## Standing Resolutions

- The Conference President shall in his quarterly meeting see that adequate insurance is carried by each church on its property.
- 2. The pastor's Statistical Report must be passed by the Conference Treasurer and the Committee on Character, and must be presented to the Statistical Committee before being read to the Conference body.
- 3. The Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the Conference year which shall be a standing committee of five members with the Conference President as member ex-officio. This Committee shall nominate the chairman and members of committees and the third member of the Publications Committee. Each committee on this report shall be presented to the conference body separately and time allowed for nominations from the floor.
- 4. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close at midnight, June 30, and that the Conference Treasurer close his books effective midnight, July 7, and that all statistical reports are to be sent in by that date to the Conference Treasurer, and he in turn send them to the statistical chairman. All money received after that date is to be applied to a budget item on the following year. The Conference Treasurer of the Missionary Society, Wesleyan Youth and Y. M. W. B. send a report immediately after their books close to the Conference Treasurer, listing amount paid on each budget item from each church.
- 5. The Conference shall convene the first Monday night of August each year.
- 6. The Conference Trustees shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location and Building.
- 7. All Ministers and Delegates attending the entire annual conference and camp are to be given rooms in preference to those not active in conference business.
- 8. No divorced person who has been remarried shall be ordained in the Kentucky Conference.
- 9. All Conference officials shall assume office in the next meeting following the election.
- 10. No charge shall call a pastor or a supply from other conferences or denominations as long as there are available ministers in our conference qualified for the work. The Conference President, after having exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other conferences or denominations, shall immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, which shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report their findings to the President, after which appointments may be made.

- 11. The vote on the pastor shall be taken by ballot the first week in June unless special permission is granted by the Conference President and his advisory board for another date; said ballots are to be prepared by the clerk and the results of the vote shall be reported at once to the Conference President.
- 12. Let all ministers have their membership transferred to their new appointment, and the Ways and Means Committee shall figure Budget Apportionment after the final reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee.
- 13. Since television in its present state is so radically demoralizing in its range, be it resolved that Kentucky Conference register its disapproval of anyone within the conference endorsing or owning a television set. Furthermore, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference will not license preachers or workers, ordain elders or station ministers who own or have a television set in their possession.
- 14. The Conference President and the Conference Secretary shall be members of the Publications Committee ex-officio.
- 15. A standing Committee on Ways and Means shall be elected at the regular conference election, of which the Conference President shall be a member ex-officio.
- 16. Pastors shall read to their congregations the General and Special rules and instructions of the Discipline, the Standing Resolutions of the Conference, the report of the Committee on Moral Reform, and shall urge same to familiarize themselves with the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.
- 17. Every preacher borrowing a book from the Conference library may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty five cents for the month and five cents for every day over the month.
- 18. In this age when immodesty and worldliness are subtily creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister of ours earnestly contend for, and faithfully preach the entire word of God without fear or favor of man. Let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the church of her glory and preachers of the divine anointing.
- 19. It is hereby resolved and ordered by the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in session assembled this 6th day of August, 1958: That the Trustees of said conference are hereby fully empowered to buy, sell, convey, mortgage or lease property for, or on behalf of said conference, and to sign notes and execute mortgages for said purpose on behalf of said Conference, provided however, that between the sessions of the Kentucky Conference, a majority of the Mission Board, as the designated Board of Managers of the said Kentucky Conference, shall signify their agreement therewith by a special resolution and order authorizing each and every transaction.

#### Report No. 3

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Conference and Friends:

Honor, praise and glory be to the Blessed Trinity under whose favor we meet for another annual conference.

As a Conference we implore divine help for our churches, our pastors and laymen and for the conference gathering. We recognize as ministers that we are the candles of the churches we serve. As His light-bearers God grant us a fresh baptism of the Holy Ghost and divine love; the glorious light of His Word and spiritual insight into all truth; strong convictions in separation from the world along lines of dress and jewelry; disapproval of TV; abstinence from unwholesome radio programs; rejection of the flood of worldly, anti-religious and spurious religious literature. As His stewards we are to conserve and wisely invest our time and earthly store, and seek first of all His glory, personal holiness, and the salvation of lost souls. To this end may He help us to give ourselves to eternal vigilance, to persistent prevailing prayer and intercession for a revival among us that will produce tears, penitence and the fruits of the Holy Spirit. Then may He help us as evangels to go everywhere winning the lost. Only a mighty visitation of God will spare the Church of today and turn aside the flood gates of hell now embroiling the Church in dissensions and side-tracking us from the main line of soul winning. The nations of the world are speeding toward a bloody haulocast that may obliterate civilization. But Christ has the answer. We are His earthly ambassadors. So let us regard our calling as the highest life and labor this side of heaven.

#### State of the Conference

Steady material progress has been made over the conference this year. Atwood church has finished off a large bedroom and a bathroom on the second floor of their parsonage. Bloomfield has done repair and redecoration work on their church, arranging the doors in the rear of the church. Brooksburg has installed a furnace in the parsonage. Highland Park has plans to build a needed addition to their parsonage. Brazil pioneer work has purchased a parsonage and covered it with shingles. Franklin Avenue pioneer church has purchased a parsonage, pews, redecorated and improved Sunday school rooms. Madison has finished off an additional room in the basement for a youth room. The Milan church has installed a panelled ceiling greatly aiding the acoustics. Mt. Calvary church has done a good job of interior decorating with panelled walls and acoustical ceiling. Zion has installed a furnace in a new room under the church, much to the comfort of the congregation in the winter. New Albany has finished off some excellent Sunday school rooms in their basement. New Shiloh has obtained pews and done some finish work and was dedicated in January. Sale Avenue has built practically a new building with basement, heating plant and Sunday school rooms, valued at \$25,000 or more, yet at less than half this in outlay of money. Whitehall has improved the parsonage extensively.

The spiritual condition is most important and we are thankful for the many good revival meetings this year. Yet there is much more to be done than to hold protracted meetings, warming people over a bit and reporting the same seekers over and over again. We need revivals that will result in new converts, changed homes, stirred communities and rectified lives that will bring shouts to new born souls and glory to the saints and conviction to the sinner. May this come as we pray and prevail with God.

Pioneer fields are open for the Kentucky Conference. At least a dozen inquiries or contacts have come or have been made this year, some coming from Illinois, others from Indiana and at least five from Kentucky. We trust that through the new pioneer calendar plan we shall do our best this year to push out into the new fields.

It is heartening to welcome to our midst our brethren coming to us from the Missionary Bands of the World and the six churches or preaching points, four of them organized, another being a preaching point and another a building from which we hope to launch a pioneer effort soon. The new members will add between 50 and 75 to our membership. We welcome them all as Wesleyans who have the same doctrines and experiences as we do.

#### President's Activities

This year the President has held 33 quarterly or business meetings, preached 128 times, attended numerous conference board meetings, several pastor's pioneer rallies, four Marion College Board Meetings and a number of committee meetings on this Board, various revival meetings, the Ministerial Institute, conducted three prayer meetings, taught Sunday school seven times, as well as cared for his desk work and edited the Messenger.

#### COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

We urge the re-emphasizing of our Bible teachings of regeneration, sanctification and separation. The imminent return of our Lord is the greatest Biblical argument for a pure, unselfish, devoted, unworldly, active life of service.

Let it therefore be resolved that we vigorously protest against liquor and similar vices by every means possible, including a refusal to patronize merchants who handle the same.

We shall likewise register our opposition to nudity and the wholesale prostitution existing in the Armed Forces and National life by exalting a virtuous life and instructing our young people and parents.

Be it resolved that all Christian parents seek to establish and maintain the family altar, and to create a spiritual home atmosphere, in an effort to guard our household against insidious invasions of evil influences, and to save them for God and our church. Since dancing has become so prevalent in our public school systems, and since our youth are faced with a problem in not participating, and since our conference disapproves participation in such, we recommend that each pastor take a firm stand against dancing, and instruct the parents and young people of his church accordingly.

Be it resolved that we strongly oppose the evils of our day such as television, worldly conformity in dress, make-up, nudity, mixed bathing, divorce, questionable practices in our public schools, the use of tobacco, dope such as marijuana and heroin, etc.

Motion prevailed to engage the Louisville Chemical Co. to treat the Franklin Ave. Church for termites for a cost of \$140.00, the same to be taken from the first Sunday offering fund. Agreed also to contract for the annual inspection and service.

#### MISSION BOARD RESOLUTIONS

- September 9, 1957 signed resolution jointly with conference trustees to purchase cottage on the campground for use of the conference president.
- September 25, 1957 signed resolution authorizing conference trustees to purchase a house at 2208 Briargate, Pleasure Ridge Park, as a parsonage for the Franklin Avenue pioneer church and for said trustees to sign notes and mortgage pursuant thereto.
- December 10, 1957 signed resolution authorizing conference trustees to sign deed for highway right of way through property in Russell County, Ky., held by said trustees.
- December 17, 1957 signed resolution authorizing conference trustees to purchase a house at 915 South Leavitt Street, Brazil, Indiana for a parsonage for the Brazil pioneer work and for said trustees to sign mortgage and notes pursuant thereto.

- 10. Winchester District; Lexington, Winchester and mountain work.
- II. Each District shall have a chairman nominated by the Mission Board, approved by the Conference, provided the district or conference may nominate others from the floor. District chairmen shall constitute a Mission Council for the Mission Board and the Chairman shall report to the Conference President monthly on pioneer income from each church in his district.

#### III. Calendar System

- 1. A pioneer calendar shall be provided by the Mission Board for a Sunday in September chosen as Pioneer Sunday; at which time pledges shall be taken in each church to be paid in 10 monthly payments.
  - 2. A pioneer secretary appointed by each local church shall announce, or have announced, on the second Sunday of each month the pledge collection on the third Sunday, and shall collect and tabulate opposite each pledge the monthly contribution, then have church treasurer remit total collected each month to Conference Treasurer.
  - 3. Pioneer works may be granted permission by the Mission Board to use their money locally as may be needed.
  - 4. Previous to Pioneer Sunday there shall be a rally of the pastors in each district presided over by the Conference President or another designated by the Mission Board, when goals for each church may be suggested.
- IV. The first Sunday of the month Sunday School offering in full shall be remitted monthly by each Sunday School treasurer for much needed conference pioneer work.

#### V. Field and Goals.

- 1. Money shall be saved for centers of population, to be invested in property or to employ men of pioneer ability.
- 2. We urge a goal of \$6,000 this year for paying off Glasgow and toward starting another pioneer work.

#### VI. Revolving Fund.

This fund shall be increased by gifts, and at the discretion of the Mission Board from regular pioneer funds not to exceed \$500 per year.

#### VII. Mother Church.

We urge the larger churches to cooperate with the Mission Board in starting a prayer meeting or a Sunday School in a new section, as well as in tithing their church tithes and offerings for mothering a new work under the Mission Board.

We suggest and urge cooperation of the Conference W. M. S., and the Youth Executive Council with the Mission Council and

#### Report No. 11

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

#### Item I. Budget.

- 1. We recommend that this conference pay General Budget Assessment, General Wesleyan Youth Budget of \$1.50 per member; but that in accordance with the action of the Board of Administration all newly organized churches and organized missions be exempt from the General Budget the first two years: futhermore, that they be exempt from the Conference Budget the first year and take free will offerings for Conference Budget the second year.
- 2. We recommend that our churches pay Conference Budget as follows: Conference Work Fund —\$.75; Conference Entertainment —\$1.00 per member; Camp Meeting Fund —\$1.00; Conference Parsonage Fund —\$.50 per member; Conference President's Salary —\$1.00 per member; and an amount equal to 10% of pastor's cash salary; President's Cottage —\$.50 per member less amount paid in 57-58 Conference year; Minister's Group Insurance Fund \$.50 per member; and that the Sunday School offering for the first Sunday of each month be sent to the Conference Treasurer for Pioneer Evangelism. All budget money shall be sent in monthly.

#### Item II. Pastor.

- 1. Each pastor shall encourage the Storehouse Plan of Tithing.
- 2. All Pastors shall endorse and encourage membership in the Church Extension Card Call Plan.
- 3. The pastoral year shall end immediately following the last Sunday of Camp and the church that he is serving shall pay his salary until that time.
- 4. All churches shall provide for their pastors suitable living quarters, all their utilities, fill their obligation by monthly donations and allow him two weeks vacation with pay, and definitely arrange with the pastor the number of revivals he is allowed to conduct.
- 5. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church.

#### Item III. Conference President.

1. The Conference President shall be paid \$75.00 per week.

house rent, utilities, desk expense, traveling expenses at 7 cents per mile in connection with conference work and shall be allowed two weeks vacation with pay.

- 2. The Conference President shall meet the Board of Stewards of all churches paying less than \$1,000 salary and adjust the finances accordingly.
- 3. Each church shall hold four quarterly meetings annually; one to be held by the Conference President at his convenience and three to be arranged by the pastor. These quarterly meetings are to be held the first weeks of October, January, April and July.
- 4. The Conference President shall give one Sunday preaching service to each church annually and shall give as much time as possible to supervising the pioneer works and the smaller churches.

#### Item IV. Miscellaneous

- 1. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary shall each be paid \$75.00 a year.
- 2. All superannuated ministers of our conference shall be entertained entirely free all during camp.
- 3. We recommend that a certain amount of the surplus in the Conference President's Fund be transferred to the Pioneer Evangelism Fund by the Mission Board.
- 4. Each active church member shall be encouraged to become an honorary member of Wesleyan Youth with annual dues of \$1.00.

#### Report No 14

#### REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

Statistically the year's records do not show much change, certainly not the healthy increase that we would like to see. This condition should be a matter of self examination for us all. Why do we come to Conference year after year with reports little different from the previous year? Of course we understand that in some spots there is not much change in population, but in the city and town areas the increase of population is rapidly increasing, yet many people are unreached largely because we failed to put forth sufficient effort to win them.

We are glad to see an increase in the number on the Cradle Roll, but we deplore the fact that only twelve schools have Cradle Rolls. Then again only two Home Departments are reported. Please understand that we press the needs for more of these departments not merely to add numbers but to serve the needy lonely old people and to win them and the parents of small children to Christ. We need to tend the whole flock, to search out the neglected ones who are so often passed by unnoticed. Our Lord Jesus in His earthly ministry so often ministered to the very ones His disciples would have passed by. He is the one we are to follow and lift up.

Our common excuse, we "don't have time," applies generally because we don't take time. We let things of lesser importance crowd out the spiritual ministries that would "save both thyself and those that hear thee."

We had just four Vacation Bible Schools and should have fifteen. We surely can do better next year in this wonderful field of our work.

The total receipts in money went above any previous year to a total of eleven thousand dollars, of which \$3,000 went to the various benevolent causes, to Foreign Missions \$101.00 contributed by six schools, of which Means gave \$37.00, Home Missions \$136.00 given by three Sunday Schools. This reveals the truth that there is need for common emphasis and instruction in missionary giving in all of our schools. The Thanksgiving Offering was \$456 and to the Connectional Sunday School work was given \$380.00. However the percentage of benevolences as compared to funds used for supplies is about 27% which is very commendable, yet our goal should be as much for others as for ourselves. We believe that pastors and superintendents by more frequent presentation of missionary programs and materials can bring into the lives of their schools a better understanding of missionary work and enlist them for larger service in the evangelization of the world, in obedience to our Lord's command. Mt. 28:19, 20.

### Report No. 5

### WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means, wish to make the following recommendations:

### I. Conference

- a. The W. Y. President shall attend one rally in each district during the year and each district shall bear the traveling expenses at the rate of five (5) cents per mile.
- b. We recommend that the pioneer project for this year be the Brazil Pioneer Work in cooperation with the Conference Mission Board.
- c. We recommend that the W. Y. Executive Committee make plans to raise funds for the Youth Missionary Building.
- d. We recommend that the W. Y. Executive Committee continue a quarterly Youth Bulletin, to be sent to the young people of the conference.
- e. We recommend that a conference wide Youth Rally be held Friday night following the Annual Conference and Saturday be known as Youth Day at which time the Youth Conference will convene.
- f. We recommend that the following committees be elected as standing Committees: Ways and Means Committee, Resolutions Committee, Statistical Committee, and the Auditing Committee.
- g. We recommend that the conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the conference year which is to be a standing committee of five members with the Youth Conference President and secretary as members ex-officio. This committee shall nominate the chairman and members of the standing committees.

#### II. District

- a. We recommend that the districts be set up the same as the Mission Board.
- b. We recommend that each district have at least three rallies during the year and that we use our Young People in variety of programs for these rallies rather than always securing an outside speaker.

  III. Local
- a. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close June 30.

### IV. Finances

a. We recommend that each local raise the amount of one dollar and a half (\$1.50) per active member for the General W. Y. Program and that those churches not having an organized local take an offering for the General Youth Program.

b. We recommend that each local raise the amount of fifty (50)

cents per active member for the Conference Expense Fund.

c. We recommend that each local raise the amount of fifty (50): cents per active member for Pioneer Evangelism to be used for our Pioneer Projects.

d. We recommend that each local raise the amount of fifty (50)

cents per active member for the Youth Camp Fund.

- e. We recommend that each local raise the amount of ten (10) cents per active member to subsidize the expenses of the Youth Bulletin.
- f. We recommend that each active member be encouraged to become an honorary member of the Wesleyan Youth, with dues at one (1) dollar per member.
- g. We recommend that the Executive Committee shall have the power to appropriate the Youth money for the promotion of the General and Conference work.
- h. We recommend that \$10.00 be raised in each Louisville District Rally and \$5.00 in each of the other District Rallies the same to be forwarded to the Youth Treasurer quarterly and that \$150.00 of this fund be disbursed for the support of the Ellis child in Africa.

- k. We recommend that all money be forwarded quarterly to the Conference W. Y. Treasurer, Phyllis Morgan. The conference W. Y. Treasurer's books close July 16.
