He pointed out the urgency of getting into the new International Headquarters building just as soon as possible. At present our offices are scattered over some 650 miles. Our hearts were encouraged as we listened to how God is helping definitely in that direction at this time. The needs of the mission fields, both home and foreign, were brought before us. He made us feel what a privilege it is to belong to so wonderful a church, made up of such fine people. We were dismissed by J. F. Harrington.

Thursday Afternoon

He told of the organization and operation of the Indian Provident Fund which after several years of existence is proving most beneficial to our Indian pastors upon their retirement.

Rev. S. M. Yonally spoke briefly of the need for raising \$157.00 to make a full budget for the Pension Plan this year. Pledges were taken from various pastors for their churches to make up this deficit. Brother Millard dismissed with prayer.

Reports

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is a pleasure to greet the eighty-eighth session of the Kansas Annual Conference in the name of the Lord Jesus. For the blessings of the Lord and His gracious presence with us during this past year we are indeed grateful. We gladly give Him praise for all the victories gained and the progress made.

The closing of the books and preparing reports remind us that some day we will make our final report and God will open the books to read the account. Though many good revivals have been reported and several churches have received a fair number of members I feel certain that none of us are satisfied with the accomplishments of the year. We do hope that when the final accounts are revealed they will indicate that we have been true and faithful servants.

We praise God for two new organizations this year. However, we report the same number of churches since Idana and Hollis have been discontinued. On June 3, the Kansas City Park Ave. work, where Bro. Paul Glinn offered to pioneer without Conference assistance, was organized. Though this is a small organization with only eight full members and two associate they have been self-supporting from the begining. The property has been deeded to the Kansas Conference and the small mortgage is being paid off by the local group.

The Junction City group were organized as a church on June 30, with fourteen full members and one associate. Rev. H. J. Rothfuss went to this work immediately following last Conference. A beautiful brick veneer Sunday School unit 32 ft. by 85 ft. has been built for a very reasonable sum. The financial response has been very generous. This building has been occupied since the second Sunday of January. We are happy to present these two new organizations to the Conference.

As usual there has been considerable building expenditure on the

fields already established. The Denver church has been in the process of building a beautiful and commodious brick veneer church. Much progress has been made but the interior is not ready for use. The new building at Phillipsburg, another commodious brick veneer church, is nearly completed. It has been in use through the summer and should be ready for dedication in a few weeks.

At Lawrence the basement of the new building has been used throughout the year while construction has continued on the superstructure. The North Topeka church have completed their basement and have it paid for to date. They hope to begin on the superstructure following Conference. The St. Louis, Wesleyan Chapel group have just begun the construction of a new plant.

Special recognition should be given the St. Louis Overland church for completing the payment of their church debt. It will be a glad day when the auditorium can be built also.

The continued pressing need is the reduction of present debts so that more new fields can be developed. According to the National Association of Evangelicals there are 30,000 communities with 3,000 or less that have no church. Two million fewer Americans went to church last year than the year before. These are startling figures. The needs are alarming. Souls are lost. Jesus is coming. We must be aggressive in the cause of Christ. It is imperative that we enter more new fields. We urge you to pray that the Lord will direct the Conference Board to more open doors. I have been convinced that the needed pastors will be supplied if we succeed in entering challenging fields.

During the year we have endeavored to apply ourselves to the work assigned. It has not been because of a lack of interest or desire that we have not served you more efficiently. Your cooperation, patience and sympathetic understanding has, for the most part, made the work an enjoyable task.

Resolutions

The following resolutions which pertain to the local churches shall be read by the pastors to their people within six weeks after the receipt of the Conference Minutes and at least four weeks before the Annual Conference.

- 1. Fiscal Year: Resolved, that the closing date of the fiscal year be June 30, and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by July 15. We further request that he forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman not later than July 25.
- 2. Conference and Camp Date: Resolved, that the Conference begin annually at 1:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday in August for the organizing of Conference business and committee work, and continue through Saturday night or until completed, and that Camp begin the first Sunday morning following the beginning of Conference and continue through the second Sunday.
- 3. Order of Business: Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the following order of business be followed:

First, the front ten rows of the middle sections and the platform of the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

Second, all recommendations to travel or study be turned directly to the assistant secretary, who shall turn them to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Third, minister's reports shall be given immediately after the officer's reports are given and continue whenever other business will permit.

Fourth, business shall continue from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:30 p.m. to the hour for the orders of the day.

4. Nominating Committee: Resolved, that we elect a committee of five elders, including the president as chairman ex-officio, and five delegates elect from five churches designated by the Conference too:

First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting.

Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of Conference.

Third, examine all delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in to the committee after the first seating of delegates, and to report such to the Secretary, who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

Fourth, nominate the personnel of all the Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference.

Fifth, nominate the Committee Chairman for next year, including a full statistical Committee to be elected to serve the next year, and the chairman of the Ministerial Association.

Sixth, nominate the District Chairmen.

- 5. President to Appoint Tellers: Resolved, that following the convening of Conference and previous to the Orders of the Day for election of Conference Officers, the President shall appoint tellers for the occasion.
- 6. Election of Conference Officers: Resolved, that the election of Conference officers be held the second day of Conference immediately following the morning devotional period.
- 7. President's Duties: Resolved, that the Conference President's duties shall be: (A) Travel the Conference, visiting each church at least twice during the year, giving a total of three services to each church. The time of the visits and rotation of field and office work be left to the arrangement of the president; (B) Secure quarterly reports of the pastors, using the findings of the same for the purpose of promoting the spiritual and material welfare of the churches; (C) Urge

the proper repair and insurance of church property; (D) The president may upon his own initiative or upon the request of the Board of Stewards or the pastor of a local church call a meeting to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church; (E) Raise funds for the church extension program.

- 8. Auditing of Financial Reports: Resolved, that all financial reports together with the books that are to be audited by the Conference Auditing Committee be submitted to said Committee before being read on the Conference floor.
- 9. Introduction of New Business: Resolved, that all new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.
- 10. Orders of the Day: Resolved, that (A) the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Wesleyan Visitor"; (B) the following service be fixed as permanent Orders of the Day:

Tuesday evening, Conference Sermon at 7:30 by the Conference President.

Wednesday evening, Education Service at 7:30.

Thursday evening, Public Service of the W.M.S. at 7:30.

Friday evening, Sunday School Service at 7:30.

Saturday evening, Youth Rally at 7:30.

Sunday morning, Ordination Service at 9:30.

- 11. Camp Meeting Committee: Resolved, that the President of the Wesleyan Youth be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- 12. Evangelistic Help: Resolved, that the Campground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.
- 13. Additional Delegate: Resolved, that when more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.
- 14. Superannuate Service: Resolved, that one public service in each Annual Camp Meeting or Conference period be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Superannuate Board to arrange for such service.
- 15. 1% Assessment to be Paid: Resolved, that effective at the beginning of the Conference year 1955, every active minister of the Kansas Conference receiving an appointment by the Conference shall be required to pay 1% assessment on the total receipts for the current Conference year as determined by the rules and regulations of the Super-

annuate Pension Plan of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America; membership in the plan being optional, with the minister.

- 16. Tenure of Office: Resolved, that all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of Conference.
- 17. Pastors Paid Through Conference: Resolved, that the Church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through the Conference and Camp Meeting Period.
- 18. Pastor's Moving Expense: Resolved, that the church hiring a minister shall assume all responsibility of moving expense.
- 19. Pastor's Expense at Annual Conference: Resolved, that inasmuch as the pastor is actually a representative of the local church at the Annual Conference and Camp, that the local churches pay the expense of the Pastor and his wife, including room, board, and transportation, the same to be paid in advance.
- 20. Sunday School Attendance: Resolved, (A) that the two Sundays of Conference and Camp not be counted in the Sunday School average attendance reports made to Conference; (B) that our Sunday Schools determine their attendance by counting only those who arrive in time to attend a portion of the class period.
- 21. Quarterly Meeting Dates: Resolved, that the first quarterly meeting of the Conference year be held three months from the closing date of the previous conference year and that they continue throughout the year at regular three month intervals. Pastors are urgently requested to make proper provision for the observance of the Lord's Supper at these intervals.
- 22. Pastors Released for Meetings: Resolved, that at the request of the Missionary Board a church so approached shall release its pastor for one meeting, the same to be held on a new field or one of the weaker charges under the direction of said Board, and that the local church pay its pastor's salary during such engagement. The pastor so engaged shall receive money for the special meeting expenses incurred during such employment, the same to be paid by the church or charge being served, or by the Missionary Board.
- 23. Pastoral Nominates Steward: Resolved, that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.
- 24. Reporting of all Contributions: Resolved, that the Conference President and each pastor urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of more equitable distribution of funds.
- 25. Vacations: Resolved, that the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three

weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for vacation.

Resolved, that each church grants its pastor a two Sunday leave of absence from his work, that at least two full weeks might be spent for vacation and that the church give him one weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by pastor and church for vacation.

- 26. Money to Treasurer: Resolved, that the treasurers be urged to send all remittances to the Conference Treasurer in whole dollars when possible; and that the local treasurers send budget money each quarter to the Conference Treasurer.
- 27. Calling List: Whereas, most of the friends and members of our local churches are won through personal contact by the pastors; and, whereas, many of these friends and prospective members are lost in the changing from one pastor to another because the incoming pastor does not know of these people nor their interests in the church;

Be it resolved that the Conference shall ask each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday school, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street, and number; the same to be kept for his work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

- 28. Church Delegate Expense: Resolved, that the local church pay the Annual Conference church delegate's room, board, and transportation expenses, the same to be paid in advance.
- 29. Church Extension: Resolved, that one Sunday per month be designated by each church for receiving a special Sunday school offering. the same to be given to the Missionary Board for church extension and to help weaker churches not yet self-supporting, and that the pastor and superintendent help stimulate the giving in these offerings. That these monies are to be loaned without interest under the supervision of the Missionary Board.
- 30. Wesleyan Visitor: Resolved. (A) that the Conference shall publish the periodical known as the Wesleyan Visitor, the subscription price to be .75c; (B) that each Sunday school of the Conference pay a minimum of \$2.00 to supplement the subscription income of the Visitor, the same to be sent to the editor; (C) that each church so responding shall receive one subscription per .50c sent in; (D) that each church elect a subscription solicitor to the Wesleyan Visitor.
- 31. Conveying Property: Resolved, that all instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use, carry the official name of the church, viz., "The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."
 - 32. Trustees Authorized: Resolved, that all action taken here-

tofore by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meeting of such Annual Conferences concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, that the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seems proper and expedient and to the interest of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging, and conveying a real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

- 33. Board of Building and Location: Resolved, (A) that the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location consist of the Missionary Board and the Conference Trustees; (B) that the Missionary Board shall be composed of 5 elders, including the president as chairman, ex-officio, and 4 laymen, with not more than 3 of the members being changed in a given year; (C) that the travel expense of the Board of Building and Location be allowed at the rate of .03c per mile in excess of 100 miles round-trip, the same to be taken from the Missionary Board Treasury.
- 34. Conference Loans: Resolved, that the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Trustees.
- 35. Subscription Lists: Resolved, that all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W.M.S., or the Camp Meeting Committee and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor with a list of subscriptions from his charge.
- 36. Unleavened Bread: Resolved, that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-half cup of flour, one rounded table-spoon of butter, moisten with water enough to roll. Mark in ½-inch squares and bake as pie dough. This recipe will serve 65-70 people.
- 37. New Resolutions: Resolved, that all proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions, to be considered at the next Conference, be printed in the Wesleyan Visitor at least sixty days before the next session of Conference.

All proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions not so printed shall require a two-thirds vote to pass.

- 38. Ministerial Association: Resolved, (A) that the Annual Convention of the Ministerial Association be held on Tuesday, and Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in March of each Conference year; (B) that an offering equivalent to .25c per member be taken in each local church, to be sent to the chairman of the Ministerial Association. Such monies shall be used to defray the traveling expense of the pastors whose salary is \$1,850 or less, at the rate of .02c per mile, round trip! also that the pastor and his wife from said churches be given \$1.00 each per day for meals; (C) that pastors from the more distant churches that are over 200 miles round trip from the Convention be paid .02c per mile in excess of 400 miles round trip; irrespective of salary; (D) that the Ministerial Association Committee with the President of the Conference be authorized to engage Convention speakers as far in advance as it may seem advisable.
- 39. Prayer Convention: Resolved, that each district hold a District Prayer Convention, and that District Chairmen shall be responsible for planning such Conventions, the time and place to be announced in an issue of the Wesleyan Visitor.
- 40. Candidates to Elders' Orders: Resolved, that all candidates to Elders' Orders present the Committee on Itinerarcy and Orders a transcript of credits which may be accepted in lieu of the Conference course and a list of books and reading other than textbooks.
- 41. Pastors Vacating Parsonage: Resolved, that each pastor when moving from his charge, shall vacate the parsonage during the first week following the close of Camp week or at such time as designated by the Annual Conference or the President and his Advisory Board.
- 42. Room Reservations: Resolved, that any persons reserving rooms in Conference or School dormitories pay room rents one year in advance. In the event the room is not to be used at Conference the party shall inform the one in charge by the opening day of Conference, in which case monies received shall be refunded provided the one in charge is notified on or before the first day of Conference.
- 43. Solicitation of Funds: Resolved, (A) that requests by, and plans of all organizations and individuals desiring to visit the churches of the Conference for the purpose of soliciting funds, shall be referred to and cleared by a committee composed of the President of the Conference, the President of the W.M.S., and the Treasurer of the Missionary Board, before the completion of such plans with the local churches; (B) that we urgently recommend that 50% of all monies solicited from the churches of the Conference for projects not sponsored by the Conference or the Wesleyan Methodist Denomination shall be retained by the local church involved and contributed to Denominational Missions or to Conference Church Extension.

44. Pastor's Reporting of Contributions: Resolved, that amounts paid by the church for pastor's official expense be included on the Statistical Report in "Pastor's Salary," and that amounts paid by the church for parsonage utilities be included in "Pastor's Gifts." These amounts are not to be included in church incidental expense. Contributions for Benevolences that do not fall under any of the printed headings in Item IX are to be grouped under "Other Objects."

Reports

President's Report

It is with hearts of gratitude that we as WY'ers should approach this annual convention, for it is only by the Lord's mercy and His enabling grace that we are thus privileged to assemble. We are here not only to tabulate and record, we are here also to pray and plan and unite to find God's will for the year ahead and to continue in the great harvest fields of the Lord, reaping precious souls.

No finer motto nor more worthy goal could be chosen for this year's work both personally and as a Conference than our General Motto so recently chosen, "Workers Yielded." Let that be the desire and prayer of our hearts as we face the last year of the current quadrennium.

District Work

Much of the work of our conference is entrusted to the men who serve as District Chairman. Again it has been a real privilege to work with each of the ten men who have served in this capacity the past year. Considerable correspondence has been carried on with each District Chairmen and all of the 10 districts were contacted as directed by the 1957 Conference.

Local leaders are to be commended for their effective and efficient service making for any gains registered.

Other Work

Customary articles of a promotional and inspirational nature have been published each month in the Wesleyan Visitor as well as a few WY lessons for use in programming which appeared in the Wesleyan Youth magazine.

One of the thrills of the year was to work with the Kansas Youth Camp, serving as director. The Camp was held at Forest Park in Topeka, June 23-27, with a total of 128 registered. The privilege of serving as evangelist of the Colorado Youth Camp at Divide, Colorado, July 14-19, was appreciated. Rev. D. W. Campbell directed this Camp which was started this year, with a good enrollment.

Rev. Luke Turnbough will give details concerning the Ozark Youth Camp which he directed. A total of 199 young people, staff and workers were registered in the 3 conference youth camps this year, for which we are thankful.

Much valuable information and inspiration was received from the National Sunday School Convention, held at Grand Rapids, Oct. 30-Nov. 1. An oral report of the youth sections and youth directed courses will be given if desired.

RESOLUTIONS FOR THE WESLEYAN YOUTH

The local president shall read these suggestions to the society within 30 days after conference and 30 days before conference.

- 1. That each society sponsor a Youth Revival, the Executive Council being responsible for securing the evangelist, advertising and financing the meetings.
- 2. That the leaders for Wesleyan Youth Services be carefully chosen and the leader's names with lesson topics posted quarterly. It is recommended that the President lead at least once a quarter.
- 3. That emphasis be given to the Missionary Meeting of the Wesleyan Youth noting that the offering received applies on Church Budget and is divided 25% to Foreign Missions, 25% to Home Missions, and 50% to Education.
- 4. That emphasis be placed on the offering of Wesleyan Youth Educational Sunday, which is the third Sunday in July. All educational budget money received during the summer quarter may be credited to the Wesleyan Youth.
 - 5. That all societies sending money to the Conference Treasurer:
 - A. Remit the same quarterly by check or money order rather than small change, and that remittance slips be used and filled out properly. These remittances to be mailed within 5 days following the close of the quarter.
 - B. That all societies remit Youth Camp Apportionment in full, to the Conference Treasurer no later than January 15, and that said monies be disbursed to the district Youth Camp Treasurer.
 - 6. That attention be give to local representation at the Annual Wesleyan Youth Conference.
 - A. The newly elected President or Vice-President.
 - B. Two delegates. (One additional delegate for societies whose membership exceeds 25).
 - C. The Pastor.
 - D. In case there is no local Wesleyan Youth organization the pastor may appoint a representative (age 13-40).
 - 7. That the fiscal year close the thirtieth of June and that all monies sent to the Conference Youth Treasurer be postmarked by the fifth of July, and that the Conference Treasurer's books and financial statement be sent to the Conference auditor by July 25th. All reports are to be sent to the Conference Youth Secretary by the tenth of July. These include:
 - A. Annual Report.
 - B. Delegate Credentials.
 - C. Efficiency Standard Report.

- 8. That the local president and adult counselor receive the Conference Visitor, these subscriptions to be paid at the Annual Conference by the society treasurer.
- That one service be designated for the promotion of Conference Church Extension Revolving Fund. (See Finance Report).
- 10. That each district plan at least three Conventions a year, one of which shall be under the direction of the Conference President, and that the district Chairmen be responsible for making a report of these conventions to the Conference Visitor.
- 11. That the Conference Wesleyan Youth President work out the district visitation itineracy with the District Chairman to the end that mileage expenses may be kept to a minimum.
- 12. That a Youth Rally be held on Saturday of the first week of conference, such meeting to be planned by the Executive Council.
 - A. That a portion of the program be given for a conference wide Bible contest.
- B. That District Bible Contest team members who are not official representatives be provided board and room while on the grounds; These arrangements to be made upon the registration of the contestants. These expenses to be paid from the Conference Promotional Fund.
- C. That an award be given to the "A" society with the highest points of the efficiency standard. This award will be presented at the Saturday night rally. If societies be tied in points, the winner will be determined by per cent of gain.
- 13. That there be a Nominating Committee composed of the Wesleyan Youth Conference Executive Council and the first delegates elect from Heber and Hutchinson Societies and Pastors from Topeka Gage Park and Topeka North. (Societies rotating alphabetically) The duties of the committee shall be:
 - A. To examine all credentials and certificates.
- B. To nominate all sessional committees and committee chairmen for the ensuing year.
 - C. To nominate all District Chairmen.
 - D. To nominate members of the standing committees.
- $\mbox{\bf E.} \quad \mbox{\bf To select tellers and secretaries to serve in the election} \\ \mbox{\bf of officers.}$
- 14. That the Annual Wesleyan Youth Conference convene on Monday morning of the annual Camp Meeting and that sessions be held from 8:30 a.m. to noon, on Monday and Tuesday, and 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. each day until business is completed.

 - A. Report of the Nominating Committee.
 - B. Report of the President.
 - C. Report of the District Chairmen and Officers.

We recommend:

- 4. That the bands have at least one meeting each month, and a public meeting once every three months.
- 5. That the money be sent quarterly to the Superintendent, Mrs. Oletha Hoerner, Route 5, Clay Center, Kansas. Quarters ending, September 30, December 31, March 31, and June 30, and remittances post marked not later than the third of the following month.

- 6. Our Membership goal to be 2,400 and our goal for dues and offerings be \$4,000.
- 7. That at Conference an award be given to the Band that has met the largest number of the following items:
 - (1) For having reached a goal of 100% on the Efficiency Standard.
 - (2) For having the greatest percent increase in membership.
 - (3) For raising the largest amount of money per member.
 - (4) For bringing a poster to Conference, as well as attendance chart.
 - (5) For at least 50% of the active members, memorizing the assigned scripture.
 - (6) For fulfilling obligations mentioned in items 10, 11, and 12.
- 8. The new Superintendent elected at the annual election of the W.M.S. take office at the beginning of the New Conference year, and the same to be treasurer of the band. We request each Superintendent to attend Conference, if possible.
- 9. The Superintendents' books be closed June 30, and the annual report sent to the Conference Superintendent, postmarked not later than July 5, 1958.

Kamakwie church became self supporting and built their church in 1953. They are now building their parsonage. One native pastor resigned from his pastorate with a good salary because he felt the need to go into evangelism even though he would not receive a salary. Two Missionaries are in full time evangelism, the Huffs. The needs in evangelism, education and medical work are great in face of the cut in funds but two miracles of answered prayer, the new hospital and the coming of Doctor Princell encourage us that God can perform miracles.

(Ten per cent credit shall be given for each of the above items and all societies making a grade of 80% shall be placed on the Honor Roll).

CONFERENCE WORK

- Conference goal for coming year: 850 active members; 325 honorary members; 1000 magazines.
- The President and District Chairman arrange the time and recommend the worker for Conference and Convention Visitation.
- 3. Each district supervised by the District Chairman under the direction of the Conference President.
- 4. We recommend that at least one workshop for the Y.M.W.B. and Children's worker be held annually.
- 5. The districts are divided as follows:

Kansas City District—Immanuel, Kansas City, Missouri, Olive St., Kansas City, Missouri, Park Ave., Kansas City First, Lawrence, Leavenworth.

FINANCE REPORT

- 6. That \$1.00 per day plus room rent be allowed for the care and supervision of Abbott Hall during camp and for the final cleaning.
