JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Champlain Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America, convened for its eightieth session at Lisbon, N. Y., April 19, 1921, at 7:30 P. M.

Rev. A. J. Allen, the President, called the Conference to order, and made a few remarks. Song, All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name, was sung. Prayer was offered by O. G. Wyman and C. E. Hill. The Scripture lesson was read from the fifty-first Psalm. Song, He Took My Place, was sung by Florence Baxter.

Rev. E. D. Carpenter brought the message of the evening from texts found in St. Luke 12:48 and Romans 14:7. God is able to always help and care for his people, at all times and places, and we are held responsible for our opportunities and privileges, that our lives should be so lived as to bring others to Christ. The Spirit of the Lord was present through the service. Song, The Victory May Depend on You, was sung.

Benediction by Rev. T. P. Baker.

Second Day-Wednesday Morning Meeting.

Rev. G. D. Jock had charge of the devotional services. Songs were heartily sung and a number of prayers were offered, and the Lord's presence was felt at this time. The Scripture lesson was read from part of the 121st and 124th Psalms.

The roll was called to which 11 elders responded.

A partial report of the Committee on Credentials was approved with the understanding that the future names be added without the necessity of a vote. Twelve delegates were present.

The bar of the conference was fixed to include the first four rows of seats.

The Committee on Pastor's Credentials was elected as follows: Rev. G. D. Jock and R. J. Johnson.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations was elected as follows: A. J. Allen, E. D. Carpenter, C. E. Hill and E. L. Elliott; Laymen: Frank Mattoon, R. J. Johnson and Archie Crapo.

By vote, the time of opening and closing the sessions of the

conference was fixed as follows: Opening, 9. A. M., 1:30 P. M.; Closing, 11:30 A. M., and in the afternoon by vote.

In the absence of the Vice-President, E. D. Carpenter was called to the chair while the President made his annual report. The same was adopted as read. See Report No. 1.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced Rev. T. P. Baker, Missionary Secretary, also Connectional representative, who made some very welcome remarks. He also read a paper submitted by the Committee of the Conference which was assembled at Jersey City, April 16, 1921.

It was moved and supported that the Champlain Conference grant the Middle Atlantic Mission Conference the privilege of acting in Greater New York. See Memorial No. 1.

Rev. L. C. Mattoon, a pastor from the Lockport Conference, was introduced, who made some very welcome remarks.

Moved that all visiting members, who are in harmony with our principles, shall be welcome to honorary seats.

Moved to adjourn for committee work. Benediction by W. N. Osgood.

Wednesday Afternoon Meeting.

The Song and Praise service was in charge of Rev. W. N Osgood. Song, He Hideth My Soul, was sung. Scripture lesson was read from the 22nd chapter of St. Matthew. Prayer was offered by Brother Osgood. God's presence was manifest in this service.

The roll was called and 12 elders and 14 delegates responded to the call of their names. Minutes of the evening and morning session were read and the same was approved.

Doctor Ruby Paine, returned missionary from Africa, and Mrs. Edith Lee, Organizer of the Eastern District, was introduced to the Conference. The Committee also introduced Prof. J. S. Luckey, of Houghton, N. Y., and Rev. J. S. Willett, Connectional Agent. Both made some interesting and encouraging remarks concerning the great work in which they are a part.

The Committee on Resolutions made their report. The same was approved. See Resolution No. 1.

The names of E. D. Carpenter, A. J. Allen, J. J. Davidson, S. C. Fox, S. A. Green and G. D. Jock were called and characters passed.

The Committee on the Order of the Day reported and their report was adopted as follows:

Thursday, 9:30, election of Conference officers. 10:30, Connectional Representative, Rev. T. P. Baker.

Thursday, 2 P. M., meeting of the S. M. A. Society.

Friday, 10:00 A. M., Education, Professor J. S. Luckey.

Friday, 2 P. M., Sunday School Secretaries.

Friday, 7:30 P. M., Missionary Service in charge of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society.

Saturday, 10:00 A. M., Memorial Service in memory of Rev. C. E. Hill and Rev. A. F. Lent.

The names of A. E. Moses, T. A. Moses, V. D. Otis and K. F. Schaubhuth were called and their characters passed.

A letter of standing was asked for K. F. Schaubhuth and the same was granted.

The names of Rev. E. Trowbridge and Rev. J. F. Wright were called and their characters passed.

The Committee on Resolutions made a report and the same was

adopted. See Resolution No. 2.

The Order of the Day having arrived, the Conference joined in singing the song, Wonderful Words of Life. The Scripture lesson was St. John 1:17. Rev. J. S. Willett offered prayer and brought the message of the hour from the Word of God recorded in St. John 1:11-15.

The writer of these words tells us of the divinity of Jesus, the Lamb of God, that He fulfilled all the types and figures in His coming and death on the cross. That Jesus was in the beginning, and that He is authority for all that is needed in our lives. Song, Sweet By-and-By was sung.

Moved and carried to adopt the following resolution: Resolved, That we, as a Conference, send through our Conference Secretary a vote of appreciation to Governor Nathan L. Miller, of New York State, for his splendid influence exerted in behalf of honest Prohibition enforcement legislation until satisfactory laws were passed at the recent session of the New York State Legislature.

On motion Conference adjourned for committee work. Benedic-

tion by L. C. Mattoon.

Wednesday Evening Meeting.

The song service was led by A. J. Allen. A number of songs were sung. E. D. Carpenter and J. S. Willett offered prayer. This was a splendid service. The lesson for the evening was read from

the second chapter of Colossians. Song, Dig Deep, was sung by Mrs. Edith and Mrs. Lillian Stevenson. The Word was preached by Rev. T. P. Baker, from the sixth to tenth verses of the second chapter of Colossians. This text teaches if we have the anxiety that wins souls we must have the baptism of the Holy Spirit. God's grace is sufficient for every emergency. Song, Fill Me Now, was sung heartily. Benediction by A. J. Allen.

Thursday Morning Meeting.

Devotional service in charge of C. A. Heath. Song, I Must Tell Jesus, was sung. A number of prayers were offered praying that God's blessing might be upon the day's session.

Scripture lesson was read from the 24th Psalm. This was a very helpful cervice. The roll was called and 13 elders, 1 licentiate and 20 delegates responded.

The minutes of the afternoon and evening session were read and approved.

Letters of greeting to the Conference were read from Rev. E. Trowbridge, Rev. A. H. McKnight, Rev. W. F. Lewis and from the boys and girls of the Champlain Conference who are in the school at Houghton, N. Y.

Moved and carried that the Conference Secretary send to all the superannuated ministers a letter of greeting, in behalf of the Champlain Conference; also a letter of greeting to the boys and girls at Houghton.

The Committee on Resolutions made a partial report, and the same was adopted. See Resolution No. 3.

The name of W. F. Lewis was called and his character passed.
The Order of the Day having arrived, this being the election of
Conference officers, E. L. Elliott and L. M. Hayes were appointed
tellers and C. A. Heath and Frank Mattoon to prepare ballots.

The following were elected: President, Rev. A. J. Allen; Vice-President, Rev. E. D. Carpenter; Secretary, O. G. Wyman; Treasurer, E. L. Elliott. Rev. Charles E. Hill was elected Conference Trustee to succeed himself.

Conference Sunday School Secretary, W. F. Lewis; Helpers, L. M. Hayes for the Northern District and C. S. Hill for the Southern District.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders: H. S. Hill to fill the vacany of F. H. Wright; E. L. Elliott was elected to succeed himself.

Committee on Presidency: Elders, G. D. Jock, D. W. Summers and O. G. Wyman; Laymen, R. J. Johnson and Frank Mattoon.

Judiciary Committee: C. E. Hill, E. D. Carpenter, E. L. Elliott and C. A. Heath.

Tithing Secretary, G. D. Jock.

Missionary Board: President W. H. & F. M. Society, Rev. E. L. Elliott and Rev. G. M. Wyher.

Camp Meeting Committee: President of Conference, Pastors of West Chazy, Mooers, West Plattsburg charges; Laymen, Dr. Walter Stevenson, Stephen Wright and LeRoy Stafford.

Advisory Board: H. S. Hill and S. H. Miller.

An invitation was extended from the West Plattsburg charge to entertain the next Annual Conference. The same was unanimously accepted.

The time set for the next session of this Annual Conference to be the Tuesday before the last Sunday of April, 1922.

Rev. C. E. Hill was appointed to preach the opening sermon. D. W. Summers was appointed alternate. Remarks were made by our President. Blest Be the Tie that Binds was sung.

The Order of the Day having arrived Rev. T. P. Baker spoke in behalf of the great needs of our Connectional work. This was a burning message, and was followed by J. S. Willett, who clinched the gospel nails that had been driven. Moved and carried that the time be extended so Dr. Willett might finish his address.

Benediction by C. E. Hill.

Thursday Afternoon Meeting.

The Song and Praise service was led by C. E. Hill. The song, What a Friend we Have in Jesus was sung. The Scripture lesson was read from 1 John, the first chapter. Brother Hill offered a fervent prayer.

The Roll was called and 14 elders, 1 licentiate and 20 delegates responded to the call of their names.

Minutes of the morning session read and the same were adopted. The Order of the Day having arrived, the Conference gave way to the annual business meeting of the Superannuated Ministers' Association. See Report No. 2.

The names of E. L. Elliott and L. M. Hayes were called and their characters passed.

The hour having arrived for the presentation of God's Word, a special song was sung by Edith and Lillian Stevenson, Give Me Jesus. Rev. J. S. Willett brought the message from the Word of God. The lesson read was from 1 Thessalonians, first chapter. Text used was 1 Thess. 5:23. He spoke of baptism, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, divine healing, and the second coming of Christ, as important truths, but that the doctrine of entire sanctification is the all important doctrine. "For this is the will of God, even your sanctification."

At the close the congregation sang. Benediction by G. D. Jock.

Thursday Evening Meeting.

Songs, Blessed Assurance, Marching to Zion, and When Love Shines In, were heartily sung. A. J. Allen offered a prayer of thanksgiving and praise to God for his great goodness to all men.

A special song was sung by Edith and Lillian Stevenson and Pearl Hill.

Rev. T. P. Baker was the speaker of the evening. Text used was Psalm 107:4-7, saying that in the beginning God made things right, that God is a Being, and He loves fellowship, that He brought into existence the race af man. God is a Spirit, and man must worship him in spirit and in truth. God's presence was manifest. Song, There is Power in the Blood. Benediction by E. D.. Carpenter.

Friday Morning Meeting.

Rev. G. N. Wyher led the song and praise service. A number of songs were sung and prayers offered. God's refreshing dews were on the hearts of His people.

The roll was called and 13 elders, 1 licentiate and 17 delegates

answered to the call of their names.

The minutes of the afternoon and evening sessions were read and the same approved. The Committee on Conference Union, representing the Lockport, Rochester and Champlain Conferences, read their report and the same was adopted unanimously as read. See Report No. 4.

The Committee on Resolutions made their full report. The same was adopted with the understanding that the resolution of the appreciation of the Conference for their good entertainment

while here in Lisbon be read Sunday morning. See Resolution No. 3.

The names of F. H. Wright, H. S. Hill and O. G. Wyman were called and their characters passed.

The congregation arose and sung All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name.

The Order of the Day having arrived Professor J. S. Luckey, Mrs. Edith Lee, Dr. Ruby Paine and Dr. J. S. Willett all spoke in behalf of the Educational interests, that the work was very encouraging at Houghton and on the mission field in Africa.

Moved to adjourn. Benediction by C. L. Hill.

Friday Afternoon Meeting.

The devotional service was led by C. L. Hill. Song, He Is So Precious to Me, was sung. Scripture lesson was read from the 96th Psalm. Brother Hill led in prayer. This was a good praise service.

The roll was called and 14 elders, 1 licentiate and 21 delegates responded to their names.

The minutes of the morning session were read and the same were adopted.

The name of C. A. Heath was called and his character passed. The Order of the Day having arrived for the report of the Sunday School Secretary, L. M. Hayes offered prayer. H. S. Hill spoke in behalf of this great work and gave his report, the same being approved. See Report No. 9.

The name of F. E. Wood was called and his character passed. By request Brother Wood sang a solo, I Want to Go There. Don't You?

D. W. Summers' name was called and his character passed. At this time the Conference enjoyed a five-minute recess,

The Order of the Day having arrived, being the preaching of the Word, I'll Live for Him was sung, and the Scripture lesson was read from the second chapter of Philippians. Dr. J. S. Willett offered prayer and brought the message of the hour, using for a text Phil. 2:2, 3. He said that Jesus made a statement that no other could truthfully utter, "It is finished." His earthly work had been completed. And this is the work of God, that we believe in Him whom He hath sent, that every one should believe in a risen Christ, and there is no other way of salvation. That great

man Paul said, "Forgetting the past, I press on toward the mark of the high calling in Christ Jesus." This was a great service. The burden of souls was on the saints while many gathered around the sacred altar and many fervent prayers freighted with the presence of God, were offered in behalf of the lost and perishing. God's benediction was on the meeting.

Friday evening meeting was in charge of the W. H. & F. M. Society. See report of same in Conference Minutes.

Saturday Morning Meeting.

O. G. Wyman and G. D. Jock offered prayer. The roll was called and 13 elders, 1 licentiate and 16 delegates answered to the call of their names. The minutes of the afternoon session were read and the same approved.

The Camp Meeting Committee gave their annual report and the same was adopted. See Report No. 5.

It was proposed to make the forenoon meetings at the camp meeting of the character of a Ministerial Institute. The same was referred to the Camp Meeting Committee.

The name of G. N. Whyer was called and his character passed Committee on Courtesy introduced Rev. N. J. O'Brien, who made some welcome remarks.

The Conference Treasurer made his annual report and the same was adopted. See Report No. 6.

The Order of the Day having arrived, being the Memorial service in memory of Rev. C. C. Hill and Rev. A. F. Lent, Rev. C. E. Hill and H. S. Hill were in charge of this service. Blest Be the Tie that Binds was sung. A heartfelt petition was offered by E. D. Carpenter for God's richest blessings to rest and remain upon the sorrowing and bereaved hearts. C. E. Hill took as his texts Phil. 1:21 and 2 Tim. 4:7. He said in his opening remarks, that it was possible to have victory in the closing of life. God's people have fellowship, and that the pleasant memories of the past still linger after the loved one has gone before. That these brothers had left a good record and gone to receive the reward of the just.

Rev. H. S. Hill spoke of the blessed privilege of knowing Brother Lent, and the opportunity he had of being in his home, and knowing of his faithful work in his ministry, and of the many loved ones he left to mourn the loss. Brethren Allen, Carpenter, Wyman, Wood, Jock, Elliott and Hayes spoke of the holy fellowship they had with Brother C. C. Hill; of his cheerfulness, originality, courage, faithfulness and Christian sympathy; that a brother had gone who would be greatly missed. But our loss is heaven's gain. REPORT No. 4.

Committee on Conference Union.

The Committee on Conference Union, representinging the Lockport, Rochester and Champlain Conferences, met in the Wesleyan Methodist Publishing House, Syracuse, N. Y., Feb. 1, 1921. On motion, Rev. E. D. Carpenter was elected chairman.

Prof. J. S. Luckey was asked to state the business of the hour, which he did, giving the history of the resolution to unite the three above-named conferences into one New York Conference The whole matter was thoroughly discussed and carefully considered. As a result the following facts appear:

First. That a serious situation confronts us in the steady decline in membership in these conferences during several years past, due in part, at least, to the fact that most of these churches are located in rural communities with a declining population, and to the fact that we have failed to locate churches in the growing centers of population.

Second. That some difficulties appear in the matter of union:

1. The geographical area covered by the three conferences is large.

2. The expense of many would be largely increased in attending the annual conference.

3. There would be the spiritual and inspirational loss resulting from not holding the three annual sessions as at present.

Third. That some definite advantages would result from union:

- (a) The possibility of more efficient and economical leadership. Two kinds of leadership are recognized, administrative and evangelistic. The qualifications for leadership in both lines is seldom found in the same man. Therefore, small conferences often employ two men. If the three conferences were united, it is believed that one President could perform the administrative duties of the new conference, then two or three evangelists could be employed for the evangelistic leadership.
- (b) The possibility of concentration of evangelistic effort. The union of forces should make it possible to concentrate money and men in some center of population long enough to establish there a substantial Wesleyan church.

- (c) The possibility of an interchange of pastors throughout the conference, New minds, new relations, new visions, bring freshness and vitality essential to efficiency.
- (d) The possibility of a greater inspiration, a greater spiritual uplift and a broader vision at the annual session of a large conference,

Fourth. The benefits are so important that the committee believes that steps should be taken to demonstrate whether there are any positive methods by which they may be obtained so that the conferences may learn from experience whether conference union is desirable.

Therefore we recommend:

That, if possible, sometime during the Conference year 1921-1922 a union ministerial institute for the three Conferences be held at a time and place determined by the three Conference Presidents, who shall meet within two weeks of the rise of the Champlain Conference, and that at this institute a time shall be set apart for a full discussion of Conference union.

Further, that all pastors be urged to attend the institute when held and that mileage be pooled.

REPORT No. 11.

STANDING RULES.

At the Session of Conference the following Standing Rules of Conference were adopted:

- I. The Standing Rules of Conference shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.
- II. All visiting members of our own or other churches in harmony with our principles shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.
- III. The Conference President shall receive \$20.00 per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.
- IV. The Conference Secretary shall receive \$15.00 per year for his labor and incidental expenses.
- V. The Conference Treasurer shall receive \$10.00 per year for his services in caring for the funds.
- VI. In making his report the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books April 1st of each year.
- VII. In our Camp Meeting Work, after the expense of the camp meeting has been paid by the Camp Meeting Committee or by the person whom they may designate, any unexpended balance shall be turned over to the Conference Treasurer.
- VIII. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice-President. It is understood, of course, that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.
- IX. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference or by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.
