### Journal of Daily Proceedings.

Fairmount, Ind., August 14, 1922.

The seventy-fourth session of the Indiana Annual Conference convened in the tabernacle on the Camp Ground, at Fairmount, Indiana, at 7:30 P. M., August 14th. Rev. J. J. Coleman preached the opening sermon, a discourse full of inspiration, helpfulness and timely admonition.

The first business meeting was held at 8:00 A. M. Tuesday.

The devotions were conducted by Elders H. C. Brown, C. S. Smith and C. A. Billheimer.

The roll was called and 37 elders and 18 licentiates responded to the call of their names.

The Conference was then declared open for business, and the I resident read his annual address, which was optomistic and helpful. The address contained the following recommendations:

- 1. I recommend that an assessment be made for Conference Missions and that the Finance Committee be authorized to bring in a report as to what the assessment shall be per capita. I also recommend that the assessment be raised in quarterly installments, so that the Missionary Board can have funds to carry on the work without having to borrow during the year.
- 2. I recommend that a Church Extension Society of the Indiana Conference be organized at this session of the Conference and that a Committee be appointed early in the Conference to set forth the purpose, means and methods for the pursuance of the work.

A motion prevailed that the address of the President be accepted.

Resolved, that the Indiana Conference delegates to the General Conference to be held in 1923 be instructed to stand unswervingly for increasing Marion College territory to include all Conferences, touching the Indiana Conference, not now in Marion College territory, with the addition of the Wisconsin Conference; provided, that any member of the Church in any Conference be permitted to give for the support of any of our schools as he may choose to do so.

Be it further resolved, that the next General Conference be premorialized to conform the territorial program of our Church to learmonize with the above resolution.

### Resolutions and Laws of Indiana Conference.

- 1. It is contrary to the spirit of the Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist in any service with oath-bound societies.
- 2. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or to travel under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 3. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.
- 4. Any waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 5. Whereas, The Discipline requires that the Stewards must meet the Pastors and agree with them as to the amount necessary for their support, be it resolved: That the circuits may at the same time enter into an agreement in writing with the Pastor as to the service he is to render to the church. In case the pastor shall fail to render said service, unless providentially hindered or released by the circuit, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make an adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as any other financial obligation entered into by contracting parties.
- 6. Each pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter these reports shall not be read in open Conference.
- 7. The membership, so far as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional interests to the pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference Treasurer by the membership, he shall send a duplicate receipt to the Pastor of the charge where such persons are members.

- 8. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.
- 9. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between pastors and charges.
- 10. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they have chage of the same and make all entries therein.
- 11. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby empowered to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Assistant Secretary \$15.00, and each member of the Statistical Committee \$15.00, the same to be apportioned pro rata among the various funds of the Conference.
- 13. The official character of no Pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 14. The ordination service shall be held in connection with the memorial services of the Conference.
- 15. The Board of Trustees shall formulate plans to govern the Educational Secretary and Church Extension Secretary in their work, this to be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by this body.
- 16. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.
- 17. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials and General Evangelists shall be called first.
- 18. In the membership report all members who are found on the circuits in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 19. No letter of standing shall be granted in the interim of Conference or during the session of Conference, until satisfactory evidence is given by the minister making the request that no outstanding debts are unprovided for and that he has honorably withdrawn from the contract for service made with a charge or Conference.
  - 20. Be it resolved, That where the Conference demands the

services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

- 21. Whereas, the Indiana Annual Conference Camp Meeting has reached a place in its history where it requires the best evangelistic assistance; and, whereas, the leading evangelists much of the time are slated for at least one year in advance; and, whereas, the Camp Meeting Committee has been handicapped in the selection of such evangelists who are suitable for our Camp, due to the fact that the Committee is elected to serve for one year only, therefore he it resolved, that the Committee be elected as follows: one for three years, one for two years and one for one year, and that the person elected for three years be chairman of the Committee, and that thereafter each member be elected for a term of three years.
- 22. Be it resolved that, It shall be the duty of the pastor to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property, upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference, who shall then have the property insured. In such case, all insurance pronies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.
- Whereas, there is an inexcusable tendency on the part of some of the charges to be forgetful and neglectful of the much needed donations for our Pastors; and, whereas, the salaries now received are comparatively and in some instances extremely small; and, whereas, failure on the part of the various charges to remember the Pastor with liberal donations greatly increases the financial burden and makes the matter of the family support a question of serious concern to the minister; Therefore be it resolved, that it shall be the duty of the Conference Evangelists holding quarterly meetings to faithfully inquire, first, as to whether a competent and energetic donation steward has been elected at each church on the charge; and, second, as to whether donations are regularly and systematically given to the pastor; and, third, it shall be his duty to call for a careful report from the donation steward at the business session of the quarterly meeting and to make it clear to the church or charge that the annual conference expects whole-hearted response to this need. Be it furthermore resolved that this resolution shall have record in the standing rules of the Conference and shall be binding until the action is revoked by this body.

Bedford to produce receipts that he had met all his Connectional and Conference obligations, and being informed by the Treasurer of the College Building Fund that he had ignored the obligation, and knowing, by his own statements and teachings that he was out of harmony with our doctrine of Entire Sanctification as set forth in Article 14 of our Book of Discipline, I refused to grant it and referred the matter to the President of the General Conference. I was informed by the President of the General Conference, the Rev. E. Teter, that he would communicate with H. C. Bedford, and would forward instructions to me. At a later date I received the form of a letter of dismissal, written by H. C. Bedford, which I was informed would be acceptable to him. The letter was as follows:

"The bearer, Henry Clark Bedford, an Elder in the Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, being desirous of withdrawing from said annual conference is hereby granted this letter of dismissal. The bearer has become an unacceptable member of the Indiana Conference because he does not accept our interpretation of the doctrine of 'holiness' as stated in Article XIV of the Book of Discipline."

I, as President, granted the above letter with the following changes: Instead of the word "holiness," I used the disciplinary term "Entire Sanctification," and I wrote the words, "the Church's interpretation." My reasons were: "Holiness" is too general and variously defined, while Entire Sanctification is the Disciplinary term and means only one thing. The Wesleyan belief in a definite second work of grace that cleanses the heart from original sin. The changes would make the letter to read as follows:

"The bearer has become an unacceptable member of the Indiana Conference because he does not accept the Church's interpretation of the doctrine of Entire Sanctification as stated in Article XIV of the Book of Discipline.

"(Signed) W. L. Thompson,

"Given this 10th day of March, 1922."

#### Report No. 2.

### REPORT ON THE MARION COLLEGE CONTROVERSY.

It is with sorrow that I feel it my duty to report the serious conditions that came to a crisis in Marion College during the year.

I make this report because of the part the Conference Board of Trustees were forced to take in this unfortunate affair. I know no better way to make a report than to go back to the beginning of the trouble and in narrative form review the facts leading up to the debacle.

The first intimation of the un-Wesleyanic faith and teachings of Dr. H. C. Bedford, were brought to me near the close of the General Conference in June, 1919. The rumors, to the effect that he was a "suppressionist" came from two sources, from the East and South. These rumors came after he had been elected to the Presidency of Marion College, when it was too late to lodge an objection, if one had been disposed to do so. Such was our confidence in the Eastern members of the Board, who were life-long acquaintances of Dr. Bedford, that we felt sure that if he was not Wesleyan in his doctrine and teaching, they would have protected us from being imposed upon, after the unparalleled labor and sacrifice the people of our Conference had undergone to bring Marion College into existence. With unbounded confidence in those making the recommendation, and also in Dr. Bedford's adherence to the doctrines of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, we gave him our undivided support and fellowship, as this entire body can testify. A freer hand was given to him than was ever given to any man before, and I hope will never be given to any man again, for such freedom is dangerous. Early in the year 1920, some of my brethren came to me and reported their fears of the unsoundness of Dr. Bedford's doctrinal views in respect to the distinctive doctrines of the Wesleyan Methodist Church as set forth in Articles VIII and XIV, the first touching Original Sin, and the second, on Entire Sanctification. At first, I thought that they were unduly alarmed and did not have ground for such fears. Finally, as I saw the harm that might follow if the matter was not brought to the notice of Dr. Bedford, whom I thought was being misunderstood, as a friedd and brother should do, I went to him and reported to him alone, in his office. I said to him: "Dr. Bedford, the rumor is going that you are a 'suppressionist,' and it will ruin the school, for our people will not stand for a suppression school. You must come out plainly and let the people know just where you stand on the doctrine, and give to us traveling men something to combat these rumors. At that time he denied that he was a suppressionist and seemed to give a satisfactory answer to my appeal. And if I remember correctly he told me when he received the Second Blessing and felt a cleanness in his soul, but did not believe in the term "eradication" as used by some preachers in the Church. I tried to place the best construction on what he said and informed the brethren by word of mouth, and also by letter to those who were not present. Hoping

and trusting that that would settle the matter, I kept on seeking to advance the interests of the College, as far as my official duties would permit me. Towards the end of the year 1921, the Financial Agent, S. C. Kinnison, repeatedly said to me in a confidential way, that Dr. Bedford's reported failure to stand by the teachings of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, on the doctrine of holiness, was greatly hindering him in the raising of finance for Marion College. The matter of his doctrinal views was mentioned in one of the meetings of the Finance Committee in the month of October, 1921. Dr. Bedford said, "that if the Indiana brethren think that I am not the man for the place, let them come and tell me, and I will quietly step down and out, and let one that is acceptable take the place, and not hurt the school." In reference to the Wesleyan Doctrines of Holiness, he said with a flourish of his arms. "I challenge any of you men to prove by the New Testament that there is any cleansing connected with the Baptism with the Holy Ghost. It does not teach it." He promised the best Bible on the market to the one that could prove it. I accepted his challenge and wrote an article under the caption, "The Baptism With the Holy Ghost and Heart Cleansing," which was published in October 30th issue of the Wesleyan Methodist. Whether my article answered the challenge or not, I will let others judge. After he resigned from the Presidency of Marion College, there was issued above his name in the Marion College Journal, the following statement, contradictory to his challenge above. It read as follows:

"I believe in the Baptism with Holy Ghost subsequent to regeneration which is received at the end of a completed and whole-hearted consecration to God. I believe that this Baptism with the Holy Ghost cleanses the heart and life from all sin."

(Signed) H. C. Bedford.

This was issued after he had resigned. With all the pursuasion that different ones of the brethren that labored with him to issue a clear, unequivocal statement so that he might establish himself as truly Wesleyan, in the minds of his constituency, the result was his challenge, "I challenge any of you to prove by the New Testament that there is any cleansing connected with the Baptism with the Holy Ghost. It can't be proven." How could he be sincere in making both statements? Or had he been converted in the meantime to the Wesleyan doctrine? I leave it to interested ones to decide. It was agreed by the members of the Finance Committee, that when the President of the Connectional Board of Trustees should visit Marion College on his return from the Western coast, everything that was affecting the welfare of Marion College, including Dr. Bed-

ford's doctrinal differences, should be considered, and a correct understanding be arrived at, so that unity that insures success, might prevail. In due time Mr. E. G. Dietrich arrived. Brethren Jacob and Jasper Hester were also invited to be present, and with others of the brethren were invited into the investigation of the College difficul-Near the close of the second day of Mr. Dietrich's sojourn at Marion College, when it seemed that no progress was being made, someone suggested that a committee be appointed to draw up a paper, setting forth what we believe and could agree to relative to the doctrine of holiness as taught by the standards of the Church. I made reply that I did not think any of us were authorized to revise the Discipline that what we believed was set forth in our Articles of Faith. Whereupon, the Discipline was called for, and the Rev. S. C. Kinnison turned to Article XIV, and read the Article on Entire Sanctification. If my memory serves me right, the following persons were present: E. G. Dietrich, Jacob Hester, Jasper Hester, S. C. Kinnison, J. O. Baker, E. E. Worth, C. S. Smith, C. A. Billheimer and the writer. After the reading of the Article XIV of the Discipline, every one was asked, whether we accepted it and believed it and would teach it. All that were present including Brother Dietrich, readily answered in the affirmative, but when the question was put to Dr. Bedford, he blushed and remained silent. His refusal to answer surprised all, and Brother Dietrich said, "Why, Dr. Bedford, you should stand by the doctrine of the Church." Finally he replied that he would accept it if he were allowed to place his own interpretation upon it. It was evident to us all that the breach instead of being closed, was widened, and further discussion was useless. After some remarks by different ones, the meeting was adjourned. The results of the investigation spread like fire in stubble. Some of the most staunch supporters of Dr. Bedford fell away from him. In a short time a communication was received from the Executive Board, conditioning Connectional support on the unifying of all parties behind and in support of Dr. Bedford's administration. As President, I called a meeting of the Conference Board of Trustees at the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Fairmount, Indiana. It has been charged that this was a secret meeting. I deny the charge. It was called in the same way all other Board meetings are called, and free for all to attend that wished to. A public announcement of the meeting of the Board of Trustees is never made, or seldom made to say the least. The President gives written notice to each member of the Board, and to those who may have any business to be brought before them.

Among other items of business, the communication from the

Executive Board was brought before the Conference Board, without recommendations from the President. The communication was dis-On the one hand was Dr. Bedford's failure to cussed at length. accept the distinctive doctrine as believed and taught by our Church, also heavy financial obligations assumed personally by the Board of Trustees to launch the College and increasing deficits and unauthorized expenditures on the part of the administration; on the other hand, our constituency was falling away. Our endowment was being invalidated. Action was necessary to prevent a stampede for endowment notes by the donors, which right the law of the State of Indiana grants for the protection of the donors in case there is a failure to carry out the object for which the school was founded. In accord with the repeated request of Dr. Bedford, that if he were not the man tor the place, let the Indiana brethren come and tell him, they passed the resolution that they would not support any Administration that would not stand for the doctrines of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and that they had grave reasons to believe that Dr. Bedford was not in harmony with the doctrine of the Church. A copy of the resolution was sent to Dr. Bedford immediately. Instead of trying to relieve the minds of the members of the Board of Trustees of their fears that he was not correct in his doctrine and in harmony with the Church, he immediately sent his resignation to the Executive Board, and gave an interview to the press. Following this interview, one of the most un-Christian assaults was made through the Marion papers, and propaganda derogatory to our Conference and especially its officers and Board of Trustees was carried on. Dr. Bedford denied that he had anything to do with it, but it was noticed that he did not try to prevent it, or mitigate the gross betrayal of the Church into the hands of sinners. I made no defense through the papers. The only statement that appeared above my name was the following: "The Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference has never requested or demanded the resignation of Dr. H. C. Bedford from the Presidency of Marion College. They did take action in a recent meeting demanding that he stand by the doctrines of the Church. We are very sorry that upon the above condition, he does not see his way clear to remain in the Presidency of Marion College." This was the second time Dr. Bedford has resigned from Marion College. The first time was two years ago, when his program was held up by the Educational Board, the second time when the Conference Board demanded him to line up with the Wesleyan Church. It was reported through the Marion Chronicle, as coming from an interview from some one in connection with Marion College, "that the resignation of Dr. Bedford did not mean he would leave the presi-

dency of Marion College, but that it was a technical way of bringing the whole matter before the Educational Board for settlement," For the storm that raged and the destructive results that followed, we disclaim any responsibility. In the chaotic conditions that befell Marion College by the press interview of Dr. Bedford and the propaganda of the opposition, the Executive Board was called to Marion. The complaints that were investigated by the Executive Board were unauthorized expenditures and his un-Wesleyan views and teachings on the doctrine of Entire Sanctification. The first complaint he acknowledged to be true at that time and also at the Board Meeting at Syracuse, N. Y., in February, and the Board forgave him his irregular practice. When the complaint as to his doctrinal view was made, without answering a word, he laid his resignation on the table and picked up his papers, and abruptly left the doom. If, as Dr. J. S. Willett declared, he would not admit into membership in his church a man that demanded the right to interpret the doctrines for himself, can cur brethren be blamed for not wanting a man in such a strategic place as at the head of our College that makes such a demand? With il:at privilege granted, how long would it be until Marion College would go the way of Harvard, Oberlin, Chicago and Vanderbilt Universities?

The above, to the best of our ability, is a true account of the controversy and resignation of Dr. Bedford from the Presidency of Marion College. I have prayed much that I might make this report with fairness and without bitterness. For Dr. H. C. Berford I have no such feelings; but on the other hand I do regard his hasty action and conduct, with a sense of pity for the man. blame him for holding doctrinal views at variance to that of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, but I do believe he is at fault holding those views and assuming the Presidency of Marion College, and at least permitting the people, who have sacrificed to make Marion College at possibility, to believe him to be thoroughly Wesleyan, when at the same time he holds to another faith. It is a cause for deep regret that young people, who believed and experienced the grace of Holiness, under influences extant in Marion College went home, at the end of the year, outspoken in their antagonism to the doctrines of the Church and will never serve in the Church that dug them out of sin, and helped them to God. The uncompromising stand that has been taken by the Board of Conference Trustees has been reported as a factional attack on the Bedford Administration. I disclaim that it is a factional attack; but on the other hand, it is the Church and Conference that are vitally concerned in the issues at stake. If the Conference Trustees were factional and at fault, they

should be censured by this Conference; but if they were in the right in contending for the faith, this Conference should take such action showing their unquestioned support of the Trustees in the part they have taken in this matter.

#### Report No. 4.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS.

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriations, beg leave to submit the following:

- 1. Considering the welfare of the work at large we believe the present method of Quarterly Meeting work to be the best obtainable, and we therefore recommend that the Evangelists travel as nearly as possible under the same conditions for the ensuing year.
- 2. We would urge all our charges that an honest effort be made to give our pastors a living support and as an assistance that active Donation Stewards be everywhere elected.
- 3. We recommend that the Evangelists report their work Quarterly in the Wesleyan Methodists.
- 4. We recommend that the Sunday Schools devote the first Sunday's offering of each month to Home Missions.
- 5. We recommend that the Minute Fund be raised on the basis of 25 cents per copy and that the quota, if possible, be kept up to the present level.
- 6. Whereas, the burdens of the Conference President are so numerous, and whereas, the need and demand for Conference Missionary extension is imperative, therefore we recommend that the proposal of the President be carried out in the following manner: Each charge in the Indiana Conference shall be apportioned in an equitable manner, as hereinafter set forth, their pro rata amount for Conference Missions, and the pastor of said charge shall be expected to diligently seek to raise the same. Where possible the President of the Conference shall assist the pastor in this work. We earnestly recommend that an eoffrt be made on every charge during the first quarter to raise the amount apportioned which should be paid in quarterly installments.
- 7. Recognizing the importance of the Church Extension work and seeking to carry out the proposal of the President in his address, we recommend that the following plan be adopted and put into operation through the work of the Church Extension Secretary:

The Church Extension Secretary shall cause to be made subscription cards on which shall be suitably arranged the following classification:

Class A—paying \$1.00 per year for each new Church built and dedicated during the year, not to exceed five.

Class B-\$5.00 per year.

Class C-\$3.00 per year.

Class D-\$2.00 per year.

Class E-\$1.00 per year.

Class F-Special Contributions of any amount.

The Secretary shall keep a record of all subscribers, and in his visitation of the charges shall seek to secure as large a support to this arm of the work as possible. All subscriptions are due monthly until the death of the donor, or until cancelled.

The apportionment for General Conference Expense shall besent to the Conference Treasurer not later than April 1, 1923.

The statements of the College representatives and the President of Marion College relative to spirituality, scholastic standards, and the fundamental doctrines of the Church being so clear and Wesleyanic, we therefore commend the administration for the stand taken and emphatically urge all our pastors, and evangelists to do their best in assisting in the collection of all Endowment interest and L. S. U. pledges and every way possible assist in making the work of Marion College a success.

We recommend the following apportionments to the various charges for the coming year:

# REPORT OF CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

The Sunday School is a department of the Church of Jesus Christ at work studying the Bible with the intent that souls might be saved. It ought therefore to be carefully organized so that its work may be effective and its results conserved.

The classes and departments ought to be carefully enrolled and the attendance and welfare of all who are enrolled should be a serious concern for those who are given responsibility. Let us not con-

sider our work too lightly.

The Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School literature is the cleanest and best material for the use of our schools. Our doctrines are fundamental and are clearly taught in our own literature, and by its use we may assure ourselves that people who attend our schools will become indoctrinated in the great truths that the Holy Spirit uses to lead men to Salvation.

The new arrangement of our "Efficiency Standards for Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools" have been very successful in inspiring effort and zeal among our schools and this we cannot too highly commend.

#### Districting.

We recommend that the Conference work be divided and District Superintendents be supplied as follows:

Northern—E. J. Pitts. North Central—F. O. Spitler. Eastern—T. M. Bodenhorn. Western—C. L. Enyeart. South Central—E. E. Cory. Southern—W. D. Baker.

# Reorganization, Statistics and Information.

1. We recommend that all schools in the Indiana Conference reorganize between the first and fifteenth of July.

2. Each Sunday School Superintendent shall report the work of the Sunday School quarterly to the Church or Quarterly Conference and furnish a duplicate to the pastor.

3. The pastor shall report the work of the Sunday School to the Conference Sunday School Secretary by the first of August on the information blank furnished him for each school under his care.

4. Each Departmental Superintendent shall report the work of their department to the District Departmental Superintendent, who shall make a report of the progress of the work to the District Convention.

#### Conventions.

The Circuit and District Conventions are a great help and inspiration to our people and should be continued.

1. The Circuit Conventions should be conducted by the Pastor and such help as may be obtained according to plans which may be obtained from the Conference Sunday School Secretary.

2. We further recommend that the Fall Conventions be held the last of October as may best be arranged by the Sunday School Secretary.

3. The District Conventions shall be held by the District Superintendents under the direction of the Conference Sunday School Secretary.

4. We recommend that the Conference apportionment be ten

cents per member, total enrollment, including Cradle Roll and Home Department. One-half shall be for the Connectional Sunday School Secretary to be used in improving our literature and the other half for use in the Conference work.

We further recommend that the third or fourth Sunday in February be designated to raise this amount and that it be forwarded

at once to the Conference Sunday School Treasurer.

#### Report No. 8.

## COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS AND RESOLUTIONS.

1. State of the Country.—We view with apprehension the spirit of unrest which is everywhere apparent among our citizens. Whether or not it is the result of the war, or because we, and not our fathers, are confronted with it, the conditions exist. We mention the "national crime wave," the mad rush for pleasure regardless of

morals, the spirit of profiteering, the demoralizing effects of the movies and the seeming indifference of the churches to these things. If we are in the trough of spirituality, may the wave of salvation from all sin soon carry our beloved country to an altitude of morals that she has hitherto not known.

- 2. Capital and Labor.—We deplore the fact that two such essentials of our body politic as Capital and Labor should be in such mortal combat as they are at this time. We fear that the spirit of greed and selfishness has precipitated and are perpetuating the great strikes in the coal, railroad, interurban and other great industries. Also that much suffering will be the result if matters are not soon adjusted. May the time soon come when each will recognize the necessity of the other and will be willing to adjust their differences by arbitration based on the Golden Rule.
- 3. The Christian Sabbath.—We rejoice in the fact that God has set apart "the Lord's day," which is the first day of the week, for us to worship Him and to exercise ourselves in spiritual things. But, with regrets, we must observe the fact that this day is so badly desecrated. With legalized ball games and other desecrations which naturally follow in its wake; with operating seven days every week of our public utilities and show-houses, we can not reasonably hope to escape demoralization and the Divine displeasure. We believe that the paramount reason for the fall of other nations in the past has been their disregard for God's law relative to the Sabbath, hence we urge our people to regard the Sabbath sacred and to keep it holy. Also that we refrain from picnics, family reunions, and joy-rides on the Sabbath day.
- Prohibition.—We have great reason to praise God that the prayers and efforts of our Church and other reform bodies have been crowned with success in that we have written in the Constitution of our nation that intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured nor sold. But we sound a note of warning that there are thirty organizations whose purpose is to defeat the intent of the Eighteenth Amendment. Also we art not ignorant of the devices of the enemy which is catching so many, that of changing the Volstead law to permit light wines and beer to be manufactured and sold. declare against any change in the Volstead Act except to make it stronger against the manufacture and sale of drinks containing alcohol as new conditions arise. We should not feel secure in what we have obtained that we cease our teaching the direful results of drinking alcoholic drinks nor to vote for a person for a public office whose convictions are not known to be uncompromisingly in favor of prohibition. We also reaffirm our position against the use and

sale of tobacco and cigarettes and urge the teaching of the young concerning their deadly results.

- 5. Secret Societies.—We reiterate our former declarations that we believe that oathbound societies are in opposition to the teachings of God's Word and a menace to the highest attainments of society. Also that they militate against the spirituality of the Church as is attested by the fact that in many places the lodge can have a full house and the church can not hold a prayer meeting. We see them multiplying and growing; and as to members, we are in the minority, but we will still guard the doors of our church and not lower our standards and thus grieve the Spirit of God. We should inform ourscives on the evils of the secret empire and teach the people that it is antagonistic to the Church of Christ who said, "In secret have I said nothing."
- 6. Education.—We also reaffirm our position that we believe in the thorough training of the mind and the obtaining of all the information we can concerning the things with which God has so bountifully and beautifully surrounded us. But we do not believe we can remain in harmony with the God of the Bible and pursue a system of education that is contradictory to the Bible. If the Darwinian theory of the origin of things and man be true, which the text-books teach as truth, then God's Word is wrong and the whole Christian system falls. We stand by the Bible as God's Word and condemn any system of education that conflicts with it. We wish to encourage those who are in the field calling the people back to God by calling them back to the fundamentals of the Bible. Also to bid Godspeed to those who are declaring against the doctrine of evolution, but that man was created in the image of God.

# Proposed Amendment to the Discipline.

Whereas, It is the plan of the Church to have all its business transacted by fifteen men, elected from every part and district of the Connection, thereby insuring representative voice from every section of the Church: and,

Whereas, The Discipline as it now stands provides that the Executive Board be composed of five members, and these five men must all be residents of one section, namely, the State of New York, shall transact all business referred to it by the full Board, during the interim of the sessions of the full Board, and shall transact any and all other business that the full Board may transact, except that of removing any of the Connectional officers; and,

Whereas, Any measure thus carried through by said Executive

Board may be transacted wholly without the knowledge of the full Board;

We propose the following amendment to the Discipline: Paragraph 184, page 115, of the present Discipline, to read as follows:

- (1) "The Executive Board of the Book Committee, consisting of five persons, shall transact all business referred to it by the full Board, but any business referred to the Executive Board, by the full Board, must be passed upon by a majority of the five members of the executive Board, and when so passed upon, shall be submitted to the full Board by correspondence for approval, or disapproval. If approved by a majority of the members of the full Board, it shall be binding as when passed upon by the full Board in session."
- (2) "Any new business that may come up for consideration in the interim of the sessions of the full Board, shall be considered by the Executive Board, and when a majority of the members of said Executive Board shall concur as to what shall be done in reference to said new business, they shall submit the same to the members of the full Board by correspondence for approval, or disapproval, as stated above.

No business of the Executive Board shall be binding until it is approved by a majority of the full Board. This shall apply to all the Connectional Societies.

# JOURNAL OF BUSINESS PROCEEDINGS.

Business meetings were conducted Wednesday and Thursday. The public program was rendered Thursday evening, at which time the following speakers were introduced: Rev. Aaron Worth, Rev. E. Teter, Rev. John Smeltzer and wife, outgoing missionaries to India; Rev. B. I. Eddy and wife, and Rev. Frank Birch, returned missionaries to Africa. Rev. T. P. Baker made a plea for the salary for Brother and Sister Eddy. An offering of about \$1,400.00 in cash and subscriptions was received and later approximately \$100.00 was subscribed for the Eddy children.

#### PRESIDENT'S OFFICIAL REPORT.

1. I made a Convention tour throughout Indiana, as per arrangement at Conference, in company with Rev. Walter Jennings and Rev. and Mrs. John Smeltzer as special workers. I presided at each service and spoke a number of times at each place.

Amount of cash raised, \$271.94. Of this amount \$142.75 was given to Brother and Sister Jennings to complete their preparation for the African Mission Field. The expenses for the five workers amounted to \$163.19. Mrs. W. H. Hopkins was present at two of the Conventions and Miss Alma Smiley at one.

- 2. I have received and answered many communications from Indiana people with regard to the missionary work in the Conference, also carried on correspondence with the missionaries on the fields.
- 3. I made the necessary arrangements for the Educational Harvest Day for Marion College.
- 4. I made two trips to the camp ground in the interest of the Dormitory, and made an appeal for the needed supplies to furnish the same.
- 5. I apportioned the needs of seven children of the Southern Orphanage which were assigned to Indiana to clothe.
- 6. Expenses for the year for writing material, postage, telephone, meals and car fare, \$20.00.
- 7. I have endeavored to labor earnestly, carefully and prayerfully that Indiana might do and be what the Master would have her do in the great Missionary work.
