STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Evangelists shall, in their reports, make a statement of the amount of salary received.
- 2. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of two Elders and one Conference Preacher, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be, to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all financial reports, save missionary, and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.
- 3. We advise our pastors and people to make special effort to get persons saved, sanctified and brought into church membership during quarterly meetings.

THE ALLEGHENY CONFERENCE

4. The order and manner of electing trustees shall be the same in local churches as it is and has been in our Annual Conference, namely, to include a series of years in keeping with the number of trustees.

5. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference, excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

- 6. When it becomes necessary for any church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense the pastor incurs in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall not be applied on the pastor's salary.
- 7. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the outgoing pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.
- 8. The Conference President will be expected to direct the attention of each Quarterly Conference attended to the various interests of the Church, including Sunday School work, and to stimulate interest in our Church Literature, especially the Wesleyan Methodist. In the general financial program of the Conference he will be expected to give such oversight and assistance as may be needed to develop every arm of the work.
- 9. At the opening of the Conference Session the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman, to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates' Credentials shall be mailed to the Conference Secretary not later than ten days before convening of Conference.
- 10. All persons recommended to Conference to study or travel shall be made members of Conference only when given employment.
- 11. Our pastors and churches shall engage no preachers for revival meetings or to supply their pulpits for a period of time, who are without Conference Credentials, until they have obtained consent of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.
- 12. Pastors shall recommend no persons to the Annual Conference until they have passed the perscribed course for Local Preachers, or persons who are taking active work from the Conference.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the Ninety-third Annual Session of the Allegheny Conference, Greetings in the name of Him who loved us and bought us with His own Blood.

When the sad event occurred on Friday afternoon, December 20, 1935, which took from us our beloved Conference President, Rev. A. L. White, responsibilities were thrust on our inexperienced shoulders, which demanded strength and wisdom beyond our natural capacity. Unexpectedly forced into a position, which necessitated a drastic change from the quiet pastoral life, which had hitherto been our lot, it became our duty to lay hold of the work which our brother had so nobly carried on, and to push forward the interests of the kingdom of God, as they were committed to the care of the Allegheny Conference. In accepting this tremendous obligation there was a consciousness of a great need, and it is a pleasure to report that, under God, we were able to cast our burden on the Lord and to go forth relying completely on Him.

In our travels over the Conference, we have found the imprints of the uncompromising character of our former President, in whose footsteps we are treading. We appreciate his rugged determination to maintain the standards of the Bible wherever he went. It has been our effort to pursue the same precious course.

There has been a spirit of revival over the Conference, which is quite' pronounced. The Saints of God feel that the coming of the Lord draweth nigh and are being alert in their desire to see souls saved. In giving our report of official conduct, we shall submit first, a report of the work done by Brother White, and second, that for which we are responsible.

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following recommendations:

- 1. Approval of Item 5 of Part One, and Item 5 of Part Two of President's Report.
- 2. Adoption of the report of Emma Armstrong, Treasurer of White Memorial Fund.
 - 3. Adoption of report of Virgil E. Sell, Treasurer of Bethshan Home.
- 4. That money loaned from the McLeister Memorial Fund, when repaid, with interest, be retained a separate fund known as the McLeister Memorial Fund. This fund to be used as loans only and not as gifts.
- 5. Payment from Conference Treasury of \$1.55 for rental of Adding Machine.
- 6. The adoption of the following plan for raising the Conference Budget for the ensuing year.
- A. The Conference Budget be raised undivided and assigned budget be apportioned on a 10 per cent basis, using the total of pastor's cash salary, parsonage rent and incidental expenses of the church in determining assigned budget. Budget to be remitted to Conference Treasurer monthly, from the Church Incidental Fund by the church treasurer or pastor. To be reported under Conference Work on Statistical blanks. Distribution of Budget: Conference Expenses, 55 percent; Conference Missions, 20 percent; Superannuated Ministers, 20 per cent; miscellaneous, 5 per cent.
- B. Money raised by Self-Denial be credited to Conference Missions in addition to the 20 per cent from Budget, and reported under Conference Work on Statistical blank.
 - C. The Conference President shall receive his salary direct from the

Conference Treasurer, thus leaving the President free to raise offerings for the local church on Quarterly Meeting occasions.

- D. When any church treasurer shall fail to remit the Budget for one or more consecutive months, the Conference Treasurer shall call such delinquency to the attention of the pastor. This is to insure prompt monthly payment of the Budget.
- E. The first Sunday of the month offering from the Sunday School shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer to be applied on Conference Missions (not Home Missions) as originally intended by General Conference, and reported on Statistical blanks under Conference Work. This money to be used only in Conference pioneer work, paying off debts and mortgages, Church extension and helping pastors whose salary is inadequate.
- 7. Approval of the report of Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes, and that 500 copies be printed for the year 1936.
- 8. Approval of the Conference Treasurer's Report. We find this report and accounts correct. We also recommend he be authorized to draw from the treasury the sum of \$50.00 in appreciation of his labors.
- 9. The payment to Superannuates of from \$60.00 to \$100.00 as funds may allow. Payment of \$40.00 to Florence E. Salisbury.
- 10. That Akron, Grace Wesleyan Church receive help from the Conference Treasury on church debt, when funds are available, subject to the approval of the Missionary Board.
- 11. We recognize and urge the hearty support of the following Connectional Interests: Foreign Missions, \$2.00 per member. Home Missions, \$.50 per member, this sum to be raised by W. H. and F. M. Society and other sources exclusive of the Missionary offering of the Sunday School. Education, \$1.50 per member. Hephzibah Orphanage \$.25 per member. We also recommend the continuation of the sending Birthday Offerings from the Sunday School to Bethshan Home. Let this item be consistently stressed by the Superintendents as it is a very definite aid in the upkeep of Bethshan Home.
- 12. That Conference assist the Sagamore Church in purchasing of seats when necessary, subject to approval of the Missionary Board.
- 13. That the Conference President receive a salary of \$35.00 per week and \$400.00 traveling expenses, he to provide from this sum liability insurance for his car.
- 14. The approval of the report of Committee to receive Conference Entertainment Fund.

Adjourned to meet at 6 p.m. Dismissed with prayer by Mrs. Swine-hart.

Motion carried to increase the amount paid for space in the minutes to \$25.00.

Committee on Courtesy presented Mrs. Susan McCarty, Editor of the Wesleyan Missionary, and Rev. E. F. McCarty, Foreign Missionary Secretary, and Rev. I. F. McLeister, Editor of the Wesleyan Methodist. Each spoke briefly, but encouragingly.

Motion carried that the Order of Day be election of officers at the first meeting on Friday.

Dismissed with prayer by Mrs. May Moore.

Third Meeting, Friday: Called to order at 1:30 p. m. by President. Sister Beulah Landrey led in prayer, followed by Sister Dessie Stahl.

Minutes read and approved.

Roll Call: 11 Conference Society Members, 19 Presidents, 31 Delegates.

Dr. J. S. Luckey, President of Houghton College, was introduced and spoke of increased attendance and spirituality of our school during the past year. Stated that fully 80 per cent of the student body were Christians.

Report of Auditing Committee accepted, and Treasurer's report adopted.

Order of Day for election of officers having arrived, the following tellers were appointed: Mary Churchill, Alma Rowland, Helen Newcomer, Eunice Comadoll. Election resulted as follows: President, Mrs. Emma Armstrong; Vice-President, Mrs. Pearl S. Fero; Secretary, Mrs. Verna E. Vogan; Assistant Secretary, Mrs. Pauline White; Y. M. W. B. Superintendent, Mrs. Beulah Landrey; Wesleyan Missionary Solicitor, Mrs. Vesta Zike; Organizer, Mrs. Emma Armstrong.

Motion carried to have a Standing Committee on Statistics. Mrs. Iva B. Van Wormer was elected Chairman.

Entertainment Fund Committee reported amount received, \$47.35, twenty-five Societies contributing.

Motion carried that Delegates turn the Statistical blanks over to the Committee immediately upon arrival at Conference.

Miss Sarah Gundy, Assistant Matron of Bethshan Home, gave a heartfelt talk on problems of the Home, information concerning estimates placed on provisions donated. Canned vegetables, 10 cents per quart; pickles and fruit, 15 cents per quart; jelly, common glasses, 10 cents, pints, 15 cents and quarts, 20 cents. Also some needs: children's shirts, size 2, sheets, 63 x 90, maternity dresses, second hand clothing, soap, towels, etc.

Sister Gleason, former Society President, followed Sister Gundy in the talk about Bethshan Home and spoke of the neat appearance, describing room by room, and naming Society responsible for refurnishing of each.

Sister Landrey read a portion of a letter from Dorothy Johnson mentioning some seeds adaptable to African climate. Cucumber, radish, lettuce, turnip, cabbage, tomato, zenna, balsom, marigold.

Partial report of Committee on Plan of Work read and returned to the Committee.

Letter from Rev. Charles L. Blanchard, Superintendent of Zion's Hill Mission, read by the President.

President's report read and adopted. (See Report No. 1.) Adjourned by limitation. Benediction by Occida J. Gleason. Fourth Meeting: Saturday, called to order at 9:00 a. m. by President. Sister Ada Lehman led, while all lifted their hearts to God in thanksgiving and praise.

Minutes read and corrected.

Roll Call: 10 Conference Society Members, 12 Presidents, 30 Delegates.

Report of Committee on Resolutions read and adopted. (See Report No. 3.)

Report of Y. M. W. B. Superintendent read and adopted. (See Report No. 5.)

Report of Committee on Plan of Work read, corrected and adopted, item by item. (See Report No. 2.)

President read a letter from Sister Hazel Jones.

Miss Grace Staggs, Matron of Bethshan Home, was introduced to the Society. Misses Geneva Wilson and Florence Hazeltine, workers at Zion's Hill Mission were introduced and spoke of the work at Zion's Hill. A love offering was taken and divided between these loyal, self-sacrificing girls.

Minutes read and approved.

On motion adjourned to meet at Stoneboro Camp. Benediction, Mabel Sell.

Public Meeting: Friday, June 12, 7:30 p. m. This meeting was anticipated with interest as Brother McCarty had just recently returned from a tour of the Foreign Mission stations. Sister Armstrong presided. Sister Leona Robertson led in singing, "Jesus Saves," Mrs. Markell at the piano. Catherine Carr led in prayer.

Miss Helen Coy, age 9, sang, "I Am Satisfied," and "The Restaurant Song."

Miss Geneva Wilson, home for a short time from Zion's Hill Mission at Taulbee, Kentucky, expressed her joy for the fellowship of God's people, asked for continued prayer for the mission and told of answer to prayer during the past winter when funds were low and they needed fuel.

Miss Gracia Fero told how her heart was touched during Brother Blanchard's address at Conference last year for the mountain work, and seeking to learn God's plan for her, had decided to go as a teacher there this fall.

Sisters Leona Robertson, Ethelyn Lauby and Esther Lupton sang, "Cast Thy Bread Upon the Waters."

Sister McCarty gave an acrostic on the Wesleyan Missionary, which was interesting.

Rev. and Mrs. Russel Heiney sang, "I Have Left All."

Brother E. F. McCarty stated that during his tour he had traveled 24,000 miles by sea and 8,000 miles by land, and had been able to eat and retain every meal. He left home weighing 183 pounds and returned weighing 208 pounds. Was gone six months and worked hard every day, traveling by auto, motor car and on foot to the different stations. Decided development was noted on each field, due to the good roads constructed by the government, enabling the use of auto and motorcycle by the missionaries, thus covering a distance in one day that formerly required three days. The Birch twins, now fifteen years of age, are proving a real asset to the work. Dr. and Mrs. Sim I. McMillen are doing good work in Africa where they now have a comfortable home and three hospital buildings. More school buildings are needed as many have been turned away from lack of room. Native Christians show a real spirit of sacrifice and the Lord is rewarding with an increase of believers.

Sister Gleason opened her remarks on Home Missions by raising the question, "How Can We Best Help Foreign Missions?" She answered by saying, "By building up the Home Base and spreading Scriptural Holiness over the land." Of Mexican missions, she stated there were one-half million Mexicans along our borders. Two thousand two hundred African boys and girls in our country, some of whom are being reached through our school at Brent, Alabama. The Hephzibah Orphanage at Macon, Georgia now homes 52 children. She stated that southern Georgia was the most fertile field for preaching holiness of any she knew. Mentioned the work among the Indians on the Onondaga Reservation and said right at our door, there are towns in Ohio with a population of 800 that have not a church. Our Slogan, "The day is far spent, the night is at hand," should urge us to greater effort than ever before.

E. F. McCarty made the annual appeal for funds which was quickly responded to with \$1240.00 cash and pledges and an offering of \$48.30, making a total of \$1288.30.

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

- 1. That at the first meeting after Conference, each society hold an installation service.
- 2. That each Society endeavor to hold a Public Prayer Meeting monthly.
- 3. That prayer be the keynote of every meeting, praying especially for the "Subject of the Program."
- 4. That each Society keep in touch with our Mission Fields by correspondence.
 - 5. That we continue our support of Dr. Sim I. McMillen.
- 6. That we have an aggressive Solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary in each society.
- 7. That we urge the use of the Study Book and the excellent programs appearing in the Wesleyan Missionary.

- 8. (a) That each Society put forth special effort to send their President and a Delegate to Annual Conference, and to assume the expense of their transportation.
- (b) That ten cents per member be raised for Annual Conference Delegate entertainment, and sent to Conference with the Delegate.
- (c) That each Society instruct their Delegate how much to pledge at the Public Missionary Meeting.
- (d) That each Delegate take back to her Society a report of the business transacted.
- 9. That each Society raise the General Conference Budget of not less than six dollars for Mountain Missions, and five dollars for Hephzibah Orphanage. Let all dues and Budget obligations be sent to the Conference Society Treasurer, Mrs. Rachel L. Dreyer, Tionesta, Pennsylvania.
- 10. If one dollar dues seems too heavy a tax, we accept fifty cents, in which case the entire amount be sent to the Treasurer, designated as fifty cent dues.
- 11. That we manifest our interest in Bethshan Home by prayer, cash offerings, clothing, donations of fruit and vegetables and household supplies.
- 12. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed; That the Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions.
- 13. That we send clothing and supplies to our Mountain Missions and Hephzibah and continue the making of bandages and supplies for our Foreign Work, the latter to be sent to E. F. McCarty. (Note: Bandages should be cut two to four inches wide and rolled. These may be valued at fifty cents per pound, the amount to be credited on statistical report, but not to count on budget.)
- 14. That we endeavor to raise \$400.00 for Home Missions, at least \$200.00 of which will be used for Zion's Hill Mission.
- 15. That we endeavor during the year to raise one-fourth of our Church Educational Budget.
- 16. That a yearly meeting in the interest of Medical Missions be held, and the offering received be used for that purpose.
- 17. That Delegates be instructed to give their report to the Statistical Committee upon arrival at Conference.
- 18. We suggest: That where suitable the Society have a Mercy and Help Committee.
- 19. We suggest: That our District Holiness Conventions where possible observe a missionary service.

Report No. 3

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be It Resolved:

- 1. That we, the members of the Wesleyan Methodist Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, read our Discipline and renewedly pledge our allegiance to its doctrines.
- That our youth be watched over with a godly jealousy and that we instruct, by example and precept the dignity and necessity of social purity; insisting upon modesty of dress; assisting them in the choice of wholesome companionship and reading matter; also creating a home atmosphere which will both hold them and be conducive to their spiritual growth.
