Journal Of Daily Proceedings.

Tuesday, I P.M.

The Tennessee Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened for its twenty-second annual session on the Camp Ground at I P.M., Tuesday, July 24, 1951.

The Rev. D. P. Denton, President, called the Conference to order. The Rev. N. C. Hoggie, Vice-President, led in prayer. Roll was called with 13 Elders, 7 Conference Preachers and 19 Delegates responding. (See Roll). Pauline Glassner and Mrs. Connie McElroy, alternate Delegates, were seated.

It was voted that the first five seats and the space forward be made the Conference Bar.

The following were elected as a Nominating Committee: C. F. Smith, Chairman, Thomas Hampton, N. C. Hoggie, A. L. Lowrance, W. T. McMahan. The Committee was excused for work.

By special vote of the Conference, the Chairman introduced Rev. R. C. Mullinax,

President of Central College, who presented the educational interests.

The hours of sessions were fixed as follows: Convene at 8 A.M. and close at 10:30 A.M. for the Religious Service. Re-convene at 1:30 P.M. and adjourn at 4:30 P.M. Meals to be served at 7 a.m., 12 noon, and 5 p.m.

The time for Special Orders of the Day was set as follows: Election of Officers, Wednesday, 9 a.m.; Conference Sermon, Wednesday, 10:30 a.m.; General Address, Thursday, 10:30 a.m.; Memorial Service, Thursday, 2:30 p.m.; Ordination Service, Friday, 10:30 a.m.

Rev. C. F. Smith was called to the Chair, and the Conference President read his annual report (See Report I). Report was accepted with a rising vote of thanks. Adjourned by motion. Benediction by R. E. Rice.

Wednesday, 8 A.M.

Conference called to order by the President. Roll called. Mrs. Mabel Akers seated as Honorary Delegate for Fairview Mission. Minutes for previous session read. By vote the Character Committee was instructed to accept the Character Blank of Rev. George Akers without the signature of his delegate.

Committee on Courtesy presented Rev. O. G. Wilson, General Editor, who gave words of greetings.

Voted that Pastors read only designated items on their statistical reports. J. V. Smith read his report for the Freedom Hill Church.

Chair called for Orders of the Day. Rev. O. G. Wilson, General Representative, was called to the Chair and Officials and Standing Committees were elected. (See page of Conf. Officials.) President nominated the following Lay Members to serve on the Committee on Itinerary & Orders: Mrs. John Roberts, Mrs. Ann McCabe, Michael Houser. President nominated his Advisory Board as follows and they were elected: Ministerial- N. C. Hoggle; Layman- Mrs. T. L. Grow.

The time for Orders of the Day having arrived, the Committee on Religious Services took charge. The Conference Sermon was preached by Rev. N. C. Hoggle. God blessed as he spoke from the subject, "Paul's Exhortation To The Brethren", taken from I Cor. 15:58. Adjourned.

Wednesday, 1:30 P.M.

Conference called to order. Rev. James Harmoning led in prayer. Roll called. Voted to have only one reading of the Minutes daily.

Voted that the fiscal year for the Conference end on June 30th, the new year to begin on July 1. Voted to set the annual business meeting for the Camp Meeting Association for Thursday, 4:30 p.m.

Rev. O. G. Wilson took the chair and the Committee on Itinerary and Orders made a partial report. Report adopted. Voted that Thomas Hampton be elected to Elders Orders.

Following recess, General Orders resumed and following Pastors reported: N. C. Hoggie, James Harmoning, R. E. Rice, George Akers. Adjourned. Benediction, Rev. Charles Haire.

Thursday, 8 a.m.

Devotions by J. G. Harmoning. Roll called and the following Delegates seated: Mrs. Ocie Kesterson and Mrs. Opal Lawson of Clinton, and Mrs. Orbie Denton of Crossville. Minutes read. Pastoral Relations Committee gave its first reading. Rev. C. F. Smith read pastoral report.

Treasurer of the Superannuated Pension Fund read his report. Adopted. (See Report 3.) Statistical Committee read its report. Adopted with a rising vote of thanks for their splendid work. Auditing Committee gave its report, stating that the books of the Conference Treasurer and the Superannuated Pension Fund had been audited and found to be in perfect order. Report adopted.

Rev. O. G. Wilson called to Chair, and the President read the statistical report for the new Crossville Church.

Orders of the Day, under Chairman of Religious Services. Rev. O. G. Wilson brought the General Address, basing his remarks on the 54th chapter of Isaiah.

Business resumed to hear the reading of the report of H. A. Harvey, pastor of the New Church at Clinton. Adjourned.

Thursday, 1 p.m.

Called to order and roll called. Conference Treasurer read his report. Adopted. (See Report #4). Sunday School Board reported. Adopted. (See Report 5). Committee on Apportionments reported. Adopted. (See Report 6). Committee on Resolutions reported. Adopted with amendments. (See Resolutions). Francis Harwell Palmer read her report for Mt. View Mission. Recessed.

Memorial Service, 2:30 p.m.

The Memorial Service was conducted by Rev. J. A. Cassady. Service opened by singing "In The Sweet Bye and Bye". Rev. George Akers led in prayer. Rev. Ruth McClure paid due reverence and respect to the life and memory of Sister Duke of Chattanooga; Rev. C. F. Smith to that of Mrs. Mae Cobb and Mrs. Flora Ferguson; Rev. J. A. Cassady to that of Brother Rollin, Mrs. Nettie Ray, William Allen, Hershal Stinson, and Charles Beardsley; Rev. N. C. Hoggie to that of Mrs. Mary Plumley.

Business resumed with Rev. O. G. Wilson in the Chair. Committee on Courtesy presented Mr. and Mrs. Oren Bragg and Mr. Owens. Each gave their testimony. Committee on Prohibition read its report. Adopted. (See Report 7). General Orders resumed with following Pastors reporting: M. L. Arnold, J. T. Dairmond, W. G. Harwell; Conference Evangelists, Mrs. Ruth McClure, and Grace Winebarger, and Child Evangelist, Mildred Thomas.

The Conference W.Y.P.S. read a petition asking for permission to hold a Youth Camp on the Camp Grounds on August 20 - 24. This request was granted. Pastoral Relations Committee gave its second reading. The Conference President read the following recommendation, which was adopted: "Since we all do better when we have some definite goals toward which we are striving, we recommend that we ministers and members of the Tennessee Conference adopt as our goal for the coming year a straight 10% increase in all items, especially Sunday School enrollment and attendance, Church membership, and membership in all auxiliaries of the Church. We further recommend that the President be asked to promote these goals in all possible ways.

Voted that the Secretary send a letter to Mr. Patterson expressing our appreciation for the highway signs advertising our Camp Grounds. Adjourned.

Friday, 8 a.m.

Devotions by Rev. J. A. Cassady. Roll called. Miss Bonnie Rudder of Mascot was seated as

Delegate in place of Mrs. Connie McElroy. Minutes read. Committee on Thanks reported. Adopted. (See Report 8).

General Orders resumed with the following Ministers reporting: Luther Lawson, A. L. Lowrance (report read by Secretary), Carl Cox (oral report given by pastor). Voted that the Secretary send words of greeting and encouragement from the Conference to Elders and Conference Preachers unable to be present. Committee on Religious Services reported. Adopted. (See Report 9). Committee on Itineracy and Orders read its completed report. Adopted. (See Report 10). Voted that Mrs. Ruth McClure be elected to Elders Orders.

The W.Y.P.S. President read his annual report. Adopted. He then read the names of the Officers of the W.Y.P.S. for the coming year, which was approved by the Conference Body.

The W.M.S. President read her report. Adopted, with statistical report to be furnished the Secretary at a later date. (See W.Y.P.S. and W.M.S. Minutes).

Voted that the next Annual Session of the Tennessee Conference be held on the second Tuesday in July, 1952. Voted to authorize the President and His Advisory Board to take care of any unfinished business of the Conference. Voted that the President work with the Secretary in editing the Minutes.

Voted that a special love offering be taken for our Conference President, in addition to the regular camp meeting offering, at the evening service. Recessed until call of chair.

Orders of the Day arrived and the Ordination Service was held under the direction of the Committee on Religious Services. Service opened by singing, "Saved To The Uttermost". Prayer by Rev. R. E. Rice. The Ordination Sermon was preached by Rev. O. G. Wilson, basing his message on portions of scripture taken from the first, second and third chapters of II Corinthians. Following the sermon the Conference Ordained to the office of Elder in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, Rev. Ruth McClure and Rev. Thomas Hampton. D. P. Denton presented the class to the Conference and the following Elders assisted in the consecration service: C. F. Smith, J. A. Cassady, M. L. Arnold, N. C. Hoggle. The service closed by singing, "Must Jesus Bear The Cross Alone".

Friday, 1 p.m.

Called to order. Prayer by Charles Haire. Voted that the proposed amendment as passed by General Conference to paragraph 12, of our Discipline, Article 5 in Articles of Religion, be accepted. 27 votes cast, all in the affirmative. Voted to express to Dr. Stephen W. Paine, our appreciation for his stand on this change. Rev. O. G. Wilson was asked to convey our appreciation to Dr. Paine.

Voted that if a Pastor finds he is unable to attend the Ministerial Convention or Annual Conference that he write a letter stating the reason why. Pastor's Report for Hinton Street Mission was read by M. L. Arnold (Pastor absent). Earl Solbers absent. (Oral report given by his Pastor.) E. B. Carnes, in school at Central. (Oral report given by his Pastor.) E. L. Robinson, absent. (Oral report given by his Pastor.) J. A. Cassady read his report.

Pastoral Relations Committee gave its final reading. Adopted with the addition of the name of Francis Harwell Palmer to the list of Conference Evangelists. (See Report II.)

Minutes read and approved. Upon motion, Conference adjourned sine die.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE TENNESSEE CONFERENCE

50

We, the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report: Be it resolved, that these articles shall become the standing rules and law of this Conference:

1. Before a local building committee proceeds with a building plan or program that they be required to have all plans approved by the President and his Advisory Board and the Missionary Board; and further that no financial obligations be assumed without the consent of the Conference Trustees.

2. That the Board of Conference Trustees be, and they are hereby, empowered to sign all papers necessary for the sale, or transfer of Conference, Church or Parsonage property, providing the said sale or transfer is authorized by the President and his Advisory Board and shall not violate the spirit of paragraphs 886, 887 of our book of Discipline.

3. The Board of Conference Trustees are hereby authorized to execute papers to secure funds for the liquidation of Conference, Church or Parsonage indebtedness, providing that the Churches set forth in writing the amount and the purpose for which the loan is to be used; and that no funds so secured shall be used for any other purpose than that set forth in the notice to the trustees of the Conference.

4. When a deed for Conference, Church or Parsonage property is received and before it is recorded it shall be referred to the President and his Advisory Board who are hereby designated as a Deed Examining Committee whose duty shall be to examine the deed and see that there are such disciplinary clauses included as may be necessary to make the property secure to our Church. Said Committee shall have power to engage such legal advice as may be needed to insure the proper steps regarding the reception or transfer of the property. See paragraphs 888, 889 of present book of Discipline.

5. The President's salary be raised to \$1650 per year, plus traveling expenses for quarterly meetings. Each Pastor is urged and expected to receive a love offering at the first and fourth quarterly Conference for the President. Each Pastor is also urged to take at least one fifth Sunday offering for the Conference Fund. The Conference Treasurer is hereby authorized to remit the President's salary semi-monthly. We further recommend that if the budget does not take care of the increase in the President's salary, the deficit be taken out of the Pioneer Fund.

6. We shall proclaim with voice and pen and holy living the gospel of full salvation, recognising our dependence upon, and need of the indwelling power and presence of the Holy Spirit.

7. Because of the alarming increase in worldliness, immorality, drunkenness and Sabbath desecration, as well as the tendency to shallow living among the people professing holiness, we pledge ourselves to an uncompromising stand against such evils and implore God's presence by the maintenance of the family altar in our homes.

8. We urge all Conference Preachers and Elders to become members of the Women's Missionary Society, and that the pastors attend each meeting and encourage the women, this being one of the

strong arms of the Church.

9. Each Church shall make a special effort in behalf of, and loyally support the Church Extension Card Plan.

10. Each pastor, or charge, shall have in the hands of the Statistical Secretary not less than five days before the Annual Conference one copy of his statistical report in full. This report shall be accompanied by a statement from the Conference Treasurer giving the amounts paid on budget under Item VIII in the pastor's statistical report, and the pastor's report must check with that of the Conference Treasurer.

11. The Conference Treasurer's books shall close on June 30 of each year and no credit shall be given on the Budget for that fiscal year for money received after this date.

12. The President's, Secretary's and Treasurer's correspondence expenses shall be paid from the Conference Fund by the Conference Treasurer.

13. Minutes of this Conference shall be published through arrangements made by the Missionary Board and delivered to the pastors in numbers equal to 80% of their Church membership.

14. Preachers and Delegates shall remain throughout the entire Conference session unless providentially hindered or excused by the Conference.

15. All Elders received from other denominations shall be required to pass examination on our Book of Discipline, and must have passed a course of study which is equivalent to our course for ordination, and harmonize with our theological views. They shall give special attention to the requirements found in paragraph 171 of our book of Discipline.

16. Copies of these resolutions together with the apportionments and the addresses of the President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be in the hands of each pastor within two weeks of the close of the Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary be authorized to carry out this resolution.

17. Pastors shall mail all Delegate's credentials to the Conference Secretary not less than five (5) days before convening of Conference.

18. The Conference Budget shall be raised and remitted monthly to the Conference Treasurer.

19. All monies which are reported through the Conference Treasurer shall be sent to him either as cash or receipts and he shall give Conference Treasurer's receipt for each item, and no money shall be listed paid out by the Treasurer except by check, on order of the President, and he shall be required to present cancelled checks and vouchers for each bill paid.

20. In order to promote a progressive program of Pioneer Evangelism, we recommend (a) That the Churches of the Conference shall support this program by raising a sum of not less than 10 cents per month for each scholar in main school of Sunday School as reported on Statistical blank, and this money shall be remitted monthly with the regular Budget to the Conference Treasurer, who shall hold in trust all such money thus designated; and shall pay out of this fund only at the time and in the amounts ordered by the Missionary Board. (b) This money shall be wisely and carefully used for Pioneer work, and for those places and pastors where there is a definite prospect of establishing a prosperous Wesleyan Methodist Church, or any other purpose in the Home

Mission work of the Conference that the Missionary Board sees fit to use it. All monies to be raised by the Churches and Missions for expense, such as Pioneer work, Minutes, etc., shall be placed in the Minutes with the Apportionment Committee's report.

21. Those wishing to take examinations in the Course of Study for credit during any year, shall write for questions before May 31 of that year, and shall have the answers in the hands of the proper instructor before June 30 for credit for that year. The Committee on Itinerary and Orders shall not be expected to send out questions or accept papers after these dates.

22. In view of our disciplinary stand on the matter of jewelry and our interpretation of the Scriptures in regard to it, we do not think it consistent with our standards for a Wesleyan Methodist minister to use the ring ceremony in performing a wedding. Therefore, preachers of this Conference shall be asked to refrain from performing a ring ceremony.

23. It shall be a standing rule that the Secretary shall be remunerated the sum of \$50.00 for each session of Conference. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be given \$25.00 per year for services.

24. We recommend that when the Conference President labors as an evangelist in any of our churches he be paid as other evangelists are paid.

25. Each unorganized work which is being run under the direction of the Conference and served by a member of this body, shall be allowed to elect an honorary delegate who shall be permitted to sit with the Conference and speak on matters of business, but not allowed to vote.

26. The Conference President shall be required to hold Quarterly Business Meetings at all unorganized works that are under the Conference Missionary Board or within the Conference, and the pastors of these works shall receive an offering quarterly to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and used toward the President's salary. Treasurer's of these unorganized works shall be members of some Wesleyan Methodist Church unless otherwise approved by the Conference Missionary Board.

27. The Committee on Nominations is not elected as heretofore, in view of the fact that this Committee is elected immediately upon the opening session of next Conference.

Beloved In Christ:

Much could be reported here regarding the work of the past year, but we shall mention only those things which seem of importance. Suffice it to say that this has been a good year, in spite of the many difficulties, and we feel that the Pastor's reports will show good work having been done all along the line. We are enjoying present victory in our soul and have a deeper love and appreciation for our Brothers and Sisters of the Conference than we have ever had. The last Conference session left some pastorates unfilled. These were soon settled with good Pastors, but several changes were necessary during the year.

In November, James U. Bender resigned as Pastor at Corinth, and Juanita Tollefson resigned from Liberty. These remained without a Pastor until January, when Brother James C. Harmoning resigned from Mascot and was assigned to Corinth and Liberty. In January, Luther Lawson united with the Mascot Church coming to us from another denomination, and he was appointed pastor there at the request of the Church and with the consent of the President's Advisory Board.

In March, Sister Francis Palmer resigned as pastor at Rockdale, and Bro. J. V. Smith was assigned to that work along with his pastorate at Freedom Hill. In May, Brother W. B. Carnes resigned from the pastorate at Mt. View in order to attend school at Central College, and Sister Palmer was assigned to this work for the remainder of the year.

I have assisted as much as possible on the new building projects and have labored on several of them, as well as on the Camp Ground. I have given much time on the buildings at Fairview, Rockdale and Clinton, and did practically all the work on the building at Crossville. All these buildings but Clinton are now in use. I have printed four issues of the Conference Bulletin, helped plan and promote the annual Ministerial Convention, participated in the Area Convention at Central College, attended the Conference President's Roundtable in Charlotte, N. C., attended the Homecoming at Hepzibah Orphanage, served as your Delegate to the General Conference, have attended all meetings as your member on the Local Board of Managers of Central College, assisted in several District Meetings, and worked with Brother Haire in one round of Young People's Rallies throughout the Conference. I have held nine meetings of one week or more and have seen a good number saved and sanctified. I have pastored the Church at Crossville since its opening in April.

Due to sickness we have been unable to fill all Quarterly Conference engagements. We wish to acknowledge the splendid cooperation and help given us this year by Bro. N. C. Hoggle, our Conference Vice-President. He has held several Quarterly Conferences and assisted in many ways. I feel we should recognize the splendid work of Bro. Charles Haire, Conference W.Y.P.S. President. He has spent much time in this work. Several Brethren have responded to calls for workings on the Camp, but most of the work this year has been done by Brothers Arnold, Hampton, Hoggle, McMahon, and W. G. Harwell, along with some laymen. We also wish to thank our Missionary Board and our Advisory Board for their good help. While cooperation in many ways has not been as good as in previous years, nevertheless this has been a year of wonderful fellowship among the Brethren of the Conference. As far as I have been able to determine there has been the best harmony that I have ever seen. For this we humbly praise God.

In October we effected an interim organization at South Clinton. This group was completely organized on February 25, and they are seeking admission into the Conference. On July 8, an interim organization was effected at Crossville, and this group seeks admission into the Conference. On March 18 a new Mission was opened at Oak Ridge and this gives promise of being a strong work.

During the year I have preached 276 times, been in 266 other services, made 483 visits with prayer, labored 155 days (average 8 hours) on Churches and Camp, and have travelled 28,260 miles. As we close this our fifth year in this position, we do it with the feeling that we have come far short of what we should have done, although we have tried to be faithful. In these five years we have never been outside the Conference except for Conference Business, and the few meetings that we have held for other Churches within the bounds of our Conference have never gotten us out of contact with our own work and never more than an hour or two from some of our Churches. We are happy to report that according to our Home Missionary Secretary's figures, this Conference stood fourth from the top in percentage gain of membership and Churches among all our

Conferences. May God grant that at the end of this next four years, we shall be at the head of the list.

Minutes of the Women's Missionary Society.

Monday, July 23, 1951 - 1 P.M.

The annual session of the Tennessee Conference W.M.S. was held at the Conference Campground on July 23-24, 1951. Opening service was a public devotional under the tent. Rev. Thomas Hampton brought the message basing his remarks on Acts 1:8.

The Ladies moved to the Church building for their business meeting. There were 30 ladies present. Meeting was called to order by the President with the seating of the Presidents and Delegates from the local Societies. Two new Societies had recently been organized, at Clinton and Oak Ridge. Our President discussed the literature on display and the local Society Posters which were very commendable. Reports were read from those Societies whose Delegates were present. The Conference Secretary-Treasurer's report was read and adopted. This report showed a balance on hand of \$80.34 to be used in the Conference at the discretion of the Executive Committee. Report was made on the Conference W.M.S. project for the year, which was the purchasing of two electric stoves and a water heater at a cost of \$174.45. All this was reported "paid in full". The labor for the installation of all this equipment was donated by Rev. W. G. Harwell.

The President reported some of the things done at General Conference. Two additional Budget items have been added to be paid to the General Fund. (1)- 25c per member (Twenty five cents) for the General Fund so that Mrs. Ruby Reisdorph, our General President, may have a salary. (2)- General W.M.S. voted to send Mrs. Reisdorph on a world tour of our missions, and added 20c per member for the purpose of raising the necessary expense of such a tour. She reported that the Budget for Home Missions is so inadequate for the Home Missions needs that it was recommended that each member give an offering of \$1.00 on each Birthday to go as a special above budget offering for Home Missions to be sent to the Treasurer, designated as such.

The President introduced the thought of another project for the W.M.S. for the ensuing year, suggesting the building of a Worker's Cottage for our Campground. Adjourned until morning.

Tuesday, July 24, - 8:30 A.M.

Devotions by Mrs. Pearl Grow of Bristol. Prayer by Mrs. J. C. Harmoning of Corinth. Meeting called to order by the President. Reports read and approved from the remaining Societies. Four new ladies were introduced to the group - Mrs. Cox, Mrs. Lawson, and Mrs. Kesterson from Clinton, and Mrs. Harmoning from Corinth. The Vice-President took the chair and the President's report was read and approved. Mrs. Hoggle expressed the belief that the Knoxville, First Church Society could raise the necessary funds for the material for a Worker's Cottage. The need for another Women's Dormitory was discussed. The group voted to take this as our project for the ensuing year, and pledges were taken amounting to \$350.00.

The election of Officers for the coming year resulted as follows: (See Roll of Officers.) Those elected to serve as District Chairmen were: Eastern- Mrs. R. E. Rice; Knoxville- Mrs. N. C. Hoggle; Central- Mrs. C. F. Smith; Western- Mrs. J. C. Harmoning.

The Conference Y.M.W.B. report was read and approved. This report showed a great increase making it possible for our Y.M.W.B. to be on the Honor Roll, and were presented a Pennant to
