The Rochester Yearly Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America held its eighth session at Seneca Falls, Seneca C^o N. Y. Commencing on Wednesday April 28th 1852.



Luther Lee was appointed a committee on reforms; who presented the following report, which was adopted.

The committee to whom was referred the general subject of reforms beg leave to report that they recommend to the conference the adoption of the following Resolutions

On Slavery.

Resolved, That American Slavery, the foundation principle of which is the assumption of the right of property in man human beings, had its origin in man-stealing, and can be perpetuated [insert: only] by repeating the process of stealing in the case of every new generation; for as all men are created equal, and endowed by their Creator with the inalienable right of liberty, to claim and hold the offspring of stolen persons, is no less man-stealing than was the act of stealing the first of the enslaved race, and that it is an invasion of the prerogatives of God, an assumption of a right to, and a controll [sic] over men which is inconsistent with their obligations as subjects of God's moral government, and therefore a violation of the divine law, and an outrage upon all the most sacred rights of humanity, especially the right to obey God; and that therefore, slaveholding is and ever must be a sin under all circumstances

The Fugitive Slave Law

Resolved, That as slavery is a violation of the law of God, a sin, and involves the crime of man stealing, all slaves are under obligations as strong as those which hold them in allegiance to the throne of God, to escape from bondge [sic] whenever they find it within their power to do, and for a slave to escape from his master is as justifiable as for an undoubted owner to take possession of his stolen property, and to assist a slave to escape is as justifiable as to assist a man to obtain possession of his horse a stolen horse, and is more important in proportion as a man is better than a horse; and therefore the Fugitive Slave Law, so called, is a violation of the law of God, and of the most sacred rights of humanity, that it is false in principle, wicked in its design, cruel in its operations, the crime of its authors and abettors, the foulest blot on our statute books, the infamy of this nation, and the disgrace of this age, and that no man can execute or obey it without sinning against God and man, and as we hold ourselves bound to obey God and to injure no man, we cannot and will not assist to execute it or obey it.

Temperance.

Resolved, That Intemperance is a great and fearful evil; involving every crime against God and man, that it is the certain result of what is termed moderate drinking, and can never be prevented while the practice of using intoxicating drinks as a beverage is continued in community, and that the habit of drinking is not likely to be discontinued so

long as men are authorized by law to vend intoxicating drinks as a beverage or are permitted to vend them without license, and therefore the traffic is chargable [sic] with all the crimes of drunkenness and ought to be suppressed by prohibitory law; that we can see no reason why we should talk, lecture, preach, pray, and sing for temperance, and vote for rum, and that it is inconsistent and profane to pray God to give us good rulers and good laws while we make bad ones for

ourselves; therefore we, will do all we reasonably can to secure the enactment of the Main [sic] Law in this State.

Moral Purity.

Resolved, That Licentiousness is a crime against which God, in his word, has distinctly directed the heaviest thunders of his the divine law, and that it is most destructive to social order and human happiness, and that it should be made the subject of proper, prudent and earnest pulpit rebuke as all other crimes; and that we will do all we an to create a healthy moral sentiment on the subject until the libertine and impure shall be excluded from good society, beyond what may be involved in all proper efforts to reform them.

<u>War</u>.

Resolved, That the Gospel of Jesus Christ is opposed to all forms of war, that every war is the crime of the nation or people that wage it that every battle is a blood stained blot that every victory is a loss, and that we will do all in our power to oppose war, and to promote [insert: the principles of] peace, until the time shall come, in which we have good hope, when men shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks, and learn war no more.

The Conference voted to hold its next session at Penn Yan Yates Co. N. Y. commencing on the fourth Wednesday in April 1853. At 9 o'clock A.M.

Conference appointed M. Q. M[©]Farland agent [insert: for] to for the Michgan [sic] University.

Resolved, That we recommend the patronage of the Western Evangelist so far as may not conflict with the circulation of the True Wesleyan.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Conference be tendered to the friends of Seneca Falls and its vicinity, for their hospitality extended to the members of this Conference during its present session.

The committee on pastorial [sic] relations presented their final Report which was unanimously adopted. See Page. 22 & 23

Whereas Rev C. Prindle has accepted an appointment in the Michigan Wesleyan University as Professor of Theology there by supplying important facilities for the education and elevation of the Ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Connect – Therefore Resolved, That we recommend that each charge in the Conference shall life a public collection at each appointment in said charge for the support of said Theological department of the University, in October next.
