

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Fairmount, Indiana, August 12, 1946.

The ninety-eighth session of the Indiana Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened on the Camp Ground at 7:30 P. M. August 12th.

The song service was conducted by Virgil Sheets.

Prayer was offered by Dr. F. R. Eddy, General Conference President and Connectional Agent.

The message of the hour was delivered by the Rev. E. L. Kierstead, Vice President of the Conference. He spoke on the subject of "God's Family." He used as a text I Peter 2:9 "But ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people." The message brought forcibly the facts of the high privileges of the individual who is a member of the family of God. but along with the privileges there are responsibilities.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

- 1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 2. That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.
- 3. Any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 4. The Committee on Elder's Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 5. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the Pastor may live.
- 6. It is the duty of the Pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.
- 7. All charges and stations to which a Pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said Pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any

one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

- 8. Each Pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the fifth day of August. The Pastor shall report in open Conference the amount of Pastor's salary received, the amount of Budget assigned and raised, loss or gain in membership, the number of Wesleyan Methodist papers, Missionary magazines and Young People's Journals taken. The official character of any pastor shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 9. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 10. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice-President \$35.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; the same to be paid from the Conference Missions and Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday school Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday school Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday school Treasury.
- 11. In the examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 12. The Conference shall elect three members of the Camp Meeting Committee, one to be elected each year for a term of three years.
- 13. The Pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President quarterly on blanks furnished by the Conference.
- 14. We believe that the healing of the body is among the gifts of the Spirit according to 1 Corinthians 12:7-11, hence not for all Christians at all times as it is not always the will of God to heal the body.
- 15. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other **denominations** as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations, is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.
- 16. The Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

- 17. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.
- 18. Each Pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$1500.00 a year shall seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to one of the weaker churches—whose total pastor's receipts are \$1000.00 or less—to help establish it. And that the church which he pastors grant him such privileges without censure and that with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. And that the Vice-President of the Conference serve as a Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.
- 19. The Storehouse Tithing Plan is the Conference plan for financing the Church work and the following percentage basis is the rule for distributing the same: Local Church Work, 70%; Budget, 30%. A Tithing Secretary be elected and that one evening service in the Conference Session be given for a Tithing Service and all Tithing Bands or churches of the Conference be called to give their yearly report, and some minister be chosen to preach on the Storehouse Tithing Plan. The expenses of Tithing Literature and Postage are to be paid from the Conference Missions and Expense Fund and churches desiring literature may secure the same from the Tithing Secretary. This service is a Special Order of the Conference.
- 20. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference and Camp Meeting to the Marion daily papers.
- 21. The first Sunday of the Annual gathering belongs to the old year, and the second Sunday of the Annual gathering belongs to the new year.
- 22. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.
- 23. The President of the Conference, Vice-President and Conference Missionary Secretary shall be given each year a two weeks' vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.
- 24. When churches which have been placed in the hands of the President, if they can and do decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to the press, the same shall be entered in the minutes the same as if ordered by this Conference.
- 25. In case of an emergency the President and the Board of Trustees are empowered to make a special assessment to meet the need, and the funds are to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and credited to the Sick Preachers Benefit fund.
- 26. Each charge shall grant to its pastor each year a two weeks' vacation with pay.

- 27. No pastor whose total receipts are \$1500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution number 18, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Committee.
- 28. All building and repair on Conference property which the local church is unable to provide for satisfactorily shall pass the approval of the Conference Building Committee before obligations are assumed.
- 29. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.
- 30. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.
- 31. The Sunday school offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between Connectional Home Missions and Conference Missions and Expense Fund until these budgets are in full. The same shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.
- 32. The Camp Meeting Committee shall have the privilege of putting out pledge cards in the congregation, receiving these pledges from friends, taking cash offerings throughout the Camp and designating one or two nights during the Camp as "dollar night." All Camp Meeting pledges shall be sent to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.
- 33. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.
- 34. Delegate's Credentials shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor not later than ten days before the convening of Conference, and he shall notify the Secretary of the number of credential blanks needed before the Fourth Quarterly Meeting.
- 35. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August 15th.
- 36. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.
- 37. This conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday School. Listing the relationship they hold to the church. Listing their names and addresses by city street and number. The same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.
- 38. The sitting of the conference for each day is considered as one meeting.
- 39. The secretary and the assistant secretary constitute a committee on communications.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS EXPEDITION

We the undersigned being elected as a special Committee on Expediting the business of the conference submit the following recommendations:

ITEM I.

We recommend that the sitting of the conference for each day be considered as one meeting and in accord with this the roll shall be called and the minutes shall be read at the beginning of the morning sitting only, and that after the noon recess, a brief devotional period shall be provided, after which the unfinished business of the morning sitting shall be taken up.

ITEM II.

We recommend that the Secretary of the Conference and the Assistant Secretary be constituted a committee on communications. It shall be their duty to receive all communications to this body, and they shall present to the conference only letters of importance or general interest to the body and any items of business arising from communications as may require action by the body for their proper disposal.

They shall make their report daily at such time as the chair may provide, and in addition to such letters and items of business as they may present, they shall state the names of all those who have reported to this body by letter. And they shall respond to all communications on behalf of the conference without further action or authorization by the conference.

ITEM III.

We recommend that the foregoing items be placed in the standing rules of this body.

Report No. 3

EVANGELISTIC SINGERS AND CHALK ARTISTS

We, your committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, authorized to bring in a plan for licensing evangelistic singers and chalk artists, the same to be presented to the General Conference give the following recommendation:

Item I. When there are members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church who feel called to the special ministry of song evangelism or chalk drawing, they may be licensed as such for one year by the annual Conference provided: they have been recommended for such work by the local church of which they are members; give evidence of grace, gifts, and usefulness; have had some experience in song evangelism or chalk drawing; and have been carefully examined, by the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders of the Conference of which they are members, regarding their spiritual, intellectual, and other fitness for such work.

Item $\dot{\mathbf{H}}$. The Licenses of evangelistic singers and chalk artists may be

renewed each year by the annual conference of which they are members provided: they are regularly engaged in such work; have taken or are taking the evangelistic singers course (two years) or its equivalent or comparable work in chalk drawing in one of our colleges (2 yrs.) or an acceptable course from another school, or the Evangelistic Singers or Chalk Artists course or its equivalent under the direction of the Committee of Itineracy and Elders Orders; and have been recommended by the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders.

Candidates taking the Course under the direction of the Committee of Itineracy and Elders Orders must pass at least one book per year and the entire course must be completed within five years from the time of the granting of the first license by the annual conference.

Item III. The annual conference may assign licensed singers and chalk artists to the General Evangelistic Work provided: they have completed one of the courses recommended; are properly qualified for general evangelistic work; and are properly endorsed by the annual conference for such work.

Item IV. The licensed singers and chalk artists shall be amenable to the annual conference from which their licenses are received, shall report to their conference annually, but shall have no vote in the annual conference, and for conduct out of harmony with the Bible and Church Discipline shall be dealt with by the same disciplinary methods that govern local preacher and Elders in the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Report No. 8

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriation, submit the following report:

We recommend the following appropriation:

Item I. That the Budget Apportionment per member be as follows: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Connectional Home Missions, \$1.00; Connectional Education, \$1.50; Orphanage, 25 cents; Conference Missions and Expense Fund, \$2.00; Camp Meeting Expense Fund, 75 cents; Superannuated Ministers Fund, 50 cents; Sick Preachers Benefit Fund, 25 cents. That all church budget excepting that raised by the W. H. and F. M. S., Y. M. W. B. and W. Y. P. S. be sent to the Treasurer of the Conference.

Item II. A special assessment of 20 cents per member for the General Conference Expense and Delegate Fund. The same to be sent to the Conference Treasurer on or before June 1, 1947.

Item III. Superannuate Pension Plan.

A. Since the Conference has adopted the Superannuate Pension Plan there shall be a special assessment of \$1.00 per church member for the Sinking Fund.

B. All preachers who expect to participate in the Plan are required to pay a membership fee of \$25.00 each. The same to be paid by the time Conference closes in 1947.

C. The foregoing should be sent to the Superannuate Pension Plan Treasurer. (See Directory).

Item IV. That the Conference Sunday School apportionment be 10 cents per enrolled member in the main school.

Item V. That the price of the Conference Minutes shall be 25 cents per copy with an allotment of one copy of the minutes for every six members; and should any deficit in this fund occur, that it be paid from Conference Missions and Expense Fund.

Item VI. That the W. Y. P. S. Connectional dues be 50 cents per active member of the W. Y. P. S.

Item VII. That the President shall have supervision of the general work of the Conference and shall not be required to hold more than 30 quarterly meetings during the year.

He shall be assisted by the Vice-President and the Conference Missionary Secretary, both of whom shall devote their full time to holding of quarterly meetings and Conference Extension in new or needy fields within the bound of the Conference.

The Vice-President and the Conference Missionary Secretary shall be responsible for the promotion of the Conference Missionary work, but under the supervision of the Conference President and the Missionary Board.

The President, Vice-President and the Conference Missionary Secre-

tary shall work jointly and co-operatively in planning the program of the quarterly meetings and of Conference Extension work.

And we further recommend that at least one quarterly meeting be

held on each charge during the year by one of these officials.

Item VIII. We recommend that the salary of the President be \$2700.00 per year and expenses incidental to his work; and the salary of the Vice-President and the Conference Missionary Secretary shall be \$2400.00 each per year and expenses incidental to their work.

Item IX. We recommend that the proposed building program for Marion College be continued as recommended by the Local Board of Managers and passed by the Book Committee, and that the Conference accept the goal of \$2.00 per member per year for a three year campaign for this purpose. This is the closing year for this campaign. This is to be sent to the Treasurer of Marion College.

Item X. That the last sentence in standing rule No. 10 be changed to read as follows: The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Conference Sunday School Treasury.

Item XI. That we approve the asking of the Book Committee concerning the "Wesleyan Hour" Radio Broadcast. The Sunday School pay one cent per enrolled member and that a special offering be taken once per month. The same to be sent to Rev. Cecil Clifton, Director of the "Wesleyan Hour."

. Item XII. We recommend the following concerning the Indiana Weslevan Messenger:

A. That the President, Vice-President and the Conference Missionary Secretary constitute the Executive Committee of the Wesleyan Messenger.

B. That the Vice-President be the Editor. That the Conference Missionary Secretary be the Business and Circulation Manager.

C. That the Executive Committee be authorized to employ an assistant as need demands, to be the typist for the Editor and also to be the Mailing Secretary for the Circulation Manager.

D. That we authorize the Executive Committee to organize so that the work be as nearly as possible equally divided among themselves.

E. That the expenses of this Secretary be paid by the Conference Treasurer from the Conference Missions and Expense Fund as authorized by the Executive Committee.

Report No. 9 REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

We, your Conference Sunday School Board respectfully submit the following report.

Under the blessing of God our Sunday Schools are able to report increases on all items but one. Increase in enrollment 630; in average attendance 1281; in conversions 41; in benevolences \$1890.51; in D.V.B.S. 3 schools, with increase in enrollment of 237 and an average attendance of 172. We thank God for these favorable signs of His blessings.

In the item of converts joining the church we have fallen—120 under that of last year. May we put greater emphasis on this in the year before us.

Three Training Schools for D.V.B.S. workers were conducted by well qualified leaders under the direction of the Rev. E. J. Mills. These were well attended and did much good.

Report No. 11

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Your committee on resolutions submits the following report:

First: That we unite our prayers for a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit to the end that in this age of atomic power we may meet the challenge of moral reconstruction with the dynamic of the positive gospel which is still "the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth."

Second: Whereas the liquor traffic has become deeply entrenched in the personal and national life of our country to the extent that 50 million Americans drink, 20 million of which are women and of this number three million are excessive drinkers, of which 750 thousand are known alcoholics;

and whereas the annual expense to the Federal government for the treatment of alcoholic wrecks in mental institutions alone has reached 18 million dollars;

and whereas our National government in 1945 spent more than 1½ million dollars of our tax money for alcoholic beverages in diplomatic entertainment; also that our government is now manufacturing and selling intoxicating liquors;

Therefore we believe it to be the Christian duty of every minister and layman to use his influence to secure for the State of Indiana a local option law that will enable any community by majority vote to prohibit the sale of liquor within its bounds.

Third: Whereas it is evident that the hierarchy of the Roman Catholic church is actively engaged in hindering and blocking wherever possible the granting of passports and visas to Protestant missionaries;

Whereas it is evident that the Roman Catholic church is making desperate bid for political power in the U. S. A., so much so that because of having 75% of the personnel of our State Department Roman Catholic she is dominating our foreign policy.

Whereas it is her admitted aim to get sufficient power in the U. S. to curb the freedoms of speech and of the Protestant religion.

Be it resolved that the pastors of our church sound the warning to our people to be on their guard by, 1, Not voting for any Roman Catholic for public office; 2. By strenuously opposing every effort of the Roman Catholic Church to secure public funds for transportation of her children to her parochial schools and for the purchase of books; 3. By asking the General Conference of our church to petition the President of the U. S. to withdraw immediately his personal ambassador to the Vatican, Mr. Myron P. Taylor, whose presence at the Vatican is contrary to the spirit of the Constitution of the U. S. and contrary to all our historically and accepted standards of the separation of Church and State.

Report No. 12

BE IT RESOLVED

THERE SHALL BE A SUPERANNUATE PENSION PLAN

Item I. It shall be established as follows:

- 1. By gifts, bequests, and endowments.
- 2. Each member of the Plan shall pay a membership fee of \$25.00, which fee is to be paid by the time Conference closes in 1947.
- 3. The Conference shall levy a special assessment of \$1.00 for each church member for the conference year of 1946 and 1947.
- 4. These funds shall be known as the Sinking Fund.

Item II. It shall be maintained as follows:

- 1. By gifts, bequests, and endowments.
- 2. A budget of \$1.50 per year per each church member, beginning at the rise of Conference in 1947; to be paid quarterly.
- 3. Each member of the Plan shall pay 1 per cent of his total receipts excluding parsonage rent; beginning at the rise of Conference in 1947; to be paid quarterly.

Item III. It shall be administered by the following method:

- 1. There shall be a Board of Managers of the Plan consisting of four elders and one lay-member, and the Board shall elect a secretary and treasurer from among their number, the treasurer to be custodian of this fund. The members of the Board shall be elected by the Conference, one of whom shall be elected to serve one year, one to serve two years, one to serve three years, one to serve four years, and one to serve five years. This Board shall set up the Plan for operation and be empowered to make adjustments of assessments and benefits from time to time as prevailing conditions may demand. If at the time of the beginning of the operation of this Plan the balance in the Sinking Fund is not sufficient to pay benefits as per the following schedule, this Board shall determine the amount of benefits it shall pay when it begins operation.
- 2. The Board and the Treasurer shall be required to make their reports to the Conference at the time of its annual gathering.
- 3. The Secretary of the Board shall be required to keep a complete record of the status of each member of the Plan, and forward such information to the Pension Treasurer, at least annually.

Item IV. Persons eligible for membership shall be:

Elders and conference preachers who are giving full time to a pastorate, and provided that no preacher shall be eligible for benefits until he has been ordained and his time of service shall begin with his first full time pastoral appointment.

- Elders who are giving full time to a conference or connectional office and lay-members who are giving full time to a connectional office.
- Evangelists who are giving full time in the evangelistic field and missionaries.
- Item V. Benefits shall be paid quarterly on the following scale:
 - 1. Married members may be paid annually not to exceed \$20.00 per each year of service rendered to the Wesleyan Methodist Church in the Indiana Conference.
 - 2. Single members and widows of members not to exceed \$14.00 per each year of service rendered to the Wesleyan Methodist Church in the Indiana Conference.
 - Under no circumstances shall any one family receive more than one benefit.
 - 4. Should an individual who is eligible for membership fail to become a member and later on desires to do so, he may become a member by paying all past assessments from the first date of his eligibility.
- Item VI. The age of retirement shall be 65 years, but no benefits shall be paid before actual retirement. However, a member may become eligible to receive benefits if he becomes permanently incapacitated before his 65th birthday.
- Item VII. Should a member fail to pay his assessments at any time he forfeits his rights to benefits, but he may be re-instated by the approval of the Board and paying all unpaid assessments. Should a member be compelled to withdraw temporarily from active duty because of ill health either of himself or some member of his family, he may retain his membership in the Plan by paying the average of his past annual assessments.
- Item VIII. Should a member withdraw from the Plan, he may draw out of the treasury not to exceed 50 per cent of all he has paid in, and all other funds paid into the Plan by the member shall be forfeited to the Plan.
- Item IX. Should a widow re-marry her name is automatically dropped from the benefit roll. In event of the death of any member of the Plan and also the death or re-marriage of his widow, his heirs, legatees, assigns, or estate shall have no right or claim to any interest in the Plan.
- Item X. It is provided that all persons who are on the Superannuate list at the time of the adoption of this Plan shall become members of the Pension Plan without being required to pay the initial membership fee.

- Item XI. It is also provided that the balance in the Superannuate Funds shall be transferred to the treasury of the Pension Plan at the rise of Conference in 1947.
- Item XII. Conference shall retain the right to revise and change the rules of this Plan at any of its annual sessions by a two-thirds vote.

It was moved and supported that the Treasuries of the Young People's Society and of the Youth Camp be bonded, and that the bond be set by the Executive Committee.

The motion was amended as follows:

The Treasury of the Young People's Society be bonded, and that he act as Treasury for the Youth Camp. The bond to be set by the Executive Committee.

The motion and its amendment were carried.

STANDING RULES

- 1. The first session of the W. Y. P. S. Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of Conference week at one o'clock and sessions shall be continued daily until all business is transacted.

- 6. The executive committee be composed of president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, the divisional superintendents, and the president of the annual conference.
- 7. The Ways and Means Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the W. Y. P. S. conference and a sixth member chosen from the Committee on Finance and Appropriations of the main Conference body.

- 8. The W. Y. P. S. conference shall be composed of four divisions. A superintendent shall be elected annually for each division, whose duty it shall be to work with the district presidents in seeing that all churches in the districts have organized societies with a complete membership roll.
- 9. All delegates' credentials shall be sent with the statistical blanks to the secretary not later than August 4.
- 10. That there shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and that the date of the camp be set by the W. Y. P. S. Camp Meeting Committee.
- 11. That the manner of election of district officials shall be by a nominating committee that shall be composed of five members, the chairman, who shall be a pastor in the district who is vitally interested in young people, and four other members from different churches where possible. This nominating committee shall bring in a report at the last rally of the year. It shall bring at least two names for each office. The president shall be elected by ballot.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, your committee on Ways and Means, submit the following report:

- I. We recommend that the following become a standing rule: That the manner of election of district officials shall be by a nominating committee that shall be composed of five members, the chairman, who shall be a pastor in the district who is vitally interested in young people, and four other members from different churches where possible. This nominating committee shall bring in a report at the last rally of the year. It shall bring at least two names for each office. The president shall be elected by ballot.
- II. That the Indiana W. Y. P. S. comply with the Discipline, Par. 398, Art. 4, Sec. 1: "There shall be a Conference W. Y. P. S. President, Vice-president, Secretary and a Treasurer. These four, together with the President of the Annual Conference and the four Divisional Superintendents shall be the Executive Committee of the Annual Conference Society. The Executive Committee of the Annual Conference Society.

cutive Committee shall be ex-officio members of the business meeting of the Annual Conference."

- III. That the vice-president not be a Divisional Superintendent but work in cooperation with and under the direction of the president.
- IV. That the office of secretary and statistician be combined and that it be known as Conference Secretary.
- V. That each district cooperate with the following state program as to rallies: (a) One group rally to be held in each division on Friday following Thanksgiving. (b) At least three other rallies to be held in each district, the time and place being set by the respective divisional superintendents working in conjunction with the District President. (c) State Rally at Campgrounds May 30.
- VI. That each district secure its divisional superintendent as speaker for one rally during the year.
- VII. That all churches send their statistical report to the secretary by August 4.
- VIII. That the executive board of the W. Y. P. S. have complete charge of helping new works.
- IX. That the pastor and society president shall make out their annual W. Y. P. S. report together to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- X. That Standing Rule No. 1 be changed to read as follows: The first session of the W.Y.P.S. Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of conference week at one o'clock and sessions shall be continued daily until all business is transacted.
- XI. That Standing Rule No. 3 be changed to read as follows: (a) The president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer shall be elected by ballot. (b) The divisional caucuses shall be held at the close of the first session by each of the divisions to nominate a divisional superintendent to be elected by the conference.
- XII. That Standing Rule No. 4 be changed to read as follows: The executive committee shall nominate the chairman and members of committees, their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of the annual conference.
- XIII. That Standing Rule No. 6 be changed to read as follows: The executive committee be composed of president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, the divisional superintendents, and the president of the annual conference.
- XIV. That Standing Rule No. 9 be changed to read as follows: All delegates' credentials shall be sent with the statistical blanks to the secretary not later than August 4.
- XV. That there shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration, and that the date of the camp be set by the W. Y. P. S. camp meeting committee.

FINANCE

- I. That the area president receive traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.
- II. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows: (a) President, \$75.00; (b) Vice-president, \$20.00; (c) Secretary, \$30.00; (d) Treasurer, \$40.00; (e) Divisional Superintendents, \$20.00 each. Said salary shall be paid at the end of the first quarter.
- III. That desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer be paid from the general fund and of the divisional superintendents from the evangelistic fund; and that said expenses be paid quarterly.
- IV. That the budget be as follows: (a) Connectional dues, 50 cents per active member of the local society to be paid by December 31, 1946; (b) Conference budget: 20 cents, pioneer evangelism; 10 cents, general fund; 20 cents, Youth Camp; 5 cents, General Conference Delegates Fund. The Conference budget is based on church membership and shall be paid by the local society.
- V. That traveling expenses be figured on the basis of four cents per mile.
- VI. That the executive committee shall have power to appropriate money from the general fund for the general promotion of the Youth work.
- VII. That all offerings above expenses of divisional and district rallies be sent to the conference treasurer to apply on pioneer evangelism.
- VIII. That we urge each local society to cooperate with the church in raising money for the college building project, conference extension, use of the college loyalty fund chart, and the Wesleyan Hour.
- IX. That two copies of the report of the Ways and Means Committee be mailed to each church and district president within three weeks after the close of conference.
 - X. That special mention be made of all societies raising a full budget.
- XI. That the executive committee of each local W. Y. P. S. consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.
- XII. That all money paid by local societies, other than local projects, be sent to the conference W. Y. P. S. treasurer not later than August 4.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Women of the W. H. & F. M. S. of the Indiana Conference: Another year has swiftly passed by. It has been a busy year and we trust a fruitful one. Our women as usual have been lovely to work with, the district superintendents and local presidents have all been very co-operative. We are anticipating a good financial report.

All societies contacted have given liberally for all appeals. Equipment was purchased for Miss Peggy Rickey who is now serving the church in South America; for Miss Marguerite Poe and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Coleson who are soon to go to India. Societies or districts purchased a Mimeograph machine and a washing machine for India, kitchen equipment for Marion College and the men of the College purchased a stoker for the Missionary Center. Liberal gifts were made to various arms of the work, especially to

Church Extension. All of these items with many personal gifts to missionaries were above the budget.
