GENERAL INFORMATION

CONFERENCE FISCAL YEAR for local churches closes April 30. Conference Treasurers close their books on May 15. All budgets due at least quarterly, or payable in advance.

DAKOTA CONFERENCE 8% FUND-Financial plan for Conference Work: Money for Conference Work shall be obtained by each local church paying an amount equal to 8% of all monies raised for all purposes. This is to include local church treasury, Sunday School, W.M.S., W.Y., and Y.M.W.B., with exceptions of finance for building, repairs and dues, and that ¼ of the 8% be earmarked for Conference Headquarters and Camp Meeting. This amount is to be sent to the Conference Treasurer once a month.

THE DAKOTA CONFERENCE

STANDING RULES

1. Annual Conference 8% Fund: Financial plan for Conference Work: Money for Conference work shall be obtained by each local church paying an amount equal to 8% of all monies raised for all purposes, this to include local treasury, Sunday School, W.M.S., W.Y., and Y.M.W.B., with the exceptions of finance for buildings and repairs and dues, and that ¼ of the 8% be earmarked for Conference Headquarters and Camp Meeting. This amount to be sent to the Conference Treasurer once a month.

2. Railroad Expense: The annual assessment of the railroad expense for each charge shall be determined by the total cost of the car expense of the pastors who are present at the annual conference and are eligible for travel expense. This figure is to be adjusted according to any deficit or surplus carried over from the previous year and the result is to be divided by the total number of churches. Only those pastors whose churches have paid the assessment for the previous year shall be eligible to receive travel expense. It is recommended that each charge send its assessment to the Conference treasurer as soon as possible in the conference year.

The committee shall reimburse the pastor at $5\notin$ a mile one way for the distance from his parsonage to the conference grounds. This distance shall be determined by the railroad committee according to an up-to-date road map.

3. Camp Meeting Board: The Conference W.M.S. President, the Conference W.Y. President, the Conference Sunday School Secretary, and the Camp Supervisor, shall be members of the Camp Meeting Board by virtue of their offices.

4. The Local Church File is to be left with the church by the outgoing pastor, so that the incoming pastor will have immediate access to the data contained therein upon his arrival on the field. This file is to be open for inspection to members of the local church.

5. Budgets: All Churches are to be instructed at the beginning, and again at the close of the conference year regarding their obligations to the Conference, relative to Budget askings, and the amount due on the Budget.

6. Officers' Terms: All officers shall hold office until the close of the Conference session in which they are retired.

7. Honorarium Treasurer: The Conference Treasurer shall be paid an honorarium of \$150 each year.

8. Honorarium Secretary: The Conference Secretary shall be paid an honorarium of \$150 each year.

9. Regarding Ordination: No person shall receive ordination in the future in the Dakota Conference, who does not intend to engage in definite Christian work.

10. The Auditing Committee shall be one of the Standing Committees.

11. Instruction to Treasurers: The treasurers of the various Conference funds shall hold such funds in some bank that is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in the name of the Dakota Conference, and checks drawn on such account shall be signed by the treasurer, as treasurer of said fund.

(a) Each treasurer shall have in hand, bank statements at the beginning and at the close of the Conference year involved, and said bank statement shall be submitted with the treasurer's account book to the Auditing Committee of the Conference at the Annual Conference session, on the first day of the session.

(b) Duplicate receipts, or records, other than the treasurer's account book, with source, date, and donor of all receipts shall be submitted to the Auditing Committee with said treasurer's books.

(c) All disbursements from said funds shall be paid by check, and all cancelled checks shall be submitted with the treasurer's books to the Auditing Committee.

12. Pioneer Pastor's Funds: An assessment of three dollars (\$3.00) per year shall be raised from each member of each charge, and sent to the Conference Treasurer. The monies thus raised constitute the Pioneer Pastor's Fund which will be distributed by the Missionary Board (the Board of Directors).

13. Closing Date of Conference Fiscal Year: Closing date shall be April 30.

14. Dakota Annual Conference Minutes, or Journal: Each church or charge shall be apportioned one Journal for every three members, unless otherwise designated by the Pastor or Delegate. The Conference Secretary shall send a statement to each charge, stating the amount necessary to pay for the Minutes.

15. Each Pastor Shall Receive His Salary from the Church he has served the past year, for the two Sundays of Conference and Camp Meeting.

16. Change of Pastors-Moving Expense: We recommend that when a church makes a change of Pastors, that said church enter into an agreement with the incoming Pastor, establishing an equitable way of financing the Pastor's moving expenses.

17. Vacation for the President: We recommend that the Conference President be granted a two-weeks' vacation with pay, inclusive of two Sundays.

18. Vacation for the Pastor: We recommend that the Pastor be granted a two-weeks' vacation with pay, inclusive of two Sundays.

19. Ministerial Benefit Fund Purpose: To provide financial assistance for Conference Elders and Preachers, in times of serious illness, or death in their families.

All members and licentiates shall become members upon payment of first assessment, but no one shall be eligible to receive benefits until four consecutive assessments have been paid. Applications for benefits must be sent to the Secretary-Treasurer within sixty (60) days of illness or death.

The Secretary-Treasurer Shall Make Four Assessments Per Year, or more if emergencies arise, in the following manner: Each minister on the Conference Roll shall be assessed \$1.50 on due notice from the Secretary, except when both husbands and wives are preachers. In such cases only one is assessed. Each pastor shall collect \$1.50 from his church or charge each time an assessment is made, except ministers not serving in the Conference as Pastors. These are to pay \$2.00 for each assessment.

Disbursements: The Secretary shall upon receipt of the worthiness of the case, pay out of the treasury 50% of the amount of the actual expense to the Pastor, provided that no payment shall exceed seventy-five dollars to any one family during one conference year, possible exceptions being made in extreme cases with the approval of the Conference President and his advisory board, and the Secretary-Treasurer of the Ministerial Benefit Fund. (Normal maternity cases excepted.)

Members Delinquent in the last two payments prior to claim for help, shall be ineligible. In case one is delinquent in two or more payments, no benefits will be paid in emergencies by paying of delinquent payments. If assessment is paid by check, include a service charge to the amount of the check.

In Case of Death a maximum of \$100 will be paid the beneficiaries. The assessment in such case shall be one dollar for pastor, and one dollar for the church and \$1.50 for all others.

In case the Secretary-Treasurer is in doubt as to the worthiness of a case, he shall advise with the Conference President.

Postage and necessary expense shall be deducted from the fund.

20. Conference Dates: The Dakota Conference requests the Board of Administration to fix the time of their Annual Conference Session, if possible, to be the week following the third Monday of June of each year.

21. Conference Work: All monies sent in under the 8% Fund shall be counted as Conference Work on the Statistical Blanks, and money sent in for the Pioneer Pastor's Fund shall be counted as Conference Missions on the Blanks.

22. Standing Committee Records: Each Conference Standing Committee shall have a book of records, and shall be prepared to report to Conference all work done by its Committee.

23. Member of Missionary Board (the Board of Directors): The Conference Treasurer shall be a member of the Missionary Board (the Board of Directors) by virtue of office.

24. Committee Members' Travel Expense: All members of all committees doing conference work, shall have their travel expenses paid from the Conference Treasury.

25. Closing Date for Treasurers: All treasurers of the various funds of the Conference, are instructed to close their books on the 15th day of May each year.

26. Committee Chairmen and Personnel: The Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, the Chairman of the Committee on Railroad Expense, and the entire Statistical Committee, shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, and elected by the Conference a year in advance, and their names to appear with the list of Standing Committees.

27. Church Responsibility: Each church shall be responsible to the Pastor, and each Pastor shall be responsible to the Church to which he was appointed at the last Conference Session, and which church he has served for the preceding Conference year; this responsibility to be inclusive of the first Sunday after the close of the Conference and Camp Meeting.

28. Superannuate Pension Fund: Monies sent in by the churches on the Budget item of Pension Plan (\$3.50 per member) is to be sent to the Superannuate Pension Fund Treasurer of the Conference.

29. Aid to Churches: All Pastors receiving aid from the Conference, whether the funds come from the Conference Treasurer, Advisory Board, Beckman Board, or Pioneer Pastor's Fund, shall send a monthly statement of monies received: 1st from the Charge, 2nd from secular work, 3rd from any other conference source. This report to be sent to the Treasurer of the fund from which he is receiving aid, and to the Conference Treasurer, and that subsequent payments are not to be made until last month's statement be received, also this information to be included in the regular Quarterly Report to the Conference President.

30. See Items of Vital Importance below.

31. The Signers for the legal documents for said Dakota Conference, shall be the President and Secretary of said Corporation, or its Trustees.

32. Pastor To Receive Salary When Attending Youth Camp: Each Pastor shall receive his salary for one week, including Sunday, each year during his attendance at Youth Camp.

33. Ministers Reporting: Ministers who do not report to the Annual Conference, and those who do not present a satisfactory report—the character of these can be passed only by Conference action.

34. A Recommendation: That when a missionary conducts services in any of our churches, who is other than a Wesleyan Methodist missionary, that ½ of the offering be retained for our own missionary work, and that missionaries from other bodies be notified of the Standing Rule.

35. Conference Reports Due May 15 of Each Year:

A. The blank designated "Pastor's Statistical Report" is to be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by May 15 of each Conference Year.

B. The blanks designated "Evangelist's and Special Worker's Financial Reports" and the "Report of the Minister to the Annual Conference" along with a list of the lay delegates from the local church shall be in the hands of the Conference President by May 15 of each year.

36. Report of a Minister to the Annual Conference: The blanks designated as "The Report of a Minister to the Annual Conference" and the Pastor's and Evangelist's Statistical Reports be kept in the files of the Conference President after they have been acted upon by the proper committee.

37. Standing Committee on Nominations: That four Ministerial members be elected by the Conference body annually, and that the ministerial members so elected meet with the Conference President in advance of the Conference Session, to select the four Delegates one of whom shall be from each of the Four Districts of the Conference.

ITEMS OF VITAL IMPORTANCE

Information Regarding the Beckman Board: A board was created in June 1949, to be known as the Beckman Board, this Board to manage and to operate the Beckman properties. This Board was composed of the following persons: Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. William Ward, Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Rev. Arthur Reisdorph, Rev. John Kearns, Rev. R. J. Sausoman, Mr. O. Theo. Beckman, Rev. Kenneth Shelley. This Board is self-perpetuating and shall appoint any vacancies that shall occur through death or other causes. This Board shall have complete control over the properties received through transfers of Willie E. Beckman, or O. Theo. Beckman as Executor of the last will and testament of Willie E. Beckman, deceased. This Board shall retain such portion of income as necessary to meet its expenses in operating and keeping the property in good repair, including a separate reserve to imsure sufficient operating funds. That the funds shall be disbursed in accordance with the agreement heretofore entered into between Willie E. Beckman and the Dakota Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church. That in accordance with the wishes of Willie E. Beckman that O. Theo. Beckman continue as supervisor of the Beckman properties.

38. Agreement Between Conference and Willie Beckman Estate: The following land is deeded to the Dakota Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, on the agreement mentioned below; S.W. ¼ and North ½ of Section 28, all of Section 21, and S.W. ¼ of Section 9, all in Township 18, Range 11, in Perkins County, South Dakota.

(Subsequently three quarter-sections of land were sold, the N.E. ⁴/₄ of Section 21, the S.E. ⁴/₄ of Section 21, and the N.E. ⁴/₄ of Section 28.)

- (1) That O. Theo. Beckman be appointed supervisor to rent and subrent such land.
- (2) That the land not be sold without the approval of O. Theo. Beckman.
- (3) That Rev. J. F. Simpson and his Advisory Board be a committee to receive and disburse 50% of the receipts of the crop for Church Extension.
- (4) That when J. F. Simpson ceases to be President of the Conference, that the committee to receive and to disburse that amount for Church Extension as mentioned in Paragraph 3, be Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. William Ward, Rev. L. D. Harris, and Rev. R. J. Sausoman.
- (5) When the land is sold, it is requested that Miltonvale College, the Indian Work, and the Philippine Work sponsored by the Conference, be given proper consideration.
- (6) It is requested that the following persons be a committee to disburse the money from the sale of the land: Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. William Ward, Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Rev. Arthur Reisdorph, Rev. John Kearns, Rev. R. J. Sausoman, Mr. O. Theo. Beckman, and Rev. Kenneth Shelley.
- (7) That the committee mentioned in Paragraph 6 be empowered to fill vacancies made by the death or other cause, of any of the committee.
- (8) It is requested that this agreement become a part of the Standing Rules of the Conference, and printed accordingly in the Dakota Conference Minutes.
- (9) In case Mr. O. Theo. Beckman, the land supervisor, is deceased before the land is sold, that the committee mentioned in Paragraphs 6 and 7, be empowered to transact all business relative to the land mentioned in this agreement.

(Note: The present Beckman Board is composed of Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. L. D. Harris, Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Rev. Arthur Reisdorph, Rev. R. J. Sausoman, Mr. O. Theo. Beckman, Rev. John J. Hunter, and Mrs. O. Theo. Beckman.)

AMENDMENTS TO ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

On June 7, 1952, the Dakota Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, voted to amend their Articles of Incorporation as follows:

1. That the Dakota Conference Missionary Board be the Board of Managers for said Dakota Conference; it has the power of attorney to transact all legal business for said Conference, in keeping with the Discipline of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in the interim of the Annual Conference.

2. The signers for the legal documents for said Conference, shall be the President and Secretary of said Corporation, or its Trustees. 3. That the Beckman Board of the Dakota Conference, be known as the Directors of the Beckman Estate, with power to transact all legal business in the estate, in keeping with the provision of the will of Willie E. Beckman.

4. When said Board of Directors shall sell a part, or all of the land in the Beckman Estate, or when the leasing of the land for oil, or the sale of mineral or gas rights or royalties be made, that the President and the Secretary of said Conference, or its Trustees, are empowered to sign any legal papers, leases, deeds, and contracts of all kinds.

- The said Beckman Board of Directors has power to sell any or all of the land, herein after described, and that the President and Secretary shall have power to execute such conveyances. Said land being described as follows, to wit: S.W. ¼ and North ½ of Section 28; all of Section 21, and the S.W. ¼ of Section 9, all in Township 18, Range 11, in Perkins County, South Dakota.
- 2.) That said Beckman Board of Directors is self-perpetuating and the remaining members shall fill any vacancies which shall occur through death or other causes.

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF DAKOTA CONFERENCE

By unanimous vote of the 83rd Annual Session of the Dakota Conference, June 18, 1964, the board formerly variously called "The Dakota Conference Missionary Board," "The Board of Managers," and "The Board of Directors" was named as the "Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism" (see paragraph 253 of the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline) and was confirmed as the managing board of the conference. Thus it also performs the functions described in Paragraph 245. (The board retains the legal title: "The Board of Directors" of the Dakota Annual Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.)

Daily Proceedings

Minutes of the Eighty-third Session of the Dakota Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, held at Rapid City, South Dakota, June 16-20, 1964.

First Meeting-8:00 a.m., Tuesday, June 16, 1964

Opening Meeting—The Eighty-third Session of the Dakota Annual Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America was convened in the main tabernacle of the Dakota Conference Wesleyan Methodist Campground on Red Dale Drive, Rapid City, S. D., at 8:00 a.m. Tuesday, June 16, 1964. Rev. John J. Hunter, the conference president, called the meeting to order. Rev. O. Dean Watson led the group in a song, and the opening conference message was brought by Dr. B. H. Phaup, General Superintendent of the Western District of the denomination. Dr. Phaup spoke from Luke, chapter 2, pointing out the dealings of the Holy Spirit with Simeon.

Bar of Conference-By motion the Conference Bar was established to include the front section of seats in the tabernacle.

Call for Credentials-Rev. Hunter called for delegates' credentials to be handed to the secretary and, in reply to a question, explained that all elders vote except those listed by the conference as "unstationed."

Roll Call-The conference roll was called, revealing the presence of 45 elders, 11 conference preachers, and 34 delegates. By motion two new pastors in the conference were seated as voting members, namely Rev. Paul Turner of Garden City and Rev. Earl Donaldson of Sturgis.

Organization of Conference:

Denominational Representative Seated-On motion Dr. B. H. Phaup was seated as co-chairman of the conference session.

Report of Program Committee-Rev. Clen Wessel read the report of the Program Committee, which was amended and adopted.

Report of Auditing Committee-The report, read by Rev. Earl Olson, was adopted. See Report #1.

Report of Nominating Committee-The first report of the Nominating Committee, completing committees to serve during the 83rd session of the annual conference, was read by Mr. David Gowan, the secretary of the committee. Other names were added by consent or by vote, and the report was adopted in the form shown in Report #2A.

Report of Conference President-Rev. Hunter read his financial report, which was adopted. He then read the report of his official acts, which was adopted by a rising vote of thanks. See Reports #3A and #3C. He concluded with an informal report and exhortation stressing the importance of the camp meeting and of revival services on local fields. Dr. Phaup added remarks of concurrence and commendation.

Report of Wesleyan Youth President-Rev. Burnell Pudwill, Dakota Conference W.Y. President, read his report, which was adopted. He called attention to the fact that 26 churches of the conference failed to report Youth activities. See Report #4.

Nominations to Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders-The conference president nominated the following laymen to complete the committee: Mrs. Verda Betz, Mrs. Ingeborg Trovik, and Dr. Ivan Palmer. They were elected by vote.

Adjournment-The first meeting was adjourned with prayer led by Mr. L. L. Hildebrandt.

Second Meeting-3:00 p.m., Tuesday, June 16

Devotional Message-Dr. Alton E. Liddick, Secretary of the Department of World Missions, conducted devotions, commenting on Jesus' words, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:35).

Report of Conference Treasurer-Rev. S. J. McIntyre read his report, #5. After several questions and comments, it was adopted.

Report of Special Church Extension Treasurer-Rev. R. J. Sausoman read the Report of the Special Church Extension Treasurer, which was adopted. See Report #6.

Report of Camp Treasurer-The Camp Meeting Treasurer's Report, submitted by Mr. Melvin Gibson, was read by Rev. Glen Wessel. It was adopted as Report #7.

Report of Superannuate Pension Fund Treasurer-The report was read by the treasurer, Rev. W. J. Leyh. President Hunter called attention to the reduction in benefits to retired ministers which results when budget assessments are not paid in full. The report was adopted. See Report #8.

Report of Transportation Secretary-Read by the Secretary, Rev. J. F. Simpson, the report was adopted. See Report #9.

Report of Ministerial Benefit Fund Secretary and Treasurer-Rev. Darrel Martin read his report, which was adopted. Report #10.

Report of Blue Cross Fund Treasurer-The Blue Cross Fund Annual Report was read by Rev. Bennie D. Veeder and was adopted. See Report #11.

Committee on Courtesies Reports-Rev. Marion Vreugdenhil, chairman of the committee, presented Rev. Lloyd Phipps of the Nebraska Conference, the camp song evangelist and youth director.

Adjournment-The second meeting was adjourned with prayer by Dr. Phaup.

Third Meeting-8:00 a.m., Wednesday, June 17

Devotions-Rev. Ronald Burkhalter led in prayer, after pointing out the Comfort, the Conviction, and the Counsel of the Holy Spirit as portrayed in John 15 and 16.

Roll Call-38 elders, 11 conference preachers, and 41 delegates were marked present on the second roll call.

Courtesies Committee Reports-Rev. Ronald Burkhalter, Rev. Paul Turner, Rev. Dale Nash, and Rev. Earl Donaldson, four new pastors in the conference were introduced by the committee.

Rev. George Rhoads was introduced to the conference by Rev. Hunter, who described him as a Methodist minister who had greatly influenced his early life. Rev. Rhoads spoke briefly in testimony and exhortation, counting his ministry not in vain if it had furnished Dakota Conference with a president.

The Conference Board of Directors ("The Missionary Board") gave a partial report, which was read by the board secretary, Rev. Burnell Pudwill. After some discussion the report was referred back to the board until its final report should be made.

The Revolving Fund Treasurer, Rev. G. W. Goodsell, read his report, which was adopted. See Report #12.

The Report of the Superintendent of Philippine Missions was given by Rev. J. F. Simpson, who read the Philippine Mission Treasurer's Report prepared by the treasurer, Mr. David Simpson. See Report #13.

The Report on Indian Evangelism was given verbally by Rev. Neal Phipps, the Coordinator of Wesleyan Indian Missions. He reported nine full-time workers under WIM, supported to the extent of \$75 per couple per month. Six part-time workers receive some assistance. Forward steps include establishment of four new stations where mobile chapels are placed or permanent buildings are contemplated. Two teams of Brainerd Indian School students are evangelizing reservations this summer, and a radio project "Decision Time" has been begun on several stations. The report was accepted by a rising vote of thanks.

The Blue Cross representative, Mr. Claude Bandy, a Wesleyan layman from Sioux City, Iowa, was introduced. He gave his testimony and a report of the new church in Sioux City. After the adjournment of the meeting, he met with preachers participating in the Blue Cross insurance program.

Wesleyan church periodicals were recommended by Dr. Phaup, who offered sample copies.

The Bookstand Manager, Mr. Archie Wessel, spoke of bargains in paper offered by the Bible and Book Store of Rapid City.

A fraternal representative to the Interdenominational Holiness Camp Meeting at Wilmot, S. D., June 18-28, 1964, was chosen with the election of Conference President Hunter to that responsibility.

Adjournment was voted and prayer was offered by Rev. Lee Goodell.

Fourth Meeting-3:00 p.m., Wednesday, June 17

Prayer-President Hunter called the meeting to order and requested Rev. John Winterberg to lead in prayer and to give his testimony.

The date of the next conference session was determined as the cochairmen consulted Standing Rule #20 and tentatively set June 22, 1965, as the date to be requested for the opening of the 84th Annual Session of the Dakota Conference. Thus camp meeting would begin Thursday, June 17, 1965.

Conference Journals-On the motion of Rev. A. L. Cretsinger it was voted that 600 copies of the 1964 Conference Journal should be ordered from Wesley Press. Rev. H. W. Cretsinger's motion prevailed that churches should be billed \$1.50 per copy and that any deficit should be paid from the 8% fund.

Proposed Changes in the Wesleyan Methodist Constitution-Dr. Phaup explained Proposals A, B, and C (see Report #14) and conducted the votes by which each was adopted-Proposal A 67 to 1, Proposal B 67 to 0, and Proposal C 68 to 0. On the motion of Rev. Burnell Pudwill it was ordered that the vote of the local churches on these proposals be taken at the first quarterly conference business meeting of each charge.

Haitian Relief and church reconstruction were reported by Rev. Alfred Hartman when he was introduced by the Committee on Courtesies. Rev. Hartman described the progress made on repairing and rebuilding churches destroyed by hurricane Flora. He explained that it had been necessary to interrupt the work because successive crop failures had spread famine in the devastated area. Pres. Hunter also read a letter from Miss Mae Palmer which Rev. Hartman had delivered to the conference.

The Committee on Courtesies also introduced Rev. Elmore Blaine, Wesleyan pastor from Atkinson, Nebraska, who has accepted the pastorate at Avon, S. D.

The Committee on Railroad Expense presented its report, which was read by the chairman, Rev. Lee Gocdell. It was adopted-see Report #15.

The Conference Sunday School Secretary, Rev. Glen Wessel, gave his report, which was adopted. He also read recommendations from the Conference Sunday School Board. They were adopted, see Report #16A and B.

The Committee on Evangelism gave its report, read by Rev. R. J. Sausoman, the chairman. See Report #17, which was adopted.

The meeting was adjourned.

Fifth Meeting-8:00 a.m., Thursday, June 18

Devotions-Rev. Paul Turner led in a song and read from Revelation 12: 1-12, pointing out the means by which Satan was cast out: the Blood of the Lamb, the word of their testimony, and the consecration of those who loved not their lives unto the death.

The Conference Roll was checked by Mrs. Julius Strand, the office secretary, who marked 42 elders, 13 conference preachers, and 49 delegates present.

The day was occupied with the election of conference officers and committee members. Miscellaneous business was transacted while tellers counted ballots. Tellers were Dr. Ivan Palmer, Rev. Benjamin Joachim, Mr. Larry Mudgett, and Rev. Paul Faulkenberry.

The Conference officers elected were: President, Rev. John J. Hunter; Vice President, Rev. Gordon W. Goodsell; Secretary, Rev. Gordon H. Cary; Treasurer, Rev. S. J. McIntyre.

The Committee on Ministerial Character reported—see Report #18, which was read by Mr. C. G. Dufloth and adopted by the conference.

Standing Rule #35, dealing with reports to conference, was cited by President Hunter as needing revision. After discussion, the matter was referred to a committee to be appointed by the president. Rev. Beverly Wilson and Rev. Clifford Watt were later appointed to this committee.

All delegates to conference from the various charges are to be named on the blank "Report of a Minister to the Annual Conference," according to a motion by Rev. J. F. Simpson. Thus the Nominating Committee will have advance notice as to who the delegates shall be. This provision becomes by two-thirds vote an addition to Standing Rule 35A.

Local Church Statistical Reports must be signed by the Conference Treasurer, verifying the Budget Item. So ruled Dr. Phaup from the instructions for Item IX.

Minutes of the first meeting were read and approved.

Two members of the Local Board of Trustees of Miltonvale Wesleyan College were named with the election of Dr. Ivan Palmer and Rev. John Hunter to four-year terms. The Nominating Committee further reported through its secretary, Rev. David Gowan, its nominations for other conference positions. Report 2B shows the form of the report finally adopted.

Standing Rule #3 was amended on the motion of Rev. Burnell Pudwill that the Conference Sunday School Secretary be an ex officio member of the Camp Meeting Board.

The Conference Educational Committee was augmented by the addition of the Conference Sunday School Secretary on motion of Rev. Andrew Gerleman.

On recommendation of the Nominating Committee and motion of Rev. A. L. Cretsinger, it was voted that the Conference Secretary become an ex officio member of the Conference Board of Directors.

The meeting was adjourned by prayer, led by President Hunter.

Sixth Meeting-3:00 p.m., Thursday, June 18

Opening Prayer was led by Rev. H. W. Cretsinger.

Reports of the W.M.S., the Y.M.W.B., and the Secretary of Child Evangelism were given by guests introduced by Rev. Paul Faulkenberry of the Committee on Courtesies. President Dorothy Cretsinger reported verbally concerning the Woman's Missionary Society Conference. Mrs. Alice Fletcher, Conference Superintendent of the Young Missionary Workers' Band, reported their activities. (See the Minutes of the Session of the Woman's Missionary Society for details of the W.M.S. and Y.M.W.B. reports.) Miss Marie Brannon, Secretary of Child Evangelism, presented a written report, #19. The three reports were accepted by vote.

The Conference Board of Directors (often called "The Missionary Board") became also the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism (see paragraph 253 of the Discipline) and by vote were confirmed as the managing board of the conference upon the motion of Rev. Beverly Wilson, dealing with the recommendation of the Nominating Committee. See Report 2B.

The Conference Educational Secretary, Rev. Beverly Wilson, gave his report, which was adopted. See Report #20. He added the exhortation that a vote to adopt the report must be followed by individual action carrying cut its recommendations.

The Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders gave a partial report, which is incorporated in the final report-#31.

The Report of the Treasurer of the Willie E. Beckman Board, O. Theo. Beckman, was read by him and was adopted by a rising vote of thanks from the conference. See Report #21.

Rev. A. L. Cretsinger, the Conference Prayer Secretary, read his report, which was adopted by vote and with favorable comments by President Hunter and Dr. Phaup. See Report #22.

The Conference Director of Wesleyan Men (formerly called the Promotional Secretary for Wesleyan Men), Dr. Ivan Palmer, read his report and called attention to paragraph 614 of the Discipline, which outlines the responsibilities of members of Local Wesleyan Men. His report was adopted (see Report #23), and Rev. Hunter added brief comments on blessings, progress, and possibilities of the men's work. By ballot Mr. J. E. Alexander was elected a Conference Trustee, his term to expire in 1967.

The sixth meeting was adjourned by Dr. Phaup's prayer.

Seventh Meeting-8:00 a.m., Friday, June 19

Devotions were conducted by Rev. Earl Donaldson, who spoke from Hebrews 12:8 of "Children Without a Father"--those who cease to strive against sin, who heed not the chastening of the Father, who are born only of the flesh and have invented an imaginary god in their own image.

The Conference Roll was checked by Mrs. Strand, with 38 elders, 10 conference preachers, and 46 delegates marked present.

The Report of the Statistical Committee was read by Rev. Beverly Wilson, who offered explanations and comparisons. The report was adopted. See Report #35.

Rev. Rolland Fletcher read the Report of the Committee on Resolutions. It was referred to the committee again for the addition of resolutions dealing with civil rights and the use of the Bible in the public schools.

The conference recessed for one hour.

Conference reconvened with prayer offered by Rev. Darrel Wagner.

The report of the special committee to study Standing Rule #35 was read by Rev. Clifford Watt and was unanimously adopted. See Report #24 for ruling on presentation of reports to conference.

President Hunter nominated the following to his Advisory Board: O. Theo. Beckman, Cyrus Pettigrew, J. E. Alexander, Rev. G. W. Goodsell, Rev. R. M. Kelly, and Rev. O. D. Watson. They were elected by conference vote.

Correspondence and greetings from the following absent members and friends were reported by the conference president: Miss Ruth Bixler, Rev. Paul VanCleave, Rev. Harry Shreve and Rev. Mrs. Ina Shreve, Mr. E. Stanley Banker, Rev. Clyde McCone, Rev. John Hermann, Rev. Eugene Gisselbeck and Rev. Mrs. Evelyn Gisselbeck, Rev. and Rev. Mrs. H. Vreugdenhil, Miss Isla F. Knight, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. Mrs. Grace Goodwin Kauffman, Rev. L. L. Knapp, Dr. and Rev. Mrs. R. D. Reisdorph, Rev. Romeo Baronia, Rev. Mrs. Grace Miller Hoien, Rev. C. Milton Newbold. Quotations were made from letters and greetings were conveyed. Rev. W. D. Shelor transmitted greetings from our eldest elder, Rev. A. M. Wiley and called attention to his 95th birthday August 3rd.

On motion by Rev. B. F. Wilson, Mr. Albert Hillen was named to serve as a member representing the Dakota Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church on the Board of Alcohol and Narcotics Educational Association.

The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location reported, the report read by Rev. Darrell Wagner. The report, #25, was adopted.

The final report of the Committee on Resolutions, read by Rev. Rolland Fletcher, was unanimously adopted. See Report #26.

It was voted unanimously on motion by Rev. Earl Donaldson that a letter incorporating the resolution concerning the recognition of God in public institutions be prepared and sent to our state and national governmental representatives.

The meeting was adjourned.

THE DAKOTA CONFERENCE

Eighth Meeting-3:00 p.m., Friday, June 19

Prayer was offered by Rev. Eugene Stanislaus, who also gave a testimony and bade the conference farewell on his departure to minister in Texas.

The Committee on Courtesies, represented by Rev. Paul Faulkenberry, presented Dr. and Rev. Mrs. Ralph Earle. Mrs. Earle gave testimony and greetings. To his greetings, Dr. Earle added introduction of the Wesleyan Bible Commentary, a six-volume devotional commentary of which he is New Testament editor. His recommendations called attention to the fact that 11 of the 22 writers of the commentary are Wesleyan Methodists. The first volume, covering the Gospels and Acts, is to be available in August.

The Conference Tithing Secretary, Rev. Orland Johnson, read his report, which was adopted. See Report #27.

Rev. Arnold LaRue, the Conference Card Call Secretary, read his report, #28. It was adopted.

Rev. Darrel Martin offered two recommendations from the Conference Sunday School Board. See Report #16C. Their adoption ordered \$20.00 be paid from the Conference Sunday School Fund to the Alcohol and Narcotics Education Association of South Dakota and that expense of official travel of the Conference Director of Christian Youth Crusaders (the Secretary of Child Evangelism) be paid from the same fund.

The Report of the Committee on Appreciation was read by Rev. Julius Strand, amended by consent, and adopted. See Report #29.

The request of Rev. Clen Wessel for a statement of conference position in relation to support of the projected "Rushmore College" was referred to a committee consisting of the conference president and his advisory board, with the addition of Rev. Beverly Wilson.

On motion by Rev. A. L. Cretsinger, the conference voted to extend its thanks to the general superintendents for the copies of General Conference Minutes they mailed to ministers.

The final Report of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders was read by the chairman, Rev. R. J. Sausoman, and was adopted. See Report #30. By motion of Rev. Darrel Martin, the conference authorized the committee to elect its own chairman for the coming year.

The eighth meeting was adjourned by prayer led by Mr. David Gowan.

The Ninth Meeting-8:00 a.m., Saturday, June 20th

Devotions were conducted by Rev. Dale Nash, who read Psalm 121 and spoke of drawing strength from the Creator by looking unto the hills He has made.

Roll Call-38 elders, 9 conference preachers, and 30 delegates were marked present on Saturday.

District Chairmen of Wesleyan Men were elected as follows: Aberdeen District, Rev. Arnold LaRue; Black Hills District, Mr. Cyrus Pettigrew; Northwest District, Rev. R. J. Sausoman; Southern District, Dr. Ivan Palmer.

Authorization to prepare his supplementary report from data already included in other reports and to insert it in the minutes following adjournment of conference was granted President Hunter on motion of Rev. H. W. Cretsinger. See Report #3B.

Revolving Fund Assets and Liabilities were reported by the treasurer, Rev. G. W. Coodsell. The report was adopted and incorporated with #12. The Committee on Pastoral Relations presented its report, which was read by Rev. Darrell Wagner. On motion of Rev. Darrel Martin, the conference recessed for one hour. Rev. Gordon Cary offered prayer before recess and Rev. Rolland Fletcher after. Following the recess, the report was read with alterations and adopted. See Report #31.

On motion Rev. Ronald Burkhalter and Rev. Dale Nash were seated as voting members of the conference.

Reports of the Conference Board of Directors (The Missionary Board) were read by the board secretary, Rev. Burnell Pudwill. The minutes of the meetings of October 14, 1963, October 17, 1963, June 15, 1964, and June 18, 1964, were approved by consent and the report was adopted. See Report #32.

In connection with the transfer of funds from Gillette to Sioux Falls, on motion of Rev. Beverly Wilson, the conference delegated authority to the conference president and his advisory board to confer with the Executive Secretary of Church Extension and Evangelism and to reach a decision as to possible use elsewhere in the conference of Card Call funds received in the appeal for Gillette.

On motion of Rev. Wilson, the conference adjourned to meet again at 1:30 p.m., setting aside the Orders of the Day.

Closing prayer was offered by Dr. Phaup.

The Tenth Meeting-1:30 p.m., Saturday, June 20th

Devotional Period-The Conference Vice President called the meeting to order and led in singing "Love Lifted Me." Rev. Kenneth Harris led in prayer. Before the business session, Dr. Phaup was asked to conduct brief devotions. He read Colossians, chapter 4, calling special attention to Paul's warm regard for his beloved brethren, faithful ministers and fellowservants in the Lord-and to Paul's exhortation, "Take heed to the ministry which thou hast received in the Lord, that thou fulfill it." He concluded his remarks with cordial words and best wishes for the conference.

The special committee appointed to formulate a statement regarding the attitude of the conference toward a school to be established in this area reported. Rev. John Hunter read the report (see #33) and a supplementary statement by Mr. O. Theo. Beckman. He then called on Rev. Beverly Wilson for additional remarks. The report was re-read, and on motion of Rev. Darrel Martin, the report of the committee was adopted.

The Camp Meeting Board's Report was read by Rev. Burnell Pudwill. Minutes of the meetings of June 15, 1963, February 19, 1964, and June 11, 1964, were read and were approved by separate motions. See Report #34.

The Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders reported that they had met and had elected Rev. R. J. Sausoman as chairman of the committee.

The minutes of meetings third through ninth were read, corrected, and approved.

On the motion of Rev. John Hunter, it was provided that since the Ordination Service is a part of the business of the conference, the minutes of that service should be included in the record of Daily Proceedings. See account of Religious Services.

Dr. Phaup asked the conference to express its thanks to Conference President Hunter and his associates, and to assure them of their confidence and cooperation. This was done by a rising vote. The Courtesy Committee presented Rev. Duane Seitz, Student Chaplain of Miltonvale Wesleyan College for the 1964-65 school year. He brought greetings from the school and from the Kansas Conference.

Rev. Darrel Martin enquired concerning the possibility of paying Ministerial Benefit Fund benefits on the basis of advance payment of the first year's premiums. President Hunter ruled that to qualify a candidate for payment by advance premiums would defeat the original intent of the Standing Rule by giving coverage for several additional months than provided for in the rule.

On motion of Rev. Darrel Martin, the conference president and his advisory board were authorized to handle any items of conference business which may inadvertently have been overlooked—and if necessary, to call an additional meeting of the 83rd Session of Conference.

Minutes of the tenth meeting were read and approved, and the meeting was adjourned with closing thanksgiving and prayer led by Dr. Phaup.

Phaup, General Superintendent of the Western District of The Wesleyan Methodist Church, Dr. Ralph Earle of the Nazarene Theological Seminary, Kansas City, Mo., Dr. Alton E. Liddick, Executive Secretary of the Department of World Missions of The Wesleyan Methodist Church, and Rev. Lloyd Phipps of the Nebraska Conference, song evangelist. Mrs. Marsena Pelton and Miss Marie Brannon were the Children's Workers. The ministry of these workers was blessed of the Lord and greatly appreciated by the members of the camp meeting assembly.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKSHOPS

At 10:00 a.m. Friday, June 12, Rev. Glen Wessel, conference Sunday School Secretary, was in charge of a panel discussion of Sunday School problems and methods.

PHILIPPINE MISSIONS SERVICE

At 1:30 p.m. Friday Rev. John Hunter presided in a service devoted to Philippine Missions. Rev. Darrel Martin led the singing, and Rev. W. D. Shelor led in prayer. Rev. J. F. Simpson, president of the Philippine Conference and head of Philippine Missions, Inc., was introduced as the principal speaker. He reported the recent Philippine Conference Session, the occasion of his tenth trip to the islands. The conference reports revealed the best year in its history, with more than 40 pastors and deaconesses, three training points for students, and 2000 pupils last year in Child Evangelism classes. He estimated that it would require ten years of work and \$200,000 expense to duplicate what has been accomplished to date.

SEMINAR ON THE NEW DISCIPLINE

At 3 p.m. Friday Rev. Hunter presided over a panel discussion of changes and emphases found in the new Wesleyan Methodist Discipline. The other members of the panel were Rev. Gordon Goodsell, Rev. Gordon Cary, and Rev. R. J. Sausoman.

SUNDAY SCHOOL RALLY

At 7:30 p.m. Friday Rev. Glen Wessel, Conference Sunday School Secretary, presided at the annual conference Sunday School Rally. Rev. Burnell Pudwill led congregational singing and a Youth Choir. Prayer was offered by Rev. Arnold LaRue. Special music was provided by the juniors, who were led by Mrs. Marsena Pelton in singing "Jesus Loves the Little Children," "Sunlight," and "Always Take Time to Pray," by the Wessel trio of junior girls, who sang "It's Not an Easy Road," and by the Youth Choir, who sang "Will Your Anchor Hold?" Rev. Arnold LaRue and Rev. Marion Vreugdenhil were asked to describe contests in which they engaged with the Huron and Terry churches, with benefit to all, Redfield winning 120% increase to 111% and Miles City winning with a peak attendance of 120 on Rally Day. Rev. Wessel also extended recognition to the largest Sunday Schools in class B (Bismarck and Mobridge), class A (Watford City), class AA (Aberdeen), and class AAA (Rapid City First).

Dr. Ralph Earle delivered the Sunday School address, speaking from I Corinthians 15:9 and 10 and discussing four "P's" that go to make Sunday School success: Personality, Power, Planning, and Push.

MILTONVALE RALLY

Saturday, June 13, 7:30 p.m. was the time of the annual conference educational service. Dr. Wesley L. Knapp was the featured speaker and emphasized the need of "The Conquest of Inner Space." Special music was furnished by the MWC "Men of Song," a quartet composed of Tom Bedient (Conner, Mont.), first tenor, Paul Robbins (Miltonvale, Kansas, but born in S. D.), second tenor, Clay Wirt (Miltonvale), baritone, and Bob Kraus (Joliet, Mont.), bass.

Rev. Wesley Wagner, newly appointed MWC Admissions Counselor, was introduced as another Dakota Conference representative on the Miltonvale staff.

Conference President John Hunter, who is also a member of the MWC Local Board of Trustees, delivered a fervent educational exhortation in connection with taking the educational offering.

WESLEYAN INDIAN MISSIONS

Missionaries to the American Indians serving under Wesleyan Indian Missions and serving at Brainerd Indian School were introduced at 1:45 p.m. Sunday afternoon, June 14th. In addition, Rev. Neal Phipps, Coordinator of Wesleyan Indian Missions and Field Representative of Brainerd Indian School, reported before the conference Wednesday morning, June 17. (See Daily Proceedings)

ANNUAL MISSIONARY SERVICE

(Reported by Mrs. Dorothy Cretsinger, W.M.S. President)

The Public Missionary Service, held Tuesday evening, June 16, began at 7 p.m. with "Meet Your Missionaries." After congregational singing, Rev. J. F. Simpson led in prayer. Ruth Hayward, returning to Sierra Leone in September, gave her testimony of victory and also of challenge. Rev. and Mrs. Alfred Hartman, missionaries to Haiti, gave their testimonies, and Rev. Hartman reported on conditions and building progress since hurricane Flora.

Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent Mrs. Alice Fletcher presented the honor bands with their awards and urged 100% participation in the Y.M.W.B.

Rev. Lloyd Phipps sang "So Send I You," after which Mrs. Ruth Liddick gave her testimony and information on the Prayer Sharer plan.

Guest speaker Dr. Alton E. Liddick, General Secretary of World Missions, spoke concerning Christ's Church around the world, and gave greatly encouraging information of progress on each of our Mission Fields.

The annual missionary offering was received to be divided between General Fund of World Missions and the new church at Sioux Falls, South Dakota. Rev. B. H. Phaup dismissed the service with prayer.

DENOMINATIONAL ADDRESS

The Denominational Address was delivered at 11:00 a.m. by General Superintendent B. H. Phaup. In reporting the progress of the various arms of the church, he accounted for the fact of the \$80,000 drop in missionary receipts for 1963 by explaining that the change in the dates of the fiscal year made 1962 a year of 8 months. The appeal to turn in funds before the end of 1962 succeeded in keeping that year's report up, but drained treasuries for the first months of 1963. He reported the Publishing Association operating vigorously but needing more space and more modern equipment in order to compete with other firms that use offset methods. The assets of the Wesleyan Investment Foundation now exceed one-half million dollars. The Woman's Missionary Society is at high tide, and the area schools are building. Wesleyans are erecting a building at Asbury Seminary.

Dr. Phaup appealed for united support of the church program and warned that those who take extreme and ultra-radical positions are causing major problems. "In taking strong positions," he said, "let us not fail to grant to those who differ with us the right also of being Christian."

MEMORIAL SERVICE

At 1:00 p.m. Thursday.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES IN THE WESLEYAN METHODIST DISCIPLINE

Submitted by Rev. Garl Beaver, Secretary of the General Conference and presented by Dr. B. H. Phaup

PROPOSAL A

The following statement, if approved, will become a new Article of Religion and will be placed in the Discipline as Article XIX, preceding the present XIX entitled "Rites and Ceremonies of the Church."

THE CHURCH

"The Christian Church is the entire body of believers in Jesus Christ. The Founder and only Head of the Church is Christ.

"A local church is a body of believers formally organized on gospel principles, meeting regularly for purposes of worship, edification, and evangelism.

"The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America is a denomination consisting of those members within annual conferences and local churches who hold the faith set forth in these Articles and acknowledge the ecclesiastical authority of its governing bodies."

- NOTE: The purpose of this proposal is to give a clearer definition of the church and specifically to denote that the term "church" refers to more than local organization, as seems to be indicated in Par. 41 of the Discipline.
- NOTE: It should be pointed out, also, that this does not provide for the deletion of Par. 41, 42, and 43, from the Discipline.

This was approved by the General Conference by a standing vote of 102 to 0. (Approved by Dakota Conference 67 to 1.)

PROPOSAL B

This proposal is to add following "bounds" in Par. 60 (1) on Line 2, the parenthetical cross-reference: (as modified by VIII 5 below). The reference is to Article VIII, Par. 69 (5).

The portion of the Discipline now reads:

Par. 60. "The constitutional rights of each annual conference shall include the following:

"(1) The right to take charge of all the ministers and churches within its bounds except such of the general officers of the church as the General Conference shall define (who shall be amenable to the Board of Administration for their official conduct and to their annual conferences for their moral character), and subject to the right of the ministers and churches to enter into pastoral engagements for one year from the next session of the annual conference, or to contract the pastoral relationship at any time during the interval of the sessions of the annual conference when this does not interrupt any arrangement which was sanctioned by the annual conference at its previous session."

The proposed change would cause this paragraph to read as follows:

Par. 60. The constitutional rights of each annual conference shall include the following:

(1) The right to take charge of all the ministers and churches within its bounds (as modified by VIII 5 below) except such of the general officers. . . . (The remainder is unchanged.)

NOTE: Observe that this is not a new provision, but is a cross-reference to Par. 69 (5) which already makes a distinction between the regular and mission annual conferences.

NOTE: This could well have been an editorial insertion, but it was felt that possibly it should be voted upon by due constitutional processes.

This was approved by the General Conference by a standing vote of 100 to 1. (Approved by Dakota Conference 67 to 0.)

PROPOSAL C

It is proposed that the second paragraph in Par. 30 of the Discipline be deleted. This is Article of Religion XIX, and entitled "The Rites and Ceremonies of Churches." (If all these proposals are approved, this would likely become Article XX, inasmuch as an Article entitled "The Church" would become XIX. This would necessitate the renumbering of the Articles of Religion from this point forward.)

This Article now reads:

Par. 30. "It is not necessary that rites and ceremonies should in all places be the same or exactly alike, for they have always been different and may be changed according to the diversities of countries, times, and men's manners, so that nothing be ordained against God's Word.

"Every particular church may ordain, change, or abolish rites and ceremonies, so that all things may be done to edification."

The proposal is to delete the last short paragraph, making this Article to read as follows:

It is not necessary that rites and ceremonies should in all places be the same or exactly alike, for they have always been different and may be changed according to the diversities of countries, times, and men's manners, so that nothing be ordained against God's Word.

NOTE: The following explanation was given the Board to support recommending this change.

"... some of our missionary leaders have felt that the second paragraph under this paragraph number should be clarified or preferably deleted. If the words 'every particular church' is interpreted to mean every local church, the sense of the paragraph is highly undesirable in areas where a church has newly come out of paganism, whose members still have no appreciable store of Christian content in their history or background. In practice we are not able to permit each particular church to change or abolish rites and ceremonies or to ordain new or different ceremonies until their social life has more Christian content. Yet we feel that even these babes in Christ can properly be made a part of a New Testament church.

"Since 'every particular church' seems to mean 'each local church,' our suggestion is that the paragraph be deleted in its entirety."

This was approved by the General Conference by a standing vote of 99 to 0. (Approved by Dakota Conference 68 to 0.)

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

Dakota Conference has been back of Miltonvale Wesleyan College this past year. Twenty-seven of the students on the campus came from our local churches. Eight people on the faculty and staff have come from our conference, and this coming year Rev. Wesley Wagner will also be joining the staff in the area of admissions counseling. Two members of the college quartet came from Dakota Conference and one of our Dakota boys, Mr. Robert Kraus, is the newly elected student council president.

This year our total giving for educational budget was \$4579.00 and our above budget giving for Miltonvale was \$7035.00. The Dakota Conference is awakened today as never before to the importance of Miltonvale College to the future of our church.

In return Miltonvale College has had another fruitful year. Its theological department continues to grow numerically and its scholastic standing continues to rise. This year two of the theological seniors, Ronald Burkhalter and Dale Nash are returning to our conference for work.

Two years ago the decision to move forward was made and we cannot turn back. This coming year will see the launching of phase number two of the College Development Program. The financial goal of this project is to be announced at the planning conference at Miltonvale on October 27th. If you as a leader are invited to participate in this conference, as an educational secretary, we urge you to take time for this crucial conference.

The objectives of this second phase are four: (1) a new dormitory of approximately 50 beds; (2) furnishings for the science building; (3) faculty enrichment or giving teachers assistance for graduate study, also salary improvement; (4) scholarship aid.

A careful scrutiny of the records we have written this past year indicates that we have not been 100% in our efforts for Miltonvale. Our budget giving dropped \$85, while our giving above budget dropped \$5554.00. This, of course, is largely determined by the giving for the Development program.

We had 28 churches who paid their educational budget and of these thirteen overpaid their educational budget. Nineteen churches or 40% failed to pay their educational budget in full. Of these nineteen there were eight who raised less than half of their educational budget. Our total deficit on budget was \$809.00.

Our conference must also awaken to the need of urging our young men to go on to further training at the Wesleyan Seminary Foundation at Wilmore, Kentucky.

Our General Conference, seeing the trends in the demands that are being placed upon our pastors, is pushing forward in this field of advanced education for pastors.

Currently each married student attending our Wesleyan Seminary Foundation receives \$200 per year and the unmarried student receives \$150 per year.

Dr. Wilber Dayton, professor at Asbury Seminary, is the director of the Wesleyan Seminary Foundation. As a denomination we are presently in the midst of raising funds for a new \$30,000 Wesleyan Seminary Foundation Center. The construction of this building will begin as soon as there is \$20,000; the foundation received \$9,000 from the denominational Thanks-giving offering.

We urge interested individuals to give financial backing to this essential program. All contributions should be sent to Rev. S. J. McIntyre, the conference treasurer.

Realizing that the church of tomorrow is being determined by the degree and quality of the education we are furnishing for our youth today, we suggest the following objectives for the coming year:

1. That we strive to be 100% as a conference in the coming year in raising our assessments for Miltonvale College and the Wesleyan Seminary Foundation.

2. Each pastor and delegate put forth planning and effort in interesting our local church youth in Miltonvale College.

3. The conference president urge our theological students to go on to further training in our seminary whenever possible.

4. Every local church participate wholeheartedly in the second phase of

the College Development Program which is to be initiated on October 27, 1964.

5. Our churches be urged to pray for our leaders in the field of education as they confront the staggering problems of our church-related schools.

It is our firm conviction that these five objectives are an absolute minimum for the Dakota Conference for the coming year if we are to fulfil our responsibility in the Kingdom of Christ.

REPORT OF DAKOTA CONFERENCE SECRETARY OF PRAYER

In making a retrospect, as we come to the close of the Conference Year, we can say with Samuel the Prophet, "Hitherto hath the LORD helped us" I Samuel 7:12. HE has answered prayer! We give praise to HIM!

Since we have realized His help during the past, we can believe and expect greater things from GOD for the days ahead. There is the need of planting our holiness Sunday schools and churches everywhere to meet this our greatest challenge of our generation. Intercessory and prevailing prayer is needed, and should be made by every praying Christian to effect this divine missionary program.

The church of the living GOD is threatened also with determined opposition and the destruction of our Christian faith, by Catholicism, Communism, modernism, and false religions and cults, these deadly enemies of the Gospel of Christ, having a form of godliness, but denying the power of Christ to regenerate, to entirely sanctify, to keep man holy; from such God says "turn away." There is also worldliness, apathy, irreverence, irresponsibility, and wickedness at home, and the forgetfulness of GOD.

The Christian, however, has the assurance that the gates of hell shall not prevail against a praying, believing, Spirit-filled Church. GOD is the answer to all of our problems. It is prayer and faith alone that can cause the hand of GOD to intervene, and to interpose in behalf of the church and nation. Like Cornelius the centurion, who prayed always, it is for every member of the church to give themselves to genuine intercessory praying until they are assured from heaven that their prayers are heard, and their pleadings are come up for a Memorial before GOD, thus beginning a mighty offensive against Satan's Kingdom for its overthrow. The world is waiting to see what God can do through a true, praying, believing, obedient, Spirit-filled Church. We have appreciated all who have cooperated in the Dakota Prayer Program. GOD also has this record. We therefore submit the following:

I. YEAR-ROUND CONFERENCE PRAYER PROGRAM

 - a. That prayer shall be made EACH WEDNESDAY MORNING, and b. AT ALL OTHER TIMES as the Lord may lead, for the Churches and personnel of the Dakota Conference.
- II. THE PERSONNEL INCLUDES ALL TO PRAY
 - 1. To enlist young and old in the Conference Prayer Program; the children assigned 5, 10, or 15 minutes or more; the young people assigned a longer period; adults often spend one hour or more, waiting before God in intercessory prayer.
 - 2. Those Christians who remain on the fields (where their church structure is gone), who desire to unite in the Conference Prayer Program, for the building of Christ's Kingdom through Wesleyan Methodism.
 - 3. Also to enlist all others outside the Church, who will unite in the Dakota Prayer Program for the extension of God's Kingdom on earth.
- III. THE PURPOSE FOR "EVANGELIZE NOW"
 - 1. Praying and laboring for REVIVALS IN EVERY CHURCH IN THE CONFERENCE, AND REACHING INTO NEW AREAS for the CHRIST, and for growth in church membership; growth in the Sunday School, the W.M.S., the Y.M.W.B., the W.Y., and the Wesleyan Men.
 - 2. "Evangelizing Now," and pioneering with revivals in the new fields in our great Northwestern Territory, and the planting of Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools and Churches therein.
 - 3. That laborers shall be called into the whitened harvest fields.

THE DAKOTA CONFERENCE

- 4. That the material and spiritual needs of the church shall be supplied from the hand of GOD.
- 5. That sinners might be born into Christ's Kingdom.
- 6. That believers (the justified) might be entirely sanctified.
- 7. That in every home there shall be a family altar.
- 8. That daily secret prayer be made or renewed in every life.

IV. MAILING AND EXPENSE

- 1. More than 800 prayer requests have been mailed for REVIVALS and special needs.
- 2. The expense for this work has been \$34.37.
- 3. We pray this effort will glorify our LORD, and advance His Kingdom in the earth, in the hearts and lives of men, and will bring honor, glory, and praise to HIM forever.

In the past year several District Wesleyan Men meetings were held. I attended the Southern District meeting at which C. Wesley Lovin was speaker.

I was invited by the Mitchell group to speak at their organizational meeting and was impressed by their plans. It would be well for others contemplating organization, to consult with this group. It has been brought to my attention that the Strathavon Church in Rapid City has recently organized a men's group. These two churches are to be commended for their efforts. In addition to these groups, Brookings has a functioning men's group, but as yet, it is not officially organized.

I believe in the immediate and potential value of the Wesleyan Men's organization as a means of winning men to the Lord. I would suggest that every church evaluate its program to see if it is effectively reaching the men in its congregation. If a need is found to be present, prayerful consideration should be given as to the advantages of organizing the men of your church.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING AND LOCATION

The committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location met on Wednesday, June 17th, and again on Thursday, June 18th, at the Campground in Rapid City. After meeting with representatives from Avon, Pierre, Sioux Falls, and Miles City, the following recommendations were made:

We recommend that representatives of the Building Committee meet at Sioux Falls and assist Rev. Wagner in the selection of a building site and proceed to purchase location when approved; and that Rev. Wagner then proceed with plans for a suitable building for Sioux Falls which shall be presented to the building board for approval.

We recommend that the local building board of the Miles City, Montana, church prepare plot plans to be presented to members of the Conference Building Board at a meeting in Miles City on July 18, 1964.

We recommend that the Pierre Church elect a building board to make tentative plans to be presented to the Building Committee. We favor immediate steps to formulate plans for a new church building in Pierre.

We recommend that the Avon Church proceed to develop plot and floor plans for the building of a parsonage, and that information be secured regarding availability of finance through local financing institutions. These plans to be submitted to Building Board for approval.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

We, your committee on resolutions, submit the following report: Be it resolved:

That we as pastors and laymen of the Dakota Conference pledge ourselves to a diligent walk in the light of God's Word. As individuals, let us purpose to seek, find, and do the will of God, and in fulfillment of Romans 12:1, thus be enabled to render unto God a reasonable service.

That knowing we are living in perilous times, when there is a great falling away of the church in general, we strongly urge the important necessity of giving priority and proper emphasis to the prayer program as set forth in the report of our conference prayer secretary. Let us observe times of fasting and prayer throughout our entire conference area and promote district prayer conferences wherever possible. That we also have the family altar and secret prayer in our Wesleyan homes, until we are known as a praying people, who have power with God and man.

That we keep before us as pastors, the challenging exhortations of I Thessalonians 5:16-24, combining our energies for the purpose of embracing and spreading Scriptural holiness.

That since we are His stewards, diligence should be given in areas of our tithes and offerings, time, and talents in the work of the Lord.

That as the theme of this quadrennium is "Evangelize Now," we should be mindful that the power to evangelize has been promised, and that we should be aware of the prospects in the people to be reached with the message that is vital to their need. With mushrooming populations at home and overseas, we must work while it is day.

That we call attention to the command, "Remember the Sabbath Day, to keep it holy," and urge greater respect for the Lord's Day on the part of our people. That we abstain from buying or selling, from amusements and other unnecessary activities that do not glorify God.

That we use our influence to direct the lives of our youth in Christian service such as the ministry, the mission field, personal witnessing, and that we encourage our youth to attend our church schools.

That I964, being National election year, we recommend that much prayer be made for our nation in this hour of crisis, and that all our people take part and cast their vote on election day. Regardless of our personal political preference, let us pray much and then let the Holy Spirit direct us in our voting.

That we strive to keep our congregations informed as to developments on local, state, and national levels affecting our religious liberties and that we give much attention to united and earnest intercession on occasions when we suspect that our much-valued religious liberties are in danger of being limited, or destroyed by governmental action.

That as God's people we firmly resist the evils of the liquor traffic and the increased demand for legalized gambling and the spread of obscene literature.

That we as the Dakota Conference accept the statement of our General Board of Administration on Social Concerns as follows:

1. We believe on Biblical authority that God has created of one blood all men, and that He is no respecter of persons in offering the grace of Christ to all.

2. We believe that all Christians are "children of God by faith in Christ Jesus" (Gal. 3:26). As such they are members of the "body of Christ" (Eph. 4:12).

3. We believe that worship in the house of God should be open to the whole family of God, and that all who care to worship with us should be welcomed.

4. We believe that as Christians, we are obligated to evangelize all men, regardless of race or condition, at home or abroad. As those who preach a full and free gospel, we are responsible for the development of mature Christian disciples through the Church.

5. We reaffirm our conviction that Christians in particular should be concerned that there be secured "to all men the enjoyment of every natural right" and access to opportunities ordinarily open to the public.

6. We believe that these principles place an inescapable obligation upon the local congregation to evangelize its own neighborhood, as well as to extend its ministry as widely as possible.

That under social principles:

1. We support the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States that there shall be no segregation on the basis of race or color in tax-supported institutions.

2. We believe that equal rights bring equal responsibilities, and that no society or group has the responsibility to maintain unlimited privileges for those who refuse to accept normal and proportionate responsibility. There should be no discrimination against individuals on account of their ancestry. On the other hand, we believe that members of all races should demonstrate their desire to be true worshipers when they enter our churches, to be lawabiding citizens when they enter business establishments, and to live consistently with neighborhood standards when buying or renting a home in a section which is predominantly of another race. We believe that all should receive equal pay for that which is done with equal excellence. As the person of any race becomes a regular member of the church or community, assuming proportionate financial and other responsibilities, he should be fully treated as such.

On the Recognition of God in our Public Institutions:

WHEREAS the historic attitude of the United States Government toward the worship of God has been one of friendliness, as may be substantiated by any number of evidences, and

WHEREAS the American citizenry today, of whatever creed, is overwhelmingly characterized by faith in God and a recognition of our national and personal dependence upon Him, and

WHEREAS the intent of our founding fathers in forbidding the establishment of religion in the First and Fourteenth Amendments of our Constitution was manifestly not to remove all vestige of our theistic faith from governmentsponsored premises and activities, and

WHEREAS in recent years there has been a determined effort by an atheistic minority, having every personal privilege of disbelief, to secure judicial decisions purportedly based upon the Constitution to shield themselves from reminder of their minority status by the banishment of all theistic traces from publicly sponsored activities and premises, notably from our public schools which, because of compulsory attendance requirements, affect the lives of the vast majority of our moral and ethical value system, and

WHEREAS successive actions of the Supreme Court, occasioned by the persistent appeals of atheists and agnostics, seem to indicate a growing inclination to ban from public life all worship of God, in however broad terms, and all recognition of Him,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Dakota Conference respectfully petition our legislative leaders to discover for us and for the great Godfearing majority of our people some adequate lawful redress from the abovedescribed disability. We presume that such may require a Constitutional Amendment recognizing the sovereignty of Almighty God for our nation (while granting freedom of conviction and propagation to those who choose not to recognize Him), reaffirming the doctrine that units of the Government are to avoid acts and policies involving the support or establishment of organized religion, but declaring the principle that it is not deemed a contravention of this doctrine that the name of God be honored in state and civic life and that men be encouraged to read the Bible in its various versions and to worship God in accordance with the dictates of their own conscience, not excluding the incidental occurrence of such activities even from premises built or financed in whole or in part by public monies, that this nation may indeed be a nation under God.

BE IT RESOLVED FURTHER that we urge all our people to circulate petitions after this tenor, these to be sent to the national legislators from our various areas of residence, endeavoring thus to show the concern of Godfearing peoples in America that the public recognition of God, the Creator of all men, who is revealed fully in His Son, Jesus Christ, be not destroyed from among us.

Lastly, knowing that the time is short and the coming of Christ is near at hand, we urge our people to labor and to live in constant readiness for His glorious return.

"Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life." Revelation 2:10.

Friday Rev. and Mrs. Ferdinand Witthuhn from Haiti sang "I Surrender All." Friday afternoon, "How We Do It, on the Area Level," was given by the area presidents.

A variety hour was held at 2:45. Friday evening the Bible Quiz Finals were held between Marion and Central with Central coming out on top.

A World Missions Service was held at 7:45 and Dr. B. H. Phaup was the speaker. Many of our missionaries were introduced.

Saturday morning Rev. Brannon led devotions. He read from I Peter 1:13-16. Among the things he pointed out were these three:

1. live steadfastly in hope

2. live sensitively in holiness

3. live sincerely in harmony

Our new W.Y. officers were installed and we went on with business.

Saturday afternoon we had "How We Do It on the Local Level." Following are the topics:

Reaching New Youth-Derric Johnson Promoting Use of W.Y. Tools-Don Klob Youth Week-Robert Zuhl Reporting-Murray McKnight Finances-Bob French Departmentalization-James J. Harris

Throughout our business sessions we revised our W.Y. Constitution. The changes are listed on pages 9-13 of the minutes.

Saturday evening a service on Inter-Racial Evangelism was held. Also this was Wesleyan Youth Night. Robert McIntyre was the speaker using as his text, II Samuel 18:32—"And the King said unto Cushi, 'Is the young man Absalom safe?' And Cushi answered, 'The enemies of my lord the king, and all that rise against thee to do thee hurt, be as that young man is'." Following are some of Rev. McIntyre's statements:

"When people die we say, 'I wonder if he was a Christian,' but I wonder if we have ever said to him, 'Are you a Christian?'"

"The kind of person you are is the kind of person your son will become."

"Every father ought to consider his own son and daughter his main responsibility."

"The way David lived, it isn't a wonder that his son, Absalom, lived the way he did."

"In 1962 crimes increased 7% over 1961."

"In 1962 juvenile delinquency increased 9% over 1961."

"There is no reason to change something because we've always done it that way, nor is there any reason to do it that way because we've always done it that way."

"Are we doing all we can?"

"Will the church cry out in warning before it cries out in mourning?"
