Standing Rules

1. Visiting Ministers:

All visiting ministers of our own denomination and those of other denominations who hold the Bible to be the very Word of God and the final authority in faith and practice are invited to honorary seats in this conference.

2. Date of Conference:

The annual sessions of the conference shall convene on the Chambers Campground at 1:30 p.m. the last Tuesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Tuesday after the General Conference convenes. The forenoon meetings shall convene at 8:30 and adjourn at 10:45. The afternoon meetings shall convene at 1:30 and adjourn by vote. The seven rows of seats in the front of the tabernacle, and the platform, shall comprise the bar of the conference.

3. Examinations:

Examinations shall be in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than two weeks before the opening of the conference session.

4. Loans:

Any and all conference loans shall be subject to the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

5. Procedure:

The daily order of business shall be: 1. Hymn, 2. Roll Call, 3. Devotions, 4. Reading of Minutes, 5. Appointment of Committees, 6. Report of Committees, 7. Miscellaneous Business, 8. Passage of Characters.

The roll call and the reading of the Minutes shall be heard only at the first session of each day.

6. Taking of Pastoral Vote:

To obtain uniformity it is recommended that the Pastoral Vote be taken on each charge during the third full week in April, or during the following week if Easter falls during the third week. The Pastoral Vote shall be taken on prepared official ballots for this purpose.

7. Pay for Officials:

The Secretary and the Treasurer of the conference shall receive \$75.00 each annually.

8. Statistician:

The conference shall elect a statistician, whose term of office shall expire at the close of the next session of the Annual Conference. He shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee.

9. Closing of Records:

Each local church of the conference shall close its financial and other records for the conference year, May 31. The statistical report with all cash and receipts must be sent to the Conference Treasurer by June 10. Any money sent after that date will be applied on the next year.

10. Reporting of Statistics:

We authorize the use of the abbreviated report blanks.

11. Reports:

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society and the report of the Wesleyan Youth shall be printed in the conference minutes.

12. Ex-officio Members:

(a) The President of the conference and the President of Wesleyan Youth shall be ex-officio members of the Camp Meeting Committee.

(b) The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman and the President

of the Woman's Missionary Society shall be an ex-officio member of the Missionary Board.

- (c) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of the conference shall be ex-officio member of the Nominating Committee.
- (d) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of Evangelism shall be member ex-officio of the Committee on Evangelism.

13. Sale of Properties:

All money coming to the conference from the sale of church and parsonage property shall become a part of the Church Extension Fund.

14. Committee on Location:

The Board of Trustees shall choose three of their own number to constitute a Committee on Building Location. They shall study all proposed building projects and report their findings to the Board of Trustees. The names of the committee shall be printed in the minutes.

15. Editing of Minutes:

The Secretary of the conference is authorized to edit the minutes.

16. Election of Camp Meeting Chairman:

At the time of the election of conference officers, the conference shall elect by ballot from among the elders the chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee.

17. Election of Conference Officers:

All conference officers shall be elected by ballot or after nominations by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. (See list of officers.)

18. Conference Policy:

- (a) Each church shall grant its pastor at least two weeks vacation each year, with pay; and the church shall furnish the supply.
- (b) Each church shall grant its pastor the privilege of a two week revival meeting away from his pulpit each year, and the pastor shall pay his supply.
- (c) It is understood that the pastor shall have one day each week for rest and recreation. Accumulation of days shall not exceed three days.
- (d) Each church shall furnish an adequate heating system (preferably a central heating system); and a kitchen range for the parsonage as soon as possible.
- (e) Each church shall furnish shades or venetian blinds, draw-drapes, curtain rods and fixtures for the parsonage.
- (f) The church shall release the pastor for attendance at Conference and Camp including both Sundays and shall furnish the supply.
- (g) Each church shall encourage and plan for the pastor to attend all Conference gatherings (Ministerial Fellowships, District meetings, work bees, etc.). This is an important part of the Conference work.
- (h) The church shall encourage the pastor to attend the Annual Ministerial Refresher Course at Houghton each year and shall make this possible by providing for the expense for the same or as much of that expense as possible.
- (i) When a church anticipates changing pastors and invites a minister to candidate it shall provide the expense for such a trip.
- (j) When a church changes pastors it shall pay the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

19. Apportionment of Budget:

- (a) The Budget Apportionment Committee shall apportion budget to all members-in-full, regardless of age.
- (b) The Onondaga Reservation charge shall be assigned only the denominational budget.
- (c) A newly organized church shall be exempt from Conference budget the first year following its organization and only one-half the conference budget assigned

the second conference year following its organization, after which it may be assigned all items of budget in full as usual.

20. Course of Study:

Persons recommended to study or to travel under the direction of the conference shall appear personally before the Committee on Itinerary and Orders before they are accepted and annually thereafter or communicate with the committee so long as they are continued. If they fail to do this for two successive years, they shall be returned to their quarterly conference.

21. Ministerial Institute:

The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee to plan the Ministerial Institute. The three district chairmen shall complete the committee. This committee shall arrange for the Institute following the next annual session of the conference.

22. Delegates' Credentials:

It shall be the duty of the pastor not later than one week before the next annual session of the conference to forward to the Secretary of the conference, who is a Committee on Credentials, the credentials of the delegate(s) and the alternate delegate(s) from his charge.

23. Audits:

The books of the Treasurer of the conference and of other custodians of conference funds shall be audited by an accountant or recognized bookkeeper approved by the President and his Advisory Board. This shall be done prior to the convening of the annual session of the conference, and a certified copy shall be furnished the President.

24. Defining Pioneer Work:

In the interim between conference sessions the Missionary Board is authorized to interpret what shall be considered a pioneer or extension work. In the event of the purchase of property, the Missionary Board may make recommendations to the Board of Trustees.

25. Offerings for Extension Work:

The third Sunday of the second month of each quarter is recommended as the time for taking the Sunday school offering for extension work.

26. Bible Study Quarter:

During the first quarter of each calendar year, which is designated as Bible Study Quarter, each church shall conduct a Bible study program. Plans for this work shall be offered each year by the President and the Bible Study Committee.

27. Committee on Orders of the Day:

The President and his Advisory Board shall constitute a committee on Orders of the Day. They shall plan the daily schedule of the conference and shall prepare a printed agenda. The following shall be the order of the evening services: Tuesday, a Sunday school rally; Wednesday, Church Extension; Thursday, Missions; Friday, the Ordination Service.

Daily Proceedings

First Day — Tuesday Afternoon

The Rochester Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the call of the Chair for its 116th Annual Session on the Chambers Camp-ground at 2:00 p. m., on Tuesday, June 28, 1960. The Secretary of the Committee on Bible Study made an oral report and asked for instructions as to what the Conference desired. A motion was passed that the report be accepted.

Thirteen pastors present indicated their willingness to use materials presented by the Bible Study Committee.

Rev. I. Leslie Conley, Secretary of Men's Fellowship, reported orally urging that pastors give the Men's Fellowship a try. The report was accepted by vote.

A motion to adjourn was presented.

Second Day — Wednesday Morning

Jelliff, Robert Evans, Grace Russell, and Mary Crandall.

Rev. and Mrs. Gerald MacKinnon were invited to be seated within the bar of the conference.

Rev. Stanley Lawrence gave his pastoral report.

Order of the Day — The Conference President's Report.

The Vice President, Rev. James E. Bence, took the chair. The Annual Report and Official Acts of the Conference President, Dr. David A. Rees, were given and adopted by vote. The motion was amended to include "with appreciation".

The Courtesy Committee reported. Dr. Claude A. Ries, Chairman of the Division of Bible & Christian Education of Houghton College, and Dr. Bert Hall, Acting Dean of Houghton College gave a testimony.

We were adjourned by limitation of time.

Second Day — Wednesday Afternoon

An opening hymn, "It is Joy Unspeakable", was sung. The Conference President called the session to order. Rev. Gerald MacKinnon conducted devotions.

Item No. 1 was adopted with 47 voting "yes" and 4 voting "no". Item No 2 was adopted. Item No. 3 was adopted. Item No. 4 was adopted. Item No. 5 was adopted. Item No. 6 was adopted. Item No. 7 was adopted. (See Report No. 9)

Third Day — Thursday Forenoon

The Conference was called to order by the President. Rev. Roger Rounds led in a hymn. The roll was called. Donald Barber conducted devotions.

Order of the Day — The election of Conference Officers.

Motion carried that our General Superintendent, Rev. B. H. Phaup, preside during the election of the President and Vice President, and that then the President of the Conference preside for the rest of the election.

The Committee on Examination of Character gave a partial report. The report was received which included the following names: Robert Wilhelm, C. B. Newbury, Richard Brown, Harold Kingdon, Wesley B. Nussey, William W. Turverey, I. Leslie Conley, James E. Bence, Roger Rider, John Edling, Gerald F. Wright, John Crandall, James Frase, William Woughter, Royal Woodhead, Gerald H. Jack.

The following officers of the Conference were elected by ballot:

It was voted that we adjourn.

Fourth Day — Friday Afternoon

The Conference was called to order by the Vice President, Rev. James E. Bence. Rev. Gerald F. Wright, Sr., led us in the singing of "There is a Fountain Filled with Blood." Gerald Wright, Jr. led devotions.

The Finance Committee made its final report. It was approved by vote. (See Report No. 12).

The Report of the Statistical Committee was adopted. (See Report No. 18)

The Report of the Sunday School Secretary was adopted and the financial report referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 13).

The following pastors reported: John Crandall, Royal S. Woodhead, Harold Kingdon.

The Treasurer's Report of the Wesleyan Youth was read and referred to the Auditing Committee.

The President resumed the Chair.

The report of the Missionary Board was adopted. (See Report No. 17)

Report of the Pastoral Relations Committee was read by Mrs. Norma Button and corrected by consent. It was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 14) It was moved and seconded that the Old Superannuated Fund be transferred to the General Fund of the Conference. Report No. 5**REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT**

To the members of the Rochester Conference gathered on the Chambers Campground for the 116th Annual Session:

Greetings in the precious name of the Master. How rapidly the year has gone by and we are again, through His providence, privileged to assemble for another Annual Conference Session. In the past reports we have called attention to the almost constant crisis which confronted us as a nation and certainly this year is no exception; one could say without exaggeration it has been actually worse and yet how thankful we are that the differences and difficulties of the nations are still being negotiated around the peace table and at various levels of diplomacy rather than endeavoring to settle them by strategy being planned by opposing commanders on the field of battle. In the realm of the spiritual and moral, Satan seems to have his forces deployed not only around the world geographically but also into all walks and phases of life reaching all ages in all areas of activity. So often his forces are triumphant and the future is not bright but we are reminded again "If God be for us who can be against us", and we recall the promise of the Master "All authority — all power of rule — in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Go then and make disciples of all nations . . . and lo, I am with you all the days, perpetually, uniformly and on every occasion to the very close and consumation of the age." Thus let us take courage and gird for the future with determination and will for the advancement of the Master and His cause. To this end let us as individuals and as a Conference re-dedicate ourselves.

As we gather for another Annual Conference it brings us to a time of accounting of our stewardship for the past year. We believe the records and reports will show that it has been a good year in all phases of the work and one of real progress; especially do we feel it has been a good year spiritually for which we praise Him!

It has been one of progress in church expansion by way of providing more adequate and attractive facilities for worship, Sunday School and Youth activities. The dedication services of the two excellent Educational units at Canisteo and Elmira and the dedication of the excellent new parsonage at Bentley Creek were very happy occasions for pastors and congregations and will serve to provide much needed facilities for the churches and pastor as well as a real asset in their respective communities. It was a real privilege and joy to organize the new church at Spencerport with 42 members and we know it was a most happy occasion for the pastors and people of both Rochester and Spencerport churches and it marks another real step in a great program of advancement. Another very happy occasion was the organization of the new church in Endicott with 23 members which gives us a representation in the triple cities area where we have prayed earnestly for an opening and again we wish to thank God for answering prayer. Let us pray especially for this newest work.

We are very encouraged with the progress being made in all our new pioneer fields each of which is making real solid advancement and laying a good foundation for a strong aggressive church. Let us not fail to remember these pastors who are giving their best in what might be termed an uncharted course for Christ and our Church. We would also call attention to progress being made in several of our churches which have been established longer but which are definitely moving ahead as the reports will show.

While this has been a very good year and we rejoice that there is no occasion for a memorial service, yet there has been some illness among our pastors and their families and there have been four major automobile accidents among our pastors. In each case the car was demolished beyond use but, fortunately and we thank God for His protecting hand, no lives were lost and none hurt critically. How marvelous is the overshadowing of the Almighty! It became advisable for your Conference President to have some time off because of illness. The provision for this made possible by the Advisory Board was much appreciated and we thank God for very definitely helping us physically. We would like to express thanks to our vice-president who, at the request of Brother Dietrich and myself, assumed the responsibilities of the Conference during this period and also our thanks to the pastors and churches for their fine cooperation. Fortunately all churches were supplied with pastors at the close of the last Annual Session of Conference. However, we come to the close of this Conference year with an unusual situation with several of our pastors having answered the call to study or specialized fields of assignment. All of these are remaining as members of the Conference — only one is transferring back to his home conference and one is choosing work in another field. But God is definitely undertaking and already we have secured three strong men for our churches and we are in contact with others. We have received the transfer for George F. Kilpatrick and Bernard M. Roof.

The Christian Life Book Shop, which is owned and operated by the Conference, has made steady growth through the months since its beginning and especially during the past year with the exception of a short period during last summer. In August Mrs. Rees and I, by authorization of the Book Shop Committee, attended the Christian Booksellers Convention in Grand Rapids, Michigan, where we were privileged to meet many representatives from stores across the country and Canada. The lectures, work shops, and exchange of ideas as well as the study of display from more than 100 publishers together with the special buys offered proved to be helpful to our own Book Shop. We feel it was a definite answer to prayer that we were able to secure Rev. and Mrs. Edwin Foot from Washington, D.C. to come to the Book Shop with Mr. Foot as Assistant Business Manager. In our opinion the steady increase in gross business the past few months has been due to three things: one, the new location across the street in larger quarters; two, our store is constantly becoming more widely known; and third, especially the work of Brother Foot as Assistant Business Manager; but above all, God's definite answers to prayer. The cooperation and patronage together with the interest and prayers of our pastors and churches is much appreciated. Again we would like to express our sincere thanks and appreciation to Brother Bence, our Vice-President, for his faithful cooperation and counsel; to the Advisory Board, Board of Trustees and Building Committee for their fine cooperation and counsel; to the pastors and local

churches who have cooperated in a fine spirit of team-work which has made our progress, as a Conference, possible. We would express thanks to Mrs. Rees who has served faithfully in the office work and in sharing the burdens of prayer, and sincere appreciation to Brother and Sister Conley who have cooperated faithfully in many ways as neighbors and friends. We would, above all, express deep gratitude to God for His help and guidance and answers to prayer. Now, as we enter upon a new year, which actually has already begun, let us be alert to the opportunities and accept the responsibilities which are ours and move forward as a team endeavoring to constantly make ever greater progress in the Master's work.

In the evening the Building Committee met with the congregation at Blatchley to consider a new parsonage; the church authorized the building of a new parsonage. Aug. 16 - 19 — Mrs. and I, as authorized by the Book Shop Committee, attended the Christian Book sellers Convention in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Aug. 24 - 26 — Attended the Ministerial Retreat at Chambers.

Aug. 27th — Met with the Board of Trustees at Avon and authorized the purchase of lots and the location of the new church.

Sept. 19th — Attended the Wesleyan Youth Council at Baldwinsville.

Sept. 1 — Met with the Committee at Waterloo to plan the Fall Ministerial Fellowship.

Oct. 12th — The full Book Shop Committee met in Syracuse and completed arrangements to secure and move Rev. and Mrs. Edwin Foot to work in the Book Shop in Syracuse, Rev. Foot to be Assistant Business Manager, his duties to begin Nov. 2nd.

Oct. 17th — Attended the Sunday School Convention in the North Syracuse Baptist Church where, with the help of Mrs. Rees and Brother Turverey, a Book Shop display was arranged which proved to be very valuable especially as a promotional project.

Oct. 26th — We made arrangements to move Rev. and Mrs. Foot from Washington, D.C. to Syracuse Oct. 29 - 30. This task was completed with a minimum of expense especially due to the help of Brother and Sister Evans.

Oct. 27th — Met with the Building Committee at Avon in the interest of the new church.

Nov. 2nd. — Attended the Fall Ministerial Fellowship held in the Horseheads Church.

Nov. 12th — In keeping with the authorization of the Book Shop Committee, signed the new lease for the Book Shop in its present location through April 30, 1962.

Nov. 15th — Brought the message and dedicated the fine new Educational unit in Canisteo.

Nov. 18th — Met with the church in Avon at which time the new church building was officially authorized and a Building Committee was elected.

Nov. 22nd — Brought the message at the dedication service of the new church in North Bay, Canada.

Dec. 2nd — Held Quarterly Meeting at Fyler at which time the Conference President was invited to officially attend the meeting of the Policy Committee in planning

Dec. 4-6 — Ministered in long week-end service at Westfield.

Dec. 21st — Investigated a church for sale in Binghamton and concluded the cost of remodelling and redecorating would prohibit any purchase consideration.

Jan. 4th — Met with the Policy Committee at Fyler to discuss expansion plans.

Jan. 11th — Met with the committee in Elmira to make plans for the Ministerial work shop to be held in Syracuse February 29th.

Jan. 11th — Met with the Building Committee in Avon to consider building plans with Mr. and Mrs. ValVano, Architects of Rochester.

Jan. 21st — Met with the Fyler congregation and, after long consideration, it was voted to build a new church and to authorize a financial campaign to secure money for same.

Jan. 26th — Met with the Policy Committee of Rochester and Spencerport to consider organizing the Spencerport Church.

Feb. 1-24 — Scheduled a rest period in keeping with advice and decision of the Advisory Board.

Feb. 4th — Met with the Special Committee at Sampson Air Base to consider bidding on property for possible new location of Camp. Mr. Huttar, our attorney, also met with us by request. Matter referred to Board of Trustees and Special Committee.

Feb. 26th — Attended special business meeting at Spencerport at which time the Spencerport congregation voted favorably for organization.

Feb. 29th — Attended Ministerial work shop in Syracuse at which time pastors and wives had an opportunity to visit the Conference Book Shop.

Feb. 29th — Met with the Board of Trustees and members of special committee to investigate property at Sampson. It was voted to authorize a bid on two pieces for \$10,000.

Mar. 1st — Mailed letter to chairman of the Board of Stewards in each local church.

Mar. 2nd — Attended a special business meeting of the two churches — Rochester and Spencerport at Spencerport to officially vote on organization. It was voted to organize and plans were made accordingly.

Mar. 7-10 — Attended a meeting of the Houghton Area Conference Presidents at Houghton; also attended the Ministerial Refresher Course where we were scheduled to bring one of the devotional messages.

Mar. 14th — Attended a meeting of the Childrens' Camp Committee in Corning.

Mar. 17th — Attended Spring W.M.S. Convention in Odessa.

Mar. 17th — Mailed letter to the chairmen of the Pulpit Supply Committees in the local churches.

Mar. 31st — Met with the Policy Committee at Fyler and considered a dual membership which was rejected.

April 13th — Attended business meeting at Blatchley at which time they voted building plans for the new parsonage.

April 15-17 — Ministered in long week-end service at Lisbon and Heuvelton in the Champlain Conference.

April 24th — Brought the message and dedicated the fine new Educational unit at Elmira.

April 26th — The Conference Building Committee met with the local Building Committee at Blatchley to consider building plans for the new parsonage.

April 7th — Met with the Policy Committee at Fyler and a new constitution was proposed.

April 30th — Met with the Trinity Memorial Church at Endicott, by their

request or invitation, to consider the advantages and disadvantages of being affiliated with a denomination. We presented this subject which was followed by a period of questions and a time of discussion after which the church voted by ballot, almost unanimously, to become Wesleyan Methodist, and to proceed with steps to become fully affiliated with the Rochester Conference.

May 2nd — Met with the Conference Board of Trustees in Elmira to approve legal steps associated with the organization of Spencerport and to approve building plans for the new parsonage at Blatchley and other items of business.

May 10th — Met with the Board of Trustees of the Endicott Church at which time they authorized the calling of an official meeting of the members of the church to sell and deed the property to the Rochester Conference. This was done in keeping with Resolutions prepared by our attorney, Mr. Huttar.

May 16th — Met with the Building Committee of the Avon Church to approve building plans for the new church.

May 17th — Met with the Committee for the Home of the Aged of Houghton Area at Houghton. This matter will be presented later for your consideration.

May 20-22 — Ministered in long week-end service at Spencerport and organized the church Sunday night May 22nd with 42 members.

May 24th — Met Conference Board of Trustees at Chambers and approved building plans for the new Avon Church.

May 25th — Met with the members of the Endicott Church at which time they officially voted resolution, as prepared by Mr. Huttar, to sell and ultimately deed the property to the Rochester Conference. The vote was unanimous.

May 26th — Met with the group at Manlius Center to consider organizing into a Wesleyan Church. No decision was attempted.

May 28-29 — Ministered in long week-end services with others at Blatchley in a program which included their 100th Anniversary service, Old Home Day, and ground breaking on Monday for the new parsonage.

June 1st — Made a special trip with Rev. C. Wesley Bradley to talk with Mr. and Mrs. Seth Holmes concerning the status of their property as a Home for the Aged in the Houghton Area.

June 6th — Received a copy of the deed of the Willett Memorial Church to the Rochester Conference.

June 7th — Received the transfer of Rev. Bernard M. Roof from the North Carolina Conference and upon adoption of this report he will become a member of this Conference.

June 6-10 — Attended the Annual Meeting of the Board of Administration held in the new International Headquarters Building in Marion, Indiana.

June 14th — Met with the Conference Policy Committee at Waterloo. Report of this meeting will be presented to this Conference.

June 19th — Officially organized the church at Endicott with 23 members.

June 19th — Brought the message and dedicated the fine new parsonage at Bentley Creek.

June 21st — Attended a special business meeting at Fyler at which time a resolution was read stating there were several, including Wesleyans, who were withdrawing from the Fyler Union Orthodox Church with plans to launch a new program which would provide adequate space and be definitely Wesleyan.

June 22nd — Received the transfer of Rev. George F. Kilpatrick from the Lockport Conference and upon adoption of this report he will become a member of this conference.

June 22nd — Presided over a special business meeting at Endicott held for the purpose of electing new officers in keeping with the Discipline as a Wesleyan Methodist Church including a delegate to Conference.

We have conducted 32 Quarterly Business and Special Business meetings, met 15 times with Policy Committees, preached more than 80 times including 17 Pioneer Services besides devotional talks etc.; participated in several communion services, had

more than 36 personal conferences and 10 business conferences; called and met with the Conference Board of trustees several times, had several meetings of the Conference Building and Locations Committee. We have had two meetings of the full Book Shop Committee and several meetings with the Executive Committee of the Book Shop Committee, and have given a great deal of time to managing and promoting the business. We have sent out 7 circular letters and carried on a heavy correspondence; have prepared and sent out three circular letters to the chairmen of the Board of Stewards and Pulpit Supply Committees of the local churches, together with official ballots. We have counselled freely with the Conference Advisory Board concerning the work of the Conference and Conference policy. We have worked with the Pulpit Supply Committees where change of pastor was being planned. We have endeavored to keep in close touch with the pastors and churches and especially with our new Pioneer Work, and work with all groups in an over-all Conference program.

Recommendations:

1. That the Conference Board of Trustees be authorized to study the appraisal of property throughout the Conference looking forward to adjustments which will be more in keeping with modern costs and values and make suggestions to the local churches.
2. That the Board of Trustees be authorized to make a study of parsonage rental allowance looking forward to adjustments which will be more in keeping with local current rental rates and make suggestions to the local churches.
3. That all churches be requested to annually present in a series of studies the material known as Preparation for Church Membership and that all new members each year be asked to attend these classes.

Report No. 9

REPORT OF POLICY COMMITTEE

1. Standing Rule 18 to be headed "Conference Policy".

- a. Each church shall grant its pastor at least two weeks vacation each year, with pay; and the church shall furnish the supply.
- b. Each church shall grant its pastor the privilege of a two week revival meeting away from his pulpit each year, and the pastor shall pay his supply.
- c. It is understood the pastor shall have one day each week for rest and recreation. Accumulation of days shall not exceed three.
- d. Each church shall furnish an adequate heating system (preferably a central heating system); and a kitchen range for the parsonage as soon as possible.
- e. Each church shall furnish shades or venetians blinds, draw-drapes, curtain rods and fixtures for the parsonage.
- f. The church shall encourage and plan for the pastor to attend all Conference gatherings. (Ministerial Fellowships, District meetings, work bees, etc.) This is

an important part of the Conference work.

- h. The church shall encourage the pastor to attend the Annual Ministerial Refreshing Course at Houghton each year and shall make this possible by providing for the expense for the same or as much of that expense as possible.
- i. When a church anticipates changing pastors and invites a minister to candidate it shall provide the expense for such a trip.
- j. When a church changes pastors it shall pay the expense of moving in the incoming pastor.
2. All ministers shall furnish a report of his complete earned annual income to the Conference President and Treasurer for the purpose of assessment for mutual aid. This information is kept strictly confidential.
3. October shall be designated as Conference Pioneer Month during which special prayer and promotion of our Pioneer work shall be emphasized; the pioneer offering is to be taken Sunday October 16th.

There will be an exchange of pastors on October 9th. The schedule will be arranged by the Conference President and his advisory board.

4. The Conference shall promote the offering for Houghton Academy on Academy Sunday, the second Sunday in September, and also endeavor to raise the Educational Budget in full; of which, Houghton Academy receives 20%.

Any other appeals for offerings or otherwise, including personal solicitation, must be presented to and approved by the Conference officials. (The Conference President and His advisory board including the head of any Conference organization involved).

5. Outside speakers who are not Wesleyans other than the usual guests such as Gideon and Bible Society representatives etc.; and financial appeals other than the regular approved appeals shall require the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.
6. The Conference President shall be authorized to meet with small ministerial groups this coming fall to be arranged in size, time and place at his discretion and with the approval of the Advisory Board.
7. The proposed calendar of events for the coming year.

Report No. 12**REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE**

We recommend that the Woman's Missionary Society and the Wesleyan Youth be asked to pay for the printing of the number of pages in their portion of the Conference Minutes.

We recommend that where the pastor is a member of the Social Security plan that the church give the pastor a bonus sufficient to cover his social security payment.

We recommend that for the conference year 1960-1961 the expenditures for the Conference Administrative work be approximately \$5500 as follows:

A. The salary of the President shall be at rate of \$72.50 per week.

B. The Conference President shall be allowed expence at the rate of seven cents per mile and miscellaneous expenses.

C. The Conference is to assume the expenses of the parsonage utilities.

D. We recommend the Conference Treasurer be authorized to give the Conference President a bonus sufficient to cover his social security assessment plus the fifteen dollar minimum for Mutual Aid.

E. That the Conference President receive \$300 for secretarial work. In order to finance the above program we recommend that the following be adopted:

1. The Conference Budget shall be \$7.60 per member of which 25 cents will go for Chambers Camp expenses and 50 cents for Mutual Aid.

2. When the Conference President shall hold revival meetings within the bounds of the Conference \$50 per week shall apply on budget. Any balance above this amount shall be a love offering to the President.

The Budget Apportionment is assigned on a per capita basis and is divided at the rate of \$19.20 per full member of the church, and is divided as follows: General Conference Claims \$11.60 (World Missions \$2.00, Australia \$.25, Brainerd School \$.25, Church extension and evangelism \$1.50, Pension Plan \$2.00, Church Administrative fund \$1.00, General Conference expense \$.50, Board Meeting Expense \$.25, Orphanage \$.35, Education \$3.50); Rochester Conference claims \$7.60 (Conference Sunday School \$.05 based n total number in main school).

General Sunday School \$.20 based on total number in main school.

Report No. 13**REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY**

To the 116th Session of the Rochester Conference, the following accounting is made:

It was my privilege as your Sunday School Secretary to attend a meeting of the Conference Policy Committee; to speak at a Sunday School Convention at Taylor, N.Y.; to furnish the tape recorded Conference Sunday School Rally Address of 1959 to the Fyler, Waterloo, Wallace and Boylston Sunday Schools for use in Staff Meetings.

Sought to spark the sharing of working Sunday School ideas in our Conference News paper, first, by a letter contact with pastors and followed by reminders in the News. Circulated information concerning the National Sunday School Convention at Columbus, Ohio, and served as an information center for those desiring rides or riders to the Convention. Also, supplied to nearby pastors news concerning the Olean Regional Sunday School Convention in Portville, N.Y.

Secured through our Conference Book Shop 100 Award Ribbons to be given annually to Schools of the Conference that increase their average attendance by 10% or more.

Secured the Reverend Willard Crunkilton of Niagara Falls, N.Y. to conduct a Sunday School Workshop, answer questions, and give an inspirational address at our Conference Sunday School Rally of 1960. The Reverend William Woughter in charge of music; the Reverend Wallace in charge of Exhibits assisted by Reverend Willard Steele.

The total average attendance for the Schools of the Conference increased over the previous year by 121, or 5%.

AWARDS

The Conference Cups for the year ending May 31, 1960 are awarded to Canisteo, with a 4% increase, the greatest among schools 100 and up in average attendance; Berrytown, with an increase of 47%, the greatest among schools 60 thru 99 in average attendance; Pine Meadows, with a 64% increase, the greatest among schools up to 59 in average attendance. The pastor or a key-layman of these schools will each receive transportation in one car to a Sunday School Convention in the Fall to be worked out with those concerned by the Conference Sunday School Secretary. In addition to transportation as specified, each representative of cup winning schools will receive from the Conference fund, \$10.00 toward other Convention expenses.

The Ribbon of Merit is awarded to each of the following schools for achieving a 10% increase in average attendance for the year: Avon (31%), Baldwinsville (15%), Bentley Creek (16%), Berrytown (47%), Corning — Riverside (16%), Fyler (11%), Pine Meadows (64%), Redfield (14%), Sandy Creek (33%), Spencerport (14%).

THE AWARD STANDARD

The Sunday School Board recommends the following awards and standard for the coming year:

1. Each school in the Rochester Conference achieving a 10% gain in average attendance for the year will receive a Ribbon of Merit.
2. Schools competing for the Conference cups shall be divided into three groups: up to 59, 60 thru 99, 100 and up. The grouping of schools will be established according to the average attendance at the end of the last conference year. A cup will be awarded to the school in each group achieving the greatest percentage gain.
3. The Pastor or a key-layman of each cupwinning Sunday School may travel without charge in one car at the expense of the Conference Sunday School fund to the National Sunday School Convention or a comparable one selected by the Sunday School Board. In addition, each winner who takes advantage of this award will be given \$10.00 from the same fund for other convention expenses.
4. The Denominational Perfect Attendance Award System is recommended to the Schools of our Conference.

Each school shall have the privilege of omitting from its record of average attendance any four (4) Sundays of the year. To be counted present scholars must

be in attendance at least half of the Sunday School Session. Persons known to be in attendance at the Sunday morning services of our Annual Campmeeting, may be considered present at their local Sunday School for that Sunday or Sundays.

That a full time president be employed by the Conference, whose duties shall be in accordance with those set forth in the Discipline, paragraphs 147-150.

1. We recommend that the pioneer and newer churches shall be under the special care of the Conference President and his Advisory Board, until they shall have assumed the entire responsibility for their indebtedness, and with other Pioneer churches by mutual agreement of the Church and Conference President. The Conference President shall be a member ex-officio of the boards of these churches and shall be informed of the meetings of these boards with the agenda for same. He shall be sent a copy of the minutes of these meetings. The Conference President shall visit these churches as often as necessary to counsel and encourage the pastor and people.

2. He shall be required to study and survey possible fields for new work and report semi-annually to the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism. This board shall have the power to authorize further investigation and institute a definite plan of action.

3. The Conference President shall superintend the more established churches and shall endeavor to visit them once a year either at a Sunday service or business meeting. Each pastor shall adjust to the convenience of the President of the Conference so that his visit may be made with a minimum of time and travel.

4. He shall present the needs of the conference and church extension on every proper occasion.

5. He shall enforce the provision of the Discipline, and uphold the standards of the church as need may require.

6. He shall seek to co-ordinate the evangelizing efforts of the various churches or the Conference by suggesting to pastors a suited arrangement of meetings, and by counseling with reference to evangelists.

7. His Conference evangelistic dates shall be established by the President and his Advisory Board.

8. The Conference President is to be permitted to take two meetings per year outside the bounds of the Conference.

9. He shall be a member ex-officio of the Budget Committee.

We recommend:

1. That the following appropriations be made: Mrs. A. J. Shea from the Conference Fund, \$100. Mrs. Exa Rathbun from the Conference Fund, \$50.

2. That an appropriation be made for the Onondaga Reservation to the amount of \$600. to be taken from the Conference Fund.

3. That an appropriation be made for the new parsonage at Blatchley to the amount of \$200. to be taken from the Conference Fund.

The Executive Committee met at Waterloo January 25, 1960. Following prayer, the Spring Conventions with Rev. Cessna of Japan and Rev. Phipps from the Brainerd Indian School were planned. It was voted to have just afternoon and evening services. Orders of the Day were set up for Conference.

It was voted that linen rental at camp be: 10¢ per pillow case, 20¢ per sheet. It was voted drapes be purchased for Boy's Barracks. It was voted that pastors and their wives be given 25% discount on rooms.

The Executive Committee met on Chambers Campground June 29, 1960. Following prayer the Thursday evening services was planned.

Mrs. Reba Wright was appointed Matron for the coming year.

Mrs. Louise Rees was appointed Women's World Fellowship Secretary for 1960-61. It was voted to buy screens for Boy's Barracks.

It was voted to give the Ridgways \$70.00 from the cash offering Thursday evening.

We recommend that the amount of room rent to be given the Camp Committee be left to the judgment of the President and Treasurer.

Recommendations for the distribution of the White Christmas and April Self-Denial offerings were discussed. These will appear in Plan of Work.

STANDING RULES

1. Our first session of Conference shall convene at 10:00 Wednesday morning, the last Wednesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Wednesday after General Conference convenes. The forenoon session shall be 10:00 to 11:45 a. m. Afternoon session 2:00 to 4:00 p. m.

2. The first five seats shall comprise the bar of Conference.

3. The Conference Officials shall receive the following salaries:

President — \$15.00

Vice President — \$5.00

Secretary — \$10.00

Treasurer — \$35.00

Y.M.W.B. Superintendent — \$15.00

They shall receive their board and room during Conference.

4. Members of the Executive Committee shall receive traveling expenses equal to that voted by the Conference for Conference Officials.

5. There shall be elected a Conference Statistician whose term of office shall not expire until the close of the Conference session following her election. She shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee and shall be authorized to choose the members of said committee. She shall be seated within the bar of Conference and shall be given board and room during Conference. The local treasurers shall send both of their statistical reports to the Conference treasurer by June 5th. The local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall send their reports to the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 5th.

6. Each local society of the Conference shall close its financial and other records for the year, May 31st.

7. To receive credit all cash and vouchers must be sent to the Conference Treasurer and Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 5th. Any money sent after that date shall be applied on the next year.

8. It shall be the duty of the local president to forward to the Conference Secretary, who is a Committee on Credentials, not later than one week before the Annual Conference convenes the Credentials of the delegate from her society.

9. The Matron of the Dormitories shall be elected by the Executive Committee. Her salary shall be \$35.00 per year. Her board and room is to be paid during Conference and Camp. She may choose her own assistant whom the Conference will pay \$5.00.

10. The Y.M.W.B. Superintendent and the Conference Treasurer shall have their books audited by a competent bookkeeper before coming to Conference and the auditor send the report to the President.

11. There shall be a member of the Camp Meeting Committee present to council with the Executive Committee when plans affecting the Camp are being acted upon.

12. The method for paying traveling Missionaries shall be as follows:

Societies with less than ten members — \$2.00.

Societies with from 10-20 members — \$3.00.

Societies with over 20 members — \$5.00.

13. All missionaries, General Officers, former Conference Officers, and local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall be seated within the Bar of Conference and given the right to speak.

14. The Conference shall elect 3 members for a committee on committees which shall meet before conference convenes to nominate committees for the organization of conference. The President and Secretary shall be members Ex-officio.

15. The Executive Committee shall act as Orders of The Day Committee. The Secretary shall act as Committee on Credentials.

16. The offerings taken at Spring Conventions and Conference Public Meeting shall be divided as follows: one-third World Missions, one-third Conference Pioneer, and one-third approved project.

STANDARD OF EFFICIENCY 1960-1961

We recommend:

1. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society the first meeting after Conference (5% Credit) and that arrangements be made for one missionary prayer meeting each month. (5%)

2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted (5%) and at least one public meeting. (5%)

3. That a Women's World Fellowship Secretary be appointed by the Executive Board, who shall promote the program of the General WMS (5%); that a Prayer Partner Circle be formed under the direction of the WWF Secretary, and report sent to the Conference WWF Secretary within sixty days after Conference. (5%)

4. That a Solicitor be elected for the Wesleyan Missionary gaining not less than two subscriptions a year and that she use the Conference Church Key Combination on all Subscriptions. (5%) That the President, Secretary, Treasurer and the equivalent of 75% of the active membership be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary. (5%)

5. That a mission study secretary be elected and she report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by January 15. (5%) That 10% of the active members read at least four of the recommended books. (5%)

6. That a delegate be elected to the annual conference Woman's Missionary Society and that she pledge as instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the annual conference session (5%) and that the Y.M.W.B. Superintendent be seated in the annual session, be granted the privilege of speaking and provision be made by her society for such representation. (5%)

7. That the \$1.00 membership dues be sent to the Conference Treasurer and be forwarded to the General Conference Treasurer for the General Fund.

8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or achieve a ten per cent gain in total membership.

9. That each local society pay annually into the Conference Working Fund the amount assessed by the Conference Executive Board.

10. That the newly elected local President or Vice President attend the Con-

ference session and provision be made by her society for such representation. (Ten per cent credit for each of the above items, except those specified, and all societies making a grade of eighty per cent shall be placed on the Honor Roll.

Y.M.W.B. EFFICIENCY STANDARD

1. Twelve band services in which prayer, God's Word and personal service were stressed (10%)
- *2. One public service during the year (5%)
3. Band funds remitted quarterly — Sept. 5, Dec. 5, Mar. 5, June 5, (10%)
4. Use of mite boxes, envelopes, membership cards, or some other systematic method for gathering in dues and offerings (10%)
5. Band Superintendent be a reader of the Wesleyan Missionary (5%)
6. Increase in membership (10%)
7. Increase in funds raised (Credit 10%)
8. Offering for Church Extension (10%)
9. Offering for Education (10%)
10. Two cents per member sent to Conference YMWB Superintendent as desk fund (10%)
11. Annual Report sent in on time — June 5 (10%)
- * This service to be in addition to the twelve meetings each year.

RULES FOR ROOMERS

1. Write to Dormitory Matron for room reservations.
2. To hold a room from year to year one dollar deposit must be made with the matron. If the roomholder does not desire to use the room for any certain year, by notifying the matron two weeks before conference, the room may still be held the following year.
3. A room holder may not sublet a room.

PLAN OF WORK — 1960 - 1961

For each Woman's Missionary Society we recommend:

1. The election of consecrated officers with a vision to carry on all phases of the missionary work.
2. Emphasis on the field support of our conference missionaries, Rev. Robert Crosby and Rev. George Huff, through World Mission Offerings and cooperation with The World Missionary Department in support of its entire program, including "Penny a Meal".
3. The use of the "Guide", world maps, pictures, posters and audio-visual aids from Wesley Film Service.
4. That we keep a monthly Fast and Prayer Day.
5. That at least half and preferably all the April Self-Denial be designated for Conference Pioneer.
6. That the White Christmas Offering be designated for the Turvereys on the Onondaga Indian Reservation.
7. The election of a Mission Study Secretary whose duties shall be: to promote the Mission Study and Reading course; to send the annual report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by the 15th of January; and to form a Missionary library, which shall consist of at least the books in the Reading course.
8. That all monies be sent through the W.M.S. Conference Treasurer; Vouchers permitted for local church work, Community Missions and other objects when necessary. All remittances must be sent by Sept. 5, Dec. 5, Mar. 5 and June 5.
9. The observance of Educational Harvest Day with a program and offering (budget); the promotion of Honorary Enrollment; and a contribution to Houghton Men's Dormitory furnishings.

10. Payment of 50 cents per active member to constitute a W.M.S. Working Fund from which the treasurer may pay necessary expenses. (non-budget)

11. That \$5.00 be given for the Camp Building Fund; \$3.00 or more for the Medical Fund; promotion of the Mile of Dimes to be used for Mission equipment; and The Card Call Plan. (non-budget)

12. An annual offering to support the American Bible Society. Send to Conference Treasurer.

13. A contribution of \$5.00 for the Hephzibah Orphanage; \$5.00 for Australia; and liberal contribution to the support of Church Extension and Evangelism. (budget)

14. That stress be placed on personal evangelism with special emphasis on the Jew, March designated as "Focus" Month.

15. The choosing from this list of projects: New items will be credited according to cost; no cash credit for used items. Boxes of good clothing for Hephzibah, Onondaga and NAE Relief, quilts for camp and needy families, cancer dressings, clothing for child at Hephzibah, canned goods at camp —large jars of fruit — 45 cents per quart, jams and jellies — 40 cents per pint, vegetables — 35 cents per quart, dill pickles 25 cents, other pickles 45 cents. Camp needs are: pillow cases and double bed sheets (colored), single quilts 63" or single blankets, Army blankets, medium size plastic waste baskets, large bath towels, 7" or 8" potholders, large dishpans, plastic cream pitchers and sugar bowls, syrup pitchers and cooks' white aprons. Africa and Haiti can use baby layettes — essential parts, receiving blankets, bright dresses or materials, embroidery work, S.S. charts cards and flannelgraphs.

16. That each society inaugurate a program of community service, under the supervision of the Work Director and two other people in counsel with the President. (Needs arising from unemployment, illness or emergencies.)

REPORTS

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE W.M.S. PRESIDENT

To the members of the Rochester Annual Conference and of the Woman's Missionary Society. Greetings in the name of our precious Saviour. As we meet here on the Chambers Camp ground for our 55th annual session, we are very much aware of the unrest of our world in general. How wonderful it is that we can "Rest beneath the Shadow of the Almighty God", knowing that "He holds the future in His hands" for us as individuals as well as that of the nations.

We have counted it a privilege to serve another year as your Conference Missionary President. We are rejoicing today for victories won and lessons learned. It has been our aim to work with the pastors and local societies in such a way that through enlarged vision, God's kingdom may be extended, both at home and abroad.

Immediately following last Annual Conference, I arranged for the travel of Rev. Thomas Cowart to each of our churches. Conventions were held at this time, consisting of from two to five services, in twenty-six of our churches. Several missionaries were used and Conference Pioneer work was presented by Dr. David Rees in different ones of these conventions.

One new Society was organized at Manlius Center, late in September, by the Vice President, Mrs. Nora Woodhead. They report six active members and six magazine subscriptions. We welcome them to our fellowship.

Spring Conventions were held in Haskinsville, Odessa and Lyncourt churches. Since we did not have the mild winter that had been predicted when we planned the conventions for March, our attendance was rather disappointing especially in the afternoon at Odessa and Lyncourt. The messages brought by Rev. and Mrs. William Cessna, missionaries to Japan, and Rev. Neal Phipps, field representative for Brainerd Indian School, were greatly enjoyed by all who were able to be present. Dr. Reisdorph was an extra speaker at the Syracuse District. The total offerings were \$235.22.

The Missionary Board has granted Rev. Cessna the privilege of study in the States for the next two years. We are therefore, as a Conference Society, transferring

our field support to Rev. Robert Crosby. The Crosbys expect to serve in the South American field for the next two years.

I have sent out six form letters to all pastors and local presidents, besides eighty-four personal letters and cards. I have traveled about 400 miles for the missionary work. The total giving this year is \$19,447.82. This exceeds last year by about \$400. The membership is 977, a gain of 47. Magazine subscriptions total 546. Let us endeavor to raise these totals during the next year.

My hearty thanks to each of you who have faithfully labored in your local societies. May you continue to feel the need of permitting the Master to use your hands, heart and mind for the salvation of the lost.

REPORT OF THE WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT

To the members of the Wesleyan Youth of the Rochester Conference: Greetings in the Precious Name of Jesus! It has been a real privilege to serve as President of the Wesleyan Youth of our conference for another year. I have counted it a real joy to labor together with you in accomplishing God's purposes for the Youth of the Rochester Conference.

Promotional Work — I have sent out six circular letters to the WY Presidents, Counselors and Pastors promoting the WY Leadership course, the Pioneer Drive, WY Subscriptions, the Talent Contest and Youth Camp.

Conference News — The editor of the conference newspaper started a new feature in our **Conference News** this year by having a youth column on the back page. This has given you an opportunity to share items of interest from your local WY and it has also provided another means for me to share important information with you.

Leadership Course — This course was given at Baldwinsville and Horsheads. Notebooks were designed for each local Youth President. Classes were taught on the following subjects: The Purpose of Wesleyan Youth, The Responsibilities of a WY President, Conducting a Meeting, Planning the Program, Conducting a Business Meeting, The Youth Program for the Year and a spiritual challenge was given on "Living the Life."

We were, however, next to the top in the number of WY members compared to the size of our church membership in the conference.

Other Activities — As WY President I have met with the Camp Meeting Committee, and the Policy Committee, and have participated in the work which they have performed.

I am sincerely appreciative for the privilege of serving the youth of our conference in this capacity.
