the Camp Meeting Treasury.

Section II. Annual Session of Conference

- 6. (a) The annual Conference shall convene on the fourth Monday of July and continue through the following Sunday.
- (b) Camp Meeting shall open with the Friday evening service of Conference week.
- (c) The Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for Conference and Camp.
- 7. All elders and licentiates are required to attend the entire session of Conference. It shall require a vote of Conference to pass the character of any minister who fails in this regard.
- 8. (a) It is recommended that persons elected as lay delegates to conference shall be able to attend the entire session.
- (b) The Conference Secretary shall provide blanks for Delegate's Credentials, including the following items: certificate of election, address of Delegate, information as to how long the Delegate intends to remain at Conference, the pastor's address and telephone number. These credentials are to be returned in advance of Conference to a Standing Committee on Credentials, appointed by the President.
- 9. (a) It is required that each pastor obtain from the conference treasurer a signed statement of all budget monies paid to him. This statement shall agree with the pastor's statistical report, both of which shall be mailed to the chairman of the Statistical Committee not later than July 15th.

- (b) The Conference shall omit the reading of the statistical reports by the pastors, and instead the Committee on Statistics shall post on the bulletin board certain items of vital interest, for the instruction of the members of the Conference.
- 10. (a) The Special Orders of the Conference shall be: Monday evening, a Conference Sermon and Communion Service; Tuesday evening, Educational Service; Wednesday Afternoon, one half hour each to the Tithing Secretary and the Sunday School Secretary; Wednesday Evening, Pioneer Evangelism Service; Thursday evening, Missionary Service under the W. M. S.; Memorial Service when necessary, Friday afternoon; Sunday morning, Ordination Service.
- (b) The Annual Session of the Ohio W. Y. P. S. Conference shall be held on the fourth Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in June in each year in connection with a Bible Conference.
- 11. (a) All persons recommended to Conference, and those pursuing the Course of Study, shall appear before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than the second day of Conference.
- (b) Examinations shall be taken before a member of the committee or a person appointed by them. In order to receive credit for the current year, examinations must be taken by July 10.
- (c) All persons taking Conference Course of Study shall pay \$1.00 registration fee.
- 12. The Budget Committee shall assign new churches 25% the first year, 50% the second year, and full budget the third year.
- 13. (a) The fiscal year for churches shall be from July 1 to July 1. All financial reports shall conform to this schedule.
 - (b) The Conference Treasurer's books shall close July 8.
- 14. (a) The Ohio Conference shall be authorized to charge 4% on loans to churches from the Superannuated Elder's Fund.
- (b) All notes to churches shall be drawn up on the form given in the Minutes of 1940.
- (c) Loans from the Superannuated Fund may be made by the conference pension board to ministers of the conference to assist them in paying arrears in income assessments at the time of joining the Wesleyan Pension Plan. Such loans shall be secured by notes, the duration of which shall not exceed 2 years. They shall be repaid in equal monthly payments and shall carry 2% interest computed semi-annually.

Section III. Churches and Pastors

- 15. In addition to the duties as outlined in the Discipline, it shall be the responsibility of our pastors to:
 - (a) Attend all sessions of Camp Meeting.
- (b) See to it that all funds and receipts from his charge be sent to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.

- (c) Co-operate with the stewards in notifying non-attending members of their financial responsibilities.
- (d) Instruct all local preachers on their charge of disciplinary requirements to study and travel under Conference direction.
- (e) Be sure all Conference Preachers on their charge have necessary licenses and recommendations.
- (f) Return Sunday School Reports monthly to the Sunday School Secretary.
- (g) We also recommend that each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving.
 - 16. It shall be the responsibility of our churches to:
 - (a) Pay the moving expense of the in-coming pastor:
- (b) Pay pastor's salary for fifty-two weeks per year, beginning with the rise of Conference.
- (c) Pay traveling expenses, room and board for pastors and delegates at Conference.
- 17. No church shall begin or continue in any major building or remodeling program until it has conferred with the Conference Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location. The Building Committee of said church shall sign a written agreement, to be acted upon by this Conference Committee. They shall also report monthly in writing to this Conference Committee; The matter of such reports and agreement shall be agreed upon mutually by these two committees concerned.

Section IV. Standards of Practice

- 18. We recommend the use of associate or probationary membership for all persons received on confession of faith.
- 19. We understand paragraph 51 in the Discipline to require that no one be received into membership of our local churches unless they have left off wearing of gold including the wedding ring. Be it further resolved that paragraph 52 regarding modest apparel be strictly adhered to.
- 20. We require that all workers, preachers and singers on the platform at Conference and Camp Meeting, wear sleeves at least to the elbow, and all their apparel be in accord with the discipline.

To the Members of the Ohio Conference, Greetings:

As we gather here at Victory Campground for the forty-second annual session it is with a sense of gratitude and thanksgiving to God and a kindred spirit of appreciation to the membership of the Conference, including both the laity and the ministry, for the sympathetic and loyal support given me as I have endeavored to carry out your instruction during the past year.

God has not been unmindful of our constant need of wisdom and sustaining grace in the doing of His will and work. There have been problems, but in the midst of them I have been glad I could see and find help at the hands of One who knew far more about problems, things, churches and people than I did. His favor and blessing has been manifest in many of the churches throughout the Conference, although at times progress has appeared slow and the gains meager and costly.

We are deeply grateful for the definite gains and the splendid improvements in buildings and the new churches erected at some points. These are worthwhile additions and more could be legitimately desired at other points. In the midst of all our activities in doing the work of the church it would be well for us to ever remember that God can say of us as He did of each of the Asia Minor churches, "I know thy works." We should be deeply concerned lest He should likewise say of us in this Laodicean age, "thou art neither cold nor hot." We face this danger.

In seeking to fulfill the duties assigned me, I have sincerely endeavored in the fear of God, to care for the local, Conference, and general interests of the church and especially to help souls unto God. I have visited all the organized churches and most of the new pioneer works, preaching 163 times, conducted 27 business meetings, 3 dedication services, and 2 organization meetings. From the Conference Treasurer I have received \$2200.00 in salary, \$471.65 for travel expense, \$36.26 for telephone tolls, \$9.43 for desk expense and \$40.32 on moving expense. Cash offerings totaled \$77.00 and \$58.65 for other special services and funerals. Gifts: \$92.50.

Report of Vice-President

Report of the Executive Secretary of the Conference Missions Board

In accord with the action of the Annual Conference of 1948 I have served as Executive Secretary of the Conference Missions Board on a part time basis throughout the year. Following the instructions of the Conference I organized the field into five Districts with those five men elected by the Conference as District Supervisors. Also we asked each pastor to appoint a Local Pioneer Secretary in his church to have charge of collecting funds, to make monthly reports, and to keep the cause before the people. We have had in most cases excellent co-operation from both the District Supervisors and the Local Pioneer Secretaries, and I wish in this report to express our appreciation of their labors.

While we did not reach the goal of "Every dollar pledged paid by July 15th" we have had excellent returns. The pledges and offerings from the Calendar appeal totaled \$10,601.53 of which \$9,457.92 has been received by the Conference Treasurer. This is approximately

only a 10% loss. There were several churches however which paid their pleddges in full or overpaid, and an Honor Roll containing the names of these churches and their secretaries will appear with this report in Conference Session.

Two new organizations have been effected during the year. Miami Shores of Dayton and Weirton Heights, West Virginia.

Five new Pioneer points were officially opened. Lockbourn Road Columbus, Delaware, Mt. Vernon, Springfield, and Strouds Run.

Full time workers, Bro. Lee Shultz and family were placed on the Wooster work in November. In spite of the seeming tragedy of the destruction of the trailor and contents by fire, a total loss both to the Schultzes and to the Conference, the work at Wooster has manifested that God still is able to turn our disappointments into blessings, and that He moves in mysterious ways His wonders to perform. God's blessing is on the people, and in the near future we expect to see an organization effected.

A full time worker, Brother Robert Vermylia, was placed on the South Zanesville work about the middle of the year. Progress has been slow, and the Board is recommending that the South Zanesville point be placed on the North Terrace charge.

Cumberland has had a year of holding its own. Some increase in interest has been noted. It will remain on the Senecaville charge for the coming year.

Mt. Vernon was opened in the fall of '48 under the direction of Brother and Sister Harry McQuigg. They have done an excellent job, A good spirit prevails and becoming an organized church in the near future with a full time pastor.

Miami Shores is still under the direction of the Board. It was organized as a church in May. Some difficulties have been in the way of building, but the Lord is working out His purpose.

The new point at Springfield is under the direction of Brother Daniel Woodward. Many adversaries stood in the way, but prayer meetings which were exceptionally well attended were begun in homes and after several disappointments a church building has been rented on Pleasant Street. The first Sunday services were held last Sunday with — present for Sunday School and — for preaching.

Strouds Run, a new work, opened by Brother Curtis Knight and Brother E. C. Kenny has made good progress during the year. A fine spirit prevails among the people. A recent Revival meeting with Rev. Edmund Life of Parkersburg, W. Va. as evangelist brought many of the community both young and old into the kingdom of Christ. Brother Samuel Pettitt has served as pastor during the year.

South West Sharon has also noted some progress, and under

the direction of Brother Taylor will probably be organized in the near future.

At Lockbourn Road, Columbus, an independent community church group worshipping in a newly built church contacted Brother Mc-Intyre to acquire his services as pastor. Those who have remained with the work desire a Wesleyan organization. Negotiations are now under way to purchase the building which is being offered to us at a small fraction of its value or cost, and plans are being made to put a full time man on the field. This is a rare opportunity, and needs our fullest support.

Weirton Heights, one of our Pioneer points of long standing was organized during the year and is making splendid progress. Brother Harold Schupbach is the pastor.

The Delaware work was opened due to the vision of Brother Walter Jeffries and his Men's Missionary Society of Sunbury Church. To them go the credit for remodeling the building and getting the work started. Brother Jeffries has continued to supply the point since its opening in January.

In early May due to financial difficulties the Church at New Bloomington was placed under the direction of the Conference Missions Board by the President and his Advisory Board, and since that time has received financial assistance from Conference Missions funds.

Other doors are opening to us. The opportunities are greater than our vision and our resources. Hooverson Heights, W. Va., Glendale, W. Va., Toledo, Cleveland, Prospect, Mansfield, plus scores of smaller cities and villages and country communities in our territory need the Wesleyan Message of Salvation from all sin. LET US GO FORWARD LED BY HIS SPIRIT.

REPORT NO 1

President's Message

Dear W.M.S. Presidents and Delegates to the forty-second annual session of the Ohio Conference Woman's Missionary Society:

Greetings once again in the Name of our precious Redeemer, who has delayed His coming a little longer in order that a few more souls might be saved, a few more churches organized, and others have the Gospel preached to them. Some of our members have been translated to their heavenly reward, but we have been left behind to carry on the work of the Kingdom. As the societies give their reports, let us remember that all our activities cannot be reported in numbers, dollars, and cents. Statistics do not include burdens borne, intercessory prayers, tears, and groans for souls; only God has that record, and He alone can give the reward.

My official acts during the year included the sending out of four circular letters and a card, by one of which we sponsored the Missionary Digest Campaign, and by three the raising of funds for the erection of a new dormitory on the campground. Last Fall I arranged a tour of the Conference for Rev. R. L. Gowan which did not materialize due to his going to Haiti with Rev. and Mrs. Birch. I then secured Rev. Geo. Huff for a series of group meetings. His messages were much appreciated by our people. The offerings amounted to \$739.59. At the request of the Y. P. S. Executive Board, I secured Rev. Marion Birch as missionary speaker for the Young People's Conference. He and his wife spent the following week-end in the Zanesville Churches and reported good services.

The first week in July we had the privilege of attending the East Central District Missionary Convention held at the Dayton First Wesleyan Methodist Church (S. Ohio Conf.). A report of this meeting will be given later. Following the Convention Rev. Gowan represented the Brainerd Indian Training School and Haiti at District Rallies throughout the Conference. The offerings amounted to \$250.

We are anticipating a blessed time with the Saunders family from Africa and Miss Mary Baker from Brainerd School during this session.

I have received \$10.30 from the treasurer for postage and supplies.

We are glad to welcome three new societies this year, namely, Zanesville, N. Terrace, Radcliffe Heights, and Miami Shores. This brings our number up to forty societies—twice as many as we had ten years ago. May we continue to grow under the blessing of the Lord.

Last, but not least, we wish to express our appreciation for the privilege of having this fine commodious Missionary Tabernacle in which to hold our meetings. We give praise to God and thanks to all those who labored and gave to make it a reality.

May the Lord bless you as you go forth to labor for Him, and "make you fruitful unto every good work".

Thursday evening we appointed a building committee to meet with the conference building committee regarding the new dormitory. This committee to be Mildred Stratton, Velma Walker, and Florence Kean.

Moved we order eight complimentary copies of the minutes.

It was moved we strike out resolution No. 12. In keeping with the action of conference we added resolution No. 14., which, "Two Statistical blanks shall be filled out; one to be sent to the Statistician by July 10, the other to be brought to conference. (1949.)

REPORT NO 3

Plan Of Work

- We recommend and urge that more time be given in each local meeting to prayer, with a Fast and Prayer day as often as possible.
- 2. We recommend continued cooperation with the new set-up for the Y.M.W.B. and W.Y.P.S. and that we stress the Child Evangelism program being promoted by the Child Evangelism Commission.
- 3. We recommend that each local Society be assessed \$1.00 to apply on the cost of laundering and care of Camp bedding.
- 4. We recommend careful study of and adherence to the items of the local Society Efficiency Standard.
- 5. We recommend that each Society send an offering of not less than \$.50 to the Conf. W. M. S. treasurer before Dec. 1st to be sent to the Mexican work as a Christmas offering, not to apply on budget.
- 6. We recommend systematic giving throughout the year in each local society for the Day Fund. We urge that the giving shall not be less than an average of \$3.00 per members. We suggest a plan of \$.25 per month for each member. (This does not apply on budget.)
- 7. We recommend and urge the raising of funds for the new dormitory to the equivalent of \$2.00 per member. (This does not apply on budget.)
- 8. We recommend that the Plan of Work be read in each Society at least once each Quarter.
- 9. We recommend the observance of May Day by all societies. Gifts for Foreign Missionaries shall be sent to the Missionary Home, 32 Bergen Ave., Jersey City 5, N. J. Gifts to Home Missionaries shall be sent to the respective individuals.
- 10. We recommend that Home Mission stations be contacted before sending used clothing so we may know what materials are needed.
- 11. We recommend that each district have at least two Conventions during the year.
 - 12. We recommend that the four-point program as outlined by

the General Conf. be emphasized, namely: 1. Prayer partnership, 2. Study program, 3. Subscription goal, 4 Enlarged membership.

- 13. We recommend that each society have a membership drive during the month of October in order to be a "hold fast" society as well as a fruitful one.
- 14. We recommend that each society furnish some large absorbent dish towels for use in the dining hall. These shall be sent to the Caretaker, Victory Camp, Galena, Ohio., some time during the year.
- 15. We recommend that the Conference Solicitor promote a subscription drive in January with a goal of not less than four new subscriptions to the Wesleyan Missionary for each society.
- 16. We recommend that each society make a special effort to get all monies in to the Treasurer before or by July 1st, in order to get proper credit.
- 17. We recommend the following goals for the Y.M.W.B. for the coming year: Membership—active, 600; honorary, 500; Efficiency Standard—fifteen 100% bands; Funds—\$2000.00.
- 18. We recommend that mimeographed copies of the Plan of Work be sent to each local society immediately after Camp.

(b) We recommend that each local society be aggressive in placing the WESLEYAN YOUTH in libraries, Children's Homes, and Hospitals. (c) We recommend that each local society member be a reader of the WESLEYAN YOUTH.
- 6. We recommend that all funds be dispersed through the Conference W.Y.P.S. Treasurer.
- 7. We recommend that each local society member pay the sum of fifty cents (\$.50) for general assessment and fifty cents (\$.50) for conference dues.
- 8. We recommend that the W.Y.P.S. Conference President be paid the sum of \$50.00 in appreciation of his labors and traveling expenses at the rate of five cents (\$.05) a mile.
- We recommend that the Secretary and Treasurer be paid all desk expenses.
- 10. We recommend that each Society pay traveling expenses, room, and board for delegates to Conference.
- 11. We recommend that the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer pay \$25.00 to the Marion College Area W.Y.P.S. Treasurer for Area Assessment.
- 12. We recommend that the Conference Young People's Society pay for its share of space in the Conference minutes, and for six

complimentary copies to be sent to the Area Presidents, the General Secretary, and the General President.

- 13. We recommend that each Society pay \$2.00 monthly for the support of a Pioneer Missionary Project to be designated by the Conference Missionary Board.
- 14. We recommend that each Society contribute \$5.00 toward the support of David Day, same not to apply on budget.
