JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Fairmount, Indiana

August 15, 1949

The One-Hundred-First Session of the Indiana Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened on the Camp-ground at 7:30 p. m., August the 15th.

the history of the text to describe the problem of today. It was stated that an Institution well founded upon the "Rock Christ Jesus," could face pagan philosophies and stand. He emphasized the fact that Marion College will stand.

Resolution—The following resolutions were presented and upon motion were adopted.

We recommend that the following resolutions be adopted:

I. Whereas, since during the year it may be desirable to sell or exchange properties belonging to the Conference or local churches, and it may be needful to sell or exchange such properties; therefore be it resolved, that the Board of Trustees be and are hereby authorized to execute all such deeds, and when ordered the President and Secretary of the Conference are empowered to sign and transfer such deeds. The Secretary of the Conference shall record the sale of such properties in the Journal after the words: "Indiana Yearly Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America has ordered the sale of the following."

II. Whereas, since during the year it may be desirable and necessary to borrow money and mortgage Conference Property; therefore be it resolved, that the Board of Trustees be and are hereby authorized to secure such loans, and the President and Secretary of the Conference are hereby empowered to sign all papers necessary to execute such loans. The Secretary of the Conference shall record in the Journal the transaction of said loan after the words: "Indiana Yearly Conference of the Wesleyan Meth-

odist Church of America has ordered the execution of the following loan."

Recommendation—The following recommendation was read:

1. The conferences of the Marion Area be asked to assist in raising funds for the erection of a men's dormitory to house a hundred men, at Marion College, the same to be known as the Williams Memorial Building.

2. Each conference be asked to set up a campaign committee composed of the conference president, the W. M. S. president, the W. Y. P. S. president, and the educational secretary.

3. The campaign be conducted on the basis of a personal solicitation in each conference of the Marion College Area.

Motion—It was moved that the above campaign plan recommended by the General Building Campaign Committee approved by the Local Board of Managers of Marion College be adopted. Motion was adopted.

Standing Rule—A motion prevailed that it be a Standing Rule of this Conference until revoked that, There shall be a January Preachers' and Workers' Convention held biennially in the four sections of the Conference. These conventions shall be held during the conference years in which the Marion College Area Ministers Conventions are not held. The Vice-President shall be responsible for planning and conducting such conventions. He may nominate and the Conference shall elect one man from each conference district who shall serve with him on the planning committee.

Resignation—Rev. E. L. Kierstead tendered his resignation as chairman of the Judiciary Committee. Resignation accepted.

Centennial Service Sunday, 2:00 p. m., August 21, 1949

The Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America gathered together to celebrate a century of work and progress Sunday afternoon, August 21, 1949.

The service was in charge of the Rev. E. L. Kierstead, the newly elected President of the Indiana Conference. The President stated that, "we are here to observe 100 years of service."

The congregational singing was conducted by Kenneth Knapp, the Camp Meeting Song Evangelist. He selected two inspiring hymns of the church "I Am Redeemed" and "Jesus Saves." These hymns were sung by 3,000 people whose hearts were in their singing. Mr. Knapp said, "after 100 years Jesus still saves."

The prayer of thanksgiving for the favors of God which have been upon us in the days of the past, was offered by the Rev. E. J. Pitts, a former Conference President.

A male quartette composed of Kenneth Knapp, Maynard McConn, Maxwell Enyeart, and Walter Titus brought a message in song.

The Rev. H. J. Logsdon, officiated in the receiving of a special offering. There was \$3,500.00 raised in cash and pledges for the improvements on the grounds at this time. On Wednesday evening of Conference \$7,000.00 was raised in cash and pledges. With the two offerings, the goal of the Camp Meeting Association which was \$10,000.00 was reached.

The new buildings completed on the Fairmount Campgrounds at the turn of the century are four in number, the Centennial Conference Office Building, Sanitation Buildings, one on the east and one on the west of the grounds, and the Fourteenth Dormitory.

The Rev. A. M. Jackson, retiring President of this year, offered prayer in behalf of the future of our Conference and churches.

"I Am Hiding In the Rock," was sung as a special song by Mr. Kenneth Knapp, the song evangelist of this camp.

The President of the Conference introduced the speaker of the hour Dr. F. R. Eddy, Publishing Agent, Syracuse, N. Y., and a member of this Conference. It was stated that Dr. Eddy has been a member of the Indiana Conference for 45 years.

Dr. F. R. Eddy, used as a background for his subject, "Whence We Came and Why We Are, What We Are," a text found in Habakkuk 3:2.

The life and brief history of John Wesley and the origin of Wesleyan Methodism was reviewed. It was shown that John Wesley's experience at Aldersgate was the beginning of a great revival that swept over England and influenced America.

John Wesley did not preach a new doctrine but changed the emphasis. The change was from orthodoxy, legalism, formalism and ritualism to evangelism. He went forth not to preach more doctrine but Salvation by Faith and in so doing all England was stirred.

Through Mr. Wesley's influence Francis Asbury came to America and began the work of evangelism. The ministers of Francis Asbury lived so intently in their ministry and fiery preaching that they lived on an average of ten years. When the early preachers began to be silenced for their preaching on slavery and pressure became so intense, it was here

at this point that Wesleyan Methodism was born. These preachers refused to be silenced.

Men were sent out, regardless of cost, to evangelize. Our beginning in Indiana in 1849 was as reformers. Our Church spent forty years of debate and that will never save men. The passion of the soul is not to debate, to prove, but to proclaim.

The first Conference was held at Westfield in October, 1849. The first church was organized at Vernon, Indiana. There were nine circuits and fourteen men received appointments.

Tribute was paid to the Rev. Eber Teter for bringing about the awakening and reviving of the spirit of evangelism in the Indiana Conference. The progress and growth of this Conference is definitely attributed to our message and evangelism. If ever we swing from the evangelistic emphasis we are lost.

Give us a fire baptized ministry

"Today the sun never goes down on Wesleyan Methodism"

These quotations and statements are taken from the Centennial address of the speaker, Dr. F. R. Eddy. The speaker had a message for the hour and delivered his soul.

It was a beautiful day, pleasant and cool. The audience had gathered together to celebrate the day of days on the Fairmount Campgrounds. We shall never again meet in this capacity but the Song of Victory will ever be the same.

One year ago the Conference elected the Rev. Garl Beaver, Dr. W. F. McConn, and Mr. John D. Williams a committee to prepare and plan this Centennial meeting.

A very fitting closing hymn entitled "A Charge To Keep I Have" was sung by the congregation.

The closing prayer was offered by the chairman of the program committee, the Rev. Garl Beaver.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

II. Pastoral Duties.

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

2. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee before the close of the fifth day of August.

A. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on special blanks furnished by the Conference.

B. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.

C. In compiling statistics report, all figures shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i. e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number VIII on benevolences alone to be expected and shall be reported exactly as paid.

3. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

4. The pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President and Vice-President, quarterly, on blanks furnished by the Conference.

5. This Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday School; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city; street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

6. No pastor whose total receipts are \$1500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$2000.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help to establish it. The church which he pastors should grant him such privileges without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice-President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.

8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor not later than ten days before the convening of Conference.

III. Churches.

1. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations, is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.

5. The Sunday School offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

IV. Conference.

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August fifteenth.

2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year.

3. The fiscal year begins August 1st and ends July 31st.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.

6. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.

7. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.

8. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion daily papers.

9. The Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

10. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.

11. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

12. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice-President \$50.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; the same to be paid from the Conference Mission and Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

13. The President of the Conference, and Vice-President shall be given each year a two weeks' vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.

14. When the churches, which have been placed in the hands of the President, decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.

15. "The Emergency Benefit Fund" shall be used only for the relief of the Ministers, or their widows, of the Conference in times of sickness, or death, or other needs of emergency character. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.

16. There shall be a January Preachers' and Workers' convention held biennially in the four sections of the Conference. These conventions shall be held during the years in which the Marion College Area Ministers' Conventions are not held. The Vice-President shall be responsible for planning and conducting such Conventions. He may nominate and the Conference shall elect one man from each Conference District who shall serve with him on the Planning Committee.

17. The Building Committee shall be elected by the Missionary Board except one member who shall be elected by the Conference.

V. Committees

1. The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.

4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

5. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

VI. Other Resolutions.

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriation, submit the following report:

We recommend the following appropriations:

Item I. That the Budget Apportionment be per member as follows: General Executive, 25 cents; Foreign Missions \$2.00; Home Missions, \$1.00; Education, \$1.50; Superannuate Pension Fund, \$1.50; Orphanage, 25 cents; Conference Expense Fund, \$2.75; Camp Meeting Expense, 75 cents; Emergency Benefit Fund, (To be disbursed at the discretion of the Conference Trustees), 25 cents; Conference Parsonage, 25 cents. That all church budget excepting that raised by the W. M. S., Y. M. W. B., W. Y. P. S., be sent to the Conference Treasurer, Rev. C. D. Crabill.

Item II. Superannuate Pension Plan

All who expect to participate in the Plan are required to pay a membership fee of \$25.00 each, and 1% of their total receipts from August 1, 1947, plus such interest on back assessments as may be determined by the General Pension Board. The above to apply only in the case of those eligible for membership on the above mentioned date. Those not so eligible on that date, shall pay the 1% assessment plus interest only from the date of their first eligibility for membership in the plan. All Pension budget and assessments and entrance fees shall be sent to the Conference Pension Treasurer. Name, C. D. Crabill, Address, 364 W. 13th St., Peru, Ind.

Item III. That the Conference Sunday School Apportionment be 10 cents per enrolled member in the main school as reported in the Conference minutes of the preceding year under "Total in Main School." Send all Sunday School Apportionment money to the Conference Treasurer, Rev. C. D. Crabill.

Item IV. That the price of the Conference Minutes shall be 35 cents per copy, with a minimum of one copy for every six members of the church; and should any deficit in this fund occur, that it be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

Item V. That the General W. Y. P. S. Dues be 50 cents per active member of the W. Y. P. S. This money to be sent to the Conference W. Y. P. S. treasurer, Rev. Layland Smith, 1706 S. Main St., Kokomo, Indiana.

Item VI. That the President shall have general supervision of the work of the Conference.

a. Each church shall be visited by one of the Conference officials during the year, and when possible for a Sunday service. He shall inquire as to the state of the church, and counsel and advise with the pastor, and he shall present the interest of the General and the Conference Work.

b. The Vice-President shall have direct supervision of the Conference Missionary work, subject to the counsel and approval of the Conference Missionary Board. He shall be responsible for the raising of Conference Missionary Funds, and he may secure assistance as he may deem necessary to successfully carry out the same.

c. We recommend that the Rally Day offering go to Conference Missions as recommended by the Conference Sunday School Board.

d. We further recommend that there be appointed by the Conference Missionary Board one man in each of the conference districts who shall assist the Vice-President in the carrying out of the Conference Missionary Work. It shall be his duty to inform the Vice-President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in his district and the Vice-President shall investigate the same.

Item VII. All Quarterly Meetings shall be arranged by the Pastor,

and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The Pastor shall report quarterly to the President and the Vice-President on blanks formulated by the President.

Item VIII. That the salary of the President be \$65.00 per week and that of the Vice-President be \$60.00 per week, the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work.

Item IX. The Vice-President shall receive \$30.00 a Month for Parsonage rent.

Item X. We recommend the following concerning the Indiana Wesleyan Messenger:

A. That the President and Vice-President constitute the Executive Committee of the Wesleyan Messenger.

B. That the Vice-President be the Editor.

C. That the Executive Committee be empowered to select some person to act as Business and Circulation Manager.

D. That the Executive Committee be authorized to employ an assistant as need demands to be mailing secretary for the Business Manager.

E. That the Various Departments which use the columns of the Wesleyan Messenger regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

Item XI. The President and Vice-President may employ secretarial help as needed, the same to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

Item XII. We recommend that the Rev. Eugene Kierstead former Vice-President receive \$200.00 in consideration for the extra service rendered during the last seven months.

Item XIII. We recommend that;

A. The President call a meeting of the Ministers in different parts of the conference.

B. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference. The President shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals and in general seek to correct the cause in not holding our gains.

C. All Pastors be required to attend the meeting for their District except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

I. We recommend that the petition of the North Liberty Circuit, requesting that the two churches, Star and Beaver Creek be made stations, be granted.

II. We recommend that the petition of the Hoopston Church requesting that they be permitted to unite with the Illinois Mission Conference, be granted.

III. We further recommend that the Illinois Mission Conference, be

given the privilege of establishing churches within the territory in Illinois, now belonging to the Indiana Conference.

STANDING RULES

1. The first session of the W. Y. P. S. Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of Conference week at one o'clock and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.

2. The executive council shall nominate the chairman and members of committees, their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.

3. All organized societies shall keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall include a classification of active and associate members and shall be revised at the close of each Conference year.

4. The Ways and Means Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the W. Y. P. S. conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations of the main Conference Body.

5. There shall be a Youth Camp of one Week duration and that date of the camp be set by the W. Y. P. S. Camp Meeting Committee.

6. No members of the executive council shall be a district president but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president.

7. The office of secretary and statistician be combined and that office be known as Conference Secretary.

8. All churches send their delegates' credentials and statistical report to the secretary by August 4.

9. The executive council of the W. Y. P. S. shall have complete charge of helping new works.

10. The local society president shall consult with the pastor when making out their annual W. Y. P. S. report to avoid inconsistencies in the same.

11. Two copies of the report of the Ways and Means Committee shall be mailed to each church and district within three weeks after the close of conference.

12. That special mention be made of all societies raising a full budget.

13. The executive committee of each local W. Y. P. S. should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.

14. All money raised by the local societies, other than local projects be sent to the conference W. Y. P. S. treasurer not later than August 4.
15. The manner of nominating District Officials shall be as follows:
 - a. The district at its last convention of the conference year shall nominate the district president, whose name shall be presented at the annual conference for election.
 - b. That the manner of nominating other district officials shall be by a Nominating Committee, composed of five members the chairman of which shall be a Pastor, who is vitally interested in young people's work. All members shall be from separate churches where possible. This committee shall be elected at the last rally of the year and their duties shall be to present nomination at the first rally after conference for the remaining officials. Two names for each office should be presented.
16. There shall be a missionary committee elected by each local society to be responsible for one missionary service each month.
17. The W. Y. P. S. Treasurer pay from the general fund each year the sum of twenty-five dollars for the expense of printing the minutes. And that the W. Y. P. S. Secretary co-operate with the Conference Secretaries in determining the number of pages used.
18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be seated in the conference.

Report No. 5**WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE**

We, your committee on Ways and Means, submit the following report:

- I. We recommend that each district co-operate with the following state program as to conventions:
 - a. At least four conventions one to be held quartely in each district, and that the churches be notified at least two weeks previously.
 - b. State convention at Campgrounds, May 30.
 - c. The following point system for district banner awards be adopted: local society president at rally, 5 points (if president is absent the vice-president being present shall receive the same number of points); Pastor present, 5 points; current number of Wesleyan Youths taken, 1 point each Subscription; an organized society, 10 points; for each 1% of the active society members present (to be based on the current number of members), 1 point; 1 point for every other person present; and for each mile traveled to the rally site, 1 point. The society with the highest total is to be the winner.
 - d. That the conference print and distribute to the local societies suitable blanks to implement the point system.

II. That either the state president or vice-president visit each district convention once during the year if possible and upon invitation of the district president.

III. We recommend:

- a. That there be held promotional conventions as soon as feasible after conference under the direction of the executive council.
- b. The purpose of these meetings shall be the general promotion of the conference work and initiation of new plans and goals.
- c. These conventions shall be officially composed of the district presidents, local society presidents, and pastors included in each section.
- d. These sections and their convention sites to be:
 1. District 1—2, Ft. Wayne, Plymouth meet at Warsaw.
 2. District 3—3—6, Bluffton, Warren, Fairmount meet at Huntington.
 3. District 4—5—5, Wabash, Kokomo, Lafayette meet at South Kokomo.
 4. District 7—7—8, Shelbyville, New Castle, Bakers Corner meet at Noblesville.

Finance

- I. That the Area President receive traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.
- II. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:
 - a. President—\$90.00
 - b. Vice-President—\$35.00
 - c. Secretary—\$35.00
 - d. Treasurer—\$50.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments, one on January 31, and the other July 31.
- III. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer be paid from the conference fund; and the desk and traveling expenses of the campmeeting committee be paid from the Youth Camp fund and that the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. (That traveling expenses be figured on the basis of five cents per mile)
- IV. That the budget for the coming year be as follows:
 - a. General dues, 50 cents per active member of local society.
 - b. Conference budget (based on church membership):
 - 20 cents, pioneer evangelism.
 - 20 cents, conference fund.
 - 20 cents, Youth Camp.

- c. Above funds should be sent in quarterly.
In as much as this is based on church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the society when necessary.
- V. That the executive council shall have power to appropriate money from the conference fund for the general promotion of the youth work.
- VI. That all offerings above the expenses of district conventions be sent to the conference treasurer to apply on pioneer evangelism, each district setting a definite goal toward which they shall work.
- VII. That we urge each local society to co-operate with the church in raising money for church extension and the use of the college loyalty fund chart.
- VIII. That all monies raised within the society for missions be forwarded to the conference treasurer for departmental credit, and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We the Committee on Resolutions humbly submit the following:

- A. Be it resolved that we give prayer and due recognition:
 - 1. To Almighty God for the progress, the victories, the blessings that are ours up to the present time.
 - 2. To the founders and promoters of Wesleyan Methodism, for 100 years of Christian heritage that is ours through the foresight, sacrifices, and the faith of our fathers.
- B. Be it resolved that we, the Wesleyan youth, will not slacken the pace, nor lessen the zeal in continuing the good fight of faith, but with "Holiness unto the Lord" as our slogan, may we meet the crises of the hour in our Church and the nation as well, fully equipped with the whole armour of God.
- C. We recommend to our local societies these methods of attack:
 - 1. Work for higher spiritual efficiency. Prov. 7:7, "I discerned

among the youths, a young man, void of understanding." We resolve that we will endeavor to reach all age levels with spiritual food. (Review Article V under local W. Y. P. S. Constitution.)

2. We resolve that we will help erase from the thinking of our youth any artificial separation of religion from every day living; that it is our duty to make the Gospel clear to a young mind using associations and methods on his level of thinking, that he might be "transformed by the renewing of his mind."
 - a. Use a positive psychology in dealing with an adolescent mind. Our Lord was a master teacher and He preferred the theory of the words "Do this," to that of "Thou shalt not."
 - b. Explain religious vernacular to the teen-age mind periodically. Give tangible definitions to such phrases as "the beauty of holiness" or "saved by the blood."
 - c. Don't ignore the delinquency problem that the home and the school thrusts upon the Church. Teach democracy in our societies by associating courtesy, unselfishness, good morals, freedom and the pursuit of happiness with Christ, when He said, "as ye would that men should do to you, do ye also to them likewise."
 - d. Let us stress the importance of nurturing the new-born babes in Christ by following up our evangelistic campaigns with a united effort on the part of our societies to win the friendship and help establish the soul.
3. Work for higher efficiency in service.
 - a. Keep step with the newly organized commission on Child Evangelism. We recommend new efforts to be supervised by the societies in this field. Let us remember that the slogan "Give me a child until he is seven" is not idle thinking.
 - b. The society should be a counseling bar for young adults, the home and the church builders of our group.
 - c. Counter-attack the lures of the world by balancing the spiritual program with social and recreational activities. (Review Article IV, clause 7 of local society By-Laws) We are endeavoring to capture the youth's interest, desires, thought life and ultimately his soul.
 - d. Exploit the material of the Wesleyan Youth magazine in our programs. This will boost subscription sales.

- e. We recommend the society sending two or more teen-agers (preferably non-Wesleyan background) to the Youth Camp by paying their enrollment fee.
- f. Finally let us be faithful—knowing that two talents will be awarded as much as five if we are found faithful.

Regular order was resumed. The minutes were read and approved. 28 presidents and 47 delegates responded to the roll call.

**RESOLUTIONS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND STANDING
